

WHEREAS, this new statute, Section 466-a of the Real Property Tax Law, authorizes Nassau County to decrease the number of years volunteers must serve to be eligible to receive the partial exemption from taxation for volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers from five years to two years; and

WHEREAS, in the judgement of this Legislature, it is in the interest of Nassau County to implement the newly authorized real property tax exemption in order to recognize and reward our volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers for their service; now therefore

BE IT ENACTED by the County Legislature of the County of Nassau as follows:

Section 1. Section 6-2.6 of Title A of Chapter VI of the Nassau County Administrative Code is an1ended to be read as follows:

§6-2.6 Partial Exemption from Taxation for Volunteer Firefighters and Volunteer Ambulance Workers

1. Real property owned by an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service or such enrolled member and spouse residing in Nassau County shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of up to ten percent of the assessed value of such property for county purposes, exclusive of special assessments.

2. Such exemption shall not be granted to an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service residing in Nassau County unless:

(a) the applicant resides in the city, town or village which is served by such incorporated volunteer fire company or fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service;

(b) the property is the primary residence of the applicant;

- (c) the property is used exclusively for residential purposes; provided however, that in the event any portion of such property is not used exclusively for the applicant's residence but is used for other purposes, such portion shall be subject to taxation and the remaining portion only shall be entitled to the exemption provided by this section; and
- (d) the applicant has been certified by the board of directors of the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or voluntary ambulance service as an

enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or voluntary ambulance service; provided, however, that such applicant has been an enrolled member for no less than two years.

3. Any enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service who accrues more than twenty years of active service and is so certified by the board of directors of the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service, shall be granted the ten percent exemption as authorized by this section for the remainder of their life as long as their primary residence is located within Nassau County.

4. Un-remarried spouses of volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers killed in the line of duty. The County shall continue an exemption or reinstate a pre-existing exemption claimed under this section by an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service, for such deceased enrolled member's un-remarried spouse if such member is killed in the line of duty; provided, however, that:

- (a) such un-remarried spouse is certified by the board of directors of the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as an un-remarried spouse of an enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service who was killed in the line of duty; and
- (b) such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least five years; and
- (c) such deceased volunteer had been receiving the exemption prior to their death.

5. Un-remarried spouses of deceased volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers. The County shall continue an exemption or reinstate a preexisting exemption to an un-remarried spouse of a deceased enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service; provided, however, that:

- (a) such un-remarried spouse is certified by the board of directors of the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as an un-remarried spouse of a deceased enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service; and
- (b) such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least twenty years; and
- (c) such deceased volunteer and un-remarried spouse had been receiving the exemption for such property prior to the death of such volunteer.

6. Application for such exemption shall be filed with the Nassau County Assessor on or before the taxable status date on a form as prescribed by the commissioner.

7. No applicant who is a volunteer firefighter or volunteer ambulance worker who by reason of such status is receiving any benefit under the provisions of Article Four of the Real Property Tax Law on the effective date of this section shall suffer any diminution of such benefit because of the provisions of this section.

§2 Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder

thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

§3 It is hereby determined, pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), 8 N.Y.E.C.L. Section 0101 et seq. and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of Title 6 of 6 N. Y. C.R.R. and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, that the adoption of this local law is a "Type II" Action within the meaning of Section 617.5(c)(26) and (33) of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and, accordingly, is of a class of actions which do not have a significant effect on the environment; and no further review is required.

§4 This law shall take effect immediately

Any conflict or deficient written description of the boundaries of the nineteen legislative districts contained in Annex A of the Charter shall be resolved in favor of the map contained in Annex A of the Charter as interpreted by the digital equivalency file, using Caliper Corporation's "Maptitude for Redistricting Version 2022 Build 5015" using their 2020 New York Prisoner Adjusted Final Redistricting Data, filed with the Clerk of the Nassau County Legislature with this Local Law. §3. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

§4. It is hereby determined, pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 8 N.Y.E.C.L. section 0101 et seq. and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, that this Local Law will not have a significant effect on the environment, and that no further review is required.

§5. Effective Date: This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon the filing of the law with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the New York State Municipal Home Rule Law.

§2. Any conflict or deficient written description of the boundaries of the nineteen legislative districts contained in Annex A of the Charter shall be resolved in favor of the map contained in Annex A of the Charter as interpreted by the digital equivalency file, using Caliper Corporation's "Maptitude for Redistricting Version 2022 Build 5015" using their 2020 New York Prisoner Adjusted Final Redistricting Data, filed with the Clerk of the Nassau County Legislature with this Local Law.

§3. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

§4. It is hereby determined, pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 8 N.Y.E.C.L. section 0101 et seq. and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, that this Local Law will not have a significant effect on the environment, and that no further review is required.

§5. Effective Date: This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon the filing of the law with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the New York State Municipal Home Rule Law.

14	Miranda got his department issued

16	to the house through the exterior wall.
17	The officers switched off using the
18	breaching tool and an off duty fire
19	department volunteer who was there
20	working for the Town of Hempstead
21	Sanitation also helped break down the
22	exterior wall. They were able to locate
23	the victim, pulled her from the house.
24	She was unconscious and not breathing.
25	CPR was performed and she was transported

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2	to a local hospital, Ambulance 2351, for

6	victim out of the house. This is why

24	that breaching tool that you all
25	authorized for us to buy. And it went
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2	into that car and he used it. Taking
3	turns, they pulled that victim out

14	opportunity. So thank you for that.
15	This case was started on September
16	30th of 2022, is a report of shots fired
17	at a location. The officers responded and
18	it was negative results. The detectives
19	responded back the following day and they
20	recovered shell casings at an
21	intersection. They did a thorough
22	investigation, numerous interviews were
23	done. They recovered two videos of the
24	shooting. They were able to identify both
25	shooters.

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2	Again, they did multiple canvasses
3	and interviews. The suspects were
4	eventually stopped in a car stop. They
5	were found to have weapons on them, and
6	the detectives responded. Detective
7	Barbieri went and secured oral interviews
8	and confessions from them. Detective
9	Rodriguez had the case from the beginning
10	on the onset and all the way through, the
11	guys did a terrific job. It's still an
12	active case, so they really can't comment
13	on it. But if you want to ask me any
14	questions, you're free to do that. Thank
15	you very much.
16	The February case is a case for Pete
17	Sikinger and the members of the gang
18	unit, and Joe Grasso is the prosecutor
19	from the ADA's office. This case happened
20	on April 25, 2022, around 3:43 a.m. at
21	the Park West Nightclub in Westbury. Two
22	rival gangs were involved in a shooting.
23	Over 40 rounds were fired. One suspect
24	was shot multiple times. Detective
25	Sikinger responded. He's got a great
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	knowledge of the gangs and the people
3	involved. He identified this as a gang
4	shooting through confidential informants
5	information he received, physical
6	evidence collected at the scene, and an
7	extensive criminal investigation of the
8	incident, they were able to get a
9	probable cause on five different
10	shooters.
11	Joe Grasso, the ADA, who was
12	assigned this case, extensive experience
13	being an ADA in the city. He's only been
14	out here for about ten months, but also
15	very knowledgeable on homicides and
16	gangs. And between the two of them and
17	their knowledge, they were able to indict
18	these five shooters on 57 different
19	charges. The case is still active, again,
20	but Detective Sikinger and ADA Grasso are
21	currently connecting these shooters, to
22	other shootings in Nassau County. These
23	guys are what we would consider career
24	criminals and they're responsible for a
25	crime wave just on their own.

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2	But I'd like to congratulate them
3	for the hard work that they do. And if
4	there's any questions, I'd be happy to
5	answer them. Otherwise, I'll put the
6	Commissioner on.
7	COMMISSIONER RYDER: So as we all
8	know, the rules have changed and the
9	Nassau County Police Department has
10	adapted. The great work by these
11	detectives that can't speak about the
12	cases that they did because they're
13	ongoing, is why we're getting a chance to
14	recognize them and can't get up and take
15	any questions. They're ongoing
16	investigations.
17	This case working with our District
18	Attorney's office, our gang unit, going
19	after the worst of the worst, and then
20	our DA going out and moving forward to
21	prosecute.
22	Our district attorney, young ADA
23	here, his dad was also a hero, and was
24	legal counsel at one time for the
25	Commissioner's Office, NYPD. He's also

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2	here. I'd like to recognize his dad here.
3	There he is, over there taking pictures.
4	But also a leader in his own way and
5	doing great work as a lawyer.
6	Partnering up with the District
7	Attorney, getting great cases gathered by
8	these detectives, getting the statements
9	that they've taken, putting the evidence
10	together and presenting a package to a
11	good young ADA is what gets the
12	prosecution, gets the ball across the
13	line. And when you get it across the
14	line, we put the bad guy where he belongs
15	in jail. And that's exactly what's going
16	to happen in these cases.
17	So I want to congratulate both of
18	them and thank the District Attorney's
19	for its continued cooperation with the
20	Police Department. Thank you.
21	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
22	Several legislators want to speak. So we
23	have Legislator Gaylor, Legislator Kopel,
24	and then Legislator Ford.
25	LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Sure. Thank you,
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2	Presiding Officer.
3	My remarks are directed to the
4	January incident, which we can't go into
5	too much details. But it's always a
6	privilege for me to hear stories of the
7	great work that all of our law
8	enforcement community and our District
9	Attorney's office, in combination with
10	the law enforcement community, are doing
11	to recognize those folks in a forum like
12	this.
13	So this month, I want to commend
14	Detectives Rodriguez and Barbieri for
15	their thorough investigation and
16	interviews with eyewitnesses culminating
17	in the arrest of at least two people,
18	maybe more, ongoing, the recovery of
19	loaded firearms and vehicles and whatnot.
20	Just testament to the great work that you
21	guys do and continue to do.
22	Fortunately, in this incident, there
23	was no injuries from the dangerous
24	exchange of gunfire, an incident that
25	started in Inwood, and I think it ended
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2	up in Hempstead. But it's clear that
3	these individuals posed an ongoing threat
4	to the community. And since there's no
5	telling what kind of harm they may have
6	caused until they're apprehended and
7	taken off the street and we can put a
8	stop to this kind of activity.
9	So your hard work, as I said, is
10	testament to the fine training. All of
11	our men and women in blue receive that
12	allows them day to day to serve and
13	protect and keep our community safe. And
14	so this is another example why Nassau
15	County Police Department is the finest
16	law enforcement department, organization
17	found anywhere in this country.
18	So congratulations to Detective
19	Rodriguez and Detective Barbieri for
20	being January Top Cop. Appreciate it.
21	LEGISLATOR KOPEL: So let me start
22	with with Detectives Rodriguez and
23	Barbieri. I not only represent a good
24	part of the area that you that you serve,
25	I live there. I live there. I live not
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1	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	far from where this incident happened in
3	Inwood. And I've got children and
4	grandchildren over there.
5	What you've done and your hard work
6	makes me feel safe. Makes me feel safe
7	for myself, not only for myself, but for
8	my family as well. And I appreciate
9	everything that you're doing.
10	And not to neglect the Detective
11	Sikinger, as well as ADA Grasso, we all
12	know that gangs are a terrible scourge,
13	not only here, but all over the country,
14	many, many large cities. And you do
15	dangerous work. And it's just it's just a
16	good feeling to know that you're on the
17	job.
18	And your work, all three of you, all
19	four of you, I should say, exemplify the
20	spirit and the courage, all of which
21	combine to make Nassau County the safest
22	large metropolitan area in the country.
23	So congratulations on this award and
24	thank you very much for your service.
25	LEGISLATOR FORD: Good evening. All
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2	I can say is one can never underestimate
3	the courage and the level of
4	professionalism shown by our officers,
5	especially our detectives.
6	Detective Sikinger, your devotion
7	and dedication in working to solve this
8	crime, resulting in these dangerous gang
9	members being taken off our streets, I
10	have to say this success was the result
11	of your own dedication and your
12	determination to solve it, but also with
13	the partnership with ADA Grasso, who also
14	had a great knowledge of gangs which
15	helped in being able to solve this case.
16	I have to say congratulations to
17	both of you for making our neighborhoods
18	safer. It really is. I think that you
19	hear from the other legislators, we know
20	how dangerous your jobs are and having to
21	deal with these gangs. It really is, to
22	me, it goes one step above because we
23	know how dangerous they are and the
24	retaliation that they can show whether or
25	not to regular folk and even to our

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2	police officers. It's extremely
3	dangerous.
4	But thank you, both of you. And I
5	think we also should have to say, well,
6	Commissioner Ryder, of course, you know,
7	you lead this fine Police Department and
8	we see it day in and day out. And as the
9	Presiding Officer said, every time we
10	have, we're honoring our Top Cops, it's
11	always for a different reason. Whether or
12	not it's going into burning buildings,
13	helping to keep somebody from committing
14	suicide. They could be on train tracks or
15	wherever. It's always a different
16	experience. And I have to say that it is
17	always something that will always stay
18	with us knowing the dangers that they
19	face.
20	And I guess we'll have to do a
21	special shout out to DA Donnelly for
22	bringing ADA Grasso here into Nassau
23	County. You know, find job for both of
24	you. For all of you. Thank you very much
25	(applause).

4	to proceed with the Agenda. So if we
5	could just have your attention for a
6	little while longer.
7	The Nassau County Legislature is
8	proud and privileged to celebrate Black
9	History Month. Harriet Tubman said,
10	"Every great dream begins with a dreamer.
11	Always remember you have within you the
12	strength, the patience and the passion to
13	reach for the stars, to change the
14	world".
15	Today, we recognize African
16	Americans who have shown the strength,
17	the passion and the patience, often in a
18	struggle against extraordinary
19	circumstances and adversity, to triumph
20	in all walks of life. So we salute all
21	those who have changed our world and are
22	still changing our world.
23	I'd like to introduce Legislator
24	Giuffre for the purposes of presentation
25	and then Minority Leader Abrahams.
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2	LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: So at the West
3	Hempstead Chamber of Commerce meeting
4	last week, I had the pleasure of seeing
5	two young women who I recognized from the
6	cover of <i>Newsday</i> . And I said, Are you
7	the twins that are valedictorian and
8	salutatorian of West Hempstead High
9	School? And they answered in stereo,
10	"Yes". And it was a delight. They are as
11	nice as they are smart, and they are our
12	honorees for Black History Month.
13	I have the privilege to represent
14	them and their family in the County
15	Legislature. They are from West
16	Hempstead. And so we'd like to
17	acknowledge and honor Gloria Guerrier and
18	her sister, Victoria Guerrier, who at
19	West Hempstead High School have GPAs of
20	105.4 and 104.9, respectively. Did I get
21	that right, girls?
22	(Whereupon, Guerrier ladies
23	confirm.)
24	(Whereupon, applause.)
25	LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: All right. And
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	there's got to be some record that they
3	broke. Twins. How many times could this
4	have happened?
5	So their first assignment for their
6	college was to look back and see
7	they're going to Yale, by the way
8	(applause) To see how many twins in
9	Nassau County have met this this
10	achievement. And we have with them also
11	tonight, their mom, Marie (applause).
12	He's done a great job. And not only was
13	he their teacher at Chestnut Street
14	School, but he is now the superintendent
15	of the West Hempstead School District.
16	Dan Raymond (applause).
17	And I know before I bring you up,
18	their history with the Nassau County
19	Legislature goes all the way back to
20	kindergarten. Legislator Walker?
21	LEGISLATOR WALKER: I had the
22	privilege of reading to Victoria and
23	Gloria when they were in kindergarten.
24	Although that's not my district, Dan, the
25	superintendent, happens to be a

3	grew up with my kids and he was a
4	principal over in Chestnut Street and
5	asked me what I please come and read to
6	his class. And at the time, Vin
7	Muscarella was the legislator that

10	district. But, you know, I have a special
11	connection with the principal teacher
12	there. And so he said, Absolutely. And
13	although they were little girls at that
14	time, five years old in kindergarten, the
15	smiles they have today were the same
16	smiles they had when they were five years
17	old in kindergarten. And I will never
18	forget those smiles and sweet little
19	girls. And they've grown up to be sweet,
20	amazing young women who are now headed
21	off to Yale. And we could not be prouder.
22	And I'm going to have to go through all
23	my pictures and find that picture and
24	then compare the two today and back when
25	you were five years old in kindergarten.

3	and share this special night with you.
4	God bless you all and the best of luck.
5	LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: So if you'd like
6	to come up for photographs. Oh, please go
7	to the podium. Tell us a little bit about
8	yourselves and what you plan to do.
9	So who's older?
10	GLORIA GUERRIER: I am. So, hi, I'm
11	Gloria. Thank you, all, for inviting me
12	today. I'm so honored by this
13	recognition. I want to thank Nassau
14	County and all the administrators who
15	have supported me throughout my journey.
16	I couldn't have done or achieved this
17	much without you guys. The support I
18	received and all the aid and I really
19	appreciate it. And thank you so much.
20	VICTORIA GUERRIER: Hi, I'm Victoria
21	Guerrier. Yes, I'm the younger one. Twin
22	B, salutatorian. Always come after
23	Gloria. But honestly, I'm very happy for
24	my sister and for myself. I'm happy both
25	of us made it together as top two. Also,
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2	I'm also very appreciative of the support
3	I've gotten from Nassau County, the
4	teachers, my coaches. I would never have
5	accomplished this if I was in another
6	county, I believe, personally. So thank
7	you guys so much. I'm very honored. And
8	yes, thank you.
9	LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: So would you
10	like to come up? We'll do pictures with
11	everybody. You too, Mom. And yes,
12	Superintendent Raymond.
13	(Whereupon, Citation
14	presented.)

4	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you,
5	Presiding Officer.
6	So I think the Presiding Officer
7	started to talk a little bit about it.
8	Obviously, we're in Black History Month,
9	and during this time we try to celebrate
10	collectively on both sides, individuals
11	that have made their mark not just in the
12	last year, but have continued to make
13	their mark time and time again. And I
14	have the pleasure on behalf of the entire
15	Legislature of introducing Jeffrey and
16	Cheyenne Spencer. And at this time, I
17	would ask both of them to come to the
18	podium.
19	Jeffrey and Cheyenne are father and
20	daughter duo. They're lifelong residents
21	of Hempstead. Jeffrey is a firefighter
22	and his daughter Cheyenne is a ophthalmic
23	technician. Approximately eight years
24	ago, they began hosting events within the
25	community, starting with the safe

3	sit down dinners and turkey giveaways for
4	those that are less fortunate. What
5	started off small, grew to them to
6	hosting numerous events throughout the

9	dinner, where they serve the dinner and
10	give toys to hundreds of kids and
11	community members every year.
12	Their duo has fueled the smiles and
13	joy, and they bring many more families
14	together each and every year. Obviously,
15	during those times, government can't do
16	it all. And it's very important that we
17	have community individuals like Jeff and
18	Cheyenne that are here to be able to do
19	their part. They don't do it for money.
20	They don't do it for anything else but
21	the warmness that it gives them in their
22	hearts. So it gives me great pleasure to
23	recognize them today as our Black History
24	Honorees for obviously, the month of
25	Black History. Thank you again to both of

4	MS. SPENCER: Thank you.
5	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I have a
6	citation here, but before I introduce you
7	and have you come up for the
8	presentation, please, the floor is yours.
9	MS. SPENCER: I just want to thank
10	you all for even considering honoring us
11	tonight. Like you said, my dad and I have
12	been doing this about eight years. This
13	Christmas would be our ninth. And we're
14	just grateful. We appreciative of the
15	support. And also the support that we get
16	from these two gentlemen behind us,
17	Village of Hempstead Trustees Boone and
18	Burrows. And I see a few familiar faces
19	that have been to our events before.
20	So I just want to thank you. And
21	like you said, we don't do it for
22	anything but the joy that we're able to
23	see and feel, putting smiles on hundreds
24	of people in the communities faces. So
25	thank you for honoring us.

3	You good, Jeff? Trustees. You're
4	good. All right. Fair enough. Come on up.
5	(Whereupon, Citation
6	presented.)

3	let's get started with public comment.
4	First speaker is Brian Sullivan,
5	president of Nassau COBA.
6	MR. SULLIVAN: Forgive me, folks. I
7	was outside talking to our new sheriff.
8	Brian Sullivan, President, Nassau
9	County Correction Officers Benevolent
10	Association.
11	I just wanted to say a couple of
12	quick words. Tonight is not my night to
13	be here. Tonight is Anthony LaRocco's
14	night to be appointed as the sheriff in
15	Nassau County.
16	Obviously, several weeks ago,
17	whatever it was a month and a half ago,
18	whatever, we were here for a Public
19	Safety hearing and a lot of warts came
20	out. A lot of stuff that I've been
21	talking about here for the longest time.
22	Out of that meeting, I want to thank
23	several of the legislators that went over
24	to the jail and had a meeting with the
25	Administration. Legislator Pilip,

2	Legislator Ferretti and Legislator Denise
3	Ford. Some things were rectified. Some of
4	the stuff that I talked about and I want
5	to thank you for getting involved in
6	this. There's been some increase in post
7	coverage in the perimeter outside, which
8	was definitely a bone of contention with
9	us.
10	The main thing that I just want to
11	stress here is, the last two sheriffs
12	that were appointed in Nassau County I
13	had high hopes of that there was going to
14	be a lot of cooperation, there was going
15	to be, whatever. One of them was a
16	captain on our job. The next one came
17	from outside, had a resumé that went down
18	the block and we didn't get anything
19	done. There was no cooperation with the
20	union. There was a lot of excuses why we
21	can't get things done; Money, this, that,
22	COVID, everything else.
23	I am not here to block or talk any
24	bad way about Anthony LaRocco. I know
25	Anthony LaRocco for probably 25 years. Do

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2	I think he could be a very good sheriff
3	in Nassau County? Yes. My issue is not
4	with Anthony LaRocco, and I'm not going
5	to go off on any tangents here. But I
6	think everybody in this room and in this
7	county knows where my issues are with
8	management in the jail.
9	I hope that Anthony LaRocco, once
10	he's appointed as the sheriff, will be
11	able to control that situation and we
12	will have a fruitful and cooperative
13	relationship.
14	One thing I can can talk about,
15	obviously, until I'm blue in the face is
16	staffing here. We just had, Civil Service
17	certified a test back in January excuse
18	me, February 1st. Sorry, just trying to
19	get my brain together. I was having
20	conversations in the back.
21	February 1st of this year, this past
22	month, Civil Service certified a test. We
23	thought that was the test that was given
24	in June of 2022. That was the test that
25	was given in September of 2021. That was
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	just certified this past month. That's
3	not the fault of the Department. That's
4	not the fault of anybody else. I don't
5	even know if it's the fault of Civil
6	Service. I just don't understand why that
7	has to take so long.
8	It's my understanding now that the
9	test that was given in June of 2022, the
10	test results just hit the last several
11	days. People are calling me up saying
12	that there's people there.
13	The 2021 test that was certified
14	February 1st, amazingly had a list of 74
15	eligibles on it. I say this all the time
16	when I come here. I'm here 1000 years.
17	I'm like Methuselah. Thirty five years
18	ago, I took this test with 18,000 people.
19	This past test was given in 2021, they
20	have 74 eligibles on that test. We're
21	going to be in a bad way, if that's what
22	continues down the road.
23	This new test that just came out
24	today, I have it on good authority that
25	there is approximately 520 eligibles. And
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	when you think about the average, you're
3	lucky to get one out of seven, one out of
4	ten. We're going to run through that list
5	pretty quick, too.
6	It's also my understanding,
7	information and belief, to sound like a
8	lawyer, that there may be another test
9	given in June of this year. We have to do
10	something. And that's the stuff that I
11	need to implore with Anthony LaRocco as
12	the new sheriff, as everybody here with
13	the Public Safety Committee, in
14	particular, with the County Executive's
15	office, with all of our administrators.
16	We can't go down the same road that we've
17	gone down with all past administrations.
18	We can't just not do something different
19	to bring people in to this job. This is a
20	very good job. I know it's a different
21	world now. Millennials, everything else
22	they could they could yell at me for what
23	you want. People don't want jobs like
24	this. You give a test that maybe 1000,
25	maybe 600 people test. We have to come up

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2	with a different plan.
3	We opened up the borders. We're
4	going into Queens or going into Suffolk.
5	There's other talk about possibly taking
6	people from other jobs and bringing them
7	here from different counties. I think we
8	need to explore all of this.
9	That's the main issue that I want to
10	talk about here is the staffing and the
11	cooperation between the County, the
12	Administration and the Union. We can't
13	all be compartmentalized in our own boxes
14	throwing dirt at each other. I've done
15	that a thousand times. It doesn't get
16	anywhere. We go through different
17	administrations. I'm here trying to
18	develop new relationships with new
19	administrations. Where does it get us? It
20	doesn't get us anywhere.
21	Perfect example that I could talk
22	about now. How many times did I talk in
23	front of this Legislative Body about our
24	academy. Our academy that we had on the
25	jail property was old, dilapidated inmate
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	housing trailers. The police left there
3	in, God, forgive me, I think it was 2003
4	the police left there. We were in there
5	just until this new academy opened up in
6	Garden City.
7	Now, unfortunately, because of some
8	people looking for time and space in
9	there, our department has actually
10	brought back onto the jail property part
11	time in another old inmate housing area
12	to set it up, kind of just jerry rig it
13	up and set it up to put in service
14	training back on jail property in old
15	inmate housing areas. To me, this is
16	absurd. We shouldn't be doing this. We're
17	in the new academy over there. There
18	should be plenty of room. It's my
19	understanding that it's a lot smaller
20	than it was initially anticipated to be.
21	But what are we telling correctional
22	officers here? This this far down the
23	road after that academy was built?
24	There's talk about doing something else
25	on on our property. What are you telling
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	the longstanding correctional officers
3	here whose morale is beneath the floor to
4	begin with, that now we're going to put
5	you in old inmate falling apart, housing
6	areas again, with roofs leaking, rusted
7	outdoors, old plumbing that hasn't been
8	used in probably 20 years?
9	This is pennywise and dollar
10	foolish, pennywise and dollar foolish.
11	It's just absurd. We have to figure out
12	another plan here, whether we get some
13	more space in that academy in Garden
14	City, we find another area in the county
15	to use. There's plenty of empty space and
16	county buildings. I just think that we
17	need to find a better plan here.
18	And as I said before, going forward,
19	I want to know exactly what the game plan
20	is with the new administration, with
21	Sheriff LaRocco, with everybody that's
22	there. I would like to know exactly what
23	the game plan is going forward about how
24	we're going to fix security in this
25	place, how we're going to address HALT,

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2	how we're going to address training.
3	Obviously, I talked about here ad
4	nauseam about all the use of force
5	incidents that we have here with the
6	least amount of inmates we've had in 30
7	years. We've had 30 to 40% increase in
8	uses of force. This can't go on.
9	So I want to have a good cooperative
10	relationship with Anthony LaRocco as the
11	sheriff. I would like somebody else to
12	calm down a little bit and we'll just
13	leave it at that. Like I said, I'm not
14	going to beat that to death here. But we
15	need to have a constructive relationship.
16	I want to congratulate and
17	anticipate going forward that he's going
18	to be appointed tonight, congratulate
19	Anthony LaRocco on being the new county
20	sheriff. But what's the game plan going
21	forward? We need to get a new academy for
22	our people. We need to fix a lot of
23	things here. We just can't go on the way
24	it is.
25	Thank you.

3	you, Brian.
4	I have a request from the
5	Administration to move up two
6	appointments, so we're going to quickly
7	present those two appointments.
8	Item 20, Resolution 39, a Resolution
9	to confirm the County Executive's
10	appointment of Arnold Pulaski to the
11	Nassau County Bridge Authority.
12	Motion by Legislator Walker,
13	seconded by Legislator Pilip. This
14	appointment is before us. Is Mr. Pulaski
15	here?
16	MR. PULASKI: Good evening. I'd like
17	to take this opportunity to thank the
18	County Executive and the Legislature for
19	giving me another opportunity to serve my
20	community. I've been here before. You
21	also approved me as Chair of the Nassau
22	County Water Resources Board several
23	years back.
24	Also I take the time to just say
25	thank you for your support, this is
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1	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	unrelated, to the Nassau County Police
3	Activity League, which I am vice
4	president, been on the board for 25
5	years. And if it wasn't for you people
6	supporting us, we couldn't do the nice
7	things we do for the 40,000 children of
8	our community.
9	But at any rate, I am appreciative
10	of whatever I can do to to help on the
11	Bridge Authority. And if you have any
12	questions, I'm here.
13	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
14	Legislator Ford.
15	LEGISLATOR FORD: Good evening. How
16	are you?
17	MR. PULASKI: I'm good.
18	LEGISLATOR FORD: Okay. So I guess
19	you're familiar with the Bridge Authority
20	and the Atlantic Beach Bridge. Do you
21	live in the area?
22	MR. PULASKI: I've lived in the Five
23	Towns my whole life. So I'm familiar with
24	at least crossing the bridge.
25	LEGISLATOR FORD: Okay. Thank you
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	for being honest.
3	But my concern, of course, with the
4	changes that we had with the increase in
5	the fare, which you're not increasing
6	tolls. But I'm hoping that in the near
7	future we'll be able to meet with you to
8	discuss some of the increases, because
9	there are some that especially for our
10	trucks and everything, it has been very
11	egregious. The cost for trucks to be
12	going over the bridge like twice a day is
13	really cutting into the small business
14	owners because they're having to pay
15	these increased tolls. So I'm hoping that
16	we'll be able to work with you on that to
17	maybe take a fresh look with you, to be
18	able
19	MR. PULASKI: I'd be glad to help in
20	any way I can.
21	LEGISLATOR FORD: Because. Yeah.
22	MR. PULASKI: I'm a little familiar
23	with increases in rates because I manage
24	the town of Hempstead Water Department.
25	And I had those similar problems trying
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	to increase rates in that area too.
3	Hopefully, I can bring some experience to
4	the table.
5	LEGISLATOR FORD: I'm sure you will,
6	sir. Thank you very much. And I know
7	we're undergoing a big change with this
8	eventually moving to E-ZPass. So God
9	bless you in wanting to help with that.
10	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
11	Legislator Solages.
12	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Okay. Thank
13	you. Good evening.
14	May you please discuss any plans for
15	the E-ZPass or cashless toll at the
16	Authority?
17	MR. PULASKI: Since I'm not on the
18	board at this point and I have really no
19	experience with them, it's very difficult
20	for me to answer any questions at this
21	point. Perhaps when I get on the board
22	and get familiarized with what they've
23	been doing, I might be better off to
24	help. But at this point
25	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Why is that
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	bridge so special? Why is that the only
3	bridge in New York state that is a
4	cashless, that is only cash? Where's that
5	money going?
6	MR. PULASKI: I couldn't answer that
7	question. I've seen it my whole life and
8	crossed it many times. And I really don't
9	have an answer for that. I guess you'd
10	have to go back 70 or 80 years when they
11	established the bridge to find out how
12	the authority was created. I really don't
13	know.
14	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Thank you.
15	LEGISLATOR FORD: Legislator
16	Solages, E-ZPass should be up and running
17	probably by the summer.
18	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Any
19	other questions from Mr. Pulaski?
20	(Whereupon, no verbal
21	response.)
22	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Nope.
23	Thank you. Appreciate it. All in favor,
24	signify by saying, "Aye".
25	(Whereupon, all members of
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	the Nassau County Legislature
3	respond in favor with, "Aye".)
4	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
5	opposed?
6	(Whereupon, no verbal
7	response.)
8	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
9	Carries unanimously.
10	Item 23, Resolution 42 is a
11	resolution confirming the County
12	Executive's appointment of Dana Durso to
13	the Nassau County Planning Commission.
14	Motion by Legislator Walker. Seconded by
15	Legislator Kennedy. That's before us. Ms.
16	Durso.
17	MS. DURSO: Good evening, everyone.
18	Thank you for having me here today. I
19	would like to thank Nassau County
20	Executive Bruce Blakeman and everybody
21	here today on the Board.
22	My name is Dana Durso, and I want to
23	thank everybody for your consideration on
24	being appointed to the Nassau County
25	Planning Commission. I want you to
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2	understand, I do not take this
3	consideration for this position lightly.
4	As I am ultimately selected, I will be
5	committed to this as I am with every
6	position that I hold.
7	Just to give you a little background
8	of myself, I, of course, live here in
9	Nassau County, Massapequa Park, to be
10	exact, where I serve as a trustee of the
11	Incorporated Village of Massapequa Park
12	since 2020. I'm currently serving my
13	second term, and I really enjoy serving
14	the community that I live in.
15	I am learning the understanding of
16	local government front and center. I also
17	have worked alongside Congressman Andrew
18	Garbarino as a community affairs
19	representative.
20	My career as a real estate agent for
21	the past eight years has really helped me
22	learn about communities all across across
23	Long Island, but also helping people
24	achieve a goal in finding their forever
25	homes.
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2	Family is so important to me. I have
3	served as a PTA president for my
4	daughter's school for two years, which
5	was one of the most rewarding jobs I've
6	had. From planning events to raising
7	money for our children's school have been
8	the best experience possible.
9	Between my two children, PTA events,
10	village board meetings and showing homes,
11	I also help to manage a family business.
12	I grew up in the restaurant business
13	since I was 12. Learning the business
14	understands the struggles of small
15	business owners, but most of all serving
16	the public with a smile and treating
17	everyone like family.
18	I love people. I love to work, and
19	most of all, I love to learn. I may not
20	have all the answers, but I am willing. I
21	hope that not only the skills I've
22	learned throughout my various positions
23	helps me with this one, but my
24	willingness to learn, my passion for
25	people and commitment to public service
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2	can be seen as a positive when deciding
3	if I am the correct person for this
4	position.
5	I thank you all for your time, and I
6	look forward to working with everyone.
7	Thank you.
8	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Any
9	questions?
10	MS. DURSO: Any questions?
11	LEGISLATOR WALKER: I don't really
12	have a question, but I really do feel
13	that your background and especially your
14	background dealing with real estate,
15	oftentimes when we have issues or
16	something from our districts that is gone
17	before the Planning Commission and we're
18	giving information, we're asking
19	questions, whatever, you know, you
20	understand a lot of that just from your
21	background in real estate. So hopefully
22	things will go well tonight, and I look
23	forward to working with you.
24	MS. DURSO: Thank you, Ms. Walker.
25	LEGISLATOR WALKER: Because I seem

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2	to have a lot of things on that Planning
3	Commission. Thank you.
4	MS. DURSO: Thank you.
5	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.
6	Any other questions? Comments?
7	(Whereupon, no verbal
8	response.)
9	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: No.
10	All right. I'll call for a vote. All in
11	favor signify by saying, "Aye".
12	(Whereupon, all members of
13	the Nassau County Legislature
14	respond in favor with, "Aye".)
15	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
16	opposed?
17	(Whereupon, no verbal
18	response.)
19	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
20	Carries unanimously. Congratulations.
21	MS. DURSO: Thank you so much.

3	apologize to the people for public
4	comment. We'll jump right back into that.
5	Bob Arciello, Nassau County CSEA and
6	Deputy Sheriffs.
7	MR. ARCIELLO: Good evening,
8	Presiding Officer Nicolello and
9	Legislators.
10	For those of you who don't know me,
11	my name is Bob Arciello. I'm the
12	executive vice president of CSEA Local
13	830 and president of the Deputy Sheriffs
14	Benevolent Association.
15	I'm here tonight just to give our
16	support from CSEA and from the Deputy
17	Sheriffs Benevolent Association for
18	Anthony LaRocco. I know Anthony, for
19	I've been with the County over 33 years
20	and four years as a correction officer,
21	the rest in the enforcement division on
22	the other side. And I know Anthony about
23	30 years. He was a very dedicated public
24	servant for his time here before he
25	retired as a captain from the Enforcement
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2	Division. Since the County Executive has
3	appointed him as undersheriff and then
4	acting sheriff now, he's done several
5	things to move the Enforcement Division
6	forward. He's a great guy, he's loyal,
7	trustworthy, and I just wanted to come up
8	and give my support for his appointment
9	tonight. Thank you.
10	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
11	you very much, Bob.
12	Corrine Kaufman.
13	MS. KAUFMAN: Good evening. I'm
14	Corinne Kaufman, and I'd like to thank my
15	legislator, Delia DeRiggi-Whitton, for
16	inviting me here today. I thank all the
17	legislators for your time and for
18	welcoming me.
19	I'm here to speak with you about the
20	loss of our granddaughter, Paige Grace
21	Gibbons, who passed away from an
22	accidental fentanyl overdose on November
23	20, 2022.
24	On November 16th, I spoke with Paige
25	to wish you a happy birthday. She had
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2	just turned 19. Four days later, she was
3	dead from fentanyl poisoning.
4	What happened? Paige and another
5	girl also named Paige, and a third girl
6	planned a sleepover with the parents
7	home. The girls had purchased what they
8	thought was Percocet. They took a nibble.
9	As my son in law, David described, it was
10	100% fentanyl. That's how powerful it
11	was. Our Paige passed away. The second
12	Paige survived after weeks in critical
13	care unit and also suffered two strokes.
14	That night, the third girl, a non
15	participant, ran upstairs to get the
16	parents who tried to perform CPR. You
17	might say the surviving Paige was lucky,
18	but I fear the lifetime emotional burden
19	will be unbearable.
20	These young souls were not drug
21	addicts. They wanted to relax. I really
22	think they were naive. I do think that
23	between the isolation of COVID, the pace
24	of society and the pressures that exist,
25	they sought something to alleviate this,
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2	these stressors.
3	Our daughter, Kate, and son in law
4	David, were notified by two policemen at
5	their front door that Paige was gone.
6	They also learned that this case is now
7	considered a homicide. It is unimaginable
8	that this is us.
9	All about Page. I'd like to tell you
10	who Paige was. This Paige.
11	(Whereupon, photo of Paige
12	Gibbons is displayed.)
13	MS. KAUFMAN: She attended Our Lady
14	of Mercy in Pittsford, New York. She
15	graduated with a 4.0 plus average and a
16	national honor student. She used to get
17	upset when she received an A-minus. She
18	had a photographic memory and wanted to
19	be a doctor. Everything she did was about
20	life.
21	She volunteered for the Pittsford
22	EMT Department and drove the ambulance.
23	She gave swimming lessons to
24	underprivileged children at Healthy Hero
25	Camp. She demonstrated CPR instruction

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2	for her senior project and also purchased
3	a female model for the demonstrations and
4	donated this to her school. She raised
5	funds for the American Foundation for
6	Suicide Prevention. I share this because
7	you because I want you to know that Paige
8	was all about life.
9	This brings me to the moral of the
10	story. It can happen to anyone. This
11	demon drug knows no boundaries, and it's
12	taking people all ages and all walks of
13	life.
14	The impact on our family. Our family
15	will never be the same. When this
16	happened, my pain centered on my
17	daughter, Kate. I recall all the
18	wonderful things she did, as any mother
19	would raising a child. Birth. Love. First
20	steps. First words. Camp. Sports. Braces,
21	plays. Prom. Graduation. Building a
22	wonderful human being.
23	This death is a terrible waste. Her
24	funeral was the day after Thanksgiving.
25	My son in law, a strong six foot four
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2	former football player, is a man who is
3	very private. But he cried oceans of
4	tears as he hugged over 300 people at the
5	wake.
6	At the funeral, he delivered a
7	tribute to Paige, filled with love and
8	anecdotes that was live streamed on
9	YouTube. Paige's sister, Brooke, 15 years
10	old, spoke too. I realized that she grew
11	up overnight and she took on the role of
12	the surviving sister. Over 3000 people
13	have watched this video. The family wants
14	everyone to see it because it conveys
15	fentanyl awareness and the heartbreak
16	that it caused.
17	The lesson. Our family is now Narcan
18	trained, and we did this just days after
19	the funeral for education and family
20	solidarity. I ask myself what good can
21	come from this horrible tragedy? I
22	wondered, What can I do to get our
23	message out? Initially, I contacted
24	everyone I could think of. I wanted to do
25	it all, but I realized I needed to start

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2	locally and focus on what I can actually
3	do. I could not change the issues with
4	the cartels, the borders, the gangs, etc.
5	Stopping them would be the solution.
6	Let's start with the schools, I thought.
7	Firstly, we have to start by getting
8	Narcan mandated in all the schools and
9	this is where we should begin. I learned
10	that Narcan is not mandated in the Nassau
11	County Schools Nurse's office. I reached
12	out to Dr. Dominick Palma, president of
13	the Nassau Superintendents Board, and he
14	kindly said he would be in touch with all
15	the Nassau County superintendents for me.
16	I quote, he called fentanyl "the scourge
17	of our time".
18	Secondly, we need to educate our
19	children in the schools all about drugs.
20	Our youngest daughter will be holding an
21	assembly in Oyster Bay High School in
22	March. She will appear with a substance
23	abuse expert, thus giving students both
24	the information they need to hear as well
25	as the emotional consequences firsthand.

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2	I know we are not alone, but just think,
3	if everyone in this room could save just
4	one life.
5	This is my wish list:
6	1. Narcan in all Nassau County
7	middle schools and high schools with the
8	addition of fentanyl strips that are
9	being considered by the Legislature
10	again.
11	2. Drug education in the schools
12	starting in middle school. Creating a
13	model for all school assemblies to follow
14	county and statewide. Anti fentanyl
15	signage in every school.
16	3. Mental health screening in
17	schools to see who might be at risk.
18	4. Photos of the young victims
19	poisoned by fentanyl with the addition of
20	support from news media, very much like
21	we see the statistics on COVID in the
22	newspaper every single day.
23	5. A nationwide campaign to fight
24	fentanyl and stop fentanyl.
25	6. And lastly, the formation of a
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2	coalition of all organizations against
3	fentanyl and all substance abuse so that
4	we can work together and share our
5	resources and not duplicate each other.
6	If any of you wish to see the
7	"Thanksgiving for the Life of Paige Grace
8	Gibbons", it is on YouTube. The tribute
9	begins at 36 minutes. And I think if you
10	have young people at home or
11	grandchildren, sharing this with them
12	would share the emotional side of this
13	terrible, terrible drug in our lives.
14	Thank you very much.
15	LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
16	Corrine, I just want to commend both you
17	and your husband, Andrew, on the amount
18	of strength that takes with just only a
19	couple of months after this tragedy to be
20	able to walk in here and be so
21	knowledgeable and so impressive. You hit
22	all of our hearts for sure.
23	All I can say is we would love to
24	have a hearing on the fentanyl strip
25	legislation. It's not perfect, but it's
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2	something. Especially for those
3	unsuspecting victims. And they've been
4	family friends of my husband for decades.
5	And I can tell you, if you haven't
6	figured it out, if it could happen to
7	this family, it could happen to any
8	family. This is a warm, loving family
9	that did all the right things.
10	And as a mom, I am shaken to the
11	bone from what you just said. And I just
12	appreciate you so much. And I appreciate
13	both of you for being here and you're in
14	our thoughts and prayers.
15	MS. KAUFMAN: Thank you for giving
16	me the opportunity.
17	LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Well, I
18	appreciate it.
19	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
20	you, Ms. Kaufman.
21	MS. KAUFMAN: Thank you.
22	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
23	Deborah Brooks.
24	MS. BROOKS: I was afraid you were
25	going to call me next. I just want to
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2	wish my condolences. I'm a school board
3	member in Port Washington. I know that we
4	do educate the children, but I will
5	certainly raise this at our board
6	meeting.
7	Good evening, Presiding Officer, and
8	to the legislature. Thank you to
9	legislator DeRiggi-Whitton for inviting
10	me here. I'm Deborah Brooks, chair of the
11	Port Washington Board of Education
12	Legislative Task Force here to address
13	the zero emissions school vehicle
14	mandate.
15	Last year, the state legislature
16	mandated that school district
17	acquisitions of new vehicles for students
18	be zero emissions beginning July 2027,
19	with all vehicles being zero emissions by
20	2035. The goal of improving air quality
21	for our children by deploying cleaner
22	school vehicles is a noble one; however,
23	this is an unfunded mandate that is
24	fiscally and logistically burdensome to
25	school districts.

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2	Accordingly, the Port Washington
3	Board of Education is urging you to sign
4	on to the assurances sought in the letter
5	presented to you by Legislator
6	DeRiggi-Whitton.
7	The program's long term viability
8	will depend upon the capacity of our
9	utilities and infrastructure. Full
10	deployment of electric school vehicles
11	with its demand for and on a sizable new
12	network of charging stations and related
13	infrastructure will greatly increase
14	demand on our grid. Is PSEG Long Island
15	ready for this?
16	We urge the State to study PSEG,
17	Long Island capacity limits and then fund
18	and operate a local PILOT program to
19	ensure local utilities and infrastructure
20	can handle the increased demand without
21	negatively impacting elements of our
22	daily utility services.
23	In addition to purchasing new
24	vehicles, school districts will need
25	charging stations, overhauled electrical

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2	infrastructure and more. Since 2012, the
3	tax cap has constrained the property tax
4	revenue school districts can generate.
5	School districts should not have to
6	choose between funding academic
7	programming and complying with a costly
8	unfunded state mandate.
9	Numerous municipalities have
10	received state grants to support
11	transportation electrification. If the
12	state proceeds with this mandate, we urge
13	that similar opportunities be afforded to
14	all school districts.
15	Finally, we urge the State and the
16	State Education Department to provide
17	comprehensive guidance regarding how to
18	implement and sustain this initiative,
19	including, but not limited to, funding
20	opportunities, additional waivers,
21	avenues for cooperation with local
22	utilities, managing operational diesel
23	buses and more. Until such guidance is
24	provided, we urge the State to delay this
25	mandate.
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2	Thank you for taking the letter
3	before you into consideration. As we
4	devise and implement initiatives to
5	protect our environment, we must be
6	mindful to prevent unintended negative
7	consequences, especially to our schools,
8	that could undermine the long term
9	success of our efforts.
10	We hope you will sign on to the
11	letter and partner with relevant entities
12	to achieve an outcome that is the best
13	interests of all New Yorkers, most
14	important are children. I thank you.
15	LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: All
16	right. This is my last witness.
17	There's a copy of the letter
18	everyone's been handed that I would love
19	to send this on a bipartisan fashion with
20	all of us, because it's going to affect
21	all of our school districts. So,
22	Presiding Officer, if you want to let me
23	know if that is a possibility, we would
24	like to do that.
25	And then I think Deborah is also
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2	going to be reaching out or we're going
3	to figure out a way to reach out to many
4	different school districts as well, so we
5	can not only have Nassau County support
6	it, but other school districts and PSEG
7	and all these other utilities, which I've
8	had issues with in the past, I think
9	really need to hear that it's a
10	countywide issue and for them to pay
11	attention.
12	So thank you, Deborah, for taking
13	the time and making us aware of this
14	before it is implemented. Hopefully,
15	we'll have everything in place by then.
16	So thank you for coming down today.
17	MS. BROOKS: Thank you for inviting
18	me.
19	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
20	Richard Clolery.
21	(Whereupon, no verbal
22	response.)
23	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Brent
24	Hill.
25	MR. HILL: Good evening, Presiding
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2	Officer, Deputy, and members. Thank you
3	for this opportunity.
4	My name is Brent Hill, and I've had
5	the honor of being the executive director
6	of the Five Towns Community Center for a
7	number of years now. For 116 years, 116
8	years, the community center has provided
9	vital and impactful services to a very
10	vibrant and very diverse community. It's
11	an understatement to say that we're woven
12	into the fabric of the community.
13	And with that being said, we have a
14	number of community members and
15	supporters here I'd like to ask them to
16	stand.
17	(Whereupon, Community
18	Members stand.)
19	MR. HILL: So after 66 years of
20	service, we entered into an agreement
21	with the County. The County built a
22	building just for us. We're very thankful
23	for the opportunity. The building is
24	amazing. We have a great basketball court
25	where our PAL program plays. The
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2	Governor's Office of Storm Recovery also
3	just gave us a new HVAC and a generator
4	because during Hurricane Sandy, hundreds
5	of people literally slept in our building
6	because they were flooded out. So we're
7	thankful for that.
8	And we like our relationship to
9	continue with the County, even though it
10	RFP was released for a new lesser to come
11	to the building. But I don't want you to
12	hear from me how great the center is.
13	Members of the community would like to
14	share their views, so I'm going to
15	actually turn the microphone over to
16	them. Thank you for your time.
17	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
18	Legislator Kopel.
19	LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Brent, come on
20	back for a moment.
21	As you know, Brent, I'm very
22	familiar with the center I've been
23	working not only with current management,
24	but with previous management going back,
25	I'll say, about 10-12 years. Well aware
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2	of what's going on, well aware of the
3	difficulties that are inherent with the
4	RFP, which require a significant cash
5	infusion. I understand that.
6	I'm working with with your Board, as
7	you know. I've met with you a number of
8	times. Can't announce anything yet,
9	unfortunately. But we are hopeful that
10	we'll be able to come to a solution that
11	is going to enable the community center
12	and its members to continue some of its
13	very good, very important work.
14	The kitchen is wonderful. I'm just
15	mentioning one or two of them. The work
16	that the center did during Sandy, it's
17	going back a ways, but I still remember
18	that. I still appreciate that.
19	So be patient. Hopefully, real soon,
20	maybe we come to a good solution that
21	preserves the benefits of the center and
22	hopefully makes it even better for the
23	entire community.
24	MR. HILL: Thank you for that.
25	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
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2	Legislator Solages.
3	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Thank you. Hi,
4	Brent. Thank you for being here tonight.
5	Thank you so much. And thank you to
6	everyone who came here from the Five
7	Towns Community Center, Inwood, and the
8	Greater Five Towns community.
9	To be clear. Is it the capacity of
10	your organization, the nonprofit, to make
11	a significant capital contribution to the
12	County? Is that is that feasible?
13	MR. HILL: Not at this time, no.
14	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: What are you
15	expected to raise?
16	MR. HILL: The RFP says \$5 million.
17	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Understood.
18	And is the Board contemplating or
19	preparing to submit a proposal?
20	MR. HILL: I can't speak for the
21	Board, but I believe they are looking at
22	all avenues for us to remain in the
23	space. Yes.
24	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Are there any
25	proposals that put it on paper in black

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2	and white that the Five Towns Community
3	Center Board will have a future at the
4	Community Center?
5	MR. HILL: I think that is a
6	possibility, but I'm not sure. I'm not
7	able to speak about that. I'm not sure. I
8	would need my board president here to
9	speak on that.
10	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Understood. Has
11	it has there been efforts in the past to
12	bring a medical facility to the five
13	towns Community Center?
14	MR. HILL: So we operate one section
15	of the building. There was a section
16	there where there was a medical facility
17	at one time over a decade now. And I
18	believe there have been some interest
19	from different hospitals, but nothing has
20	panned out at this time.
21	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: To your
22	understanding, are there any proposals
23	from any medical facilities to submit a
24	proposal in RFP?
25	MR. HILL: I'm not aware of who
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2	submitted proposals. That information
3	hasn't been shared with us.
4	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Based on the
5	community interests that this has
6	garnered, there has been a lot of
7	community interest, is the community
8	asking for more time for the RFP? Are
9	they asking that the RFP process be
10	reconsidered?
11	MR. HILL: Yes, The Board of
12	Directors did send a letter to Mr.
13	Blakeman asking that the RFP be held at
14	this time.
15	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Understood.
16	Thank you.
17	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Angel
18	Bran.
19	MR. BRAN: Hi, my name is Angel
20	Bran. I'm a resident of Inwood, New York,
21	and I attend Lawrence High School. The
22	Five Towns Community Center has been a
23	very important piece of my life. When my
24	parents had just started their new life
25	in this country, they were looking for
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2	more opportunity and the one place that
3	caught their attention was the Five
4	Towns.
5	My parents really wanted me and my
6	sister to excel and have opportunities
7	that they did not have growing up in a
8	third world country. My mom found the
9	community center. It was a warm,
10	affordable land of opportunity to jump
11	start the American dream they seeked
12	(sic).
13	I have experienced the services from
14	both points of view as the one receiving
15	and as the one giving. When I was a
16	child, I was enrolled in the Head Start
17	program and this is where I learned how
18	to speak, read and write English as a
19	second language. I was also able to get a
20	literal head start when it came to math,
21	science and enrichment.
22	And now jumping forward to when
23	COVID hit, all I wanted to do was get out
24	of my house. My mom told me one day that
25	she was going to volunteer at the food
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2	pantry, Gammy's Pantry. I tagged along
3	with her, and to be honest, I kind of
4	wanted to go home the minute I got there.
5	I'm not very much a people person, and
6	when I first got there, there was a line
7	of, I'm not overexaggerating, hundreds of
8	people. And somehow we maintain COVID
9	protocols, which I really have respect
10	for the community and the Five Towns.
11	I did not understand why my mom
12	wanted to help out the community so much,
13	as much as I wanted to go home. I
14	realized that I was fortunate enough to
15	have food in my fridge, fruits, fresh
16	bread and everything. And then one day my
17	mom was serving food with me, and I want
18	to say almost all the people here who
19	have shown their support, who have come
20	every day, spent their afternoons after
21	work coming to volunteer at the food
22	pantry, I saw a mother and two children.
23	That reminded me of my mother, my sister,
24	Natalie, and me when we were younger. I
25	then realized that the reason why my mom

2	had come every single day. She spent
3	hours, hours. My mom, honestly, she
4	wouldn't eat. This is because she didn't
5	want anybody to go through what she had
6	to go through. She saw people who came to
7	this country just like her and who needed
8	help.
9	Now that I'm entering college, I've
10	put everything that I've done with the
11	community centered on my college resume.
12	I've been offered many scholarships and
13	even in acceptance into my dream school.
14	And this is all just because I was able
15	to receive services from the Five Town
16	Community Center. And even though on
17	paper this seems like it's the best
18	possible thing for me to gain from my
19	experience, the real gift that I was
20	given from this experience was my voice.
21	If I hadn't experienced serving hundreds
22	of people, then I don't think I would be
23	able to be standing here right in front
24	of all of you.
25	The Community Center is really a

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2	safe space for us teens, children, adult
3	and seniors. I do not think we can be
4	told to be patient when we don't know
5	what the future of our community is going
6	to look like.
7	Thank you (applause).
8	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Jayden
9	Emery.
10	MR. EMERY: My name is Jayden Emery.
11	I'm a student at Lawrence High School and
12	a resident of the Five Towns. It outrages
13	me that there has yet to be an offer for
14	the renewal of the lease of the Five
15	Towns Community Center, given it is such
16	a vital resource of our community.
17	Many within the Five Towns,
18	especially the town of Inwood, which is
19	the center located within, are below the
20	poverty line, are senior citizens and are
21	fighting to make ends meet on a
22	day-to-day basis.
23	However, it is not only the lease
24	renewal that outrages me, but the
25	perception our County Executive holds on
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2	our center, and his statement his
3	assistant Chris Boyle made. As I quote,
4	that "the Center has failed to live up to
5	their obligations, which is problematic".
6	This statement has done nothing but left
7	me with confusion for the Center has
8	always held up with her obligations. If
9	saving citizens and the youth of the
10	community from starvation and giving many
11	employment opportunities throughout the
12	program ran in the Community Center isn't
13	living up to their obligations, then
14	please explain to me what it is your
15	county expects from the Community Center
16	more.
17	Bruce Blakeman also had made a
18	statement with Channel 12 News today that
19	he is worried about the youth colliding
20	with the people that come for AA and
21	whatnot to the Community Center. Yet
22	there has been nothing that he has done
23	to prevent this. And also, might I add
24	that children within the programs of the
25	Community Center are closely monitored

2	and remain on presence as long as they
3	are there. There is no collision between
4	the adults and the children.
5	Might I also add that the people
6	that attend these, AA and whatnot, are
7	also the aunts and uncles, fathers and
8	mothers of these children and with
9	without the help of the center, these
10	parents, these aunts, these uncles would
11	not be able to get the help that they
12	needed and the children would suffer.
13	I noticed that we are here today to
14	congratulate those who remove gangs off
15	the street, recognize diversity and
16	recognize those who started community
17	events. Might I add that that is what
18	exactly the Community Center does on a
19	daily basis.
20	We have been taken advantage of by a
21	few powerful lawmakers for too long,
22	leaving us in despair and desperate for
23	change. This is a sick game. I'd go as
24	far to say a game of life or death. If
25	not, the Center remains in place, the

2	people of the community will suffer. It
3	is truly sickening that us residents of
4	the Five Towns are subject to going
5	through such worries at this time.
6	Thank you (applause).

8	Goldsby.
9	MS. STEELE: Good evening, everyone.
10	My name is Laquita Steele, born and
11	raised Inwood, New York. So are my
12	children. I'm just going to tell you a
13	bunch of things that the Community Center
14	has done for me.
15	I was a teen parent when I was 16.
16	They had a program called Lawrence 2000
17	where I would go once a week or once a
18	month and pretty much prepare me for
19	parenthood. Besides, you know, you have
20	your parents there to help you and your
21	grandparents, but they prepared me.
22	The Community Center has given me my
23	first job. When I finished school, I went
24	back and got a job there as well. I also
25	became a youth organizer as well as

2	gained my leadership skills.
3	My children have went to the daycare
4	center there. My youngest child was in
5	the day camp there with children like
6	Angel being amazing counselors, camp
7	counselors for them, which my son is

10	Community Center.
11	Just to talk about little things, I
12	actually was as well, on the other end. I
13	was a child there. I went to the daycare,
14	I went to the Head Start, I went to the
15	camp as well. And without the Community
16	Center, I wouldn't be where I am today. I
17	have a bachelor's from Saint John's
18	University in business with a minor in
19	mass communications. I have a master's
20	degree from Full Sail University. And I
21	have one more year left for my doctoral
22	at Capella University for Human Services
23	with concentration and leadership and
24	organizational management. So without the
25	Community Center, I probably would be one

2	of these kids or gang bang members or
3	whatever in the streets without their
4	guidance and their help.
5	Thank you.

7	Thomas.
8	MS. THOMAS: Good evening. Thank you
9	all for having me here tonight. I'm going
10	to speak from the heart.
11	I do have something I've written in
12	2007 when this same attack on the
13	Community Center happened. And if I have
14	a chance, I will read it.
15	But I would like to address Bruce
16	Blakeman, who I believe in 2019, came to
17	the Inwood Buccaneers at the invitation
18	of Pete Sobel. And you came directly over
19	to me and shook my hand and said, so
20	wonderful to see you again, because I had
21	been a while.
22	Since I became a citizen of this
23	country, I always voted for you, Bruce.
24	I'm a registered Democrat. Most of you
25	here, Republicans, Democrat, I voted for.

4	you, Bruce, requested of our community to

11	been tied behind our backs for at least
12	the last 20-30 years with the lease. We
13	have been running the clock out and
14	playing this game, another lease is
15	coming. We have not had any meetings with
16	the community to tell us what is your
17	intentions? One hundred and sixteen years
18	cannot be discounted; 116 years cannot be
19	forgotten; 116 years cannot be written
20	off with 50 years in comparison.
21	I have the opportunity to work for
22	the Community Center for seven years. It
23	was the best job. I have an opportunity
24	to work for the Episcopal Diocese of New
25	York as an accountant, and I was lucky to

2	have two jobs that I love. But I was
3	seeing these people are the hardest
4	working people I've come across. They
5	make chicken salad out of chicken poop,
6	literally.
7	I work for an organization that had
8	hundreds of millions of dollars and they
9	have nothing. Our hands have been tied
10	behind our back. We, the residents,
11	deserve to put a bid in for this
12	community center. We can take care of our
13	future.
14	This was given to us as a gift by
15	Russell Sage at the request of Sylvia
16	Lord for his wife, Margaret Olivia Sage.
17	It belongs to the community. It cannot
18	be taken away. You can't run the clock
19	out.
20	I supported you, Bruce and most of
21	you on this on this panel, as a Democrat.
22	I do not vote down the party line. Please
23	do not disappoint me tonight. I have
24	faith in this Body that we will have a
25	chance to put in our bid for all \$5

2	million. We will find money. This belongs
3	to the community and we have the right to
4	make sure that our future can go for
5	another 2107. Our children deserve to
6	recognize us today, just like Sylvia
7	Lord, Margaret Sage and Russell Sage.

10	Natalie Bran.
11	MS. BRAN: Good evening. I would
12	just like to thank everyone who is
13	present today for their time.
14	For those of you who do not know who
15	I am, I would like to briefly introduce
16	myself. My name is Natalie Bran and I've
17	lived in the Five Towns Community Center
18	essentially my entire life. I've seen how
19	much this community has done for me and
20	for others, and it truly saddens me that
21	there's a possibility that I may no
22	longer be here.
23	At three years old, I was able to
24	learn English and get the support that I
25	needed to start pre-K. People like Miss

2	Helen, who is present here today, at the
3	Head Start program, guided my path early
4	on for success.
5	The summer camp is also another
6	resource at the Five Towns community
7	Center that has given children an outlet
8	to blossom their creativity and learn new
9	skills. Fortunately, I was able to be a
10	camp counselor and see the goals and the
11	ambitions of these children at such a
12	young age.
13	Finally, Gammy's Pantry is a
14	resource where I spent seven days a week
15	packing fruits and vegetables and bread
16	to give to our local families. A place
17	where I was able to see the impact of our
18	work when the line for food went down the
19	street. Anyone is able to get help,
20	regardless of race, gender and religion.
21	One experience that really affected
22	me was when this man came outside of
23	pantry hours looking for food. He said
24	his daughters were crying at home because
25	they had no food or water. I will never

2	forget the desperation in his voice.
3	Without the tireless efforts of many in
4	the community, I would not be here today
5	standing before you as a sophomore with a
6	full ride at Columbia University
7	(applause). I used to believe that
8	someone like me could never accomplish

10	anyone who has the ambitions and the
11	support, can live in the dreams that they
12	create for themselves.
13	My story is just one of many.
14	Politics aside, if I could leave you all
15	with at least one thought, it is that
16	closing the Community Center would would
17	cause disruption to what is the only
18	stable thing in people's lives. Many are
19	dependent on the various services and
20	programs offered. If the interests of the
21	community are truly at heart, then the
22	Center must stay.
23	Thank you all for your time.

25	you, Natalie.

3	REVEREND STANISLAUS: Good evening,
4	everyone. Thank you so much for this
5	opportunity.
6	You know, tonight Dr. Gregory K.

8	Baptist Church in Inwood, Long Island, 26
9	years. And I'm going to say what we
10	witnessed here tonight is not just the
11	greatness of America, but Nassau County
12	in terms of what community really is. And
13	what we've seen is police officers being
14	honored for the great work that they do
15	in terms of keeping us safe. But then to
16	see these two young ladies go to Yale
17	because of the work that's done as
18	superintendents and teachers. But then
19	the heartbreaking story of a woman who
20	lost her granddaughter to fentanyl. So
21	community comes together.
22	I come to you and stand because of
23	the Five Towns Community Center where
24	many of my parishioners go and were able
25	to eat throughout the entire pandemic. I

2	saw police officers go into the Five
3	Towns Community Center and create that
4	organization called PAL and build
5	relationships with young men and young
6	women and give them hope for a new day.
7	My concern is that when you shut

9	there's no longer any access to a
10	community center like that, where are
11	they supposed to go? Then we complain
12	about them being on the streets and doing
13	things they should not be doing. They
14	need positive relationships that came
15	from the police officers and the staff of
16	the Five Towns Community Center.
17	Now, Mr. Blakeman has just inherited
18	the situation, but prior administration,
19	to be very honest, he had the
20	responsibility of taking care of the
21	community center, repairs and so forth,
22	which they have not done. And since they
23	have not done that, you can't really
24	bring certain programs in because the
25	building itself is in disrepair. And so

2	the narrative is now that the staff
3	didn't really do a great job. They did
4	the very best job that they could when
5	the other part of the partnership didn't
6	do their part.
7	And so now we come to this is a
8	possibility that we're asking him to

11	playing field. Now, even if the Board or
12	whoever is considering a partnership, I'm
13	concerned about the word partnership
14	because in my marriage, a partnership is
15	equal. But outside of that, I'm concerned
16	that they're going to relegate the Five
17	Towns to a certain center. And the
18	proposal, it may be I want you to look
19	at it because you're the bosses, you can
20	handle this they are considering a fee
21	to join the Community Center to take part
22	in some of the activities. This is a
23	community that is suffering with low
24	income families. People are just
25	struggling, trying to make ends meet. So

2	what's the difference if you take it away
3	and say, well, we're not taking it away,
4	but we're going to make it a community
5	center that's so grand that you have to
6	pay a fee to be part of it. It's the same
7	thing.
8	So I'm asking you whichever one of
9	those things are going, if you're not
10	going to extend the lease, then be
11	careful about who takes partnership,
12	because I believe the partnership is
13	about creating almost like a club for
14	certain people. And we already understand
15	the community is shrinking for people
16	like black and brown people. We need to
17	reconsider this stuff and understand that
18	Inwood is a beautiful community and it is
19	peaceful and that's exactly the way we
20	want to keep it.

25	MR. GIORGIO: Hi, Don Giorgio.

2	My topic is not as dire as a
3	Community Center or as somebody that is
4	in some kind of mental state because
5	their granddaughter died. But it is about
6	community. It's about a property that
7	Nassau County acquired a number of years
8	ago, and that property has yet to realize
9	its full potential to Nassau County and
10	to all those people that are trying to
11	support it.
12	I live in Nassau County. I am a
13	business owner in Nassau County. And I'm
14	looking for the county to to commit more
15	deeply to what they already have. What's
16	at stake is a property that is in
17	Brookville and Jericho that was leased
18	out. The lease ran out. I appeared here
19	about two years ago discussing the issues
20	of that particular property and what it
21	needs and what it means to the community.
22	Two years later, the person, the
23	lessee, has passed away and the county is
24	letting some unknown person manage a
25	property that is valuable to the

2	community as a resource to people that
3	are there in Nassau County. So what's at
4	stake? There are jobs at stake for this
5	particular property. It's an equestrian
6	center that involves horses and care and
7	the opportunity to serve a lot of
8	children. We hear stories about a
9	community center and kids that need a
10	function, need a program, need to do
11	things. This property could offer that.
12	You have adults that don't golf in Nassau
13	County, as many golf courses as there
14	are, they have other sports and
15	activities that they can participate in.
16	This property was purchased for that
17	particular purpose with a with a promise
18	to the person that sold it, Mrs.
19	Discount, that it would always be enjoyed
20	as an equestrian park to the benefit of
21	the public and serving Nassau County and
22	the people in that county. Right now it's
23	treated more a little bit like an
24	exclusive country club instead of
25	benefiting children, adults, lessons,

2	education, outreach to the community that
3	would benefit kids that need an activity.
4	And we're talking about people today
5	that have been starved by COVID for human
6	interaction and activity that they could
7	enjoy. And animals, if we look at mental
8	health and everything and what an animal
9	can do for people and their mental
10	health, is part of that. And having a
11	place like this that is a jewel that's
12	been underserved and underutilized for
13	one reason or another left in languish
14	because of a lack of direction, a lack of
15	vision, I as a county resident and I'm
16	an avid equestrian, I have three horses,
17	I compete, I have a national ranking I
18	have to drive 40 minutes to Suffolk
19	County to a state owned facility in order
20	to enjoy my hobby, when there's a center
21	right here that's 20 minutes away from me
22	in Massapequa. And for some reason it's
23	gotten languished and caught up in a
24	political quagmire that I have no idea
25	why or what for.

2	And I understand what everyone's
3	talking about and how important your
4	stuff is, and I appreciate it. Come ride
5	a horse. You'll have a good time with
6	that, and you'll enjoy it for your kids
7	because it's part of Nassau County that
8	we should all enjoy.
9	So thank you. I'm sorry (applause).

11	Jacqueline Pfiefer.
12	MS. PFIEFFER: I know some of you
13	from past meetings we've had over a good
14	number of years. I'm going to speak
15	briefly from myself and I and Robin
16	couldn't make it here, so if you don't
17	mind, I'll read her statement to you. The
18	National Equestrian Center was purchased
19	in 2008 for \$12 million for the purpose
20	of preserving open space and providing an
21	equestrian facility open to the public
22	with public events and offering
23	affordable boarding and lesson programs.
24	For the past five years, it has been
25	subleased to a high end private boarding

2	facility with no public riding lessons,
3	no public programs, and discourage public
4	access with an electric gate at the
5	entrance with no signage that this is a
6	county facility open to all.
7	In April of 2021, the Nassau County
8	Legislature rejected the proposed new ten
9	year contract awarded to the previous
10	leaser. He unexpectedly died in December
11	of 2021, and over the past year, the
12	facility has been managed on a temporary
13	extension to his son, Joe Rizzo.
14	Unfortunately, it is impossible to reach
15	Joe via phone, website or at the barn.
16	I recently paid a visit because a
17	friend told me there were several empty
18	stalls available. This is only partly
19	true. There are three empty stalls, but
20	they are unusable because the outside
21	wall is collapsing and it is unsafe to
22	put horses there. And since Joe is there
23	on a temporary basis, he is
24	understandably reluctant to invest in
25	extensive repairs. If a horse or a person

2	gets injured on the property now, under
3	this extension, if anybody gets hurt, Joe
4	is simply a caretaker. He was never on
5	any previous contract, or has he been
6	vetted by the County. Would the County be
7	liable for that lawsuit?
8	The three major barns on the
9	property were built in the thirties and
10	forties, and the termites have had over
11	80 years to do their damage. I have
12	previously boarded at Old Mill for over
13	25 years and know the facility well.
14	There's a lot of work that needs to be
15	done, but Nassau County has a golden
16	opportunity right now to ensure the
17	future of this property by crafting by
18	crafting a new RFP and requesting bids to
19	replace at least one of the barns with a
20	new structure.
21	This is a beautiful facility with an
22	indoor ring for year round, riding
23	several rings with all weather footing,
24	numerous paddocks to turn out, fields to
25	ride on, and a connection to the trail

2	system of the 500 acre Muttontown
3	preserve. Years ago, they held horse
4	shows here twice a year and hosted one of
5	the first European style Grand Prix in
6	the Big Ring.
7	Our equestrian group has offered
8	numerous times to assist the county in
9	formulating a comprehensive RFP and
10	contract that would reflect the intention
11	of the original purchase. This facility
12	is not an office or an apartment
13	building, and Nassau County should not be
14	expected to understand all the nuances of
15	managing an equestrian facility with live
16	animals and public programs. But through
17	our combined lifelong involvement in the
18	equestrian life of Long Island, we can
19	offer guidance in crafting an RFP and
20	contract that will ensure the future of
21	NEC.
22	Nassau County has already written to
23	other RFPs and contracts since 2008, and
24	with a few corrections and additions,
25	could have these new documents ready in

2	from a slightly different angle. I'm not
3	sure any of you guys go to Belmont Park
4	for the races ever. Yes. Awesome. If
5	you've ever gone on Triple Crown Day,
6	which is the last leg of the famous race,
7	if there's a Triple Crown contender like
8	there was several years ago, there was
9	100 and, I don't know, 120,000 people
10	in attendance that day. On a non Triple
11	Crown day, there's 89,000 people. They
12	come from out of state that come from
13	across the country and they spend money
14	in Nassau, and I know it's half Queens,
15	half Nassau County.
16	I just want you to understand the
17	impact that the equestrian industry
18	provides for New York and Nassau County.
19	A study was done in 2017 by the American
20	Horse Council. It doesn't break it down
21	by county, but it does break it down by
22	New York State. Just in racing alone,
23	there's 19,000 people employed in racing
24	in New York State. That's \$3 billion in
25	annual revenue. That's billion with a B.

2	Governor Hochul just announced two
3	days ago a \$455 Million plan to update
4	Belmont Park. There's a lot of money here
5	in horses. At the end of the day, the
6	race horses that leave Belmont Park and
7	can no longer race are often adopted or
8	purchased by people here on Long Island,
9	trainers and owners. Where do those
10	horses have to reside? Well, in Nassau
11	County, that is shrinking and shrinking
12	and shrinking. Nassau Equestrian Center
13	represents one of the last commercial
14	barns that is relatively affordable.
15	Now, I know you look at equestrian,
16	you think, Oh my God, they are rich
17	snobs. If I owned a boat or an RV, you
18	probably wouldn't say that where I choose
19	to spend my money and by the way, I
20	live in Huntington Station. I'm not rich.
21	I am like working class. Where people
22	choose to spend their money shouldn't
23	really matter.
24	Another thing to put in perspective,
25	and I mentioned this the last time I was

2	here two years ago, if you're familiar
3	with West Hills County Park, just over
4	the border in Huntington, there was the
5	former Sweet Hills Equestrian Center,
6	which was mismanaged for years to the
7	tune of multi million dollars in
8	remediation to remove poisonous dirt that
9	was dumped there illegally. It made
10	Newsday, I'm sure you guys remember it.
11	That was due to lack of oversight.
12	I am here representing the
13	Nassau/Suffolk Horseman's Association.
14	I'm the President. I'm also a director
15	for the New York State Horse Council. So
16	when I tell you that I'm here and I'm
17	passionate and I want to be involved in
18	the future of Nassau Equestrian Center.
19	The first RFP that was put out was
20	brilliant. There were so many things for
21	the community.
22	The last point I'm going to make,
23	I'm also a real estate agent and what I
24	focus on, one of the things we focus on,
25	are where people going and where people

2	are coming from. People are moving from
3	the city to Long Island. People are
4	fleeing the state because they can't keep
5	their horses on Long Island. Nassau
6	Equestrian Center needs to be one of
7	those places, and it should be. Thank you
8	for your time. Go to Belmont Park
9	(applause).
10	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Selene
11	Castrovilla?
12	(Whereupon, no verbal
13	response.)
14	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Nope.
15	Okay. Amil Virani.
16	MR. VARANI: Good evening. My name
17	is Emil Virani. I'm from Valley Stream. I
18	wanted to speak in regards to the latest
19	redistricting maps, but, beforehand, I
20	just wanted to thank people from the
21	Community Center for coming. As a
22	Lawrence High School graduate, and as
23	somebody who was a part of the community
24	center program in seventh grade, I deeply
25	support your efforts and I hope that
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2	there's a resolution here. So thank you
3	so much (applause).
4	No problem. And thank you,
5	especially to Miss Sasha Young. I saw her
6	efforts, especially during COVID, helping
7	out with Gammy's Pantry. And personally,
8	I think the the Five Towns is really
9	lucky to have Sasha. So just on a
10	personal note, I just wanted to mention
11	that.
12	I wanted to speak in regards to the
13	latest redistricting maps and my concern
14	about the maps in its current form. When
15	I opened the Excel file, which glad the
16	files are now up there, I know that there
17	was an issue early on in the
18	redistricting process. I saw only four
19	Majority/Minority districts, and I find
20	this very concerning. Many speakers,
21	including myself, at previous hearings,
22	had voiced the need for at least five
23	Majority/Minority districts, and we don't
24	have that.
25	As well, I wanted to talk about the
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2	division of Mill Brook and the division
3	of Valley Stream. Particularly in Mill
4	Brook's case, the lines don't really make
5	sense. And I think from a legislative
6	perspective, making sure that the lines
7	make sense to residents makes it very
8	easy for them to address any of the
9	issues that they're having. There's no
10	difference, even though I'm not from Mill
11	Brook, there's no difference. And I don't
12	know why Mill Brook was split up, as well
13	as the village of Valley Stream. And
14	villages such as Hempstead, which was
15	really noted in Newsday, is very
16	concerning.
17	And, overall, that in itself is
18	really just showing how this map in its
19	current form is just the County asking
20	for people to bring expensive litigation
21	as the current maps violate the Voting
22	Rights Act and the New York State John
23	Lewis Voting Rights Act.
24	So I ask the County to fix these
25	maps so that way we can avoid that

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2	litigation and not have that because it's
3	not something the County should be
4	investing our money in, especially when a
5	solution is definitely attainable and we
6	can definitely avoid that litigation. So
7	thank you (applause).
8	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
9	Richard Libby.
10	MR. LIBBEY: Hi. I'm here to talk
11	about the Five Towns Community Center.
12	Originally, when the County got the
13	title, the property was donated by the
14	people from the Center to the County. In
15	order for the county to do tax exempt
16	bond financing and build a new building.
17	They then put in Nassau County Medical
18	Center, which was the healthcare center.
19	But somehow when it was switched over, it
20	was removed, which is a horrible thing.
21	The Center actually feeds, I
22	believe, like 5000 people. You know, the
23	thing I think they gave away a million
24	and a half pounds of food. It's a
25	horrible thing that they're coming up
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2	with this idea of the \$5 million. The RFP
3	should either be postponed or canceled.
4	You should enter into a time period where
5	the Community Center can maintain and
6	raise money because under the County
7	lease, the money that they raised there
8	goes into the county general fund. So
9	they're always at a losing proposal. It
10	doesn't profit them to do anything. Every
11	time they try to work on something, if
12	they have all these things, they can go
13	out and get grants and stuff like that.
14	But if they could outsource part of the
15	property for themselves, they can make
16	money from the property.
17	As the former owners of it, the
18	County, when they took the title, they
19	signed the lease. And I guarantee you the
20	people who entered into the agreement
21	weren't as sophisticated as the County
22	people who were taking it in there. And
23	in good faith, they were two ministers
24	and they signed one sign of the lease in
25	1970, and then the second parcel was

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2	signed in 1974. They were ministers. One
3	lived in a basically 385 Bayview Avenue,
4	which was the HAP project. So I don't
5	think that they were as attuned or as
6	cunning as the County people who were
7	negotiating with them, and they didn't
8	think 50 years would really end that
9	fast. So in their mind, when they set it
10	up, it was like such a long time period.
11	People since Jeff Toback was trying
12	to give the property or sell the property
13	to the JCC. Now I know that JCC is trying
14	to open up something in the Community
15	Center saying they want to put a pool in
16	there and everything else, but they just
17	actually did one on Central Avenue. So
18	why don't they open that facility up to
19	everyone from Inwood so they could use
20	it? They don't need to put another pool
21	or any other expansion of the money
22	there. I mean, the County at one time,
23	they put tennis courts in there when it's
24	basically a soccer playing area. They had
25	to rip out the tennis courts and put the

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2	basically the soccer field back in there.
3	The County ripped off the roof of
4	the building prior to a hurricane, which
5	allowed water infiltration to come into
6	the building. They have been basically
7	neglecting the maintenance of it and then
8	turn around and blame the people for not
9	doing the proper procedure. If they came
10	out and as I said, the taxpayers paid
11	for the whole thing. It's not the
12	County's money, but the taxpayers money.
13	We need this center in here in order
14	to honor Black History Month because they
15	actually serve most of the black people
16	and Hispanic people, they're working on
17	that.
18	And Mrs. Ford, just in another
19	point, when the Atlantic Beach Bridge, my
20	grandfather in the thirties, went to
21	legalize it, 1938, when Nassau County
22	became a county, he went to legalize it
23	because they were going to sell it as a
24	profit center because it was a part of
25	the original part of Atlantic Beach. They
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2	built it and then they came around and
3	turned it in. The County ended up buying
4	the bridge for three years of the gross
5	revenue. So that's how that came back in
6	there.
7	But I would like it if you guys
8	would extend either the RFP because
9	you only gave them a month and a half
10	to put a proposal in there, remove the \$5
11	million and give them a new lease for
12	five years without the restriction of the
13	financial component that you guys make
14	all the money, go to the general fund. It
15	should go to the people in the Center
16	(applause).
17	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
18	you, Mr. Libbey.
19	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Mr. Presiding
20	Officer, real brief.
21	As a point of clarification, Mr.
22	Libby, thank you very much for coming.
23	And thank you for everyone here from the
24	Community Center for all the work that
25	you do.
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2	As a point of clarification, the RFP
3	was issued by the County Executive and
4	this Body just votes on the proposal,
5	their pick. So I when that comes before
6	this body, I will be supporting the
7	proposal that supports the community. And
8	if it doesn't support the community, then
9	I have grave concerns.
10	MR. LIBBEY: The County has gotten
11	3800 petitions to extend the lease or
12	cancel the RFP and there's just a new
13	effort on it.
14	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
15	you, Mr. Libby. We appreciate it.
16	Charlene Thompson.
17	MS. THOMPSON: Good evening once
18	again. My name is Charlene Thompson. I'm
19	here to speak about redistricting.
20	So I did take a look at the report.
21	I got a chance to look through it. And I,
22	I do readily recognize four
23	Majority/Minority districts, for a point
24	of information, would you be able to
25	clarify what the fifth one that has been
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2	identified? I have one, two, three and
3	six. I'm not sure which is the fifth.
4	Because it doesn't specify that in the
5	report.
6	Just to go on. You know, one of the
7	things that we we look at redistricting
8	every ten years, we talk about what
9	political legacy are we creating over the
10	next ten years? And we look back at the
11	last ten years, a lot of people who were
12	here ten years ago are not here anymore.
13	But the legacy that they created still
14	stands with us. Peter Smith, Judy Jacobs.
15	And so now today with this new map,
16	you've you've guys are shifting the
17	paradigm here. And one of the things that
18	I recognize is that you are redrawing
19	some of these traditional district lines
20	that have been in place since the
21	Legislature became 19 Legislative
22	Districts. And I, for one, think that's a
23	good thing, because what I believe it
24	will do is promote healthy political
25	competition and not allow incumbents that
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2	have served for decades to get too
3	comfortable. Because when incumbents get
4	comfortable, then they stop necessarily
5	paying attention and serving the
6	community's interests.
7	So I'm not adverse to political
8	competition, and I look forward to one
9	of the things I would encourage both
10	sides is that, we need to groom some
11	young folks to step up and be ready to
12	take advantage of these opportunities as
13	they arrive. I don't see enough of that
14	being done on either side of the aisle.
15	So I would encourage that we do have some
16	young people who are interested in
17	stepping up, but they need the guidance
18	and support of the more senior
19	legislators to get them along the way and
20	make sure they're ready to get out there
21	and compete in a meaningful way that
22	they're involved and engaged in community
23	activism.
24	So I, for one, encourage healthy
25	political competition. Because choice,
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2	political choices, are a great thing. I
3	look forward to see how this is all going
4	to shake out.
5	So thank you for putting I'm a
6	resident of Baldwin, so I know that that
7	was one of the great things that we
8	championed that we wanted for the most
9	part, Baldwin to be whole. I see that
10	Baldwin has been placed in Roosevelt with
11	Roosevelt. So that'll be interesting to
12	see how that paradigm shift is going to
13	evolve and promote political leadership.
14	I look forward to keeping an eye on that.
15	And so one just one point of
16	clarification, and I want to see where
17	the Fifth District is, because it's not
18	clear for me, but I'm looking forward to
19	see what's going to come over the next
20	ten years and what kind of legacy we
21	created.
22	Presiding Officer Nicolello, I can
23	say what I've seen so far is that you've
24	governed fairly and inclusively, and for
25	that we appreciate it.
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2	Thank you so much.
3	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
4	you.
5	Jerry Kornbluth, Nassau Community
6	College.
7	MR. KORNBLUTH: Good evening,
8	everyone. My name is Jerry Kornbluth.
9	I'm the Vice president for Community and
10	Governmental Relations. I just want to
11	say a few words.
12	You guys have inspired me to what
13	you do in the community and your passion
14	is tremendous. And it's because of you,
15	The Nassau Community College has put the
16	"C" back into Nassau Community College.
17	We are committed to the community that we
18	serve. Our mission is to change lives, to
19	give students all the opportunities
20	possible. We work closely with the local
21	school districts, we work closely with
22	not for profit organizations, the
23	business community and all other
24	communities in the county.
25	One of the one of the departments at
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2	Nassau Community College, the Sociology
3	Department, came to me with a proposal
4	about teaching some classes in the
5	Corrections facility. I went to see
6	Sheriff Anthony LaRocco. He embraced the
7	idea. And right now, I just want to share
8	with you, we're teaching a credit course
9	in the Corrections Facility as an
10	introduction to sociology class that is
11	an online class. Hopefully, it works out
12	well. We're looking to work out the kinks
13	in it right now, and hopefully we'll be
14	able to offer many more courses within
15	the in the correction facility.
16	And I just have to say that Anthony,
17	Sheriff LaRocco was fantastic in giving
18	us that opportunity and allowing us to
19	come in there and to work this program,
20	because the one institution that we want
21	to try to change is the criminal
22	institution. We want to be able to give
23	students the opportunity and open up
24	their eyes to see what it's like to be in
25	an institution of higher education. And I

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2	think that this is the beginning and this
3	is what Nassau Community College does. So
4	I want to thank you for your time and I
5	just wanted to share that with you.
6	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
7	you, Jerry.
8	Susan Gottehrer.
9	MS. GOTTEHRER: Good evening. My
10	name is Susan Gottehrer. I'm the director
11	of the Nassau County and New York Civil
12	Liberties Union. I'm not here to speak
13	about redistricting, but I am here to see
14	the vote. Mr. Ferretti, it was really
15	nice to see you show up at 3:00 this
16	afternoon and miss most of the public
17	comment. But I digress.
18	I would like to call attention to
19	all the pieces that have come together
20	here tonight. We've had a community
21	center asking for help. We had police
22	officers that were being highlighted for
23	their heroic behavior and doing their
24	jobs. I really just want to point out
25	that this is a moment of putting your
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2	money where your mouth is on two
3	different fronts. If you talk about
4	public safety and you are concerned about
5	public safety, then you will do
6	everything you can to help that community
7	center, because front loading the system
8	with policing and incarceration has been
9	what we've been doing since the Nixon
10	years and it doesn't work and it has
11	nothing to do with community safety. So
12	if your campaigns talk about community
13	safety and you don't help this community
14	center, that's what helps community
15	safety. That's exactly what helps
16	community safety. That's number one.
17	Number two, if you're going to talk
18	about Black History Month and then you're
19	going to vote on these maps I think
20	that might be all I have to say on that.
21	I think you get it.
22	Number three, the jail. I have a lot
23	to say about the jail. I've said it all
24	before. I'm getting a little tired of
25	only hearing about caring about the
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I	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	corrections officers at the jail. Again,
3	public safety. Public safety is about
4	using incarceration to prepare people
5	when they come out. If you care about
6	public safety and you put that in your
7	campaign ads, then put programs into that
8	jail. Number one.
9	As public safety Committee members,
10	I've asked you repeatedly look into the
11	medical provisions at the jail, look into
12	the records, look into all of those
13	things, because the conditions in those
14	jails that we hear the corrections
15	officers complaining about is where these
16	people live, 70% of them pretrial. And if
17	you think that putting people into an
18	atmosphere like that and then expecting
19	them to come out and act like regular
20	members of the community with no support,
21	then you don't care about community
22	safety.
23	So if you're going to put community
24	safety in your campaign ads, then put
25	your money where your mouth is. Tonight
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2	has just shown the whole thing. The whole
3	thing, and it's going to end with the
4	vote on the maps.
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2	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Item
3	18, Resolution 37, a resolution to
4	confirm the County Executive's
5	appointment of Anthony LaRocco to the
6	position of Sheriff of Nassau County.
7	Motion by Legislator Giuffre, seconded by
8	Legislator Ferretti. Motion is before the
9	Legislature. Mr. LaRocco.
10	SHERIFF LAROCCO: If I may, I'd like
11	to read something into the record,
12	please.
13	Good evening, honorable members of
14	the Legislature. My name is Anthony
15	LaRocco, and I am the acting sheriff.
16	Before returning to this position, I held
17	the position of Undersheriff from January
18	of last year and had a long career in
19	this very department.
20	I began my journey in 1986 in the
21	Enforcement Division as a deputy sheriff.
22	I was part of a recruit class to be the
23	very first deputy sheriffs to ever enter
24	into the Police Academy. In early summer
25	of 1990, our class of 20 were ordered
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2	into the correctional center to cover
3	posts due to budget issues affecting many
4	departments at that time. We worked
5	alongside correctional officers in
6	various positions throughout the
7	correctional center.
8	In the years that followed. I rose
9	through the ranks from deputy sheriff to
10	sergeant to lieutenant, and finally to
11	Captain, which were all civil service
12	tested positions. In 2000, I was
13	appointed to the title of Deputy
14	Undersheriff, which I held for one year.
15	During my career, I supervised every
16	aspect of the enforcement division, which
17	included the field unit, landlord/tenant
18	unit, warrant unit, and the Family Court
19	unit.
20	On September 6th of last year, I
21	became the acting sheriff. As acting
22	sheriff, I am tasked with the oversight
23	of two equally important divisions, being
24	the enforcement division and the Division
25	of Corrections. I must share my time
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2	accordingly between both. Some of my
3	accomplishments in the short period of
4	time include the promotions of 56
5	individuals, which included six captains,
6	16 lieutenants, 15 sergeants and 20
7	corporals. This number of promotions made
8	at one time has never happened in the
9	history of the sheriff's department.
10	I am also glad to announce that we
11	have a class of 22 recruits join the
12	ranks of correctional officers and also
13	have an additional class of 17 that will
14	also be joining the ranks sometime in
15	April of this year. I am also in the
16	process of replacing the entire fleet of
17	vehicles for the Sheriff's Department.
18	These promotions and hirings have
19	had a positive effect on cutting overtime
20	costs. From January 1st through February
21	24th of this year, the overtime cost will
22	1.6 million as compared to this same time
23	last year, which were 4.2 million. This
24	is a realized savings of approximately
25	60%. And more importantly, in no way have
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2	these savings had any adverse effects
3	regarding either the safety of the
4	offices or the inmates.
5	The care, custody, and control of
6	inmates is our number one objective, and
7	we take that task very seriously. We're
8	also in the process of adding additional
9	security cameras throughout the
10	Correctional Center to enhance safety for
11	all. Thank you.
12	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
13	you. Any questions? Legislative Lafazan.
14	LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Thank you, Mr.
15	LaRocco, for your prior service and your
16	commitment to your future service.
17	SHERIFF LAROCCO: Thank you very
18	much.
19	LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Of course.
20	As legislators we wear different
21	hats. We wear legislative hats, fiscal
22	hats, investigatory hats, and, of course,
23	oversight hats. Though you will serve at
24	the pleasure of the County Executive,
25	this chamber maintains oversight over the
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1	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	Executive Branch and over countywide
3	departments such as yours. So your
4	success as a leader is our success as
5	lawmakers. And I wish you the best.
6	But when it comes to the jail and
7	our law enforcement professionals in
8	COBA, I'm concerned. I'm concerned about
9	morale issues that come month after month
10	after month. I'm concerned about staffing
11	issues. I'm concerned about the academy
12	location. I'm concerned about the
13	infrastructure at the jail. And I'm very
14	concerned about an extremely questionable
15	appointment that was made recently. Given
16	this administration's decision making so
17	far when it comes to the jail, I have to
18	vote no.
19	But I wanted to wish you the best of
20	luck. Your success is our success. And I
21	hope you can work with President Sullivan
22	and COBA with urgency. And I hope you
23	have the courage to think differently and
24	make change. So I wish you the best.
25	LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Thank you very
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2	much.
3	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.
4	Anyone else? Legislator Ford.
5	LEGISLATOR FORD: Good evening,
6	Sheriff LaRocco. I want to thank you very
7	much for giving us a brief history of
8	your tenure at the jail already. And I
9	also want to thank you to hear that you
10	did put those outposts. You added the
11	security, I guess, in that rear, which we
12	had asked for.
13	And I thank you very much for
14	listening to some of the concerns that we
15	brought to you, not only for our
16	correctional officers, but also for the
17	inmates, the people that do reside at the
18	jail, and the concern for their safety
19	and also for their well being.
20	And I know that there's a number of
21	issues that we still need to work on, and
22	I'm hoping that we can continue with this
23	dialogue that we methodically go after
24	each issue so that we can make sure that
25	we follow it to its completion and to the
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2	benefit of all, whether or not it's
3	somebody who works there or somebody who
4	is residing there.
5	And I do appreciate the fact that
6	you have responded, but I'm looking
7	forward to working with you to make sure
8	that we continue this dialogue and we
9	finally get this jail up to the jewel
10	that it was meant to be.
11	SHERIFF LAROCCO: Thank you.
12	LEGISLATOR FORD: And I have to say,
13	though, I also agree. Even with the
14	morale, and I know there was some issues
15	that we brought up in regard to maybe
16	wellness committee taking a look at maybe
17	bringing some other things, visitation
18	changes there. And I'm hoping that you
19	will seriously look at that and respond
20	and help us so that we can get those
21	things established.
22	Thank you. But I do intend to vote
23	for you.
24	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
25	Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
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2	LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Hi,
3	Sheriff. I also agree with Legislator
4	Lafazan, my coworker. We do want to see
5	you prove us wrong.
6	But what I want to do is say that
7	it's really important to have bipartisan
8	communication. I understand that you
9	recently met with the Majority members of
10	of the Public Safety Committee and being
11	Ranking for the Minority, I wasn't aware
12	that you were meeting. And having an open
13	dialogue I have no idea what you even
14	discussed. I don't know if you have any
15	updates. I don't know if you had any of
16	the answers that we asked you at the
17	hearing, but we were not included in
18	that. And I just don't think that's the
19	right way to go about garnishing our
20	support or working out situations.
21	It's not that we just have concerns
22	that are not grounded. I mean, I sat here
23	as a legislator for years hearing about
24	one death after another when we were
25	having the health, the health issues. We
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2	were worried about different things as
3	far as disciplinarian subjects. And I
4	have no idea if you talked about it with
5	them, but if you did, we weren't granted
6	that privilege. So all I can say is, you
7	know, I don't know what else to say other
8	than, if you want our support and you
9	want us to work with you, we need to be
10	included in these meetings. I actually
11	just heard about it today for the first
12	time.
13	So I hope that you're doing a good
14	job as being sheriff. I hope that you're
15	using your own mind. I always hear you're
16	smart, man. You can depend on yourself.
17	And I hope you are. And I hope that you
18	are the sheriff in town.
19	And but again, we really have a lot
20	of concerns about the jail. You know,
21	fellow Legislator Siela Bynoe has been
22	the real the real back. Bone of the
23	effort to try to make improvements. And
24	the fact that we had no idea that you
25	were meeting is really just sending the

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2	wrong message, in my opinion.
3	So I'm also not going to be able to
4	support your nomination, but I really. It
5	can only go up from here. So I hope that
6	you take this opportunity to work with us
7	and respond to us and hear our concerns.
8	Thank you.
9	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Any
10	other legislators?
11	(Whereupon, no verbal
12	response.)
13	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
14	Hearing None. All in favor signify by
15	saying, "Aye".
16	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Aye.
17	LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Aye.
18	LEGISLATOR FORD: Aye.
19	LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Aye.
20	LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Aye.
21	LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Aye.
22	LEGISLATOR PILIP: Aye.
23	LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: Aye.

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2	LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: Aye.
3	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
4	opposed?
5	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Nay.
6	LEGISLATOR MULE: Nay.
7	LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Nay.
8	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Nay.
9	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Nay.
10	LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Nay.
11	LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Nay.
12	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
13	right. It passes by a vote of 11 to 7.
14	Congratulations, Sheriff.
15	SHERIFF LAROCCO: Thank you very
16	much.
17	(Whereupon, applause.)
18	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Next,
19	two items are 17 and 22, Resolutions
20	number 36 and 41, both of which are to
21	confirm the appointment of John DeGrace
22	as a member of the Nassau County
23	Community College Board of Trustees.
24	Moved by Legislator Walker, seconded by
25	Legislator Kopel. John?
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2	MR. DEGRACE: Thank you very much,
3	Mr. Presiding Officer, Ladies and
4	gentlemen of the Legislature, it's a
5	pleasure to be here. I have served on the
6	board at the College for about eight
7	years. I took a brief hiatus and I'm
8	looking forward to getting back to
9	business at the Bard. I love the College.
10	My major concern is for the students of
11	the College and bringing in as many new
12	students as possible.
13	And I'd also like to say hello to my
14	former Trustee, Buddy, Arnie Drucker.
15	Nice to see you, Arnie. He moved up the
16	ladder. I didn't. I got a demotion. But
17	thank you very much.
18	Any questions?
19	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
20	Legislator Kopel then Legislator Drucker.
21	LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Yes. Thank you.
22	I've had the privilege of knowing John
23	now about 15 years; John and Barbara,
24	actually. And ever since I've known you,
25	you've been doing nothing but public
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2	service. You've been devoted. And that's
3	a family that's devoted to public
4	service. Barbara, I served with you on
5	the on the the Valley Stream Chamber of
6	Commerce. You're a very active member. So
7	this is a family that has done nothing
8	but work for the betterment of the County
9	of Nassau and our people. So I think
10	that at this point, we're just lucky that
11	you're willing to still come back and do
12	more work for us and more work for the
13	for the wonderful students at the
14	College. College is lucky to have you.
15	We're lucky to have you.
16	And thank you for serving.
17	MR. DEGRACE: Thank you very much.
18	Thank you, Howard.
19	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
20	Legislator Drucker.
21	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you,
22	Presiding Officer. John, welcome back.
23	MR. DEGRACE: Thank you, Mr.
24	Drucker.
25	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: You know, it
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2	really is a pleasure for me to have this
3	opportunity to to recognize and offer my
4	support for your appointment back on the
5	Board.
6	I met John about 2012, so about 11
7	years ago. We served on the board
8	together. And I'm not reticent to say
9	that John and I are of different
10	political persuasions, but I never found
11	a more endearing, friendly, good hearted
12	man that I consider a friend than John
13	DeGrace.
14	When it came to the college and the
15	students, there was no politics involved.
16	Your commitment was to the betterment of
17	the College and to the students
18	primarily. And I always recognize that,
19	and I think that's why you and I got
20	along so well. I think we also we loved
21	sharing quotes from The Godfather movies,
22	if you remember correctly, that was one
23	of our favorite pastimes. One of the
24	lines from one of the Godfather movies
25	comes to mind now. When Al Pacino said,
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2	Just when you think you're out of this
3	life, they pull you back in, right?
4	MR. DEGRACE: That's right. Exactly.
5	Well, thank you very much. Thank you.
6	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: I consider you
7	a friend. And I more importantly as as
8	Legislator Kopel said, the College is
9	lucky to have you. The students are lucky
10	to have you. And I think you're going to
11	continue in that work.
12	And I will ask you as a personal
13	favor, John, that you and the fellow
14	members of the board try to work with the
15	full time Faculty association.
16	MR. DEGRACE: Yes.
17	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: I think I'm
18	speaking on behalf of all 19 of us. We
19	all share in that. We want you to work
20	together with them. And I hope that
21	you'll do that. I know you will.
22	MR. DEGRACE: I'll do my very best.
23	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: And I want to
24	congratulate you in advance, John. I
25	think you're a great person, and I'm
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2	proud to call you a friend.
3	MR. DEGRACE: Thank you very much.
4	It's reciprocal. Thank you very, very
5	much.
6	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
7	Legislator Walker.
8	LEGISLATOR WALKER: John, I, too, am
9	very excited to see you be part of this
10	board again. And I know how much you love
11	this county. I know how much you love the
12	residents of this county. I know how much
13	you love the College and certainly the
14	young people in the in this county that
15	can utilize our community college and
16	once again make it the jewel that it has
17	been for many, many years.
18	And I know enrollment has gone down,
19	but I know you're going to look to every
20	possible way that you can help build that
21	enrollment, whether it's other programs
22	that we can offer or whether it's looking
23	at something that we let go and we should
24	bring back. But I know you're going to do
25	the best and I look forward to working
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2	with you and anything we can do to help
3	you and the College out.
4	MR. DEGRACE: Legislator Walker,
5	Thank you very much. I appreciate that.
6	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: John,
7	I just wanted to add that you've always
8	been very passionate about the College.
9	And almost every time I've seen you, you
10	brought up an issue about the College for
11	our consideration. But it's great to have
12	somebody going back on with your
13	experience. We're going to need that
14	experience, that gravitas that you have
15	going forward with the issues the College
16	is facing and also your ability to work
17	with your board members and build
18	consensus, I think that's invaluable. So
19	we're very pleased that you'd want to
20	come back and do this.
21	MR. DEGRACE: Thank you. Legislator
22	Nicolello.
23	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Anyone
24	else? Legislator Lafazan.
25	LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Thank you,
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2	Presiding Officer. Mr. DeGrace, I take
3	Arnie Drucker's recommendations very
4	seriously. He speaks the world of you,
5	and I believe you're a wonderful man. And
6	I wish you the best.
7	I just wanted to explain why I'm
8	abstaining. Like Sheriff LaRocco, you are
9	a person of immense character, and I
10	thank you for your prior service, and I
11	congratulate you on your future service.
12	But the teachers at Nassau Community, for
13	months, my alma mater, they've been
14	crying out for change. And I think a
15	statement needs to be made that the
16	direction of the College needs to change
17	and change quickly. So I wish you the
18	best. You're going to be approved and I
19	look forward to working with you. Your
20	success is our success and our students'
21	success. And I thank you for serving.
22	MR. DEGRACE: Well, thank you very
23	much. I appreciate that.
24	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
25	right. Let's go to a vote. All in favor
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2	signify by saying, "Aye".
3	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Aye.
4	LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Aye.
5	LEGISLATOR FORD: Aye.
6	LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Aye.
7	LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Aye.

16	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
17	opposed?
18	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: No opposed.
19	Abstentions.
20	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: So it's
21	13 yes votes and five abstentions.
22	Congratulations.
23	MR. DEGRACE: Thank you very much.
24	And have a great evening.
25	
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3	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Item
4	19, Resolution 38, a resolution to
5	confirm the county executive's
6	appointment of Gennaro Cesrano to the
7	Assessment Review Commission. Motion by
8	Legislator Ferretti, seconded by
9	Legislator McKevitt. Gennaro.
10	MR. CESARANO: Good evening. My name
11	is Gennaro Cesarano. I'd like to thank
12	the County Legislature for allowing me
13	this time. I want to thank the County
14	Executive for this appointment to the
15	Assessment Review Commission.
16	A little bit about me: Currently,
17	I'm serving my second appointment on the
18	Civil Service Commission for the Town of
19	Hempstead. I also own and operate a
20	business in the county for the past ten
21	years. I look forward to bringing my
22	business experience, my civil service
23	experience to the County, working with my
24	fellow board members to serve the people
25	in Nassau County.
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2	Thank you.
3	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
4	you very much.
5	Any questions?
6	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: How are you,
7	Mr. Cesarano?
8	MR. CESARANO: Very good. How are
9	you?
10	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Good, good,
11	good. I guess following the tone of this
12	evening, just to make sure that you are
13	fully aware. We're not going to be able
14	to support your appointment, but it has
15	nothing to do with you personally. I'm
16	sure you're a good person. You stand up
17	for your community and looks like you're
18	a good business owner.
19	However, the County Executive has
20	not provided, and we've been asking now
21	for quite some time, an assessment plan
22	in terms of how we plan to go forward in
23	this county in regards to managing
24	assessments. As you may or may not know,
25	there's been some errors that have been
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2	created, nothing of magnitude that would
3	that would rise to the level of the
4	Commission that you're going to be on to
5	a large degree. But there were some
6	errors in the last computation of
7	assessment that has been done, and still
8	we have not seen a plan.
9	So our objection to you or us not
10	supporting you is not directed at you.
11	It's more directed at the fact that the
12	County has not seen a plan. We have taken
13	this course before with other folks that
14	have been appointed to the Assessment
15	Review Commission as well.
16	So I just wanted to make sure you
17	were aware of that. But I wish you
18	nothing but the best and I wish you much
19	success. And to quote Legislator Lafazan,
20	"your success is our success". Seems like
21	a popular line tonight.
22	MR. CESARANO: Thank you.
23	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: You're
24	welcome. Thank you.
25	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
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2	Legislator Solages.
3	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Thank you.
4	Again, I have to vote along with my
5	colleagues. But I have to say that every
6	time I've been to your restaurant, you
7	treated me with the utmost respect.
8	You've introduced me to Italian food I
9	didn't know about. So, again, I really
10	appreciate you. It's nothing personal.
11	Just we have a certain agenda when it
12	comes to issues and Assessment
13	Department, the things that we have not
14	seen done by the County Executive or the
15	Republicans, but yet they complained
16	about it profusely when we had a
17	Democratic County Executive. The
18	assessment system has been frozen. We
19	recently advocated for the extension of
20	the deadline, which I'm happy the County
21	Executive granted. Again, nothing
22	personal. You're a complete, gentleman.
23	MR. CESARANO: Thank you.
24	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: I think some of
25	the best Italian food in Nassau County.
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2	But thank you.
3	MR. CESARANO: Thank you.
4	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
5	Legislator Ferretti.
6	LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you,
7	Presiding officer. And I do want to speak
8	highly of my friend Jerry, but before I
9	do, I do think it's important just to
10	point out and I'm not questioning the
11	vote of the Minority, but Jerry's being
12	appointed to the Assessment Review
13	Commission, which is independent of the
14	Assessment Department.
15	But nevertheless, you know, Jerry,
16	we've known each other for a very long
17	time. I'm looking at your resume and I
18	see all the way back to 2003 when we
19	worked together in the Town of Hempstead
20	for a couple of years. And it's 20 years
21	ago now, which is insane. Well, you look
22	the same. I look 30 years older. So
23	something something's going on.
24	MR. CESARANO: It's that life in
25	politics for you (laughter).
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2	MR. CESARANO: No comment.
3	But no, you're extremely qualified
4	for the position. You have many years in
5	public service. And I can personally
6	attest to your character, your work
7	ethic. And I know you're going to succeed
8	at this position with flying colors. So
9	preemptive congratulations. Good luck and
10	glad we're working together again.
11	MR. CESARANO: Thank you.
12	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Anyone
13	else?
14	(Whereupon, no verbal
15	response.)
16	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
17	Calling for a vote. All in favor signify
18	by saying, "Aye".
19	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Aye.
20	LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Aye.
21	LEGISLATOR FORD: Aye.
22	LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Aye.
23	LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Aye.
24	LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Aye.

8	(Whereupon, no verbal
9	response.)
10	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
11	Abstentions?
12	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Abstained.
13	LEGISLATOR MULE: Abstained.
14	LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
15	Abstained.
16	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Abstained.
17	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Abstained.
18	LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Abstained.
19	LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Abstained.
20	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
21	right. It passes by a vote of 11 votes
22	for and with 7 abstentions.
23	Congratulations, Gennaro.
24	MR. CESARANO: Thank you.
25	
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2	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Item
3	21, Resolution 40, a resolution to
4	confirm the County Executive's
5	appointment of Louis DiGrazia to the
6	Sewer and Storm Water Finance Authority.
7	Moved by Legislator McKevitt, seconded by
8	Legislator Giuffre.
9	MR. DIGRAZIA: Good evening. I'd
10	like to thank County Executive Blakeman
11	for selecting me for this appointment and
12	for the Legislative review and time they
13	spent in helping out the county
14	residents.
15	I've been doing public works work
16	for 30 years for the Village of Freeport,
17	Town of Hempstead. I know the Board very
18	well. I've worked with Commissioner
19	Arnold for 20 years on various projects.
20	And I think I bring a perspective to this
21	authority which is needed on this board
22	right now.
23	Thank you.
24	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.
25	Thank you very much. Legislator Mule.
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2	LEGISLATOR MULE: Hi, Lou. How are
3	you?
4	MR. DIGRAZIA: Hi.
5	LEGISLATOR MULE: It's wonderful to
6	see that you're going to be here helping
7	out the County. He was always the go to
8	person if we needed to know something. Is
9	this being done correctly? You always
10	told it to us straight. So I know that
11	you'll do a great job.

13	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.

5	Ford. That puts the item before us.

7	inasmuch as a amended map was filed on
8	February 21st, 2023, which incorporates

14	Now, this is going to be a vote just
15	on the amendment. It's not on the Item,
16	the item as amended. All in favor of the

18	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Aye.

5	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
6	opposed?
7	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Nay.
8	LEGISLATOR MULE: Nay.
9	LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Nay.
10	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Nay.
11	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Nay.
12	LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Nay.
13	LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Nay.
14	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: The
15	amendment passes by a vote of 11 to 7.
16	I would ask at this time that the
17	transcripts of the hearings of the Rules
18	Committee on January 17th and the Full
19	Legislature from February 16th and today
20	be incorporated by reference into the
21	record.
22	Any legislator wants to speak? Sure.
23	Minority Leader Abrahams.
24	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you,
25	Presiding Officer. Thank you for
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2	incorporating the record from the
3	previous hearing into this particular
4	vote.
5	I do have a question probably for
6	you, Presiding Officer, as it pertains to
7	Mr. Trende's analysis, was that analysis,
8	was that analysis paid for with
9	Legislative TDAC money or Legislative
10	Majority contractual money? I'm just
11	trying to make sure I understand, is this
12	something that's privileged or is it
13	something that this entire Body should be
14	able to obtain?
15	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: I'll
16	answer that by saying that we retained
17	Mr. Tseytlin's firm, Troutman Pepper,
18	which retained Mr. Trende, which uses Mr.
19	Trende. So it was it flows through the
20	counsel that we retained.
21	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: And the counsel
22	that you retain was paid for with TDAC
23	commission resources?
24	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: No. As
25	as authorized by the Charter and Laws of
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	NC FULL LEGISLATURE 02.27.23
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2	the County, I, as Presiding Officer,
3	retained Troutman Pepper.
4	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: So the
5	resources come out of the Legislative
6	Majority budget.
7	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: I
8	don't believe they're coming out of the
9	majority budget. I believe they come out
10	of the County Budget as a whole. This
11	through the County Attorney's Office.
12	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: The general
13	fund?
14	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Yes.
15	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I'm just
16	trying to figure out
17	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: It's
18	out of the County Attorney's budget.
19	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: How do we get
20	a copy of the analysis? If the analysis
21	is privileged, then it's privileged. Then
22	we shouldn't get it. But if the analysis
23	is something that's been paid for out of
24	some type of Redistricting Fund, I think
25	we would like to get it. I think we
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2	should be able to put it up on the County
3	website and it should be something that
4	the entire public should have an
5	opportunity to see. Unless I'm mistaken.
6	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: It was
7	done through the offices of Troutman
8	Pepper. So I am not sure what the
9	legalities of that is. But as we
10	discussed before, we have what we have
11	offered and we are ready to move forward
12	in the process.
13	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I'm sorry,
14	Presiding Officer. Let me just try again.
15	I'm not trying to be argumentative or
16	competitive.
17	How is Troutman Pepper paid?
18	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: It was
19	paid out of the County Attorney's budget.
20	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: So it's been
21	paid out of the County Attorney's budget?
22	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Yes,
23	the County Attorney's budget. The
24	Presiding Officer has the power, as
25	granted by the Charter, to retain
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2	counsel, which I have done.
3	Mr. Tseytlin, Troutman Pepper, is an
4	attorney that I retained for the purpose
5	of this process. And I would say that his
6	services and his communications with me
7	would be something that would be subject
8	to attorney client privilege.
9	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: That's
10	interesting. I really have a comeback for
11	that one. Well, I have a comeback, but I
12	can't believe what we're doing. All
13	right.
14	I mean, I think it begs the question
15	that the County Attorney did not make
16	known to the Legislative Minority that he
17	was taking on Troutman Pepper on behalf
18	of the Majority. I would think the
19	Legislative Minority is also privileged
20	to that counsel, since the County
21	Attorney does represent us as well, and
22	we were never made aware that Troutman
23	Pepper was being hired, nor have we been
24	privileged to the opportunity of seeing
25	what Troutman Pepper had put together in
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2	regards to requesting Mr. Trende to be a
3	part of his analysis.
4	So, I'm just saying and I'll wrap up
5	by saying this. You mentioned before,
6	earlier during the hearing, that we in
7	the Legislative Minority have been
8	provided all the information that your
9	side has, and obviously we have not. And
10	this is a clear example of how we have
11	not received any information and we're
12	actually a part of this Body. I had no
13	idea, there's been no memo, that the
14	County Attorney, who apparently is only
15	representing half of the Legislature or
16	12/19 of it or 11/19, Mr. Rhoads is
17	not here anymore 11/19 of the
18	Legislature has chosen to not include the
19	Legislative Minority. I wonder why.
20	So from that standpoint, Presiding
21	Officer, I understand the way that it
22	went down. We're prepared to take the
23	vote. I would just kindly ask that you
24	allow the folks that are here that maybe
25	didn't get a chance to speak earlier to
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2	incorporate them into the record. But to
3	me, it's disheartening that we are at
4	this point where we have not been
5	included in this process. But thank you.
6	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: As I
7	said, this is a power that's given to the
8	Presiding Officer to retain counsel.
9	There's two points I'd like to make,
10	and the Legislator Ferretti made this
11	point earlier. It was announced by one of
12	the Democratic Commissioners to the TDAC
13	at the very beginning that this is going
14	to the courts. So that was a
15	consideration that we took.
16	Secondly, with the changes in the
17	laws in New York State, with the new
18	Court of Appeals decision in Harkenrider,
19	the law is not what it was ten years ago.
20	So we wanted to make sure, as we looked
21	at the TDAC process, that the process
22	that was followed, the maps that were
23	produced, would comply with those laws.
24	So I, as Presiding Officer, retained the
25	counsel that won the case of the Court of

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2	Appeals last year for obvious reasons,
3	because that counsel has experience in
4	litigating this issue and has been
5	successful with the New York State Court
6	of Appeals. That counsel has been
7	advising me and developing this map for
8	the Legislature. The information that has
9	been provided, the memos that have been
10	provided to us, have been made part of
11	the record. And we're at the point, I
12	believe, where we can vote.
13	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Just this is a
14	point of clarification, Presiding
15	Officer, the memos that have been
16	provided to the Legislature, you have
17	shared with us. But the analysis that was
18	done by Mr. Trende that's been hired at
19	your direction to the County Attorney's
20	office, has only been provided to your
21	side.
22	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Just
23	to be clear, I hired Troutman Pepper. Mr.
24	Trende works with Troutman Pepper. So I
25	hired Troutman Pepper and his office
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2	works with Mr. Trende, who has, again,
3	provided analysis that was accepted by
4	the Court of Appeals.
5	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Nobody's
6	disputing what Mr. Trende has done. What
7	I'm saying is Mr. Trende has provided an
8	analysis, I guess, to Troutman Pepper, to
9	Mr. Tseytlin. I'm assuming he's provided
10	it to your side. However, the County
11	Attorney, which represents all of us,
12	basically that analysis should be
13	provided to all of us, shouldn't it?
14	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Well,
15	you have. Those memos or what we have.
16	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I'm not
17	talking about the memos, Presiding
18	Officer. I think you know exactly what
19	I'm talking about. There is a Sean Trende
20	analysis, which basically he has
21	conducted, which is an ensemble approach,
22	which he did 50,000 iterations of the map
23	to determine based on his expertise we
24	disagree with his expertise, but it's
25	hard for me to publicly disagree with it
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2	because all I'm going based off is the
3	description but we disagree with his
4	analysis based on what Dr. Magleby has
5	testified a few weeks ago.
6	That being said, that analysis is
7	mentioned in the Troutman pepper report,
8	an analysis that has been paid for by the
9	County Attorney's office. However, that
10	analysis, I haven't seen it. I'm asking
11	the question to you, have you seen it?
12	Has your side seen it?
13	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: We
14	have been provided what you have been
15	provided, which is the conclusions of Mr.
16	Trende. Other than that, I've had
17	conversations with with my counsel, which
18	I'm not going to disclose. But other than
19	that, we've been provided with the
20	conclusions Mr. Trende provided, it's in
21	the memos, you have what we have.
22	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Okay, So,
23	basically the County Attorney's Office
24	authorized yourself and your side to pay
25	for something, and you have not seen the

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2	analysis that you're paying for?
3	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: I have
4	seen the summary, which is in the memo.
5	The summary of the findings of Mr.
6	Trende. When I'm not a demographer, I'm
7	not someone who can read and understand
8	the data that's being used by somebody
9	who is analyzing 50,000 variations of
10	possible maps in Nassau County. No, I did
11	not get into the into the weeds. I did
12	not see all 50,000 of the ensemble. No, I
13	didn't. What I got was the conclusions
14	after he reviewed the maps that were
15	drafted. What we received is his
16	conclusions. And those conclusions, as a
17	matter of the record, fit well within the
18	acceptable parameters and perform much
19	better than those maps that were put
20	forward by the Democratic members and
21	Republican members of the Commission.
22	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: So just to be
23	I just want to make sure
24	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: I
25	am
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2	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I'm sorry. I
3	thought I was I thought you were done. Go
4	ahead.
5	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: I am
6	done answering questions. I've said
7	everything I'm going to say. If you want
8	to make a statement, you're welcome to do
9	it.
10	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Well, I
11	apologize, Presiding Officer, but I have
12	to ask questions because you just brought
13	to my attention that you basically use
14	resources from the County Attorney. As
15	far as I'm concerned, the County Attorney
16	represents everyone in the Legislature,
17	not just 11/19 of it.
18	So from that standpoint, all of that
19	information should have been provided to
20	this Legislative Body immediately, not
21	five minutes before a meeting. We should
22	have been at the table discussions. I was
23	under the impression for weeks, if not
24	months, that your side was paying for
25	this out of the TDAC Commission money,
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2	the leftover money that was unused by the
3	Commissioners, which would give you the
4	authority to hire and bring in whoever
5	you want. But for some reason, that
6	wasn't the case. And now we're learning
7	that the analysis that was done by Mr.
8	Trend, no one has seen. We've only seen a
9	descriptive response put together by
10	Troutman Pepper, who, as far as I'm
11	concerned, was the litigator in the case
12	in Harkenrider versus Hochul. But they
13	were not actually the map drawers.
14	So I just have to ask a question:
15	How much was the Troutman Pepper analysis
16	since the County Attorney is paying for
17	it and we should be represented by it?
18	How much did the what was our portion?
19	What was our 7/19 portion of that?
20	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: I am
21	done answering your questions. I can tell
22	you that again, that the Charter gives
23	the Presiding Officer the power to retain
24	counsel, which is what I did. And perhaps
25	if Democrat Commissioners at the

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2	beginning of the process weren't
3	announcing that this is going to the
4	courts, I wouldn't have needed to hire
5	outside counsel, but the Commissioners
6	did, and others did, who are Democrat
7	leaders, have said matter of factly, It
8	doesn't matter what you do, it's going to
9	the court. So I did the prudent thing. As
10	been mentioned time and time again, the
11	expense of potentially paying prevailing
12	wages is something that should be taken
13	into consideration. So I went out and
14	hired the counsel who successfully argued
15	the case before the Court of Appeals.
16	Shockingly, a Democrat appointed
17	bench who sided with counsel in finding
18	last year that the maps prepared by the
19	Democratic Legislature was so egregiously
20	gerrymandered that they had to be thrown
21	out. Yes, I went and got that counsel
22	because your side has announced in every

24 25

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way that you could possibly announce that

you're bringing this to litigation. So I

did that to protect the County's

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2	taxpayers.
3	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I'm not too
4	sure I understand. What's my side?
5	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Did
6	you? I don't know.
7	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I appointed
8	members to a TDAC commission, and that
9	was it. Right?
10	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
11	right. So look, all right. I don't mean
12	any pejoratives there. I mean, it was a
13	member of the the Temporary District
14	Advisory Committee, so I withdraw the
15	word, "your side".
16	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you.
17	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Do you
18	have a statement or anything else?
19	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: No, no. I
20	didn't get answer to the question. How
21	much did the contract cost for Troutman
22	Pepper and the analysis that was done by
23	Mr. Trende?
24	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
25	Legislator Mule, you raised your hand.
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2	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: We're not
3	going to get an idea of how much you
4	cost? I mean, we can get you guys an
5	audit of every single cost of Dr.
6	Magleby, Dr. Gall. The experts have been
7	provided, every single one.
8	So again, folks, this is the
9	secrecy. They say they're transparent,
10	but they can't even tell you how much
11	they paid for something that the County
12	Attorney paid for, which is the people's
13	attorney. The entire Legislature and the
14	people's attorney, but can't even tell
15	you how much it is, but it's transparent.
16	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
17	Legislator Mule.
18	LEGISLATOR MULE: Thank you,
19	Presiding Officer. I just wanted to talk
20	a little bit about my thinking just prior
21	to the vote. Like Legislator Ferretti, I
22	have found this process fascinating. I
23	learned a tremendous amount. Very
24	fascinating. I went to several of the
25	TDAC hearings, particularly there was one
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2	in my hometown. I attended that one as
3	well as a couple of others.
4	I want to thank the Presiding
5	Officer for taking into account several
6	things that I said at the Rules Committee
7	Hearing, which had to do with South
8	Hempstead and putting that back together
9	that needed to happen and thank you for
10	doing that.
11	Freeport now is divided into two as
12	opposed to four, and you don't have to
13	put on your bathing suit in order to get
14	to the one side to make it contiguous.
15	You took that into account, and I very
16	much appreciate that.
17	But I do have some serious problems
18	which were brought up perhaps by several
19	other people. But I'd just like to give
20	my take on it. The fact that most of
21	Freeport has been moved into a district
22	with Merrick and North Bellmore, and to
23	say that because they share Sandy or
24	flood-related issues that that makes them
25	alike. I am not in that district. I'm in
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2	a different district. That portion of
3	Freeport really is where the majority of
4	the flooding, the Sandy-related flooding
5	happened. So to say that that's a real
6	reason, it just doesn't make any sense to
7	me.
8	And then to LD6, if you look at the
9	map, in order to get Roosevelt to add to
10	it, you have to come around and up and
11	over Freeport and then it's kind of over
12	there (indicating). And I that that one
13	doesn't make sense to me either. It makes
14	much more sense to keep it with North
15	Freeport. By putting Freeport, most of
16	Freeport now, with with Merrick and North
17	Bellmore, I think that that is just very,
18	very clearly diluting the minority vote.
19	And so I believe that the residents of
20	Freeport will no longer have real
21	representation as a result of that.
22	So that's all I have to say. Thank
23	you.
24	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.
25	Any other legislators?
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2	Legislator Lafazan.
3	LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Sure. So I
4	think the theme of this evening, in my
5	opinion, is disagreement doesn't always
6	have to be personal, and politics can be
7	disagreeable without being personal. So,
8	Rich, you've been a gentleman to me
9	always, and I thank you as always.
10	Ten years ago, as a young student, I
11	sat in this auditorium and I watched this
12	Body carve up a gerrymandered map. Ten
13	years later, sitting here as a
14	Legislator, it's sad that we haven't
15	grown.
16	I'm an eternal optimist, and I think
17	this County's best days are ahead of us.
18	But I'm also practical. And there's
19	nothing I can say. There's nothing anyone
20	on this side can say that will change
21	this vote in a few minutes. It doesn't
22	mean that we have to just be silent and
23	not put on the record that it's
24	outrageous that legislator Drucker and I,
25	two Democrats who represent two very
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2	large and distinct school districts and
3	communities, Syosset and Plainview, are
4	now in one district. And if this map
5	passes, Arnie, who's been a friend and a
6	mentor and a big brother to me, is now in
7	my district. This doesn't have to be this
8	way. And I know we'll hear from those who
9	drew the map, "We don't know where
10	incumbents live". But how many
11	Republicans have been put in a district
12	with another Republican? The answer is
13	zero. And so if you do an ensemble
14	analysis, tens of thousands of
15	simulations, what is the statistical
16	probability that we'll end up with a map
17	with two Democrats in the same district,
18	but no Republicans in the district if
19	another Republican?
20	Tomorrow morning, students in Nassau
21	County are going to wake up to a snow
22	day. This Body is going to wake up to a
23	lawsuit. When the courts kick it back, I
24	hope that we can work together to make a
25	fair map. This County is not served by

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2	the political competition foisted upon
3	Legislator Drucker and I. We've been
4	singled out, it's unfair and it's quite
5	frankly, egregious.
6	So, again, when the courts kick this
7	back to us and we have an opportunity
8	directed by the courts to draw a new fair
9	map, right. When all the rhetoric is done
10	and we finally lose in court, I hope you
11	work with us. I love serving here.
12	Legislator Drucker loves serving here.
13	Our constituents lose tonight and nobody
14	wins.
15	Thank you.
16	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Anyone
17	else?
18	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: For the
19	record, Presiding Officer.
20	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Yes.
21	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Just for the
22	record, I talked about transparency and I
23	talked about costs. And it wouldn't be
24	fair if I wasn't transparent, nor was I
25	being true with public. The Legislature,
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2	the TDAC members on the Democratic side,
3	in extension, obviously going into 2022,
4	we spent \$22,000 to Dr. Magleby, who
5	provided expertise in regards to the map,
6	and we spent \$74,800 on the map ability
7	drawing capabilities of Dr. Gall. Just to
8	be fair. So I would like to hear the
9	number again, but obviously we may not
10	hear that number.
11	But the bottom line is from our
12	standpoint, and just to piggyback on what
13	Legislator Lafazan has said, we have the
14	power and the authority tonight to
15	basically do the right thing.
16	Unfortunately, this map is going to go
17	forward. And this Body is choosing to
18	vote on a map that is going to be
19	illegal. It's illegal for multiple
20	reasons that I indicated at the hearing.
21	But most importantly, Mrs. Thompson,
22	to answer your question, the reason why
23	you didn't get an answer to the five
24	Majority/Minority districts is because it
25	does not exist. There's only four. There
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2	is not five.
3	This map also violates multiple
4	Federal Voter Rights Act clauses. It also
5	violates the John Lewis Provision as it
6	pertains to Minority/Majority. It dilutes
7	minority votes in the areas of Freeport
8	that Legislator Mule talked about. And it
9	also dilutes votes in the area of
10	Lakeview. That is very clear.
11	What is also clear is that the legal
12	fees that are presented by the
13	petitioner, or the plaintiff in this
14	particular matter, whatever may be the
15	case, those legal fees are going to be
16	paid for by taxpayers, not the County
17	Attorney taxpayers. The County will have
18	to foot that bill to pay if those
19	petitions and those litigation cases are
20	successful, that's it. So it would be it
21	would be proper and appropriate for this
22	Legislative Body to do everything it can
23	to kick over, to turn over every single
24	issue, to ensure that we are passing a
25	legal map. We're not doing that.

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2	We have chosen to do things in
3	secrecy. We've told things not to be
4	transparent. We've asked pointed
5	questions in regards to Lakeview, to
6	Freeport, no answer. We've asked pointed
7	questions in regards to a fifth
8	Minority/Majority district. We're told by
9	Mr. Tseytlin, who was here a couple of
10	weeks ago, that he did not look at race,
11	which to me sounds to be a little bit
12	I'm not too sure of what to say about
13	that because the whole Legislative Body
14	was created because Judge Arthur Spatt
15	created two Minority/Majority districts
16	because of race. So I'm not too sure what
17	Mr. Tseytlin is talking about.
18	But that being said, unfortunately,
19	none of us want this. None of us want to
20	see a lawsuit. I rather things get worked
21	out, because ultimately the lawsuit is
22	going to cost taxpayer money. That being
23	said, I don't see how there's going to be
24	any path for residents not to join a
25	lawsuit to be able to get some type of

3	We have the opportunity to do the

Any conflict or deficient written description of the boundaries of the nineteen legislative districts contained in Annex A of the Charter shall be resolved in favor of the map contained in Annex A of the Charter as interpreted by the digital equivalency file, using Caliper Corporation's "Maptitude for Redistricting Version 2022 Build 5015" using their 2020 New York Prisoner Adjusted Final Redistricting Data, filed with the Clerk of the Nassau County Legislature with this Local Law. §3. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

§4. It is hereby determined, pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 8 N.Y.E.C.L. section 0101 et seq. and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, that this Local Law will not have a significant effect on the environment, and that no further review is required.

§5. Effective Date: This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon the filing of the law with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the New York State Municipal Home Rule Law.

§2. Any conflict or deficient written description of the boundaries of the nineteen legislative districts contained in Annex A of the Charter shall be resolved in favor of the map contained in Annex A of the Charter as interpreted by the digital equivalency file, using Caliper Corporation's "Maptitude for Redistricting Version 2022 Build 5015" using their 2020 New York Prisoner Adjusted Final Redistricting Data, filed with the Clerk of the Nassau County Legislature with this Local Law.

§3. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

§4. It is hereby determined, pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 8 N.Y.E.C.L. section 0101 et seq. and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, that this Local Law will not have a significant effect on the environment, and that no further review is required.

§5. Effective Date: This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon the filing of the law with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the New York State Municipal Home Rule Law.

10	Minority/Majority. I'm guessing it's

11	that are here today. I know there's many
12	people here from from the Lakeview
13	Community, Hempstead Community, Freeport
14	Community. Obviously, those are all
15	communities that are being impacted by
16	their votes being diluted. But most
17	importantly, the one thing I can stress
18	today to my Republican colleagues is
19	this: We have an opportunity. If the
20	disagreement is between Mr. Trende and
21	Dr. Magelby's approach, we have an
22	opportunity today, they have an
23	opportunity today, to instruct their
24	consultant to run the measurement based
25	off of what Dr. Magleby did. If they
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	NCL HEARING 02.27.23
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2	don't do that, let me explain what
3	happens. If they don't do that, they are
4	putting their heads in the sand and,
5	therefore, saying that they do not want
6	to see what that those numbers look like.
7	Why? Why don't you want to see what Dr.
8	Magleby already generated? I'll tell you
9	why. The reason is very clear. It's
10	because it's going to show exactly what
11	Dr. Magleby is saying. If you change the
12	measurement to county executive, DA,
13	county clerk years, it's going to show
14	exactly what he's saying. But instead, I
15	read through Mr. Tseytlin's report or
16	I'm not too sure who drafted this from
17	Troutman Pepper and that indicates
18	that they're more trying to impugn his
19	work. They're trying to discredit his
20	work, when it's clear it's just the
21	measurement. That's the big difference,
22	of when we measure that particular
23	election. But if they choose not to run
24	that report the way Dr. Maglbey has done,
25	we are going down a path that's going to

2	ensure there will be litigation and suing
3	this county. Because that particular
4	measurement, that particular analysis
5	that needs to be done could very well be
6	asked to be done right now. We can take
7	the time, I'm sure, by a push of a button
8	on a computer, Mr. Trende can generate
9	that analysis, but we are choosing not to
10	have him generate that analysis. And the
11	bigger question is: Why? They won't give
12	you an answer why. They're going to say
13	that they stand by Mr. Tseytlin's
14	testimony that racial makeup should not
15	be incorporated into redrawing the map. I
16	look out into the audience today, I think
17	the folks here beg to differ.
18	That being said, we are seeing that
19	the community of Freeport, the community
20	of Lakeview, their votes are dramatically
21	being diluted in this process, and the
22	only thing that's stopping any level of
23	litigation is politics. That's it.
24	Nothing else. From our standpoint, the
25	Republican Majority is now being

2	forewarned. That if this analysis is not
3	to take place, very clearly, there's
4	going to be third party lawsuits out
5	there and the County will be sued on
6	various different things that I just
7	mentioned just now: Minority/Majority
8	districts, dilution of votes; it's clear
9	as day. We're going down a path where
10	we're going to be asking you, the
11	taxpayers, to pay the bill. Keep in mind,
12	law firms that sue the County, their
13	costs and expenditures are reimbursed by
14	Nassau County. The costs are not taken on
15	by them and then they forever stay with
16	them. Their costs are reimbursed by
17	Nassau County. So if Nassau County
18	generates a bill to basically defend this
19	case, they not only have to pay the
20	counsel that's here to represent this
21	Legislative Body and the County
22	Executive, and whoever else is named in
23	the lawsuit, they are also responsible
24	for paying the fees of the petitioner and
25	the plaintiffs millions of dollars just

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2	because of politics.
3	So from that standpoint, we are
4	being forewarned today that we have an
5	opportunity to do everything we can, look
6	at the Trende analysis, ask for it to be
7	done a different way, as per Dr. Magleby,
8	just to cover ourselves as an
9	institution. But they're choosing not to.
10	The bigger question is why? Thank you,
11	Presiding Officer.
12	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
13	you. We'll start with the public comment.
14	Jonathan Prevost.
15	MR. PREVOST: Good afternoon,
16	elected officials, residents of Nassau
17	County. My name is Jonathan Prevost, and
18	I'm here today to discuss the issue that
19	Minority Leader Abrahams has just brought
20	up regarding the redistricting.
21	Before I address my points, I like
22	to point out some of the demographic
23	changes that have occurred here in Nassau
24	County since our last census was taken in
25	2010. The African American community has

2	seen an increase of 11%, and between 2010
3	and 2020, there has been a 10% increase.
4	The Native American and Alaska Native
5	Community has seen a 96% from 2010; the
6	Asian American community has seen a 59%
7	increase from 2010; Native American and
8	other Pacific Islanders, 7.3% increase;
9	and those who self identify as other
10	race, 153.5% increase from 2010. What are
11	these numbers telling us? Nassau County
12	is changing. The demographic in which we
13	are being represented is consistently
14	being changed to reflect a changing
15	demographic. These maps that have been
16	proposed do not reflect that.
17	I'm a resident of LD-1. The LD-1 map
18	that has been presented, looks nothing
19	similar what the standard should be for a
20	fair and just Minority/Majority map that
21	should be representative of the people.
22	Similar situations for LD-2 and LD-3.
23	Three strong legislative districts with
24	strong minority communities.
25	According to the ACLU, the Supreme

2	Court deems vote dilution as certain
3	electoral laws, practice or structures
4	interacts with social and historical
5	conditions that cause an inequality and
6	opportunities enjoyed by black and white
7	voters to elect their preferred
8	representatives. Furthermore, as Minority
9	Leader Abrahams stated, the John R. Lewis
10	Voting Right Act of New York now, I
11	know some of your attorneys, so Page
12	Four, Section Two, lines 10-12 for your
13	references states, it prohibits
14	against vote dilution. No Board of
15	Elections political subdivision shall use
16	any methods of election having the 12
17	effects of impairing the ability of
18	members of a protected class to elect
19	candidates of their choice or influence
20	in the outcomes of an election. Violation
21	of paragraph A in this subdivision shall
22	be established upon showing that a
23	particular subdivision used at large
24	methods in election in either voting
25	patterns of members of protected class

2	within the political subdivision of
3	racially polarized, under the totality of
4	the circumstances, the ability of the
5	members of the protected class to elect
6	candidates of their choice or influence
7	outcomes. What are we doing here? We are
8	setting precedent for the next ten years
9	of Nassau County. We are addressing what
10	will come next if we allow this map to
11	proceed. What message are we saying to
12	our changing neighborhoods? What message
13	are we sending to the future residents of
14	Nassau County when you come here, their
15	votes matter.
16	These people behind me have come in
17	today to share their opinions about the
18	situation at hand because they felt it
19	was important to them, and not only them,
20	the next generation of Nassau County
21	residents. So I implore you to please
22	reconsider this map and consider the
23	points I've made here today. Thank you
24	(applause).

2	you. Thank you, Mr. Prevost. Judy
3	Cataldo.
4	MS. CATALDO: Can I speak later?

7	MS. CATALDO: Hi, Judy Cataldo,
8	Bellmore. I'm just here to question. Why
9	won't you look at the constituents, what
10	we're asking for and redo the maps
11	according to what the Democratic
12	representative was speaking about. Like,
13	I don't understand why you just won't go
14	through the system and just explain to
15	us, maybe perhaps there's a different
16	perspective to look how you districted.
17	Do you get to answer or is it like a non
18	option?
19	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: You
20	have you have three minutes.
21	MS. CATALDO: That's okay. I just
22	want an answer. I'll use my time for you.
23	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: As I
24	indicated before, the number of changes
25	that were made with the input of the

2	Minority and with residents, that we had
3	made to the current map. So we have made
4	a large number of changes to our map, the
5	one that's being proposed today, based on
6	community input, based on the comments of
7	Legislators.
8	MS. CATALDO: So what if I'm
9	interpreting what you're saying, which
10	I'm thankful that you're responding, is
11	that you made certain provisions, but
12	you're not making total provisions and
13	taking total consideration of what the
14	impact of the area is?
15	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: We've
16	taken consideration of everything that's
17	been said and every proposal and every
18	suggestion, but we were unable to
19	accomplish every one of those
20	suggestions.
21	MS. CATALDO: Well, okay. Thank you
22	for your time. I totally don't agree, and
23	I think everybody else won't agree with
24	that, too. Correct? Can we hear a loud,
25	yes?

3	responds.)

5	right, Mr. Cataldo. Thank you. Ellen
6	Smiley.
7	MS. SMILEY: I'm here to protest the
8	map that was adopted by the Town of
9	Hempstead Board and the changes that have
10	come since that meeting. It breaks apart
11	communities and significantly dilutes
12	minority votes. Minorities now make up
13	47% of the population of Nassau. Yet,
14	that significant percentage of the
15	population, nearly half, has only one
16	representative district in Nassau, that
17	being Hempstead, which has now been
18	broken into two districts. This is, in
19	essence, voter disenfranchisement at its
20	worst. It's a terrible black stain on
21	the reputation of Nassau County that must
22	be rectified to ensure proper
23	representation for a large segment of our
24	population.
25	We must ensure that there are five

3	full representation of nearly half of our
4	population. This map that has been
5	approved by the Town of Hempstead Board
6	doesn't do that and it's disgraceful. We
7	must do better for our residents. Thank

11	MS. COADS: Good afternoon,
12	everyone. I have a request. I want to
13	turn this microphone around, if that's
14	okay. I want to speak to the audience.

16	is your opportunity to speak to us, not
17	the audience. So please direct the
18	comments this way.
19	MS. COADS: Well, I thought I would
20	ask first.
21	Before I begin, let me just thank
22	legislator Kevin Abrahams, our Minority
23	Leader; Siela Bynoe, our legislator;
24	Carrie A. Solags, our legislator; and all
25	who are on the progressive side, thank

3	fighting for us. Kevan, I don't have
4	Legislator Abrahams forgive me if I
5	say Kevan, because I know you for so long
6	I thank you for being very explicit in
7	your explanation about how they misused
8	and abused their decision to crack and
9	pack our communities. I'm so upset about
10	what's going on in Lakeview that I don't
11	know how to describe the feelings that I
12	have. What I'm going to try to be as
13	diplomatic as possible.
14	This is my ninth time coming before
15	you, this Body asking you to be fair and
16	equitable in your decision in drawing
17	maps. The person who stood in front of us
18	last week or the week before, whatever
19	day you fumbled through things, it's a
20	disgrace that we had to hear all of how
21	he came to a conclusion of moving
22	Lakeview, cracking Lakeview, cracking
23	District Two. How did he come to that
24	conclusion? It's beyond me.
25	I'm not going to cry here because
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[NCL HEARING 02.27.23

2	I'm a big lady. I've cried at home. My
3	district that's been in play has been in
4	existence for 43 years. It took 2023 for
5	this body on the conservative side to
6	decide that we should not have a voice
7	anymore.
8	On August 31st, your very first
9	redistricting hearing, I, along with many
10	other Nassau County residents, stood
11	before you and passionately requested
12	that you keep our districts together. We
13	Lakeview residents, and other
14	organizations, and Nassau residents were
15	here from the beginning with the same
16	request. And here we are at the end of
17	the hearings, making the same requests,
18	pleading with you to keep us together.
19	This time, the majority legislators
20	have put Lakeview in the worst electoral
21	position since 1980, 43 years ago.
22	What is this redistricting? The
23	reason I asked if I could talk to the
24	audience. Many people know what
25	redistricting is about, but many don't.

2	I'll say it anyway. So they can hear me,
3	I'll speak loud. Redistricting is the
4	process by which states and the
5	jurisdictions within them, redraw the
6	lines that encompasses electoral
7	districts. These districts are
8	geographical areas from which political
9	representatives many of you sitting
10	there might understand what I'm saying
11	are elected on local, regional, state and
12	federal levels. The residents of each
13	electoral district vote for who will
14	govern them and represent them in the US
15	House of Representatives, State
16	Legislature, county commission, city
17	councils, school boards and more.
18	According to the US Constitution, all
19	electoral districts within a given
20	redistricting map must contain
21	approximately the same number of people.
22	That's the starting of redistricting.
23	When it comes to redistricting, the
24	map drawing, there are three things
25	residents must be aware of in the map

2	drawing process: One, Cracking.
3	Fragments of minority population
4	disperses them among other districts to
5	ensure that all districts are white.
6	Perfect example is Lakeview. Lakeview was
7	cracked by being put in four conservative
8	districts where we have no common
9	interest, whatsoever. None. Yes, we have
10	a school district with Malverne,
11	Lynbrook, Lakeview, but school district
12	has nothing to do with fair drawing of
13	lines.
14	Stacking is number two. Stacking
15	combines large minority population with
16	great number of white voters in order to
17	ensure districts are majority white.
18	Packing. Packing concentrates as
19	many minorities as possible to minimize
20	the number of districts where the
21	majority are members of a majority. But
22	you all who did the maps know this
23	already. You really don't care. We, the
24	voters are supposed to choose candidates.
25	But when lawmakers draw districts line to

2	entrench one party, one political power,
3	some votes count more than others. We
4	want to have individuals elected already
5	in place with the fight to protect our
6	community.
7	I'm first to tell you, it's not
8	about the individuals who sit there
9	facing me. We happen to luck out in our
10	district. In District Two, we got a
11	fantastic elected official, in District
12	One and in District Three. Let me say,
13	however, maps should be drawn with
14	community cohesion in mind and not
15	division. You've divided us, and that's
16	not what you're supposed to do. Lines
17	should not be drawn that divides
18	communities of interests, which creates
19	difficulty to find representatives to
20	champion their cause and advocate for
21	them.
22	Yes, I'm supposed to speak to you,
23	but I hope everybody is listening.
24	Lakeview brings to the four districts
25	about six plus thousand votes. One of the

2	four districts got 20,000. How are we
3	supposed to ever elect anybody with
4	common interests if you keep this map
5	with Lakeview being where you have put
6	us? My request tonight is, however, that
7	the maps should be redrawn for Lakeview,
8	Freeport, Hempstead.
9	Legislator Kevan, I say again. I
10	take my hat off to you. I don't have to
11	speak any of the numbers because you
12	spoke them already and you step right up
13	to the plate. We realize also that our
14	minority communities are generally the
15	ones that must always fight for services
16	that many times are automatically given
17	with ease to other communities, such as
18	repairing roads and many entitlements of
19	federal, state and local services.
20	Let me go to gerrymandering that you
21	have done to Lakeview. We all are
22	familiar with gerrymandering. Back in
23	2013, I made a passionate plea on behalf
24	of the NAACP to our brothers and sisters
25	across the state of New York to join with

2	us and to support us as we continue to
3	fight against gerrymandered district maps
4	that were designed by Nassau County
5	Majority Party for the Nassau County

8	accommodate the gerrymandering effort and
9	control and power electorally. You have
10	taken a community that has been in place
11	for 43 years. I repeat, yes, 43 years.
12	And turning it upside down all in the
13	name of power. You that hungry for power
14	that you would destroy my entire
15	community, that we have no voting power?
16	None. None. We are conscientious voters
17	in Lakeview that have managed to choose
18	our representatives well, and we did. Now
19	you're taking the opportunity to select
20	our representatives that will not fight
21	for our issues.
22	I did an analysis. There are four
23	great election districts in Lakeview.
24	There's six altogether. But the four I'm
25	referring to, I can tell you the numbers

2	because I did the analysis. Blank voters,
3	39.5%; conservative voters, 85.71%;
4	Democrats, the true active voters:
5	2,502, 2,307 that voted in 2022. We had
6	a total vote. The republicans had 304
7	votes. Tell me why you put me, why you
8	put us, with four conservative districts.
9	Because you need our votes, but you're
10	not giving us a fair chance at the
11	representatives we want.
12	Yeah, I'm upset. I came to Long
13	Island in '78, worked my butt off to grow
14	the district. We all did. I don't like to
15	use I or me. We all worked hard to make
16	our community strong. Then you take it
17	away from us and throw it away where we
18	don't have any votes at all.
19	I learned from whence I came from
20	the deep south. Got on a train. And years
21	ago when I was a kid, scared to death of
22	being accused of anything, we could not
23	stop anywhere to eat. Anybody who
24	traveled from the south travel with fried
25	chicken in a shoe box. Yes, we worked
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]	NCL HEARING 02.27.23

2	our way through buroughs. Now, fast
3	forward to '78, coming to Long Island up
4	South. Did I know I would end up up
5	south? This is definitely what we're
6	dealing with. North Carolina can do
7	better with redistricting than we're
8	doing in Nassau County. It's a doggone
9	shame.
10	We are sick. We are tired. We are
11	tired of fighting for everything that we
12	ever gain. And then you come along in
13	2023 and you take it away just like that
14	with the flick of the pen. I asked you
15	before, can you do something about
16	putting Lakeview back in District Two? It
17	can be done. Lakeview could have been the
18	fifth Minority/Majority district. But
19	instead, you took it away.
20	I guess I'm not going to have the
21	opportunity to speak to you again, but I
22	hope and pray that I don't have to worry
23	about the mere fact that this girl that
24	came from Charleston, South Carolina,
25	came to Nassau County to be mistreated

2	by. Some colleagues that I was at the
3	town board together with. And I remember
4	inviting you in 2013 to come to Kennedy
5	Park as I went from one community to the
6	next to explain to my community what
7	redistricting was all about. And then you
8	said to me, Majority Leader, see,
9	Scottie, I promised you I would come and
10	I came. This is the same Scottie that
11	invited you to come. And I know the party
12	persuasion was different, but what we do
13	is the right thing for our community and
14	for our people.
15	Please, do what you can to make me
16	gain some kind of confidence back in
17	Nassau County. Oh, yes. My folks over
18	here have done their thing. I appreciate
19	Kevan, Siela, Carrie A., and all of the
20	others. I'm just only talking about the
21	minority district right now and that you
22	have torn apart. You've torn Kevan
23	Abrahams' district apart. You put some of
24	it back together for Siela and some of it
25	back for Carrie A, but you left us

3	for anybody that can support us and
4	represent us.
5	I thank you for listening and I

11	to desecrate. And I'm talking about the
12	US Capitol.
13	I stand today on a structure that my
14	ancestors directly laid the concrete, the
15	foundation for. And I stand here today in
16	2023, 102 years since burning of black
17	business communities. The desecration of
18	the people who gave their very lives,
19	including one million who served in World
20	War II for what they felt was a double
21	victory, not just victory in Europe and
22	Japan, but victory in America. It wasn't
23	until 1948 after World War II was over
24	that blacks that the desegregation of
25	the armed forces. So needless to say, my

2	ancestors have more than a notion in
3	terms of how they have been disrespected
4	and disenfranchised.
5	But I stand here today to speak for
6	them and for the other voices of the men
7	and women of my community. I recently saw
8	a documentary that said from "Swastika to
9	Jim Crow" that spoke to the relationships
10	between the black and Jewish communities,
11	particularly during World War II, and
12	United Front when you had white
13	conservatives that were discriminating
14	against blacks and Jews, the coalitions
15	that were formed, the Freedom Riders who
16	couldn't travel. As Scottie Coads said,
17	they had to bring their chicken and their
18	bread in a shoebox. They could not use
19	public facilities.
20	And I stand here today in the midst
21	of a disenfranchised process, in the
22	midst of a country where you have state
23	leaders that are trying to say racism
24	doesn't exist, diversity is not
25	necessary, and we are all in a

2	post-racial society. The lies. The lies.
3	The lies.
4	I recognize Legislator Drucker's
5	impassioned speech considering the line
6	was drawn straight down his block, and he
7	had to cross the street to get in his own
8	district, and the residents of the now
9	reunited Plainview and Old Bethpage, I
10	recognize that. What I don't recognize is
11	the number of residents who stood before
12	you or stood before a Commission that at
13	one point the Republican Delegation left
14	the room, the stenographer refused to
15	record, and taxpayers braved the rain to
16	speak their issues, but Malverne's
17	voices, Lakeview's voices were not heard.
18	It's not addressed in this well
19	impassioned, one sided commentary. Where
20	is that? Where is the justice for that?
21	There's recognition of a district
22	that was formed or kept whole because of
23	the views of the Orthodox Jewish
24	community. I recognize that. They wanted
25	to be kept whole. They wanted to have

2	their common interests recognized and
3	supported. I'm fine with that. There was
4	a question that was asked of this Body
5	that was not answered. Because a number
6	of representatives on this side spoke to
7	the possibility of them not being seated
8	there come the next election with this

10	and said, yes, my position is
11	compromised. That is telling to me.
12	The two primary villages,
13	Incorporated Villages of Hempstead, is
14	still split. The accommodation is, well,
15	it was three, now we made it two. They
16	wanted one. There were four residents
17	that spoke about Plainview and Old
18	Bethpage. Four. There are anywhere from
19	30 to 40 to 50 residents from Malverne
20	and Lakeview. Where was their voice
21	heard? Because it will not be heard in
22	the election polls. It will not be heard
23	in the distribution of state and federal
24	funding. Why is that? Who is going to
25	speak for us. There are counties in
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[NCL HEARING 02.27.23
1	
2	upstate New York that have maybe less
3	than 500,000 residents and they have
4	upwards of 40 districts. If the census
5	requires that, we are entitled to up to
6	five Majority/Minority districts, then we
7	need more than 19. We need to have our
8	voices heard. We need to have our votes
9	count.
10	It's interesting that the County
11	Executive can show up in Garden City for
12	no casino meeting, but refuse to show up
13	in Uniondale despite many requests to
14	come. That is telling to me.
15	My last statement. We know that
16	these maps, as was poignantly stated by
17	the Minority Leader, are illegal on its
18	face. We know the Town of Hempstead maps
19	are illegal. I commend you, Presiding
20	Officer, for at least making some changes
21	because the Supervisor gave us no
22	courtesy and no respect. These maps, the
23	work is not done. We will wait because
24	it's in violation. They do reinforce
25	racial stereotypes. They do undermine a

3	must overcome. Thank you (applause).

6	Let the record reflect that
7	Legislator Kennedy is in the room.
8	MR. MEJIAS: Thank you, Presiding
9	Officer, for having me and letting me
10	speak. This has been a very vigorous
11	process. The Democrats and the Temporary
12	District Advisory Commission have done
13	everything we possibly could to be as
14	transparent as possible with everything
15	that TDAC has done. Our delegation
16	provided comprehensive reports from two
17	nonpartisan experts, including four from
18	demographer and racially polarized voting
19	expert, Megan Gall. She testified at the
20	TDAC Committee meeting. We provided five
21	reports from our political science
22	expert, Dr. Daniel Magleby, who we made
23	available to testify twice and openly
24	responded to any questions put forth. All
25	reports were put on the record and made
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1	NCL HEARING 02.27.23
1	
2	publicly available well in advance of any
3	hearing. This is starkly different than
4	the accessibility that the public and the
5	Legislature themselves had to the reports
6	submitted by Mr. Trende. I believe there
7	was one submitted today just before this
8	hearing started from your attorney. We
9	tried to do everything we can to make
10	sure the public knew what was going on
11	here, because that's the most important
12	thing in government, is to be open and
13	transparent.
14	The Democratic Delegation of TDAC,
15	used a separate Google drive that
16	included all information, data, maps,
17	reports, proposed resolutions, etcetera,
18	as the majority of the information
19	generated during the TDAC Commission
20	hearings was not made available on the
21	Nassau County website. We had hundreds of
22	members of the community come down to
23	speak about the importance of the maps
24	and their representation in this Body for
25	the next ten years.

2	The Majority in the Legislature has
3	refused to produce their voting rights
4	analysis, including the RPV analysis of
5	Mr. Trende. Dr. Daniel Magleby submitted
6	a rebuttal analysis to the Trende Report,
7	and we did so well in advance, proving
8	that Mr. Trende used the incorrect
9	elections to analyze partisan
10	gerrymander, and, therefore, his
11	conclusions are wrong. He uses what's
12	called a gerrymandering index referred to
13	in this Troutman Pepper Report as being
14	the measure used by the Court of Appeals
15	in Harkenrider. There is no reference to
16	gerrymandering index in the Harkenrider
17	Report. In fact, the court endorses the
18	very ensemble analysis that Dr. Magleby
19	used. Dr. Magleby analyzed all proposals
20	and concluded that this map is an extreme
21	partisan gerrymander and used the same
22	exact analysis that was used in the
23	Harkenrider case. Mr. Trende drew his
24	analysis without regard to race,
25	according to this report, which is a
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	NCL HEARING 02.27.23

2	clear violation of the Voting Rights Act
3	and the New York State Voting Rights Act.
4	Therefore, the entire analysis used for
5	this map is invalid. The Court in
6	Harkenrider, clearly endorsed the
7	ensemble analysis used by Dr. Magleby. We
8	don't know which elections we use to
9	calculate this gerrymandering index.
10	On Page 14 of this analysis of the
11	report today, we have this graph .1, .13,
12	.17. No one says, specifically, exactly,
13	what that means. What does that mean?
14	What do these measures mean on this map?
15	Dr. Megan Gall confirmed the presence of
16	Racially Polarized Voting, or RPV, in
17	Nassau and compliance with Section 2 of
18	the Federal Voting Rights Act and the New
19	York Voting Rights Act demands the
20	creation of five Majority/Minority
21	legislative districts and failing to
22	create five such districts, the
23	Majority's map does not comply with
24	Section 2 and the New York Voting Rights
25	Act's prohibitions on racial vote

2	dilution.
3	The cases that are cited and the
4	Troutman Pepper report failed to tell you
5	that it is a compelling government
6	interest to comply with the Federal
7	Voting Rights Act, which would require
8	five Majority/Minority districts. That is
9	a compelling government interest.
10	Troutman's own report says absent the
11	compelling government interest. That's
12	already been ruled to be a compelling
13	government interest. This map will not
14	hold up in court.
15	Additionally, Dr. Gall concluded
16	that it is possible to create an Asian
17	influence district with an Asian voting
18	age population above 40%. And she notes
19	in her report that the current map is an
20	egregious retrogression resulting in
21	dilution of the Asian vote. And just
22	yesterday there was a lawsuit filed by
23	the Asian American Defense Fund in New
24	York City because that map did the exact
25	same thing that this map does.

2	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Dave,
3	could you sum up? We've actually made
4	those reports part of the record, the
5	full reports.
6	MR. MEJIAS: While are on notice
7	that there should be five
8	Majority/Minority districts and Asian
9	influence districts, and the fact that
10	this map fails to comply with the Voting
11	Rights Act in regard to Majority/Minority
12	districts and an Asian influence
13	district, where in North Hempstead we see
14	an Asian American community split into
15	three different ways, an illegal map such
16	as this will not hold up in court, will
17	result in wasting millions of taxpayer
18	dollars on lawsuits that the County is
19	all but certain to lose. And we saw this
20	exact thing happen in Islip, where they
21	spent millions of dollars on defending a
22	lawsuit and paying the prevailing party
23	and in the Town of East Ramapo as well.
24	So I thank you for extra time, Presiding
25	Officer. I think this process is not over

2	yet. Somebody, anybody, could file a
3	lawsuit on this current map. And,
4	unfortunately, this it's a very simple
5	solution. This is something that's very
6	easy to do. But at the end of the day,
7	the Federal Voting Rights Act prevails,
8	and it's there for a reason. And this
9	this map fails and there's a compelling
10	government interest for this Body to
11	correct the errors in the current map.
12	Thank you. Thank you, all.
13	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Presiding
14	Officer, before you before you call the
15	next speaker, I think Chairman Mejias
16	brought up a point that I failed to
17	neglect and it was a very pointed
18	question to the Majority, which I think
19	deserves a response to the public, at
20	least, in terms of the metric that Mr.
21	Trende used. I just want to make sure we
22	establish for the record the metric that
23	he used when he developed his analysis.
24	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: We
25	have submitted for the record a complete

2	report from Troutman Pepper, which
3	explains in detail exactly what was done.
4	So beyond that, we're not going to
5	comment.
6	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I understand
7	that the report has been submitted and I
8	get that. From what I understand from Mr.
9	Tseytlin, he indicated that yourself and
10	him put together the map. So I think it
11	would be very clear to understand that
12	when you were with Mr. Tseytlin putting
13	together the map, that it was with the
14	direction of Mr. Trende's report. So, Mr.
15	Trende's report, if I can understand it
16	correctly, the metric that's being
17	utilized is very important to be
18	established in the record, which I would
19	think yourself and Mr. Tseytlin would
20	have knowledge of, because you built the
21	map, at least, according to Mr. Tseytlin.
22	He indicated that you guys put together
23	the map together.
24	So that being said, I would like to
25	demonstrate just for the record and for

11	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
12	Regardless, that report speaks for
13	itself. We're not going to go into any
14	further detail with respect to that. So
15	I'm going to continue to call residents
16	to come speak.

18	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: As Mr.
19	Thompson comes to the podium, this is the
20	problem with the process. It's done with
21	secrecy. It's done in dark. When you try
22	to bring things to light, then you don't
23	get it. My colleagues, unfortunately,
24	this process I'm sorry to take away
25	from your time this process,

3	the opportunity to choose their
4	candidates and also to choose who elects

10	in. But thank you. I apologize for taking
11	over here before.

13	your time starts, Mr. Thomas, I would
14	point out that the City University of New
15	York looked at the proposed map and found
16	that 15 of the 19 districts had Democrat
17	enrollment majorities. So I'm not sure
18	what it is the Minority wants, but
19	perhaps they're unhappy that you have a
20	map that's going to create fair fight
21	districts throughout this county, and
22	what they really want is a gerrymandered
23	map. So that's the only thing I can
24	conclude. If you if you have 15 districts
25	out of 19 that have an enrollment edge

3	that, then it speaks to the motivations

17	why this thing is being done in a fashion

23	give it to people right there. I asked a
24	very pointed question about the metric,
25	we don't get we get a stalwart answer.

3	enrollment. They know that. And their own
4	expert indicated that. This is based off

10	the guy. More respect to you. So from
11	that standpoint, you vote the way you
12	want to vote. You vote Independent, you
13	vote for whoever. You may be a Blank,
14	somebody that's not registered to any
15	particular party, and you may vote the
16	way you want to vote. And that's why it's
17	based on performance. And they know that.
18	But they're going to try to cloud things.
19	They're going to bring up City of New
20	York, they're going to bring up all these
21	entities that try to validate what they
22	put forward. Unfortunately, the biggest
23	validation is, you had an opportunity to
24	ask Mr. Trende to be here today. He's not
25	here. You had an opportunity to ask Mr.

3	to try to discredit Dr. Magleby, you
4	could do it in one stroke of a computer

8	Troutman Pepper Report, they ran his
9	numbers and indicated that his numbers
10	are as skewed as can be.

13	have an honest discussion?
14	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Yeah,
15	we can.
16	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: They ran his
17	numbers
18	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: But
19	you're not being honest.
20	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: No, Rich.
21	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: You're
22	not being honest. We know where you're
23	going.
24	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I'm not going
25	anywhere.

3	when we started this process back at the
4	time of the first hearing, one of the
5	first comments was made by one of the
6	Democratic commissioners, "this is going
7	to a lawsuit". So you're trying to

10	said that.

12	that will support your claim that all the

13	they're going to keep trying to defend
14	what they did. The bottom line is you see

20	page, is that Mr. Trende's analysis uses

9	said it best, you heard from 40, 50 some
10	odd people from Lakeview. I think
11	Lakeview probably came down here more
12	than any other community in Nassau, and
13	you didn't incorporate one single of
14	their changes. I've advocated for
15	Freeport. An area that vote is being
16	diluted. I don't see any changes
17	incorporated to Freeport. I know you're
18	going to I know what you're going to say.

10	ultimately, we have that opportunity:
11	Present the analysis. If Mr. Trende's

16	they won't ask Mr. Trende to do that.
17	Well, I wouldn't vote for that map.

21	Mr. Trende to do that.

23	did. He did.
24	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: No, he did
25	not.

it's not based off a measurement

public and don't I want to hear from

now you want to hear them. Folks they

10	was a complete and utter gerrymander. It
11	performed so poorly that it was so far to
12	the right of the scale where it should be
13	that it was obviously a gerrymander. So
14	don't make any mistake here that they

16	ensemble approach. I know you had
17	indicated that you asked Mr. Trende to
18	change the measurement to reflect county
19	elected years, but I don't see that in
20	the report. Can you identify that by

15	LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Yet the report
16	that you and your caucus rely upon, on
17	Page Two, it states that the proposed

21	stated again, you stated a portion. This
22	report states significant. I refer to the
23	map and it is not a significant portion
24	of Mill Brook. There are constituents in
25	Mill Brook that call our office

4	and I would not be able to do so as a

9	evident.

11	I think it's event as well, with respect
12	to your position. But that's all right.
13	Go ahead.
14	MS. JORDAN: Good afternoon. I first
15	want to thank Minority Leader, Legislator
16	Abrahams for opening remarks and for
17	always fighting for Freeport. Thank you.
18	My name is Maria Jordan Wallem and I
19	am a resident of Freeport. I attended all
20	of the hearings and made my voice heard
21	about what we wanted to see in this map.
22	I also submitted this via e-mail, just in
23	case.
24	I cannot, for the life of me
25	understand how the Republican Majority,
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	NCL HEARING 02.27.23
1	
2	along with its experts, could even make
3	up this fantasy that Freeport has
4	anything of interest besides the same
5	line on the Long Island Railroad with
6	Merrick and North Bellmore. I don't care
7	how broad anyone wants to define
8	community of interest. Everything the
9	Majority's attorney pointed to in the
10	previous hearing that we have with these
11	communities are purely transactional in
12	nature and regarding government
13	operations. And, by the way, Freeport
14	does not share schools with any of these
15	communities like you state in your little
16	paragraph on District Five.
17	The communities you want to group us
18	with are the same ones who, in the summer
19	of 2020, when residents, mostly black and
20	brown, took to the streets to protest the
21	murder of George Floyd, we were told by
22	Merrick and Belmore residents to go back
23	where we came from. Go back to Freeport.
24	When the State was trying to give
25	Freeport Armory to a youth group run by

2	African Americans, Merrick residents said
3	they didn't want those kids to cross the
4	bridge and enter into their area. When
5	many don't even feel safe going into, or
6	walking the streets of these communities,
7	you are here telling us that we are to be
8	considered a community of interest.
9	When Freeport is already glaringly
10	segregate between north and south, what
11	the Republican Majority has done with
12	this latest map is basically erase us
13	from the political conversation in Nassau
14	County by aggressively diluting our vote
15	for the next decade. Thank you.
16	And just a quick question. Will we
17	be allowed to speak again at 6:30 p.m.?
18	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: No.
19	That'll be a vote on the maps. Actually,
20	there is a public comment portion before
21	the meeting starts and then once the
22	meeting starts and we engage in various
23	items, including the item on the map,
24	there's no public comment at that point.

8	what time it is. I've been at 12 meetings
9	the last two weeks.
10	Good afternoon. So I was sitting
11	there and I was just going in my phone
12	looking at a few synonyms for
13	gerrymandering: Trickery, treachery,
14	crookedness. My question is: Why would
15	Nassau County in 2023 want to be
16	associated with these terrible words?
17	Although I am pleased that Uniondale
18	was kept whole on the Nassau County map,
19	I definitely feel the pain and
20	disappointment of my fellow
21	Majority/Minority communities. Because
22	the struggle is real for all minority
23	communities.
24	Scottie, I just want to turn to you
25	and say, thank you, Scottie. That's why I

2	call you the queen. Scottie Coads taught
3	me everything I know about redistricting,
4	gerrymandering, disenfranchisement. Many,
5	many years ago, I went to a class that
6	she gave, and she gave it her all. And I
7	called her, and she's just such a giving,
8	nurturing and educating person. Thank you
9	so much, Scottie. I stand with you for
10	Lakeview.
11	I have something even though this
12	is bad enough, I'm happy that Uniondale
13	remain whole on this map and I wish my
14	other minority communities would be
15	recognized and have the changes they want
16	for their communities but I have
17	something even worse. Because the Town of
18	Hempstead map is an abomination. And I
19	want to put this on public record, I am
20	disappointed, but not surprised that Ms.
21	Goosby, who I can no longer call
22	councilwoman, voted with the Majority to
23	cut off Uniondale, north of Hempstead
24	Turnpike. The only minority councilperson
25	on the Town of Hempstead board votes

3	result will result in further
4	marginalization and disenfranchisement
5	for Uniondale. Like I said, I am
6	disappointed, but not surprised. I don't

11	patterns and all of that. And I just have
12	to say that I noticed that the day after
13	Super Bowl Sunday, they were doing a
14	traffic study on Hempstead Turnpike, the

16	consistently a light traffic day. And I
17	would say, I would just assume that they
18	were doing that traffic study for the
19	coliseum, the proposed coliseum over
20	there, and they probably pick, oh, well,
21	we'll do I don't know they could have

23	Bowl Sunday. But I know I saw it the day
24	after Super Bowl Sunday, one of the
25	lightest travel days in the year. It's an

3	they're doing it for, I'm sure, for that
4	proposed casino. Which I made it clear
5	and I'm still making it clear, I don't
6	want. The vast majority of residents, no

8	the stakeholders, I'm not talking about
9	the millennials. I'm talking about the
10	people who own their homes, pay high
11	taxes and have vested interests in
12	Uniondale, we do not want a casino in
13	Uniondale. Thank you.
14	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
15	Jonathan Ortiz.
16	MR. ORTIZ: Good afternoon,
17	Presiding Officer, Minority Leader and
18	legislators. My name is Jonathan Ortiz. I
19	am in the seventh grade. Today I come
20	before you to share my concerns and
21	thoughts about the redistricting and how
22	it will impact my community; Lakeview.
23	Over the past few years, I've had
24	the pleasure of participating in events
25	in which our local elected officials have

2	sponsored and attended. My parents have
3	always talked about voting and the
4	importance of voting. In fact, every
5	Election Day, my parents make sure we go
6	to vote as a family. They have shared
7	with me that my great grandparents have
8	not always had the right to vote, and now
9	we are able to vote and actively
10	participate in the election process, we
11	should do so.
12	My mother shared with me that our
13	community is in jeopardy of losing our
14	representatives that we have had almost
15	my entire life, and it does make me feel
16	sad. When I may not fully understand why
17	these maps have to be redrawn every ten
18	years, I do understand the importance of
19	being able to select the representative
20	you want to represent our community.
21	Today, while I am not old enough to
22	vote, one day I will be able to do so.
23	God willing, I will go with my parents to
24	the election polling site, as we do every
25	year to cast my first ballot. My hope is

2	that when I turn 18 and can select a
3	candidate, a candidate who will advocate
4	for my community and engage with us just
5	as we have been afforded by our current
6	elected officials. I hope that when I
7	turn 18 in just a few short years, that I
8	will be able to elect a candidate within
9	a district that shares similar values. I
10	hope that as I enter an election booth, I
11	will be able to select a candidate for
12	Lakeview that desires to maintain a
13	presence within our community. These
14	desires can become a reality if Lakeview
15	is placed in a district with other
16	communities that share similar values.
17	This reality can be achieved if we are
18	placed in a district that does not dilute
19	our vote. And this can be achieved if our
20	community remains whole.
21	So today I ask you to only vote for
22	a map that will make it possible for
23	myself and my peers to look forward to a
24	day that we are able to vote in favor of
25	representatives like ones I have been

2	fortunate to have as long as I can
3	remember, and reject any map that dilutes
4	my community's ability to participate in
5	the process that my great grandparents
6	were unable to participate in when they
7	turned 18. Thank you (applause).

9	you, Jonathan.
10	Doris Hicks.
11	MS. HICKS-NEWKIRK: Good afternoon.
12	I am Doris Hicks-Newkirk. This is my
13	third time appearing before you. I asked
14	the question and before I begin,
15	Jonathan, thank you. I've known Jonathan
16	since a baby. That's a strong young man.
17	He lives around the corner from me. And
18	you're going to hear from him later in
19	years. He knows what he's talking about.
20	He's at meetings and he enjoys what we do
21	in our community of Lakeview. He's there.
22	He knows.
23	I have a question for you. As a
24	resident of Lakeview for 37 years, I
25	stand before you knowing that so many

2	people came here how many times? I know
3	this is my third time. Have you not heard
4	us? What does it take for you to
5	understand who we are as the Lakeview
6	community? I just don't understand it.
7	What does it take? We're not asking you
8	for money. We're asking you for
9	representation so that we are equally
10	represented.
11	You say that we have commonality
12	with the Malverne School District. Let me
13	just remind you, I worked for that
14	district for 15 years as a regular
15	teacher. After retiring from Verizon for
16	30. I went there after 30 years of
17	Verizon, and went there and taught for
18	15, and then they call me back to sub for
19	four until COVID hit.
20	The Malverne residents, let me
21	school you in on this, they don't use our
22	school, their school district. It may say
23	Malverne, but you know who uses it?
24	Lakeview. Go back and look at your stats.
25	How many people from Malverne go to the
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	NCL HEARING 02.27.23

2	Malverne School district? Check it. Do
3	your homework. We don't have commonality
4	with them. We were forced over there
5	because we didn't have any. You need to
6	really understand there's no commonality
7	there. Not with Lynbrook. Stephanie Chase
8	told you that a week ago. As she
9	delivered mail, they called her out the N
10	name, but yet you're putting us over here
11	with these people that don't care. Where
12	my kids went to the store to get pizza
13	and they say, Ns, we don't serve you. Why
14	aren't you hearing us? What does it take?
15	When you have your recess, you need
16	to go back and look at that map again.
17	I'm asking you to. I'm not telling you
18	to. I'm asking you, as we have done all
19	along. We have nothing in common with
20	these people that you have put us with,
21	even the new one. And may I say, I know
22	my time is just about up and I'm not
23	going over, but may I say thank you to
24	the legislators that have supported us
25	all these years. Jonathan is right. We

2	see the people there. They come to our
3	events. They support us. You don't want
4	that? You don't want a happy community
5	with a minority population? I know you
6	don't want an unhappy community in a
7	minority population. Be careful. I'm not
8	threatening you. But I'm telling you, my
9	people will not stand for this forever.
10	Thank you.
11	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Lisa
12	Ortiz.
13	MS. ORTIZ: Good afternoon,
14	everyone.
15	I, like many other Lakeview
16	residents, have been here for several
17	meetings. We were here throughout the
18	TDAC process, and we voiced our thoughts
19	and our concerns and our requests and our
20	desires. And here we are today at the
21	final hearing on redistricting in the
22	Legislative Body.
23	The last time I was here, myself and
24	several other residents from the hamlet
25	of Lakeview came out and we asked if it

2	was possible to place us in the closest
3	Minority/Majority district. And today we
4	come back and the lines have been
5	redrawn, the maps have been redrawn, but
6	not in favor of Lakeview. Today, we're
7	now finding out that East Rockaway,
8	Lynbrook, North Lynbrook, Malverne, West
9	Hempstead, portions of Valley Stream,
10	North Valley Stream and now portions of
11	Oceanside have been included in this new
12	proposed 14th District, and then you have
13	Little Lakeview also included in that new
14	14th District. This is disheartening.
15	This is disturbing. This is every synonym
16	that you could think of to describe how
17	heartbreaking this is to our community.
18	As my son Jonathan mentioned, we
19	have had great representation within the
20	Second Legislative District. And while we
21	understand that the maps do have to
22	change every ten years, we also
23	understand that there are communities
24	that we share commonalities with that are
25	very close to Lakeview. There were other
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	NCL HEARING 02.27.23
1	
2	maps that were presented that show if you
3	put Lakeview with them, you would have an
4	additional Majority/Minority district.
5	Last time I was here, I listened to
6	some of my neighbors speak about their
7	experiences within the neighboring
8	communities. And while they were not
9	favorable, they were not pleasant, they
10	shouldn't have even been warranted
11	experiences that they've had to live
12	through. This is our reality,
13	unfortunately.
14	Our only request is that, well, two
15	requests, is that we be placed within a
16	district that we share commonalities
17	with. Not that you assume based on the
18	narratives that are presented: We share
19	a school district, we share a train line.
20	I mean, naturally there's not many train
21	lines in Nassau County. So if you're
22	adjacent to a one community, you're going
23	to share a train line with them. But
24	that's not a reason to say that we have
25	common interest. Our churches are not in

2	East Rockaway. Our churches are not in
3	Lynbrook. Our churches are not in West
4	Hempstead. Our churches are in Hempstead,
5	Westbury, our churches are in Baldwin.
6	Our churches are in other communities,

9	that we share common interests with.
10	Again, I'm going to ask for the I
11	don't know how many times this is do
12	not vote this map in. And I'm going to
13	ask that you reject it. And anyone who
14	votes for this, we will go ahead and be
15	sure to remember that. We'll take note of
16	that. And we're watching. And this next
17	generation of young voters, they're
18	coming up. And while they may not be able
19	to vote in this upcoming election,
20	they're coming, and they're going to
21	remember. Times are changing,
22	demographics are changing. They're
23	shifting. And we're asking at this moment
24	that you vote down any map that keeps
25	Lakeview in a diluted, disenfranchised,

2	cracked map that does not have our best
3	interests at heart. Thank you. And keep
4	us in District Two, if possible. Have a
5	good day.
6	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
7	you, Lisa.
8	Susan Kay.
9	MS. KAY: We've heard a lot about
10	change in Nassau County. I saw the
11	revolution nary change. I used to live in
12	North Valley Stream from 1956 to 2010.
13	When I was very young, the area was a
14	strictly white Jewish, Italian area.
15	Suddenly it changed. It became
16	multicultural, black, Hispanic, Indian,
17	Muslim. Three blocks away from where I
18	used to live there was a Muslim mosque.
19	That change brought a very strong change
20	in the Third Legislative District. For
21	years we had John Ciotti get re-elected.
22	Suddenly Carrie Solages got in, because
23	of change. Your maps that you have are so
24	gerrymandered. The Town of Hempstead in
25	this map, it is disgusting. We can get

2	red flag laws in New York State, but how
3	come we can't get a map that's cohesive
4	to what is going on with the population
5	and the Nassau County Legislature? These
6	maps should be voted down. It is
7	absolutely disgusting.
8	Gerrymandering hurts people and
9	elections. A good example was the last
10	year of the New York State Senate. We had
11	lost good people because the maps were
12	gerrymandered and we ended up with
13	garbage.
14	I suggest anybody who votes on these
15	maps, your next election, you will be
16	voted out of office. Thank you.

18	Johnson.
19	MS. JOHNSON: Good afternoon. This
20	is my first time here. I am a recently
21	retired New York City Department of
22	Education, public school principal,
23	grades seven through 12. My school was a
24	high performing school.
25	I feel confident in speaking to you.
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	NCL HEARING 02.27.23
1	
2	The population of my school did not look
3	like me, so I'm accustomed to speaking to
4	people whose experiences in life do not
5	do not look like mine, but with whom I
6	can establish some common ground. And
7	what I am concerned about is this: I've
8	heard speakers being cut off; I would
9	never be permitted to do that in my
10	school. I've heard that suggestions are
11	being dismissed; I could never do that in
12	my public school. I've heard it intimated
13	that we've spent enough time. What I do
14	know is that when people are not heard,
15	when they feel they're not valued, where
16	they feel that their viewpoints don't
17	count, don't matter, they become
18	dissatisfied. What I do know is that if
19	information is presented and decisions
20	are made, at least people can say, hey, I
21	don't like it, but I see how that was
22	done. But what I'm hearing is that it's
23	quite possible that everyone's not seeing
24	what's done. But I could be mistaken.
25	Because when people argue, fight back and
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1	NCL HEARING 02.27.23
1	
2	forth and talk over one another, I can't
3	hear what the individuals are saying. It
4	sounds to me like there may have been a
5	process that could be used for
6	redistricting that was not used. But then
7	I think I heard that maybe it was. But
8	the data didn't come up or present itself
9	in a way that another member wanted it to
10	look like. And I can't myself explore
11	what's being said because it's not made
12	available. Does that make any sense? And
13	that's disturbing to me.
14	Let me make a correction. There are
15	children in my school that look like me,
16	some of them, but the majority of them do
17	not, and somehow we were able to have a
18	good, cohesive school community but it
19	was because we made things transparent.
20	And my gut is telling me that's not
21	happening here, but I could be wrong. And
22	if I'm not wrong, please show me where I
23	can get that information, because I would
24	like to understand what's going on. I
25	hear what people are feeling, but I don't

2	see all the data. Does that make any
3	sense?
4	I'm also going to add that, I
5	believe they called her Miss Scott, when
6	my great aunt, who is now 96, when
7	driving her to the family reunion in
8	North Carolina, I had to take the piss
9	pot out of her bag because she was
10	accustomed to not being able to go to the
11	bathroom. So I had to argue with her
12	about the piss pot. And of course, she
13	put it in the trunk of my car. But at
14	least she didn't have to use it. So I
15	understand.
16	I also understand, I was shocked to
17	hear that people are being called the
18	N-word. I used to work at the Burger King
19	on Merrick Boulevard. And I recall coming
20	in one day and the youngsters, people
21	younger than myself, I was age 17, a
22	little younger than me, were upset
23	because black people weren't wanted at
24	the front counter during dinner hour. And
25	I said to my manager, who did not look
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1	NCL HEARING 02.27.23

2	like me, I said, wait a second, you
3	always have me at the front, no matter
4	what time of the day. And he said,
5	because you're different. I didn't know
6	how to take that, didn't feel so
7	comfortable. But that was over 40 years
8	ago. I'm 59. We shouldn't still be
9	experiencing that same thing. I'm 59. I
10	was 17 at the time. We shouldn't be
11	experiencing that same thing.
12	And one last point. Somehow my
13	parents raised me to believe that all the
14	black is beautiful and I should be proud.
15	It doesn't diminish the shine of anyone
16	else. But when we play the games, it then
17	makes us feel like you're diminishing.
18	Please answer me. Is that data
19	available that you spoke of? Because I
20	would like to see it. I don't know about
21	the argument. I don't know which way I'm
22	going to go, but I would like to see what
23	the discussion is about. It's not clear
24	to me because I don't see that data. Is
25	that available online or in a packet
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	NCL HEARING 02.27.23

2	here?
3	I lied, one more. Is there a rush to
4	make a decision? Because one thing I did
5	learn in order to have successful school
6	where they want me to come back as
7	principals, that I delayed stuff to the
8	chagrin of my superintendent and the
9	powers that be. I wanted to make certain
10	that my school community was all on board
11	to whatever it was. Even if they said, I
12	don't like it, but I get it. So I'm
13	recommending that if you are rushing to
14	have a vote at 6:30, that given the
15	discord and the discomfort that's in the
16	community, that maybe it be delayed, some
17	information made available and maybe a
18	vote take place a little later on; is
19	that possible?

19	Now, some of you have been very open
20	and transparent and others have continued
21	to allow their process to be shrouded in
22	secrecy. Must I remind you of the old
23	proverb adage that said, what's done in
24	the dark comes to the light. And when it
25	comes to the light, when it's exposed,

2	this community, this county will see that
3	these maps have been disproportionately
4	drawn to disenfranchise and to dilute not
5	just minority votes, but constituents
6	across the board.
7	What I'm asking you for because
8	truly, I'm losing faith in this process,
9	I've lost hope and the integrity of
10	people is to help restore citizens
11	trust in government. Part of what's wrong
12	with this country, why we're so divided
13	on topics with the left is fighting the
14	right and the right is fighting the left,
15	is because everybody's trying to get over
16	on somebody. And ultimately, many of us
17	just want a community where we live in
18	harmony. Where our streets remain safe.
19	And where are our voices and our opinions
20	can be heard. I believe you want to be
21	heard. But you don't want to hear when
22	folks disagree with you, which is
23	"politricks" and not politics. Politics
24	is about coming to the table of
25	negotiation and asking it, requesting and

2	showing your cards in your hands and not
3	try to fool by sleight of hand.
4	Before you all vote tonight, I urge
5	you to reflect on this process. Reflect
6	on all the materials you've received.
7	What you've shared, and may not have
8	shared with us as the public, reflect on
9	it and come to a decision. But before you
10	do that, take an opportunity, one last
11	opportunity, before 6:30 tonight to not
12	only listen to the community, but to work
13	amongst yourselves to make sure that
14	Nassau County is fairly represented.
15	As a pastor, I proclaim hope, peace,
16	unity, and love. That's what I believe
17	Nassau County wants to represent. Do me a
18	favor, because I'm watching, prove me
19	right. Please don't prove me wrong. We
20	beg of you. We implore. We humbly
21	request. Do the right thing. Do the right
22	thing.
23	And lastly, and I'm headed back to
24	my seat, we're coming to the closing
25	hours of Black History Month. And right
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	NCL HEARING 02.27.23

2	after the close of 11:59 p.m. on February
3	the 28th, we will enter into Women's
4	History Month. Let us remember, as one of
5	my sisters quoted so poetically from what
6	is one of the greatest songs I've ever
7	heard, Lift every Voice and Sing, let us
8	remember the blood, the sweat, the tears,
9	the lives that have been lost from
10	minority communities and women's rights
11	groups throughout time that have simply
12	asked for rights to vote and to elect
13	candidates that represented them and not
14	to have their voices diluted or ignored.
15	Have a wonderful day (applause).
16	PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.
17	Anyone else have a statement to make
18	among the legislators?
19	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I think. Wow,
20	this is really tough. I was listening to
21	I was just reflecting on the young man,
22	Jonathan Ortiz, that spoke earlier. And I
23	don't think I mean, this is my third
24	redistrict. I think I share that
25	responsibility and that task with maybe a

2	few people up here. And I don't think
3	I've ever seen a young man, 12 years old,
4	say the things that he said.
5	Understanding the magnitude and obviously
6	a lot of this is much larger and hard to
7	comprehend, but that's a great civic
8	action that he was a part of. And I just
9	want to reflect on that just for a
10	moment.
11	So this is what we have today. And I
12	already know what the Majority is going
13	to say. They're going to disagree with
14	everything I'm going to say, and that's
15	okay, because that's part of this
16	process. I mean, they're going to say
17	what they need to say and we'll say what
18	we need to say, and let the public decide
19	for themselves.
20	That being said, there are major
21	problems with the map that's being
22	proposed. This map has issues as it
23	pertains to dilution of minority votes.
24	This map violates federal voter rights
25	provisions. The John Lewis Provision, it

2	violates parts of the New York state
3	Constitution. The public has
4	demonstrated, I want to say on now
5	several occasions just this year that
6	they have requested that Lakeview and
7	Freeport be assimilated to
8	Minority/Majority districts.
9	We saw for periods of this map where
10	in some cases it could be argued I'm not
11	saying by me, but it could be argued that
12	this map disfavored candidates of this
13	Body and this Legislative Body. We've
14	seen in this map, again, a report that
15	was put together by Mr. Trende, the
16	expert of the Republican Majority.
17	Everyone asked for the report, and we all
18	we get is you can get a description on
19	Page 18 that summarizes his report.
20	When Mr. Trende was asked to do a
21	report before you go a few pages earlier,
22	Page 14, he did a very nice bar graph.
23	Where is the analysis based off of what
24	Dr. Magleby said in a bar graph? You're
25	not going to get it.

2	Then we asked for the polarized race
3	and voter information, the same
4	information we asked of Mr. Tseyltin, I
5	though we asked of Mr. Tseytlin. And Mr.
6	Tseytlin is not here today. Big surprise.
7	But not only is he not here, there's no
8	mention of it. And then again, folks,
9	you're going to be left in the darkness.
10	You're going to be left. There's things
11	done in secrecy. There's no transparency.
12	And then, luckily, I'm not being cut off
13	this time. Luckily, every single time
14	you're going to get cut off, you're going
15	to get shouted down. You're going to be
16	told that we did it. We did the analysis.
17	Trust us.
18	The bottom line is, I'm just going
19	to make this very clear, the way they can
20	make their map legal so that this could
21	be done in unanimous fashion is a couple
22	of different things. One, you have a
23	unique opportunity from the folks from
24	Lakeview, the folks that came from
25	Freeport, they have come here to include

2	in a Minority/Majority district, those
3	areas that are predominantly
4	Minority/Majority. They've made the
5	request. It's not that you should do it
6	because Lakeview is asking for it, even
7	though there are taxpayers and our
8	residents. You should do it because it

10	federal voter rights legislation.
11	Secondly, you've had the opportunity
12	to create five Minority/Majority
13	districts. We came close. They fell short
14	by one. Now, this is a provision, this is
15	not what Democrats are asking for,
16	because I know they would try to paint
17	this issue, that this is something the
18	Democrats want because they want a
19	gerrymandered map. No. This is written
20	into federal law. It's in the state
21	constitution. The John Lewis provision
22	indicates that when possible, which
23	Nassau County is possible, and Dr. Gall's
24	report, which if anyone would care to
25	read her memo, indicates that. I have it

2	right here for everybody in the public
3	that wants to see it. And, obviously, we
4	will provide it to anyone that wants to
5	read it because we have nothing to hide.
6	But Dr. Gall's report indicates that that

10	four. For whatever reason, Lakeview and
11	Freeport, if put together in a certain
12	way with other communities, could easily
13	be five. But why don't they want to do
14	that? Because they did the performance
15	analysis that Mr. Trende did, and their
16	analysis shows that they still have 12
17	seats and they're trying to protect to
18	make sure they keep 12 seats. That's the
19	politics behind all this. So if they want
20	to make sure they keep 12 seats, but
21	they've got to give one to a minority
22	majority district, who loses out? The
23	Minority/Majority district loses out
24	every single time for the sake of
25	preserving 12 seats in the Republican

3	clear as we can. That's what this is
4	about. So it has nothing to do with

9	it the way it is. They're going to ask
10	the question, well, how come the
11	community didn't get the data analysis
12	report that was done by Mr. Trende? And
13	how come it took 60 residents, 70
14	residents from the hamlet of Lakeview to
15	come down here and to explain once and
16	over again that they would like to be
17	placed in a Minority/Majority district,
18	and they're still not. And then we had
19	folks from Freeport do the same thing and
20	they're still not.
21	And then you have to explain, well,
22	why isn't there five Minority/Majority
23	districts? Did Mr. Trende do an analysis
24	based on that? Did Mr. Tseytlin from
25	Troutman Pepper do an analysis based on

3	over again, well, what information you
4	don't have, Democratic Minority? There's
5	a lot. I just went through a litany of
6	things. Now I know what the Presiding

10	have. But if we're telling you we're not,
11	and we can describe and delineate it case
12	by case and point by point, then let's
13	have a working session and figure it out.
14	Because obviously there must be some
15	disconnect, because all I can see on page
16	18 is that Mr. Trende references and
17	described his report. I don't see a
18	report here. I don't see an analysis that
19	is very similar to the analysis that he
20	did when we had a legislative session, a
21	hearing sometime last week. I don't see
22	it. So just tell me where it is. If I got
23	to go to a hallway or closet somewhere in
24	this building, I'll go find it. But the
25	the fact remains, it's not being

2	and 16 and Five. As referenced earlier,
3	you heard the voices of the legislators
4	and the individuals that came out and
5	spoke on the record and made changes to
6	the map. So, I am heartened by that. But
7	I do share the sentiments of my
8	colleague, Kevan Abrahams, that I don't
9	want to see this go to a lawsuit. And I
10	know that you've done a lot to close the
11	gap on some really big issues when this
12	map first met this Legislature. But I do
13	think we've got to push the envelope just
14	a little bit further. No one should be
15	left behind. Not Lakeview, not North
16	Freeport. But I'm going to today, in this
17	moment, speak specifically to Lakeview.
18	Lakeview has a historic value in
19	context here in Nassau County, that does
20	not mimic anywhere else in Nassau County.
21	It was because of the segregation the
22	black students went to the school at the
23	at the Woodfield Road School and the
24	white students of the same school
25	district only went to the Malverne High

2	School. And it was because of that
3	significant separation that Dr. Martin
4	Luther King came here on May, the date
5	varies, it could be the 12 for the 11th,
6	but, nonetheless, it was in 1965. And for
7	some of us, that was before we were even
8	born. But it was a historic time that
9	happened back in Lakeview to start the
10	desegregation. And it's that same moment
11	in time that was captured back in 1965 to
12	to this very day is still really, really
13	highly spoken about in the Lakeview
14	community. There is not one matriarch nor
15	patriarch in that community that you'll
16	ever spend any significant time with
17	where they won't share that story. They
18	either experienced it directly and
19	witnessed Dr. Martin Luther King come and
20	fight for their rights, or some of the
21	younger folks had the benefit of sitting
22	at a kitchen table and hearing that
23	story. And it's because of that fight
24	that you see individuals time and time
25	again from the Lakeview community show up

2	here and beg and plead for them to be in
3	a district where their voices will not be
4	diluted, where they will not be
5	disenfranchised. It's because that fight
6	is birthed in them because of their
7	struggles, the struggles of their
8	matriarchs and their patriarchs.
9	And I think it was a significant
10	value that Jonathan was here today.
11	Because we are now hearing generations
12	that will come after us, that will serve
13	in some way or another say, please, with
14	the same fight in them, don't dilute my
15	voice. Don't disenfranchise me. So it's
16	for the very reason that we want to
17	create opportunities for these hearings,
18	for us to hear from our communities, our
19	constituency, so that we can understand
20	the impacts of our vote, that I thought
21	it was important that Jonathan was here
22	today. I applaud his mother and his
23	father for making the decision to bring
24	him here today. Because our impact will
25	far exceed any immediacy in its moment,
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	NCL HEARING 02.27.23

2	it will have impacts down the road. It
3	will have impacts down the road because
4	disenfranchisement and dilution of votes
5	also lead to suppression of votes.
6	Lakeview is a community that votes
7	vigorously, regularly. As Ms. Coads
8	said, has just a few electoral districts,
9	but that district would rival many other
10	communities of larger size. So to lose
11	their voice, to lose their presence,
12	would be very, I think it would be
13	tragic. A community that was the
14	epicenter, the battleground for civil
15	rights would now be diluted. But more
16	importantly, the young people that would
17	have to come after us, they would seek to
18	serve, would not hit a glass ceiling, but
19	in fact, today we would pull it down on
20	them.
21	I, like legislative Kevan Abrahams,
22	can see how we can make I could see
23	I'm not an expert, I can't draw a map for
24	you but I can see the pathway to
25	bridging those communities like North

2	Freeport with Lakeview and Baldwin and	
3	South Hempstead. I can see it with my	
4	mind's eye, without even looking at the	
5	map in the moment.	
6	And so, if there's a moment in time	
7	that we can do something so that we don't	
8	disenfranchise that community, a	
9	community that's been very, very active,	
10	that is very, very passionate about their	
11	representation, now is the time. Thank	
12	you.

14	Legislator Ferretti.	
15	LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you,	
16	Presiding Officer. I've said a couple of	
17	times now, I find the entire process	
18	fascinating. And I've watched the	
19	hearings of the TDAC. One of the first	
20	hearings, the chairman of the Democratic	
21	Commission, maybe it was a slip, maybe it	
22	wasn't, I don't know. But he said that	
23	and this is before any map was proposed.	
24	And I know the Presiding Officer	
25	referenced this earlier, before any map

2	was proposed by either the Democrat
3	Commission, the Republican Commission, no
4	map, that this was headed to court. And
5	at that point in my head, I said, oh,
6	boy, you know, when we're up there
7	voting, no matter what we do, I have a

9	going to have a problem with it. That's
10	politics. I get it. I get why you're
11	saying and need to say what you're
12	saying. I knew it the moment I heard the
13	commissioner of the TDAC on the Democrat
14	side say this is headed to court. So I
15	get that.
16	But before we take the vote tonight,
17	I did want to thank the Presiding
18	Officer. I wanted to thank our entire
19	Caucus over here, the public, and I want
20	to thank the Minority as well.
21	Legislator Bynoe I know a few
22	minutes ago said that we've done a lot
23	since this map was first was first put
24	up. We really haven't. We have as an
25	entire Legislature. Those amendments were

2	at your suggestion on the Minority side,
3	many of them, many from the public, but
4	many were from you, from Legislator
5	Bynoe, Legislator Drucker. We heard from
6	all of you. And I would challenge anyone
7	in this room to find, since the new laws
8	passed down from Albany a map that's put
9	forward for a vote where more input has
10	not been taken from the Minority in a
11	Body. I would challenge you to find one.
12	I would challenge you to find a single
13	map that was put forward by a Majority
14	that had more districts with registered
15	voters from the Minority party. I
16	understand, Legislator Abrahams says said
17	it should be, you know, has indicated
18	that there's trending that should be
19	considered. I get that.
20	But I want to thank the entire
21	Legislature because like I said, like it
22	or not, I feel this map is a map that was
23	created by all of us. So thank you, all,
24	for your efforts.

11	fair process. But that is assuming that
12	there is no phenomenon that we may know
13	of as party rating where one particular

17	elections. We're assuming that doesn't
18	occur in Nassau County. The party
19	registration factor can't be considered,
20	not in a vacuum. It has considered that

22	Secondly, there was reference made
23	to my predecessor, John Ciotti. May he
24	rest in peace. I do want to point out
25	that that election in 2011 was a very

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2	historic election, not just because a
3	16-year-incumbent was defeated, but also
4	it represented one of the very few times
5	in the history of this institution that a
6	Republican and a Democrat won on the same
7	lines that were drawn. And I believe that
8	those lines those lines were drawn by
9	Democrats when we had a Democrat as a
10	Presiding Officer. And those lines in
11	2011, a Republican won on those lines and
12	a Democrat won on those lines. And that
13	district was very different from the
14	district that exists currently. That
15	district expanded from west to east. It
16	clearly showed the trend of population of
17	individuals from Queens reaching the
18	American dream, buying a home. And as
19	they moved them from Elmont to Franklin
20	Square to West Hempstead, the district
21	expanded eastwards. The year after that
22	election, maybe because certain
23	communities were upset that a young
24	Democrat was representing them, the
25	district was changed and it didn't go

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2	from west to east, it went from north to
3	south. And as we see under many
4	constitutional cases regarding
5	gerrymandering, that is a clear sign that
6	these districts have been gerrymandered.
7	And so, yes, I thank the Commission
8	and the Majority for changing certain
9	things in the map that were mentioned
10	regarding District Three, but it does not
11	truly reflect the true growth and the
12	communities of interests and their
13	growth. Respectfully, I'm thankful that a
14	sliver of Mill Brook has been included,
15	but, nevertheless, not the majority of
16	all of Mill Brook has been included. I
17	ask you to please keep Mill Brook whole.
18	I ask you please also to not just focus
19	on the Third Legislative District, but to
20	focus on all the districts in which we
21	see an example of packing and cracking.
22	For those reasons, I have various
23	concerns about this map. I have various
24	concerns that not only would have lead to
25	a lawsuit, but it will lead to many

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2	things that we saw in the congressional
3	election last year in which people did
4	not know of the election date. It led to
5	a low voter turnout. It led to
6	frustration amongst voters feeling that
7	their vote was diluted or that their vote
8	was not respected. It was not the best
9	example of democracy in action when you
10	have a special master or a court not
11	issue sufficient notice to the public to
12	educate people as to how and what exactly
13	is going on in the process. For those
14	reasons that I have various concerns, not
15	just that this map will lead to a
16	lawsuit, but it would lead to conditions
17	in Nassau County becoming less
18	democratic.
19	Thank you very much, everyone who
20	came here to speak. God bless you.
