Ladies and gentlemen, it's my privilege to introduce to you the County Executive, Bruce Blakeman.

(Whereupon, County Executive Bruce Blakeman enters and greets the Legislature and then proceeds to podium.)

COUNTY EXECUTIVE: Thank you. Thank you. Let's get down to business.

So it's been one year. First, I want to thank God Hashem, for giving me the strength to be County Executive. I pray that God gives me the wisdom, courage and compassion to serve the residents of this great county to the best of my ability.

Thank you, Presiding Officer Rich Nicoletto, Minority Leader Abrahams, and all the members of the Legislature, Comptroller Elaine Phillips, District Attorney Anne Donnelly, our Clerk, Maureen O'Connell, and all the other elected officials who are here tonight. Members of the union, members of my staff, thank you for your hard work and the great workers in Nassau County.

I especially want to thank our

1
2 county workers for the outstanding job
3 they did this past year coming out of the
4 COVID pandemic. I want to thank all of
5 our first responders, our volunteer
6 firefighters, our EMTs and our great
7 veterans and all of our employees,
8 whether they be corrections officers,
9 deputy sheriffs clerks, whether they work
10 in social services, thank you to each and
11 every one of you for all you do for the
12 citizens and residents of Nassau County.

13 Over the past year, my
14 administration has tackled issues head on
15 that have been swept under the rug for
16 far too long by previous administrations.
17 By making the tough decisions, we were
18 able to make the County more affordable
19 and safer.

20 As inflation reached 8% nationally,
21 we were still able to submit a no tax
22 increase budget. And as a result of our
23 sound fiscal practices, we received a
24 bond upgrade from the Wall Street rating
25 agencies who have endorsed our record of

economic performance (applause).

I also worked with the Legislature to approve a comprehensive capital plan that will help to upgrade Nassau's critical infrastructure, protect our environment, resurface our roadways, give law enforcements the resources they need, and improve our parks and recreation areas, all without raising taxes (applause).

To keep costs low, especially for our seniors, veterans and young people, my administration is focused on expanding the tax base, driving local economic activity, and bringing some of the biggest and most prestigious companies in the world right here to Nassau County.

There is an interesting proposal to development the area around the coliseum known as the Hub. Las Vegas Sands has proposed an entertainment center, luxury hotel and casino for the Coliseum site. This resort would have local and celebrity residents, a luxury hotel and

1
2 spa, an entertainment venue, and other
3 top notch high class amenities. We are
4 considering this proposal, and I have
5 consistently stated that we would keep an
6 open mind. However, there are three
7 requirements necessary to move this
8 proposal forward:

9 First, it must be world class with a
10 luxury hotel and entertainment component;

11 Second, it must bring significant
12 revenue to the County and surrounding
13 areas, including construction and
14 permanent jobs;

15 And third, it must have the support
16 of the community.

17 We will continue to explore this
18 possibility and will keep county
19 residents informed throughout the
20 process.

21 One of the first things I did upon
22 taking office was asking that our great
23 comptroller, Elaine Phillips, conduct a
24 comprehensive review of the Department of
25 Assessment. The Comptroller uncovered

that the previous administration had improperly tampered with home values against the advice of their own professional consultants, causing disparities in values and assessments. She also found that the quality control was lacking. Because of the volatile housing market caused by nationwide inflation, rising interest rates, and the phase-in negotiated by my predecessor, which does not expire for another year, I felt it would be unreasonable to burden our taxpayers with a reassessment of the whole county again.

Prior to the comptroller's report, the Department of Assessment already had made significant changes in staff training and oversight, along with implementing best practices that will make the system more fair, accurate and transparent (applause).

On the economic front, I am committed to moving forward with economic development initiatives which create new

1
2 jobs and economic prosperity for all of
3 our residents. Our administration
4 increased the Boost Nassau Main Street
5 Grants program by an additional \$10
6 million to support small businesses and
7 keep family owned businesses in Nassau
8 County (applause).

9 We have begun meeting with
10 professionals and entrepreneurs from
11 every community to begin work on
12 expanding opportunities for all people so
13 that every community and every person
14 black, white, Asian, Hispanic and Latino
15 share in our county's prosperity.

16 Nassau County is bigger than ten
17 states by population, and our GDP is
18 larger than 145 nations in the United
19 Nations. My administration is committed
20 to doing big things. Attracting people to
21 Nassau County is a major priority. We
22 have world class healthcare, restaurants,
23 shopping and beaches. Our housing stock
24 is diverse and dynamic. We must market
25 Nassau County as the vibrant and exciting

community it is (applause).

Over the summer, we held our Nassau Back concert series at the Lakeside Theater at Eisenhower Park, headlined by Nassau's own Hall of Famer, Joan Jett. To enjoy great music and honor the heroic work of our first responders who stepped up to the plate during the COVID pandemic (applause). A record breaking crowd of over 25,000 people attended this event. The concerts also served to drive economic activity for our local residents, stores, hotels and other small businesses who struggled during the COVID pandemic. I am working on a star studded lineup for this summer, as well as hosting other major entertainment and sports events.

In partnership with Island Harvest and Long Island Cares Harry Chapin Food Bank. We had a Thanksgiving Eve food drive and collected more than 10,000 pounds of food (applause) with the help of our own Jericho native, singer

We held the county's first Feliz Navidad concert and toy distribution in collaboration with Toys for Tots for over 6000 people (applause).

We also held parades to celebrate our state champion sports teams. Little League World Series participants and UFC champion.

For Presidents Week, we began a comprehensive marketing campaign to highlight our county parks and museums while children were off from school. Rather than spend thousands of dollars on a vacation because of inflation and high gas prices, we urged residents to stay right here in Nassau County and enjoy everything we had to offer.

Now, this is the good part. I am proud to say we almost doubled visitation during that weekend at our county parks, ice rinks and museums, providing low cost and fun ways for families to spend time together. We need to market Nassau County

and all we have to offer (applause).

This year, as Nassau County will be hosting the Korean American National Sports Festival, which will draw thousands of athletes from around the world to Mitchell Field. I will always be the greatest and biggest cheerleader for our communities and fight to protect our suburban way of life.

Unfortunately, in Albany, some folks have proposed legislation that threatens the suburban experience of Nassau County residents. Legislation is being proposed in this year's budget that demands a 3% growth in housing stock. For Long Island, the target would mean 38,000 new housing units in the next three years. This would add approximately 100,000 new residents to Nassau County in just three years. In order to meet this goal, suburban areas of Nassau County, like Lakeview, Massapequa and Port Washington, would have to add multi-story apartment buildings and multifamily homes. While

1
2 these goals may be attainable in other
3 parts of the state where they have
4 sufficient land, I do not believe this
5 one size fits all approach takes into
6 account the suburban character of Nassau
7 County, and the fact that we are
8 surrounded by water and already the most
9 densely populated suburban county in the
10 United States. The water aquifers would
11 be stretched to dangerous levels. Our
12 environment would suffer and traffic
13 would be unbearable. Our schools would be
14 overcrowded. It's a dangerous idea that
15 will destroy the quality of life that we
16 enjoy. This is why I will stand against
17 that state plan, but I stand willing to
18 negotiate with our leaders in Albany on a
19 common sense approach to housing that
20 takes into account the necessities that
21 we have here in Nassau County (applause).

22 There's another issue that has
23 arisen up in Albany, which I think would
24 be very deleterious to Nassau County. I
25 will stand against the plan in Albany to

1

move local elections to even years.

3

Moving local elections to even years will

4

drown out local issues that our residents

5

care about like roads, taxes, government

6

services and benefits, where the media

7

will only focus on national or major

8

state issues. Local issues will be

9

drowned out. We can't let that happen. We

10

need to protect our local home rule and

11

our local elections and our local elected

12

officials and not get drowned out by a

13

policy that would put us in a situation

14

we haven't seen since the birth of this

15

county.

16

I will also strongly oppose the

17

State's proposal to raise the payroll tax

18

from \$0.34 to \$0.50 for every \$100 of

19

payroll. Nassau County residents should

20

not have to bail out the bloated and

21

ineffective bureaucracy known as the MTA.

22

Residents cannot afford another tax, and

23

certainly not to subsidize the MTA, which

24

is using now train cars from the 1980s

25

and delays continue in service. And as

1
2 we've seen with the rollout of the Grand
3 Central Station, there are problems
4 there. It's not upon our residents to
5 bail out the MTA, and I will oppose that
6 tax (applause).

7 Our Police Department, led by
8 Commissioner Ryder, does a great job. Our
9 cops are the most highly trained and
10 dedicated in the nation. For example,
11 after seeing countywide rise in thefts of
12 catalytic converters, officers seized
13 thousands of stolen catalytic converters
14 and more than \$7 million from an
15 organized crime ring, putting a
16 significant dent in their operation.
17 Thank you, Commissioner Ryder, and the
18 dedicated police officers of Nassau
19 County. I especially want to thank
20 Senator Chuck Schumer for asking the
21 Department of Justice to help us and send
22 a special response team to Long Island to
23 help crack down on these thefts
24 (applause).

25 This year's budget included the

1
2 hiring of 86 new law enforcement
3 professionals, including 36 new Nassau
4 County Police Department officers. I was
5 proud to work with PBA President Tommy
6 Shevlin to approve a new contract for the
7 PBA that adequately compensates police
8 officers for their service while
9 protecting taxpayers wallets (applause).
10 Together, with all of our unions, we
11 resolved years of litigation and
12 uncertainty regarding longevity
13 (applause).

14 Our great men and women of the
15 Nassau County Police Department solve the
16 crimes and make the arrests. But Albany's
17 woke progressive policies like cashless
18 bail raised the age and other crazy laws
19 are making us all less safe. We must
20 repeal these laws which are designed to
21 give criminals more rights than the
22 victims. It must not continue (applause).

23 President Biden's border policies
24 are also affecting us, more than just New
25 York City. Just over a month ago, four

1
2 migrants were bussed to New York City at
3 taxpayer expense from Texas. And we
4 arrested them for stealing thousands of
5 dollars in merchandise from Macy's just
6 down the street from here at the
7 Roosevelt Field Mall. A majority of the
8 residential burglaries in Nassau County
9 are now committed by organized crime
10 groups from places like Chile and El
11 Salvador. I am asking President Biden to
12 work with our great Customs and Border
13 Patrol agents to secure our borders, stop
14 the flow of criminals into our
15 communities, and keep out drugs like
16 heroin and fentanyl that are killing our
17 kids.

18 (Whereupon, standing
19 ovation.)

20 COUNTY EXECUTIVE: Thank you. I have
21 met with far too many parents who have
22 lost loved ones to the disease of
23 addiction. It has to stop. And that
24 starts with securing our border
25 (applause).

1
2 While we work to find fixes to the
3 criminal justice system, my
4 administration is putting substantial
5 resources into helping to end the heroin
6 and opioid abuse epidemic that has
7 ravaged our communities. Our county
8 earmarked \$15 Million per year for the
9 next four years to combat opioid
10 addiction through treatment and helping
11 local hospitals, clinics and other
12 community organizations so that our
13 county can focus on prevention, education
14 and treatment.

15 Working together, all of us in
16 Nassau County, we reduced overdoses by
17 30%. But it's not enough; it's not
18 enough. UCLA came out with a report today
19 that 30% of the fentanyl comes in through
20 the border. It must stop (applause).

21 Recently, Governor Hochul announced
22 to government and business leaders her
23 initiatives to spur economic development
24 by investing in education, technology and
25 science. The first of these initiatives

will begin right here in Nassau County at Long Island University C.W. Post Campus. We look forward to working with the governor on more projects to create jobs and for prosperity for our residents.

We must also work in a bipartisan manner to provide more help to those with special needs, especially our children. We have seen a rise in autism throughout the United States, and we must be responsive to the needs of those parents and those children.

While we still have many challenges, such as making sure we have a safe and reliable water supply, by working together Republicans, Democrats and independents, we can meet every challenge that comes before us (applause).

Nassau County is one of the best places to live in America, but it is not a time right now to rest on our laurels. I will continue to fight to keep Nassau safe, affordable, and on a path to prosperity. And with the help of my
