A LOCAL LAW TO AMEND § 21-11.4 OF TITLE D OF CHAPTER 21 OF THE NASSAU COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE CODE, AS LAST AMENDED BY LOCAL LAW 3-1987, IN RELATION TO HOME IMPROVEMENT LICENSE APPLICANTS.

WHEREAS, the Nassau County Department of Consumer Affairs is charged with safeguarding and protecting homeowners from abuses on the part of home improvement contractors by regulating the home improvement, remodeling and repair business and by licensing persons engaged in such business; and

WHEREAS, the Nassau County Administrative Code currently requires that applicants for a home improvement business license be fingerprinted by the Nassau County Police Department; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Consumer Affairs seeks to make the fingerprinting requirements for home improvement business licenses more consistent with the fingerprinting requirements for other license applicants under Title D of Chapter 21; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Consumer Affairs also seeks to update the amounts of required insurance coverage to provide more appropriate coverage; now therefore

BE IT ENACTED by the County Legislature of the County of Nassau as follows:

Section 1. Subsection 2 of Section 21-11.4 of the Nassau County Administrative Code is amended as follows:

2.

(a) An applicant for a home improvement contractor's license must establish that he is the real owner and possesses title to or is entitled to the possession of the establishment and will conduct, engage in and transact a home improvement business. He must furnish satisfactory evidence of a good moral character and financial responsibility.

(b) All applicants for a license pursuant to this title will submit to fingerprinting of the individual owner, if the applicant is a sole proprietorship, the general partners if the applicant is a partnership, and the officers, principals, directors, and stockholders holding more than 5% of the outstanding stock if the applicant is a

corporation. All individuals fingerprinted in connection with an application for a license shall be subject to a review of their criminal history record by the Commissioner of the Nassau County Department of Consumer Affairs, or his/her designee. All fingerprints and any applicable fees must be submitted in the form and manner as prescribed by the Division of Criminal Justice Services ("DCJS"). Any decision regarding a prospective applicant's fitness for a license based upon a conviction contained in the criminal history background information obtained from the DCJS of any individual fingerprinted pursuant to this section must be made upon consideration of New York State Correction Law Sections 701-703-b and Sections 751-753. The cost for fingerprinting shall be an expense payable by the applicant.

(c) All applicants must furnish certificates of public liability and property damage insurance in the amount of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per person, five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) per occurrence, bodily injury and one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) each occurrence and aggregate, property damage.

§ 2. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

A RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE STATE LIQUOR AUTHORITY TO CHANGE THE HOURS OF RESTRICTION ON SALES OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES BY WINE AND LIQUOR STORES IN NASSAU COUNTY.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 72-2023 FIXING THE TAX RATES AND LEVYING TAXES FOR THE TWELVE-MONTH 2024 FISCAL YEAR, BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 2024, AND ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2024, UPON TAXABLE PROPERTIES WITHIN THE TOWNS AND CITIES OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU FOR COUNTY; COUNTY FIRE PREVENTION, SAFETY, COMMUNICATION AND EDUCATION FUND; COUNTY POLICE HEADQUARTERS FUND; COUNTY POLICE DISTRICT FUND; NASSAU COMMUNITY COLLEGE FUND; COUNTY ENVIRONMENTAL BOND FUND; NASSAU COUNTY SEWER AND STORM WATER RESOURCES DISTRICT FUND; COUNTY DISPUTED ASSESSMENT FUND; AND FOR THE AFOREMENTIONED 2024 FISCAL YEAR FOR TOWN, TOWN HIGHWAY, TOWN GENERAL FUND, TOWN GENERAL FUND-PART TOWN, TOWN SPECIAL DISTRICT, UNPAID WATER CHARGES IN ARREARS, TOWN SIDEWALK AND CURB ASSESSMENT AND OTHER LAWFUL PURPOSES AND ALLOCATING REVENUES FROM CERTAIN SALES TAXES IMPOSED WITHIN THE COUNTY OF NASSAU OUTSIDE OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH AND DETERMINING THE EQUALIZATION RATES IN RELATION THERETO AND AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE AND THE CLERK OF THE NASSAU COUNTY LEGISLATURE TO EXECUTE SEPARATE TAX WARRANTS ADDRESSED TO THE RECEIVERS OF TAXES OF THE TOWNS AND CITIES WITHIN THE COUNTY OF NASSAU FOR THE COLLECTION OF THE SEVERAL SUMS MENTIONED THEREIN; PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW OF NASSAU COUNTY AND THE NASSAU COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE CODE, THE REAL PROPERTY TAX LAW, THE COUNTY LAW, THE LOCAL FINANCE LAW, THE TAX LAW, THE TOWN LAW AND THE EDUCATION LAW OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, AND CHAPTER 14 OF THE LAWS OF 1995

WHEREAS, Ordinance No.72-2023 passed by the County Legislature fixes the tax rates and levies the taxes for the 12-month fiscal year of 2024; and

WHEREAS, the substance of Ordinance No.72-2023 needs to be updated and, as such, requires a new ordinance amending it; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No.192-A -2023, adopted by this Nassau County Legislature on September 18, 2023, there have been included in the proceedings of the said Legislature, statements of the total assessed valuations of the properties situated in the County, the three towns, two cities and special districts within the County of Nassau for the 2024 fiscal year for County; County Fire Prevention, Safety, Communication and Education Fund; County Police Headquarters Fund; County Police District Fund; Nassau Community College Fund; County Environmental Bond Fund; Nassau County Sewer and Storm Water Resources District Fund; County Disputed Assessment Fund; Town; Part Town; Town Highway; Town Special District; and other lawful purposes, and the town budgets of the Towns of Hempstead, North

Hempstead and Oyster Bay for the year 2024 including the lists of Special Districts as contained therein and the amounts certified by the Town Board of each of the said towns to be raised and levied for Town General Fund, Town General Fund-Part Town, Town Highway, Town Special District and other lawful purposes, and the amounts of unpaid water charges in arrears in the respective water districts and Town Sidewalk and Curb assessments to be levied against certain properties in the Towns of Hempstead, North Hempstead, and Oyster Bay will be caused to be printed in the proceedings of the Nassau County Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Legislature has, by Chapter 383 of the Laws of 2002, as amended, authorized the Nassau County Legislature to provide for abatement from increases in the County general property tax rate for eligible senior citizens and the tax rate as set forth herein is calculated in consideration of such abatement; and

WHEREAS, Appropriation Ordinance No.71-2023 for the fiscal year 2024 has been adopted by the Nassau County Legislature for the conduct of the County Government of Nassau County for the 2024 fiscal year, and such Appropriation Ordinance constitutes the Appropriation Ordinance for the 2024 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 302 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, the County is required to adopt a budget for a twelve-month fiscal year commencing on January 1, 2024, and terminating on December 31, 2024, and to levy taxes in accordance with said 2024 fiscal year budget and year, and to cause real property taxes to be assessed, collected and paid in order to fund County governmental operations for said 2024 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the County accordingly is required to adopt an ordinance for the levy of taxes in accordance with Appropriation Ordinance No.71-2023; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 306 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, the County Legislature of the County of Nassau is required to levy County, Town and Special District taxes for the ensuing year and the Legislature is also required to levy the unpaid water charges in arrears which have been filed by the Town Boards of the respective towns; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 12-4.1 of the Nassau County Administrative Code, the Nassau County Legislature is required to levy the unpaid town sidewalk and curb assessments and other lawful town charges; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 1262 of the Tax Law of the State of New York, the Nassau County Legislature is required to allocate revenues from certain sales taxes imposed within the County of Nassau, outside of the City of Long Beach, and for purposes of ascertaining

the full valuations of the properties in the area of the County outside the said City of Long Beach so as to make such allocation, may determine the equalization rates to be applicable in such areas; and

Class Two- All other residential properties, such as apartments, co-ops, and condominiums, but not hotels, inns and motels.

Class Three - Public utility properties.

Class Four - All other property not defined in classes one through three.

§ 26. Taxes and assessments are hereby levied and shall be collected for the purposes for which the aforesaid appropriations have been made and which this Legislature has ordained shall be raised and levied, and that all of said taxes and assessments be collected from the several persons and upon the properties named and described in the assessment roll on file in the Office of the Assessor for the County of Nassau, and the County Executive, or in her absence or inability to act, the Presiding Officer of the Legislature, and the Clerk of this Legislature are hereby authorized and directed to execute for and on behalf of the County of Nassau consolidated tax warrants addressed to the Receivers of Taxes of the several towns and cities within the County of Nassau, to wit: the Town of Hempstead, Town of North Hempstead, Town of Oyster Bay, City of Long Beach and the City of Glen Cove, authorizing, directing and commanding the said Receivers of Taxes to collect the taxes and assessments herein levied by this Legislature from the several persons and on the properties as named and described in the portions of the assessment roll to which the said warrants are annexed, being the several sums mentioned in the respective consolidated tax warrants for County; County Fire Prevention, Safety, Communication and Education Fund; County Police Headquarters Fund; County Police District Fund; Nassau Community College Fund; County Environmental Bond Fund; County Disputed Assessment Fund and County Sewer and Storm Water Resources District Fund purposes. § 29. It is hereby determined, pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 8 N.Y.E.C.L. section 0101 et seq. and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, that the adoption of this ordinance is a “Type II” Action within the meaning of Section 617.5(c)(26) of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and, accordingly, is of a class of actions which do not have a significant effect on the environment; and no further review is required.

§ 30. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

EMERGENCY RESOLUTION NO. 12 – 2023

AN EMERGENCY RESOLUTION DECLARING AN EMERGENCY FOR IMMEDIATE ACTION UPON A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE TO EXECUTE A GRANT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF NASSAU, ACTING ON BEHALF OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS, RECREATION AND MUSEUMS, AND NORTH SHORE HISTORICAL MUSEUM.

WHEREAS, the Honorable Bruce Blakeman, County Executive, has submitted to this County Legislature a written recommendation dated December 18, 2023, pursuant to the provisions of the County Government Law of Nassau County; and

WHEREAS, the said recommendation refers to an emergency resolution declaring an emergency for immediate action upon a resolution authorizing the County Executive to execute a grant agreement between the County of Nassau, acting on behalf of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Museums, and North Shore Historical Museum; and

WHEREAS, the said recommendation is that the County Legislature adopt a resolution declaring that an emergency exists in Nassau County the nature of which is to take immediate action upon the aforesaid resolution; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the County Legislature hereby declares that an emergency exists within Nassau County, the nature of which is to consider and to take immediate action upon the aforesaid resolution before this Legislature.

RESOLUTION NO. 252–2023

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE TO EXECUTE A GRANT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF NASSAU, ACTING ON BEHALF OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS, RECREATION AND MUSEUMS, AND NORTH SHORE HISTORICAL MUSEUM.

19 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Laura
20 Schaefer?

21 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Here.

22 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator John
23 Ferretti?

24 LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Here.

25 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Arnold

Drucker?

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Here.

CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Rose
Marie Walker?

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Here.

CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Joshua
Lafazan.

LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Here.

CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Michael
Giangregorio?

LEGISLATOR GIANGREGORIO: Here.

CLERK PULITZER: Minority Leader
Kevan Abrahams?

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Here.

CLERK PULITZER: Presiding Officer
Richard Nicoletello?

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Here.

CLERK PULITZER: We have a quorum,
sir.

(Whereupon, Legislator
McKevitt was left out of the
roll call but is indeed in
attendance.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.

1
2 Before we go into public comment, we Top
3 Cops, which is what we traditionally do
4 at each Legislative meeting. If you
5 intend to come and speak during public
6 comment portion, we ask that you fill out
7 a slip as Meta Mereday is doing right now
8 up at the front of the room and we'll
9 call you in turn.

10 And for our Top Cops, Nassau County
11 Police Benevolent Association, we have
12 Vice President Kevin Mullick.

13 MR. MULLICK: Good afternoon,
14 everyone. I want to thank everybody for
15 the opportunity to allow me to speak to
16 present our Top Cops for December 2023.
17 But for some of you on the Legislature, I
18 know you're moving on to better pastures.
19 I want to thank you very much for having
20 a good working relationship with you and
21 being my friend. Thank you very much.

22 On December 9th, 2023, police
23 officers from the Nassau County Emergency
24 Service Unit, also known as ESU, visited
25 Cohen's Children Medical Center in

1
2 Manhasset. The event was coordinated by
3 police officers Kevin Probst, Kenneth
4 Tymecki and Dennis Sheehan. Twenty two
5 Police officers from ESU did rappel from
6 the 40 foot roof of the medical center.
7 While rappelling from the roof, our ESU
8 officers were waving and smiling at the
9 children that were bedridden and confined
10 to their rooms.

11 Our ESU police officers also
12 collected and donated funds from their
13 unit and purchased 75 Christmas gifts and
14 presents for the children admitted to the
15 hospital. ESU did personally deliver toys
16 to the children at Cohen's medical
17 center.

18 Being away from home in the hospital
19 is, especially during the holidays, must
20 be very difficult on these kids and their
21 families. The love and compassion
22 demonstrated by the members of ESU lifted
23 their spirits. The Nassau County PBA is
24 honored to announce police officers Kevin
25 Probst, Kenneth Tymecki and Dennis

1
2 Sheehan as Legislative Top Cops of 2023.

3 (Whereupon, applause.)

4 COMMISSIONER RYDER: I'm going to
5 correct Kevin. You're not moving on to
6 better pastures. These are the best
7 pastures you can want. But you're moving
8 on, and we thank you very much for your
9 partnership and friendship, and I've said
10 it before.

11 Every time at this time of year, we
12 do a lot of different things. We do toy
13 parades, we go and we visit schools and
14 we give away toys to those unfortunate
15 children that don't or cannot have it at
16 Christmas time. They get to make a
17 difference in people's lives.

18 This is a second year doing it, and
19 they asked me if they wanted to lower me
20 off the roof. And I thought about it for
21 about a second and said no, because they
22 wouldn't let me choose who was holding
23 the rope.

24 But I got to tell you what they do
25 and what they do for these children. When

1
2 we did it during Covid, these kids not
3 only couldn't be exposed to anything and
4 they're in that recovery area, they come
5 down the window. It was slippery, it was
6 wet, it was raining last year and they
7 still went forward with it. Taking that
8 risk to make sure that these kids had
9 that great day. And now they went above
10 and beyond this year, and they raised
11 their own money, their own funds, and
12 they bought additional gifts for them. We
13 could have knocked on -- everybody knows
14 the Major -- and said, hey, give me some
15 toys to give to these kids. No, they went
16 and got their own. It shows that how much
17 they care about their communities and
18 what they do for them. So I'm very proud
19 to be part of it. And I say thank you
20 again to all of you, but more
21 importantly, thank you to our cops.

22 OFFICER PROBST: Thank you,
23 Commissioner, and thank you, Legislature.
24 And thank you again for the opportunity
25 to speak in front of you guys today.

1
2 Thank you for the award. And again,
3 it wasn't just Kenny, myself and Dennis.
4 It did take an army, as the Commissioner
5 always says, of everyone in the Unit to
6 come support and help these kids.

7 Unfortunately, with everything in
8 our day to day line of work, we see
9 people at their worst and this just
10 affords us the opportunity to go and
11 spread some light, some love to these
12 children and their families who
13 unfortunately we're not able to or
14 hopefully they can come out and we all
15 want to see them get better for
16 Christmas.

17 So just having that little bit --
18 and again, as the Commissioner said,
19 we're going to push real hard to get them
20 over the edge again. But just to do
21 something and have those kids see us for
22 even if it's five minutes, everyone going
23 on this side of the wall, it just it
24 makes our lives and our hearts feel full,
25 and we hope it does the same for the

1
2 children and the parents as well.

3 Thank you again.

4 (Whereupon, applause.)

5 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: You
6 know, this demonstrates another of the
7 many, many, many ways that our Police
8 Department makes our county better. It
9 makes our county stronger. And I want to
10 thank the three officers and all the
11 officers who participated in this and
12 making the days of these young people,
13 children, brighter, especially this time
14 of year.

15 Through the years, we've had Top Cop
16 celebrations, recognitions before each of
17 our legislative meetings, and we've seen
18 countless ways that that our police have
19 contributed to our county, countless ways
20 that they've shown the courage,
21 dedication, professionalism that makes
22 you the finest police force in our
23 country. And I just want to say, on
24 behalf of the residents of Nassau County,
25 thank you for everything that you and

1
2 your brothers and sisters do to keep our
3 county safe.

4 So thank you, folks.

5 LEGISLATOR FORD: I would like to
6 echo what the Presiding Officer has said
7 about you. I can only imagine the
8 excitement that the children felt when
9 they saw you going down the building,
10 stopping to wave to them. Indeed, that is
11 something that you just can't -- we take
12 for granted what you do, but for these
13 children to see you in such a positive
14 way, a friendly way, doing something
15 special for them just says a lot about
16 your character. And I thank you very much
17 for doing this.

18 And, Commissioner, I don't mean to
19 put you on the spot, you have an
20 absolutely wonderful police department,
21 but I'm sure next year they can raise a
22 lot of money if they could go by every
23 foot you go down you could raise. So I'm
24 just putting it out there.

25 COMMISSIONER RYDER: You hear him

1
2 say, get me up there and push me over the
3 side. He didn't say I was tied off.

4 (Whereupon, laughter.)

5 LEGISLATOR FORD: Well, I thought
6 you would rappel (laughter).

7 But no, officers, in all sincerity,
8 this is why you are Top Cops. And for the
9 whole unit that did that. Really, I
10 cannot underscore the thanks for what you
11 did for those children and those
12 families.

13 Thank you.

14 (Whereupon, applause.)

15 LEGISLATOR WALKER: And I too, just
16 want to thank you so much. I know some of
17 the children that are there right now
18 and, you know, they're very, very sick.
19 And like you said, they can't be out and
20 about. They can't do some of the things
21 that all of the rest of us can do with
22 our families during the holidays, and
23 what you did for those children and just
24 brighten their day and how excited they
25 were to see you. Just totally amazing. I

1
2 mean, when they say, "the police officers
3 were climbing down the building and
4 waving to us", you touched their lives
5 and and made a difference for them and
6 for their families, more than you will
7 ever know. So thank you so much for all
8 you do.

9 And, Paddy, thank you for all of us,
10 from all of us for having the best police
11 department that there could ever be. So
12 God bless you all and Merry Christmas to
13 each and every one of you.

14 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: In a
15 couple of moments. We'll have you up for
16 a presentation. Thank you, folks.

17 Now for the Detectives Association,
18 Inc., I'd like to introduce Joe Philbin,
19 the Sergeant At Arms, for a presentation.

20 SERGEANT AT ARMS PHILBIN: Thank
21 you, Legislators. Good afternoon,
22 everybody. Thank you to everybody who's
23 been a team member of ours. For those of
24 you moving on, we wish you the best of
25 luck. For those of you coming in and

1
2 moving forward, we look forward to
3 working with you.

4 Today, we're here to recognize
5 Detective Jason Green and Detective
6 Anthony Barbieri, who on October 2nd,
7 2023, around 1100 hours, Detective
8 Barbieri and Detective Green were exiting
9 the Southern State Highway at Exit 19S
10 when they observed a Hempstead RMP
11 blocking the road. As they drove by, they
12 observed a uniform Hempstead police
13 officer speaking with an individual
14 sitting on the ledge of the overpass of
15 the Southern State Parkway on the
16 opposite side of the fence, contemplating
17 suicide.

18 Detective Barbieri and Detective
19 Green pulled over and asked the Hempstead
20 unit if he needed assistance, at which
21 time, and he accepted the help. Detective
22 Barbieri and Detective Green initiated a
23 conversation with the aided, who was in
24 severe distress and stated she had been
25 contemplating suicide and had taken

1
2 multiple pills prior to climbing over the
3 fence of the overpass. Detective Barbieri
4 and Detective Green were able to have an
5 ongoing conversation with the aided for
6 approximately 10 to 15 minutes, and were
7 eventually able to talk the aided into
8 climbing back over to the sidewalk.

9 In order for the aided to get back
10 onto the sidewalk, she had to stand up on
11 the ledge of the overpass, which is
12 approximately one foot in diameter, hold
13 on to the fence and carefully walk back
14 to the end of the overpass, which was
15 another challenge. Detective Barbieri and
16 Detective Green were able to calm the
17 aided down enough to get her slowly and
18 carefully walk back onto the sidewalk, at
19 which time she was taken to new NUMC for
20 a treatment evaluation.

21 I can say is as a hostage
22 negotiator, there's nothing harder than
23 talking to somebody in distress. You
24 don't know what's going to set them off.
25 You're talking to them at the worst time

1
2 in their life. And for them to be not
3 even called to this assignment, just
4 happen on it, talk to this person and
5 help them get back into a state where we
6 can get them to treatment, just shows the
7 professionals that we have in the
8 detective division, which is why it is
9 imperative that we get to full staffing.

10 So I'd like to ask you guys to join
11 me in congratulating our top detectives,
12 Detective Jason Green and Detective
13 Anthony Barbieri.

14 COMMISSIONER RYDER: So once again,
15 we have specialties in this department as
16 you all know, because you help fund it
17 and you help us get the training that we
18 need. Our emergency service that, just
19 spoke, BSO in the back. We have one of
20 the best hostage negotiating teams in the
21 country. And the training that they go
22 through is why we never have to fire our
23 weapons in this county, because they're
24 so good at what we call verbal judo. But
25 every single officer goes through some

1
2 kind of negotiation training. Every
3 single officer goes through that training
4 that takes that decision to be made in
5 that split second. They made a decision
6 to talk. They made a decision to try to
7 de-escalate and bring that person back.
8 Because of that training, because of the
9 support we get from this Body is the
10 reason why these two detectives were able
11 to do the job that they did that day. And
12 again, I also congratulate both of them
13 and thank you again.

14 DETECTIVE BARBIERI: Thank you. How
15 are you doing?

16 I just want to thank the
17 Legislature, the Commissioners, the
18 Chiefs behind me. We're very grateful
19 for this award. This is not a job that we
20 do for awards or accolades. We do it to
21 assist the members of Nassau County to
22 the best of our ability.

23 I just wanted to say that day was a
24 normal morning for us. We were doing our
25 regular duties, and we happen to pull up

1
2 on this situation. Our stress levels shot
3 through the roof, and to stay calm in
4 that situation was not something easy for
5 for us. And to talk her down was
6 extremely stressful situation for the
7 both of us. So I can't even imagine how
8 stressful it was for her and what this
9 young 17-year-old girl was going through.
10 So I just hope she got the help that she
11 needs. And I hope that our interaction
12 with her was was able to get her to a
13 better place and to get her the help she
14 needed and to start off to get her life
15 going again. So thank you.

16 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

17 Legislator Ford.

18 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you.

19 First of all, thank you very much
20 for saving a life. I think that that's
21 the most important thing that we hear
22 today. And yes, you're right, I can only
23 imagine the stress that you both were
24 going through watching this young woman,
25 17 years old. And from the way that I

1
2 heard the story, how it was depicted, was
3 that there was a fence between you and
4 the individual, or was she right there
5 with you?

6 DETECTIVE BARBIERI: Yeah, she she
7 was on the other side of the fence is
8 approximately a ten foot fence. So for us
9 to get over that, to actually physically
10 help her was impossible.

11 LEGISLATOR FORD: Aside from your
12 professionalism and your training, you
13 brought into your into this whole
14 situation such a compassion and an
15 understanding and a connectedness that
16 you had with this individual, to the
17 point where not only did you stop her
18 from jumping, but the fact that she
19 actually walked, holding on to the fence,
20 back to safety where you then could
21 administer first aid to her, that says
22 volumes about the character that you both
23 have in regard to dealing with this
24 situation, and I'm sure that the family
25 is eternally grateful that you were able

1
2 to save her.

3 And yes, we all pray that she did
4 get the help that she needs. But the two
5 of you, honestly, I just can't say enough
6 and thank you enough on behalf of this
7 county for the excellent job that you did
8 and the bravery and the courage that you
9 showed and you demonstrated in dealing
10 with somebody because, yes, you never
11 know what's going to set them off and
12 what happens.

13 It takes special people to do this.
14 And you two are very, very special
15 individuals, the finest of our cops.
16 Thank you.

17 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Deputy
18 Presiding Officer Kopel.

19 DEPUTY PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL:
20 Well, I see that the Police Department
21 chooses its detectives wisely. You guys
22 were just going along and not even
23 looking for something like this. Your
24 powers of observation are clearly very
25 good. You noticed something going on

1
2 there. Who looks over fences along the
3 sideway.

4 So it's just a wonderful thing that
5 you've gotten the right training. And the
6 versatility that you show. I mean, your
7 basic training is criminals. You're out
8 there looking for criminals and you're
9 out there trying to understand criminals
10 and how they think and how they act and
11 what to do about them. This is an
12 entirely different thing altogether. And,
13 you just pivoted and accomplished it.

14 For someone who lives in this
15 neighborhood, in your neighborhood, that
16 you gentlemen police, it's a tremendous
17 feeling of comfort. And I also would like
18 to join in thanking you. Can't thank you
19 enough. Makes me feel good. Makes me feel
20 safe. Makes me feel safer. All the people
21 in the area. Thank you.

22 (Whereupon, applause.)

23 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.
24 Thank you very much.

25 We invite you and the PBA honorees

to come on up.

(Whereupon, photos taken and
Citations given.)

1
2 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: So we
3 now have a couple of points of personal
4 privilege. The first would be with our
5 Legislator John Ferretti.

6 LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you,
7 Presiding Officer Jackie Testamark and
8 Mom and Dad, if you want to come up to
9 the podium.

10 So thank you for coming. It's an
11 honor and privilege and privilege to
12 recognize Levittown own Jacqueline
13 Testamark here today. Jackie is a
14 graduate of my alma mater, Division
15 Avenue High School. She graduated in
16 2020. I graduated in 2019. That's a joke.
17 (Laughter).

18 At Division Avenue High School,
19 Jackie excelled. She was an AP scholar
20 with distinction who was not only
21 academically gifted but also musically
22 talented. She received the lead role in
23 Division Avenue's musical production of
24 Mamma mia! She was part of the school
25 choir and brought her singing talents to

1
2 the All-State Music Festival in 2018.

3 Jackie was also a member of the
4 Tri-M Music Scholars Honor Society and
5 vice president of the Thespian Honor
6 Society. She played soccer for Division
7 and was a student council representative.

8 After graduating salutatorian from
9 division, Jackie took her countless
10 talents to Yale University. She continues
11 to excel at Yale, planning on graduating
12 this spring.

13 While Jackie started her career at
14 Yale as a political science major and I
15 think in politics as well, she did have a
16 plan to go to law school, but eventually
17 changed her major and is currently
18 studying classical civilizations in
19 history. And incidentally, I think
20 there's probably a few people up here
21 that would say good choice.

22 At Yale, Jackie helped organize
23 Yale's Classics anti-racism reading group
24 and worked as a field archeologist in
25 Rome.

1
2 This past November, Jackie was named
3 a Rhodes Scholar, an accomplishment that
4 will enable her to pursue her passion for
5 reframing museum exhibitions to show a
6 globalized view of the ancient world.
7 Jackie is among the roughly 30 Americans
8 named to this prestigious scholarship,
9 which will take her to the University of
10 Oxford in October 2024 to pursue her
11 graduate degree.

12 To put Jackie's accomplishments into
13 context, more than 2500 students started
14 the application process this year for a
15 Rhodes Scholarship, aiming to pursue
16 graduate degrees in areas ranging from
17 the humanities to physical sciences. More
18 than 860 were endorsed by roughly 250
19 higher learning institutions, and only 30
20 Americans -- 30 Americans -- were chosen,
21 and they will join an international group
22 representing more than 70 countries.

23 Jackie, we are so proud of you, not
24 just for receiving this Rhodes
25 Scholarship, but for all of your

1
2 accomplishments. Your accomplishments are
3 a reflection of your hard work, your
4 upbringing by your parents who are here
5 with you today, and I had the honor to
6 meet. And I can tell you, you've got two
7 great parents. They're supporting you the
8 whole way. And it's also a reflection on
9 our incredible school district in
10 Levittown. You didn't go to Abbey Lane
11 like me, we still let you in. But you did
12 go to Wisdom Land and Division Avenue.

13 I know we have your principal and
14 superintendent here are going to come up
15 and say a few words in a little bit, and
16 it's really a reflection on our great
17 Levittown school district as well.

18 Again. We're so proud of you. Wish
19 you the best of luck finishing up at
20 Yale. And of course, in the fall at
21 Oxford. God bless you.

22 Want to say a few words?

23 MS. TESTAMARK: I'll keep this short
24 and sweet. If there's anything I've
25 learned, it's that people like short and

1
2 sweet. So I will keep this pretty short
3 for you guys.

4 I think the question I've been asked
5 the most since winning Rhodes was why
6 does someone who wants to study art
7 history deserve this kind of scholarship?
8 To which I say, why not, usually. And
9 then I go on a long, rambling tangent
10 about all the things I'm interested in
11 studying.

12 But more than anything, I think that
13 winning this award is just proof that
14 every person has something that they're
15 supposed to do. And when you find that
16 thing, the doors will start to open.

17 I did not start out studying art
18 history or anything like that when I got
19 to Yale. The reason that I'm on the
20 trajectory I am now is because of my
21 parents and the countless times that
22 they've pushed me to pursue the things
23 that interest me and the things that I
24 love. I was always worried that, you
25 know, there was no job security outside

1
2 of law school and that was always a huge
3 factor. Something I was thinking about.
4 Time and time again, they told me that
5 they wanted to see me wake up happy every
6 morning and doing something that I loved,
7 and that if I was doing that, I'd never
8 be working a day in my life. So, I owe it
9 all to my parents for giving me the
10 courage to kind of keep pursuing this
11 path, obviously.

12 And it's really just kind of been an
13 absolutely surreal experience having my
14 entire family behind me, some of whom are
15 here today. And of course, my principal,
16 John Coscia, my superintendent, Todd
17 Winch, who kind of gave me the keys to
18 success all those years ago. Absolutely
19 would not be here without any of those
20 people. So it's truly a dream come true.
21 I'm very excited to be going to Oxford
22 and to not be paying for it. Just, all
23 my thanks to everyone who helped me get
24 here today.

25 (Whereupon, applause.)

1
2 LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you so
3 much.

4 And you know, from what I read
5 online, there are politicians or elected
6 officials that were Rhodes Scholars. One
7 is President Bill Clinton, the other was,
8 Senator Cory Booker. I saw that as well.
9 So I told you, if you ever do go into
10 politics and follow in their footsteps,
11 that's what you got to live up to.
12 President. Just make sure you skip over
13 the county level, because you'll kick my
14 butt if you ever run against me.

15 Mom, Dad, do you want to say
16 anything, we're good?

17 (Whereupon, decline to
18 speak.)

19 LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: All right.
20 Congratulations.

21 Anybody from the school district
22 want to come up?

23 SUPERINTENDENT WINCH: Thank you,
24 Legislator Ferretti, for giving me the
25 opportunity to share a few words.

1
2 A Rhodes Scholar once shared that
3 people like short and sweet. So I'll do
4 my best to comply (laughter).

5 On behalf of the entire Levittown
6 School District, it is my honor to share
7 our congratulations to Jackie Testamark
8 on this tremendous achievement. Although
9 we are looking to coordinate our own
10 small celebration with our Board of
11 Education, I didn't want to miss out on
12 the opportunity to attend the Legislature
13 recognition, as this is such a defining
14 moment for both you, your family, and for
15 your extended family of the Levittown
16 School District.

17 While you achieved this incredible
18 milestone all on your own, we are just
19 proud to have been part of your
20 educational journey. We wish you much
21 success and happiness in the years ahead.
22 And at this time, I'd like to just
23 introduce the principal of Division
24 Avenue High School, Mr. John Coscia, who
25 will share a few brief words.

1
2 Thank you.

3 MR. COSCIA: Thank you, Mr. Winch.

4 Walking in today, I was just
5 reflecting on Jackie's high school
6 career, and I expressed this to Jackie
7 earlier on that when I would talk about
8 her with whether it be Dr. McDonald at
9 the time or Mr. Winch, if one of the
10 Division Avenue students I'd come in
11 contact with would receive a Rhodes
12 scholarship, she's the least surprising
13 of the bunch.

14 I had an opportunity to look back on
15 some of the things I said about her and
16 one thing really resonated, which was
17 when I described her in my senior award
18 speech, I described her as relentless,
19 and someone who will do anything within
20 her means to surpass her competition. And
21 this is just further proof of it. She
22 has impeccable character, which I know
23 she gets from her mother and her father.
24 We're just beyond proud of her at
25 Division Avenue High School.

1
2 Congratulations, you've earned it.

3 (Whereupon, applause.)

4 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Jackie, I want
5 to congratulate you too, and congratulate
6 the Levittown School District. It really
7 shows everyone how great our school
8 districts are and what our students can
9 accomplish if they put their minds to it
10 and work as hard as you can.

11 Although I don't know Jackie
12 personally, I do know her aunt very well,
13 Mrs. Christine Moyer (phonetic), who was
14 here in the audience today, who taught my
15 children over in Old Country Road
16 Elementary School. I'm sorry they didn't
17 become Rhodes Scholars, but you did a
18 great job anyway (laughter).

19 Again, congratulations. We are so
20 very, very proud of you. And I feel like
21 I have a connection to you through
22 Christine. So congratulations. And to mom
23 and dad too, and again to Levittown
24 School District.

25 (Whereupon, applause.)

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Okay. Thank
you.

1
2 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: We are
3 fortunate to have with us today one of
4 the outstanding educational leaders in
5 our county. The president of Nassau
6 Community College, Dr. Maria Conzatti.

7 MS. CONZATTI: Thank you, Presiding
8 Officer.

9 It would seem that today's theme is
10 about community, and I just wanted to
11 take this opportunity to thank each and
12 every one of you for the outstanding job
13 that you do in supporting all of your
14 community based organizations, including
15 Nassau Community College.

16 And for the retiring legislators:
17 Presiding Officer Nicoletto, Legislator
18 Abrahams, Legislator Ford and Legislator
19 Schaefer, thank you so very much for your
20 unwavering support for this college. For
21 its 14,000 students and over 160,000
22 alumni, this institution has been an
23 opportunity to flourish in this county,
24 to thrive in this county, to stay here,
25 to raise families and continue the legacy

1
2 of this county. And you can see from our
3 outstanding police force to the number of
4 individuals invested in this county and
5 its successes, the work that you have
6 done and continue to do.

7 We wish the four of you well. We
8 look forward to continuing our rapport
9 with the the rest of the legislative
10 body. I wish you all very happy and
11 healthy holidays.

12 MR. KORNBLUTH: I just want to say a
13 few words.

14 I want to thank the entire
15 legislature for all the support that
16 you've given to Nassau Community College
17 over the years, and especially as the
18 retirees Presiding Officer Nicolello,
19 Minority Leader Kevan Abrahams, and
20 Legislators Laura Schaefer and Denise
21 Ford. I want to thank you. We're going to
22 miss you tremendously.

23 I have developed some great
24 relationships. Kevan and I go back many,
25 many years before I was standing here.

1
2 And hopefully we'll get back to having
3 our breakfast soon.

4 Again, I want to wish everyone here
5 a healthy and happy holiday and New Year,
6 and we'll see you right afterwards.

7 And just in closing, I just want to
8 say something. Maria didn't say it, but I
9 figured I'd say it. I can get away with a
10 little bit more. We do feel good when you
11 question us and you interrogate us when
12 we come up here to do the budgets,
13 because it makes us think about what
14 we're doing, and we really appreciate it.
15 And what it has done for us, it has
16 helped us to provide a real quality
17 education at a low cost for all the
18 students that we serve in Nassau County.
19 So for that, we really thank you. And
20 have a great year again.

21 Thank you.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
23 right. All the rest of you heard that,
24 right? They like to be interrogated
25 (laughter).

1
2 Thank you for joining us today for
3 the for the recognition. And, you know, I
4 think we are all proud of our association
5 with the college and all proud to have
6 supported the college, its budget, its
7 capital projects throughout the years.
8 And it is a real jewel of Nassau County.
9 It will be going forward. Thank you.

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2 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Last,
3 I'm going to take a moment to take my own
4 point of personal privilege to say how
5 fortunate I have been to be a legislator
6 in this county, and how fortunate I've
7 been to serve with my colleagues, many of
8 whom both past and present, I consider
9 friends for life.

10 Thank you to all the dedicated
11 Nassau County workforce. County workers,
12 Government workers don't always get the
13 recognition they deserve, but this county
14 has done tremendous things for our
15 residents. Still doing that. You're all
16 serving selflessly, and you make all of
17 us look good.

18 I especially want to thank the
19 department heads and agency heads who
20 come and make presentations for us. You
21 should get battle pay for having to
22 listen to us year in and year out and
23 meeting after meeting.

24 To the staff, I want to thank both
25 staff for the entire Legislature, but

1
2 especially from my side, the Majority,
3 our counsel, Chris Ostuni; Meredith
4 Hughes; Bill Muller; communications, Mary
5 Stoddard, Kevin Ryan, Bill Florio and all
6 the members of the Majority staff who
7 have made sure that we're prepared for
8 every meeting. They have caught every
9 issue, gotten us on the straight and
10 narrow. So they've done a fantastic job.
11 And throughout the pandemic, when most
12 people were sheltering in their homes,
13 they were all here working, making sure
14 the County continued to work, the
15 Legislature continue to work, and county
16 operations continued.

17 And then last but not least,
18 certainly not least, I want to thank my
19 two assistants, Ursula and Pete. Been
20 with me for many years. I truly
21 appreciate everything that you do. They
22 have been excellent in their roles and
23 it's not me, just me observing it. But
24 everywhere I've gone, I've gotten
25 compliments on what they do, which is the

1
2 true testament. So basically, I just want
3 to say thank you all. And it's been a
4 privilege.

5 (Whereupon, applause.)

6 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Good afternoon
7 for the last time, at least for me up
8 here.

9 I got a lot of different mixed
10 emotions, a lot of different feelings,
11 and wasn't too sure what I wanted to say
12 today. But the most important thing I
13 wanted to come across is just to say
14 thank you. So many different levels of
15 thank you. I apologize if I get a little
16 bit long. And I'll take it that Rich also
17 thanked a lot of people that I was going
18 to thank.

19 Just starting first and foremost
20 with my colleagues, the 18 of you, I know
21 at times it didn't seem that way all the
22 time, but I have a tremendous amount of
23 respect for each and every one of you.
24 Each of you bring a different background
25 and perspective, which, if we don't

1
2 always agree, we do agree that we are
3 both advocating for what we believe is
4 best and keep that within you. Keep that
5 fire within you. Debate is good.
6 Discussion is even better. So from that
7 standpoint, I want to thank each and
8 every one of you.

9 More specifically, to thank my
10 colleagues in the Minority. We've been
11 through thick and thin. We've been
12 through good times. We've been through
13 bad times. We've been through laughing
14 times. We've been through sad times. I
15 would be remiss if I don't remember some
16 of the sad times to acknowledge them.
17 One of my good friends in Judy Jacobs,
18 when she passed away, she was one of my
19 dearest friends, to the point today, it
20 kind of chokes me up. Peter Schmitt as
21 well. Even though Peter and I were
22 sometimes at odds, he would say,
23 Abrahams, you don't know anything. And
24 then he would gavel the end of the
25 meeting and say, what about those

1
2 Yankees? We had a respect. We had a bond
3 outside of the floor.

4 In many occasions, what the public
5 sees is what I like to call the theater.
6 But I think everyone up here has a mutual
7 respect for each other. Obviously, Joe
8 Scannell as well, and many others that
9 have come here and have served. I want to
10 thank them for the opportunity.

11 To my senior staff, we are enriched
12 would attest to this as well as Denise
13 and Laura and everybody here, quite
14 frankly, we are pretty much nothing
15 without them. They are a tremendous asset
16 to us. It goes without saying that they
17 give up their nights, their weekends to
18 ensure that we look the best that we can
19 look. Over the 20 years that there's so
20 much senior staff that goes along. So
21 it's very hard to thank all of them. But
22 definitely the ones that are here today.
23 Bill, Danny, Cecilia, Michelle, Sarah,
24 Tony, Robin, Gabby. And I'm sure I'm
25 missing somebody. I want to thank each

1
2 and every one of you. It warms my heart
3 for what you did today in terms of the
4 celebration luncheon. And I want to
5 continue to thank you again.

6 To my Legislative District 1 staff.
7 I gotta tell you, these two ladies have
8 been with me since day one. Robin Wheat
9 and Sharon Gripper. Many times I have
10 said that they are the Legislator, and I
11 mean that in a joking way, because they
12 have given up their -- forget their
13 Saturdays and Sundays, they would give up
14 Christmas Day for this office. They
15 serve without expecting anything back. I
16 have two tokens of appreciation for both
17 of them. For somebody that's been with
18 you for 20 years, they're not coworkers,
19 they're family. And it's very hard
20 sometimes to try to decide what you want
21 to get for family. But I will say that
22 these two ladies are by far the best
23 things that this district has seen.
24 They're going to be missed. They're
25 going to go on their own paths, but it

1
2 would be a disservice if I did not
3 recognize them today. And I want to thank
4 each and every one of you for being
5 there.

6 (Whereupon, applause.)

7 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: And last but
8 not least, I want to thank the community.
9 You have entrusted me through I can't
10 even remember how many elections. You
11 have entrusted me with your vote. You've
12 entrusted me with your confidence. And I
13 am so appreciative of that.

14 I keep telling everybody I'm not
15 going anywhere. But to some degree, I
16 kind of am. But for the most part, I
17 would be nothing without the people of
18 Uniondale and Roosevelt and Hempstead and
19 Freeport and Baldwin and East Meadow. You
20 guys truly allowed me to stand and be
21 strong without having to worry about an
22 election, advocate for what I believe and
23 what I think you wanted me to advocate
24 fore because it's what you believe. I am
25 truly honored to represent you for the

1
2 last 21 years.

3 It goes without saying, I have to
4 obviously thank my family. My kids made
5 the ultimate sacrifice. Me missing
6 basketball games and chorus events, you
7 name it, theater events. It goes without
8 saying, my wife, that's been very
9 supportive to me, it goes without saying.
10 Even though they couldn't be here today,
11 I want to thank them as well.

12 It's a tough day, I'm happy for this
13 institution. I'm looking forward to my
14 good friend Delia DeRiggi-Whitton
15 stepping in as the Minority Leader. And I
16 think it's an opportunity for the
17 legislature to redefine itself.

18 The Legislature, despite what people
19 see and read, we agree on 98% of the
20 stuff that happens here. It's the 2%
21 that gets written about all the time.

22 But that being said, with four new
23 legislators coming in, it's definitely a
24 new opportunity. You can always make
25 things better. So I know I was kind of

1
2 long, but hey, today's our day. I
3 decided to say a couple things and thank
4 a couple people.

5 But I want to again, Rich, you've
6 been always a stand up guy. You have
7 been always a honor to serve with. I want
8 to continue to thank you as well. But
9 thank you, community. And thank you,
10 senior staff, and thank you to my
11 colleagues. God bless each and every one
12 of you. And I wish you nothing but the
13 best.

14 Thank you again.

15 (Whereupon, applause.)

16 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
17 you, Kevan. I just want to say the
18 feelings are mutual. And absolutely, the
19 respect is mutual; 100%.

20 LEGISLATOR FORD: Well, Kevan, you
21 really brought this into the emotional
22 level.

23 I too, want to say farewell to
24 everyone as well, and to thank everybody
25 who supported me to help me on this

1
2 journey of 20 years of fantastic
3 experiences, learning about so many
4 different aspects of the county, and of
5 course, my district.

6 I want to echo with what both Rich
7 and Kevin said about the people that work
8 here in the county. We have the finest
9 workforce. People that are dedicated to
10 their jobs, willing to do whatever they
11 can to make this county better. They take
12 great pride in the work that they do. Our
13 CSEA workers, our public safety, our
14 police officers, our fire marshals,
15 anybody, whatever department they work
16 in. And I'm going to forget if I keep
17 talking about different departments. But
18 in each and every single -- in all my
19 experiences and encounters with them, I
20 have to say that they really deserve the
21 recognition of being the best, the best
22 workforce in this great country of ours.

23 Also with their supervisors, their
24 department heads that have to sit here.
25 When I first came to this Legislature, we

1
2 were over in one West Street and we would
3 be starting at 10 a.m. and not ending
4 till about 8 or 9:00 at night. And those
5 department heads stayed and still would
6 get up and testify. Me, I probably would
7 have complained or whatever, but they did
8 it with true professionalism. So that
9 only goes to show you the quality of the
10 people that we have working here.

11 When I look at all the staff that
12 works here, I look at both sides of the
13 aisle -- and Robin, I want to wish you
14 and Sharon good luck with your
15 retirements, because I always had a great
16 occasion of working with you, Robin. And
17 it really was always a very, very
18 positive one. But even on our side with
19 our staff, when I think of all the people
20 that support us and like Rich said, they
21 help us to look good. Despite the times
22 that we call them, we ask them to do
23 certain things, they're always at the
24 ready. And I know Chris Ostuni is going
25 to miss my calling him up at all times of

1
2 the night, every weekend, whether he's on
3 vacation or not. I do actually start out
4 with saying, I hope you're not on
5 vacation, but if you are, I need to have
6 this taken care of.

7 Meredith, who also has to field my
8 phone calls. When I look, I'm looking
9 over there. I'm probably going to forget
10 everybody but Bill Florio Mary Studdard,
11 we have Frank Maroney, Kevin Ryan, Rob,
12 there's numerous. And even with our
13 clerk, Mike, thank you very much. And
14 with all the legislators that I work
15 with, they have right from the beginning.

16 When I first came here, I worked
17 with such a phenomenal group of
18 legislators. Over the years they have
19 changed. But still, I have to say, I'm
20 working with the best of the best and on
21 both sides of the aisle. And Kevan,
22 you're right, we always got along. We
23 were always friends. We may argue, but
24 that was always left here up at the dais
25 when we had to go out and interact with

1
2 one another. And I have to say that we
3 truly are friends.

4 I also have to give special
5 recognition to my aide, Patty Dunham.
6 We've been together for 15 years, and I
7 have to say -- she's leaving with me as
8 well. People don't realize that they are
9 the first line in our job. They are the
10 ones that received the initial phone
11 call. They have no idea who's on the
12 other side of the telephone line, what
13 kind of mood they're in, are they going
14 to complain or whatever. And they have to
15 think at that split second, how to be
16 able to handle each and every single
17 phone call with professionalism. And I
18 have to say that it's not just me that
19 feels that she does a good job, but it's
20 my public when I when I am out in my
21 community, people will always comment on
22 how she has handled them, how she has
23 worked with them. And yes, not only do
24 they take care of things in the office,
25 but there are times, especially after

1
2 Sandy, Patty would take forms to people's
3 homes to make sure that they got these
4 forms and that they needed to do so they
5 would be able to secure the funding in
6 order to rebuild from that storm. She has
7 consistently gone above and beyond, in
8 the job that she has done. And Patty,
9 it's going to be tough of us separating,
10 but we both will still be living in Long
11 Beach. And even when I look at Dan McCloy
12 and then when we look even with the
13 Ursula and Pete who also have had to --
14 Rich, I don't want to tell you, but
15 they've had to help me out a number of
16 times as well, and they always did.

17 So to all of you, thank you very
18 much for giving me 20 years with the job
19 that I truly love and that I will always
20 miss. And I wish each and every single
21 one of you good luck.

22 And I know we have two legislators
23 that may be moving on, so when you do, I
24 want to be I want to come to your final
25 Legislative hearing.

1
2 And Rich, thank you very much for
3 your guidance. You helped me in the
4 caucus when we first came, we had a lot
5 of good conversations. And it's always
6 the friendship that we had. Kevan, we
7 started out together as well.

8 So I know that we're leaving this
9 county in good hands with those that are
10 staying here and with the new legislators
11 that are coming on. And I'm very thankful
12 to my district for making this especially
13 sweet to leave, because I know that the
14 legislator who will be taking over for me
15 will do an outstanding job, and I know
16 that they will be in good hands and I
17 think that they'll reap the rewards of
18 his professionalism and the character
19 that he has.

20 So to all of you, good luck and
21 enjoy the holidays. And I am signing off
22 for the last time. Thank you.

23 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
24 Legislator Schaefer.

25 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Yes. Thank

1
2 you. So I was fine earlier. Now I have
3 three people I had to listen to, and I'm
4 thinking things and feeling things. No,
5 no, there's so many things I could echo
6 the same sentiments for. Everybody here
7 brings a unique perspective to the table.
8 It's really been a pleasure to work with
9 people who I've worked with from day one,
10 and then people that have come in since
11 then. I'm excited for the new people
12 that are coming in the new legislature
13 that we're going to have. I can say for
14 the three people we have on our side,
15 they're great and they're really going to
16 contribute great things to this
17 legislature and to this county. So I'm
18 excited for the County as well.

19 I also want to thank the staff. The
20 county government staff is just
21 incredible. As was said, anytime we
22 needed something, anytime my office
23 needed something or I needed something, I
24 could just pick up the phone and call
25 people. Even if I needed to call a couple

1
2 of people to figure out who to talk to,
3 you could do that and you'd get the help
4 you needed. Whether it was a snowstorm or
5 it was Covid or things that were going or
6 just anything that was happening. People
7 are responsive and they really try and do
8 the right thing, and that's what you need
9 to make a county work. So I do want to
10 say thank you to everybody and everybody
11 who sits here every week, as well as Rich
12 was saying and listens to us. It's a
13 challenge, we know that. So thank you for
14 your patience.

15 And again for our staff, our
16 attorneys. I'll have to say about Chris
17 as well. I've called Chris at times that
18 I say, if you're at home or you're sick
19 and somehow he has an amazing way of
20 making it sound like he doesn't care.
21 He's totally happy to help you, even if
22 he's on his deathbed. He's just like, no,
23 no, no, I'm good. I'll help you, what do
24 you need? So that thank you so much for
25 that. And certainly for Meredith and Dan

1
2 and then for Bill Muller as well. You've
3 always been there with incredible help
4 and getting answers for us when we didn't
5 have them. And our PR staff who makes us,
6 as was said, makes us look good. And you
7 guys go above and beyond as well to help
8 us to do what we have to do to be out
9 there in the community and make sure that
10 we get out in the community, even if it's
11 digitally or whatever we have to do.

12 Billy, for all the videos that you did
13 with me, that was a lot of fun. And our
14 staff, everybody's individual staff has
15 been helpful as well. Everybody's always
16 there to answer questions.

17 And for the relationships that I've
18 developed, I'm really happy about that.
19 I'm very happy that Legislator Bynoe and
20 I became friends because now she's my
21 legislator. We'll probably have to talk
22 occasionally. You know, it's just been a
23 pleasure.

24 Office of Budget, thank you so much
25 for your well wishes. I know you guys

1
2 sent me a card. I do really appreciate
3 that.

4 I'm really grateful to have had this
5 opportunity. It's given me a lot of
6 unique experiences that I'm sure I never
7 would have had if I just practiced law or
8 chose something else in life. There's no
9 way I would have experienced some of the
10 things that I've experienced with people
11 learning about people, learning about
12 dealing and working with different types
13 of people. It's just been ten years of
14 growth for me and I'm very appreciative
15 of that because I think life is all about
16 growth. And if you don't look to move
17 further and farther in your life than,
18 you're standing still, and that's never
19 good.

20 So I am looking forward to moving
21 on. But it's definitely bittersweet in
22 some ways, although mostly sweet. No,
23 it's definitely going to be great. I'm
24 not going anywhere either, like Kevan was
25 saying. So you never know where any of us

1
2 will pop up. Like I said the last time,
3 maybe right out there saying something to
4 the Legislature, having something to
5 complain about. Wouldn't you love that?

6 But anyway, thank you, everyone, for
7 all that you've done. Rich, thank you for
8 your leadership. I remember when I heard
9 that you were going to be our presiding
10 officer. I was really, really excited
11 about that because I think you're just
12 such a gentleman. You just have such a
13 wonderful way about you. And I think
14 you're really an incredible leader. So
15 thank you.

16 And Rose, who was my buddy in
17 Hicksville and Bethpage, you know, you
18 know, we're going to stay friends and
19 there's no way that's changing. And
20 everybody, I hope to be able to see
21 everybody in different places in life.
22 And I wish you all the best.

23 Thank you.

24 LEGISLATOR WALKER: And I'm sure you
25 probably don't want to hear from all of

1
2 us. Being one of the senior legislators,
3 now, four of them are moving on, but I,
4 too, want to congratulate each and every
5 one of you. Thank you for all you've
6 done for each and every one of us who sit
7 here. Many of us have reached out to you
8 for questions or concerns that we had.
9 Can you go over this with one of us? Can
10 you explain this? Can you help us with
11 this issue? Where our districts cross
12 paths, we work together on so many
13 issues.

14 Kevan, I'm going to miss talking
15 about my grandkids' sports and your
16 children's sports because we overlap
17 there, even though it's my next
18 generation. I will keep you posted on,
19 uh, my little Aiden going to your alma
20 mater and how he's doing over there at
21 Saint Dom's.

22 Denise, you and I started our our
23 careers together. Although I spent the
24 first six years over in the Town of
25 Oyster Bay. We worked together from the

1
2 very get go.

3 Laura and I shared the district,
4 like she said in Hicksville and Bethpage,
5 and we continue to work together, and I
6 know we'll continue to work together,
7 even though she'll no longer be a
8 legislator.

9 And as Laura said, Rich, you had
10 such leadership for each and every one of
11 us, and we cannot thank you enough. So on
12 behalf of all of us here on the
13 Legislature, we wish you the very, very
14 best of luck in your future that you're
15 heading off to and know that we will
16 always be here for you, as we know you'll
17 be here for us. And we will miss you
18 being here with us. But our friendships
19 will last forever. So thank you again for
20 everything.

21 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
22 you, all. Thank you, Rose.

4 Maria Jordan Awalom.

5 MS. AWALOM: Good afternoon.

6 My name is Maria Jordan Awalom. I'm
7 a Freeport resident and proud president
8 of the Freeport School District Board of
9 Education. As a 33-year resident of the
10 village of Freeport, there is so much
11 that I have learned and experienced while
12 living in an incorporated village. We all
13 know that local elections truly matter,
14 but most importantly, the people who we
15 elect to represent us matter.

16 I'm here today to briefly speak on
17 how our minority leader, Legislator Kevan
18 Abrahams, kept the residents of the

1

1
2 you know, your staff became family to
3 many of us.

4 Miss Sharon, I appreciate you
5 deeply, and it has been an absolute
6 pleasure to have partnered and
7 volunteered on so many events with you
8 ladies.

9 Miss Robin Wheat, all I can say is
10 that I'm blessed that I met you. You are
11 truly an amazing person.

12 Legislator Abrahams, I know this may
13 be the end of a long chapter, but it's
14 definitely just the beginning of your
15 book. Wherever the path of public service
16 takes you, just know that you have an
17 army ready to help and fight alongside
18 you.

19 Forever thankful to you, our
20 Minority Leader Legislator Kevin
21 Abrahams, for many years of true
22 dedication to us. Your constituents thank
23 you. Thank you.

24 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Maria, I just
25 want to I just want to take the

1
2 opportunity to thank you. You do a
3 tremendous job with the school district,
4 and it speaks volumes. And many of the
5 stuff that you talked about is a
6 partnership working with everyone. And
7 Sharon and Robin, I could go on for days
8 about how great they are. They are an
9 extension of being able to work within
10 their community. The community,
11 everything that we've been able to do.

12 We still have one more event that's
13 coming up on Saturday. A day of giving
14 for those that are a little less
15 unfortunate, it never ends. I'm so
16 appreciative of you for not just being
17 here today, but for all the things that
18 you do and establishing a very strong
19 partnership with our office. But thank
20 you again.

21 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
22 you.

23 Nancy Youngfert.

24 MS. YOUNGFERT: Good afternoon,
25 ladies and gentlemen. I want to say

1
2 congratulations to those who are leaving.
3 I know some of you, you've seen my face
4 here before.

5 I'm here today as a resident of
6 Nassau County, Franklin Square, and the
7 president of the Franklin Square
8 Historical Society and Museum. We have a
9 museum that's been opened -- took 15
10 years to build it -- we've been open now
11 for about a year and a half.

12 Back in September of 2021, I'm here
13 today to ask you, I don't think you've
14 got the answers to all my questions, but
15 I'm going to ask them anyway, we
16 submitted our paperwork for two grants
17 that came through the Boost Covid relief.
18 The first one was it was strictly for not
19 for profits. It was for \$10,000 we
20 received that. We were beyond ecstatic
21 because that helped us keep the doors
22 open during Covid.

23 The second grant was for 127,000,
24 also only for not for profits. We
25 submitted and I think September of 2021

1
2 and we've heard nothing. I have been in
3 contact with Dr. Regina Williams. She was
4 your boost administrator. I do believe
5 that's her title, Dr. Regina Williams,
6 not heard anything. And then I was
7 astounded to hear in *Newsday* that
8 Blakeman is planning on using it for one
9 offs. One concert. One, I don't know
10 what. Whatever it is, whatever it is he's
11 planning on doing with it. And in the
12 meantime, the shovel ready projects that
13 we've had waiting may not receive any
14 kind of funding at all.

15 So I'm asking you, do you know how
16 many not for profits applied for that
17 second grant? Do you know what the total
18 of that amount of money would have been?
19 And do we have any reason to still
20 believe that we might be receiving some
21 of that money? And if not, I want to know
22 why. It was federal money passed through
23 to the County to give out to not for
24 profits. I'm still waiting to know what
25 happened. Anybody want to take a shot at

1
2 it? Thank you. You're supposed to be
3 voting on this, I think sometime today.

4 LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: No, we're not
5 voting on this. But I do understand your
6 concerns. I did get your letter dated
7 December 6th. I have made inquiries of
8 the administration. I have not gotten
9 answers yet, but they are looking into
10 it. And I will get back to you to find
11 out whether the grant was approved. If
12 so, where the money is and what the
13 holdup is.

14 MS. YOUNGFERT: Thank you, I
15 appreciate that. Thanks very much.

16 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Just
17 just to be clear that there is an item on
18 the Calendar for \$10 million later on.
19 We're not voting on the full spending,
20 and we're not voting on spending with
21 respect to nonprofits. But there is an
22 item on the Calendar.

23 MS. YOUNGFERT: Well, the 10 million
24 is supposed to be for these events.

25 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: You're

1
2 correct. I just want to make sure that
3 you didn't think that it was not on the
4 Calendar. It is on the Calendar.
5 Although, the lion's share of the ARPA
6 funds still remains outstanding.

7 MS. YOUNGFERT: All right. Thank you
8 very much.

9 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Dan
10 Oppenheimer.

11 MR. OPPENHEIMER: Good afternoon.
12 I'm on the same topic. Just to confirm
13 Resolution 250, is that the resolution
14 for the transfer of \$10 million from
15 Covid 19 funds?

16 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: You
17 can go ahead and speak. I'll just confirm
18 that they got the right resolution number
19 (perusing).

20 Yes. That's it. You're right.

21 MR. OPPENHEIMER: Okay.

22 As mentioned in *Newsday*, it appears
23 that the County Executive has identified
24 a critical shortage of golf tournaments
25 and car shows and concerts that requires

1
2 an immediate infusion of \$10 million to
3 correct this this terrible shortfall.

4 You may think this is not a very
5 good attempt at humor, but it seems
6 pretty ludicrous to me that this funding,
7 \$10 million of Covid 19 relief funding
8 would even be considered for these
9 purposes. Yes, there are budget lines
10 that the County has established for all
11 manner of veteran service, mental health
12 services, substance abuse. But can you
13 say that all of these have entirely
14 adequate budgets, and that you should not
15 consider putting money into those areas
16 instead of tourism, which could easily be
17 boosted by a modest matching fund for
18 private commercial enterprises, so that
19 if some someone like UBS or Sands Casino
20 set aside a large amount of investment
21 for tourism purposes, the County could
22 put a small matching amount to go along
23 with that.

24 While the funds may be approved for
25 tourism -- apparently legally you can use

1
2 these funds for that -- I would ask each
3 of you, you serve on various
4 subcommittees for seniors, for public
5 housing, for mental health. And when you
6 vote for appropriations for these special
7 areas, would you rather that the money
8 goes to a car show or a golf tournament?
9 Or would you think maybe it should go for
10 public safety?

11 How about technology? A lot of the
12 towns and villages throughout Long
13 Island, Nassau and Suffolk, are subject
14 to potential dangers from cyber
15 incursions within the government. Maybe
16 you should look at putting \$10 million
17 into upgrading the security within the
18 computer systems within the county.

19 So if you're not going to vote on it
20 today, I'm getting mixed message, I would
21 like you to confirm whether you were
22 going to approve yes or no, whether this
23 money is going to be transferred.

24 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: It
25 will be voted on later. What legislators

1
2 choose to vote at that time, they'll
3 choose to vote, but it will be on the
4 Calendar. It will be subject to a vote.

5 MR. OPPENHEIMER: Thank you.

6 LEGISLATOR FORD: Chris Jacobs.

7 MR. JACOBS: Good afternoon, Chris
8 Jacobs, Uniondale, New York.

9 I concur with the previous speakers
10 about the \$10 million being voted on from
11 the *Newday* article that County Executive
12 Blakeman wanted to use that for car shows
13 and concerts and golf tournaments. In my
14 opinion, Nassau County already has plenty
15 of that. We have concerts every week at
16 Eisenhower Park during the summertime.
17 We have car shows, and we have athletic
18 events all throughout parks throughout
19 Nassau County.

20 I think that money can be used for
21 better things. Such as, like they said,
22 the homeless crisis and mental health. I
23 mean, we just honored the two detectives
24 who helped that young lady who was having
25 a mental breakdown. So to sit there and

1
2 say, you know, good work, detectives, but
3 we're not allocating any money for the
4 people who are having that problem is a
5 bit of a misnomer to me.

6 I think we can use that for camera
7 technology and other things like that to
8 make our county a much safer place. New
9 York City uses cameras for everything,
10 speed restriction and security. And
11 Nassau County, we are limited on that.
12 All we have red light cameras. And that's
13 why our police have to do so much work
14 because we have a lack of technology,
15 which I think we can invest in.

16 Other than that, like I said,
17 hopefully we're able to use that money
18 correctly as opposed to adding golf
19 tournaments. I'm an avid car guy too, but
20 something we can also invest in is those
21 noise cameras that basically catch those
22 people. Every day I get these cars
23 driving past me, blacked out windows to
24 have those cars backfiring. And nobody
25 likes that. I don't like it, nobody likes

1
2 that, so maybe we can put it towards
3 that. So in my opinion, it can be used
4 for much better usage.

5 And that's all I have to say. Have a
6 great afternoon.

7 LEGISLATOR FORD: All right. Thank
8 you.

9 Pearl Jacobs.

10 MS. JACOBS: I wish all the
11 Legislators who are moving on a happy and
12 healthy life, and prosperous as well.

13 As a result of last week's Appellate
14 Court ruling, the County should now
15 follow all laws and complete the secret
16 process in an open and transparent
17 manner, then follow the open Meetings law
18 and revote on the lease transfer. We are
19 confident that once residents of Nassau
20 County fully understand the many harmful
21 implications of this massive casino, you,
22 as a Legislative Body, will follow the
23 will of the people and vote no on the
24 leased transfer.

25 As you are aware, Uniondale, the

1
2 host community for this project, has been
3 identified as a community that has been
4 disproportionately affected by high
5 levels of air pollution, primarily
6 attributed to high vehicle emissions. The
7 New York State Department of
8 Environmental Conservation Traffic Study,
9 June 2022 to August 2023 revealed that on
10 average, 100,000 to 130,000 vehicles
11 traveled through Uniondale daily.
12 Roadways studied where Hempstead
13 Turnpike, Meadowbrook Parkway in the
14 Northern State Parkway. How would adding
15 20,000 plus vehicles daily improve
16 Uniondale traffic and air quality issues?
17 Asthma rates among union youth infants to
18 17 years old is at 17% in the top three
19 of highest asthma rates among youths,
20 only behind Hempstead and Roosevelt, who
21 was higher than 17%. Two other New York
22 State Department of Environmental
23 Conservation identified as identifying
24 disadvantaged communities: Hempstead and
25 Roosevelt.

1
2 Building this mega casino project in
3 Uniondale's backyard in environmentally
4 disadvantaged community would be nothing
5 other than environmental racism.

6 Concerning Blakeman's proposal to
7 use \$10 million of Covid relief funds for
8 the County's 125th year celebration of
9 the County's break away from Queens is
10 another bad idea. The surplus and Covid
11 relief funds should be used for the
12 plethora of social issues that are
13 currently destroying our county: Opioid
14 and drug addiction, alcoholism, suicide
15 prevention, homelessness, veterans
16 services and, yes, gambling addiction,
17 which is rising right here in Nassau
18 County.

19 Our county needs to address the
20 out-of-control traffic accidents and the
21 increase in traffic fatalities. Covid
22 relief monies can be used to save lives
23 by investing in camera technology that
24 will insist in mitigating accidents and
25 deaths on our roadways. So yes, he's

1
2 celebrating being separated from Queens,
3 but New York City has a lot over us
4 because at least they're addressing their
5 fatalities and the numbers are going
6 down.

7 Thank you.

8 LEGISLATOR FORD: Monica Kiely.

9 MS. KIELY: Good afternoon.

10 Congratulations to the two brave
11 officers who talked that 17-year-old
12 young woman off the bridge and prevented
13 her from committing suicide.

14 As many of you up here know, I'm
15 opposed to the Sands casino proposal, and
16 I think it's going to come back around in
17 front of you legislators again. And I
18 hope that this time you will really
19 consider your vote and vote your
20 conscience this time. There is a
21 connection between what you do up there
22 and what happens in real life. There's a
23 connection between gambling and suicide
24 and crime and safety for our residents,
25 and what our police officers are called

1
2 upon to do. Thank God they don't have to
3 talk somebody off a bridge every weekend.
4 But we don't want more lives at risk. We
5 don't want their lives at risk.

6 Up to half of the individuals in
7 treatment for gambling disorder have
8 suicidal ideation. 20% of US adults with
9 gambling problems have attempted suicide
10 in the last year. We have a national
11 suicide epidemic. Gambling addiction
12 rates, sadly, are rising, and the more
13 available gambling is, the more gambling
14 addicts we will create right here at home
15 and we will be dealing with them.

16 To quote professor Earl Grinols,
17 which please look this man up, he's not
18 paid for by the gambling industry. He
19 does independent research and he's
20 excellent. And his name is spelled
21 G-R-I-N-O-L-S. Look him up. To quote him,
22 "it is impossible to offer a casino
23 without creating additional social
24 problems and pathological gamblers.
25 Problem gamblers create elevated crime

1
2 and suicide. The social costs are high".
3 Legislators, please reconsider your vote
4 next time around.

5 Regarding the \$10 million party that
6 Bruce Blakeman wants to throw, Richard
7 Nicolello, you, during the hearings last
8 spring, characterized the economy here in
9 Nassau County as, "teetering on the brink
10 of recession". Well, first of all, if
11 you're teetering on the brink of
12 recession at casinos, the last thing you
13 want here. But I'll just go with the
14 false premise that casinos help your
15 economy. So which is it? Are we teetering
16 on the brink of recession, or are we big
17 fat Nassau County, let's throw a \$10
18 million party. Which one is it? Okay. I'm
19 done. Thank you.

20 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Lynn
21 Krug.

22 MS. KRUG: Good afternoon. I'd like
23 to speak on two issues today. Other
24 people have already spoken, but I have my
25 own spin on this.

1
2 Now that the effort to rush the
3 casino project through has been
4 interrupted, I hope that this legislative
5 group will realize a few things. Saying
6 over and over that there's community
7 support for a casino with any size in the
8 heart of our suburban Nassau County.
9 Doesn't make it true. Hearing these
10 falsehoods from the head of the
11 Construction and Trade Council is to be
12 expected. If you read about him in the
13 newspaper or the news, it was despicable.
14 Hearing it from our elected leaders is
15 just unconscionable. Everyone here has
16 seen the polls. Only a minority of Nassau
17 residents support this folly. If there
18 was a referendum on this in Nassau
19 County, we all know it would fail.

20 Number two is an illusion of a done
21 deal has now been exposed. As a process
22 restarts and more light shines on this
23 project, more people will learn how it
24 will hurt our quality of life and
25 property values. So I'm taking this

1
2 opportunity, that you reconsider your
3 support for this ill-considered project
4 and vote with the people instead of the
5 big money.

6 Secondly, I'd like to comment, as
7 other people before me have said on the
8 \$10 million project or party that Mr.
9 Blakeman is proposing using Covid
10 recovery funds on anniversary parties and
11 advertising. What do anniversary
12 celebrations have to do with recovering
13 from Covid? We all know who is served by
14 this advertising. Just look at the name
15 in the largest block letters in every ad,
16 on every pencil at the golf courses.
17 Using taxpayer dollars in this way is
18 shameful. There are so many needs in this
19 county. The highest purpose and best use
20 of \$10 million is parades and
21 advertising? We have infrastructure that
22 needs rebuilding and a hospital that
23 needs updating, among other things. I'd
24 rather see the money go back to the
25 taxpayers than to see it spent on

1
2 self-serving TV ads for so-called
3 celebrations.

4 We have a water crisis in this
5 county. Let's address it. Let's spend the
6 money to fix the PFAs and get these wells
7 so that everyone has a safe, healthful
8 life.

9 Thank you for listening, and I hope
10 you really vote with your conscience. As
11 I've always said at every meeting I've
12 attended to, this is your legacy, people
13 will remember how you voted.

14 Thank you.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
16 Mariano Ugalde.

17 MR. UGLADE: Good afternoon. My
18 name is Mariano Ugalde, I'm the president
19 of the Uniondale Chamber of Commerce.

20 I'm here because I really want to
21 thank Legislator Abrahams office for all
22 their support to our chamber, to our
23 neighborhood. I don't know what to say.
24 Robin knows how I feel about this. Your
25 staff is superb. We deal with a lot of

1
2 government offices up and down the state,
3 even on federal level. But your office is
4 superb. Talk about a staff that goes
5 well beyond whatever their criteria is
6 for the job. Calls on the weekend, calls
7 back at night. It's just a tireless
8 effort to get to the bottom of whatever
9 the issue is. It ranges from so many
10 things, in some cases just connecting
11 other people from Uniondale to your
12 office.

13 But I really can't thank you enough.
14 Really. Thank you for all the effort you
15 put in. It's just been a remarkable
16 relationship working with your office.
17 Really, good luck wherever you go next.
18 And you'll definitely be missed as well
19 as your staff.

20 Thank you, Sharon. Thank you, Robin.

21 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Mariano, I
22 just want to thank you again. From
23 everything that we do, it's only done
24 with partnerships like the with the
25 Chamber and other communities and civic

1
2 associations. I think about the National
3 Night Out when we did at Uniondale, but
4 we moved it from at the time it was in
5 Freeport. Most thought it was going to be
6 a challenge and it was going to be tough
7 to do it. But the community came together
8 and it's probably one of our most
9 successful events of the year.

10 I keep telling people I'm not going
11 anywhere, and you guys are making this
12 really tough on me today. Because I
13 wasn't anticipating this. But I want to
14 thank you for your for your service and
15 your partnership and working with these
16 two classy ladies and being able to do
17 what you do.

18 I know earlier too, Charles and
19 LeVar were here. Those guys, they didn't
20 want to speak. I guess they were a little
21 too proud, but you know what I mean.
22 Those guys too. The backpack events,
23 everything we do in Freeport, those guys
24 are great, too. Nothing gets done
25 without you guys. I just want to thank

1
2 you from the bottom of my heart again.

3 MR. UGLADE: Same here. Thank you to
4 you and your staff. And the best to
5 wherever you guys go. And for your staff,
6 their retirement is well deserved.

7 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you.
8 I'll let them know. Thank you, Mariano.

9 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Meta
10 Mereday.

11 MS. MEREDAY: Good afternoon.

12 I do share in the thanks or
13 congratulations or well wishes for those
14 who are moving on. It's often a
15 transition sometimes. It's good that the
16 number of you are able to walk away,
17 since some who have served,
18 unfortunately, kind of, you know, left
19 too soon. When Judith Jacob's name was
20 brought up, that definitely hit a chord
21 with me because she was very responsive
22 to the needs of the residents of Nassau
23 County and she's definitely missed here.
24 I wish those well who are moving on.
25 Buckle up for those who are staying.

1
2 Those who are coming on board, 2024 is
3 going to be a significant year. I know
4 Kevan is wiping the sweat off his brow.

5 But we've got issues, folks, we got
6 issues. Residents have brought up about
7 the medical center, have had state
8 officials who have been told by Nassau
9 County that that medical facility itself
10 is beyond repair. I'm sorry, why are we
11 continuing to see friends, relatives,
12 donors and patrons who are getting
13 \$200,000 jobs plus benefits to bolster
14 something that is dead in the water?
15 That's a problem for me.

16 The casino. I'm waiting for plan B,
17 I said it here. I've said it to all those
18 who have tried to feed me breakfast,
19 lunch, dinner, outside of this facility.
20 We need a plan B, okay. It's the Nassau
21 County Veterans Memorial Coliseum. Okay?
22 Our veterans still would not be able, in
23 most part, to cross that threshold.
24 They're dying at 44 per day; 44 per day.
25 I was on the phone yesterday with the

1
2 family of a 97-year-old war widow who got
3 a 20 page document from Veterans Affairs.
4 They're trying to claw back a little bit
5 of money that they give her that she
6 earned per month. That's an issue that
7 we're facing here in Nassau County. We
8 got veterans facing eviction, but the
9 County Executive wants to give us,
10 someone said, a \$10 million party, but we
11 can't put out, what, \$2 million to do a
12 study to address the empty facility that
13 sits over there at the medical center
14 that our crowded, overworked, hard
15 working Veteran Services Agency could use
16 what may be transitional housing, daycare
17 support services, military and family
18 resource center that other places in this
19 region -- I read in *Newsday*, and as I
20 stand here, somebody is stealing the
21 money before you even give Bruce the \$10
22 million, because you're going to give it
23 to him. So just keep it honest. Keep it
24 real. You're going to give him the money.
25 You know, I would like to think you're

1
2 going to think differently with residents
3 standing here, but you're going to give
4 it to them. Let's keep it real.

5 We need to change the dynamic. We
6 need to do a better job. And we talk
7 about saluting our officers. We don't
8 give them cars, they're still riding
9 three. And this will be the last time
10 that I'm asking for my little privilege
11 here.

12 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Well,
13 You were saying nice things about us
14 before we get some extra time (laughter).

15 MS. MEREDAY: Okay, I appreciate it.
16 Thank you so much.

17 Okay, so we're saluting our officers
18 here, but, you know, they're riding two
19 and three a car. And if you talk to the
20 local on the ground patrolman, they have
21 a problem with this casino. They're going
22 to have to man that, but you're going to
23 have three in the car. So what is the
24 person going to do if they arrest
25 somebody? You're going to put the

1
2 officer in the trunk? Let's give them
3 some cars. Let's give them some
4 resources. Let's change the dynamic.

5 You've got an element here to change
6 the alcohol sales date. We've got a
7 gambling problem, an alcohol problem, a
8 mental health problem. Has anybody seen
9 where drug and alcohol actually sits in
10 Nassau County? It's not in a big office
11 with windows. They don't have a lot of
12 staffing.

13 Again, let's buckle up. Let's do
14 what we need to do. Let's build out a
15 genuine, bona fide facility, veteran and
16 family services at that medical center.
17 Let's do what we need to do. Let's not do
18 the \$10 million for him because it's for
19 him. It's not for us.

20 And all those who are moving on,
21 maternal health. So if you want to be in
22 Congress, you better think about what's
23 happening to women of color with maternal
24 health. Black women are dying three times
25 more than the national average. So if

1
2 you're not speaking up here in Nassau
3 County, I can't see how you're going to
4 do much for me in Washington, D.C..

5 And lastly, I also want to recognize
6 Josh Lafazan. Young man, keep up the good
7 work. Wherever you land, you will
8 prosper.

9 Everybody have a happy holiday. And
10 since Christmas is my birthday, I
11 celebrate me. I brought my stocking and
12 if you want to stuff some money in
13 something, give it to me.

14 Thank you very much.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
16 you, Meta.

17 Susan Kaye.

18 MS. KAYE: I am against the casino.
19 I have spoken at this meeting time and
20 time again. You're going to hear me
21 again.

22 Mr. Blakeman, you are trying to buy
23 your way for the idiotic, stupid casino
24 of Sands that nobody wants.

25 You're wasting \$10 million that

1
2 could be used for a crisis that is very
3 underground that nobody is talking about.
4 But I'm bringing it up. We have a crisis
5 in the state of young women from 20 to
6 39, diagnosed with breast cancer, very
7 late stages. They cannot get mammograms
8 because they're under the age. That \$10
9 million that you want to go for a stupid
10 party could be used into research as to
11 why many of these women are ending up
12 with stage three and four. There was a
13 woman who was on something on Netflix at
14 the age of 19 diagnosed with breast
15 cancer.

16 I can think of many projects that we
17 could do instead of building a stupid
18 casino. Build an allied health center
19 that Memorial Sloan-Kettering would love,
20 and other things. Have a Reiki in there,
21 continuing education, emotional freedom,
22 tapping, Reiki. Many other things than
23 building this stupid casino which causes
24 gambling addiction.

25 Somebody who I graduated high school

1
2 with happens to be a gambling addiction
3 counsel in the state of Delaware. Maybe
4 we should have him come down here, talk
5 at the next legislative meeting.

6 And I commend Delia DeWhicky (sic)
7 the only legislative (sic) who voted with
8 your heart and voted no to the casino.
9 And I will be back next year to talk
10 more.

11 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Gary
12 Levine.

13 MR. LEVINE: Where did Denise escape
14 off to? I wanted to thank all for being
15 the template of what a legislator is all
16 about. I'm not sure where she's at, but
17 her and Patty, they killed it. That man
18 over there is going to do some good
19 things, I know it. I've gotten to know
20 Patrick over the last couple of months.

21 I'm going to be here every month
22 about the Nassau County Back Bay study.
23 And Bruce Blakeman gets an F minus. He's
24 too busy taking pictures. I had a six
25 foot wave hit the back of my house during

1
2 Sandy. Nothing's been done. I told you,
3 folks, it's the most important
4 infrastructure project that we could
5 possibly do for our generation, our kids
6 and our grandkids. Nobody's done anything
7 but Denise Ford. Nobody. Nobody. And
8 that's pathetic. Whether you're a North
9 shore, mid shore, south shore, it affects
10 every Long Islander. So tell Bruce
11 Blakeman on his own website, it's a 217
12 page voluminous document. Tell him to
13 read it. Tell him to pick up the phone
14 and call Chuck Schumer. Maybe Chuck
15 Schumer will do something besides trying
16 to get reelected again and again and
17 again, because that guy's clueless.

18 Rich, you did a great job leading
19 this Legislature. I'm proud to know you.
20 But as far as the Nassau County Back Bay
21 story, you guys need to wake up. You need
22 to wake up. We need sea gates. We need
23 sea berms. Pardon me, flood gates. We
24 need berms. We need dunes. We need
25 levees. Go to New Orleans. Drive to New

1
2 Bedford like I've done three times. They
3 work. They haven't flooded since. We have
4 not done a thing since Sandy.

5 Now in my village of Island Park,
6 our Mayor has done a bang up job with the
7 Renaissance, handling all the inside
8 stuff. But I was on record as saying we
9 need to fix where the water comes from
10 first. We need a seagate in the
11 intersection in Jones Inlet. We need a
12 barrier at the intersection of Hogg's
13 Channel and Reynolds Channel. And I'm
14 going to be here every month to find out
15 what any of you have done.

16 Josh Lafazan, be proud of what
17 you've done, son. You're awesome, bro.
18 Now. I wish you would have called me
19 back, but I understood why you didn't.
20 You had to race to go after. I expect
21 great things from you.

22 But seriously, the red light
23 cameras, I'm going to finish what my late
24 dad started. Okay. I am hereby declaring
25 that "We the People" will be the third

1
2 political party in Nassau. And I am
3 declaring that I am going to be in the
4 running to become the next county
5 executive in 22 short months.

6 Thank you.

7 MR. LEVINE: Gary, we have a speaker
8 in the back, I had to take an important
9 call. No disrespect to you, but I want
10 to thank you very much for your kind
11 words on behalf of myself and Patty.

12 MR. LEVINE: My late dad, too. He
13 would have said the same thing if he was
14 here.

15 LEGISLATOR FORD: Your father, Judge
16 Levine, was just a phenomenal individual,
17 and I loved working with him. Your
18 parents, I remember them at the senior
19 center and everything. They touched my
20 heart, and so do you. And I wish you good
21 luck with everything.

22 But I know that with the back
23 bays -- and I live right on the West End.
24 We can throw rocks at one another --
25 that's something that we had advocated

1
2 for right at the beginning. I know I
3 believe Mayor Kennedy down in Freeport
4 was also.

5 MR. LEVINE: He's the liaison with
6 Congress and Anthony D'Esposito's big
7 time involved.

8 LEGISLATOR FORD: This really falls
9 to the federal government. We need to
10 have that with the Army Corps of
11 Engineers, EPA. We'll keep advocating on
12 behalf of that.

13 MR. LEVINE: I need you guys to
14 write a letter to Chuck Schumer tomorrow.

15 LEGISLATOR FORD: A lot of the FEMA
16 money has been spent on doing the
17 bulkheads and whatever.

18 MR. LEVINE: Denise, this is
19 trillions of dollars. I've gotten this
20 study to every public official from the
21 Rockaways to Montauk at my own time and
22 expense. You know how much it costs to
23 print up 217 pages at a dime apiece? My
24 own expense. Every public official has
25 it. Every public official says, let's get

1
2 going on it. I need you as a body,
3 whether you're mid shore, south shore and
4 north shore. Put your name. We need these
5 gates. Drive to New Bedford, go up to
6 Cape Cod while you're at it. It's
7 wonderful. I did a clinic there last
8 weekend. But New Bedford got it right.
9 They haven't flooded since.

10 And the last thing we need to do is
11 we need to eliminate towns. We need to
12 combine them with the County. Their
13 superfluous, their waste. There's deputy
14 commissioners making high six figures.
15 Deputies to deputy commissioners look at
16 the Town of Hempstead roster. The last
17 names are disgusting. Eliminate the
18 towns. Do more with less.

19 And also I plan on taking on the
20 school unions. And I also plan on taking
21 the administrative unions. We need to
22 lower school taxes.

23 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. You
24 have a lot on your plate and good luck
25 with all of that.

MR. LEVINE: It's all going to get
done.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Have a good
holiday season and happy New Year.

MR. LEVINE: God bless you.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
you. Gary.

1
2 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: There
3 are a couple of items on the Full

the Full Legislature respond in
favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: They
are carried unanimously.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

Calendar number one. It's a hearing on a proposed local law to amend Section 21-11.4 of Title D of Chapter 21 of the Nassau County Administrative Code, as amended by Local Law 3, in relation to Home Improvement License applicants.

Need a motion to open the hearing, Legislator Ferretti, seconded by Legislator Lafazan.

All in favor of opening the hearing, signify by saying, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Full Legislature respond in favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
Hearing is open.

MS. HARKINS: Good afternoon. My name is Mary Harkins, Deputy County Attorney for Consumer Affairs.

1
2 We're seeking to amend 21-11.4(2).
3 It's for the home improvement
4 contractor's license. The first request
5 we have is to change the language for the
6 fingerprinting requirement. Currently,
7 the fingerprinting requirement is not
8 DCJS compliant, which means that we're
9 not able to get any results of the
10 fingerprint search with that language. So
11 we're seeking to update the language to
12 match the six other Consumer Affairs
13 licenses. They all have the DCJS
14 compliant language.

15 The second request we had was to
16 increase the minimum for the insurance
17 that the home improvement contractors
18 have to carry. There were questions, I
19 believe, about the policy that would be
20 used by Consumer Affairs with when we get
21 the results of the fingerprinting search.
22 And I had a discussion with Legislator
23 Bynoe and her staff this morning and I
24 articulated a little bit clearer, I hope,
25 about what we're doing already and what

1
2 we're going to do with the home
3 improvement fingerprinting results. And
4 that's basically to follow the Correction
5 Law, Section 751-753. And they require us
6 to, not deny a license or take adverse
7 action on a license just because someone
8 has a prior criminal conviction for one
9 or more than one offenses. And so we'll
10 follow the formula in 752, which talks
11 about whether there's a relationship
12 between the license and the criminal
13 offense and also the risk to the public
14 of safety and well-being or property.

15 And also in 753, not to go on and
16 on, but they give you factors to use when
17 you're using the formula from Ssection
18 752, and some of the factors are the age
19 of the person when they were convicted,
20 how much time has lapsed, what proof is
21 there of rehabilitation? And you balance
22 these factors and then you make a
23 decision on the prior conviction and the
24 applicant.

25 I was explaining to Legislator Bynoe

1
2 that there's case law that says that if
3 you use these eight factors and you
4 balance the positive and the negative,
5 that it's not arbitrary and capricious
6 and it's not an abuse of discretion, and
7 that a reviewing court is not allowed to
8 relay those factors and substitute their
9 own judgment for that of the
10 administrative agency. So I think we're
11 on some solid footing. And they've been
12 we've been doing the right thing, and
13 we'll continue to do the right thing.

14 At Consumer Affairs, if an applicant
15 is in jeopardy of having their license
16 denied for a prior criminal conviction
17 will bring them in, give them an
18 opportunity to be heard and go through
19 those factors. If we make a decision to
20 deny a license, then they're giving a
21 written explanation and they have four
22 months to bring in Article 78 proceeding.
23 To date in 2023, we have not denied any
24 licenses based on a prior criminal
25 conviction.

1
2 Should I go on to the insurance? Are
3 there any questions?

4 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
5 Legislator Bynoe has a question.

6 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Not necessarily a
7 question. I just really wanted to thank
8 you, Attorney Harkins, for taking the
9 time to write that response to me, and I
10 think the whole Body may have received
11 it. And I thank you for taking the time
12 and going through it thoroughly with us.
13 I think it's Section 753 with the eight
14 components. It really made a lot of sense
15 after you walk me through it. So I
16 appreciate that.

17 And I also appreciate you expressing
18 that you're working towards having
19 procedures for many of the different
20 facets within the department. And so I
21 salute that. I encourage that. And I
22 thank you again for taking the time.

23 MS. HARKINS: Thank you, Legislator
24 Bynoe. That's one of the Commissioner
25 Capece's goals for us was to get those

1
2 policies and procedures written down. So
3 and we're working to get that done.

4 I think someone else had a question
5 about the the use of the results and how
6 they're handled, and that's through DCJS.
7 We have a Use and Dissemination Agreement
8 in place for the other licenses and will
9 continue to abide by that. And we're
10 subject to annual audits. We're having an
11 audit meeting tomorrow with DCJS to make
12 sure we're doing the right thing.

13 The insurance, that was interesting.
14 I think one of the legislators was asking
15 about the cost to the contractors, if we
16 increase the minimum requirement and what
17 we found out. Was that most of our home
18 improvement contractors carry a million
19 in liability insurance. Anyway, I wasn't
20 able to find a Certificate of Insurance
21 for 100/300 to try and get a price quote.
22 So already our contractors are carrying
23 much more than 100/300. Suffolk requires
24 500 minimum liability insurance that the
25 contractors purchase, and Westchester

1
2 lets the insurance companies decide based
3 upon the scope of work. So we still think
4 that we should go up to at least 250, if
5 not 500, to match the neighboring Suffolk
6 County.

7 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Any
8 questions?

9 (Whereupon, no verbal
10 response.)

11 MS. HARKINS: Thank you to all the
12 the legislators that are moving on to
13 hopefully good times ahead and healthy
14 good times ahead. Thank you.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
16 you.

17 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER CAPECE: I'd just like
19 to add one thing. When they talked about
20 exceptional county employees, Mary
21 Harkins is an exceptional county employee
22 and I'm blessed to have her. And good
23 luck to everybody moving on. Let's all
24 have safe and happy holiday.

25 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank

you.

Any public comments?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

Hearing none, we need a motion to close
the hearing.

Moved by Legislator Ford, seconded
by Legislator Drucker.

All in favor of closing the hearing,
signify by saying, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of
the Full Legislature respond in
favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: The
hearing is closed.

Calendar 4, a vote on a proposed

County Administrative Code, as last amended by Local Law 3 of 1987, in relation to Home Improvement License applicants.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All those in favor, signify by saying, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Full Legislature respond in favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: That item carries unanimously.

1
2 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: We're
3 going to move on to Calendar Item 3, a
4 hearing on a proposed Resolution
5 234-2023, a resolution requesting the
6 State Liquor Authority to change the
7 hours of restriction on sales of
8 alcoholic beverages by wine and liquor
9 stores in Nassau County.

10 Motion by Legislator Giuffre,
11 seconded by Deputy Presiding Officer
12 Kopel to open the hearing.

13 All in favor of opening the hearing
14 signify by saying, "Aye".

15 (Whereupon, all members of
16 the Full Legislature respond in
17 favor with, "Aye".)

18 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
19 opposed?

20 (Whereupon, no verbal
21 response.)

22 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: The
23 hearing is open.

24 Chris?

25 MR. LEIMONE: Good afternoon, Chris

1
2 Leimone from the Administration.

3 As I discussed at the Committee
4 meeting, Clerk Item 413-2023 is a
5 resolution that requests the New York
6 State Liquor Authority to change the
7 hours of restriction to allow for the
8 sale of alcoholic beverages by wine and
9 liquor stores from 8 to 10 p.m. on
10 Mondays through Wednesdays.

11 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.
12 Thank you.

13 So it's basically just changing the
14 hours for two hours per day on Monday,
15 Tuesday and Wednesday.

16 MR. LEIMONE: Right. Thursday
17 through Saturday is 8 a.m. to 10 p.m..

18 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: And
19 then the information that we have is that
20 Nassau County is something of an outlier
21 with respect to these hours and basically
22 the rest of the state, with one or two
23 exceptions or several exceptions, has
24 actually longer hours than this.

25 MR. LEIMONE: Right. New York state

1
2 law allows the sale from 8 a.m. to
3 midnight Mondays through Saturdays. So
4 we're definitely one of the exceptions.
5 Forty five counties throughout the state,
6 including all the New York City counties,
7 allow for the sale from 8 a.m. to
8 midnight. So we're just getting ourselves
9 closer into compliance with what New York
10 State allows.

11 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
12 right.

13 Any questions for Chris?

14 (Whereupon, no verbal
15 response.)

16 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
17 you, Chris.

18 MR. LEIMONE: Thank you.

2 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: There
3 are two items on the Emergency Calendar.
4 First, we need a motion to establish an
5 emergency for Clerk Item 417 of 23. With
6 the consent of the Minority, we're going
7 to waive the reading of that entire item.

8 Clerk Item 417, an ordinance
9 amending Ordinance 72 of 2023, fixing the
10 tax rates and levying taxes for the 12
11 month 2024 fiscal year beginning January
12 1st, 2024 and ending December 31st, 2024.

13 Motion by Legislator Walker,
14 seconded by Legislator Gaylor. That is
15 to establish the emergency.

16 All in favor of establishing the
17 emergency, signify by saying, "Aye".

18 (Whereupon, all members of
19 the Full Legislature respond in
20 favor with, "Aye".)

21 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
22 opposed?

23 (Whereupon, no verbal
24 response.)

25 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: The

1
2 emergency is established.

3 Now, onto the item itself. Clerk
4 Item 417, an ordinance amending Ordinance
5 72 of 2023, fixing the tax rates and
6 levying taxes for the 12 month 2024
7 fiscal year beginning January 1, 2024 and
8 ending December 31, 2024.

9 Motioned by Deputy Presiding Officer
10 Kopel, seconded by Minority Leader
11 Abrahams.

12 Any debate or discussion on the
13 item?

14 (Whereupon, no verbal
15 response.)

16 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
17 Legislator Mule.

18 LEGISLATOR MULE: Presiding Officer,
19 I'd just like to put it on record again
20 that we're requesting a written opinion
21 from the County Attorney with regards to
22 whether we're doing this legally, since
23 we do not have an assessor.

24 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.
25 That's that's on the record now.

LEGISLATOR MULE: Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.

Absolutely.

Any further debate or discussion or questions?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
Hearing none, all in favor, signify by saying, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Full Legislature respond in favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: That carries unanimously.

1
2 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: The
3 other emergency relates to Clerk Item 391
4 of 2023. It's Item 29, the Calendar. We
5 need an emergency because of timing
6 issues.

7 It's an emergency for a resolution
8 authorizing the County Executive to
9 execute a Grant Agreement between the
10 County of Nassau acting on behalf of the
11 Department of Parks, Recreation and
12 Museums and North Shore Historical
13 Museum.

14 Motion to establish an Emergency by
15 a Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton, seconded by
16 Legislator McKevitt.

17 Any debate or discussion on the
18 emergency?

19 (Whereupon, no verbal
20 response.)

21 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Nope.
22 All in favor of establishing the
23 emergency, signify by saying, "Aye".

24 (Whereupon, all members of
25 the Full Legislature respond in

favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: The
emergency is established.

Now we need an amendment in the
nature of a substitution to correct the
term of the Grant Agreement.

Motion by Legislator Drucker,
seconded by Legislator Walker.

Any debate or discussion on the
amendment?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
Hearing none, all in favor, signify by
saying, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of
the Full Legislature respond in
favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: The
item's amended.

Now we have to vote on the item, as
amended. We don't need another motion, so
I'm going to call for a vote on the item
as amended.

All in favor, signify by saying,
"Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of
the Full Legislature respond in
favor with, "Aye".)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
right. We passed the item as amended.

1
2 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Item
3 27, Resolution 250. A resolution to
4 authorize the transfer of appropriations
5 heretofore made within the budget for the
6 year 2023.

7 Motion by Legislator Kennedy,
8 seconded by Legislator Walker.

9 That puts this item before us. Andy,
10 are you here to speak on this?

11 MR. PERSICH: Good afternoon, Andy
12 Persich, Office of Management and Budget.

13 I'd be remiss if I didn't say good
14 luck to all of you leaving Presiding
15 Officer, Minority Leader, Legislator
16 Ford, Legislator Schaefer, Legislator
17 Lafazan. It's been a pleasure working
18 with you. Been some bumps in the road,
19 but we've seemed to make some progress
20 here and we are living in a better place.
21 So take that with you when you leave.
22 I'll still be here for a little while
23 longer, so.

24 Item 403 is before you. A couple
25 updates that I just would like to give

1
2 you since the last meeting. One is we're
3 anticipating spending \$10 million and
4 hoping to generate for every dollar we
5 spend, \$3 in new revenues, roughly, in
6 tourism and sales tax generation, about
7 \$30 million.

8 We're planning on promoting events
9 such as the Cricket World Cup, an LPGA
10 event like we used to have in the old
11 days with the senior tour at Eisenhower
12 Red. We're going to work with the
13 Legislative Body. The County Executive
14 has made a commitment to work with you on
15 your districts to see how we could
16 promote your districts. There are many
17 planned events that probably you guys can
18 coordinate with him.

19 As far as what I see this as and
20 what I spoke to the County Executive
21 about, we have to look at it a little
22 differently. This is an economic
23 generator. It's an economic development
24 thing. And by promoting the County, I
25 think you have to realize that we're

1
2 going to be helping small businesses by
3 doing that who don't really have
4 advertising budgets. So when we do events
5 like this, like I would say, when you do
6 the cricket event, some of the
7 communities over there, like the East
8 Meadow community where I grew up, there's
9 going to be a benefit, the more we
10 generate a lot of excitement around that.
11 And that's just a way of of promoting
12 these small businesses: The delis, the
13 small operators, the bagel stores, all
14 the things that are out there. We're
15 going to try and maximize the amount of
16 money we're spending out there. But
17 remember, these people don't have enough
18 money for advertising. So I guess this is
19 a form of us doing that for them.

20 In addition, we're going to work
21 with you for projects on the remaining
22 balance of the money. And anything else
23 that we probably see that was permissible
24 under the guidelines that ARPA defined
25 for us.

1
2 So I'm here to take any questions
3 which I'm sure you're going to have for
4 me. And I do not like being
5 interrogated, unlike the college. I'm
6 just letting you know that. But I'm sure
7 I'm going to get interrogated (laughter).

8 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: I just
9 have one question or statement I'd like
10 you to confirm. If we approve the
11 authorization today, the expenditure of
12 these monies have to come back to the
13 Legislature. Correct?

14 MR. PERSICH: Absolutely. Any
15 contract we do. So you have control over
16 what we're doing with this. Even though
17 we're moving the appropriation, it's
18 kicking off the ball. So if we want to
19 contract with somebody, we will do that.

20 In addition, we're looking for some
21 public private partnerships for the 125th
22 Centennial. I heard there was a lot of
23 chatter about that, but we are looking
24 for some sponsorship money for that. So
25 and other events where we can get

1
2 sponsorship, maybe the cricket. I'm sure
3 there's going to be a lot of things that
4 come out of this. I want to clear up the
5 misnomer from the last time, having had
6 an extensive conversation, that we are
7 going to be looking for public private
8 partnerships for some of these big events
9 and everything else.

10 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: But
11 the Legislature will be sitting here next
12 year will have to approve any money
13 that's actually spent for this purpose.

14 MR. PERSICH: The contracts will be
15 before this Body as routinely as
16 everything else as part of our
17 procurement guidelines and the charter as
18 how we have to follow.

19 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
20 you.

21 Anyone else? Legislator Drucker.

22 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you,
23 Presiding Officer.

24 Andy, you stated that this will
25 generate \$3 in revenue for every dollar,

1
2 right? How did you how did you calculate
3 that?

4 MR. PERSICH: Well, it's really hard
5 to put a pin on that. But I will say
6 this --

7 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: You have to put
8 a pin on it.

9 MR. PERSICH: Well, here's what I
10 will say. When I worked in a previous
11 life, I worked for the Town of
12 Huntington, and when there is a lot of
13 economic development going on, there's a
14 planning factor associated when you do
15 something for a business, meaning like
16 you're promoting a business and
17 everything else, and the multiplier
18 effect of every dollar coming in is seven
19 times that when you do something like
20 that. I'm thinking \$3 is probably within
21 the ballpark, a conservative estimate, I
22 think that's probably where it will land.
23 We know that cricket has an economic
24 benefit of \$150 million. That was, what
25 they proposed to us. So that being just a

1
2 guideline into itself, that's new money.
3 How that's spent and gets divvied down to
4 us, remember, there's sales tax is
5 occupancy tax money that we're going to
6 get. We're seeing an uptick in occupancy
7 tax -- hotel/motel tax is what I'm
8 referring to -- as a result of maybe
9 coming out of Covid. Additionally, from
10 some of the events we had done here and
11 the restoration of life back to Covid
12 times. But we are seeing an uptick in
13 occupancies in hotels.

14 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: So can you
15 quantify it by other examples. So let's
16 say last summer County Executive had
17 commercials that ran purportedly to
18 promote tourism here in Nassau County.
19 Did that generate the \$3 for every dollar
20 spent?

21 MR. PERSICH: I wouldn't say
22 specifically \$3, but I will say it did
23 have an impact on our tourism budget,
24 which impacted that upwards. We're up, I
25 can tell you right now from last year. On

1
2 a budget of approximately \$4.5 million,
3 we're probably up almost to 5.5 million.
4 I don't know the percentage dollar
5 whether it's 1 to 3 on that ratio. But we
6 do see an uptick right now of hotel/motel
7 occupancy.

8 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: You can break
9 down that 5.5 for us?

10 MR. PERSICH: I can break that down;
11 Yes, I can. I can't break it down to
12 that specific dollars. I can tell you
13 that we're all seeing uptick there. Our
14 sales taxes remain strong. That's a hard
15 thing to put a pin on. You do realize
16 that sales tax is not like -- consumer
17 spending is a tough thing to figure out.
18 But we do know that promoting and
19 advertising does help generate an
20 economic increase.

21 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: I have no doubt
22 that it helps. But you're asking us to
23 take a ride with you and hop on and hope
24 for the best. You're very optimistic
25 about it, but it's speculation. It's

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2 speculative at best. Whereas, I think \$10
3 million, you talked about small
4 businesses. How about if we gave \$10
5 million to grants for small businesses?
6 That's a direct correlation that directly
7 helps these small businesses who are
8 struggling. I know you keep saying that
9 these departments are well funded, but
10 \$10 million can help a bunch of
11 floundering businesses right now. We have
12 mental health crisis in this county, all
13 over the country, but we have it in this
14 county, as evidenced by the heroic
15 efforts by the Police Department today in
16 saving that young woman's life.

17 We have homelessness. This county
18 should never have homelessness. It should
19 not exist. We have the needs of veterans
20 who have made the ultimate sacrifices for
21 us, this county. They could get direct
22 benefits of part of this \$10 million.
23 There is no speculation in it. We have
24 food insecurity. There should never be
25 food insecurity in Long Island.

1
2 Infrastructure improvements. We we heard
3 people today talk about the remnants of
4 Superstorm Sandy. We still have work to
5 do. But the work that needs to be done in
6 this county doesn't have to be
7 speculative. It doesn't have to be
8 projections. It can be accurate, direct
9 correlation.

10 So I'm going to reiterate the
11 comments I made in Committee two weeks
12 ago, where I have a fundamental objection
13 to the Administration prioritizing
14 tourism over the life and living of our
15 residents.

16 Thank you.

17 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
18 Legislator Solages.

19 LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Thank you.

20 Again, do you have a specific
21 formula that clearly states the \$10
22 million investment into that line will
23 produce at least \$30 million? Do you have
24 a specific formula; yes or no?

25 MR. PERSICH: I gave you my analysis

1
2 of what I thought. A multiplier, when
3 you do economics, some of these economic
4 generators is seven times that when you
5 do stuff like this. I'm using a
6 conservative formula, which is three
7 times. Can you tie this directly to sales
8 tax and consumer spending? That's a hard
9 thing. That's like trying to get into
10 the market basket and Walmart, which they
11 try and figure out what people are buying
12 at the same time as they're buying other
13 things. I do know that advertising in all
14 forms is good. And to promote this county
15 to the gold standard that it is, I think
16 it's going to help drive the generators
17 for these small businesses. It can't hurt
18 us to do this. It fits within the
19 guidelines of what the federal government
20 told us to spend this money on, which was
21 one of the things that they did say.

22 So I think this is a win win. Is
23 this speculation? Sure. But I think this
24 other things that we will probably be
25 coming forward with in the future to see

1
2 how we can make it better for these other
3 businesses out there.

4 LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: With all due
5 respect, it's not just a win win. It's a
6 it's a missed opportunity if we can
7 perhaps put that funding in different
8 lines to produce different results.

9 For example, we saw recently in
10 August/September, a very terrible
11 rainstorm. In my community, we're
12 reaching out to the Governor and the
13 President for help. We have homeowners
14 and businesses that need compensation for
15 damages they faced. Improving our
16 infrastructure, our sewers, that is a
17 very important goal. My outgoing
18 colleague, Mr. Lafazan, had a great idea
19 about an infrastructure report card that
20 our county should be graded upon. I
21 respect all the hard working people are
22 doing at the Department of Public Works
23 from the commissioner, Mr. Arnold. But
24 but we need more improvements into our
25 infrastructure, especially on our South

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2 Shore. And so it is a missed opportunity
3 to not put this funding where we really
4 need it in social services and addressing
5 mental health concerns, as we saw today
6 with the heroic efforts of our officers,
7 which I thank.

8 So, you know, again, it's not just a
9 win win. We're missing a great
10 opportunity here. So I respectfully
11 disagree. And and I look forward to
12 again, declining a vote in favor of this
13 at the portion of this hearing to vote.

14 Thank you.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

16 Legislator Ford.

17 LEGISLATOR FORD: Good afternoon.

18 I guess it is touchy subject, this
19 \$10 million. And I think that probably
20 what makes it so maybe controversial is
21 that we haven't really adequately spent a
22 lot of the ARPA funding on projects
23 throughout our areas, throughout our
24 neighborhoods, such as the instance of
25 infrastructure within Legislator

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2 Solages'. Is there any attempt to try to
3 expedite it or place a priority on some
4 of these projects? Because this \$10
5 million represents only a small portion
6 of the full amount of the money; am I
7 correct?

8 MR. PERSICH: That is correct. And I
9 do believe that the County Executive has
10 conveyed to this Body that it will work
11 with you on individual district projects,
12 as well as countywide projects to to
13 figure out what we want to prioritize.

14 I hate to say it, but 19 people have
15 19 different priorities, which makes it a
16 little bit difficult for him to manage
17 through. So we have to work together with
18 the balance of that money to figure out
19 where we want to put that money. Some of
20 these other programs may be eligible. We
21 do have a lot of money in the budget for
22 some of these other things. I have to
23 convey that point. Because we've seen an
24 uptick in cases in DSS, which we've amply
25 funded, which we do get federal aid for.

1
2 So we have to be careful. There are
3 partners that take care to help us with
4 some of these expenses that we have to
5 bear.

6 So, yes, to answer your question,
7 Legislator Ford, he's forthcoming and
8 wants to meet with every individual
9 legislator, to figure out what the
10 priorities are and how to spend the
11 balance of that money.

12 LEGISLATOR FORD: Well, I would urge
13 him then, in the beginning of the new
14 legislative term, that this is something
15 that he does, and his whole
16 administration. Because I think that we
17 have up until a certain time where we
18 have to expend all these funds, correct?

19 MR. PERSICH: That is correct. The
20 clock is ticking on us for obligation,
21 which is 2024 and to be fully spent by
22 2026. I think that's when we have to
23 expend it. But the obligated piece is a
24 key component. We had some scares in the
25 beginning of the year with Congress about

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2 talk about taking the money back,
3 clawing it back. So it was a panic. I
4 can't tell you that it wasn't. I
5 personally don't like giving money back
6 because we're in a different financial
7 position now than we were. You've all
8 lived through the tough times that we've
9 been through. This is a different place
10 that I think we're in. And I think it's
11 just a better place than where we started
12 at.

13 LEGISLATOR FORD: I agree, I hope
14 they don't claw the money back because
15 unfortunately, they clawed it back from
16 some of my homeowners after Sandy and
17 destroyed their lives.

18 Also then I guess we have another
19 part of money that has been talked about,
20 the opioid settlement money. And I did
21 have a conversation with the County
22 Executive. So I'm hoping that as much as
23 you are going to pay attention and
24 possibly put a priority on this \$10
25 million to help with events or

1
2 initiatives throughout the county,
3 basically to celebrate Nassau County, to
4 celebrate its anniversary or maybe to
5 help stimulate economic activity, where
6 are we going to be with that? We haven't
7 expended and we talked about these brave
8 cops that saved a woman, but how do we
9 get a priority on that?

10 MR. PERSICH: Well, we've
11 appropriated \$15 million in next year's
12 budget when we did do that. I think
13 there'll be a second plan coming forth
14 for the next tranche of money. We're
15 trying to be careful how we do this. You
16 have to take steps. We expect performance
17 from the vendors, we enlist. So we don't
18 want to just say, here's the money. You
19 have to, you know, set goals and
20 guidelines and boundaries. Money is a
21 dangerous thing sometimes. I hate to be
22 that way, but we have to make sure. I
23 can't give you statistically. I'm hoping
24 that, I don't know statistically. But our
25 overdoses are down, the fatalities are

1
2 down. I think that some of the
3 initiatives that we have done here,
4 Project Natalie, that the Police
5 Commissioner talks about, I think some of
6 those homegrown things that we've done
7 here have helped the problem, and we need
8 to expand what the future's going to
9 hold. Because the next fentanyl epidemic
10 could be something else. I don't know
11 what that is, but we've all experienced
12 something with it. But I think there'll
13 be a plan put forward to this Body, the
14 new Body that will be coming in, and what
15 the next tranche of the money --

16 LEGISLATOR FORD: And I'm not moving
17 out of Nassau County. I'll still be in
18 Long Beach. For me, it's also the mental
19 health side. Unfortunately, in our
20 neighborhood, we had a young student who
21 killed himself on Thanksgiving. So when
22 we talk about, like, with money, you
23 know, just when people who want to spend
24 it and you don't want to spend it willy
25 nilly, we can't hoard it. We can't keep

1
2 it close to ourselves and act like we
3 need to save for the future or whatever.
4 I think that we have to trust this Body
5 as well as the Administration. Everybody
6 must work together in order to get this,
7 because we have a lot of people that are
8 in need. And while I wasn't initially in
9 favor of this legislation, the \$10
10 million, but I'm somebody who supports
11 tax credits in New York State. And it's
12 something that can also be signified by a
13 leap of faith as well. The amount of
14 money that is given to allow agencies and
15 industries to work here in New York
16 State. And why they give it is because
17 they know of the economic return. They
18 cannot quantify to say that it would be 3
19 to 1, 2 to 1 or 5 to 1.

20 My family works in the movie
21 industry. So we saw the four months
22 strike, the SAG strike, how it stopped
23 all productions, all movies, commercials
24 and everything, not only in Nassau
25 County, but throughout New York State,

1
2 specifically in New York City. And
3 Governor Hochul lamented over the fact of
4 the hundreds of millions of dollars that
5 were lost in revenue because these movies
6 were not being made and because the local
7 delis, the local stores, they can shop
8 in, like Home Depots and whatever -- so
9 their dollars, whatever they spend does
10 result in bringing in additional funding.
11 And it does help the small store owners
12 because of the work that they do. So with
13 something like this, I'm glad to hear
14 that all the contracts must come back to
15 this Legislature.

16 And I'm going to ask, is it any
17 amount of the contract, or does it have
18 to be over a certain amount of money in
19 order to come before the Rules Committee?

20 MR. PERSICH: I believe it's subject
21 to what the Charter restrictions are. I
22 don't know that off the top of my head,
23 but I think it's \$25,000, whatever the
24 dollar amount is, I forgot. I'm being
25 honest with you. I don't know the answer

1
2 to that, but there is a threshold with
3 inside the charter.

4 (Whereupon, off the record
5 discussion.)

6 MR. PERSICH: And anything over a
7 thousand or over a year must come before
8 this Body. Chris just opined on that for
9 me.

10 LEGISLATOR FORD: Okay. I'm hoping
11 that, and I hope the Administration, I
12 hope you can convey to the County
13 Executive that this is something that I
14 think maybe this would be a little bit
15 easier to swallow if we saw that on the
16 other side, we were spending the money in
17 areas that we as legislators feel that
18 the money should be spent. So there has
19 to be a give and take. And we need to
20 have this from the County Executive.

21 MR. PERSICH: And I believe he's
22 looking for full transparency with this
23 and working with this Body to properly
24 spend this funding. That's been conveyed
25 to me to deliver to you guys. So I'm

just going to reaffirm that.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Well, thank you for standing up to the task. Have a good one.

MR. PERSICH: Thank you. You too, Legislator.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Legislator Bynoe.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you, Presiding Officer.

Good day, Mr. Persich.

MR. PERSICH: Good afternoon.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Discover Long Island. They are a destination -- what are they? They're a visitors bureau, right?

MR. PERSICH: From what I understand, yes. I don't know specifically about the contract, but that's what I believe they are.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Is there anybody in this chamber that represents the Administration who knows anything about Discover Long Island?

1
2 (Whereupon, off the record
3 discussion.)

4 MR. PERSICH: Chris Leimone has just
5 told me that the contract with Discover
6 Long Island expired last year, so we
7 don't have one in place.

8 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: That was a
9 visitors bureau to, to which we were a
10 part of Nassau and Suffolk. And there was
11 a reason why we were investing in that
12 entity, so that they could work to bring
13 visitors here to Long Island. Not by
14 events that showcases the County
15 Executive or any other department here.
16 It was for the purpose, solely for the
17 purpose of bringing visitors here, and
18 with that, they were able to create hotel
19 and attraction promotions and they were
20 able to blast that out far and wide.
21 Nothing that you talked about here today
22 replaces what Discover Long Island does.
23 And so because of that, I actually argue
24 that we're hurting businesses. We're
25 hurting local businesses and hotels

1
2 because we are no longer engaging with
3 Discover Long Island for the sole purpose
4 of bringing tourists to spend their money
5 here with our businesses. So we think
6 that we're doing a better service by
7 having these one offs where Boys II Men
8 is here for one night and folks go back
9 to -- I'll wait until you finish.

10 (Whereupon, off the record
11 discussion.)

12 MR. PERSICH: So sorry about that,
13 Legislator.

14 I just want to give you the update
15 from what I got. We are planning to
16 engage in a new contract with a different
17 vendor from other than Discover Long
18 Island. I think there's an RFP or
19 whatever --

20 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: But they're a
21 Long Island Visitors Bureau where we were
22 working with them. Why are we doing
23 that? Because they seem to have been
24 doing a great work. Is there a differing
25 of an opinion?

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MR. PERSICH: I cannot answer that.

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I don't know the answer to that. I can bring back the concerns to my principals and find out why we made the change. But I don't know off the top of my head as to why. Maybe one of the things I think was maybe it was they have a different planning of how to advertise as opposed to Discover Long Island. But I don't have the facts in front of me, so I can get back to you on that.

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LEGISLATOR BYNOE: We would be one of the only municipalities in the state of New York, that instead of using a visitor's bureau, we would be RFPing (sic) these services. And I can't help but think that that's because we want to drive the attention to one focal point, as opposed to doing what's right and making sure that somebody without any self-interest in the process has the ability to drive tourists here and do it in a way that would be above reproach, an objective. But instead, we want to have

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2 an RFP for a company that we can drive.
3 That we personally can have some level of
4 self-promotion. That's what it appears to
5 me. I'm just calling it as I see it.
6 This is a shame. Because now when people
7 go to Discover Long Island, they no
8 longer get any Nassau County
9 opportunities. We've starved that conduit
10 for our local businesses. But here today,
11 now we want to say we're here working and
12 fighting for that. I'll tell you, that's
13 a shame; that's a shame.

14 MR. PERSICH: Understood. I will
15 bring your concerns back to my
16 principals.

17 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: It was my
18 understanding that when we entered into
19 this whole process for this cricket
20 festivities that will be held later in
21 the year, that they were going to be
22 responsible for doing much of that work,
23 that it wasn't going to cost the county
24 taxpayers anything. And while you might
25 think using ARPA money is not taking any

1
2 money away from the county residents, I'm
3 here to tell you today that's not a fact.
4 Any money that's being sent over for that
5 distinct purpose is taking away from the
6 taxpayers up opportunity to have direct
7 services that we know they need, that we
8 know they need.

9 Legislator Solages talked about
10 infrastructure that was an out-birth of
11 Legislator Lafazan's effort. I could tell
12 you right here, I submitted a bill for
13 Alzheimer's help so that we could give a
14 bracelet to each individual under a
15 certain income threshold to have a
16 bracelet on their arm, or a necklace
17 where it had the GPS locating on it so
18 that if they went missing, that they
19 could be found easily, easier than when
20 our police officers are out there
21 stretched with resources trying to find
22 them. But instead of funding that
23 initiative, we still are allowing folks
24 who are struggling with cognitive
25 inabilities to be out there wandering. I

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2 see the silver alerts. We all get the
3 missing notices to our e-mails. And the
4 reason why I submitted that bill is
5 because Mr. Chesnel Veillard of my
6 district, went missing and died on the
7 many on the train, on the train tracks
8 here in Mineola. A second gentleman from
9 my district, only three blocks from that
10 one gentleman, went missing in that same
11 week and he fell over into a small body
12 of water, and couldn't turn himself over
13 because of the disease. And
14 unfortunately, when our brave men and
15 women of Nassau County found each one of
16 these individuals, they were dead. They
17 were dead. But instead of funding
18 something like that, funding the
19 infrastructure, funding the things that
20 would stabilize individuals who are
21 currently homeless, we want to take \$10
22 million and fund this. And break away
23 from a visitors bureau that was serving,
24 objectively serving our local businesses.

25 I'm a big fat no. And I'd love my

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colleagues to join me in that.

Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Hi,
Andy.

Andy, do you know the history of
this tourism with NIFA? There was a
connection with NIFA and Discover Long
Island.

MR. PERSICH: I'm not aware of it.
No.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: That it
was required not use Discover Long Island
because we used Hotel/Motel money.

MR. PERSICH: I don't believe
there's an agreement between us and NIFA.
I'm not aware of anything that might
prohibits me or restricts me to use them.
I can find out for you.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Definitely find out because I've heard
directly that it is something that we are
obligated, from what I understand, to use

1
2 Discover Long Island because of something
3 involving with NIFA and when we were --
4 back having issues, we used Hotel/Motel
5 for financing. You got to look at it.

6 MR. PERSICH: I will look into it.

7 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: But
8 unfortunately, I think we should table it
9 until we know for sure. Because I think
10 for us to use a different agency other
11 than this one, it's going to put us in a
12 real situation with the NIFA agreement
13 that was agreed upon when Hotel/Motel was
14 used for the budget. It's something that
15 they're very aware of and they're ready
16 to -- I don't want to see the County get
17 sued for something we're not aware of
18 when we're agreeing to do this without
19 using them.

20 MR. PERSICH: I don't want to
21 conflate the issues here --

22 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: But we
23 have to.

24 MR. PERSICH: The Discover Long
25 Island contract is separate from this

1
2 transfer.

3 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: It's
4 not.

5 MR. PERSICH: I'm just saying,
6 though, this is a legislative action to
7 move money.

8 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Andy,
9 you're wrong.

10 MR. PERSICH: Legislator, I'm not
11 trying to pick a fight here.

12 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I'm not
13 fighting. But the problem is it's
14 specifically because it's tourism.
15 Tourism funding is supposed to go to
16 Discover Long Island. Any tourism funding
17 -- what we're doing with the \$10 million
18 supposed to go through Discover Long
19 Island. It's a contract that supposedly
20 NIFA -- that was the condition of us
21 using Hotel/Motel when we were in a
22 situation where we needed the budget, and
23 they know it.

24 MR. PERSICH: I will check on that
25 and get back to you. I don't believe

1
2 there's a restriction, but I will find
3 out for you. Because Hotel/Motel taxes is
4 in another what I will call the "bucket",
5 which is not a favorite term here. It's
6 it's in two different grants that's over
7 here (indicating). This what we're
8 talking about here is a separate matter.

9 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: No,
10 it's not, it's tourism. It's for tourism.
11 Anytime that you use tourism, it's
12 supposed to go through this agency,
13 Discover Long Island.

14 MR. PERSICH: Okay.

15 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: And
16 that's what Suffolk County does. There's
17 a ratio. Actually, they've shown how much
18 money we've lost by not using them
19 recently. It's a lot more involved here.
20 By using this money for tourism and not
21 knowing the implications of that by not
22 using Discover Long Island, I think we're
23 putting the County at risk. That's what
24 I've been told that there's a specific
25 agreement through NIFA that we if we're

1
2 going to be using money for tourism, it
3 has to go through Discover Long Island.
4 The fact that we've let this contract
5 lapse is already a problem. I think we
6 have to be careful before we move forward
7 with even putting money into a place that
8 can jeopardize this agreement.

9 It's also said that we can actually
10 forego 160,000 of New York State regional
11 funding just by doing this. I don't
12 think we know enough about this. There's
13 a history that we really have to be aware
14 of. I've heard it from people that are
15 directly involved. This will come back. I
16 can tell you right now. I get a radar for
17 some things. This is going to be a big
18 problem if we transfer this money for
19 tourism and it is not included with
20 Discover Long Island and the conditions
21 of NIFA.

22 I make a motion to table.

23 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Second.

24 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

25 Seconded by Minority Leader.

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Motion to table not debatable.

All in favor of tabling this item,
signify by saying, "Aye".

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Aye.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Aye.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Aye.

LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Aye.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Aye.

LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Aye.

LEGISLATOR MULE: Aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
opposed, "Nay".

Nay.

DEPUTY PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL:
Nay.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Nay.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Nay.

LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Nay.

LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: Nay.

LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Nay.

LEGISLATOR PILIP: Nay.

LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: Nay.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Nay.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Nay.

1
2 LEGISLATOR GIANREGORIO: Nay.

3 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Motion
4 to table fails by a vote of seven, 12
5 votes against.

6 MR. LEIMONE: Chris Leimone from the
7 Administration.

8 Just to correct the record, we are
9 required under Title 24 of the
10 Miscellaneous Laws, to have a contract
11 with the Tourist Promotion Promotion
12 Agency, not necessarily Discover Long
13 Island, but we do have to have one.

14 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: And do
15 you have one, right now?

16 MR. LEIMONE: As was discussed, we
17 will be having one.

18 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: You do
19 not. You're in a lapse. Their's already
20 expired. Chris, you're absolutely right.
21 Thank you. Basically just said what I
22 said. And that's a real problem,
23 especially if you are accepting money
24 into the tourism line. You said it better
25 than I did. And I appreciate you

1
2 validating it. Because basically we are
3 in default and we're starting a really --
4 I'm telling you now. Somebody that has
5 been here for a long time, you put this
6 10 million into that line and you start
7 coming up with contracts and spending at
8 different ways. I'm telling you -- and
9 NIFA is involved with this. It is
10 connected. With a deal that we entered
11 into NIFA years ago, when Hotel/Motel
12 money was transferred into the general
13 fund. You guys have to be aware of this
14 because honestly, it can come back and
15 cost the County. We're not doing so well
16 with lawsuits. I don't want to see
17 another lawsuit like this.
