WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 72-2022 passed by the County Legislature fixes the tax rates and levies the taxes for the 12-month fiscal year of 2023; and

WHEREAS, the substance of Ordinance No. 72-2022 needs to be updated and, as such, requires a new ordinance amending it; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 192-A -2022, adopted by this Nassau County Legislature on September 19, 2022, there have been included in the proceedings of the said Legislature, statements of the total assessed valuations of the properties situated in the County, the three towns, two cities and special districts within the County of Nassau for the 2023 fiscal year for County; County Fire Prevention, Safety, Communication and Education Fund; County Police Headquarters Fund; County Police District Fund; Nassau Community College Fund; County Environmental Bond Fund; Nassau County Sewer and Storm Water Resources District Fund; County Disputed Assessment Fund; Town; Part Town; Town Highway; Town Special District; and other lawful purposes, and the town budgets of the Towns of Hempstead, North

Hempstead and Oyster Bay for the year 2023 including the lists of Special Districts as contained therein and the amounts certified by the Town Board of each of the said towns to be raised and levied for Town General Fund, Town General Fund-Part Town, Town Highway, Town Special District and other lawful purposes, and the amounts of unpaid water charges in arrears in the respective water districts and Town Sidewalk and Curb assessments to be levied against certain properties in the Towns of Hempstead, North Hempstead, and Oyster Bay will be caused to be printed in the proceedings of the Nassau County Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Legislature has, by Chapter 383 of the Laws of 2002, as amended, authorized the Nassau County Legislature to provide for abatement from increases in the County general property tax rate for eligible senior citizens and the tax rate as set forth herein is calculated in consideration of such abatement; and

WHEREAS, Appropriation Ordinance No. 71-2022 for the fiscal year 2023 has been adopted by the Nassau County Legislature for the conduct of the County Government of Nassau County for the 2023 fiscal year, and such Appropriation Ordinance constitutes the Appropriation Ordinance for the 2023 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 302 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, the County is required to adopt a budget for a twelve-month fiscal year commencing on January 1, 2023, and terminating on December 31, 2023, and to levy taxes in accordance with said 2023 fiscal year budget and year, and to cause real property taxes to be assessed, collected and paid in order to fund County governmental operations for said 2023 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the County accordingly is required to adopt an ordinance for the levy of taxes in accordance with Appropriation Ordinance No. 71-2022; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 306 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, the County Legislature of the County of Nassau is required to levy County, Town and Special District taxes for the ensuing year and the Legislature is also required to levy the unpaid water charges in arrears which have been filed by the Town Boards of the respective towns; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 12-4.1 of the Nassau County Administrative Code, the Nassau County Legislature is required to levy the unpaid town sidewalk and curb assessments and other lawful town charges; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 1262 of the Tax Law of the State of New York, the Nassau County Legislature is required to allocate revenues from certain sales taxes imposed

within the County of Nassau, outside of the City of Long Beach, and for purposes of ascertaining the full valuations of the properties in the area of the County outside the said City of Long Beach so as to make such allocation, may determine the equalization rates to be applicable in such areas; and

WHEREAS, Article 18 of the Real Property Tax Law of the State of New York requires that property must be assigned to one of four classes for the purpose of taxation. The four classes are as follows:

Class One - One-, two- and three-family homes and such other property as included in the definition of class one set forth in subdivision one of section 1802 of the Real Property Tax Law.

Class Two- All other residential properties, such as apartments, co-ops, and condominiums, but not hotels, inns and motels.

Class Three - Public utility properties.

Class Four - All other property not defined in classes one through three.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU THAT ORDINANCE NO. 72-2022 IS HEREBY AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

The Clerk of the Town of Oyster Bay, having indicated that it will be filing with the Nassau County Legislature a copy of the Town Budget of the Town of Oyster Bay for the year 2023 adopted by the Town Board of said Town on October 25, 2022, (the original of which is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Town of Oyster Bay) and the amount specified therein having been appropriated by the Town Board to be raised by tax for Town purposes for the year 2023, this Nassau County Legislature does hereby finally fix and determine that the sum of \$59,180,168.28 shall be raised and levied on the properties situated within the Town of Oyster Bay for Town purposes for the year 2023, and that the tax rate on properties within the Town of Oyster Bay for Town purposes for the year 2023, and that the tax rate on properties within the said Town of Oyster Bay for the year 2023 for Town purposes is hereby fixed and determined to be Class One \$101.238, Class Two \$18.690, Class Three \$27.930, Class Four \$16.781 on each \$100 of assessed valuation of properties.

§ 14. The assessed valuations of the Special Districts in the Towns of Hempstead, North Hempstead, and Oyster Bay for the year 2023 having been included in the proceedings of the Nassau County Legislature, together with the lists of such Special Districts necessary for the payment of expenses during the year 2023 of each of the Special Districts and the amounts of money necessary therefore having been appropriated by the Town Boards for such purposes, the said sums so appropriated by the Town Boards are hereby determined to be raised and levied on the properties in the Town situated within each of said Special Districts is hereby finally fixed and determined to be the tax rate set opposite each respective amount so appropriated and more particularly shown on the following lists of Special Districts for the Towns of Hempstead, North Hempstead and Oyster Bay:

§ 25. Taxes and assessments are hereby levied and shall be collected for the purposes for which the aforesaid appropriations have been made and which this Legislature has ordained shall be raised and levied, and that all of said taxes and assessments be collected from the several persons and upon the properties named and described in the assessment roll on file in the Office of the Assessor for the County of Nassau, and the County Executive, or in her absence or inability to act, the Presiding Officer of the Legislature, and the Clerk of this Legislature are hereby authorized and directed to execute for and on behalf of the County of Nassau consolidated tax warrants addressed to the Receivers of Taxes of the several towns and cities within the County of Nassau, to wit: the Town of Hempstead, Town of North Hempstead, Town of Oyster Bay, City of Long Beach and the City of Glen Cove, authorizing, directing and

§ 29. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately

8 Clerk's Office up here, which will be,
9 from your perspective, to the left, and
10 please fill out a form, and then you'll
11 be called during the public comment
12 portion of the meeting.

13 So to start things off, my privilege
14 to introduce PBA President Tom Shevlin
15 for the Top Cop presentation.

16 MR. SHEVLIN: Good afternoon, happy
17 holidays to everybody and thank you so
18 much for having us. I'm going to
19 introduce Police Officer John Patterson,
20 who is the corresponding secretary to
21 speak about December's Top Cop.

22 MR. PATTERSON: Thank you, Tommy.
23 Good afternoon, County Legislators.
24 Thank you for having us.

25 Every month you honor the police

1
2 officers in Nassau County with an award.
3 This month is very special to me. I
4 worked with Wayne in the Fourth Precinct
5 a long time, and he's a great friend,
6 great cop, great husband, great father,
7 and I just want to tell you a little bit
8 about his story.

9 Police Officer Wayne Resnick is
10 assigned to the Fourth Precinct in Nassau
11 County. Prior to getting assigned to the
12 Nassau County Police Department, he was
13 assigned to Communications Bureau and
14 then the Correction Officers. He's been a
15 member of the Nassau County workforce
16 since 1994. Wayne has served the County
17 residents for a number of years. In the
18 Fourth Precinct he received numerous
19 citations and awards and displayed
20 bravery on multiple occasions.

21 In April of 2022, this year, Wayne
22 was unfortunately diagnosed ALS, Lou
23 Gehrig's disease. A tremendous blow to
24 not only his family, Trish, his five
25 beautiful children, but to his whole

1
2 workforce and friends. Sorry. The
3 coverage that Wayne has displayed is
4 second to none. Since the diagnosis,
5 he's been brave, he's been his humorous
6 self. He greets everything with humor and
7 he's just one of the funniest guys I ever
8 met, and that has not changed.

9 Bravery can be displayed in many
10 different ways, especially for a police
11 officer who's willing to lay down their
12 life. Wayne has displayed it even more so
13 since the diagnosis. He continues to
14 fight on, he continues to never give up,
15 and that's why we thank you for honoring
16 him today. Thank you (applause).

17 MR. SHEVLIN: Thank you, John. I
18 know normally when we give a Top Cop
19 award it's for bravery, it's for one
20 incident, most of the time it's for a
21 great arrest, for great work that we do.
22 This is a little bit different, but we
23 wanted to highlight this police officer.
24 Has always served people. He's always
25 done anything possible to help others. He

1
2 risked his life every day and night that
3 he went to work. We want to show today
4 that we are all here to support him and
5 his family during this very difficult
6 time and for that reason we are honored
7 that Police Officer Wayne Resnick, is our
8 Top Cop for December 2022 (applause).

9 POLICE COMMISSIONER RYDER: Good
10 afternoon and thank you, once again.

11 Every month we stand here and you so
12 graciously recognize our heroes. Our
13 heroes that are willing to put their
14 lives on the line. This is no different
15 today. Wayne is a hero. When is a hero
16 that went out there and served the people
17 of Nassau County unwavering. He's also a
18 hero to his wife and five children, and I
19 just made a new companion in James over
20 there (indicates). He goes out and did
21 right by his family.

22 When he got sick, there was an
23 accommodation made at the precinct so he
24 can come to work, not go home. He came to
25 work. Even heroes sometimes need help.

1
2 The Union, standing behind me, came
3 to bat for Wayne big time. The Department
4 came to bat for Wayne. But what all of
5 you don't sometimes realize, and I know
6 it goes back and forth up there at that
7 table. What you do for all of us and law
8 enforcement is because mental health,
9 welfare and everything that you've put
10 forward in your bills to recognize what
11 the men and women go through, well, we're
12 going to stand by our hero today. You've
13 stood by our hero today. We'll stand by
14 the family and will continue to do as
15 long as they're in need.

16 Again, thank you for always
17 recognizing our heroes.

18 OFFICER RESNICK: I want to thank
19 you all for honoring me today. It means
20 a lot and I appreciate it (applause and
21 standing ovation).

22 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
23 Legislator Ford.

24 LEGISLATOR FORD: Good afternoon.
25 It's a very special day here in the

1
2 Legislature and a perfect choice for the
3 PBA's Top Cop.

4 Officer Resnik, you have served
5 county and your community well and we
6 will always be indebted to you. You are
7 blessed with such a wonderful family and
8 being a member of the Nassau County
9 Police Department. You will always have
10 the support and friendship of these many
11 officers, as this is not an easy road you
12 have before you. To your wife and
13 children, you know you can count on these
14 officers. They will always be there for
15 you, no matter what happens.

16 And I just want to say, Officer
17 Resnick, we are proud to honor you as Top
18 Cop for December, but also I think that
19 you should deserve the honor of being a
20 Top Cop for 2022. God bless you. Thank
21 you.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: I
23 would just add that entire citizens of
24 Nassau County, all of us, are proud and
25 grateful of your service to our county

1
2 and our residents. Your courage and your
3 service is an inspiration to everyone
4 here. I know that your family is very
5 proud of you and all that you've done and
6 all of your friends and brothers and
7 sisters in the police force, but please
8 consider us to be proud of you as well,
9 and we are very grateful that you've
10 gotten the time to serve us. Thank you,
11 Officer Resnick.

12 Minority Leader Abrahams.

13 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I just wanted
14 to again express our appreciation on
15 behalf of Nassau County residents to
16 Officer Resnick. As you all know, when we
17 present our Top Cops every month, we get
18 to see what our officers are doing
19 exemplifying their bravery and being
20 courageous, but today we get to see the
21 human side of it. As I listened to
22 Officer Resnick and I'm looking at the
23 family members that are here, it's
24 important that we see our officers do a
25 great job every single day serving the

1
2 people in Nassau County and then many of
3 our officers have to deal with the human
4 aspect of what goes on in their home. And
5 Officer Resnick wouldn't be able to be
6 here today, so I want to give a big round
7 of applause to his family and to his wife
8 for being so supportive over those years
9 for what he's been able to do. Because
10 Nassau County officers, it's not easy to
11 do what they do, but you need a very
12 supportive, strong family to be able to
13 go out there every day and serve other
14 people other than your family. So let's
15 give a big round of applause to the
16 Resnick family as well (applause).

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2 you to present the citation to you and
3 your family.

4 (Whereupon, presentation of
5 Citation.)

6 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: We
7 will continue with our Top Cops
8 presentation. I would like to invite up
9 Michael Maloney from the Detectives
10 Association, vice president, for the
11 purposes of presentation.

12 DETECTIVE KELLY: Good afternoon,
13 everybody. I am Chris Kelly, the first
14 vice president of the Nassau County
15 Detectives. I wanted to thank all the
16 legislators for always honoring our
17 members. Thank you, Presiding Officer
18 Rich Nicolello, for organizing this
19 today.

20 Knowing what a huge issue catalytic
21 converters thefts have been in Nassau
22 County. The hard work over the last year
23 is a massive accomplishment by some of
24 our Asset Forfeiture detectives. Those
25 detectives are Kenton Lock and James

1
2 Tobin. All the hard work was led by our
3 great Commissioner, Patrick Ryder, who
4 will speak a little bit more on that.

5 POLICE COMMISSIONER RYDER: So this
6 is an ongoing case. So it's a little
7 different than normal speaking about it,
8 about what was in the news. We can tell
9 you what was in the papers, but there's
10 an ongoing part to this. But what the two
11 detectives did over the past year, when
12 every day we'd be up against cat-con
13 thefts that were going on. They were in
14 the background running this
15 investigation. And it was done out of the
16 Asset Forfeiture and Intelligence side. A
17 lot of intelligence that went into it.
18 This business did over a \$100 million
19 worth of of thefts and decanting, as they
20 call it. The two detectives on top of an
21 analyst that's not here today, Amanda,
22 they data-mined it constantly. Watched
23 the flow and kept pushing and pushing and
24 pushing until they got to that
25 conclusion. Six search warrants, \$7.2

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2 million in cash, hundreds and hundreds of
3 cat-cons. Both ones that have already
4 been stripped and ones that had not been
5 stripped yet. There's been three cases
6 around the country. This was the largest.
7 We believe this is going to change and
8 end all of your headaches, as well as
9 mine, from the phone calls that come
10 about the crimes that are happening. If
11 anybody is out there bringing a cat-con
12 to any of our yards, thanks to the
13 legislation put forward by this
14 Legislative Body, we will be going after
15 them now. Because they turn a blind eye
16 to a 19 year-old kid who walks in with 10
17 cat-con but presents his ID. That's what
18 he was asked to do. Well they're not
19 doing it due diligence and because of
20 that we're going to continue the
21 investigation. They're not going to say
22 nothing but thank you because they'll get
23 themselves in a position for the court
24 purposes. But I can't thank them enough
25 for the time and effort that they put in

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2 here, because this has been a thorn in
3 our side, that and stolen cars. What
4 they've done in this case and the work
5 we've done on our stolen cars, it's going
6 to be a great reduction in crime as
7 you're going to see in the next year.
8 Thank you.

9 DETECTIVE TOBIN: Thank you very
10 much.

11 DETECTIVE LOCK: Thank you very much
12 happy. Have a happy holiday.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
14 you, Detectives Lock and Tobin. This is
15 obviously an issue that is of incredible
16 importance to our residents. We've seen
17 in Nassau County that the theft of
18 catalytic converters has skyrocketed. It
19 affects all our neighborhoods. We
20 understand how difficult it is to prevent
21 these thefts because it can be done so
22 quickly with common tools. But the fact
23 that you put this time in -- obviously,
24 Commissioner couldn't give us much in the
25 way of detail -- But I'm sure this took a

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2 tremendous amount of perseverance,
3 attention to detail, just sticking to
4 this until you got what you needed. But
5 if we're ultimately ever going to be able
6 to put this to rest, and I think we will,
7 you really have to go after that side of
8 it. The demand side. If demand
9 disappears, the crime will disappear. So
10 thank you, on behalf of all of our
11 residents for the work that you've done,
12 along with the entire Police Department,
13 as well as our Commissioner, who's been
14 on top of this from the beginning
15 (applause).

16 LEGISLATOR FORD: I too want to
17 express my gratitude for the hard work
18 and the dedication and your diligence
19 effectively with these arrests and the
20 capture of these people that are behind
21 the catalytic converter thefts. Also, I
22 think, because of the great leadership
23 under Commissioner Ryder, I think that
24 this helped facilitate this.

25 Commissioner Ryder, you too, I

1
2 think, should be considered a Top Cop
3 today in more ways than one. I remember
4 when I was in your class, when you gave
5 the civilian class, you were telling us
6 all about IT and how important it was,
7 constant staying on top of different
8 things, utilizing the various tools that
9 are open to the Police Department. I
10 think in this case it has been
11 demonstrated quite well.

12 So all of you, you deserve great
13 honors. I know we can't go into it too
14 much. But I guess on behalf of everybody
15 here in Nassau County and especially the
16 residents in Long Beach, I want to say
17 thank you very much.

18 I do want to point out that as a
19 result, because these people did live in
20 our fair city, we have here with us
21 today, our City Manager, Donna Gayden,
22 our City Council President, Karen
23 McGuinness and John McNally, who also is
24 part of the administrative staff here in
25 the City of Long Beach. So thank you. I

1
2 don't now, if you wanted to say anything.

3 MS. MCGUINESS: Good afternoon. My
4 name is Karen McGuiness. I'm the
5 president of the Long Beach City Council.
6 On behalf of the residents of Long Beach
7 and all the residents of Nassau County,
8 we wanted to thank Commissioner Ryder,
9 the Detective Department, our unsung
10 heroes, and the entire Police Department
11 for their tenacity and professionalism in
12 making this bust. We think this sends a
13 loud message that the Nassau County PD
14 and its residents won't stand for this
15 type of behavior or business in our home
16 towns.

17 Again, thank you to the Nassau
18 County Police Department, not just for
19 your effort, but you're ongoing
20 partnership with the Long Beach PD and
21 all you do to keep Nassau County
22 residents safe. Thank you.

23 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you, Karen.
24 And just to be a little corny today, I'd
25 like to think of you guys as the cat-con

1
2 theft terminators. Thank you.

3 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
4 Legislator Drucker.

5 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you,
6 Presiding Officer. I just wanted to say
7 that it never gets old up here honoring
8 you guys and the bravery and all the
9 wonderful things you do. It never gets
10 stale or old. But what's refreshing and
11 what the upshot of today is your message
12 is resonating to the residents in the
13 county wide, because all of us get phone
14 calls, I'm sure, about this problem in
15 all of our districts. But what we're
16 doing today is we're sending that message
17 out that you guys are on top of it, and
18 that's really what our constituents want.
19 They call us to say, what are the cops
20 doing about it? Well, we now can show
21 them what you're doing about it. We can't
22 get into detail, but the fact that we're
23 here today to talk about it means that
24 the message is getting out and I want to
25 thank you for that.

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PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
Legislator Ferretti.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you,
Presiding Officer. Just joining with my
colleagues in thanking you for your
continued outstanding work. This is a
major, major issue for everyone up here
and all of our constituents. I doubt
there is a single district that hasn't
been affected by this spree of catalytic
converter thefts. I want to thank you for
the time that you put into this and
giving it the attention it deserves.

I do agree with Legislator Drucker
this is. It's a great message, but not
just to our constituents saying that you
know our cops are on top of it as you
are, but it's a message to the bad guys.
Right? You come into Nassau County, you
do this kind of this kind of stuff,
you're going to get caught, and that's
because of the leadership of Commissioner
Ryder and each and every one of you.
So thank you all for what you've

1
2 done and keep up the good work.

3 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: I
4 would like to invite you up so that we
5 can present some citations.

6 (Whereupon, Citation is
7 presented.)

8 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
9 right, we have several points of personal
10 privilege today. First up, Legislator
11 Mazi Pilip has a point of personal
12 privilege.

13 LEGISLATOR PILIP: Thank you,
14 Presiding Officer. It is a great pleasure
15 to recognize Lou Bernardi for recently
16 being chosen for induction into the New
17 York State Baseball Hall of Fame class
18 2023. With this honor, you will be
19 joining a list of baseball legends such
20 as Mickey Mantle, Keith Hernandez, Sandy
21 Koufax and other distinguished players,
22 coaches that have been inducted since
23 inaugural class of 2011. To do so at such
24 a young age, further adding to this
25 accomplishment, you have dedicated your

1
2 life to the sport, first starting at
3 Herricks High School, the New York
4 Institute of Technology and for several
5 years professionally. You then joined the
6 college coaching ranks, where you have
7 enjoyed success over the past 12 years,
8 including as a pitching coach at US
9 Merchant Marine Academy since 2019 and
10 helping lead the team to become the
11 champions of 2021 Skyline Conference, the
12 first in academy history. As a Long
13 Islander and lifelong resident of New
14 Hyde Park, you have also given back to
15 the community serving as a volunteer, a
16 mentor and many students leagues
17 providing thousands of pieces of
18 equipment to underprivileged youth so
19 they can enjoy the game.

20 Besides this latest achievement, you
21 have received many other awards as a
22 player, coach and humanitarian continuing
23 to promote the game of baseball every
24 step of the way. Today we have another
25 one to add to your collection.

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2 Lou, please accept this Point of
3 Personal Privilege award on behalf of all
4 residents of Nassau County. We are so
5 proud of you. Congratulations. Thank you,
6 Lou. Come if you want to say anything.

7 MR. BERNARDI: First of all, thank
8 you so much, Legislator Pilip, I consider
9 you a dear personal friend, and it's a
10 tremendous honor to be here today. Also,
11 it goes without saying, Presiding Officer
12 Rich Nicolello, our friendship goes back
13 many, many, many years, and thank you for
14 allowing the ceremony to be here today.

15 I don't know if everyone heard, but
16 the reason I'm here is I just got
17 inducted into the New York State Baseball
18 Hall of Fame (applause). So I'm going to
19 be going into the Hall of Fame in the
20 class of 2023, and I would be remiss if I
21 didn't just mention a few people that are
22 here with me today: Friends and family,
23 representation from the United States
24 Merchant Marine Academy, and one of the
25 main reasons why I'm getting inducted

1
2 this year, who I'll talk about in a
3 minute or two, and obviously my fiancée,
4 who's been with me every step of the way.
5 She gives me the strength to do these
6 things. So I'm very grateful for them to
7 say the least.

8 Since I was announced a few months
9 ago, I've had the honor and privilege to
10 speak to various individuals on various
11 different platforms, but the one
12 consistent question that remains the same
13 is: What does it mean to actually be in
14 the Hall of Fame? What does it mean? You
15 all could ask that same question to
16 yourself: What does it mean to be a
17 legislator? The people behind me can ask
18 the exact same thing. What does it mean
19 to be a police officer? And at first,
20 I'll be honest, it made me realize most
21 about my personal achievements, my
22 personal accolades, I played
23 professional, but that's all selfish at
24 the end of the day. It wasn't until I
25 spoke to, I'll call him my sponsor, my

1
2 advisor and the reason why I'm getting
3 into the New York State Baseball Hall of
4 Fame and he's with us here today, Ray
5 Negron, from the New York Yankees, who
6 was the one who wrote the letter to the
7 President and the Committee on my behalf.
8 It wasn't until I really spoke to him
9 that I realized why I was getting in. Now
10 playing and coaching achievements are
11 great, but it's such a small fraction
12 that paints the whole picture. And the
13 main reason was, as Legislator Pilip
14 said, strengthening relationships,
15 supporting communities and, most
16 importantly, leaving a legacy. And I'll
17 answer the question one more time and
18 then I'll end here. What does it really
19 mean to be in the Hall of Fame then? What
20 does it really mean? To be honest, it
21 means absolutely nothing. It means
22 absolutely nothing. And it means nothing
23 because if I don't use my voice, it means
24 nothing, because if I don't use my
25 platform for the better good and continue

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2 to be a role model for the next
3 generation, then it means nothing. It
4 means nothing. If I take advantage of it,
5 it means nothing. If I let this title get
6 to my head, it means nothing if I forget
7 where I came from. So for those reasons,
8 as far as I'm concerned, the easy part is
9 over. The hard part now is living up to
10 this prestigious honor and representing
11 the Hall of Fame, and continue to do what
12 I've been doing for the next several
13 years to come.

14 So, with that, I do thank every one
15 of you for being here today. A special
16 thanks to Legislator Pilip, Legislator
17 Nicolello. Thank you, both, for your
18 friendship. I wish everybody up there
19 happy holiday and, most importantly, a
20 happy and safe New Year. So thank you.

21 LEGISLATOR PILIP: Lou, you are
22 amazing. Thank you.

23 MR. BERNARDI: Thank you.

24 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
25 Legislator Schaefer.

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2 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Thank you,
3 Presiding Officer. Good afternoon,
4 everyone.

5 I am here today to talk about my
6 honoree, Dave Bernacchi. If you want to
7 come up to the microphone and I don't
8 know if your volunteer wants to come up
9 as well, she doesn't have to, but she
10 can, Denise.

11 So Dave Bernacchi is the founder and
12 president of Pets4Luv Foundation. Dave
13 and I met because I live in a building, a
14 condominium building, and we had a couple
15 of stray cats living outside of the
16 building and they were living out there
17 winter, spring, summer, fall; not a life
18 for a cat. I happen to be a person. I
19 like cats. I'm not a crazy cat lady, but
20 I have a cat. Dave's not a crazy cat man.
21 He's just got a tremendous heart. So I
22 reached out to Garry Rogers, who heads up
23 the Nassau County ASPCA. He put me in
24 touch with Dave. Dave came to our
25 building and he helped to trap the cats.

1
2 So I asked him what he does, what is
3 program involved. They trap and release
4 some cats, but they trap the cats. If
5 they're sick cats, they get them medical
6 care. They get every cat spade and
7 neutered if it's not already. If the cat
8 needs vaccinations, they get
9 vaccinations. All the money comes from
10 donations to his foundation or I'm going
11 to venture to guess out of your own
12 pocket. You don't have to admit to that,
13 but I bet you it does so.

14 When Dave and I were speaking one
15 day he said, maybe you can help me out
16 with something. I said sure, what is it?
17 And he said I've been trying to get in
18 touch with the county because I have an
19 idea. He said, myself and my volunteers
20 do some work in the county sumps. He said
21 we help control the feral cat colonies
22 and the sumps, which I don't know if you
23 knew you had. I said, no, I didn't know
24 that. Nobody ever complains to me about
25 feral cat colonies in sumps, maybe

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2 couches in sumps, but not that. So I
3 said, what do you want to do? And he said
4 I know we're doing this and probably
5 illegally, and we shouldn't be in there,
6 he said, but this is what we do. And I
7 said, okay.

8 Well, we put together a meeting. We
9 spoke to the County Attorney's Office, we
10 had DPW involved, Department of Health,
11 and Nassau County ASPCA so we could cover
12 all bases and make sure whatever they
13 wanted Dave to abide by and his
14 volunteers, what rules needed to be
15 followed he would do that. We came to an
16 agreement. Then we met with the County
17 Executive, who I want to thank very much
18 for being open to doing this. We have a
19 pilot program now called Community Cat
20 Management Initiative. Dave and his
21 volunteers started with five sumps that
22 they knew had colonies in them. He told
23 me the first sump that he started in
24 Hicksville had about 33 cats when he
25 started. Now they're down to 18 because

1
2 they are able to catch, they take and can
3 be socialized and they get adopted out.

4 Right now he just has cats in foster
5 homes. They had a brick-and-mortar in the
6 Source Mall, but when the new owner came
7 in, they kicked him out. So he is looking
8 for another place to have a shelter
9 because they run out of foster homes.

10 Like I said, they started with five
11 sumps. There's two more that have been
12 added, so we're going to amend the
13 agreement. There is no money. He's not
14 paid by the County at all. Everything
15 comes, like I said, from donations.

16 So I just wanted to say that I just
17 think you're amazing in what you do. You
18 really dedicate your life to this
19 mission. And I think it's important
20 because it does help the community. It
21 keeps that population under control. I
22 know you've said even older cats, there's
23 a sanctuary they can go to, if need be.
24 I just think that it's amazing and I
25 wanted to honor you today for that. I

1
2 also wanted to thank, like I said, the
3 County Executive for being open to this
4 and for making this happen. And it's a
5 pilot program, if anybody has any
6 questions for Dave, I think he's going to
7 speak a little bit. Thank you.

8 MR. BERNACCHI: I want to thank you
9 very much for all the help and being
10 there and making this successful. And I'd
11 also like to thank Mr. Blakeman for
12 stepping up and helping us finalize
13 everything. Because not too many people
14 understand the the problem, the horrific
15 problem we have all over, including
16 Nassau County, of the community cats that
17 are out there. And we use the term
18 community because you know there's cats
19 that are born outside. Unfortunately, we
20 need stronger laws, but there's too many
21 people that just decide they don't want
22 their cats any more and just throw them
23 out. People see a colony and they figure
24 nobody's going to notice one more cat.
25 And that's basically what Pets4Luv does

1
2 is all the community cats, the sick and
3 the injured, especially the ones that
4 get, you know, put out of a house, they
5 don't know how to survive out there. Our
6 average medical bill runs about \$5-7,000
7 a month because these cats don't know how
8 to survive, they starve, they get
9 attacked by the other cats.

10 It's just such a major step forward
11 and there's just so many people to thank
12 for this. Laura Schaefer and Mr.
13 Blakeman, the top two of making such
14 headway. I've been always saying it's
15 everybody working together to help solve
16 the problems.

17 And we're saying I can't tell you
18 how many cats and, as Laura had stated,
19 every sump we can usually reduce by 50%
20 of the cats that are out there. It's a
21 safe area. And once they set up the
22 feeding stations, the houses, it keeps
23 them in there. They're comfortable, they
24 have food, they stay off the streets.
25 They're not as much of a problem to the

1
2 neighborhood. There's less illnesses and
3 sickness. We do have several sanctuaries
4 that we deal with because a lot of the
5 senior cats that we find that just can't
6 survive out on their own can go to these
7 sanctuaries to live out their life. The
8 injured ones we take in. We give them all
9 the medical care. Most of them end up
10 having to be adopted because they can't
11 go back out. There is a small percentage
12 that there's just no way to keep them, so
13 they go back to where we placed them.

14 But it's just such an honor to be
15 here and such an honor to have this for
16 us. I just want to let you guys know, I
17 appreciate everything and hopefully the
18 laws and, like she said, my biggest
19 holiday wish, because I have been based
20 on Nassau forever since 2008, I'd really
21 like to stay here, but my holiday wish is
22 that we can get the County or somebody to
23 help us get a building so we can do it
24 right. With a building like when we had
25 it, it's a matter of saving thousands

1
2 rather than hundreds, with the place to
3 put them and move them through. Thank you
4 very much.

5 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Also, I don't
6 want to forget, if you, anyone who shops
7 on Amazon and I know you pretty much all
8 do, Pets4Luv is an Amazon Prime Smile
9 charity. You know where you can pick a
10 charity and all your purchases make a
11 donation to the charity of your choice.
12 So I switch to Pets4Luv as my charity. So
13 if anybody's willing to, every little bit
14 helps. Thank you (applause).

15 MR. BERNACCHI: Thank you very much.

16 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
17 Minority Leader Abrahams.

18 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you,
19 Presiding Officer. So my point of
20 personal privilege is for the Uniondale
21 Fire Department, the Roosevelt Fire
22 Department and Sanitation District 2.

23 Some of you might remember, last
24 month we had had a distinct honor with my
25 colleague Legislator Mule to recognize

1
2 the achievements in what they were able
3 to do with the Freeport Fire Department.
4 Some of you may remember, in early in
5 November there was a terrific fire in
6 Roosevelt where all three departments
7 worked together to try to ensure the
8 safety of the residents that were at that
9 home. The Roosevelt and the Uniondale
10 Fire Departments responded quickly and
11 promptly. I have to say not just because
12 they're my fire departments in my
13 legislative district, but they are one of
14 the most bravest fire departments that I
15 know. It seems like the fires that occur
16 in Uniondale and Roosevelt seem to be of
17 a very high degree of unsafety and they
18 constantly go in and and recognize the
19 fact and put there put the residents
20 lives first.

21 But then also I want to recognize
22 Sanitation District 2, because there were
23 several firefighters and my good friend
24 for probably about almost 20-25 years,
25 Carl Dehaney, is here to accept on behalf

1
2 of Sanitation District 2. Several of the
3 firefighters were actually working at
4 Sanitation District 2 and were able to
5 leave to be able to respond to the fire
6 as well. So I want to thank them as well.
7 If folks from Sanitation District 2,
8 Uniondale Fire Department, Roosevelt Fire
9 Department, please come up. I want to be
10 able to give you the opportunity and the
11 recognition.

12 As I said before, we are very
13 appreciative of what you are able to do.
14 I know Chief Ellerbe is here and several
15 members again from Sanitation District 2
16 as well as from the other fire
17 departments, but thank you again for your
18 courageous department putting the
19 resident's lives first before their very
20 own lives. But thank you again,
21 appreciate you very much. Chief, if you
22 would you like to say something?

23 FIRST ASSISTANT CHIEF ELLERBE: My
24 name is Jessica Ellerbe. I'm the first
25 assistant Chief of Uniondale Fire

1
2 Department. Today I'm here representing
3 Uniondale Fire Department and Roosevelt
4 Fire Department due to the Roosevelt Fire
5 Department chief's absence.

6 We'd like to thank you for
7 representing us, Legislator Abrahams, and
8 we'd also like to thank you for
9 recognizing us. This fire that we
10 responded to was horrific, like you said,
11 and it was a very rough day for us. There
12 were a lot of departments that responded
13 and it was a tough day for everybody. So
14 we would like to thank you for supporting
15 the fire service and just to remind you
16 all, we're all volunteer.

17 I'd like to introduce you to the
18 people that are here today. We have
19 firefighter Melendez from Roosevelt, we
20 have ex-Chief Cameron Peek from Uniondale
21 Fire Department and we have ex-Captain
22 Luis Depaz-Rodriguez who is also our
23 supervisor for our EMS program in
24 Uniondale. Thank you again. We appreciate
25 it (applause).

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LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you again, Chief. Carl, did you want to share some wisdom this holiday season?

MR. DEHANEY: Good afternoon, men and women of the Legislature, my name is Carl Dehaney. I'm the chairman of the Board of Commissioners for Sanitary District 2. I'm joined with Keith Eckles who is our general supervisor, as well as Joe Brown, who was the actual supervisor on duty, who was the supervisor on duty who jumped into action on that particular day. I just wanted to say thank you and give our appreciation to you, Legislator Abrahams. For recognizing Sani 2 in the middle of this.

What I will say is Joe embodies everything that the district is. Joe was just doing his job on that day and happened to see what was happening and jumped into action, and I can honestly say that that would be the same for anyone in our district. Were made up of some fine men and women in our district,

1
2 and I certainly appreciate you taking the
3 time to recognize us and what we do. My
4 dad always says something important. He
5 said you can tell something very
6 important if you stop doing it. And if we
7 stopped collecting garbage, we'd be in a
8 lot of trouble in our district.

9 So I just want to just thank you and
10 take this time to thank you for the
11 appreciation, a round of applause for Joe
12 for what he did on that particular day.
13 Thank you (applause).

14 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Well, thank
15 you, Carl, and thank you, Joe. I know Joe
16 was here a month ago when Legislator Mule
17 and myself recognized him as well, but we
18 just want to thank you again for your
19 tremendous involvement in our community.
20 Making sure our community is safe and
21 clean and obviously, everything that you
22 do with the sanitation district. I do
23 have citations here, Presiding Officer.
24 I'm going to ask all of the recipients to
25 meet me in the back. I guess we'll meet

1
2 on outside, back in the vestibule, to be
3 able to take the picture, so we don't
4 disturb the program so you guys can move
5 on with the business of today.

6 But I want to thank each and every
7 one of our recipients today for their
8 work and their involvement in our
9 communities. Thank you again, God bless
10 each one of you.

11 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
12 right, almost done with the Personal
13 Points of Personal Privilege. Would be
14 remiss if I did not take note of the fact
15 that in the last election one of our own
16 was elected as New York State Senator and
17 will be beginning his duties as January
18 1, 2023, our loss, he will not be serving
19 here any more. He'll be going on to
20 bigger and better things.

21 Steve Rhoads has been an exemplary
22 legislator. Nobody works harder than he
23 does. He has been extraordinary here at
24 the Legislature here in Mineola in terms
25 the substance of what we do and the

1
2 issues that we deal with. But there has
3 been no greater advocate for the
4 residents of their own district than
5 Steve Rhoads. He has been a phenomenal
6 legislator in every way that you could
7 have. So I want to congratulate you and
8 tell you, Steve, that we will miss you on
9 the Legislature.

10 LEGISLATOR FORD: This is it, Steve,
11 your time is up for talking (laughter).

12 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: The
13 Legislator from the 19th district is not
14 recognized (laughter).

15 LEGISLATOR FORD: No, you'll be
16 given an opportunity to say goodbye and
17 farewell, but I too want to echo what the
18 Presiding Officer has said. It's been a
19 pleasure working with you. You've always
20 been very dedicated, you've been very
21 devoted and actually do a lot of homework
22 on a lot of the issues. So I know a lot
23 of time when we're sitting around and
24 talking about different things, you do
25 provide some wisdom and some guidance in

1
2 some of the issues that do affect Nassau
3 County, and I mean this honestly, I'm not
4 getting around. But aside from that,
5 you've always been somebody who -- you
6 just have a great sense of humor, a great
7 disposition, and I think that you'll be
8 very welcome relief up in Albany. I think
9 that you'll bring some energy and some,
10 hopefully, youthfulness because there's a
11 lot of older ones up there. So maybe
12 you're going to set the trend. And his
13 good looks, of course. Howard's too
14 embarrassed to say, but I'll say it on
15 behalf of Howard, your good looks as
16 well.

17 But honestly, keep up the good work.
18 I think this was a well-deserved win for
19 you and I think that you'll do well up in
20 Albany, serving not only your senate
21 district but as well as, once again, all
22 the people in Nassau County. So good luck
23 with everything, and you will be missed
24 (applause).

25 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

1
2 Legislator Drucker.

3 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: From our side
4 of the aisle, I have to tell you, though,
5 that we are happy for you, Steve. You
6 have demonstrated -- this is my seventh
7 year in the Legislature, and I can
8 honestly say, in seven years, you have
9 always treated each and every one of us
10 with civility and respect, and you
11 represent how politics should really be.
12 We don't always agree, in fact, we rarely
13 agree, but that's not the point. The
14 point is is that you've demonstrated how
15 a legislature can operate in a civil
16 fashion. You have been a dedicated
17 legislator in all these years that I've
18 known you, and I do wish you the best of
19 luck up in Albany.

20 I do say it from a personal
21 standpoint, and actually, it's not a
22 personal standpoint, I think, from our
23 side of the aisle, we thank you. Because
24 our legislative sessions are now going to
25 be considerably shorter (laughter).

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PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
Legislator Lafazan.

LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: I'll save the
comedy for a Legislator Drucker.

Legislator Rhoads, on behalf of
myself as a person, I want to thank you
for the grace you showed me as a new
legislator in this building. No cameras,
no witnesses, just you and me in your
office explaining to me how this building
worked, explaining to me the nooks and
crannies of who to call and you need new
pens all the way to you now filing bills
and legislation. You're a tremendous
person and I think your constituents know
that and I think that's why they sent you
to Albany. So congratulations and I'm
lucky to count you as a friend. Thank
you.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
Legislator Walker.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Steve, I want to
wish you the very, very best of luck too.
Thank you for all you've done here on the

1
2 legislature. You know many times I've
3 reached out to you and you've reached out
4 to me and we've shared ideas and concerns
5 that we had. I'm very, very blessed
6 because the majority of my legislative
7 district will now be represented by you
8 as a senator. Expect a lot of phone calls
9 from me. I look forward to continue
10 working together with you in a very
11 positive way for all of our residents.
12 Thank you.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

14 Minority Leader Abrahams.

15 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Where do I
16 start? I could do like comedy central
17 hour here.

18 In all seriousness, Steve, it's been
19 truly a pleasure working with you.
20 Definitely, I could say, over the years
21 your insight and your probing questions,
22 compassion towards your community has
23 been tremendous. I thought there was a
24 possibility you may want to still be a
25 legislator and a state senator at the

1
2 same time and do dual service. But I do
3 recognize the fact that though we may not
4 agree on all the issues, I think we do
5 agree that we put residents first. And I
6 want to wish you nothing but the best in
7 your senatorial term and I look forward
8 to working with you in that capacity. And
9 I look forward to all of us to work with
10 you in that capacity.

11 But God bless you, I know it's a
12 it's bittersweet because you served with
13 us now for for some time and, obviously,
14 we all want to be able to move on and
15 move upwards in life and you're getting
16 an opportunity and well deserved. I think
17 the residents in your district are going
18 to be served well. So thank you, again,
19 for your service and look forward to
20 talking to you over the years. Thank you
21 again.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

23 Before, I move on to Legislator Ferretti,
24 Jerry did you need --

25 MR. KORNBLUTH: I just like to say a

1
2 few words, if I can. In reference to
3 Steve.

4 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Okay.

5 MR. KORNBLUTH: Jerry Kornbluth,
6 Nassau Community College. On behalf of
7 Nassau Community College, I would like to
8 congratulate Steve and for all the
9 support you've given the college. We
10 greatly appreciate it. We're looking
11 forward to you going to Albany and to
12 continue that support for Nassau
13 Community College. So congratulations,
14 have a great holiday and we look forward
15 to 2023. Thank you.

16 MR. CHITTY: Sorry for the
17 interruption, I just really wanted to say
18 you really quick, Steve. Thank you so
19 very much for your assistance. Over the
20 years we've had a lot of different
21 challenges, but we've always been able to
22 get past them. I truly appreciate all the
23 support, yourself and your colleagues in
24 the legislature. We look forward to
25 working with you with your new position.

1
2 Again, thank you so much and blessed
3 holidays. I'm sorry, Lionel Chitty,
4 Office of Minority Affairs. Thank you.

5 LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: So I may know
6 Steve longer than anyone up here. I'm not
7 sure because prior to Steve moving to the
8 dark side and the plaintiff side, he was
9 actually a defense attorney and in the
10 law firm I'm currently at. Through my
11 father I met Steve at a very young age.
12 We used to go to Met games together and
13 and other things. So I've known him for a
14 very long time and I was probably like
15 eight or nine and you were like 50
16 (laughter). But you know I want to thank
17 you, Steve, like Legislator Lafazan you
18 took me under your wing. Even before I
19 ever thought about running, I would see
20 you at things and you say you should
21 really run. You would be good. I took
22 that to heart. You took me under your
23 wing. You showed me a lot. I would say
24 that hopefully one day we'll serve again
25 together, but if you're sticking around

1
2 an Albany, probably -- no, thanks. But
3 really, good luck to you. You're going to
4 be a great State Senator, just like you
5 were a great County Legislator.

6 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
7 Legislator Giuffre.

8 LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: You didn't
9 think you'd get away without me saying
10 something. I learned from you, Steve. So
11 thank you. I've only known you for a
12 year as a legislator, but I do remember
13 meeting you when you first ran in that
14 special election. We walked some in your
15 district, my friend. But thank you. It's
16 been an education and you've been a good
17 teacher. So thank you very much. I wish
18 you well.

19 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: How do you feel?
20 Your fingers okay (laughter). Start that
21 three minute clock.

22 Getting the chance to work with all
23 of the amazing people here in Nassau
24 County and in the Town of Hempstead and
25 Town of Oyster Bay has truly been

1
2 special. You know, when I got here I used
3 to tell Norma Gonsalvez that it took me a
4 long time to get here, so I wasn't going
5 to wait trying to learn the ropes and
6 everything, getting involved in stuff. I
7 know that that was difficult at times.
8 But I want to thank each and every one of
9 you for your guidance in teaching me how
10 to be a more effective legislator and in
11 teaching me how to be a better person.

12 Getting the chance to work here for
13 for Nassau County, getting the chance to
14 meet some amazing people from the folks
15 down in the copy room, to all of our
16 employees and all the various agencies,
17 to the folks that work here at the
18 Legislature who truly do amazing work. I
19 don't think the public gets the
20 opportunity to see how much energy, how
21 much passion, and how much dedication the
22 employees of this county have to the
23 people that they serve. And it's truly
24 been an honor for me to have the chance
25 to work with you, the chance to represent

1
2 you, because local government is really
3 where the rubber meets the road and where
4 important things happen on a daily basis,
5 and I wish that the public got the chance
6 to see that.

7 To my colleagues here on the
8 Legislature and especially to the
9 colleagues and the Executive Branch that
10 we've had the chance to work with over
11 the years, I can't say thank you enough,
12 not only for what you've done for me but
13 for what you do in your individual
14 districts and what you mean to to Nassau
15 County. A lot of times we get to battle
16 back and forth, but every one of you is
17 passionate and dedicated to Nassau County
18 and to the people that you serve. The
19 disputes and the debates that we have are
20 always in the best interests of the
21 people of Nassau County, even if we may
22 not agree on the path we all agree on the
23 goal, which is to make sure that the
24 people of this county are served as well
25 as they can be served. And even though I

1
2 may be heading up to Albany, don't think
3 that my heart's not going to continue to
4 be here, and don't think that I'm going
5 to in any way not be a passionate
6 advocate for the people of Nassau County
7 as you are. I'm looking forward to the
8 opportunity, whether our districts touch
9 or not, I'm more looking forward to the
10 opportunity to be able to work with each
11 of you to benefit Nassau County in the
12 future.

13 We still have some meeting left and
14 there's some business to do. But I just
15 want to say a quick word of thanks. It's
16 been an honor and a privilege for me to
17 get the chance to serve with each of you
18 and thank you for what you and all of
19 Nassau County's employees do on a daily
20 basis to keep us safe, to keep our county
21 successful and to serve our citizens. God
22 bless you. Was that okay? Oh, the three
23 meet clock never started (laughter).

24 MS. MEREDAY: Presiding officer, if
25 I may. Meta J. Mereday.

1
2 I would like to offer my public
3 comments with regard to outgoing
4 Legislator Stephen Rhoads, incoming State
5 Senator, it has been a pleasure working
6 with you, knowing that you are one who is
7 committed to service. I think the first
8 time I met you we were standing outside a
9 house of a veteran after Sandy, and it
10 was an elevated house and you stood there
11 that day and committed yourself to being
12 of service to the many who are
13 underserved and unheard in this county.
14 So we do wish you well and we do look
15 forward to working with you. And ideally,
16 for those of you who don't know that, my
17 primary focus is always on communities
18 that are underserved, but my priority is
19 for our veterans. It's our hope that you
20 will be a driving force to bring actual
21 resources, much-needed resources, to our
22 veterans and our military families who
23 are struggling here in Nassau County, and
24 it's important that we address that and
25 bring that to the table, particularly

1
2 with the opportunities that are available
3 for us for federal and state funding
4 through the PACT bill. But I do want to
5 say that we appreciate you. You even came
6 to our community meetings. We don't see
7 too many of the elected officials
8 attending unless it's right before an
9 election, but you stepped up and you
10 showed up. We just want you to know that
11 we appreciate you and we're looking
12 forward to working with you. Happy
13 holidays to all. Trust me, even though
14 this is birth month, I will be kinder and
15 gentler, but I'm not leaving just yet.
16 Thank you.

17 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: The
18 Clerk has asked me to acknowledge that
19 Legislator Lafazan is here. He was here,
20 he spoke.

21 Stephen Edmundson.

22 MR. EDMUNDSON: Stephen Edmundson,
23 Oceanside, New York. I didn't get a
24 chance to talk to the police
25 commissioner. I did want to find out,

1
2 since he's been here for five years and
3 American Crime Laboratories is citing a
4 number of violations of what happened to
5 the police lab in Nassau County. It was
6 supposed to be -- it was shut down,
7 opened up and failed because Nassau Crime
8 Lab is not accredited. Nassau County tax
9 payers have been forced to pay other
10 crime labs for their forensic testing.
11 Kevin McKenna from Nassau News filed a
12 FOIL request at the Nassau County
13 Comptroller for invoice for the forensic
14 testing performed by Nassau County Police
15 Department. At the time Nassau County
16 Crime Lab, closed at the present, to see
17 how much taxpayers have been forced to
18 pay because the Nassau County Crime Lab
19 is no accredited.

20 Nassau County Police Department for
21 all the inspections and the Nassau County
22 Crime Lab, closed at present. See how
23 many inspectors Nassau County Crime Lab
24 has failed since closure of 2011.

25 The Nassau County Department of

1
2 Criminal Justice Services Forensic
3 Laboratory accreditation to all forensic
4 labs in New York state, such as Suffolk
5 County, NYPD, New York State Crime Lab.
6 And Nassau County Crime Lab is still not
7 one of the 20 forensic labs listed on
8 receiving forensic laboratory evidence
9 and why? No answer?

10 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Kevin
11 McKenna.

12 MR. MCKENNA: Good afternoon, Kevin
13 McKenna, Edna Drive, Syosett, New York.

14 Thanks to Kevin McKenna, thanks to
15 myself, Police Commissioner Patrick Ryder
16 is being forced to reply to his FOIL
17 request regarding two Nassau County
18 police supervisors who are in fact
19 moonlighting as defense attorneys with
20 unfettered access to police department
21 databases, and if they use the Police
22 Department databases to assist their
23 client, that is a felony every time that
24 they did it.

25 I submitted FOIL requests to the

1
2 Nassau County Police Department for
3 Detective Lieutenant Bellistri and
4 Skrynecki's written requests for off-duty
5 employment as attorneys, as they're
6 required to do, and the written approvals
7 they received. My FOIL requests were
8 denied for ridiculous reasons. I was
9 told first that I have to ask Bellistri
10 and Skrynecki for notarized written
11 permission before Ryder will comply with
12 the FOIL request. I reached out to
13 Kristin O'Neill, the assistant director
14 of the New York State Committee on Open
15 Government in Albany, and I asked her if
16 this ridiculous requirement is proper.
17 O'Neill confirmed that it was ridiculous,
18 and the Nassau County Police Department
19 must comply with my FOIL request.
20 Nassau's famous civil rights attorney,
21 Mr. Brewington, has expressed interest in
22 this topic.

23 What safeguards has Police
24 Commissioner Ryder put in place to
25 monitor people such as Bellistri, who was

1
2 paid \$278,000 last year, and Skrynecki,
3 who was paid almost \$200,000 last year,
4 to ensure that they are not using police
5 databases to assist their clients, which
6 would be a felony?

7 I hope this doesn't fall on deaf
8 ears. I've provided you all with a hard
9 copy for the record.

10 Next topic. In early October, hand
11 delivered a letter to the office of the
12 Nassau County Commissioner of Health,
13 Doctor Irina Gelman, notifying her that
14 the Town of Oyster Bay demolished a zombi
15 home, clad in asbestos at 6 Hyman Drive
16 in Farmingdale, New York. I wrote that
17 the Town of Oyster Bay took no asbestos
18 mitigation procedures before demolishing
19 this home, resulting in asbestos dust
20 covering adjacent properties and upon
21 completion it improperly and legally
22 buried aspects shingles in the yard.

23 I lastly requested Dr. Gelman, ask
24 County Executive Bruce Blakeman and Town
25 of Oyster Bay Saladino to terminate the

1
2 demolition of some homes until federal
3 guidelines regarding the safe demolition
4 of buildings containing asbestos material
5 are followed.

6 On October 21st, I received an
7 unsigned letter from the Nassau County
8 Department of Health, Gelman, stating
9 that they're in receipt of my letter and
10 they have forwarded it to the New York
11 State Departmental Labors' Asbestos
12 Control Bureau for follow up an
13 investigation. We don't even know if Dr.
14 Irina Gelman, the Commissioner of Nassau
15 County Health, we don't even know if she
16 saw the letter; she didn't sign it.
17 Unfortunately, this unsigned letter did
18 not even state that Nassau County would
19 be investigating this. The Asbestos
20 Control Bureau that she allegedly sent
21 this to has never contacted me. I'd like
22 to ask, especially the legislators in the
23 Town of Oyster Bay if you're going to
24 investigate this.

25 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank

1
2 you, Mr. McKenna, your time is up.

3 MR. MCKENNA: I'd like to ask the
4 legislators in the Town of Oyster Bay if
5 you're going to investigate this.

6 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Ann
7 Meyers.

8 MR. MCKENNA: So you have no concern
9 for the residents of the Town of Oyster
10 Bay.

11 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Your
12 time is up, Mr. McKenna.

13 MR. MCKENNA: Thank you, Mr.
14 Nicolello. You have a very happy holiday
15 and a happy holiday to all of you. I hope
16 that you take this matter seriously.
17 Thank you very much.

18 MS. MEYER: I thought that I was the
19 only one who can't get through the people
20 but hearing these people.

21 Basically, I have attempted to get
22 the flagpole at the south end of
23 Eisenhower Park repaired. It's rusted and
24 I think it's a shame to fly the flag on a
25 pole in that condition. I've spoken to

1
2 David, the assistant commissioner, and
3 his boss numerous times. I know you can't
4 paint at this time of the year, but it
5 was early summer and it could have been
6 done and should have been done.

7 I have also tried to get a meeting
8 on a different topic with both the
9 Democrat and Republican Board of Election
10 Commissioners. As a poll worker I saw
11 systematic problems that need to be
12 addressed, not publicly, but I would like
13 to make them aware of what I learned and
14 saw in that position. I've been calling
15 them. I've been in person to request
16 meetings. When I go in person I have the
17 date and time stamp that I'm there so I
18 can prove I've been there asking for an
19 appointment. No callbacks. It doesn't
20 happen.

21 I'm a little upset this morning
22 having seen the officer's family because
23 it brings me back to a time, and if Robin
24 is still here, she knows what I'm
25 speaking of. I went to a park in

1
2 Hempstead looking for a legislator or a
3 member of government to help someone and
4 I saw a Nassau County tent, so I went
5 over there. She was the only one under
6 the tent. And I said, excuse me, are you
7 a legislator? She said, no, dear, I'm
8 not, but I work for one and inquired as
9 to what the situation was. For many
10 years, she stayed involved, sending me to
11 the state representatives that I needed
12 help with, to the federal people that I
13 needed to contact with regards to this
14 person's status in the country. And I
15 would like to say to Mr. Abrahams, thank
16 you. Thank you for having someone like
17 Robin who cares, and I hope that there'll
18 be someone here that will help me to get
19 heard on these other matters.

20 And Mr. Ferretti, as a Yankee family
21 member; please, try the Yankees.

22 LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: No (laughter).

23 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
24 you. Commissioner of Parks is in the
25 back. Darcy, I just ask you to take a

1
2 look at that flag pole and if it needs to
3 be painted, get that done.

4 (Whereupon, off the record
5 conversation.)

6 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

7 Commissioner has indicated that there
8 were three poles in similar condition.
9 New poles are on order and supply chain
10 issues have prevented us from getting,
11 but they are going to do it.

12 Eric Alexander, Vision Long Island
13 and the Long Island Main Street Alliance.

14 MR. ALEXANDER: Thank you, Presiding
15 Officer, members of the Legislature. I
16 just want to thank many of you guys for
17 attending our Smart Growth Summit that we
18 had and speaking, Presiding Officer
19 Nicolello, Rose Walker, Steve Rhoads,
20 Laura Schaefer, Delia DeRiggi-Whitton,
21 Deb Mule, Arnie Drucker, Tom McKeivitt and
22 John Giuffre; really great to have you
23 guys there. We had 1000 people. It was
24 a bipartisan approach to governance and
25 working together on a whole slew of

1
2 issues: Downtowns, housing, walkability,
3 small business infrastructure, human
4 needs, and there's a whole series of
5 recommendations coming out of that that
6 will get to you guys. We're also going to
7 carry the work through the ears. Lots of
8 civics and chambers were part of the
9 effort as well.

10 Just a couple of highlights:

11 Walkable streets. We been working
12 with AARP on a whole slew of improvements
13 throughout Nassau County, and Long
14 Island. I want to think Rose Walker,
15 Laura Schaefer also for Hicksville
16 improvements. Debra Mule in Baldwin,
17 Siela Bynoe in Hempstead, Delia
18 DeRiggi-Whitton for some of the
19 recommendations and improvements up in
20 Glen Cove and in her district. And many
21 of you too. I'm sorry if I'm missing you
22 guys. Walkable streets is important. We
23 used to work with Sean Salli and Ari
24 Lemberger (phonetic) in the department.
25 We need to continue those relationships

1
2 moving forward. So we'll need to connect
3 you guys in those areas. But there's a
4 lot of money to improve our roadways.
5 That's one.

6 Marketing our downtowns. Big issue,
7 a lot of money and tourism never makes it
8 chambers. Really important that we do
9 more that get the dollars directly to
10 the chambers to promote their district.
11 So we did a lot of that on our own. We're
12 going to be calling on the State to pull
13 some of those dollars in and get them
14 directly to the communities. Stay tuned
15 on that.

16 Similar with doing direct outreach
17 to businesses to get dollars that are
18 available in various grant programs, we
19 have a guy on our staff, Muslino Sylvia
20 (phonetic), who works with us Long Island
21 Main Street Alliance going door-to-door.
22 Three out of four people don't know some
23 of these programs exist. So it's a real
24 issue as far as outreach. We've talked
25 about this before here at the Leg (sic)

1
2 and I know you guys are doing outreach
3 too, your offices, but we just need to
4 keep doing it.

5 We're working with Nassau Chambers,
6 South Asian Chambers, Hispanic Chambers,
7 African-American Chamber, Peruvian
8 Chamber, whatever local chambers, we work
9 with these guys door-to-door so stay
10 toned on.

11 We've talked with some of you guys
12 and fielded some of your guys calls and
13 communities about what's next at the
14 Nassau Hub. We hope there's public
15 meetings and openness about what is
16 happening next to the Nassau Hub. We've
17 gotten a lot of calls on that one.

18 And the last one I want to end with,
19 and I have 42 seconds, is a big issue
20 that you guys all stepped up on last year
21 with New York State trying to impose
22 local zoning or take over local zoning in
23 municipalities across the island. They
24 want to do it again. It's a problem, and
25 they're low balling what we have produced

1
2 as far as multi family housing across
3 Long Island. They're saying we've only
4 produced 6200 units of multifamily
5 housing in 12 years. That number's over
6 20,000. So we're working with Long Island
7 Builders Institute to crosscheck all
8 those numbers. But we know it's a whole
9 lot more than what they're saying. We
10 know we need to build more affordable
11 units. We know we need to plan better and
12 work with local communities. We know the
13 north shore could do a little more, but
14 planning is from the bottom up and not
15 from the top down from Albany. So we need
16 your help in that this year. We'd like to
17 work with you guys closer in the coming
18 year on this issue and many others. Look
19 forward to Steve Roads going to Albany.
20 We've talked about this housing issue
21 with the State kind of getting involved
22 in local zoning overreaching.

23 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
24 you, Eric. Appreciate you coming.

25 MR. ALEXANDER: Carry on. Have a

1
2 great holiday.

3 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: You
4 too. Meta Mereday.

5 MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday. I
6 will be brief as long as everybody plays
7 nice. I'm hoping we can go into 2023 with
8 a stronger focus, but ideally we need to
9 have some questions answered,
10 particularly as it pertains to
11 redistricting. We were told by the
12 Presiding Officer, and it was on the
13 record, that resident would have a
14 viable, legible map that we can see ahead
15 of time, not maybe 10 minutes before you
16 meet and vote for it. To provide some
17 questions in input for those who showed
18 up at those meetings in the cold, in the
19 rain, it clearly is an issue that
20 residents are up in arms about. So I'm
21 hoping that we can take it seriously.

22 I'd also like to have some kind of
23 record -- if I can't get it, maybe
24 *Newsday* can do some kind investigative
25 report for the number of settlements that

1
2 are listed on an ongoing basis in the
3 agenda. We need to have some kind of
4 accounting at the end of the year.
5 Literally how many settlements? What is
6 the amount of these settlements that have
7 been paid out for various and sundry
8 activities that the County has decided to
9 compromise and settle? We need to know
10 that.

11 So distracting is one. If somebody
12 could possibly give us some answers, that
13 would be greatly appreciated because,
14 unfortunately, that situation will be
15 going to court. I was hoping we didn't
16 have to go that route, but but it's true.

17 Lastly, as I said previously with
18 regard to veteran services, we had an
19 opportunity here, with me being on the
20 White House Office of Public Engagement,
21 to get first-hand information about what
22 was happening with the PACT bill (sic) at
23 the beginning of this year. We could have
24 moved on some things that could have
25 situated our veterans and their families

1
2 a lot better.

3 The gentleman that spoke earlier
4 about looking for a space for the pets,
5 think about Nassau University Medical
6 Center. Animal therapy is something
7 that's a great asset for our veterans
8 that are struggling. You've got nothing
9 but space there. You got nothing but
10 opportunity there. Some of the key
11 components of the PACT bill (sic),
12 healthcare staff and claim processors,
13 received toxic exposure, related
14 education and training. That's funding.
15 Our current staffing at the Veteran
16 Services agency does not have the
17 capacity to take on this new amount of
18 work. With regard to the PACT bill. The
19 Act requires research on mortality of
20 veterans who served in various aspects:
21 Gulf War, Post 9/11, et cetera.

22 There's federal funding. Again, a
23 research and development facility --
24 plenty of space at the medical center. It
25 builds stronger skilled workforce. Again,

1
2 funding available to make these things
3 happen. The Act authorizes 31 new medical
4 facilities across the country. Why can't
5 it be here? We brag about being one of
6 the largest veteran populations in the
7 Northeast corridor, why don't we have the
8 resources that are available to us?

9 And I will wrap-up before anybody
10 says anything to me, because you told Mr.
11 McKenna to sit-down, but you let Mr.
12 Alexander kind of go on a little bit. So
13 I'm going to wrap it up. But I'm going to
14 say this: We need to step up. That's why
15 I'm wearing this hat that is emblematic
16 of the Tuskegee Airmen. It's about rising
17 above. They had to rise above in World
18 War II, when African-Americans served in
19 hundreds of thousands, including
20 Hispanics, Native Americans, and they
21 fought for a double victory: Victory in
22 Europe and victory at home. We
23 collectively made sure that there was a
24 victory in Europe, but we're still in
25 2022 trying to get victory in equity and

1
2 in fairness here. Do we have to go to the
3 court to get it? I would hope not, but if
4 so, we stand ready.

5 Thank you. Happy holiday, happy
6 Kwanza, Happy Hannukah, Buon Natale,
7 Feliz Navidad and goodbye.

8 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank,
9 you, Meta. You too.

10 Leveda Felder.

11 MS. FELDER: I just didn't want to
12 take up too much time. I just wanted to
13 put on record the documents that I left
14 for review which are submitted claims by
15 ETS that were altered after submission by
16 workers at Nassau County Department of
17 Social Services, indicating the balance
18 due. I also left documentation, evidence
19 that the clients were removed out of the
20 shelter under false pretense. I left
21 documentation from the Director Office of
22 Community Development requesting a
23 viability report and indicating that we
24 needed our 501C3 reinstated and now they
25 won't speak to us. We have an outstanding

1
2 balance of \$23,000 in COVID funding that
3 we were trying to get and he won't call
4 back and he hung up the phone on me.

5 And I also left documentation that
6 representatives from Nassau County
7 Department of Social Services submitted
8 false information to the Office of
9 Temporary Disability Assistance. Thank
10 you.

11 Happy holidays and congratulations,
12 Senator Rhoads.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
14 you. You as well.

15 John Gross. Just to let you know
16 the the agreement is on the Consent
17 Calendar.

18 MR. GROSS: I'll be very, very
19 brief. I wanted to extend the
20 appreciation of the college for your
21 bipartisan approval of the settlement,
22 which was long in coming. Thank you very
23 much.

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PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: We are going to move to the Consent Calendar at this time. These are items that went through Committees and it's been agreed by the majority and minority that no further debate discussion is needed at this this time.

3 legislators?

4 (Whereupon, no verbal
5 response.)

6 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
7 Hearing none.

8 I did not call 12, I am going to
9 call that next. On the items that I did
10 call, all favor, signify by saying aye.

11 (Whereupon, all members of
12 the Nassau County Legislature
13 respond in favor.)

14 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
15 oppose.

16 (Whereupon, no verbal
17 response.)

18 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
19 Carried unanimously.

20 Item 12, Resolution 228. Let the
21 record reflect that Legislator Rhoads is
22 leaving the chambers will not be
23 participating in any debate, discussion
24 or vote on this specific item.

25 Motion by Legislator Walker,

1
2 seconded by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
3 Any debate discussion on Item 12?

4 (Whereupon, no verbal
5 response.)

6 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
7 Hearing none, all in favor, signify by
8 aye.

9 (Whereupon, all present
10 members of the Nassau County
11 Legislature respond in favor.)

12 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
13 Carries. You can invite Legislator
14 Rhoads back into the chamber.

15 We have two more items on regular
16 account and then we have some emergency
17 items and a couple of other things that
18 we need to do.

19 Item 19, Resolution 235. A
20 resolution to authorize the County
21 Attorney to compromise and settle the
22 claims of the County of Nassau against
23 the proceeds of a performance bond
24 relating to a license agreement between
25 the County of Nassau and Carlton on the

1
2 Park. Motion by Legislator Rhoads,
3 seconded by Legislator Schaefer. Any
4 debate or discussion on Item 19?

5 (Whereupon, no verbal
6 response.)

7 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Going
8 to vote. All in favor of Item 19 signify
9 by saying aye.

10 (Whereupon, members of the
11 Republican Deligation respond
12 in favor, 12.)

13 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
14 opposed?

15 CHIEF DEPUTY COUNTY EXECUTIVE WALSH:
16 Arthur Walsh, Chief Deputy County
17 Executive. The attorney, Andrew Scott,
18 who was working on the file is out ill
19 today, so Maria Boultadakis should be in
20 the building any second now. She is on
21 her way over.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: So the
23 vote was 12 votes in the affirmative and
24 five opposed. So the Item passes by a
25 vote of 12:5.

1
2 Item 20, Resolution 236. A
3 resolution authorized the County Attorney
4 to compromise and settle the claims of
5 plaintiff as set forth in the actions Old
6 Brookville Residence versus the County of
7 Nassau. Motion by Legislator Walker,
8 seconded by Legislator Giuffre. Any
9 debate or discussion about this item?

10 (Whereupon, no verbal
11 response.)

12 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
13 Hearing none. All in favor of the item
14 signify by saying aye.

15 (Whereupon, all members of
16 the republican delegation
17 respond in favor, 12).

18 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
19 opposed.

20 (Whereupon, members present
21 for the Democratic delegation
22 respond opposed, 5).

23 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: So
24 that's another vote of 12:5. Item
25 passes.

1
2 We have a procedural resolution
3 which is Resolution 18 as to procedure,
4 it's a resolution to establish a calendar
5 for meetings for the Legislature for the
6 calendar year 2023 pursuant to the County
7 Government law of Nassau County. Motion
8 by Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel
9 seconded by Legislator Ford.

10 So this is just a item that sets the
11 calendar for next year's legislative
12 meetings both Full Legislature and
13 Committees; any debate discussion?

14 (Whereupon, no verbal
15 response.)

16 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: No
17 public comment on the calendar item.

18 All in favor, signify by saying aye.

19 (Whereupon, no verbal
20 response.)

21 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
22 opposed?

23 (Whereupon, no verbal
24 response.)

25 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

1
2 Carried unanimously.

3 Now we have an emergency calendar as
4 well. So there are a number of emergency
5 items today. These include Clerk Items
6 395 through 403-22. They relate to
7 levying of charges for the construction
8 or reconstruction of sidewalks and
9 demolition, clearing and securing of
10 unsafe premises for both the Towns of
11 Hempstead and Oyster Bay. With the
12 permission of the minority, I would ask
13 that a formal reading of the emergency
14 declaration into the record by waived
15 pending an examination or an explanation
16 from the Department of Assessment as to
17 the nature of the emergency and the
18 underlying items themselves. Motion by
19 Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel, seconded
20 by Legislator McKeivitt, to establish the
21 emergency. Do we have representatives
22 from the Department of Assessment. This
23 is as to the emergency.

24 MS. ESTIS: Yes. Hi. Good
25 afternoon, Karen Estis. Department of

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Assessment.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: What's the nature of these items?

MS. ESTIS: For the sidewalks and demolition?

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Yes.

MS. ESTIS: These are charges. If a sidewalk is broken or cracked or whatever and the homeowner hasn't repaired it, then the County must repair that, and so this is the charge for that.

The Town of Hempstead has five installments, the Town of Oyster Bay does not. So they give them five years in the Town of Hempstead to pay.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Let me ask you this, we were told that this had to be considered at this meeting.

MS. ESTIS: Yes, because it has to get on the 2023 general tax.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Would just explain that a little bit more.

MS. ESTIS: I'm sorry. What would you like me to explain?

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PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: What
does that mean?

MS. ESTIS: It has to go out as a
part of the general tax bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All
right. Thank you.

Legislator Drucker.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Just a quick
question: Is there any correlation
between these tax levies and the County's
responsibility to repair or replace
defective sidewalks on county roads?

MS. ESTIS: These are for private
private residences.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: But there are,
at least in my district, there are a
number of private homes whose backyard
abuts or is adjacent to county roads that
are in poor condition. Does any of these
tax levies correlate to that?

MS. ESTIS: No.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Can you answer
why?

MS. ESTIS: I don't have the

1
2 information right now to answer that.

3 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: I really am
4 curious as to the answer. Could you
5 provide?

6 MS. ESTIS: Okay. I will research
7 that for you and I'll get back to you.

8 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you very
9 much.

10 LEGISLATOR FORD: Hi. I would like
11 to know that answer too, because I have
12 properties that also that can pose as a
13 great risk to some of our students
14 traveling along Lido Boulevard.

15 But on the tax levy on this one, is
16 this the one where we're granting the
17 permission for the Town of Hempstead and
18 the Town of Oyster Bay to include these
19 charges on the resident's tax bill? It'll
20 be under their taxes, it's not a special
21 levy levied by the County. It won't be on
22 the County tax bill, but on the Town's.

23 MS. ESTIS: That's correct.

24 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you.

25 LEGISLATOR WALKER: And just to

1
2 verify so any of these are homes that in
3 the front of their home is a County road.

4 MS. ESTIS: I'm sorry. I really
5 can't answer that. There's a number of
6 residences there.

7 LEGISLATOR WALKER: But there are
8 bills that would then go on each town's
9 tax bill.

10 MS. ESTIS: Yes.

11 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Say if the
12 sidewalk in front of my house, I didn't
13 repair it. The Town would then come in
14 and repair it. Then charge me on my tax
15 bill.

16 MS. ESTIS: That's correct.

17 LEGISLATOR WALKER: And you're going
18 to let us know about the homes that have
19 rear properties that are on County roads.

20 MS. ESTIS: Absolutely. That's
21 important, I think, to all of us, because
22 we all deal with that issue.

23 MS. ESTIS: Okay. Will do.

24 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
25 Legislator Ferretti.

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LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Hello.

So, just for the sake of clarity,
all we're doing today is allowing the
Department of Assessment to allow the
towns get back the money that the towns
laid out to repair sidewalks that
residents failed to repair, right?

MS. ESTIS: Correct.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: So nothing
that we're voting on today has anything
to do with county roads, correct?

MS. ESTIS: Correct.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: I apologize,
that was my error. I realize it was all
town roads. But that other issue is very
big to all of us, so it's important for
you to get back to us about that.

MS. ESTIS: Absolutely, I have it
written down and I'll get back.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Going to say
one quick thing. Thank you, Presiding
Officer. Thank you, Legislator Ferretti,
because I wasn't clear about that either.

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So every one of these tax levies for
repairs that have already taken place by
the County?

MS. ESTIS: Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Town.

MS. ESTIS: Town.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Right. Thank
you.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Anyone
else?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
you very much.

MS. ESTIS: Thank you. Have a very
nice holiday.

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: You
too.

So on the emergency, all in favor of
the emergency signify by saying aye.

(Whereupon, all members of
the Nassau County Legislature
respond in favor.)

PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those

1
2 opposed?

3 (Whereupon, no verbal
4 response.)

5 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
6 Emergency is established.

7 So now I have to call Clerk Items
8 395-403-22, Resolutions 248A through 248I
9 2022. Motion by Deputy Presiding Officer
10 Kopel, seconded by Minority Leader
11 Abrahams to put those items in front of
12 us for a vote on the substance of the
13 items. All in favor, signify by saying
14 aye.

15 (Whereupon, all members of
16 the Nassau County Legislature
17 respond in favor.)

18 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
19 opposed.

20 (Whereupon, no verbal
21 response.)

22 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: They
23 pass unanimously.

24 We have one more item on the
25 emergency calendar, Item 404. This is an

1
2 ordinance amending ordinance number
3 72-2022 fixing the tax rates and levying
4 taxes for the 12 month 2023 fiscal year,
5 beginning January 1, 2023 and ending
6 December 31st, 2023 upon taxable
7 properties within the county. We needed a
8 motion to establish the emergency
9 Legislator Rhoads makes that motion.
10 Seconded by Legislator Walker. Do you
11 guys want to discuss the emergency
12 nature, or you just want to go right to
13 the substance? All in favor of the
14 emergency, signify by saying ayes.

15 (Whereupon, all members of
16 the Nassau County Legislature
17 respond in favor.)

18 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
19 opposed?

20 (Whereupon, no verbal
21 response.)

22 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:
23 Carries unanimously.

24 I'm going to read again the item
25 404-22, ordinance 89-A-22, an ordinance

1
2 amending ordinance number 72-22 fixing
3 the tax rates and levying taxes for the
4 12 month 2023 fiscal year beginning
5 January 1, 2023 and ending December 31,
6 2023 upon taxable properties in the
7 county. Motion by Minority Leader
8 Abrahams, Second by Legislator
9 DeRiggi-Shitton.

10 MR. PERSICH: Andy Persich. Office
11 of Management and Budget. I just wanted
12 to say congratulations to Legislator
13 Rhoads. It's been a pleasure working
14 with you and I will take any money you
15 can send us from this great state of New
16 York (laughter).

17 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Looking forward
18 for the chance to talk about buckets
19 (laughter).

20 MR. PERSICH: Me too. Keep filling
21 mine.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: They
23 have no idea what they're in for.

24 MR. PERSICH: Item 404 is the annual
25 tax warrant. The establishment of the

1
2 emergency -- I'll just give a little
3 background. This comes in very late, so
4 what happens is we have to do a crash
5 course on getting all the information
6 from Assessment to us and putting it in
7 the format and the substance of format
8 that we have. There's no other way around
9 this. I wish there was, but it's always
10 going to be established by emergency, I
11 think, at the last meeting of the
12 Legislature. So if you have any questions
13 about it, it's a standard procedure that
14 we do annually.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Any
16 questions?

17 Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.

18 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I want
19 to thank you, Andy. I got a call from
20 Glen Cove. We're one of the areas that
21 are not sewered; at least some of our
22 home owners, 140. So I think you just
23 avoided a lot of problems by addressing
24 that prior to the tax bills going out.

25 MR. PERSICH: Thank you. Yes, it

1
2 was a challenge, I will say, over the
3 weekend, but we got it done. So I will
4 say that much.

5 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I knew
6 you could, so that's why I didn't worry
7 about it.

8 MR. PERSICH: Thank you.

9 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Any
10 other questions?

11 (Whereupon, no verbal
12 response.)

13 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Thank
14 you, Andy.

15 MR. PERSICH: Thank you.

16 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: All in
17 favor of the item, signify by saying aye.

18 (Whereupon, all members of
19 the Nassau County Legislature
20 Respond in favor.)

21 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
22 opposed?

23 (Whereupon, no verbal
24 response.)

25 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO:

1
2 Carries unanimously.

3 One more item of business and that
4 is in addition to our Legislator Rhoads
5 were also going to be saying goodbye to
6 Kevin Long who was served with
7 distinguish this County for 30 years. He
8 provides IT services to the Legislature.
9 Kevin has been available to all of us on
10 a moment's notice. We have his personal
11 cell. He responds immediately. Every
12 technical issue that this County has
13 dealt with in terms of these meetings,
14 throughout the pandemic and, thereafter,
15 Kevin has a handled with a tremendous
16 amount of skill and professionalism,
17 under tremendous amount of strain.

18 On behalf of myself and am sure
19 others will want to speak, Kevin, thank
20 you very much for your incredible service
21 to this county. We appreciate it and we
22 will definitely miss you.

23 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Kev, I feel
24 like for some of us old-timers. When I
25 say old-timers, I'm one of them. We knew

1
2 Kevin Long, Rich knows this, I think was
3 probably just me and Rich. I don't know
4 anybody else that was over in the old
5 building -- and Denise. We started in
6 the old building. We've known Kevin for a
7 very, very long time and he's always been
8 prompt. He's always been diligent in
9 getting us back up and running,
10 especially when some of the problems that
11 we were having on our computers were
12 self-created. I feel like over the last
13 few years I mean just being in this place
14 now -- I don't know how long I've been
15 here, 22 years -- I just feel like I'm
16 not just losing colleagues, but I'm
17 losing friends. I know we're not losing
18 you, per say, but we're looking forward
19 to your retirement. I'm looking forward
20 for your next chapter in your life and
21 you enjoy that. And I just at wish you
22 nothing but success. God bless you,
23 Brother. You've been a good guy and
24 that's very hard to find. Keep it up and
25 look forward to hearing from you in the

1
2 future. Thanks again.

3 LEGISLATOR FORD: I too, Kevin, want
4 to wish you good luck and you are going
5 to be missed. And yes, when we came over
6 from West Street over to here it was a
7 big job getting all of these screens up
8 running. We didn't have this technology
9 in One West Street were like little, tiny
10 little room or something. So here we are
11 a much bigger room. But also with our
12 offices, the TVs put in, whatever. So
13 there's a lot of hard work on your part
14 and you were able to help us transition
15 into this new environment and it was a
16 big undertaking for everybody, especially
17 those in IT. But you've always been a
18 good friend. You've always been very
19 friendly, always available. Yes, Kevan,
20 I'm one of those people that many a time
21 I realized I did something wrong and like
22 and want to cringe behind my desk. But
23 you're always very polite to try to give
24 me a better answer so I didn't have to
25 feel like I should be ashamed of what I

1
2 just did so. But thank you very much.
3 Good luck with whatever you do. We really
4 are losing a very good friend and a very
5 technician. Thank you.

6 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: You
7 mean questions like how do you turn this
8 on (laughter)?

9 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Kevin, I just
10 want to thank you for always being there
11 for all of us. I know my office had
12 reached out to you very, very often and
13 and sometimes we had some real issues up
14 there to try to get it resolved. But
15 somehow we always made it happen together
16 and you were such an asset to us always.
17 And everything you did was with a
18 kindness and caring and your compassion
19 with just our work here and anything that
20 involved issues here, but also with all
21 our families and everything. And I just
22 wish you the very, very best of luck and
23 I hope you enjoy your retirement and if
24 you decide to go on to something else,
25 the best of luck with that. But enjoy the

1
2 life ahead that you have and enjoy your
3 family and your little ones because
4 that's what it's really all about. So God
5 bless and thank you again for everything.

6 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Kevin, in my
7 seven years, I consider you a
8 chronological contemporary. So there's
9 nothing that's more appreciated than when
10 someone makes you feel that you're not an
11 idiot. There have been countless times
12 as Presiding Officer just said of turning
13 things on, and Denise, you and Kevan have
14 also made points too. As the Presiding
15 Officer indicated, you give us your
16 personal cell number and I've called it
17 numerous times and you pick up the phone,
18 you respond by text, and it's so
19 gratifying, it's so comforting, and so
20 reassuring. Especially during -- we had
21 to get on Teams meetings during the
22 pandemic and, God Almighty, sometimes
23 that was a little challenging when you
24 weren't around or you weren't in a
25 certain place and you are so patient with

1
2 all of us. I just can't tell you in all
3 my years with knowing you, how
4 appreciated you are to me and to all of
5 us, and I wish you the very best of luck,
6 health and happiness to you in your next
7 chapter (applause).

8 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: We
9 have a presentation to make, unless you
10 want to say anything at the first.

11 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: You know how to
12 use it, don't you (laughter).

13 MR. LONG: Is it on, do you hear me
14 (laughter)?

15 I have actually gone all this time
16 without actually being on the record ever
17 and now on my last day.

18 Thank you all very much, very kind
19 words. I appreciate it. It's been a
20 pleasure and an honor to have worked with
21 you, some of you for a matter of months,
22 some of you for a number of years, some
23 of you, one of you from the election of
24 the first legislature through today. But
25 I appreciate it. Thank you very much. You

1
2 all have my phone number. Use it if you
3 need it. We can work out billing
4 (laughter).

5 (Whereupon, citation
6 presented.)

7 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: While
8 he is doing that, I need a motion to
9 adjourn the Legislature. That's reserved
10 for Legislator Rhoads.

11 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: So moved.

12 I already said my last piece, but I
13 do want to say -- sorry -- I do want to
14 say a big thank you to Sandy VonRunnen.
15 Who has been my aide for for the last
16 eight years, and we'll be moving over to
17 the, to the Senate with me. She, Mike
18 Lynch, Brandon VonRunnen, a list of
19 people have, despite my efforts to make
20 their job more difficult, have always
21 tried to make me look good. So, Sandy,
22 thank you very much for your amazing
23 work. I Appreciate and I'm looking
24 forward to working with you up in Albany.

25 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Second

1
2 by Minority Leader Abrahams. All in
3 favor of adjourning signify by saying
4 aye.

5 (Whereupon, all members of
6 the Nassau County Legislature
7 respond in favor.)

8 PRESIDING OFFICER NICOLELLO: Those
9 opposed.
