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- 2 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: At this time I
- 3 will call the Public Safety Committee to
- 4 order and ask the clerk to call the roll.
- 5 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Mule?
- 6 LEGISLATOR MULE: Here.
- 7 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator
- 8 Bynoe?
- 9 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Here.
- 10 CLERK PULITZER: Ranking Member
- 11 Delia DeRiggi-Whitton?
- 12 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
- 13 Here.
- 14 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator John
- 15 Ferretti?
- 16 LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Here.
- 17 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator
- 18 Vincent Muscarella?
- 19 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: Here.
- 20 CLERK PULITZER: Vice Chair
- 21 Legislator Rhoads?
- 22 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Here.
- 23 CLERK PULITZER: Chairwoman
- 24 Denise Ford?
- 25 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Here.

- 2 CLERK PULITZER: We have a
- 3 quorum, ma'am. There are three items on the
- 4 regular agenda today which are Clerk Items
- $5 \quad 77-18, \quad 78-18 \text{ and } 80-18.$
- 6 Clerk Item 77-18 is a local law
- 7 to amend Title 64 of the Miscellaneous Laws
- 8 of Nassau County.
- 9 May I have a motion?
- 10 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: So moved.
- 11 LEGISLATOR MULE: Second.
- 12 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Moved by
- 13 Legislator Rhoads, seconded by Legislator
- 14 Mule. This item is an amendment to Nassau
- 15 County's Social Host law which, in its
- 16 existing form, prohibits a person over the
- 17 age of 18 who owns, rents, or otherwise
- 18 controls a private residence from knowingly
- 19 allowing the consumption of alcohol by
- 20 individuals under the age of 21 on such
- 21 premises, or failing to take reasonable
- 22 corrective action upon learning of the
- 23 consumption of alcohol.
- 24 Since the enactment of the
- 25 Original Host Law in 2007, opioid addiction

- 1 Public Safety Committee/3-12-18
- 2 amongst young people has become disturbingly
- 3 commonplace.
- 4 The necessity to include
- 5 controlled substances including heroin and
- 6 Oxycodone within the scope of the Social
- 7 Host Law has been apparent.
- 8 By including controlled
- 9 substances within the Nassau County Social
- 10 Host Law, parents, guardians, siblings,
- 11 friends, and anyone else over the age of 18
- 12 will be held accountable for the consumption
- of controlled substances by anyone under the
- 14 age of 21 at his or her owned rented or
- 15 otherwise controlled private residence.
- The goal of this amendment is to
- 17 stop opioid and other drug use amongst young
- 18 people in locations where it should least
- 19 likely be occurring and ultimately prevent
- 20 addiction which devastates countless lives
- 21 every day.
- 22 Any debate or discussion? Yes,
- 23 Legislator Rhoads.
- 24 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: I just want
- 25 to thank you, Madam Chairwoman, as one of

- 1 Public Safety Committee/3-12-18
- 2 the sponsors as well as Legislator Laura
- 3 Schaefer and Tom McKevitt. I think this is
- 4 an important piece of legislation as a first
- 5 responder myself. Unfortunately, I can't
- 6 tell you how many homes we have the
- 7 opportunity to respond to in an instance
- 8 where you have someone in that home that's
- 9 in the process of an active overdose.
- By instituting this legislation
- 11 it forces all of us, any adult, to pay more
- 12 attention to what's happening inside your
- 13 own home.
- 14 We all hear stories about there
- 15 being parties involving alcohol, parties
- 16 involving drugs. Ultimately people need to
- 17 know they are responsible for the activities
- 18 that are taking place under their roof.
- In a situation where it can be
- 20 established that an adult or a person over
- 21 the age of 21 knowingly permitted those
- 22 activities to go on under their roof, there
- 23 should be some consequences to that.
- 24 The intention as the chairwoman
- 25 said is to make opioids -- to make it less

- 2 convenient for opioids to be used in a
- 3 comfortable setting and the ultimate goal is
- 4 eliminating that use.
- 5 It should be noted that this
- 6 applies to Class 1 through 4 drugs as
- 7 defined in the State Public Health Law which
- 8 would include marijuana, heroin,
- 9 hydrocodone, oxycodone, fetanyl, anabolic
- 10 steroids and cocaine, as well as all the
- 11 other drugs that are encompassed within that
- 12 description.
- I think it's important piece of
- 14 Legislation and I certainly want to thank
- 15 you Legislator Ford for your leadership as
- 16 well as Legislator Schaefer and Legislator
- 17 McKevitt on that issue.
- 18 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Legislator
- 19 Mule.
- LEGISLATOR MULE: Yes, I would
- 21 just like to say that this is a common sense
- 22 amendment that needed to be done. It's
- 23 something that came out, directly out of the
- 24 heroin prevention task force meeting where
- 25 people from all different stakeholder groups

- 1 Public Safety Committee/3-12-18
- 2 who are looking to solve this terrible
- 3 problem of opioid abuse, or talk about what
- 4 is being done and what needs to be done, and
- 5 this came about as a result of that. I'm
- 6 very much in favor of it and it's something
- 7 that needed to happen. Thank you.
- 8 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you. And
- 9 I agree with you too. Legislator
- 10 DeRiggi-Whitton.
- 11 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I'm
- 12 also happy to see this come to fruition.
- The only thing that I see as an
- 14 issue is when it just says knowingly permit
- 15 the consumption. We also have to realize
- 16 there is a responsibility as a homeowner,
- 17 believe me I have teenagers, it's real.
- 18 What you need to do is keep any
- 19 prescription drugs in a place, for instance,
- 20 they were saying keep them in the kitchen
- 21 where you can see because kids come into
- 22 your house, we have a pool, they want to use
- the bathroom.
- If there is anything in the
- 25 medicine closet, we are really, not only

- 1 Public Safety Committee/3-12-18
- 2 knowingly that they're using it, but if we
- 3 have it in our household, it's our
- 4 responsibility to lock them up.
- 5 Again, as a mom, I support this
- 6 but I also see that it has to be more than
- 7 knowingly consumption has to be any
- 8 availability of these drugs is our
- 9 responsibility.
- 10 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: I agree because
- 11 I think that's education also, and I think
- 12 that's something, if you go through any of
- 13 the training where we go to a heroin task
- 14 force where they always talk about how to
- 15 cut down with these people coming into your
- 16 home looking through your bathroom medicine
- 17 cabinets, and even like kitchen cabinets, I
- 18 don't even leave anything like that there, I
- 19 have to say I hide everything, because I
- 20 just don't want to have anybody coming into
- 21 my house, somebody visiting who may take
- 22 something like that.
- I think when we, for the social
- 24 host law for drinking, I remember being part
- 25 of the coalition for underage drinking

- 2 against underage drinking, and at that time
- 3 to even think about a law that would
- 4 basically punish people who knowingly
- 5 allowed children to drink in their house is
- 6 not a cool thing. Some people pushed back
- 7 at that, but it was something that you had
- 8 to do.
- 9 You see that like now more and
- 10 more you might see parties. They don't have
- 11 as many parties at people's homes anymore.
- 12 We're actually going after parents who want
- 13 to be the cool parents and have keg parties
- 14 for kids that are 14 and 15.
- So I think this is also like just
- 16 another step. I think whatever we do we
- 17 have to take whatever measures that we can
- 18 take to help start fighting this. If we
- 19 have to start it in the homes, let's start
- 20 it in the homes. Hide the drugs. Make sure
- 21 you know who is in your house. See what
- 22 kind of parties they're having.
- I'm not a cool mother. Never
- 24 was. I'm proud to say I'm not. Leave it at
- 25 that. Legislator Bynoe.

Public Safety Committee/3-12-18 1 2 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: I didn't have anything to say but I am in support of this. 3 4 I think it's a proper step forward. Thank 5 you. 6 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you. 7 are all in agreement. 8 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: Just one 9 other thing. Nothing in this legislation interferes with New York State law 10 11 concerning good samaritan, those people making phone calls, there would be no 12 13 liability imposed on anyone making a phone 14 call to get help with a call from a first 15 responder coming in when someone needs it. 16 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you. 17 That's a very important distinction to make, 18 that we still have the Good Samaritan Law to 19 help protect people that are overdosing. 20 Any other comments? 21 (No verbal response.) 22 Any public comment? 23 (No verbal response.) 24 Okay. - 7 We now have Clerk Items 78-18 and
- 80-18, ordinances supplemental to the annual
- 9 appropriation ordinance in connection with
- 10 the Office of Emergency Management.
- 11 May I have a motion?
- 12 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: So moved.
- 13 LEGISLATOR MULE: Second.
- 14 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Moved by
- 15 Legislator Rhoads, seconded by Legislator
- 16 Mule. The item is before us. Who is here
- 17 from the administration? It you want, we
- 18 can talk about both items.
- 19 MR. DELANEY: Good afternoon
- 20 every one. Tom Delaney, Nassau County
- 21 Office of Emergency Management. We got two
- 22 items over here for supplemental
- 23 appropriations. One is for a total of
- 24 \$856,563. It's for a grant to us from New
- 25 York State for an interoperable

- 2 communication grant.
- 3 The funding is going to be used
- 4 by Nassau County PD to assist with the
- 5 build-out of the new megahertz system. Any
- 6 questions about this? There is no match on
- 7 this one. It's just a grant.
- 8 The other one is for emergency
- 9 management performance grant. This is a
- 10 total of \$503,492. This is a pass through
- 11 from Department of Homeland Security through
- 12 New York State to us.
- There is a 50 percent cost match
- 14 on this one which we meet through salaries
- 15 through our general fund budgeted to OEM.
- 16 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you.
- 17 Just to go back to 78-18, that's the one
- 18 with the radios?
- MR. DELANEY: Correct.
- 20 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Is that a
- 21 system that we are using now or is this
- 22 something like an enhanced system?
- MR. DELANEY: That's 80-18.
- 24 That's the interoperable. It's a system we
- 25 are starting to build out right now.

- 2 We have to get off the existing
- 3 700 megahertz system. We are required to do
- 4 that. That is going to be decommissioned
- 5 and those frequencies are going to be bid
- 6 out and we're not going to have access to
- 7 them anymore.
- 8 There is some, I believe looking
- 9 for like 2021 currently, but we are going to
- 10 be beyond that by the time we actually get
- 11 off that system.
- 12 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: So then this
- 13 system will be utilized by all emergency
- 14 responders in Nassau County?
- MR. DELANEY: We're doing a lot
- 16 of planning on how it's going to be used. I
- 17 don't know if it's going to be all emergency
- 18 responders, like fire departments for
- 19 example, I don't think they are going to
- 20 have access to a PD system. But we are
- 21 looking at perhaps rolling our existing 800
- 22 megahertz system into the 500.
- 23 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Okay. So just
- 24 for compatibility, because we are going to
- 25 be starting a task force committee to talk

- 1 Public Safety Committee/3-12-18
- 2 about like future storms and everything like
- 3 that. This may be something.
- 4 I know communications was one of
- 5 the breakdowns after Super Storm Sandy. So
- 6 I'm just curious. Will this enhance it and
- 7 enable that communications would be able to
- 8 continue regardless of if there was a
- 9 natural disaster?
- MR. DELANEY: Well,
- 11 interoperable communications is a finding
- 12 and after action on every incident it seems.
- 13 It is very difficult to get all of our 71
- 14 fire departments on all of the same page
- 15 when it comes to communications but we are
- 16 trying to you our best.
- 17 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you very
- 18 much. Any questions?
- 19 (No verbal response.)
- Thank you very much.
- 21 MR. DELANEY: Thank you.
- 22 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Any public
- 23 comment?
- (No verbal response.)
- 25 All those in favor of passing
