    afternoon. I would like to call the Public
    Safety Committee to order and ask the clerk to
    do the roll call.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Here.
MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum
ma'am.
LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very
much there are six items on the agenda today which are clerk items 100-18, 101-18, 134-18, 144-18, 145-18 and 160-18.

Clerk items numbers 100-18 and
101-18 are ordinances supplemental to the annual appropriations ordinance in connection with the Office of Emergency Management.

May I have a motion. Moved by
Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator Mule the items are before us.

Who is here from the administration to speak?

MR. DELANEY: Tom Delaney,
Emergency Management.
On item 100-18, this is a
supplemental appropriation for $\$ 148,789$. It's New York State funding. This is for what's called our Public Safety Answering Point, or PSAP grant. This money is being used by fire
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marshal's office to continue the buildout of a redundant dispatch system which will eventually become their primary system. The current system they have right now is very antiquated and this buildout has been continuing now for the past several years and they're almost to the point where the backup is going to become their main system. LEGISLATOR FORD: Then what would they do for backup. Would they be able to update what they're using now as a backup? MR. DELANEY: What they're using currently is their primary system is antiquated and no longer serviceable. They're probably just going to decommission that and might look at what we're going to be using as a new backup system.

LEGISLATOR FORD: I guess because it would be warranted considering to make sure we have redundancy. Especially with emergency management.

MR. DELANEY: Correct. And it also might be where that backup system might be located. We might want to have another hot
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site.
LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. Any questions? Legislator Bynoe.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you chairwoman. Good afternoon. Will this be the final piece to the puzzle?

MR. DELANEY: No. This is an ongoing grant that we've been applying for every year. New York State makes available several grants targeted to specific purposes, and we make sure we apply to every one of them every year.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: What would be the time line for us to get to the final end product where we can abandon the old system?

MR. DELANEY: Next year's grant.
LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Very good.
Thank you.
LEGISLATOR FORD: Just on this
one, any public discussion? No?
How about 101-18.
MR. DELANEY: On 101-18 this is
another grant from New York State for $\$ 899,849$. One thing I failed to mention on

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the prior item, along with this item, there is no cost match on these. This is just money coming directly to the county. We don't have to provide any in-kind or anything to receive these awards.

This grant is for interoperatable communication, and what it's being used for is our public safety, our law enforcement systems are migrating from a 500 megahertz system to a 700 megahertz system. But this will also allow a rebuild of the core. So that even if we stay on the 500 system longer than anticipated we're still replacing outdated, unserviceable items with newer items that have compatibility to work with both the 500 and 700 systems.

LEGISLATOR FORD: These types of communication devices are they issued -- like this would be I guess with fire services, police services. Would it also incorporate public safety as well? The public safety division?

MR. DELANEY: The main concept of this is to be able to build out our system and

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create interoperatability. It's up to county agencies whether or not they want to provide other agencies with the communication devices. It's up to law enforcement to provide radios. This grant does not allow for what we call subscriber equipment. Just for portable radios.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Because I know
it's important, especially like if we have natural disasters, not only within the county agencies to communicate with one another, but is this also the same type of frequency that other agencies outside of Nassau County would be using as well? That they would be able to communicate?

MR. DELANEY: They technically
could should we have that patching capability to be able to do that. It does exist.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. Any
debate or discussion from the legislators?
Any public comment? Thank you.
MS. MEREDAY: I'm concerned about the interoperatability aspect of it because we don't seem to be that well connected to our
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extensive services or community service organizations particularly in times of crisis or emergency. That poses a problem when you will notice that our fire and police officers do an outstanding job, not taking anything away from that, but generally in many crises and disasters the neighbor is the first person that can get to their neighbor because they know what that situation is. But in many cases when we don't have electricity, whether you have the access to give someone the information during a press conference, there's may residents that are already out of power and they have no way of getting that information, something like these types of radios or systems that are portable and can be used we need to do a better job. Particularly coming from the standpoint of being in a vulnerable environment. And I know as FEMA-trained and a 9-11 first responder, that we are behind the eight ball and do really need to get better prepared so we're not trying to fix the problem after the horse has already left the barn so to speak.

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I'm curious as to what the full
extent of this grant and the capabilities it can provide for residents in auxiliary organizations community groups, faith-based organizations can work together to better address and better protect the needs of our residents. Particularly those who are the most vulnerable. Our young people, our seniors, older veterans, those with disability et cetera. I'm trying to put it on the table while the weather is relatively clear before we get into hurricane season and we have to deal with yet another nor'easter, because some of our communities are dealing with dead trees that are about to fall on homes and things of that nature. I'm hoping that we can be more proactive before we have to deal with any more tragedies or loss of life. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very
much. But $I$ believe this grant is strictly for our responders. But that being said, I think moving forward, it would be something, you're right, we need to make sure that our communities are somehow connected to vital
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information that we need. We said that after Sandy when our communities were literally cut off and nobody knew what was going on. The method of communication didn't really always fulfill what was needed.

But I think then what you're saying that we look at our various departments to make sure they do have those certain radios that can communicate on this 700 megahertz system, right?

MR. DELANEY: It's a new system.
It currently isn't operatable yet. The problem is we need to get off the 500 megahertz system because they want to sell that spectrum. That's why there's interest to move to 700. It's a long story. But there's a lot of pushback about getting off the 500 at this point.

Bottom line is we are rebuilding the core that both systems would use. It's a public safety upgrade. It's not for like any normal public communications. The Office of Emergency Management is working other initiatives to increase our public

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notification during a disaster or other instances.

LEGISLATOR FORD: That's definitely will be something, moving forward, we're going to be looking at, the aftermath of basically disasters and focusing on Sandy moving forward. What do we need to do in the legislature to ensure that we work with things that work and fix the things that didn't work.

One of the issues that I have living in a community that was devastated by Sandy, communications was very, very important. The fact is that there was no game plan so to speak to be able to disseminate the information. A lot of people were basically, hate to say it, lived in the dark for too long.

I thank you Mereday for bringing that up because that is going to be something that will be a focus on our hearings.

Thank you very much sir.
All those in favor of passing these items please signify by saying aye. Any

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opposed? These items pass unanimously.
Clerk item 134-18 is a resolution to establish a standing reward for information leading to the arrest and prosecution of drug dealers in Nassau County to be funded utilizing the asset forfeiture funds of the police department.

May I have a motion. Moved by Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator Ferretti. The item is before us.

As indicated by its title, this resolution establishes a standing reward of up to $\$ 5,000$ to individuals who provide tips to Crimestoppers that lead to the arrest and conviction of drug dealers in Nassau County. The reward will be allocated by the police commissioner and funded by forfeiture funds. With the input of the administration, it is intention to submit an amendment in the nature of a substitute for the meeting of the full legislature on Monday, April 23, 2018. Any questions? Yes.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Thank you. Is this going to be like what they
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say sometimes with some of the other conditions like this that it's based on the conviction or is it just the arrest?

LEGISLATOR FORD: Arrest and
conviction.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
don't see it saying that. Believe me, I, of course, support it. Do you know if we should put a certain amount aside? It says up to $\$ 5,000$ per incident. Do you have any idea how many times we might use it? Should we budget for it? Actually Siela is going to jump in. LEGISLATOR BYNOE: It actually
doesn't say per incident or per arrest and conviction. Not based on what I've read in the summary. It appears to say that the resolution shall require Nassau County police commissioner upon the agreement of Nassau County Crimestoppers to annually allocate up to $\$ 5,000$. Is that per arrest and conviction or is it just total of $\$ 5,000$ annually?

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Legislator
Bynoe, I'm not sure I'm following your question.

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LEGISLATOR BYNOE: In the summary
that we received, not the actual item, I just asked for the item, but in the summary it states that they're asking that Nassau County commissioner, upon agreement with Nassau County Crimestoppers, to annually allocate up to $\$ 5,000$. And so I'm asking whether it's $\$ 5,000$ annually as a total or per?

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Now that you're saying it's from the summary I think I understand because I'm reading the actual legislation and it says shall allocate Nassau County Crimestoppers annually from Nassau County sheriff federally seized forfeiture funds amounts sufficient to fund a standing reward of up to $\$ 5,000$ for information leading to an arrest and conviction.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: So this is per arrest? That's the answer?

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Correct.
LEGISLATOR BYNOE: We've already decided it was based on conviction. Here it says annually. At some point $I$ think we may be better served if we clean that up a little
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bit. Then my question is, do we understand the financial impacts for this? For the financial forfeiture fund is not unlimited. I would surmise we should be figuring out what we think this would be required annually for them to contribute towards this initiative.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Legislator
Bynoe, according to our counsel, we are working with the administration to clean up some of this, to some of the limitations so that it will come before the full leg. I understand what you mean. It's like if we have -- I mean we're looking at maybe up to $\$ 5,000$ for arrest and conviction of a drug dealer. But we may find out all of a sudden like we're going to get 20 people calling in on drug dealers and all 20 of them lead to the arrest and conviction. So we're talking about a large amount of money. So we need to make sure that if we're going to offer this reward that we have the funds to stand behind it for the people to get paid. Because then we're going to be shooting ourselves in the foot so to speak. If they're doing this and putting

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themselves out there and not getting the rewards it's not going to be a successful program.

I think that we need to make sure that we clarify that we make that quite clear in this legislation that the funding will be there regardless of how many notices we get from different people.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: That's right. That's the one piece that we need to look at, the financial impact. The other is that it does say resolved, in the final part of your resolution, that it's an annual contribution of $\$ 5,000$. Just to clear it up so that we all know what we're doing.

LEGISLATOR FORD: I know what you mean. At first, to me, it sounded like we would give the amount of funds would be set aside for that to fund this. But $I$ guess if it is sufficient to fund a standing reward that standing reward sort of makes it sound like we're going to limit it to $\$ 5,000$ a year. Thank you very much. I think the changes will be made but we will pass this
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through.
Any other comments? Questions?
Any public comment? Sorry, I didn't mean to cut you off.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: You didn't. I was reminded that $I$ have another question. Also, this could yield a lot of phone calls. Administratively I want to make sure we will be in a proper position to receive that kind of information and we will have the support staff to take the calls and make sure we dispatch the information to the police department timely.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. Legislator Ferretti.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI:
Commissioner Ryder is fully on board with this and has represented that these calls will be going to the police department and he has sufficient staffing to handle it.

LEGISLATOR FORD: I think also, because there was a was good point brought up, to make sure that when the calls come in they are aware of the fact that this is something
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new and they handle the calls properly and direct them to the right personnel. Thank you. Okay.

MS. MEREDAY: Yes. With regard to this resolution $I$ would be concerned with the number of questions and issues that were brought up here to have this kind of passed through to the full leg because this is basically you giving a recommendation on a faulty resolution. Albeit an important one. That recommendation that you're moving it today and forwarding it on with the expectation that the changes will be made does not give me much of a level of confidence to be honest.

Again, it is too vague in terms of the standing reward. Standing generally means that there is a consistent amount.

Drug dealers. What type of drugs are we talking about? What level of classification? Why aren't we not addressing it from the distribution standpoint as well? If you're going to stem the tide, clearly we have not done a great job of that. And then
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you can have maybe one individual who can basically just be turning people in just so they can get the reward and remove their own competition. Again, you have to look at these types of things from all perspectives and you have to make sure all the holes are sealed up.

And I am concerned, as with
Legislator Bynoe's point, about an annual allocation of $\$ 5,000$ means a one-shot cost of $\$ 5,000$. So are you saying each case is $\$ 5,000$ ? Are you just going to give $\$ 150$ ? Again, there are too many holes in this cheese that I feel it should not be kind of sliced up and put on the sandwich that the taxpayers are going to have to eat down the road. That's just my comment with regard to this.

LEGISLATOR FORD: It's up to $\$ 5,000$ for arrest and conviction. It's from drug forfeiture funding. The police commissioner is on board with this and our counsel have been meeting with him to discuss this. I think we just want to clarify that just to make sure because it is misleading to
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a certain degree when you look at the standard of up to \$5,000 annually. It's just for each conviction. If there's ten convictions -MS. MEREDAY: And drug dealers of what drug? You need to be specific. We can't think when it comes down to money and you're dealing with this type of scenario. It needs to be specific. All the T's need to be crossed and the I's need to be dotted. Thank you.

> LEGISLATOR FORD: All those in
favor of passing this item please signify by saying aye. Opposed? Item passes unanimously.

The clerk items 144-18 and 145-18 are ordinances supplemental to the annual appropriations ordinance in connection with the police department.

May I have a motion. Moved by
Legislator Muscarella. Seconded by Legislator Mule. The items are before us. Who from the administration is here to speak about this?

MR. STEPHANOFF: Good afternoon Lieutenant Greg Stephanoff.
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Item 144-18 this item appropriates $\$ 20,000$ in funds from the New York State Office of Homeland Security and provides law enforcement agencies with resources. This $\$ 20,000$ will be used for training. There will be multijurisdictional exercise that will be conducted with the New York State Police in regard to homeland security.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Any debate or
discussion? Any public comment?
What about now 145-18.
MR. STEPHANOFF: 145-18 this item appropriates $\$ 50,000$ in funds to receive from New York State Office of Homeland Security for our Marine Bureau. This is recurring funds that we get. We use this during Memorial Day and Labor Day for extra patrols and we also partner with open waters that we patrol. It offers some relief to us for what we do during those holidays.

LEGISLATOR FORD: It can get
crazy out there. Thank God we have this. Any debate or discussion? Any public comment? No? All those in favor of passing these items
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please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The items pass unanimously. Thank you very much.

Clerk item 160-18 is a resolution requesting the legislature of the state of New York to enact and the governor to approve an act providing disability benefits for sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, undersheriffs and correction officers.

May I have a motion? Moved by
Legislator Muscarella. Seconded by Legislator Ferretti. The item is before us. Who from the administration is here to speak about it? Good afternoon.

MS. ROTHSCHILD: Sheriff Fludd
will be here to speak on this item.
MS. FLUDD: Good afternoon.
LEGISLATOR FORD: By the way,
congratulations. I wasn't here, I was away, so I didn't get the opportunity to congratulate you on your appointment and here you are.

MS. FLUDD: Thank you so much. This resolution is going to protect officers
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who are on the outside working the perimeter and give them the same disability benefits as the ones on the inside.

LEGISLATOR FORD: I know that this has been an issue that we've been trying to get passed, especially in the New York State level, for a couple of years now. Thank you very much for once again helping to introduce this, and hopefully this time we will see a positive vote. I know that the Senate and Assembly both voted for it unanimously. I'm hoping that this year the governor will join with all of us who do support this bill.

I know that you're aware of what can happen, especially in our correctional facilities. It's something when they get covered what happens on the job, but sometimes when people do come to visit we need to make sure that we ensure the safety and health and welfare of all of those who work within the jail facility.

Are there any public comments?
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Hi.

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Congratulations also. Very happy for you and for us. I just noticed, we're talking about the funding, first of all, I support this. I think we all support this for quite a while and happy to see it move forward. But like as a little housekeeping maybe, on the backup it's still saying that there is no impact on funding as stated as far as the cost. If you could just take a look. I'm fine to pass this through but before we go to full leg we should look at that page in the backup. I think that's from the year before. It might have carried over. It just doesn't make sense.

Actually OMB should probably be the ones to help with the funding. We're going to allow it to go through today but before full leg it should be addressed and we need the line from which it will be paid through. MR. MILES: Deputy county attorney Robert Miles. We will be getting that information for you from Andy.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Legislator Bynoe? LEGISLATOR BYNOE: No.

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LEGISLATOR FORD: Anyone else?
Any public comment? No? Okay. All those in favor of passing this item please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The items pass unanimously.

There is no other business in front of this committee. May I have a motion to adjourn. Moved by Legislator Rhoads.
