- 3 Public Works and Parks Committee to order.
- 4 I will act as the clerk and call the roll.
- 5 Vice Chairman Gaylor?
- 6 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Present.
- 7 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Ms.
- 8 Schaefer?
- 9 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Here.
- 10 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Mr.
- 11 Kennedy?
- 12 LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Here.
- 13 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Ranking
- 14 Member Bynoe?
- 15 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Here.
- 16 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Mr.
- 17 Drucker?
- 18 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Here.
- 19 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Mr.
- 20 Lafazan?
- LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Here.
- 22 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: We have a
- 23 quorum. First up is Item 172 of '18, a
- 24 resolution authorizing the County Executive
- 25 to execute an agreement with the New York

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 State Environmental Facilities Corporation
- 3 in relation to New York State's septic
- 4 system replacement program.
- 5 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: So moved.
- 6 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Second.
- 7 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Motion by
- 8 Mr. Gaylor, seconded by Ms. Schaefer. The
- 9 item is before us.
- 10 Who do we have to speak on this?
- 11 MR. SCHNEIDER: Brian Schneider,
- 12 Deputy County Executive. This item 172-18
- is an agreement with the New York State
- 14 Environmental Facilities Corporation to
- 15 participate in a state septic system
- 16 replacement program.
- 17 The state has allocated \$1
- 18 million towards the replacement of failing
- 19 septic systems in priority geographic areas
- 20 to be designated by the DEC and the New York
- 21 State Department of Health.
- 22 Eligible projects will be
- 23 reimbursed through this program up to 50
- 24 percent of the total cost of the septic
- 25 system replacement with a maximum of \$10,000

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 per household.
- 3 This equates to roughly 100
- 4 households will be able to participate in
- 5 the program.
- Once homeowners are notified tat
- 7 they have an eligible project an award
- 8 letter will come out from the county. The
- 9 homeowners will then be responsible for the
- 10 total cost of the replacement.
- 11 The homeowner can choose to have
- 12 the reimbursement fee directly to their
- 13 contractor or it could go to them.
- 14 It's the intent of this program
- 15 to reduce the environmental and public
- 16 health impacts associated with the discharge
- 17 of effluent from failing cesspools and
- 18 septic systems to ground water, uses
- 19 drinking water, as well as threatened or
- 20 impaired water bodies.
- 21 The Departments of Public Works
- 22 and Health will be working out the details
- 23 on the management of this program as we
- learn more from EFC after this agreement has
- 25 been executed.

- I have also had a discussion with
- 3 the Commissioner of Consumer Affairs, Greg
- 4 May, to be sure that the paperwork will be
- 5 in order to be sure that the funds that are
- 6 going to be requested for reimbursement
- 7 coming from EFC through the county will be
- 8 all in order and will conform with EFC's
- 9 requirements reduce.
- 10 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Thank you,
- 11 Mr. Schneider. Is there anything that
- 12 requires a homeowner to participate in this
- 13 program?
- 14 MR. SCHNEIDER: There is no
- 15 demand certainly from the county. It's a
- 16 voluntary participation.
- 17 You can see what's happening out
- 18 in Suffolk County which has a completely
- 19 different scope, 75 percent of the
- 20 population in Suffolk County is on
- 21 individual cesspools and septic systems,
- 22 where as in Nassau 90 percent of the
- 23 population is covered in a centralized
- 24 sanitary system.
- 25 So there is other only about

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 40,000 homes primary on the north shore of
- 3 Nassau County that have individual septic
- 4 systems.
- 5 We're really going to be -- and
- 6 the DEC is really going to be driving home
- 7 the geographic areas that are definitely in
- 8 need to replace their septic systems that
- 9 are having an impact on primarily the
- 10 impacted local water bodies which are
- 11 primarily the north shore.
- 12 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: And it
- 13 would make sense for a homeowner who has a
- 14 problem with their system to participate but
- 15 the county is not going out and knocking on
- 16 doors and saying you must remedy the
- 17 situation?
- MR. SCHNEIDER: No. We just
- 19 don't have jurisdiction, especially along
- 20 the north shore, the local jurisdictions
- 21 have the overarching authority for septic
- 22 systems.
- I would imagine that most people
- 24 who are having problems who need to pump out
- 25 their systems on a monthly basis, that's a

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 considerable expense that they're incurring.
- 3 If they're not working that means they're
- 4 having a negative impact on the environment.
- 5 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: And they
- 6 should welcome this?
- 7 MR. SCHNEIDER: Absolutely.
- 8 So there is \$1 million that's
- 9 been set aside for this program this year.
- 10 Keeping in mind that the state has
- 11 authorized \$2.5 million in water quality
- improvements throughout the state.
- There is an excellent possibility
- 14 that there will be additional funding
- depending upon how the program is rolled out
- 16 next year.
- 17 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Any
- 18 questions? Ms. Schaefer.
- 19 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Hi. Since
- 20 you can identify or I assume you can
- 21 identify the households that have the septic
- 22 systems, correct, or is it the general area?
- MR. SCHNEIDER: Yes. For the
- 24 most part in geographic areas, we know
- 25 pretty much who is connected and who is not

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 connected.
- 3 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Is the
- 4 administration doing some sort of outreach
- 5 directly to those areas?
- 6 MR. SCHNEIDER: That's a great
- 7 question. That's something we will be doing
- 8 once we execute the agreement with EFC. EFC
- 9 has put us under the gun timewise to
- 10 participate in the program. January 18th we
- 11 signed basically a notice of intent to be
- 12 included in the program.
- A month later they sent us not
- 14 even full agreement, just kind of an
- 15 appended agreement that we needed to sign
- 16 and that's why I'm here today.
- We will be getting more
- 18 information from EFC after the agreement is
- 19 executed and then we will be able to roll
- 20 out the program as we discussed with the
- 21 county health department but we need to
- 22 reach out to the individual municipalities
- 23 along the north shore that have the actual
- 24 jurisdiction to monitor and also to approve
- 25 septic systems. The county does not. We do

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 not have a program to approval individual
- 3 residential septic systems.
- 4 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Thank you.
- 5 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Ms. Bynoe.
- 6 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you,
- 7 Chairman. Hi Mr. Schneider. I have
- 8 questions of how the grant will be
- 9 administered.
- 10 Is this going to be, number one,
- 11 are we going to be doing it in-house?
- MR. SCHNEIDER: It's our
- 13 intention to do it in-house keeping in mind
- 14 there is a number of management things we
- 15 have to do. There are some financial
- 16 auditing things we need to do to comply with
- 17 EFC requirements.
- I have not been able to get an
- 19 answer from the EFC if we can utilize the
- 20 funds from this \$1 million grant for
- 21 management. Even a nominal amount to cover
- 22 our time. So that's a question they have
- 23 not been able to answer yet.
- I can't entirely tell you whether
- 25 or not it's going to be done in-house or

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 not.
- 3 From a staffing standpoint, it's
- 4 giong to be an issue.
- 5 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Going to be a
- 6 challenge.
- 7 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yes, absolutely,
- 8 especially if we are going to be reaching
- 9 out to potentially 40,000 residents who
- 10 potentially could be eligible for
- 11 reimbursement.
- 12 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: So there goes
- 13 the rest of my questions because you don't
- 14 have a framework yet. So I was just
- wondering, you mentioned Commissioner May.
- 16 Can you clarify again what you believe his
- 17 role would be?
- MR. SCHNEIDER: It would really
- 19 be a recordkeeping issue just to make sure
- 20 funds coming from the state would not be
- 21 misappropriated or misused in any way.
- There are going to be auditing
- 23 criteria that we are going to need to
- 24 conform to. So it was not a detailed
- 25 conversation with Mr. May.

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 It was like, all right. We are
- 3 area going to have this program. It's going
- 4 to be a little bit of an issue going
- 5 forward, we have to figure out how to roll
- 6 it out.
- 7 So we need to staff up and figure
- 8 out the best way to utilize these funds to
- 9 make sure they get in the hands of the
- 10 people who actually need it the most.
- 11 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Just
- 12 administering those types of programs is
- 13 going to require us to decide whether we are
- 14 going to use a Lottery type of selection
- 15 process or whether we're going to do it on a
- 16 first come first serve with a time stamp
- 17 water mark type of placement on the
- 18 applications that come in.
- 19 MR. SCHNEIDER: That's a good
- 20 point but I think in order to be eligible in
- 21 my conversations with EFC, there is going to
- 22 be very specific criteria for eligibility in
- these systems.
- So if you have an existing septic
- 25 system that is failing in your estimation

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 because you are pumping it out every month
- 3 or so, EFC is going to want to and it's
- 4 being seen in Suffolk County, they want to
- 5 see a marked reduction in the amount of
- 6 nitrogen that is being produced in your
- 7 septic system.
- 8 One of the criteria is, they want
- 9 to see a 30 percent reduction in nitrogen.
- 10 That's not going to be a simple replacement.
- 11 That's going to be using an innovative
- 12 alternative system that's, if you're reading
- in Newsday, being approved in Suffolk
- 14 County, these systems are between 15 and
- \$20,000 a shot in order to meet those water
- 16 quality goals.
- 17 It's not simply going to be, we
- 18 have a Lottery, let's start taking names and
- 19 numbers. There needs to be a definitive
- 20 methodology on what system you're going to
- 21 use and how you are going to be improving
- 22 water quality especially when we talk about
- 23 sanitary effluent.
- 24 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: So the
- 25 reduction is -- eligibility will be

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 determined on that, and whether you can
- 3 reduce?
- 4 MR. SCHNEIDER: Correct.
- 5 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: And we might
- 6 even suggest certain equipment or a process
- 7 that would be undertaken as opposed to,
- 8 like you say, not just a simple replacement.
- 9 What is the next best technology and we may
- 10 even suggest what that is.
- 11 MR. SCHNEIDER: We are going to
- 12 be learning a lot from Suffolk County. They
- 13 are going through this rigorous process
- 14 through their health department in getting
- 15 manufacturers approved.
- 16 They are having manufacturers
- 17 come in and they are volunteering their
- 18 time, they're donating their services to
- 19 prove that their technology is something
- 20 that will make -- give the biggest benefit
- 21 to the residents and to the environment.
- Those are the things you're
- 23 reading about in the paper; probably six or
- 24 seven technologies that are approved, but
- 25 each situation is going to have to stand on

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 its own.
- 3 We need to learn a lesson from
- 4 Suffolk County. We are not going to be
- 5 reinventing the wheel here.
- 6 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: So there will
- 7 be an adjustment to the sanitary code?
- 8 MR. SCHNEIDER: That's something
- 9 we have been talking with the health
- 10 department about with Don Irwin, that's
- 11 something that we probably have to consider.
- But, again, we will not want to
- 13 make any rash decisions. We want to be able
- 14 to take what Suffolk County is doing and
- 15 kind of mirror what they're looking at.
- 16 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Understood.
- 17 Thank you very much.
- 18 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Any other
- 19 questions? Mr. Lafazan.
- LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Thanks, Mr.
- 21 Chairman and thanks again for spending time
- 22 with us this afternoon.
- 23 Regarding this grant program,
- 24 don't we as a county need sub-watershed
- 25 waste water plants?

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 MR. SCHNEIDER: There is a Long
- 3 Island Nitrogen Action Plan that has been
- 4 rolled out by the state Governor's Office.
- 5 They have allocated \$5 million to
- 6 the DEC to conduct sub watershed plans.
- 7 Right now, the LINAP, the Long Island
- 8 National Action Plan Group, is conducting
- 9 sub watershed analysis in Suffolk County.
- 10 When they complete that work they will shift
- 11 over to Nassau County and there will be sub
- 12 watershed plans and delineations made which
- 13 are actually going to be -- actually going
- 14 to delineate where in those water sheds the
- 15 priority areas are going to be.
- 16 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Do we have a
- 17 time line?
- MR. SCHNEIDER: I actually have a
- 19 meeting with LINAP tomorrow. I will have an
- 20 update and I was going to mention the same
- 21 thing to Minority Counsel Kleins that I will
- 22 have an update tomorrow on when they
- 23 anticipate finishing the sub watershed plans
- 24 in Nassau County.
- We already sit on a sub committee

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 for Nassau County. We provided them a
- 3 wealth of information on GIS, on water
- 4 quality that we have already collected over
- 5 the years. They already have the ground
- 6 work for the modeling that's necessary to
- 7 move forward with the sub watershed plans in
- 8 Nassau County.
- 9 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Thank you
- 10 very much.
- 11 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Any other
- 12 questions?
- 13 (No verbal response.)
- 14 Any public comment? Ms. Mereday.
- MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday,
- 16 Baldwin resident. I am concerned about if
- 17 we're going into this agreement I'm hopeful
- 18 that the county will make some
- 19 recommendations with regard to the selection
- 20 process.
- If we're talking about 100 homes
- 22 at a \$10,000 rate, and we have a number of
- 23 residents that cannot pay that money up
- 24 front. We a number of residents that are
- 25 still trying to collect from the

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 reimbursements that they were promised from
- 3 Super Storm Sandy.
- 4 I'm hoping again that we do have
- 5 some consideration with regard to those
- 6 residents who may fit the criteria but not
- 7 able to fit the economic impact or the
- 8 economic requirement for that.
- 9 So that's what I'm hoping that is
- 10 something that can be taken into
- 11 consideration, and, secondly, again, with
- 12 regard to the representation of the vendors
- involved with this process, I'm hoping that
- 14 the procurement and outreach will be
- 15 inclusive and will be diverse.
- It's always nice to hear that
- 17 people are trying to audit funds and to
- 18 review the actual application process and
- 19 not recreating the wheel because we seem to
- 20 do that a lot here and it's very costly.
- I'm encouraged we are waiting to
- 22 get information and research from another
- 23 location. I'm encouraged by that. At least
- 24 that will save the taxpayers some money, but
- 25 being that we have the second highest taxes

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 in the county, and Suffolk has the eighth
- 3 highest taxes in the county, I guess a
- 4 little bit can go a long way.
- 5 As I said, I'm hoping that there
- 6 is that requirement that we can look at the
- 7 needs of those who are underserved. We have
- 8 a lot of seniors. We have a number of them
- 9 who are veterans who are strapped. They can
- 10 not do that initial outlay and wait for the
- 11 state to decide when they want to give the
- 12 money back.
- There are not a lot of
- 14 facilities, I'm not sure how many facilities
- on the north shore that still have septic
- 16 tanks or cesspools, but we do have a number
- 17 of nursing homes and assisted living
- 18 facilities, we need to be sure we are
- 19 recognizing those specific needs as well.
- 20 And last, but certainly not
- 21 least, the protection of our water overall
- 22 because we do have some significant tax on
- 23 our water supply and things of this nature
- 24 are equally important when we are talking
- 25 about how we are addressing our waste water.

And those of us who live in the
South Shore particularly in Baldwin, we are
always interested in finding out how we can
effectively address the effluent since we
are the ones who have to be addressing that
when you start digging up to move the
effluent. However, it is going to be
treated or downsized or de-neutralized or
whatever terminology you choose to use
through our residential properties in the
Baldwin and Baldwin Harbor area.
I just wanted to put that on the
record and in the minds of those who are
making the decisions that are impacting
those of us who are closer to the ground.
Thank you.
CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: All in
favor signify by saying aye.
(Aye.)
Any opposed?
(No verbal response.)

Next up is Item 207 of '18, a

25 resolution designating Brian Schneider as a

- 5 Motion, please?
- 6 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: So moved.
- 7 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Second.
- 8 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Motion by
- 9 Mr. Gaylor, seconded by Ms. Schaefer. That
- 10 item is before us.
- 11 Who do we have speaking? Do we
- 12 have Mr. Schneider coming up to speak on
- 13 this? I see you're accompanied by two other
- 14 people.
- MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, apparently
- 16 I came down at the wrong time because I
- 17 apparently drew the short straw.
- 18 So for the purposes of utilizing
- 19 New York State DOT's Equitable Business
- 20 Opportunity System, there needs to be a
- 21 designee from the department to be a
- 22 responsible local official.
- I believe that I fall into each
- 24 of those three categories. So I'm just
- 25 asking that I can be designated as the

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 responsible local official.
- 3 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Could you
- 4 tell us what those three categories are?
- 5 MR. SCHNEIDER: Responsible local
- 6 official.
- 7 CHAIRMAN MUSCARELLA: Do we have
- 8 any questions of Mr. Schneider? Mr. Gaylor.
- 9 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: So the
- 10 function of this position is to satisfy
- 11 contractual reporting requirements. Do you
- 12 currently do that as the Deputy County
- 13 Executive or is that a function of the DPW?
- 14 MR. SCHNEIDER: That's the
- 15 function of DPW and it was something since
- 16 the new administration came in in early
- 17 January, there needed to be a new designee.
- 18 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: So you in
- 19 your position as Deputy County Executive
- 20 review all the contracts of DPW before they
- 21 go any where or as part of the process?
- MR. SCHNEIDER: You're talking
- about DOT contracts or any contracts?
- LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: All.
- MR. SCHNEIDER: Yes, correct.

Public Works and Parks/5-7-18 1 2 This specific item relates to DOT contracts. 3 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Thank you. 4 CHAIRMAN NICOLELLO: Any other 5 questions? (No verbal response.) 6 7 Any public comment? Ms. Mereday. 8 MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday. 9 I'm just seeking some some additional 10 information with regard to the structure of 11 this Equitable Business Opportunity System 12 since we are talking about a New York State 13 Department of Transportation which I'm 14 gathering receives federal funding as well, 15 since most of you and some of you who may not know, my focus, my primary focus is 16 17 about addressing the lack of the representation and inclusion of services for 18 19 veteran owned businesses to a significant 20 extent in Nassau County as far as funding. 21 Transportation is something that 22 is very key and necessary to our county. So 23 I'm hopeful, I have to remain hopeful that 24 we are looking in a different direction

because I don't know of anyone else, I'm

- 2 really tired about hearing about the number
- 3 of lawsuits that Nassau County is involved
- 4 in while I'm also trying to fight the number
- 5 of zombie houses increasing in my community
- 6 and others.
- 7 If we continue to violate federal
- 8 and state law as it pertains to the lack of
- 9 outreach which leads to the lack of
- 10 inclusion of our service disabled and
- 11 veteran owned businesses that have a growing
- 12 majority of minorities, particular women of
- 13 color.
- 14 It forces those of us who to
- 15 start to consider that we might need to join
- 16 that band wagon of class action because
- 17 that's the only way we seem to get any
- 18 action or attention.
- 19 I just need for me just some
- 20 clarity as to what the role is going to be
- 21 as opposed to just being the responsible
- 22 local official. I'm looking for someone to
- 23 be a little more innovative, a little more
- 24 aggressive, a little more proactive so that
- 25 we can start to look for opportunities to

- 1 Public Works and Parks/5-7-18
- 2 keep our veterans in their homes here, to
- 3 keep our student veterans who go to our
- 4 universities and colleges here and to
- 5 provide opportunities to generate those
- 6 alliances because we have a growing older
- 7 population on the north shore and we have a
- 8 working force on the South Shore who can't
- 9 get there.
- 10 Since I have been told Long
- 11 Island Railroad cannot possibly get the
- 12 infrastructure to go from south to north, we
- 13 need to do something to focus on our busing
- 14 system and our transport to address those
- 15 needs.
- 16 So that's kind of where I am.
- 17 I'm going to remain hopeful. I look forward
- 18 to working with Mr. Schneider because I'm
- 19 really not all about just coming to these
- 20 meetings. I also have to be out here in
- 21 those trenches to address these unmet needs
- 22 on my own with my limited resources and
- 23 still try to pay these taxes to stay here as
- vert 24 well.
- So, since you have all been
