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LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I would
like to call the legislature to order. I apologize for the delay today. We have a lot of items to be considered. We have the full legislature to consider a number of capital items including some emergencies today and then the items on the actual calendars. It's been a lot and we've been working out all the details with the administration to move forward.

We are prepared to do that now. The first thing we will handle today is the calendar for the full legislature. At this time I would ask Legislator Colonel Bill Gaylor to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

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The items before us on the calendar today are all related to the capital plan of Nassau County. We do have some items that are going to have to be called as an emergency on this calendar and I'm now going to ask the clerk to call the emergency items.

MR. PULITZER: Thank you. An emergency resolution declaring an emergency for immediate action upon the following clerk items. 421-18, 420-18, 417-18, 405-18 463-18 462-18. That would complete it sir.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Next, I
believe we need a motion to accept the emergency. Moved by Legislator Kennedy. Seconded by Legislator Birnbaum. Any debate or discussion? All in favor of establishing the emergency signify by saying aye. Those opposed? The emergency is established.

Now I ask you, Mike, to call the items themselves. The emergency items.

MR. PULITZER: 421-18 that would be an ordinance to amend ordinance number 13-2016 adopting the capital budget for the year 2016 for the County of Nassau

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corresponding to the first year of the four year capital plan pursuant to the provisions of Section 310 of the County Government Law of Nassau County. Shall I complete all of them? LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Please. MR. PULITZER: 420-18, a resolution declaring a capital budget emergency pursuant to \(310(d)\) of the County Government Law of Nassau County. 417-18, a bond ordinance providing for a capital expenditure to finance the capital projects identified herein within the County of Nassau in authorizing \(\$ 400,000\) of bonds of the County of Nassau to finance such expenditures pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York and the County Governmental Law of Nassau County.

The next one, 405-18, a bond ordinance providing for capital expenditures to finance the capital projects identified herein within the County of Nassau in authorizing \(\$ 400,000\) of bonds of the County of Nassau to finance such expenditures pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York and the

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County Government Law of Nassau County project 61137.

Next one would be 463-18. A bond ordinance providing for a capital expenditure to finance the capital projects identified herein within the County of Nassau in organizing \(\$ 200,000\) of bonds for the County of Nassau to finance such expenditures pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York and the County Governmental Law of Nassau County. That would be project 844.

Next would be 462-18. A bond ordinance providing for capital expenditures to finance the capital projects identified herein within the County of Nassau in authorizing \(\$ 50,000\) of bonds of the County of Nassau to finance such expenditures pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York and the County Governmental Law of Nassau County. Project 61140. That would complete it.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you sir. I need a motion for those items. Moved by Legislator Gaylor. Seconded by Legislator Drucker. These are the emergencies related to

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the resolutions involving the capital budget emergency as well as the capital budget for the year 2016 as well as two specific items. And if anyone from the administration is available I would appreciate it if you could come up and explain to us what the two specific emergency items are. I see Mr. Arnold our Commissioner of Public Works is making his way up.

MR. ARNOLD: Ken Arnold, Public Works. The two specific bond ordinances that were added as an emergency deal with Motor Parkway in Farmingdale. It's a study to look at the curb, sidewalks and the street in that location. There have been issues associated with that location.

And I believe the second one was to perform a study for the Crescent Beach area. There's a storm water issue that is impacting the ability for the bathing beach to be open. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you Mr. Arnold. Anyone have any questions or discussion among the legislators? Minority Leader Abrahams.

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LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Hey Ken.
In regards to the second emergency, the one for Crescent Beach, we have it as part of the backup -- sorry Ken. So, in regards to the second emergency it's for Crescent Beach pollution control, this is an actual measure that the county will embark on to implement solutions after we understand the conditions to a greater deal. But we are actually going to implement the solutions, correct?

MR. ARNOLD: My understanding is that the funding allows for the study and the design services. The construction would be a separate bond ordinance.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: It would be for the study and design, so the county would go forward with that?

MR. ARNOLD: Once we complete this study and find out there is a viable solution, yes.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: That would
lead to us being able to do the design?
MR. ARNOLD: Yes.
LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: For the

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total of \(\$ 200,000\) ?
MR. ARNOLD: That is correct.
LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Then at a
later date, hopefully this fail when we do the much larger plan, we will be able to embark on authorization for the \(\$ 2\) million?

MR. ARNOLD: Yes. I don't
suspect the study being done by the fall
because I have to procure a consultant but if we can yes.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: We can actually put it into a capital plan which would mean we can actually go forward with it in the out years.

MR. ARNOLD: Yeah. Just
typically we like to have the bond ordinance developed off of a study. I'm not sure the study will be complete for that bond ordinance for construction, but we can discuss it at that point.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator
DeRiggi-Whitton.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Thank you very much. Thank you Ken also. We

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had a meeting last week that \(I\) attended, along with my counsel, and both the board of health and the Department of Public Works endorsed attempting a solution for Crescent Beach. Possibly a helix system, which is what we discussed also. I would like to put on the record that that is a possibility. But the problem I'm having right now -- okay. Never mind. Okay. I think we're going to have a slight amendment.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Let's
confer with counsel. I don't know if it requires an amendment. I think what we're talking about is take out the word possible in the purpose of the project. Project description. We want to make sure that there's some remediation that's going to happen.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: While
we're waiting Legislator Walker has a question.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you. Mr. Arnold. I just want to check, both of these projects, the bonding we are looking at

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now is for them to look at that project and then do a design. Then we would have to come back and bond for the actual work of the project?

> MR. ARNOLD: That is correct.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Is there any other debate or discussion? Any public comment?

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Just for the record -- thank you for being gracious Presiding Officer -- and I know we have other comments, Ms. Mereday is coming up, I just want to note for the record that we are striking the world possible from the project. From the description of the project staff summary of the item. If anybody can understand that because I barely understand it and \(I\) just said it.

MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday, Baldwin resident. Just this is a general question as it pertains to all of these emergencies. Because \(I\) did hear that this is connected to -- the reference was made to

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Local Finance Law of New York State. I'm just curious as to whether there is going to be consideration as it pertains to the New York State Executive Law Article 15A as pertains to minority and women business participation. Since we still do not have a program, and New York State itself is reviewing its program, the effectiveness of its minority and women business program since it doesn't even have one for veteran businesses per se.

I'm curious again as to how we are going to make sure that diverse businesses are incorporated in the outreach and the bidding process for these projects. I know we are saying the word emergency. Sometimes that tends to give people leeway into making that additional effort, since \(I\) still have yet to see what the updated curriculum and process and structure is for the women and minority business program here. I know that there is another committee that has been put in place but there is money that's being doled out in hundreds of thousands of dollars. Unfortunately those diverse businesses still

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lack the representation from what \(I\) can see.
If someone can show me different I would appreciate that. But we do need to try to avoid the number of lawsuits that continue to hit this county. If we're not bonding for capital projects we seem to be bonding for settlements. If someone can give me an answer to that question it would be greatly appreciated. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: The
reference to emergencies with respect to these two specific items relates only to their status before the legislature today in terms of us being able to vote for them. They are not in any other ways the underlying items, the underlying contracts, the underlying capital bonding items are not emergencies. They go through the normal course of business of Nassau County. I don't know if you want someone to describe what the normal course the county follows in terms of its bidding and its outreach. But the term emergency has nothing to do -- it's simply going to go through the normal course like everything else.

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MS. MEREDAY: The way I heard is that this is going out for a study and design. So there are businesses, believe it or not, that are minority and women owned that can do design and study that, unless I'm mistaken, are not included in the current roll. So that's why I'm asking the question. Whether it's \(\$ 400,000\) or \(\$ 4\) million, the lack of diversity is still the lack of diversity.

Again, the question still remains, if this money is being funded in an emergency situation, that means someone is going to get a contract based upon some type of description, relationship or receipt of information and materials, is that not correct? If I'm mistaken please correct me. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: There will be a design. Again, the term emergency, the only relevance it has is it allows us to consider it today because it didn't go through the normal course. It didn't have sufficient amount of time. But the county, public works et cetera is going to have to go through -and the Office of Purchasing -- is going to

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have to go through the regular course of business. The contract itself is not going to be an emergency contract.

Again, if you want anyone to
describe the county's normal course of business they can.

MS. MEREDAY: That \(I\) don't really need. I kind of hear enough about that in Newsday. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other public comment? Hearing none, all in favor of these emergency items signify by saying aye. Those opposed? They carry unanimously.

I'm going to call now the rest of the calendar. The nonemergency items. There are a number of them. With the consent of the minority I'm going to simply call the item and ordinance number and not read each item.

Moved by Minority Leader Abrahams. Seconded by Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel. Those are the capital items. These items, as part of the 2016 capital budget, have undergone extensive negotiations by the minority, majority and administration. They represent numerous projects involved in the operation of the county for the betterment of the county involving everything from parks to roadways to traffic signals to studies to bridge rehabilitation to projects of Nassau Community College to capital bonding in connection with NICE bus service to sewer and storm water projects to a study with respect to opioid treatment clinic, to Saddle Rock Grist Mill to a new Nassau County Police Academy.

Again, they were subject of numerous negotiations and all parties in good faith came together and have agreed to these

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items which will move the county forward, will create jobs, repair our roads and make our parks better for our residents.

Any debate or discussion? Sure. Minority Leader Abrahams.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you Presiding Officer Nicolello. I just want to say also for the record I agree there was extensive discussions regarding these capital items. Obviously, I think both sides agree that we want to see the county be able to move forward. You don't have to be a stranger to Nassau County to see that some of the roads are in disrepair, some of the infrastructure is in disrepair. I'm not saying that this particular capital plan will address everything in one shot, but it goes a step in the right direction.

I want to thank the county executive. I see Mike Santoramo, Mr. Arnold, Mr. Brian Schneider, Presiding Officer, as well as my staff worked very, very -- worked on this for quite a bit of time. Michele Darcy, Pete Kleins, Bill Biamonte obviously to

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name a few. I'm forgetting somebody now that I started naming people. Cecilia Capers as well. All worked on this hand and hand and I want to thank them as well.

I do have a quick question in
regards to item 46 that I believe the comptroller's office is here to answer regarding the police academy. I think Mr. Schoen. How are you Jeff? Just present your name for the record.

MR. SCHOEN: Jeff Schoen, counsel to the comptroller.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Just a
quick question. I'm not going to take up too much of your time. Obviously this is one of the larger items on the capital plan and most people when they're questioning this or concerned about this, it's \(\$ 54\) million bond, which I believe commensurates with a contract for this particular item for the police academy. Is that your understanding as well? MR. SCHOEN: You would have to authorize the bonding and the contract would -- if the funds are there the contract

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would be -- the bonding and contract are separate issues.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I guess
what I'm driving at, the bond needs to commensurate, to your understanding, from the comptroller's office of being able to execute payment, the bond needs to be tied with the amount that's actually in the contract, correct?
MR. SCHOEN: That's really a technical question. Kind of depends on the language in the contract. We would be guided by Section 4023 of the charter, which basically says that in approving all contracts the comptroller has to ascertain before approval that monies have been duly appropriated and allocated to meet the obligations. Those obligations would be set forth in the contract. So if the contract clearly articulated the understanding between the parties as to the availability of funds that's what we would be looking at.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Has your office had the opportunity to review the
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contract?
MR. SCHOEN: No.
LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Maybe I'm not pointing the question to the right entity. It was our understanding based off of the reading of the contract that the money had to be encumbered due to the entirety of the funds. So all \(\$ 54\) million.

MR. SCHOEN: Again, I would have to look at the language of the contract. We would be guided by the statute that would require us to ascertain if the monies have been duly appropriated relative to the obligations in that contract. We would have to look at the specific obligations in that contract to determine if enough monies have been allocated.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Counsel
just reminded me, so basically, if I'm
understanding this correctly, the contract
does not have any provision for partial
funding or partial bonding for this particular contract.

MR. SCHOEN: Okay.

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LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I believe
that's what he represented to you. In that event the legislature would have to bond for the entire amount.

MR. SCHOEN: If the contract doesn't contain language that allows us to determine whether the obligations are being met, partial encumbrance language would be helpful. Then we would have to look at whether or not we could approve the contract without enough funds being there. So, yes, the full amount of the contract -- we would look to see the full amount of the contract without any partial encumbrance language.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton is going to have a question. Before that, the minority pointed out something important. We need to thank our staff for the work that they do with respect to this. Meredith Hughes is behind me. Dan McCloy, Chris Ostuni and Bill Mueller did an outstanding job on behalf of the majority.

I would like to invite up Commissioner Ryder because a major component

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of the capital plan is the police academy. So commissioner come up and say a few words. COMMISSIONER RYDER: First of all, \(I\) want to say thank you on behalf of the police department, the people of Nassau County. We will better serve the police department in a more diverse way than we ever have before by putting the academy on the grounds of Nassau Community College. We will involve the students from that school who come from our diverse community here in Nassau County and involve them in the growth of the police department. They will see that this is a department that welcomes all. From that our recruitment will improve.

We will take off that \(\$ 800,000\) a year that we pay in rent. When I came into this police department \(I\) was over in Williston Park in a grammar school. From there we went to trailers. Trailers that were condemned for prisoners but okay to train police officers in. And now we are back in an elementary school. When I went into the NYPD back in 1984 they have a beautiful facility and now

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they have a multiple, multiple million dollar facility over in Whitestone park. Again improving. That's how you improve policing, from technology and from community building. That's how we get better at it.

More importantly, it frees us the asset money. You are all well aware of that. That's how we do National Night Out. That's how we do opioids. That's how we fight gangs, terrorism, school resource programs and crime in general. We don't come to the legislature for many items that we can do and use forfeiture money for. That is giving us the ability to keep that fight where we're down 30 percent in opioid overdoses. Where we're down in crime 30 percent. Where our school resource programs get better and better every day.

I just got an email as \(I\) was sitting here that Suffolk is inquiring the Rave Act. The Rave Act that we've already gotten approved and pushing forward through this in every single school. So we get out in front of these items. Get out in front of

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them with the support of our intel analysts and intel world and of course the great work done by the men and women of this police department. From the management that is all here today to show that support for this program, right down to the \(P O P\) cop and the civilians that work for us in the police department. We are going to use the money as effectively and efficiently as we can.

This academy will be built on time and will be built correctly without change. We have been through these plans since 2010 when this project started. I know the building inside and out. I think I can build it myself by now. It's a great project. It's a cost saving project. It's a way to better police and it's a way to be more diverse and reach into our communities and bring them into it. Including the weekend basketball camps, which will start the minute that tactical warehouse is built and complete we will open that up to the communities to bring in our PAL basketball weekend programs.

Again, funded by the Nassau County

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Police Foundation who puts up that money to bring them in. And again using forfeiture money. This is a great project, and I think it will be go down in the history as one of the best projects we have ever pushed forward. Because it makes police and community one and as long as we are one we will succeed as a county. On behalf of all of us thank you. I will take any questions.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Sure.
Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: When
you came to our community meeting you mentioned the \(\$ 800,000\) that you just touched on. Can you go through basically the payment of that and the debt service?

COMMISSIONER RYDER: We have been renting space forever and now we are at about \(\$ 770,000\) a year to rent the school that we are currently in. But that does not include the repairs and the uptick of that building that has to be done all the time. Dealing with old buildings and old structures we're constantly fixing things to keep us moving. The hub of

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our intelligence sits there and the hub of our training sits there. We take that now and put it onto the college campus, where we already do our evac training, makes us more efficient, makes us more effective and makes us better policing.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: And the cost of the \(\$ 800,000\) if you are putting it towards the debt service remember how we said it --
COMMISSIONER RYDER: That's
correct. That should be put towards the debt of that bonding when it matures.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: In my opinion, not only is it good for all of you but it's also financially the right move because we are putting that money towards a building that we are going to use for years to come use.

COMMISSIONER RYDER: This is a state of the art training facility with a 500 seat auditorium which will generate a revenue. Again, the building, the way we designed it, becomes self-sufficient. We just

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met with our federal partners on another case that we are doing this morning, and again, they've already said we will be knocking on that door to use your facility and that brings in a revenue which offsets any cost to the building.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator Birnbaum.

LEGISLATOR BIRNBAUM: I hear the passion in your voice and \(I\) understand what a new police academy will bring to Nassau County. In your words, to get better policing. I just want to bring to your attention the reopening of the Sixth Precinct fully staffed. I know we have been asking for this for years to have the precinct in my area and I think Presiding Officer Nicolello's as well and I think the county executive has been in favor of it. So I hope we will see this soon.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: As well as the Eighth Precinct.

COMMISSIONER RYDER: We are a very prepared management group and when the

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hammer comes down to make any moves that we have to make we will make them and do it effectively.

LEGISLATOR BIRNBAUM: Thank you.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator
Ferretti.
LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you
Presiding Officer. I would like to second Legislator Birnbaum's request as we have had discussion on this before Commissioner. The Eighth Precinct specifically we have a brand new building there with state of the art equipment. What we need is to staff it properly and open it as a precinct. I hope \(f\) this academy moves forward and the bond for the academy moves forward, which I'm in favor, I think we need to keep in mind that with all new buildings and this new technology we have to make sure that we are utilizing it.

So, I would second the request of Legislator Birnbaum and \(I\) know the majority has already made the request to the county executive to reopen the precincts. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER RYDER: Thank you.

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LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you
Commissioner Ryder. I had one other question for the administration actually before we open it up to other legislators having to do with advertising. It wouldn't be for you commissioner. I don't know if it's for you either Ken. Where is Mike Santoramo or Katy?

MR. SANTORAMO: Mike Santoramo.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: This is a
logistical issue now that we've broken all these out into numerous separate items. It incurs an advertising obligation that will have to be met by the clerk's office. We will be looking to the administration to fund that advertising. I understand it's in the area of six figures. Is there a plan by the administration to get the monies into the clerk's office to do that?

MR. SANTORAMO: There is. We recently met with the clerk of the legislature and as the invoices come in for the advertising they will be sent over to the county treasurer's office and paid that way. That should take care of everything.

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LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator
Bynoe.
LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Could you
clarify your request?
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Yes. I think in the past the capital plan items have been put together and advertised as a single item. There is a cost to that. But when you break them out separately you have to advertise each one individually. It increases the cost to the county and to the clerk's office. That's one of the downsides of doing it this way.

Suffolk County they are having the exact opposite discussion in which the county executive has put everything into one plan and some members of the legislature has asked them to break them out into separate items. When you do break them out there are additional advertising costs. We want to make sure those are met.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: I kind of understand why we did it that way but I would like us to consider maybe at least bulking

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some of these things together. When you start talking six figures for advertising I'd like to see more projects done. I think we should work together. I think we did a great job working together and getting this plan pushed forward. I would like to see us bulk some of this stuff in the future.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: We agree
and have been making that suggestion
repeatedly to the administration. But it was there preference to do it this way at this time. I agree 100 percent. In the future let's try to put this all together and save that money.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you
Presiding Officer.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thanks. Anyone else on the legislature before I open it up for public comment? Sure. Minority Leader Abrahams.

> LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I believe
there's someone from the administration that can answer the question about the partial encumbrance Mike?

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MR. SANTORAMO: We can get somebody from the county attorney's office. LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I thought somebody was here. If nobody's here then don't. Maybe Ken can answer it real quick.

Ken, how are you? Is there language in the contract that provides for a partial encumbrance?

MR. ARNOLD: No. My
understanding is that the full encumbered value of the contract has to be available for the comptroller to act on.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Is Jeff still here? So Jeff, hearing what you just heard from the commissioner, you're expecting that the legislature bond the entire \(\$ 43\) million?

MR. SCHOEN: If the contract doesn't contain sufficient language, partial encumbrance language, availability of funds language or some sort of language breaking down the cost or some way to break it down for us to determine whether the obligations are met by the bonding then we would expect to see

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the full bond.
LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Is there any public comment? Hearing none, I just wanted to thank all the members of the Nassau County Police Department staff who are here in support of the police academy under the commissioner. Hearing no public comment, I will ask for a vote. All in favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously.

Legislator Ford is making a motion to adjourn. Seconded by Legislator Drucker. All in favor of adjourning signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously. We are adjourned and now move on to the committee calendars.
