- 5 MR. PULITZER: Thank you. Public
- 6 Safety Committee roll call. Legislator Debra
- 7 Mule.
- 8 LEGISLATOR MULE: Here.
- 9 MR. PULITZER: Legislator Siela
- 10 Bynoe.
- 11 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Here.
- MR. PULITZER: Thank you.
- 13 Ranking member Delia DeRiggi-Whitton.
- 14 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:

- MR. PULITZER: Legislator John
- 17 Ferretti, Jr.

- 4 MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum
- 5 ma'am.
- 6 LEGISLATOR FORD: There are six
- 7 items on the agenda today which are clerk
- 8 items 288-18, 289-18, 290-18, 291-18 and
- 9 355-18.
- 10 Clerk item number 288-18 is an
- ordinance supplemental to the annual
- 12 appropriation ordinance in connection with the
- 13 Department of Toxicology and the medical
- 14 examiner.
- May I have a motion. Moved by
- 16 Legislator Muscarella. Seconded by Legislator
- 17 Rhoads. The item is before us. Who is here
- 18 from the administration to speak about this
- 19 item?
- MS. DOOLING: Karen Dooling,
- 21 assistant director crime laboratory medical
- 22 examiner's office. This item is for the
- toxicology laboratory. It's an \$85,090
- grant. It's through the state. It's a no
- 25 match. And it will be used for supplies and

- 2 equipment and overtime to support the
- 3 laboratory, reduce backlog and to maintain
- 4 current quality functions.
- 5 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. Any
- 6 questions from the legislators? Any public
- 7 comment? All those in favor of passing 288-18
- 8 please say aye. Any opposed? The item
- 9 passes.
- 10 I'm sorry. I meant to call 289 at
- 11 the same time. So I would like to call
- 12 289-18. Do I have a motion? Legislator
- 13 Muscarella. Seconded by Legislator Rhoads.
- 14 The item is before us. If you can give us a
- 15 little history.
- MS. DOOLING: This is the same
- 17 grant issued that's through the state but it's
- 18 for the crime laboratory. It's \$530,704. No
- match. And it's used for the same things,
- 20 equipment, personnel, overtime and supplies to
- 21 support quality control program and reduce
- 22 backlogs.
- 23 LEGISLATOR FORD: Any questions?
- 24 Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
- 25 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Is

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- there an update on the labs? I know we always
- 3 ask this. I feel like it's been going on for
- 4 years.
- 5 MS. DOOLING: The new building is
- 6 moving along. I anticipate we will be in
- 7 there by the end of the year. It's hard to
- 8 give a firm date because there are a couple of
- 9 things outstanding and awaiting resolution to
- determine exactly when we can get in there.
- 11 Very exciting, our accrediting body will be
- 12 coming in in October and they will also be
- 13 going to that facility to take a look at it
- 14 and we'll just be picking up one operation and
- moving it there. Once they come and they look
- at the facility and find it acceptable, all we
- have to do once everything is moved and
- 18 recalibrators will have to show them proof
- that all that's been done and we will be ready
- 20 to move in.
- 21 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Not
- 22 holding you to anything but it sounds possibly
- like the beginning of 2019?
- MS. DOOLING: I truly believe we
- will be in there before the end of this year.

- 2 My best guess is November.
- 3 LEGISLATOR FORD: Any other
- 4 questions? Any public comment? Seeing none,
- 5 all those in favor of passing 289-18 please
- 6 say aye. All those opposed? The item
- 7 passes. Thank you very much.
- I'm going to call -- the next three
- 9 items actually deal with the Traffic Safety
- 10 Board. I'm going to call all of them
- 11 together. Item 290-18, 291-18 and 292-18.
- 12 All those can I have a motion? Legislator
- 13 Muscarella. Seconded by Legislator Mule.
- Good afternoon Mr. Mistron.
- MR. MISTRON: Christopher
- 16 Mistron, Nassau County Traffic Safety. Of the
- three items the first item, the 290, is in
- 18 reference to a DWI grant that we've received
- 19 for \$60,000. In fact, the check has already
- 20 been received and is waiting in the
- 21 treasurer's office to be matched to this
- 22 grant. The purpose of the money was for the
- Nassau County Police Department to be able to
- do special DWI patrols, arrange for special
- details including road blocks at various

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- 2 locations for DWI specific activity.
- 3 291 is for the Stop DWI Program
- 4 itself for a little more than 1.3 million.
- 5 This is the program that is administered and
- 6 divided between different agencies. The
- 7 police department, various police agencies
- 8 throughout the county, the district attorney
- 9 for prosecution, probation for following those
- on probation, for drug and alcohol to help
- 11 assist in the educational programs and for
- 12 traffic safety itself for being able to
- program and to administer the grant monies
- 14 themselves.
- Then 292 is monies that are
- 16 received under the handicapped program. Fines
- that are received for handicapped parking are
- divided between traffic safety and the
- 19 Department of Physically Challenged. With our
- 20 portion of the money we actually utilize it
- 21 for both educational programs as well as
- 22 within the child safety seat programs that we
- 23 do throughout the county.
- We have special needs person that's
- 25 able to install seats and to assist with those

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- 2 children that are unable to sit up properly or
- 3 are facing different physical needs that
- 4 entail specialized work within transporting
- 5 them within vehicles. Those are the three
- 6 grants before you.
- 7 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you.
- 8 Just to go back. With the surcharge that you
- 9 get, this is funding that comes from New York
- 10 State, these are fees that are charged by New
- 11 York State, correct?
- MR. MISTRON: Yes.
- 13 LEGISLATOR FORD: So then
- 14 actually you could use it in that capacity as
- training or to be able to help with car
- 16 seats?
- 17 MR. MISTRON: Correct.
- 18 LEGISLATOR FORD: Very
- interesting. On the other one 292 -- no 291,
- 20 I'm sorry, that's the one with the Stop DWI.
- 21 That's where like what is it? to provide
- 22 funding so that if the police need to set up
- 23 special checkpoints or is that something
- 24 separate?
- MR. MISTRON: The 290 was special

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- 2 money coming in one-time deal, one-time shot.
- 3 That one was when I put in for the grant it
- 4 was for special details and the state approved
- 5 and gave us \$60,000.
- 6 In the case of 291, the 1.3
- 7 million, it's a mistake that the state will
- 8 never make again. It's dedicated funding that
- 9 what basically is is that's fine money
- 10 received for DWI stays within the county and
- 11 by legislation must be maintained by DWI
- office. Who then again as we have to submit a
- 13 plan each year and they are the ones that
- 14 approve how the money and where the money is
- 15 going to go. So with that money in our
- 16 educational component, for instance, we
- actually contract with Mother's Against Drunk
- Driving, with Dedicated, which is Marge Lee
- and want to do school programs as well as
- 20 other educational elements, including Athletes
- 21 Helping Athletes is another one. Then the
- rest of the money is used for all the elements
- of DWI, enforcement, rehabilitation and
- 24 prosecution.
- 25 LEGISLATOR FORD: Does that

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- include the interlocks that get installed?
- 3 MR. MISTRON: The portion that
- 4 probation monitors the interlock program is
- 5 reimbursed, their salaries are reimbursed
- 6 through this program.
- 7 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you for
- 8 all the work you do on this. It's fantastic.
- 9 Any other questions or comments from the
- 10 legislators? Any public comment? I see
- 11 none. I'm going to call 290-18, 291-18,
- 12 292-18. All those in favor of passing it
- through say aye. Any opposed? The items pass
- 14 unanimously. Thank you so much. On to the
- 15 next one.
- 16 Item 355-18. This is an ordinance
- 17 supplemental to the annual appropriation
- ordinance in connection with the correctional
- 19 center. Can I have a motion? Moved by
- 20 Legislator Ferretti. Seconded by Legislator
- 21 Rhoads. Okay. Good afternoon.
- MS. HALL: Narda Hall,
- 23 Correctional Center. Item 355-18 is for the
- 24 Gun Involved Violence Elimination Award. It
- 25 appropriates \$22,000 in funds from New York

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- 2 State through the district attorney's office.
- 3 The grant focuses on reducing violent crimes
- 4 through improved coordination among federal,
- 5 state and local criminal justice agencies
- 6 using data driven strategies. The fund will
- 7 be used for overtime, training,
- 8 investigations, information sharing and
- 9 meeting for the county gang intelligence
- units. The term is from July 2018 through
- 11 June of 2019.
- 12 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you.
- 13 This actually is used within the correctional
- 14 center itself, funding for the gang
- 15 activities?
- MS. HALL: Yes. And preventive
- measures.
- 18 LEGISLATOR FORD: What do you
- train the correction officers with anything
- 20 special or is it more --
- MS. HALL: It's used within the
- 22 Gang Intelligence Unit.
- 23 LEGISLATOR FORD: I'm sorry. I
- 24 misunderstood you. Any other questions?
- 25 Legislator Bynoe.

- 2 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you
- 3 chairwoman. You actually started me in a
- 4 direction of my questioning. Could you tell
- 5 us a little more about the Gang Intelligence
- 6 Unit at the jail?
- 7 MR. ALBRIGHT: Alphonso Albright,
- 8 Commissioner. So the Gang Intelligence Unit
- 9 focuses on looking at gang activity inside the
- 10 jail facility. They collaborate with other
- 11 state, local and federal organizations in
- 12 regards to gang intelligence. The item that
- we have up that's going to enhance that
- 14 purpose inside and seek additional
- information. I wouldn't want to go too far
- into the dynamics of what this will be used
- for out in the public, but it is to
- 18 specifically help the gang intel unit in
- 19 coordination with others.
- 20 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: How large is
- 21 that unit?
- MR. ALBRIGHT: The unit is
- 23 approximately eight staff with a supervisor.
- 24 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you.
- LEGISLATOR FORD: Before you go,

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- 2 based on the information that you get and the
- 3 intel that you get do you then make
- 4 recommendations to the correctional center as
- 5 to whether or not to move any types of groups
- 6 or do you use that for moving any people
- 7 around in the correctional center?
- 8 MR. ALBRIGHT: The dynamics of
- 9 the intel that we do get is utilized for
- 10 certain types of movement. Again, I wouldn't
- 11 want to go too far, but yes, it could focus on
- 12 establishing different parameters or different
- solutions for how we navigate individual staff
- 14 as well as inmates.
- 15 LEGISLATOR FORD: Perfect. Thank
- 16 you very much. Any other legislators? Any
- other public? I see none. I will call
- 18 355-18. All those in favor of passing it say
- 19 aye. Any opposed? The item passes
- 20 unanimously.
- 21 Seeing as we have an addendum I'm
- 22 asking for a motion to suspend the rules.
- 23 Moved by Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by
- 24 Legislator Mule. All in favor? Thank you.
- I'm going to first call those two

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- 2 items together in connection with the police
- department, 439-18 and 451-18. I'm also going
- 4 to call item 457-18 and 458-18. A motion to
- 5 move those. Legislator Muscarella. Seconded
- 6 by Legislator Rhoads.
- 7 MR. STEPHANOFF: Good afternoon.
- 8 Lieutenant Greg Stephanoff from the police
- 9 department.
- 10 Item 439 of '18 this item
- 11 supplements \$500,000 from our misdemeanor
- 12 forfeiture funds. This is money that comes
- in, misdemeanor forfeiture funds are monies
- 14 that come from in from misdemeanor type
- offenses. One of the larger ones is DWI that
- 16 come in and property that gets forfeited.
- 17 This money is put into the DD, the general
- 18 expense. Forfeiture money, asset money is
- 19 used to further enhance the department. This
- will be used to enhance I think one of the
- 21 areas slated is our Special Victims Unit. We
- 22 are going to enhance that area so that unit
- 23 can utilize their area better.
- 24 LEGISLATOR FORD: Any questions
- 25 from the legislators on this one? Go on to

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- 2 451-18.
- MR. PERSICH: I'm also going to
- 4 speak on 447, all the UASI ones. 447, 448,
- 5 449, 450. Andy Persich, Office of Management
- 6 and Budget.
- 7 MR. STEPHANOFF: I can present
- 8 it. Item 451 of '18 appropriates UASI, which
- 9 is our Homeland Security Grant. This is a
- 10 recurring grant we've gotten since 9-11. It
- 11 appropriates \$398,905. 160,000 of it is going
- to salary, which is for training. We use the
- training for preparedness to train our cops so
- 14 that if God forbid there is an incident.
- 195,000 is going to go into the BB,
- which is the equipment line. We will use this
- to buy equipment that's necessary. And we do
- this from intelligence that we get out. Like
- 19 Commissioner Ryder says, we try and get ahead
- of the situation. Then there is \$2,000 into
- 21 the general expense.
- 22 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. I
- 23 agree. It's amazing what our police
- department's been doing. We have become a
- 25 model for so many other law enforcement

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- 2 agencies. Actually I think even throughout
- 3 the country sometimes even the world. I
- 4 commend you all for doing such a great job.
- 5 MR. STEPHANOFF: Also to take off
- 6 with the academy, some of this training is
- 7 done in the academy also with the use of the
- 8 grant funds that are supplied for that
- 9 training.
- 10 LEGISLATOR FORD: Just think when
- 11 we get the new academy how much better
- everything will be. Any comments, questions
- from the legislators? How about we go on to
- 14 item 457-18.
- MR. STEPHANOFF: 457 of '18 is a
- 16 traffic safety grant. This is the Buckle Up
- 17 it's \$147,000. This is for seat belt
- 18 enforcement. We will do this enforcement in
- 19 high accident frequency locations. We track
- 20 all the accidents throughout Nassau County and
- 21 we usually try and enforce in the high
- 22 accident areas to address the problems. This
- will be one of the problems. People get hurt
- 24 without seat belts.
- 25 LEGISLATOR FORD: I agree. I

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- think it's wonderful we offer child safety
- 3 seat installation through our Traffic Safety
- 4 Board. It's amazing. We start there and just
- 5 to follow-up to make sure parents and
- 6 caregivers secure their children safely in
- 7 cars.
- 8 Any other questions or comments
- 9 from the legislators? How about on to 458-18.
- 10 MR. STEPHANOFF: 458 is
- 11 supplement \$64,650 from our Port Security
- 12 Grant Program. This is a piece of money that
- is dedicated to our marine bureau. This will
- 14 be used to maintain engines on two boats.
- 15 These boats patrol the waterways that's part
- of our port security initiative and they are
- offering us money to help us to maintain those
- 18 engines so it takes the burden off us and we
- 19 can keep using those boats. I believe the two
- 20 boats, 27 foot boats, were also grant
- 21 purchased off the port security program. So
- they are also following up to help us maintain
- 23 those boats.
- 24 LEGISLATOR FORD: Considering how
- 25 many people are on the water we need you to be

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- there as well. Especially when they do
- 3 drinking while boating and we always hear
- 4 about horrific accidents and things like that
- 5 that happen out there.
- I know that you can go into like
- 7 the canals and whatever. You also could go
- 8 out into the ocean with it as well?
- 9 MR. STEPHANOFF: I don't know all
- 10 the boats they have. They do have larger
- 11 boats that go out on deeper water. From the
- 12 Port Security Grant, I testified a couple of
- leg sessions ago, that 37 foot safe boat.
- 14 These smaller boats can go along the shore.
- 15 The bigger boats can go out into deeper water.
- 16 LEGISLATOR FORD: Considering
- some of the tragedies that have happened in
- 18 Long Beach and we think about so many people
- that go into the water and they may not be
- 20 good at swimming. Even if they are, with the
- undercurrent and rip tide too many tragedies.
- The more law enforcement and more safety
- 23 initiatives that we have I think will just be
- so much better to keep us protected. Thank
- you. Any other? Legislator Bynoe.

- 2 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you
- 3 chairwoman. I would like to take the
- 4 opportunity to thank the Nassau County Police
- 5 Department and particularly the Marine Bureau
- 6 for their recovery efforts for young Ramille
- 7 McCray who was lost at sea out at Long Beach.
- 8 You guys never gave up. You were out there
- 9 for days and you recovered that body and was
- 10 able to bring him home to his family. And
- 11 that was some solace for them. I thank you
- 12 very, very much.
- 13 LEGISLATOR FORD: Any other
- 14 legislators? Any public comment on any of
- these? I'm going to call a vote for 439-18,
- 16 451-18, 457-18 and 457-18. All in favor of
- passing these say aye. Any opposed? The
- 18 items pass. Thank you very much.
- I'm going to call item 447-18. Can
- 20 I have a motion? Legislator Muscarella.
- 21 Seconded by Legislator Rhoads. This is an
- ordinance supplemental to the annual
- 23 appropriations in connection with the medical
- 24 examiner's office.
- MS. DOOLING: Karen Dooling,

- 1 Public Safety 7-23-18
- 2 assistant director crime lab medical
- 3 examiner's office. This is a \$25,000 grant
- 4 for medical examiner's office Homeland
- 5 Security grant. Annual grant will be used for
- 6 equipment for the morgue.
- 7 LEGISLATOR FORD: Any questions
- 8 from the legislators? Any public? I see
- 9 none. All those in favor of passing item
- 10 447-18 say aye. Any nays? The item passes.
- Now I'm going to call in bulk all
- the items for the Office of Emergency
- 13 Management. I'm going to call item 449-18,
- 14 450-18, 452-18, 453-18, 454-18, 455-18. Can I
- 15 have a motion? Legislator Rhoads. Seconded
- 16 by Legislator Mule. The items are before us.
- 17 MR. PERSICH: I think I got it
- 18 right now. Andy Persich, Office of management
- 19 and Budget. I'm here on behalf of the Office
- of Emergency Management to testify about these
- 21 items 452, 453, 454, 455 are part of the UASI
- 22 grant. It's an annual appropriation for
- training, equipment and anti-terrorism tactics
- that they use. And it's given out to various
- departments, fire commission, corrections,

- 2 police and emergency management.
- 3 LEGISLATOR FORD: Any questions
- 4 from any of the legislators? Let's go on to
- 5 the next ones then.
- 6 MR. PERSICH: You want to go on
- 7 to 448, 449?

- 9 448. We have 449 and 450.
- 10 MR. PERSICH: These are the
- annual appropriations for the SHIP Grant.
- 12 It's used for either equipment or training.
- 13 It comes from New York State Homeland
- 14 Security. It's for, as officer Stephanoff
- 15 discussed for anti-terrorism and other
- 16 equipment needs and training purposes.
- 17 LEGISLATOR FORD: This is
- 18 basically all as usual pass through grant
- money that we get?
- MR. PERSICH: It's an annual
- 21 appropriation from the New York State
- 22 Department of Homeland Security. They come in
- every year. The appropriations vary from year
- to year depending on the needs that we request
- but they're an annual appropriation.

- 2 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank heavens
- 3 they send it to us. You guys do a great job
- 4 as well and always at the ready especially
- 5 when we have unfortunately sometimes
- 6 disasters, natural and, you know, when you're
- 7 well trained and you have the equipment that
- you need it makes your jobs even better. So
- 9 thank you.
- 10 Any questions, comments from the
- 11 legislators? Anything from the public? All
- those in favor of passing items 449-18, 450-18
- 13 452-18, 453-18, 454-18 and 455-18 please say
- 14 aye. Any opposed? The items pass.
- So the last item on this calendar
- is 456-18. Can I have a motion? Legislator
- 17 Ferretti. Seconded by Legislator Mule. This
- has to do with appropriation ordinance in
- 19 connection with the District Attorney's
- 20 Office. Good afternoon.
- MR. MCMANUS: Good afternoon.
- 22 Bob McManus, District Attorney's Office. This
- item appropriates \$501,572 in funds received
- 24 from the New York State Division of Criminal
- Justice Services to maintain a staff of highly

- 2 experienced prosecutors who work to achieve
- 3 convictions and maximum sentences for repeat,
- 4 violent and serious felony offenders.
- 5 LEGISLATOR FORD: Any questions
- 6 or comments from the legislators? Any from
- 7 the public? Mr. Budnick.
- 8 MR. BUDNICK: John Budnick.
- 9 Madam chair and honorable members and my
- 10 friend from the district attorney's office.
- 11 Is there going to be or contemplated there is
- 12 going to be grants for legal aid defense and
- to the police department to do their utmost
- 14 investigation in these types of major crimes
- and recidivist cases? Will there be more to
- 16 assist these other agencies?
- MR. MCMANUS: The answer is ves.
- 18 This is a long-standing program that funds --
- 19 the program originated at the US Department of
- 20 Justice and it is granted -- funds are granted
- 21 to Legal Aid Society and police departments
- 22 actually throughout the country.
- LEGISLATOR FORD: Good to hear.
- 24 All those in favor of passing 456-18 please
- 25 say aye. Any opposed? The item passes.
