3 I'll call the Health and Social Services
4 Committee to order. I will ask the clerk to
5 call the roll.

6 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator

5 quorum, ma'am.

6 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Before we
7 begin I'm going to ask for a motion to
8 suspend the rules, please.

9 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: So moved.

10 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Second.

11 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Motion by
12 Legislator Schaefer, seconded by Legislator
13 Drucker. All those in favor of suspending
14 the rules signify by saying aye.

15 (Aye.)

16 We have Clerk Item 294-19 is a
17 Resolution to establish the Nassau County
18 Commission to combat senior identify theft,
19 frauds and scams.

20 Can I have a motion?

21 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: So moved.

22 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Second.

23 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Moved by
24 Legislator Gaylor, seconded by Legislator
25 Lafazan. Legislator Gaylor, would you like

2 to say something?

3 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Thank you
4 very much. This is a piece of legislation
5 that I asked and hope it makes it through
6 committee and then the Full Leg obviously
7 that identifies and creates a committee to
8 help establish the cause for this increase
9 in senior scams.

10 There have been numerous pieces
11 in the paper, numerous constituents have
12 been calling to the offices in recent years,
13 but it seems more prevalent now where there
14 have been many instances of seniors having
15 been victimized by various types of scams;
16 phone scams, particularly others types of
17 scams where people knock on their doors and
18 misrepresent who they are and whatnot.
19 These scams have actually become quite
20 sophisticated.

21 Some make it appear that they are
22 legitimate either from government officials.
23 I have been informed of scams by people who
24 represent themselves as police officers or
25 police agencies or sheriff departments or

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2 other government entities, or recently there
3 has been a rash of scams in our area from
4 people who identify themselves as pastors or
5 rabbis seeking money for temples and
6 churches and the like.

7 We all know about the IRS or
8 credit card companies or the social security
9 administration calls that, even I've gotten
10 that told me I'm going to be arrested in the
11 next few minutes unless I call them back
12 with some way to get them some crazy target
13 credit cards or credit cards from TJ Maxx or
14 whatever.

15 So it's a prevalent problem
16 throughout the county and particularly
17 geared towards targeting our seniors.

18 So this legislation is being
19 introduced to protect the seniors against
20 these scams and frauds which are really
21 heartless crimes being perpetuated upon
22 those that lack a certain level of awareness
23 and particularly are devastating to our
24 seniors.

25 This commission that I'm calling

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2 for is a way that we can figure out a need
3 to understand the why and the how these
4 scams manifest themselves so prevalently and
5 steps to identify them as well as steps and
6 processes to take to greatly reduce the
7 likelihood of our seniors being victimized
8 and really prayed upon.

9 The goal is to bring the
10 resources and knowledge and preparation that
11 many agencies, both governmental agencies,
12 possibly non governmental agencies, private
13 companies and citizens have to protect our
14 most vulnerable constituents, our seniors.

15 So, I believe that there is a
16 certain level of lack of awareness by
17 seniors and the goal is to improve the
18 awareness, knowledge and resources available
19 to them in this particular area. That's
20 what this legislation is calling for.

21 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Any questions
22 or comments from the other legislators?

23 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
24 support this but I also recommend the AG has
25 a very good program, Smart Seniors, and

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2 they're things I never even thought of.

3 It's good for anybody. I have them at the
4 senior center. It's a start.

5 The only other good thing lately
6 is I have noticed on the television, if
7 someone is calling now it says robo before
8 the number. That's been the best thing.

9 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Sometimes
10 what I get is, I think when you start
11 getting closer to 60, you start getting
12 these kinds of phone calls. It will say
13 spam also on the caller ID.

14 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Bill, I can
15 tell you I am at that age. I get those
16 phone calls all the time and they do come up
17 spam.

18 But, especially -- and it doesn't
19 just affect seniors, but unfortunately
20 seniors get suckered into giving money.
21 Many of them even donate to all these they
22 think charitable organizations but they
23 aren't charitable organizations. Or they
24 think they are saving their grandchild who
25 is now locked up in some country and can't

2 get home or lost everything and can't get
3 home, so everything we can do to try to help
4 them.

5 I know many of us had the
6 workshops in our senior centers in our
7 districts, but the more we can do the
8 better. There is no more comment or
9 questions?

10 (No verbal response.)

11 All those in favor signify by
12 saying aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 Those opposed?

15 (No verbal response.)

16 This will move forward. Thank
17 you.

18 Our next is Clerk Item 312-19,
19 Clerk Item 336-19 and Clerk Item 347-19,
20 which are all ordinances supplemental to the
21 annual appropriation ordinance in connection
22 with the Department of Human Services.

23 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: So moved.

24 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Second.

25 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Moved by

1 Health Committee/9-9-19

2 Legislator Schaefer, seconded by Legislator
3 Lafazan.

4 MR. HALL: Brian Hall, Human
5 Services. 312-19 is a supplemental
6 appropriation for \$36,300. This is for our
7 youth service program with the interns. We
8 get reimbursed 100 percent by New York State
9 for their salaries.

10 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Any questions
11 or comments on this item from the
12 legislators or from the public?

13 (No verbal response.)

14 Clerk item 336-19.

15 MR. HALL: 336-19 is a grant in
16 the amount of \$350,000 from the Office of
17 Children and Family Services. We use those
18 funds to contract out with the local towns
19 and municipality youth contracts. It's 100
20 percent state funded.

21 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Any questions
22 or comments from the legislators?

23 (No verbal response.)

24 Any public comment?

25 (No verbal response.)

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2 Clerk Item 347-19.

3 MR. HALL: 347-19 is a grant for
4 \$68,660 and it's for a methadone clinic. To
5 help offset some of our increased costs as
6 the cost of the drugs being used over there
7 go up. It's 100 percent reimbursable.

8 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Any questions
9 from the legislators or comments?

10 (No verbal response.)

11 Any public comment?

12 (No verbal response.)

13 Seeing none, all those in favor
14 signify by saying aye.

15 (Aye.)

16 Any opposed?

20 This will move on to the Finance
21 Committee. Thank you.

22 Next is Clerk Item 313-19, 314-19
23 and 335-19. These are all ordinances
24 supplemental to the annual appropriation
25 ordinance in connection with the Department

2 of Health. Motion, please.

3 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: So moved.

4 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Second.

5 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Moved by
6 Legislator Gaylor, seconded by Legislator
7 Drucker. We have MaryEllen Laurain.

8 MS. LAURAIN: Good afternoon.

9 MaryEllen Laurain, Department of Health.

10 Item 313-19 is a supplemental appropriation
11 in the amount of \$113,175. This is for the
12 children with special healthcare needs.

13 It's funded through New York State
14 Department of Health and provides
15 information and referral to families of
16 children up to the age of 21 who have
17 special health care needs and medical
18 diagnoses.

19 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Any questions
20 from the legislators?

21 (No verbal response.)

22 Any public comment?

23 (No verbal response.)

24 Clerk item 314-19.

25 MS. LAURAIN: Item 314-19 is a

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2 supplemental appropriation in the amount of
3 \$717,006. This is for early intervention
4 administrative grant. This is 100 percent
5 funded through New York State Department of
6 Health and provides administrative costs to
7 our Early Intervention Program.

8 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Any questions
9 or comments from the legislators?

10 (No verbal response.)

11 Any public comment?

12 (No verbal response.)

13 All those in favor signify by
14 saying aye.

15 MS. LAURAIN: Item 335-19 is a
16 supplemental appropriation in the amount of
17 \$198,425. This is for our childhood led
18 poisoning prevention grant. It's 100
19 percent funded through the New York State
20 Department of Health and protects children
21 from led poisoning.

22 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Any questions
23 or comments from the legislators?

24 (No verbal response.)

25 Any public comment?

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2 (No verbal response.)

3 Seeing none, all those in favor
4 of those three clerk items signify by saying
5 aye.

6 (Aye.)

7 Any opposed?

8 (No verbal response.)

9 Any abstentions?

10 (No verbal response.)

11 Then they will move on to finance
12 also.

13 MS. LAURAIN: Thank you.

14 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Thank you.

15 Clerk Item 350-19 is a proposed
16 local law to amend Nassau County
17 Miscellaneous laws in relation to
18 restricting advertising of age restricting
19 products.

20 Can I have a motion?

21 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: So moved.

22 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Second.

23 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Moved by
24 Legislator Drucker, seconded by Legislator
25 Gaylor.

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2 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you,
3 Madam Chair. Again, I want to applaud and
4 commend the majority for recognizing the
5 urgency of passing this bill as well. We
6 are in the midst of an epidemic. We are
7 seeing it every night on the news with the
8 vaping problems and affecting adolescents
9 who don't even know what they are doing to
10 their bodies and lungs and everything else
11 and cognitive development later on.

12 This restriction on advertising
13 obviously we have to do more and hopefully
14 this will be the start of other legislation
15 that we can enact here to combat this
16 epidemic.

17 But at least the advertising ban
18 will perhaps deter people from purchasing
19 when it when they see it in the stores, the
20 convenient stores, and gas stations and
21 other local stores near schools and parks
22 and playgrounds.

23 We have to try to do as much as
24 we can as often as we can. This is another
25 effort. I'm very excited and happy that the

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2 majority is supporting it as well.

3 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: It's nice to
4 see that we're moving even further. We made
5 sure they are not in any place where
6 children can get them readily, they're
7 behind counters where tobacco products are.
8 We made sure the fines are larger on the
9 stings and if they continue to disobey those
10 laws, they will further complicate issues
11 they have to deal with. This is just adding
12 to it.

13 Any questions or comments from
14 the legislators? Legislator Gaylor.

15 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Thank you,
16 Madam Chairwoman. Obviously we know there
17 is a vaping issue and this addresses one
18 piece of it.

19 Make no mistake, vaping is a bad
20 thing. The CDC and the federal government
21 came out with a study last week after there
22 have been numerous deaths of kids who were
23 vaping and they're vaping these liquids that
24 are in these things that look like little
25 flash drive things and they're vaping two or

2 three of those flash drive things which is
3 equivalent of each one of those flash drives
4 is a pack of cigarettes.

5 So, by them vaping, they are
6 inhaling three packs of cigarettes a day and
7 it's very harmful on them.

8 I'm proud to be part of this
9 committee in pushing this legislation
10 forward obviously. I do hope that we look
11 to try to do more because the addiction to
12 nicotine leads to the addiction of other
13 things including marijuana and other drugs
14 and just bad for our children, it's bad for
15 everybody.

16 When I say children, people are
17 vaping, kids are vaping in third grade in
18 fourth grade. It's quite common that fourth
19 graders have tried it. This is a big big
20 problem.

21 Again, good efforts and I hope
22 there is more to come on vaping and
23 eradicating it from this county. Thank you.

24 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you,
25 Legislator Gaylor. I appreciate your

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2 support and I have filed legislation with
3 the Clerk's Office and I hope that we can
4 see that support generated and continued in
5 that regard because I have filed a bill to
6 ban the flavored vapes that are the source
7 of the attraction to our adolescents, to our
8 young children today.

9 If we can obliterate them from
10 the market, it will go a long way to
11 removing this scourge.

12 As you correctly pointed out, one
13 liquid pod is equivalent to 21 cigarettes.
14 You think about the nicotine in 21
15 cigarettes, that's the addiction. That's
16 what's causing the addiction. They buy
17 these pods, these liquid vapes. They taste
18 like bubble gum, cotton candy, and
19 strawberry, and they don't realize it and
20 it's an alluring addition and habit. It can
21 lead to many other problems, not just health
22 problems but further addiction.

23 I'm anxious and hopeful that we
24 can get the majority to continue to do more
25 in this regard.

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2 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Any other
3 comments or questions from the Legislature?

4 (No verbal response.)

5 Public comment? Mr. Budnick.

6 MR. BUDNICK: Honorable
7 legislators. Mr. Drucker, my highest
8 compliments. I, over the last 40 years have
9 served as a president of counseling agency,
10 the chairman of the board of a counseling
11 agency, and on the board of various
12 counseling agencies.

13 Let me tell you, this vaping
14 stuff is a clear and present danger to the
15 young people of America and, yes, you're
16 right we have to do all we can to try and
17 stop it.

18 We have too many young people
19 doing this. They're getting sick. They are
20 becoming addicted to nicotine. Forgive me
21 for saying this, that's just a slow
22 executioner. You know about his brother
23 Guil, don't you? Guillotine. God bless you
24 and keep up the good work. May the good
25 Lord bless and keep you.

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2 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Thank you,
3 John. All those in favor of Clerk Item
4 350-19 signify by saying aye.

5 (Aye.)

6 Those opposed?

7 (No verbal response.)

8 Any abstained?

9 (No verbal response.)

10 Then this one will move on to the
11 Finance Committee. There are two more
12 items. Clerk item 329-19 is an ordinance to
13 enhance food allergy safety measures at food
14 service establishments in Nassau County.

15 Can I have a motion?

16 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: So moved.

17 LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Second.

18 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Moved by
19 Legislator Josh Lafazan, seconded by James
20 Kennedy. The item is before us. Josh.

21 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Thank you
22 very much, Madam Chairwoman. I do want to
23 especially thank Legislator Kopel for his
24 commitment to the issue. A pleasure working
25 with Howard.

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2 As we sit here today, more than
3 35 million Americans, one in ten Americans,
4 experience food allergies. Our response to
5 food allergies must warrant a true sense of
6 urgency and consider these startling
7 statistics according to food allergy
8 research in education.

9 Every three minutes, a food
10 allergy reaction sends someone to the
11 emergency room. In the United States
12 200,000 people require emergency medical
13 care for allergic reactions to food each
14 year.

15 Medical procedures to treat
16 anaphylaxis resulting from food allergies
17 increased by 380 percent between 2007 and
18 2016.

19 We recognize that food allergies
20 can be a significant barrier to both safety
21 and quality of life and our citizens deserve
22 prompt and comprehensive action here.

23 That is why I filed this bill to
24 make Nassau County a proactive municipality
25 in New York in terms of protecting

1 Health Committee/9-9-19
2 individuals with food allergies. I thank my
3 colleagues for their commitment to the
4 welfare of our children and all those that
5 have food allergies and urge a unanimous
6 vote. Thank you.

7 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Any questions
8 or comments from the legislators?

9 (No verbal response.)

10 Any public comment?

11 Mr. Budnick.

12 MR. BUDNICK: I apologize. I
13 haven't had a chance to read this. What
14 does this bill do specifically in order to
15 try to effectuate the attenuation of
16 problems that are caused by those with food
17 and similar allergies? I don't understand.
18 I haven't read it.

19 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: That's okay.
20 I read it for you. What the bill does is
21 twofold. Both are imperative. Number one,
22 it mandates signage, food allergy awareness
23 signage, and, number two, it mandates food
24 allergy safety training for individuals in
25 restaurants.

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2 So it's important not only to
3 have signage but to have personnel in the
4 restaurants to be trained. I hope you will
5 support it as well as my colleagues.

6 MR. BUDNICK: I think that's
7 fabulous. Speaking as a person who is
8 allergic to tomatoes, cheese and milk
9 solids, fish and shell fish, and worst of
10 all, chocolate. Thank you, thank you, God
11 bless you, guys.

12 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Legislator
13 Schaefer.

14 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: I'm just
15 wondering as an attorney, have you
16 considered any issues with liability for
17 this? I think it's a good idea. I just
18 wonder if that's something that you have
19 considered and what the ramifications may be
20 for restaurants and staff at those
21 restaurants?

22 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: In the
23 modification in the amendment that was filed
24 by the majority, it had a provision. I
25 don't have the bill in front of me, but it

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2 was put into place and I don't want to
3 butcher the language on the record here, but
4 it was put in place in terms of protection
5 for the county. Thank you.

6 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Now, this is
7 restaurants, Josh, did this include I want
8 to say carvels or places like that?

9 My grandson, we never had these
10 allergies, my daughter allergic to bee
11 stings or things like that, but my little
12 grandson is allergic to not peanuts, but
13 tree nuts, certain tree nuts.

14 I have to remember when we go to
15 an ice cream store they can't use that
16 scoop, they have to use a different scope
17 and some of them are very, very good. You
18 know what, if they serve soft serve you're
19 better off because that didn't have any scoop
20 involved. Because maybe she's going to be
21 put a fresh scoop in, but somebody else
22 might have just put a scoop in that was in
23 pistachio and not rinsed -- I never had to
24 deal with this before. He is a little guy
25 with the Epipen and the whole thing, trip to

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2 the hospital and whatever.

3 It is very scary but I feel like
4 a lot of the responsibility is on myself
5 when I have him or his parents or whatever.

6 I have to ask all those questions
7 or else I tell him, he doesn't know the
8 difference, he thinks it's peanuts or
9 whatever.

10 But like I said, a lot has to
11 fall on you as a parent or a grandparent or
12 caregiver whoever has them to be extra
13 cautious to avoid something.

14 But this is particularly at a
15 restaurant, not necessarily, like I said, a
16 Carvel or places like that that are in that
17 same situation.

18 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Speaking
19 with counsel, I asked Commissioner
20 Eisenstein for the number of restaurants and
21 he gave me the number 4,100 which is the
22 number of restaurants in the county so I
23 believe it would pertain to a Carvel or
24 Ralph's Ices.

25 Just a couple of points. Number

1 Health Committee/9-9-19

2 one, just to Legislator Schaefer, I pulled
3 it up in the bill, and I thank the majority
4 for thinking of this. Section 7, letter C,
5 to the fullest extent permitted by law the
6 food service establishment shall not assume
7 any liability whatsoever with respect to any
8 alleged failure to comply with the terms of
9 this local law. So I thank you for your
10 diligence there.

11 Legislator Walker, to your point,
12 you couldn't be more accurate. That's why I
13 think the training is so important here.

14 If you are a teenager working at
15 Carvel you may not know. I only know
16 because I have close friends who are
17 suffered anaphylaxis that changing gloves
18 can save lives. Cleaning of the scooper can
19 save lives. Using the same rag and using a
20 different rag can save lives.

21 The nuance of how to protect
22 against cross-contamination is so complex
23 and we can all do a better job of learning.

24 So what I'm hoping and I would
25 love to work with you, if this bill is

1 Health Committee/9-9-19
2 passed, to do a public service announcement
3 and do real public outreach with schools and
4 restaurants so an individual who is a child
5 doesn't have a parent there can have the
6 same knowledge as a parent who is
7 experienced here. So I would love to work
8 with you.

9 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Thank you.
10 Any other questions or comments from the
11 legislators?

12 (No verbal response.)

13 Is there any public comment?

14 (No verbal response.)

15 All those in favor signify by
16 saying aye.

17 (Aye.)

18 Those opposed?

19 (No verbal response.)

20 Any abstentions?

21 (No verbal response.)

22 Then this will move on to the
23 Rules Committee.

24 The final item is Clerk Item
25 331-19 which is a local law to amend the

1 Health Committee/9-9-19

2 Nassau County Human Rights Law in relation
3 to reasonable accommodations.

4 Can I have a motion?

5 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: So moved.

6 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:

7 Second.

8 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Moved by
9 Legislator Gaylor, seconded by Legislator
10 DeRiggi-Whitton. Is there anyone to speak
11 to this item? Josh.

12 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Thank you
13 very much, Madam Chair. According to NIDCD,
14 about two out of three of every 1,000
15 children in the United States are born with
16 a detectable level of hearing loss in one or
17 both ears. And one out of eight people
18 aged 12 years or older has hearing loss in
19 both ears.

20 Looking to the future of 2005
21 mark track report reported that the number
22 of Americans with hearing loss will increase
23 to 40 million by 2025 and 50 million by
24 2050. I share these statistics of course to
25 underscore the need for our collective

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2 urgency here at the Legislature and the
3 large scale of positive impact that our work
4 will have.

5 That's why I filed this bill to
6 amend the Nassau County Human Rights Law
7 because the simple fact is this, when
8 hearing acuity is a bona fide occupational
9 qualification for a job and a hearing aid or
10 other auxiliary aid can allow an individual
11 to reach a predetermined level of hearing
12 proficiency, I believe the individual should
13 be able to utilize the aid.

14 With more than 3 million hearing
15 aids being dispensed in 2016 alone in this
16 country, this bill could not come at a more
17 crucial time for people who are deaf or hard
18 of hearing. So I thank my colleagues for
19 their devotion to serving individuals with
20 disabilities and I of course urge a
21 unanimous vote.

22 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Thank you,
23 Josh. Any questions or comments from the
24 legislators?

25 (No verbal response.)

1 Health Committee/9-9-19

6 (Aye.)
7 Any opposed?
8 (No verbal response.)

10 (No verbal response.)
11 This will also move on to Rules
12 Committee. That was our final item. I
13 believe I did not skip anything.
14 Motion to adjourn?
15 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: So moved.
16 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Second.
17 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Moved by
