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LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: We are going to start with the committee meetings today. I apologize for being late. We had a hearing this morning which went a little overtime and we needed a little extra time to prepare for the meeting. What we are going to do is we will have the Rules Committee first, which will be contracts only. After we are done with the Rules we will recess, then Finance and Rules will come back afterwards. Start things off I would like to ask Legislator Denise Ford to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mike, you want to call the roll?
MR. PULITZER: Yes. Thank you.
The roll call for the Rules Committee.
Legislator Siela Bynoe.
LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Here.
MR. PULITZER: Legislator Delia
DeRiggi-Whitton.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Here.
MR. PULITZER: Ranking member
Kevan Abrahams.

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LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Here.
MR. PULITZER: Legislator Laura

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Here.
MR. PULITZER: Legislator Steven

LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Present.
MR. PULITZER: Vice chairman
Howard Kopel.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Here.
MR. PULITZER: Chairman Richard
Nicolello.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Here.
MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum sir.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: So we get this out of the way now, I would ask for a motion to suspend the rules so we can consider the items on the addendum. Moved by Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator Bynoe. All in favor of suspending the rules signify by saying aye. Those opposed? The rules are suspended.

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I'm going to call all the contracts
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at once and then we will consider them after that.

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A-15, A-33, A-42, A-482020
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resolutions authorizing the commissioner of shared services to award and execute or approve additional funds for blanket purchase orders between the county and Eastern Communications, Best Climate Predator Pest Control, Intel Tech Security Services.

That is moved by Minority Leader

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Kevan Abrahams. Seconded by Deputy Presiding Officer Howard Kopel. All the contracts are before us.

We will start off with A-15 of 2020, which is with the police department and Eastern Communications Limited.

MR. FIELD: Good afternoon.
Deputy inspector Field, Nassau County Police Department. Item $A-15-20$ is to award a blanket purchase order for Eastern Communications. They will be helping us maintain and repair Nassau County Police Department radio sites and over 5,000 portable and mobile radios. The system and the radios are used by numerous agencies including OEM, DPW, public safety, the auxiliary police as well as the fire service. The agreement provides 24 hours a day coverage for any and all issues with the system and equipment. The maximum amount authorized under this blanket purchase order is $\$ 1.5$ million from general funds.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any
questions from the legislators? I think we're
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good. Thank you. Next contracts are with public works. There's two that are going to be tabled. Those are the contracts A-33 of 2020, B-18 of 2020. A-33 is with Best Climate Control. B-18 is with Chesterfield Associates. The inspector general is continuing her investigation which is done as a matter of course but she has not completed the investigation, so we are going to table those for now.

DeRiggi-Whitton. Seconded by Legislator
Schaefer. All in favor of tabling those two
contracts signify by saying aye. Those
opposed? Contracts pass unanimously -- the
contracts are tabled.
I'm sorry. I didn't see you
there.
MS. FRANZESE: My apologies.

Just wanted to speak briefly to $A-33-20$. That actually we had an issue regarding a questionnaire form that we hadn't received when we sent the note to the legislature. Yesterday we received it and reviewed it last

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night. At this point it's good to go if it's amenable to the legislature.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: The other one still the investigation continues?

MS. FRANZESE: That's correct.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Motion to untable by Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator Schaefer. All in favor of untabling A-33 signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously. Now it's back on the table. So we are now going to consider Best Climate Control as contractor and need someone from public works.

MR. ARNOLD: Ken Arnold, public
works. A-33 is Best Climate Control is a contract cap raise. They do our HVAC maintenance at various facilities. We also use them for certain types of capital improvements when it's replacing equipment that has reached its lifetime. It's a capital expense not an operating expense.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: The
increase here is sizeable. It's striking. It goes from $\$ 425,000$ to $\$ 6,425,000$. Why is

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there an increase of this magnitude?
MR. ARNOLD: We have a large project at the district court we wanted to work on. There's a building management system and there's a lot of valves and dampers that need to be replaced. That's the majority of the money. And also we anticipate some larger work to be done due to the COVID emergency with filters and air handlers and that type of stuff.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: When this
went out to bid those projects were not anticipated?

MR. ARNOLD: That's correct.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: You
indicated some of the work may be related to COVID?

MR. ARNOLD: We are anticipating that we might be asked to do some additional work this winter so we want to have the capacity to address those situations.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Would that work, the money spent on COVID-related work, would those monies be recoverable from the

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state? Or federal government rather. MR. ARNOLD: My understanding any
capital improvement right now the way the funding was received is not but we will work with FEMA on PWs, project worksheets, to see what we can do through that program. But through the CARES funding I don't believe anything capital can be reimbursed. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: We may be able to recover monies from FEMA possibly? MR. ARNOLD: Right. Through the project worksheet program. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: What is that 75 percent? MR. ARNOLD: I think 75 or 80. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: There's a county share? MR. ARNOLD: Yes. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Anyone have any other questions on this? Legislator Bynoe. LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you

Presiding Officer. Good afternoon Commissioner Arnold.

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MR. ARNOLD: Good afternoon.
This is a considerable amount of additional work that this entity would be awarded. I just want to make sure that they have the capacity to be able to do this work especially since some of it is related to COVID and should be executed timely.

MR. ARNOLD: Yes. The issue with
any HVAC equipment is always lead time to actually buy the equipment. They have no control over that. But they have the capacity to do the work once we get the equipment through the different supply chains.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Are there any other questions? Let's go on to the next contract, $\mathrm{A}-42$, Predator Pest Control.

MR. ARNOLD: A-42 is a new contract for pest control through Integrated Pest Management System. County department has always had a pest control contract to deal with termites, rats, whatever issue comes up at a county facility this allows to us respond in a timely manner to deal with this

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situation.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: This is
inside facilities only or is it also outside potentially at parks or other places?

MR. ARNOLD: For rats obviously we would use it for rat control around county buildings. It would not be not for private properties.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Simply
county facilities?
MR. ARNOLD: Yes.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: The sum of two plus million dollars, is that how much we spend roughly in a given year?

MR. ARNOLD: That's the cap over a couple of years. That's not one annual cost.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Roughly a million plus a year to pay for --

MR. ARNOLD: Probably around
500. Something like that. I think the contract is three or four years.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other questions? I guess not. Move on to the next
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one. Chesterfield has been tabled. Next one would be Welsbach.

MR. ARNOLD: Welsbach is our traffic signal maintenance contract. We utilize it -- we do not maintain our own traffic signals. Welsbach does all the maintenance and takes all the liability along with that maintenance to make sure everything is up and running at all times.

This contract is paid mostly out of our operating fund. I think around three million per year. We do have some capital funds included in this because if some signal equipment gets damaged or needs to be repaired and it's a capital expense we utilize that funding source for that work.

We had two bidders and Welsbach was the lowest responsible bidder. They're marginal on the MWBE because most of the work they self-perform.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Why do you
think you only had two bidders? This is a large contracts.

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                                    MR. ARNOLD: Historically we've
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only receive one or two bidders on this contract. Many contractors don't want to get involved with the liability aspect of the work because they are protecting the county if something happens. And the recordkeeping associated to make sure what's running and not running at all times, $I$ believe that is the biggest reason most people walk away.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Is it also
because of the resources that the contractor has to have?

MR. ARNOLD: Yes.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other
questions? Go on to the next one, Jacobs Project Management.

MR. ARNOLD: Jacobs Project Management, which is E-117, is a construction management contract for the effluent screening of disinfectant facility at Bay Park. They will oversee the construction of that work. Their MWBE is at 21 percent. It's funded through the FEMA 428 program. We had seven bidders for that project.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any

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questions? I believe the next three are with Lockwood Kessler and Bartlett.

MR. ARNOLD: That is correct. E-118 is a contract amendment which is retroactive. They're doing the construction management for the SCADA work at our pump stations. When I say SCADA that's instrumentation and control. We are looking to reduce the reliance on manpower to operate these facilities. We have more e-signal equipment coming back to essential control room which will allow us to see situations quicker than the way we are currently doing it.

This is for an additional $\$ 725,000$ and it's for one year plus one additional year that the department can extend. Due to the lateness of the contract the department will have to extend the contract right away and we are comfortable that we will get all this work done by the end of that one contract extension.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Questions on this one? $\mathrm{E}-119$.

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MR. ARNOLD: E-119 is a design services contract for the rehabilitation of Charles Lindbergh Bridge. That bridge goes over Meadowbrook Parkway. We had seven bids received. LKB was the selected vendor. They will do a complete reinspection of the bridge, identify issues with the bridge and then put the design contract together to address all these issues. We do have the construction for this work on the New York State TIP which makes it eligible for 80 percent reimbursement.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator
Schaefer.
LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Just a quick question commissioner. Do you know how long this construction will take? Do you have any kind of timetable set up for it?

MR. ARNOLD: We're looking
starting construction I think 2022, towards the late part of 2022. Typically bridge work takes 18 months to do so we're looking somewhere in that ballpark right now.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other

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questions? 120 .
MR. ARNOLD: 120 is a
construction management services contract for the Cedar Creek Bay Park digester gas handling. For this one we had nine firms submit. They will oversee the rehabilitation contract that went to this body I think the last session. It's for both plants. And the MWBE is at 20 percent. This is not being funded through the 428 program. This county funded.

## LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Quick

question. Can you just describe for us what the digester gas handling project is?

MR. ARNOLD: The digesters
produce methane as part of its breakdown of sludge. That methane is handled through compressors and secondary compressors, storage tank. All that equipment is being upgraded at both plants.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any
questions on this one? Alright. Next one is 121, Liro.

MR. ARNOLD: 121 is a contract
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amendment for our on-call civil construction management services. We had to add additional capacity to the contract due to the large number of resurfacing projects and other work that we have coming out. We needed more capacity as we awarded work. Both Liro, which is E-121 and NV5, which is E-122, were at their cap and they would be dismissed from getting additional work if we did not raise their cap.

## LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any

questions on this one, 121? 122 you just touched on. It's basically the same.

MR. ARNOLD: Same thing just a different firm.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any
questions on 122? Thank you Ken. Do you have a question? I guess not.

Next two that we're going to call
are with the county clerk's office. That would be $\mathrm{A}-48, \mathrm{E}-123$.

MR. BUTLER: John Butler, fiscal
officer, Nassau County Clerk Maureen O'Connell's office. First item before you is

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for an updated video security system at our office. The existing system is outdated and has served its useful life. This new modern system allows our office to better secure taxpayer dollars as well as the safety and security of our employees and the public using our services. Our office processed over \$260 million in transactions last year and securing and monitoring these transactions in a secured environment is of utmost importance to clerk. Three bids were received and the low bidder was Intelli-Tec.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: The clerk's office, in addition to handling credit card transactions handles cash as well?

MR. BUTLER: Still handle cash. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any questions on this contract, A-48? E-123.

MR. BUTLER: This item before you is the result of a procurement the office undertook as it continues to modernize and digitize its operations. The office is undergoing a backfill project to digitize and make searchable online land use property

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records for the period 1993 back to 1980.
Six bids were received in response
to our RFP. Our evaluation committee unanimously selected US Imaging as the winning bidder. Rolls of film will be converted to digital images that are viewable and searchable online at US Land Records dot com.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: This one
benefits the public at large because it's making this available as opposed to having people go and do searches at the facility.

MR. BUTLER: Exactly.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Anyone
else? Any questions? Thank you. This is next to last contract. E-124 of 2020 with IIT, Inc.

MS. STANTON: Good afternoon.
Nancy Stanton, IT. E-124-20, IIT, Inc. This amendment is to increase funds by $\$ 550,000$. The contract term is from January 5, 2016 to January 4, 2021. We currently use this vendor for supplemental staffing and this is a minority-owned business.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any

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questions on this contract? Thank you Nancy.
There is one contract that we are going to untable. That would be E-109 of 2020. So we need a motion to untable. It's a personal services agreement between the county and De Bruin Engineering PC. Motion to untable by Legislator Schaefer. Seconded by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.

MR. ARNOLD: This is a CM contract for the ring pad and hardening of the East Avenue ejector station. There were nine proposers. De Bruin was considered as the highest technically ranked proposer. The cost is also least expensive. And they're running MWBE around 13 percent. This job is funded through the 428 program.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any questions on this? Thank you Ken. Is there any public comment on these contracts that we've discussed? Hearing none, all in favor of approving these contracts signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously. We are going to put the Rules Committee in recess and will be back later.

Seconded by Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel. Any further debate or discussion? Any public comment? Hearing none, all in favor signify by saying aye.

We have a bunch of appointments to the Minority Affairs Counsel. 181, 182, 183, 184, 185, 186, 187, 188. They include George Siberon, Reginald Benjamin, Biena Depena, Natalie Mitchell-Cange, Paul Quintyne, Kim Jenkins, Mickheila Jasmin-Beamon, Natalie Borneo.

Moved by Minority Leader Abrahams. Seconded by Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel.
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Any debate or discussion on these appointments? Obviously they'll be invited to come on the nomination day if they choose to do so but we generally don't have a discussion at this point. Anyway, any debate or discussion on these? Hearing none, all in favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously.

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\text { Item } 197 \text { is a resolution to }
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designate the Nassau County Police headquarters building located at 1490 Franklin Avenue, Mineola, New York as the William J. Willett Nassau County Police Headquarters.

I will make that motion. Seconded by Legislator Bynoe. Any debate or discussion on this item? Hearing none, any public comment? All in favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously.

I'm going to combine this one, the next one, which is 199 of 2020, with item 226. 199 is a resolution appointing a Democratic commissioner of elections for the County of Nassau. 226 is a resolution appointing a Republican commissioner of

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elections for the county of Nassau.
Moved by Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel. Seconded by Minority Leader Abrahams. Any debate or discussion on these two items? Hearing none, any public comment? All in favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously.

We have a number of IMAs now. 212, 213, 214, 215, 216, 217, 218. Continuing on, 221, 222, 223, 224 and that's it.

These are resolutions authorizing the county executive to execute intermunicipal agreements with the Village of Hempstead, Sea Cliff, Village of Garden City, Lido and Point Lookout Fire District, Village of Malverne, Village of East Rockaway, Village of Muttontown, Village of Freeport, Levittown Union-Free School District, Village of Lawrence, Town of Oyster Bay.

Moved by Legislator Rhoads.
Seconded by Legislator Schaefer. Any debate or discussion on these items? Hearing none, all in favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed? They carry unanimously.
