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LEGISLATOR KOPEL: We are going
to start. Do you want to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance?

Will the clerk please call the roll. MR. PULITZER: Thank you.

Finance Committee. Legislator Josh Lafazan. LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Here. MR. PULITZER: Legislator

MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum sir.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Thank you
Mr. Pulitzer. What I'm going to do is I'm going call all the items. Then I'm going give any member of the public who has something to say about today's calendar. You will have your three minutes and then we will deal with the items individually. With no objection, I believe that is the procedure we have decided on.

So, item 239, which is amending Title 24 in relation to extending the hotel and motel occupancy tax.

Item 240 which is determinations pursuant to SEQRA in terms of a declaration of need for financing of county purposes.

Item 241 is adopting the county budget for 12 month 2021 fiscal year beginning January 1, 2021.

242 is an ordinance fixing tax
rates for that same 12 month period.

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Item 243 is a resolution to adopt a multiyear finance plan. 244 is adopting the budget for the county legislature for 2021.

245 is a transfer of
appropriations. 246 is supplemental to the police department. 247 is supplemental to human services. 248, 249 are both supplemental to human services. 250 is a transfer of appropriations. 251 is supplemental for the medical examiner. 252 is supplemental for the police department. 253 is supplemental for the office of housing. 254 is authorizing a grant agreement with parks and recreation and the Great Neck Center for Visual Performing Arts.

255 is a transfer. 255 and 256 are
transfers of appropriations. 257 is
supplemental for the police department. 258
is supplemental for parks. 260 is
supplemental for the medical examiner. 261 is authorizing the Agriculture Society of Queens, Nassau and Suffolk to use fairgrounds at Old Bethpage. 262 is supplemental for the Department of Health. 263 as well, Department

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of Health. 264 is supplemental for housing and community development. 265 is supplemental for the police department. 266 transfer of appropriations. 267 supplemental for the Department of Health. And 268 is supplemental for department of probation.

A motion on those items is made by Ms. Walker. Seconded by Mr. Lafazan. The items are all before us.

Now before we start I have a one slip. That would be for Mr. Budnick. Mr. John Budnick please favor us with your remarks.

MR. BUDNICK: Good afternoon.
John Joseph Budnick, 122 Van Huenfeld Street, Massapequa Park.

Commissioner, alternate deputy chairman, members of the legislature. I'm addressing a potential misapprehension that may be in the air here that was foisted upon the people of this county by Newsday last week indicating that crime statistics were down.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Mr. Budnick,
sir, this is the Finance Committee. Do you

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have anything to tell us -- this is not the full legislature. We're not commenting about anything you want.

MR. BUDNICK: I'm urging each and every cent and dollar with regard to the probation department, with regard to the police department supplemental appropriations and the appropriations most appropriately in the county budget be approved because the headline in last week's Newsday was wrong. Crime statistics in Nassau County are up. We need more and better crime fighting by the county. We should also be having the county police department reporting to the various communities what the community crimes are on let's say a quarterly or half-year basis. It is important that no one be under the illusion that that headline in Newsday was correct.

And acting as a county legislator with reference to either probation department, police department or any of our other criminal justice agencies, they all need the maximum extent of largess financially that this county

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legislature is able to do given the circumstances.

That is why I believe the county should continue to make each and every appropriation to the police department, probation department and correction department and all the other law enforcement agencies of this county as much and as quickly as possible.

Mr. Alternate Chair and members of the county legislature. Thank you. I have asked that the county legislature start getting, at least for itself, community breakdowns of crimes statistics so that you know where the need is. Thank you very much for your time and trouble and thank you once again for putting up with me. God bless you.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Thank you
Mr. Budnick.
Number 239 is a local law extending the hotel-motel occupancy tax. Who is here to speak on that? Anyone?

MR. NOLAN: Chris Nolan from the Office of Management and Budget. This is to

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extend the law to collect the hotel-motel occupancy tax through December 31 of 2023. It's an extension of a three-year term.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Are there any
questions, debate or discussion from
legislators? Hearing none, all those in favor
of 239 please signify by saying aye. Any
opposed? The item passes unanimously. Thank you sir.

The next several items relate to the budget. We're going to have a budget hearing tonight. So I propose that if there are no objections we punt those over to the next session. Just tee them up.

So I'm going to call number 240, which was the NIFA financing. 241 budget ordinance. 242, 243, and 244. Are we all agreed? Good. So all those in favor of passing those items to the full legislature signify by saying aye. Are there any opposed? Those items are passed unanimously. Thank you.

The next several items are budget transfers. I'm going to call them together.

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Those would be numbers $245,250,255,256$ and 266. Now the first one of those is 245 which is the medical examiner. Do we have someone here from the medical examiner?

MR. HAHN: Tim Hahn, medical
examiner's office. This is a board transfer proposed to maximize funding for the toxicology lab's full Coverdale grant. It's used to support overtime to meet demands of the newly enacted New York State discovery law in particular for DWI testing.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions or discussions on that item? Thank you. 250, health department.

MS. LAURAIN: Good afternoon.
Mary Ellen Laurain, Department of Health. Item 250 is a board transfer in the amount of $\$ 75,000$. It's fully grant funded so it would be needed to maximize grant reimbursement. It has no impact on the budget.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any debate or discussion on that item? Thank you.

Number 255 is board of elections. Transfer of appropriations.

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MR. NOLAN: This is a transfer
from several different codes to address
election expenses. With of course the COVID-19 precautions in place there's an increase in cost in some expenses but it's covered by the budget. No impact.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions,
debate or discussion? Thank you.
256 would be health, public works.
MR. NOLAN: This is part of our quarterly, we try to keep these as quarterly as much as possible, budget transfers. There are a number of departments impacted here. Health, public works, housing and the clerk. Again, this is all with respect to the two larger ones, public works, which is an increase to the Long Island Railroad station maintenance. This is just covering an obligation that we have. There was a shortfall based a calculation of the CPI. There's ample funding for that coming again from DPW. And then for the county clerk their funding transfer to cover some additional cost to their Xerox contract.

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LEGISLATOR KOPEL: 266 is yours as well? Public works.

MR. ARNOLD: Ken Arnold, public works. 266 is a board transfer in the amount of $\$ 1.154$ million. It's moving funds from the interest to the principal lines of the 2020 budget. There's no overall impact.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? Thank you Mr. Arnold. So, all those in favor of the following items, that's 245, 250, 255, 256 and 266, please so indicate by saying aye. Any opposed? Those items are passed unanimously. Thank you.

The next batch will be 246 , 247 , 251, 252, 253 -- let's go through them one at a time. Police department which will be 246. MR. FIELD: Good afternoon. William Field from the police department. Item 246-20 is an appropriation of $\$ 200,000$. These funds are to be from the police traffic services grant. They are designed to help us with funding set aside for overtime incurred in relation to our buckle up seat belt enforcement initiative as well as our

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aggressive driving enforcement campaigns. LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Thanks. Don't go away. Any questions on that item? Number 252.

MR. FIELD: 252 is part of the Seen Be Seen Traffic safety grant. This is once again to appropriate $\$ 50,000$ in funds from the New York State Governor Traffic Safety Committee. This is designed to provide funding for overtime to aid in the reduction of crashes, injuries and deaths on roads in New York.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? 257.
MR. FIELD: 257 is an
appropriation of $\$ 478,360$ in funds from the Department of Health and Human Services. These funds are to offset overtime incurred by our Nassau County Police Department Emergency Ambulance Bureau during their response with COVID-19.

> LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? 265 .

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\text { MR. FIELD: } 265-20 \text { is an }
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appropriation of $\$ 50,000$ from the 2020 Operation Gateway contract. This is received from New York State Office of Homeland Security. These funds are used to staff and related to overtime costs in enforcing political statutes on Memorial Day, Independence Day and Labor Day weekends. LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions? All those in favor of 246 , 252, 257 and 265 please so signify by saying aye. Any opposed? Thank you. Those items are all unanimous.

Next would be human services. MR. HALL: Brian Hall from human services.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: We will start with 247 please. MR. HALL: 247 is stimulus funds from the federal government pass-through the Office of Aging of New York State. It's for \$654,000 for senior support.

## LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any

questions? 248 .
MR. HALL: 248 is also stimulus

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money. It is a pass-through. \$409,000. All of this money is 100 percent and this is more funds for the senior programs.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: And 249
please.
MR. HALL: 249 is again another stimulus program. It's $\$ 2,332,000$. This is also federal pass-through New York State 100 percent. And this one is geared more towards the meals, the home on meals. Meals on Wheels, sorry.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions,
debate or discussion? All those in favor of those items being 247, 248 and 249 please so signify by saying aye. Any opposed? Those items are unanimous.

Next would be the medical examiner and that would be item 251.

MR. HAHN: Item 251 is a
supplemental appropriation related to the 2020-21 New York State highway traffic safety grant in the amount of $\$ 35,000$. It's used to support the effectiveness and accuracy of testing through DWI and drug impaired

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driving. It's used to purchase supplies and support overtime.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions
here? You got 264, right?
MR. HAHN: 260.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: I'm sorry. Go on please.

MR. HALL: Item 260 is a supplemental appropriation. That's the Aid to Crime Laboratories Grant from New York State Department of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of $\$ 108,000$. It's used to support the lab's New York State forensic accreditation and support the effectiveness and testing of postmortem cases at the medical examiner's office.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? Those items are 253 and -- no, sorry. It was 251 and 260. All those in favor of those two items please say aye. Any opposed? Thank you. Housing and Community Development. Anyone here from Housing and Community Development? We'll start with 253.

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MS. PETTIS: Kenetha Pettis, director of Housing. 253, the amount of $\$ 163,333$. These funds are funded by New York State grant funded for limited time which expires on 12-31-20 and this is under the CARES Act. These funds will be used to digitize all our files. We have over 3,500 files, and I think we're the only local administrator in New York State that our files are not scanned into the system.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: How long will this project take?

MS. PETTIS: Hopefully we will be finished by 12-31 because we have to spend the money and have the services completed by 12-31.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Do you have a vendor yet?

MS. PETTIS: Yes. That's already vetted through the county. There's a vendor that's already used in the county.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Is there a new contract for that vendor?

MS. PETTIS: We're working on

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that now waiting for this to be approved.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: If you want to
get that done don't take too long.
MS. PETTIS: Because they're
going to take the money back.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? 264 .
MS. PETTIS: This is also under
the CARES Act. $\$ 425,724$. These funds, also
funded by New York State, will be used for security deposits to assist Section 8 applicants that's already on the county program who will have to move during the COVID. And the money will be paid directly from Nassau County to the landlord. This program has already started already because we've already paid about seven landlords already because the money was fronted and we have to spend the money by 12-31. LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? Thank you. All those in favor of these two items being 253 and 264 please say aye. Any opposed? Thank you very much. MS. PETTIS: Thank you.

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LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Parks. That would be number 258.

MS. KASO: Yes. There's also
254.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: 254 is a
hotel-motel grant. We will do them both. Go on please.

MS. KASO: Victoria Kaso from the department of parks. 254 is a hotel-motel tax grant for up to $\$ 10,000$ for the Great Neck Center for the Visual and Performing Arts.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions about that item? The other one which was 258. MS. KASO: 258 is a supplemental appropriation in the amount of $\$ 1,100,000$ to the Mitchell Park maintenance account. As per the United States Department of the Interior, all fees collected at Mitchell Field have to go back into Mitchell Field. So that is that. You might be curious, we accounted for the effect of COVID. Typically we appropriate about $\$ 1.7$ million. So 1.1 million we think is reasonable and our year-to-date is at about $\$ 800,000$.

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LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions on that item? All those in favor please say aye. Any opposed? Thank you very much. MS. KASO: There's one more, 261. LEGISLATOR KOPEL: I'm sorry. Which one?

MS. KASO: 261.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Sure, go ahead please.

MS. KASO: This is a correction of an original resolution that was passed back in February. It was to give occupancy to the agriculture society to OBVR. The original resolution stated that they would have occupancy from 2026 to 2030 but it was actually supposed to say 2021 through 2030. This is correcting that so that we can get the grant funding in time to utilize it.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? All those in favor of those items? Any opposed? Thank you. Health. Who is here for health? 262.

MS. LAURAIN: 262 it's a
supplemental appropriation. It's for

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\$131,946. It's for an immunization action plan. It's a supplemental flu program funded through the New York State Health Department of Health. This will allow us to buy supplies such as biological refrigerators, laptops, PCs to support our vaccination efforts.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Good. Any questions on that item? 263.

MS. LAURAIN: 263 is a
supplemental appropriation for the beach water quality monitoring and notification program. It's for $\$ 55,355$. This allows us to do beach water sampling during the summer through Labor Day. Funded through New York State Department of Health.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: This was for which season? Last season?

MS. LAURAIN: I think this one is for next season. This is 10-1-20 to 9-30-21. So next season.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? And 267.
MS. LAURAIN: Item 267 is a supplemental appropriation. It's for

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$\$ 118,144 . \quad$ This is for the Children with Special Health Care Needs program. It's funded through New York State Department of Health and it assists families of children up to age 21 who have a special medical diagnosis.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Thank you.
Any questions on that? All those in favor of these three items? Any opposed? Thank you. The last item on the regular calendar would be 268 and that's probation.

MR. LANSMAN: Good afternoon.
Douglas Lansman, Nassau probation. The item before you, 268-20, we are requesting a grant appropriation for our STIP Peer Diversion Program Center for Court Intervention award through New York State OCFS. This is a one-year grant totaling \$97,169 and it covers the period October 19 through September 20.

This grant is retroactive due to receiving late Raise the Age approval from the state in March and then having the vendor disclosure forms delayed and completed incorrectly. While all this was going on the

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contract package became stale while waiting for the disclosure forms and ultimately it needed to be redone.

As far as the program, Nassau
County Peer Diversion Court is an educational diversion program for young offenders. Peer diversion court helps teenage defendants avoid the legal and collateral consequences associated with criminal prosecution and receive the assistance they need to pursue law abiding productive futures.

This effort requires an on-site coordination staff to ensure that appropriate defendants are identified, referred to effective services and monitored appropriately. We see approximately 100 cases per year.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Do we have any questions on that item? Anyone? All those in favor of that item being number 268 say aye. Any opposed? That concludes the regular calendar.

MR. LANSMAN: May I respectfully inquire about an addendum item number 288?

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LEGISLATOR KOPEL: We are going to get to the addendum in just a moment. MR. LANSMAN: Thank you sir. LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Just stick around. We have a number of items on the addendum, and I need a motion to suspend the rules. Mr. McKevitt makes such a motion and Ms. Birnbaum seconds the motion. All those in favor of suspending the rules say aye. Any opposed? The rules are suspended. What was your item there? Probation? MR. LANSMAN: It was item 288-20. LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Go ahead.

Please hold on for a moment because we haven't called the items yet. I will call them in bulk and then consider them one by one. Hang out for a moment please.

Number 269 is supplemental agreement for federal aid with respect to Department of Transportation. 270 is a grant agreement with parks and recreation and Franklin Square Historical. 271, 272, 273, 274, 275, 276, 277, 278, 279, 280, 281, 288, 289, 290, 291, 292 are all supplemental

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appropriations. Motion on those items is made by Mr. Lafazan and seconded by

Mr. Muscarella. Why don't you go ahead now with your 288 you said?

MR. LANSMAN: Yes, sir. Thank
you. Item 288-20 for probation we are requesting supplemental appropriation for our annual GIVE grant that's now in its 17 th year of operation. This was previously known as Operation Impact. This is the same GIVE grant that the police and DA also participate in. The amount of the grant is $\$ 192,084$. There is no match. And it covers the 12 month period July of 2020 through June of 2021.

It should be noted that this is the same amount as received last year due to state-wide budgetary restrictions.

It builds upon the information sharing and partnerships developed under Operation Impact while standing use of crime analysis, evidence-based practices and community partnerships to assist in the reduction of firearm-related homicides and shootings.

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LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Thank you.
Any questions? All those in favor of item 288 signify by saying aye. Any opposed? That item is unanimous. Thank you. 269 is a grant agreement. That's transportation. Who do we have?

MR. ARNOLD: 269-20 is a
supplemental agreement with New York State DOT with their department's traffic management system phase two operations contract. This will increase our reimbursement by $\$ 1.6$ million.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: For what?
MR. ARNOLD: We operate a 24-7
traffic management system and this is our operations group. We get reimbursed from New York State DOT 80 percent for that operation.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions on that item? Any other items that you have? MR. ARNOLD: No, I don't.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: All those in favor of that item 269 signify by saying aye. Any opposed? That's unanimous.

270 is a hotel-motel grant for the

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Franklin Square Historical Society. MS. KASO: Thank you. This is a hotel-motel tax grant for the Franklin Square Historical Society in the amount of up to $\$ 10,225$.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? All those in favor of that item number 270 signify by saying aye. Any opposed? That item is unanimous.

A bunch of budget transfers.
Number 271, start with that.
MS. LAURAIN: 271 is a board
transfer in the amount of $\$ 3,978$. It's grant funded. No impact on the budget. It's to maximize reimbursement.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? Do you have any others?
MS. LAURAIN: I do.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Which one?
MS. LAURAIN: 274-20 is a board
transfer in the amount of $\$ 1,569$. This is
also grant funded to maximize grant reimbursement. No impact on the budget.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions

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on that? Anything else?
MS. LAURAIN: Item 275-20 is also
a board transfer. It's in the amount of $\$ 16,123$. This is also grant funded through New York State Department of Health and it's to maximize grant reimbursement.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? Is that it?
MS. LAURAIN: No. 276-20 is a board transfer in the amount of $\$ 47,704$. This is 100 percent grant funded and is necessary to maximize grant reimbursement.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions?
MS. LAURAIN: One more. 292-20 is a board transfer. It's in the amount of $\$ 3,838$. This is also funded through New York State Department of Health and is necessary to maximize grant reimbursement.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions on that one? So then we're dealing with -you're finished, right?

MS. LAURAIN: Yes.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Numbers 271,

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274, 275, 276 and 292 I think were yours. All those in favor of those items please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? Those items are unanimous. Thank you. 272 OMB.

MR. HAHN: 272 is a board
transfer in the amount of $\$ 20,000$. Being
proposed to maximize grant funding to update autopsy equipment.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions on that? Any others?

MR. HAHN: 273 is another board transfer in the amount of $\$ 2,232$. Once again it's used to maximize grant funding to update the autopsy equipment.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? Go on. That's it? All those in favor of items 272 and 273 signify by saying aye. Any opposed? Those items are unanimous. 277.

MR. FIELD: Item 277-20 is a
board transfer to move $\$ 300,000$ from salary and wages to our general expenses line. This transfer has no impact on the overall budget as it's just a transfer from within the fund.

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LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions
on that? Do you have anymore?
MR. FIELD: Yes, sir. 278-20 is
a board transfer. This is from the salary and
wages to the equipment line. It's $\$ 800,000$.
This once again will have no impact on the
overall budget as it just represents a
transfer of existing funds from the same department.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any
questions? Debate? Go on.
MR. FIELD: Item 279-20 is a
board transfer from salary and wages to general expenses in the amount of $\$ 300,000$. This will have no impact on the overall budget as it is existing funds from the same fund.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions on that? Do you have anymore?

MR. FIELD: Yes sir. 280-20 is a board transfer of $\$ 200,000$ from salary and wages to the equipment line. This will have no impact on the overall budget as it represents a transfer within fund.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Questions?

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MR. FIELD: Item 281-20 is a board transfer of $\$ 500,000$ from salary and wages to the equipment line. This will have no impact on the overall budget as it is from existing funds.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: 290.
MR. FIELD: 290-20 is an appropriation of $\$ 2.6$ million in funds received from the New York State District Attorney federal and state forfeiture funds. The funds will be used to offset overtime costs related to the implementation of new crime strategies as well as have a main focus on purchasing gym equipment, security cameras and tactical warehouse flooring for the police department's new police academy.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions on that item? 291.

MR. FIELD: 291-20. This is an appropriation of $\$ 465,379$. It's from the Office of Homeland Security. It is part of the state law enforcement terrorism prevention program grant. These funds are designed to provide law enforcement agencies with

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resources to purchase and supplement their capabilities in disrupting and preventing acts of terrorism. $\$ 180,903$ will be set aside for police training. \$49,097 will be set aside for related fringe benefits and $\$ 235,379$ will be used for equipment purchases in preventing terrorism.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions on that item? All those in favor of 277, 278, 279, 280, 281, 290 and 291 please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? Those items are unanimous. Thank you. I believe we have one item left and that would be 289 which would be human services.

MR. HALL: Brian Hall from Human Services. This is a grant from New York State. 100 percent reimbursable. It's called Unmet Needs and we can use it any way we need for senior programs.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Any questions on that item? Debate? Hearing none, all those in favor of this item 289 please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? That item is unanimous.

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Mr. Drucker moves to adjourn. Mr. McKevitt seconds it. All those in favor of adjourning say aye. Any opposed? We are adjourned. Thank you. (Committee adjourned at 2:05)
