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MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum sir.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: We have one item, $A-71$ of 2020 . Is a resolution authorizing the commissioner of shared services to award and execute a purchase order between the county of Nassau acting on behalf of the Nassau County Correctional Center and GP Jager, Inc.

Moved by Legislator Rhoads.
Seconded by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
MR. GOLIO: Captain Michael Golio
from the sheriff's department. The item
before you is the purchase of sewage grinders to service the A32 building housing areas. The vendor is a sole. He's the inventor of the product, the sole manufacturer and the exclusive solicitor service parts for this equipment.

Currently the grinders in the A32 building are original equipment from the early 1990s. They have been repaired and refurbished multiple times. They are beyond their useful life and they are now entering


LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Afternoon.

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The sewage system in the jail in fact is failing now, correct?

MR. GOLIO: Correct.
LEGISLATOR RHOADS: If I can ask, why has it taken so long to bring this to the legislature?

MR. GOLIO: This has been an item talked about for many years prior administrations. We've repaired and refurbished the equipment to the extent that we could. There have been proposals to make the purchases previously that just haven't gotten any traction and we are at the stage that we are now asking for the complete replacement of all the grinders in that building.

LEGISLATOR RHOADS: There seems to be no question that it absolutely has to be done. I'm just concerned going forward whether we can address future problems without it being an absolute necessity. There should be some sort of maintenance to systems that are vital to the functioning of the jail and safety of the jail so that we don't reach a

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point where we have to replace all of them at once.

MR. GOLIO: Correct. The plan
here is to purchase 12. Eight are in use at any given time. The four will give us the ability to do preventive maintenance and also repairs without taking the systems offline. So it will give us a little cushion to make sure that we don't have the problems that we are currently experiencing.

LEGISLATOR RHOADS: My
understanding is that the problem has reached a point where we've actually had to move inmates out of particular buildings because the sewage system was backing up, correct?

MR. GOLIO: There have been some transfers of inmates as a precaution. We think that the system is extremely fragile at this point.

LEGISLATOR RHOADS: I know this may be slightly off topic for your knowledge and expertise. During our budget hearings it was disclosed that one of the reasons that we are not taking federal inmates is due to
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concerns of COVID. Is it not a fact that because of the problems that we're having with these muffin monsters, as they are commonly referred to, we're not sure that if a system goes down that we're going to be able to handle our own inmates. We in fact may have to transfer them to other jurisdictions, correct?

MR. GOLIO: We are currently able to handle the amount of inmates in custody. The lead time for these grinders is four to six weeks. We are hopeful that we can maintain the population for the next four to six weeks and get the grinders installed.

LEGISLATOR RHOADS: And if another one of these systems goes down in that next four to six weeks are we facing a situation where we may very well have to transfer inmates to other jurisdictions to house?
MR. GOLIO: I think we're facing
a situation where we have to look at housing and maximize every possible space that we have inside the facility. It's a little premature

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    to say we have to move people out.
    LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Thank you.
    LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Anyone
    else? Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
    LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
    just have a quick question. I heard that
    they're finding clothes or bedding or
    something in -- this is a lovely conversation
    before lunch -- in the grinders. Do you know
    where that is coming from? Is it something
    through the laundry system or is it
    intentionally being done?
    MR. GOLIO: The grinders process
    the sewage that comes out through the
    wastewater from the inmates' cells. There are
    times and there are occasions where inmates
    are flushing things down the toilets that are
    causing the grinders to fail.
    LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: It's
    nothing through the laundry system that we
        can, correct?
            MR. GOLIO: It's not the laundry
    system. It's the acts of the inmates,
    correct.
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LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I understand that the inspector general also looked at this contract and didn't have any issues that we were made aware of?

MR. GOLIO: My understanding that's correct.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
know she's here. Just for the record.
MS. FRANZESE: Yes. Jodi
Franzese, inspector general, Nassau County.
Yes, that is correct Legislature
DeRiggi-Whitton. We did conduct a review and we found no reportable results.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Thank you. And it's good to have you at these meetings. It's reassuring.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other
questions? Anyone on remote? Thank you captain. All in favor signify by saying aye.

Those opposed? Carries unanimously.
