LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I'm going to call the meeting to order and ask Legislator Bill Gaylor to lead us in the Pledge. Please remain standing after the Pledge of Allegiance.

This weekend was the $20 t h$
anniversary of $9-11$ and all of us spent time going to various ceremonies remembering that day. So I would like all of us to have a moment of silence for the 2977 people who died in the Twin Towers, including the 412 emergency responders of which 343 were FDNY, as well as all who have passed away since. And please remain standing after that. Thank you.

Also I would like to have a moment of silence for our former presiding officer and longtime legislator, very good friend to all of us, Judy Jacobs, who passed away five years ago today. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Good
afternoon everyone. At this time I will call the Health and Social Services Committee to order and I will ask the clerk to call the

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roll.

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MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum ma'am.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you. Before we begin, since there is an addendum, $I$ will ask for a motion to suspend the rules. By Legislator Gaylor. Seconded by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton. All in favor signify by saying aye. The rules are suspended.

The first item is clerk item number 303-21, which is a local law to establish the Nassau County Advisory Council on People with Disabilities.

May I have a motion please. By Legislator Schaefer. Seconded by Legislator Lafazan. The item is before us.

Nassau residents of all ages and abilities deserve a voice in county government. This proposed local law provides such a voice to people with various disabilities by creating the advisory counsel on people with disabilities within the Department of Human Services to advise both the legislature and county executive. This counsel consists of 15 members with a term of

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three years appointed by the county executive and subject to the confirmation by the legislature as follows.

Five recommended by the presiding officer. Three recommended by the minority leader and seven having one or more disabilities or being a representative of an organization that provides services to or advocacy on behalf of people with such disabilities as intellectual, developmental disability, physical disability, blindness, legal blindness, deaf or hard of hearing, mental health disability, autism and learning disabilities.

Further, seven representatives from various county departments serve as an ex officio nonvoting member of the counsel. The counsel will meet regularly and advises and makes presentations to the county executive in an array of areas related to people with disabilities, legislation-funded priorities, the county's capital budget and the county's budget and plan and the county park and preserve infrastructure.

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Nassau County residents of all ages and ability deserve a voice in county government. This proposed local law provides such a voice for people with various disabilities by creating the advisory counsel on people with disabilities within the Department of Human Services.

Any legislators have any comments?
Legislator Gaylor.
LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Thank you
Madam Chairwoman. So, we are here today to announce the formation of a legislative advisory board that discusses different ways that Nassau County can work better as a government for those with disabilities and to make recommendations for this legislature as well as the county.

As we heard Legislator Walker mention, it will consist of members that either are physically disabled or living with Down Syndrome or autism or hard of hearing, the blind and so many more different categories. It's such a great opportunity for us to be better informed and better advised by

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people with disabilities or those that represent the disabled.

So, this piece of legislation is
definitely worthwhile. It's one that I
wholeheartedly support. I thank my fellow colleagues, including Legislator Steve Rhoads, who was a big impetus in pushing this forward to get this here today. It's really simple. It's goal is, as I simply stated, to make Nassau County work better for those living with disabilities. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Legislator Lafazan.

## LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Thank you

Madam Chair. For a number of years I've worked to make sure that we care for our most vulnerable in the community, and I want to thank Legislator Gaylor for this bill. I think it's an exceptional idea.

Quite frankly, the statistics speak for themselves. 61 million adults, 61 million in the US have a disability. 26 percent or one in four adults in the United States have some type of disability.

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We in Nassau County are making a strong statement that this county serves all residents regardless of ability and that a government should always be judged based on how it cares for those most vulnerable residents in our community. I look forward to voting yes for this bill and i urge my colleagues to do the same. Thank you Legislator Gaylor.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Legislator
DeRiggi-Whitton.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Can
I ask you one question. Would you consider adding those with chronic disease as a possible member? I just think sometimes it's important to be aware of all the different whether it's diabetes or just things that maybe the public should also be aware of. I don't know if you would consider that. It just wasn't listed on here.

It might already be covered as a disability but $I$ think it would good just to have, you know, because sometimes some pretty severe disabilities are kind of not obvious

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and I think it would be a good view just to make people aware. If we can do anything to make it easier. If it's training with the police when someone's pulled over with diabetes or $I$ just think it's a good idea to include some things that might not be.

LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: If I may? I
think that's a very good idea. I think it's something that we can definitely look into. I'm not speaking out of turn $I$ hope and madam chairperson will take it from here. What we are focused here are those with diagnosed disabilities. Whatever category they may be in. So, if somebody with diabetes is also diagnosed as disabled because of diabetes then they are within this committee and its recommendations. But we can always turn this over to the committee once it's formed and let them consider if there should be additional classes of people that are incorporated within the umbrella of this committee.

So, I definitely think it's
something we should look into. I'll just
leave it at that. Thank you Madam

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Chairperson.
LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you. Thank you Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton for bringing that point in. Legislator Gaylor also.

I think up until now without having this committee we've depended on those with disabilities often to reach out to us as individuals and address certain issues. I know I've done that in my district often and reached out to various departments how they could help. But, you know, having this advisory council would bring things to us before even a resident hopefully had to bring it to us. Thank you very much.

Any other legislators have any comments? We have public comment from first Elizabeth Treston would like to speak. Who do you have with you besides yourself? Who is your service dog.

MS. TRESTON: My service dog is McGyver number two. LEGISLATOR WALKER: Welcome McGyver also.

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MS. TRESTON: First I'd like to thank Legislator Ford and Matthew Dwyer for letting me know about this committee.

Good afternoon colleagues. I truly did not expect to speak today. My intent was and is still to ask you to pass this overdue task force for the county and all of its residents. If this task force was currently in place I would not have had the experience I had an hour before. I went to park in what I refer to as my spot. It's located near the shade tree and the waste disposal bin. First, there's road work going on so the road to my spot was closed. I backed out and went out to the do not enter way to go into the other side which says do not enter to get to my spot. On auto pilot, my trusty sidekick and I walked through the parking lot when I realized the road closure sign was not going to allow me to pass. I came back, passing the two waste disposal collection bins, and past the ramp because, yes, you guessed it, there's no sign indicating ramp access this way.

We went up the ramp, pushed the

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round access button that typically opens doors. Pushed again. Pushed again. And for good measure pushed again. Mr. Pulitzer and Mr. Belinskie was passing with peer and he opened the door saying I needed to go the other way. His peer noted I couldn't go that way because, you know, there's stairs. Now the three of us made our way to Neil. We all know Neil. He protects and serves.

Three people to get one person into this chamber that makes laws that should protect and enhance the lives of every county resident.

So, thank you for addressing this.
And next time I come I know that the task force will have provided all of you with policies that will prevent this from happening.

And also I ask in the future that you learn to reframe your language. We are not vulnerable. We are strong. We are individuals. And if we turn your idea around and join us we will have excellent policies for all. Thank you very much.

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LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you
Elizabeth. Laura Nugent Carter.
MS. CARTER: Good afternoon
legislators. My name is Laura Nugent Carter.
First, I want to thank you for giving me the opportunity to speak with you today about the proposed bill to create the advisory counsel on people with disabilities. I'm a lifelong Nassau County resident. I grew up in Merrick and currently reside in Baldwin. I come to you today because I envision a world where wheelchair users in Nassau County can live as freely as able bodied people. I lived the first 37 years of my life as an able bodied person. Actually an athlete and a competitive ballroom dancer.

However, in 2017, I was hit by a vehicle racing and driving recklessly while riding my motorcycle and today $I$ walk with two prosthetic legs, which it has taken me years to achieve. The challenges I have faced over the last 14 years reach far beyond my physical capabilities. As a result, I was unable to continue my career and needed temporary public

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assistance.
In addition, I had to navigate inaccessible housing and infrastructure, medical expenses, transportation challenges as well as emotional, mental and spiritual distress.

In the last 14 years I had to reinvent myself. I made a decision to dedicate my life to disability advocacy and just graduated from Stony Brook University with a masters in social work with a concentration in public policy. I volunteer with the Office of the Physically Challenged and work with County Executive Curran to raise awareness for wheelchair accessibility and disability issues.

I was blessed to have tremendous support from friends and family but not everyone is as fortunate. I'm excited and moved to know that Nassau County wants to improve the lives of its disabled residents who are often not seen or heard. This potential life-changing bill is a great start. It's my hope and prayer that it will

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result in specific tangible benefits. Like most able bodied people, I had no clue how difficult and far reaching living with a disability is. Therefore, the bill must require the council to include a substantial number of actually disabled people to represent the wide variety of physical, intellectual and mental disabilities covered under the bill. I am here asking to be considered for a position on the advisory council on the people with disabilities.

I thank you for your time and I look forward to working with you to create a more inclusive community for Nassau County residents.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you so much Laura. Gina Barbara.

MS. BARBARA: Good afternoon. My name is Gina Barbara. I reside in Wantagh. I'm a constituent of Legislative District 19. I come before you today as first an individual with a disability, but more importantly, as and advocate.

A few weeks ago a legislation was

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filed by the Majority, legislation 303-21, to form a Nassau County disability council. This has been advocated for constantly over many years and sadly was never introduced. It should be noted that Suffolk County has had a disability council since August of 1975 and this council was amended again in August of 2002 .

I strongly support this legislation and urge for a vote in the affirmative on September 27th and hope for bipartisan camaraderie and implementation to assist all residents of Nassau County. Together, let us make Nassau County the place to work, play and raise a family. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you so much Gina. Legislator Rhoads.

LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Thank you Madam Chairwoman, and I appreciate the courtesy of allowing me to speak even though I'm not a member of the committee.

Gina, I wanted to thank you for your advocacy and for your leadership on this issue. As you and I have spoken, my dad,

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John, had multiple sclerosis. For the last 15 years of his life he was confined to a wheelchair. It was a tough adjustment for someone who was the first starting quarterback in Jericho High School's very first class, to being someone who by the end of his life only had, out of his four limbs, couldn't use his legs, couldn't use his left hand and only had partial use of his right hand.

It was a tough adjustment for him. And from a family standpoint, I don't think you can ever really realize the challenges to accomplish the simple, ordinary daily tasks and activities of daily living that we simply take for granted that all of a sudden become a major undertaking and in some circumstances become impossible.

My dad was an avid Met fan for example. We didn't go to -- he didn't go to see a ball game at Shea Stadium because Shea Stadium wasn't -- you could get in but it was very difficult to be able to move around that ballpark. It wasn't until Citi Field and the new amenities that after weeks of planning on

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how we were going to get there, how he was going to get around and how he was going to be able to use simple things like being able to use a rest room. Thankfully in the new facility it had those amenities.

The reasons that this council is so important is because we don't have the perspective and it's a perspective that you can only get from someone who is living the fight. My hope with the disability council is that this is going to add an important voice from people who are living that fight every single day of their lives on how we can make Nassau County open, how we can make Nassau County more accessible and how we can make Nassau County live up to the promise that we made that we're going to make it a great county for all of Nassau County residents to be able to enjoy.

My hope is that whomever winds up serving on this council and whatever work this council does that it's geared towards making sure that in every way, whether it's our parks, whether it's NICE bus, whether it's

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access to government buildings, whether it's additional services that we can be providing that we are doing everything we can as a county to optimize the opportunities for individuals with disabilities to be able to enjoy as full a life as possible. And your voices are incredibly important.

I said at the time that we
introduced this bill that as elected officials we spend a lot of time talking. This is an opportunity for us to do some listening and it's well past time that we did that.

So, I want to thank you Gina for being an inspiration behind the bill, and I believe we have one additional speaker is going to talk to it, but I appreciate the chairwoman giving me this opportunity to be able to say thank you to all of you who came out to support it and I would urge my colleagues on the Health Committee to join in that support. But thank you.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you
Legislator Rhoads. Darryl Godfrey.
MR. GODFREY: My name is Darryl

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Godfrey. It's my first time here. I'm hard of hearing. Disability is in all shapes, form and the problem is I don't have a translator here. I have to sit here. No interpreter. Nothing. I would like to know what's going on just like everybody else. We are civilians and we are Americans. I believe that disabilities should be taken seriously.

You might have went over some of the things that I'm asking today as far as disability, as far as everybody is not just somebody in a wheelchair, with one arm, person who's blind person, person who's deaf person, person who has mental problems. All forms of disability. I'm surprised that you don't have anybody here that can interpret for my disability. I'm surprised. This is not a government that just opened up today or yesterday. This has been a law. Federal government has said that you always must comply with federal government and New York State that you must have a sign language interpreter at all events. And unfortunately, we're not getting anything. I don't know

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anything about this.
As a person who is disabled, that lived in Nassau County all my life, I was born and raised disabled, $I$ want to be part of America. I'm proud of it. It's unfair for us. Unfair for people who are disabled and need help. People who doesn't have any disability at all can just push us to the side like we don't even exist.

So if you're going to form a committee for people who are disabled at least have a committee with everybody, all forms, talk to all forms of types of people with disability so you can understand and know it better and what you can put in place to try to help them. We don't want handouts. We want help. We want to be part of the decision making as well as anything.

So, I apologize if I probably went
off because I couldn't hear everything that you said. Probably said everything that I said but $I$ couldn't hear so I don't what was said. I'm sitting in this meeting and if it wasn't for my wife telling me, she's hearing,

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she's telling me oh, they called your name and I have to stand up and speak. But if I didn't have my wife today you would be calling my name forever. I mean, I need a little bit more understanding from everybody. We all need understanding. It's not just a person with a wheelchair. Today it's all forms of mental, everything disability.

We have to understand we want to be part of the decision making too. We want to be part of this committee. We don't want to just be, you know, just sitting on the side. Okay, here's a penny. Go sit down and be quiet. We want to be part of this decision. So, I'm asking, if you're going to have this committee, $I$ know you probably have family members that have some type of disability, but you still need people who are disabled to understand what disabilities, being disabled is about. You can never put yourself in my shoe, her shoe or anybody until you ask them to live their life and you understand what they go through on a daily basis.

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This is not just here. This is everywhere in my life. Work, home, everywhere. Going out to an outing. We just want to be understood. That's all I have to say. I just hope that this committee coming in it will make it better and easier for everybody in Nassau County who are disabled to be able to enjoy living and loving around people in Nassau County. But thank you very much for giving me the opportunity to speak on this and wish you well on this matter. Thank you very much.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Darryl, thank
you very much. Thank you. Our final speakers are Clinton Brown and Kim Brussell.

MR. BROWN: Thank you for inviting us to appear and having us here to speak on this very important topic. My name is Clinton Brown. I've been a lifelong resident of Hicksville and I've known Mrs. Walker for quite a number of years.

I attended the Viscardi school growing up. Went to Hofstra University. Love Nassau County. Graduated with my bachelor's

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in finance and banking and I have worked in my career with Cablevision and Altice for 18 years now. I own my own home with my wife and my little boy Logan, who is 14 months old. He's a little person as well and so is my wife and we both work full-time jobs. We are advocates and we want to see the community better for Logan when he's a teenager than it was when $I$ was a teenager.

I think it's a wonderful idea. I think we should have representatives across the board of people with disabilities.

Varying types of disabilities. Varying races, ethnicities, agendas. So we have a cross-section, intersectionality is very important to have on any council that's created.

It's been 30 years since the ADA was passed and like the great Judy Heumann said, who staged the 504 sit-in in the'70s, nothing for us without us. Those are very powerful words as we sit here today.

There are issues in the county that we can address. Voting accessibility,

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transportation, increased employment, more opportunities in jobs and accessibility in our public buildings where we have forums such as this to make sure that everybody can attend on an even playing field.

I love Nassau County and I plan on staying here a long time and I really hope that one day I can help make this county awesome for people with disabilities. Thank you for creating this and I look forward to hopefully working all together to make some really positive, terrific changes. Thank you very much.

MS. BRUSSELL: Thank you
legislature. I'm joining Clinton here. I actually work at the Viscardi Center and Viscardi school. I'm here just to speak on behalf of the thousands and hundreds of thousands of individuals with disabilities that the Viscardi Center has served over the past 70 plus years.

I just want to leave with you three additional points because $I$ think all of the individuals who spoke here today really did a

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wonderful job in really painting the picture of why this task force and this council is needed.

But as Clinton said, the ADA was passed more than 30 years ago and there is so much that has been done for individuals with disabilities. But there is so much more to be done.

I want you to think about the fact that 83 percent of people with disabilities have acquired their disability throughout their life. Whether it was an accident, an illness, etcetera. To any one of us who consider ourselves able bodied today may be a person with a disability tomorrow. So think about that. That's really powerful.

And we are here and talking about all the challenges that these individuals with disabilities have but think about the contributions that they make to our society. As Clinton mentioned, they're parents, they're employees, they're taxpayers, they're homeowners. Their voice needs to be heard as much as anybody else's.

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My final comment will just be that the Viscardi Center's vision is to accelerate a more accessible world. We hope that you will join us and this counsel will be formed and all of us can do that together. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: I want to
thank you again Kim and of course a special thank you to Clinton, who I've known, no pun intended Clinton, but since he's a little boy. But he is just an amazing, amazing human being, Clinton, and probably one of the funniest young men you can ever know. And just is involved in so much and what he does. He coaches the Towers basketball team, which is a basketball team made up of little people and they've won championships and represented us all over the world here. He is just a great, great dear friend who I've known his family for a long, long time. And Clinton lives around the corner from my daughter in a beautiful Levitt home that they retrofitted to fit Clinton and his wife and now little Logan, who's a beautiful little boy.

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So I thank each and every one of you who came here today. Yes, you came here and you spoke about the need for us to address this and people with disabilities. But I can tell you, each and every one of you have many, many abilities that you can bring forward to us and I cannot thank you enough for all of you being here today. God bless you all and I am sure that this is going to get through this committee very, very well and come before the full legislature in the future. Thank you so much.

Let's vote on this one first. Was there any other public comment? Did anyone else have any public comment? Any other legislators have anything that they wanted to add? All those in favor of passing this item signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The item passes unanimously. It will move on to the Rules Committee. There are three other -sure, give it a round of applause.

There are three other items on the agenda. Clerk item 304-21, 305-21 and on the addendum was 335-21. And these are all

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ordinances supplemental to the annual
appropriation ordinance in connection with the health department. May I have a motion please. A motion by Legislator Kennedy. Seconded by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton. MS. LAURAIN: Mary Ellen Laurain, Department of Health. Item 304-21 is a supplemental appropriation. It's in the amount of $\$ 19,171,026$. That is for the reopening of schools. This is federal pass-through money through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to New York State. This grant will provide funds to school districts for the COVID-19 testing responsibilities. Testing remains critically important to identify and appropriately mitigate the spread of illness throughout the community.

Tomorrow Nassau County will survey
the schools to determine their needs and
interests. The county plans to do this through the Boost Nassau vendor. Are there any questions?

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any questions

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on item 304?
LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Hi.
Legislator Gaylor. How does it get down to the individual school districts and who decides what school district gets what amount of money?

MS. LAURAIN: It's going to be available to all including private, parochial and the plan is for it to be equitable in their distribution.

LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Based on
student population? What do you mean by equitable?

MS. LAURAIN: Yes, it's going to be based on population.

LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: That applies equally to charter schools and private schools in there as well?

MS. LAURAIN: Private schools.
State-run schools.
LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Thank you very much.
LEGISLATOR WALKER: Do they have
to apply? Does each school district have to

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apply?
MS. LAURAIN: We are surveying
them. This is brand new. They will get
information based on their interest. Some may not be. But yes, they will have to contact and they will have to submit their claims. The CDC has a whole list of what is eligible and what is not. So, they will have to submit those claims, they will have to be approved and submitted to Nassau County.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any other
legislators have any questions? Item 305.
MS. LAURAIN: Item 305-21 is a supplemental appropriation. It's in the amount of $\$ 948,929$. This is for early intervention administration grant. This is funded through the New York State Department of Health and it helps assist with our administrative cost for the program.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any questions by the legislators? Any public comment? Then lastly item 335.

MS. LAURAIN: Item 335-21 is a supplemental appropriation. It's for

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$\$ 1,715,912$. This is for our WIC Program. WIC is a federally-funded supplemental nutrition program that provides vouchers for food for infants, pregnant women and children who qualify.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Did we find there was any uptick in that during COVID?

MS. LAURAIN: I believe so. We were very successful in doing the program remotely and all of the participants now use like an EB, like a debit type card. Which is nice because there's not a stigma attached. There's no checks. I think there's a little bit of an uptick.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: I'm sure some people who might not have needed it before, if they were out of work or whatever they did need that need that.

MS. LAURAIN: We were very successful in doing it remotely, which was good.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Again, I want to thank you for all you did during the -- not that we're out of the craziness but I guess

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we're not maybe as crazy as we were months and a year back. Thank you for all you've done and your entire department.

MS. LAURAIN: It's great team at the department. It really is. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any other questions from the legislators? Any other comments? Any public comment? Hearing none, we will vote on clerk items 304-21, 305-21 and 335-21. All in favor signify by saying aye. Any opposed?

MS. LAURAIN: Legislator Walker, may $I$ just correct the record? I think I misspoke on item 304-21.

MR. SALLIE: Good afternoon
legislators. Sean Sallie, Nassau County Department of Public Works. I just want to clarify the legislator's question regarding how funds will be apportioned or allocated to the individual districts and private schools.

So, the county is sending out a survey, a brief questionnaire, hopefully tomorrow, to districts and private schools to gauge their need for eligible expenses under
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this program. We're not sure if all the districts are going to actually bite on this particularly funding source. So, we're trying to get a sense of who's out there and what type of projects they'd look to fund.

Based on that information we will be able to craft a program so that it will either be first-come first-served or a cap per grant so that most, if not all, districts and schools and private schools will get a piece of the funding action. But again, at this point we're not sure how the funding is going to be allocated.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Is it possible for us to get that list that you're going to send out to the district? Like what they might qualify for just so we know perhaps?

MS. LAURAIN: I can get that to you. It's the CDC list.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you. So let's go back to all of them.

MS. LAURAIN: I will send it to the clerk's office.

There is no other business before the committee. May I have a motion to adjourn. By Legislator Schaefer. Seconded by Legislator Drucker. All in favor of adjourning signify by saying aye. We are adjourned and next is Rules Committee. (Committee adjourned at 2:27 p.m.)
