like to call the Planning and Development Committee to order. Clerk, will you please call the roll.

MR. PULITZER: Thank you madam.
Legislator Carrie Solages. LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Here. MR. PULITZER: Legislator Siela Bynoe.

MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum ma'am.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Thank you. We're going to start with clerk item 268-21, which is a resolution authorizing the county of Nassau to endorse the application of the Trust for Public Land for a grant for the Empire State Trail extension project.

Can I have a motion? Moved by Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator Solages. The item is before us.

MR. SALLIE: Sean Sallie, Nassau County Department of Public Works. This item is essentially a request from the Trust of Public Land request for a municipal resolution of support in conjunction with its application to the New York State Parks Department under the consolidated funding application process.

The Trust for Public Land is seeking funding to advance the design of its Long Island Empire Trail extension which would create a multi-use trail between the Queens-Nassau border out to the Twin Forks.

They're working with both Nassau County and Suffolk County as far as the planning and preliminary design is concerned.

Again, the Trust for Public Land, a not-for-profit, is seeking grant funds through the state through the CFA process. In order to complete their application they require a municipal letter of support from Nassau and Suffolk counties.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Thank you. Can you tell me how long is the -- what's the distance that it would be or they're hoping for it to be from start to finish?

MR. SALLIE: Sure. The portion within Nassau County is roughly 12 miles. It would incorporate already constructed multi-use trails through the Nassau Hub, Eisenhower Park and then continue east through the central portion of Nassau County through Bethpage State Park and then into Suffolk County in the vicinity of Spagnoli Road and then continue on existing right of way in Suffolk County all the way to the twin forks. There are certain segments in

Suffolk that already exist similar to Nassau County. So they are trying to stitch those together.

The Trust for Public Land is very adamant that Long Island has this amenity. The New York State Empire Trail is on mainland New York if you will connecting Buffalo to Albany and then south down to just north of New York City. Then there are trails interdispersed within the five boroughs.

This is an initiative by the Trust for Public Land to bring that amenity here to Long Island. So, the county has been helping with some of the logistics. But, again, all of the design work and advocacy is being done through the Trust for Public Land.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: The grant funds are they seeking to have it 100 percent grant funded?

MR. SALLIE: The state program that they are seeking funds through is 50 percent. So 50-50.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Is there an anticipated amount, that 50 percent, what that

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MR. SALLIE: The county wouldn't contribute.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: It's Trust
for Public Land.
MR. SALLIE: Right. Trust for
Public Land funds that they raised and they match that with state funding.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Does it
look something like you did over at Eisenhower
Park in the last few years?
MR. SALLIE: Essentially yes.
Visually it would look the same. Ten, 12 feet of asphalt meandering through right of way corridors.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Any other
legislators have any comments?
LEGISLATOR FORD: So, is this an uninterrupted trail or is this something where you would have to like go off of the trail onto like maybe county streets or something like that? Or is it something where it's going to be completely protected trail from beginning to end?

MR. SALLIE: For the most part they're looking to design it so that it's separated from the vehicular travel way. There is a utility corridor that's, my understanding, it's partially owned by the MTA partially owned by the electric utility through the central eastern part of the county that connects essentially up to Bethpage State Park. There's some areas there where you'd have to get through or pass some busy intersections. So not completely off separated from vehicular traffic. But for the most part it would be a protected bike way.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Maybe small increments of it where you would be with the traffic but at a minimum basically?

MR. SALLIE: Correct. It's an ambitious plan. It's definitely doable. Ultimately what it will to cost we'll need to bring together. It's an effort.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Good effort.
LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Any other
legislators? Legislator Drucker.
LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you.

I don't know if someone had asked this. Maybe I wasn't paying attention. Sean, what's the length of time for this project to be completed?

MR. SALLIE: Trust for Public
Land they see this as a five to ten year build-out for Nassau and Suffolk County.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Just the
Nassau portion.
MR. SALLIE: Five years. The
design portion is not too much of a heavy lift. It's access to the utility, slash, MTA corridor that could take some time. There are existing power lines, high tension transmission lines that will need to be protected and safety is a concern. So that needs some time to work through.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: They have to design the construction would start at the Eisenhower Park portion rather than some other portion? It's going to start there?

MR. SALLIE: Essentially, yes.
The trail around Eisenhower Park, the multi-use trail ends at Carmen Avenue and then

there's an on road bike lane that gets you a little bit further east. So right around the Wantagh Parkway give or take. You'd have to get across the Wantagh Parkway and then there is actually that straight shot utility right of way.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Any other
legislators? Is there any public comment on this item? There being none, all those in favor of passing item 268-21 please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The item passes unanimously.

Next we have clerk item 278-21, which is an ordinance making certain determinations pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and authorizing the grant of an easement to Long Island Electric Utility Servco, L.L.C., as agent of and acting on behalf of Long Island Lighting Company, doing business as LIPA, over a parcel of county-owned real property consisting of approximately 12,185 square feet situated in Uniondale, Town of Hempstead, county of Nassau, state of New York said real

property known as Section 44, Block F, part of lot 317 E on the land and tax map of the county of Nassau and authorizing the county executive to execute an easement agreement and all pertinent documents in connection therewith to grant such easement.

May I have a motion? Moved by Legislator Ford. Seconded by Legislator Drucker. This item is before us. Hi. MR. HOMMEL: Ted Hommel from the county attorney's office for real estate services. This is a subsurface transmission line. It's a request to grant an easement to Long Island Electric Utility Services, L.L.C., which is a subsidiary of PSEG, as the agent for LIPA. The utility line runs across property occupied by Nassau Community College and it's to serve the adjacent service area. The easement fee is based on an appraisal.

And if there are any questions of a technical nature there are representatives here from PSEG that will be available to answer your questions.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Thank you.

Does anyone have any questions on the legislature? Is there any public comment? There being none, all those in favor of passing item 278-21 please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? Item passes unanimously. Thank you Mr. Hommel.

The next item we have is clerk item 279-21. It's an ordinance making certain determinations pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and authorizing the grant of an easement to Long Island Electric Utility Servco, L.L.C., as agent of and acting on behalf of Long Island Lighting Company, doing business as LIPA, over a parcel of county-owned real property consisting of approximately 12,185 square feet situated in Uniondale, Town of Hempstead, county of Nassau, state of New York said real property known as Section 44, Block F, part of lot 411 on the land and tax map of the county of Nassau and authorizing the county executive to execute an easement agreement and all pertinent documents in connection therewith to grant such easement.

Can I have a motion? So moved by Legislator Ford. Seconded by Legislator Drucker. Mr. Hommel.

MR. HOMMEL: Ted Hommel, county attorney's office on behalf of real estate services. This is another request to grant an easement to Long Island Electric Utility Servco, L.L.C. which is, again, a subsidiary of PSEG as the agent of LIPA. This is for what is called switch gear installation. 450 square feet servicing the Nassau Coliseum surface area. It's located just south of Charles Lindbergh Boulevard in one of the Coliseum's parking lot. Again, the easement fee was based on an appraisal.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Thank you.
Are there any questions from any of the legislators? Any public comment on this item? There being none, all those in favor of clerk item 379-21 please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? Item passes unanimously. Clerk item 280-21 is an ordinance making certain determinations pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and

MR. HOMMEL: Again, this is
another request to grant an easement to Long Island Electric Utility Servco as agent for LIPA. This is, again, a switch gear installation. This one services the new Nassau Police Academy on land occupied by Nassau Community College. Once again, the

easement fee was determined based upon an appraisal.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Thank you.
Any debate or discussion by the legislators?
Any public comment on this item? There being none, all those in favor of clerk item 280-21 please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The item passes unanimously. Thank you Mr. Hommel.

Next we have clerk item 313-21. It's a resolution to authorize the release of the surety bond and escrow deposit covering improvements on the Map of Country Pointe Condominium I situated in Old Bethpage, Town of Oyster Bay, county of Nassau, New York.

May I have a motion. So moved by
Legislator Ford. Seconded by Legislator
Drucker. I'm sorry. Seconded by Legislator
Solages. Legislator Drucker has recused himself from this item. He has recused himself on item 313-21, 314-21 and 315-21. Mr. Sallie you're here to speak on this?

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MR. SALLIE: Yes. Good

afternoon. The three actions before you, 313, 314 and 315, are related. They are all requests to release the bond and escrow funds for the subdivision known as Map of Country Point at Plainview. As the legislator mentioned, there are three separate applications. One is for condominium section one. The other is for condominium section five. And the third is for condominium section two.

For section one the release requested is $\$ 34,000$ of bond and escrow remaining is $\$ 41,010.09$. The Nassau County Planning Commission recommended that these funds be released at their meeting on July 29th.

For condominium section five the remaining bond to be released is $\$ 163,683$ and the amount of remaining escrow to be released is $\$ 38,015.94$. The county planning commission also recommended release after a public hearing on July 29, 2021.

The last section, section two, remaining bond is $\$ 70,000$. Remaining escrow

is $\$ 49,376.62$. This was also recommended by the planning commission back on July 29th. These bonds cover the public improvements within the subdivision. All public improvements have been constructed to the satisfaction of the DPW, slash, planning commission construction inspector.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Thank you Mr. Sallie. So, my understanding is that the two other items, 314 and 315, are related to different phases in this development. So, I'm going to just read the items for the record so we have that and then we can see if there's any debate or discussion on everything.

The next clerk item is clerk item 313-21. It's a resolution to authorize the release of the surety bond and escrow deposit covering improvements on the map of Country Pointe Condominium -- I'm sorry, I just read the wrong one.
Clerk item 314-21. Resolution to authorize the release of the surety bond and escrow deposit covering improvements on the Map of Country Pointe Condominium 5 situated

And then clerk item $315-21$ is a resolution to authorize the release of the surety bond and escrow deposit covering improvements on the Map of Country Pointe-Condominium 2 situated in Old Bethpage, Town of Oyster Bay, county of Nassau County, New York.

Can we have a motion for those two items? So moved by Legislator Ford. Seconded by Legislator Solages.

I know you just explained those to us Mr. Sallie. Is there any debate or discussion from any of the legislators on these items? Is there any public comment on these items? Didn't think so. There being none, all those in favor of passing items 313-21, 314-21 and 315-21 please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? These three items pass unanimously.

No other business. Thank you Mr. Sallie. Legislator Drucker can come back into the chambers. There's no other business
