MR. PULITZER: Chairman Richard
Nicolello.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Here.
MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum sir.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank
you. We have a number of contracts on the calendar and an addendum to cover today. The main items on the main agenda $E-146, E-147$,

E-148, E-149, E-151, U-4 and U-5 of 2021.
These are resolutions authorizing the county executive to execute personal service agreements or amendments to personal service agreements between the county and the City of Long Beach, the Incorporated Village of Old Westbury, Village of Garden City, Avenue Enterprise Solutions, Cameron Engineering and Associates, Incorporated Village of Lake Success, the Village of Floral Park. Motion by Minority Leader Abrahams. Seconded by Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel. Those items are before the Rules Committee. Need a to motion to table E-151 of 2021 with respect to Cameron

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Engineering as the inspector general has not yet completed her investigation. Motion by Legislator Bynoe. Seconded by Legislator Rhoads. All in favor of tabling $E-151$ signify by saying aye. Those opposed? That item is tabled.

I'm going to call the county clerk's item first since there is only one item there. E-149 of 2021. Anyone from the county clerk's office?

MR. BUTLER: Good afternoon.
John Butler, fiscal officer for Nassau County Clerk Maureen O'Connell's office.

Item E-149-21 is a contract for software that runs the electronic document management system at our office. An RFP was posted on the county's procure website on 10-26-20. 349 potential proposers were notified of this posting of which 49 downloaded it and three proposals were received by our office. The Avenu was selected by our evaluation committee after two rounds of scoring. Some delays occurred when negotiating the contract terms with this

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vendor, in addition to our office needing a board transfer of funds in order to post it.

This contract is a revenue positive for the county and our office was able to negotiate improved terms with the vendor whereby by 100 percent of all online revenue generated goes to the county and the previous revenue share was a 90-10 split. Annual recurring revenue is approximately a million dollars a year to the county's bottom line.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: What does the vendor do?

MR. BUTLER: The vendor has the license for the software that operates the -basically everything in our office to be -the documents to be electronic.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: So, first of all, how is this revenue positive?

MR. BUTLER: There's a website, US Land Records dot com, where people have the ability to go to and they can get deeds or mortgage information from the site. There are fees that are charged there that the county earns 100 percent on.

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LEGISLATOR KOPEL: And you don't
download for free?
MR. BUTLER: I'm sorry?
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: The downloads
are not free.
MR. BUTLER: They're not free.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Aren't they
free pretty much everywhere else?
MR. BUTLER: I don't believe so.
If your intent is to print them there's a certain convenience fee that charged. I believe it's 65 cents.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Per document?
Per page?
MR. BUTLER: Per page.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Sounds a
little bit high. Sounds also a little bit unusual.

MR. BUTLER: Unusual? I think it's cutting edge.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: We've got software now that does it. Do we charge now? MR. BUTLER: If they want to come to our office --

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LEGISLATOR KOPEL: No. I mean
the current system where you go online and print things.

MR. BUTLER: If you were to
download and want to print certain things there will be fees associated with them yes. And those fees are actually something aside from the website. They come to our office those fees are generally mandated by the state or county.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: How is this new software different than whatever you're now?

MR. BUTLER: It's the same vendor. The software is the same. It's a new contract with that vendor.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Essentially
it's maintenance then?
MR. BUTLER: Pretty much.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: How were you
able to bid it out if it's --
MR. BUTLER: We did an RFP.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: An RFP for
different systems.

Rules - 10-25-21 MR. BUTLER: I'm sorry?

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: The RFP would have been for different systems altogether? MR. BUTLER: No. It's for the same system that was in place. The terms of the old contract were improved with this new contract.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: I'm saying if
you would have had another vendor would you not have had to change systems?

MR. BUTLER: We would have had to change systems, yes.

LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Thank you.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator
DeRiggi-Whitton.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
know that there have been some issues with fraud, possible fraud around the deeds. Do you know if this addresses any of those issues?

MR. BUTLER: It does. One of the software enhancements was actually implemented during the old contract. It was a property fraud system that we have in here as well. So
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this vendor does have specific software to address that.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Thank you.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other
questions? Thank you John. The next contracts are with public works.

MR. ARNOLD: Ken Arnold, Public
Works. E-146, 147, and 148 are traffic safety contracts for the crackdown grants associated with DWI. They are with the villages of Long Beach, Old Westbury and Garden City respectively.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any
questions on these three contracts? No? Go to the other two.

MR. ARNOLD: $U-4$ and $U-5$ are also contracts on DWI. U-4 is with Lake Success. That is also a crackdown grant. And U-5 is the Floral Park DWI multiyear grant for the same program but not crackdown. Just their normal program.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any
questions for Mr. Arnold? Thank you. Any
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public comment on these contracts?
MS. MEREDAY: My questions again
have to do with the fact that in this day and time, 2021, and I'm still seeing some of the same names with these contracts. We got vendors that have licensing for software that involves public and private information. Where is the representation classification as it pertains to this is a minority-owned business, this is a veteran-owned business? Where are the guarantees to people of color who live in these communities? These small businesses that are not getting any bids here?

The current county executive brags about the increase of number of registration of minority women businesses listed on the books. Being listed on the books and not having a contract and not getting any involvement with the supply and diversity is not helping anybody to pay bills, to create any jobs in these devastated communities. Where, as my colleague and friend Pearl Jacobs said, the roads are already jacked up. But we

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still have minority contractors who can fix those roads if they can get involved in the bid and get a contract.

When am I ever going to see in this county, within this state that there is a vendor who is a service disabled or minority and women-owned business listed in these documents that we spend so much money with somebody to produce and to print? How many ways, how many times, how many formats, how many platforms?

People talk about inclusion and diversity and equity but we're still missing the boat. We have empty businesses along the alleged main streets. Maybe it's not in Glen Cove. Maybe it's not in Great Neck. But in communities like the town $I$ was born and raised in, in Roosevelt, and proud to say that I'm a Roosevelt Roughrider. In the town that I live in now, Baldwin, we got more 7-11s that are open than actual businesses.

Again, how many ways? I don't want to distract anybody from going on your Facebook page or answering a campaign promise

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or looking at a resume for another friend or relative. Because if we did a family tree in Nassau County, if we actually looked at the in-laws and the out-laws. When Newsday is actually going to investigate what is happening with the COVID funding that was supposed to be used for emergencies and transport services that did not go to veterans, did not go to seniors, did not go to people of color. It's enough already. It is enough.

Martin Luther King's famous speech. How long? Not long. It's still too long. And the time period is long enough. When are we going to see anything different? When? I'm asking. Is this county ever going to implement and enforce the practices that we stand up in front of that pledge. One nation under God indivisible with liberty and justice for all. When?

MR. MCKENNA: Kevin McKenna, Edna
Drive, Syosset, New York.

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Meredith, don't worry. Town of Oyster Bay News has about 12 investigative reports going on right now and you will never ever see this information in Newsday or News
12. I actually invited News 12 here today to hear my statement. They told me that they were coming and as you can see there's nobody here from News 12 because they protect the corrupt politicians. Both Newsday and News 12 protect the corrupt politicians. And Town of Oyster Bay News, that has 15,600 followers right now, that is being followed by Nassau County widely -- I hear you guys are learning a lot of information from me Mr. Nicolello but you won't let me stand on the side where you told me the press stands.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: You need to speak to the contracts that are at issue. You making a statement.

MR. MCKENNA: As far as the contract at issue with my two minutes left -LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Yes the contracts at issue. MR. MCKENNA: And this is a

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contractor issue. I stated before in my statement and I cannot believe --

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: These are contracts for DWI services with villages.

MR. MCKENNA: I cannot believe that before with the statement $I$ made $I$ cannot believe that not one of you legislators had a question to any of my comments and my statement. Hopefully, you're going to do something to help the public corruption unit investigate your illegal civil service department.

As far as the contract, as I said before, the Nassau County forfeiture fund is giving out a lot of contracts.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: These are DWI grants to villages sir.

MR. MCKENNA: I'm getting to that.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I want you to get to it now. Otherwise your comments are out of order.

MR. MCKENNA: As far as minority awarded contracts --

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LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: These are contracts with villages for DWI.

MR. MCKENNA: You need to get
that asset forfeiture fund audited to see if any minority contracts were given out from Patrick Ryder's cell phone. Thank you very much.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: All
right. All in favor of the contracts signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously.

We have one item on the addendum. We need a motion to suspend the rules. Moved by Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator Schaefer. All in favor of suspending the rules signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously. Rules are suspended.

E-150 of 2021 is a resolution authorizing the county executive to execute a personal services agreement between the county and Greenman Pedersen, Inc.

Moved by Legislator
DeRiggi-Whitton. Seconded by Legislator Schaefer.

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MR. ARNOLD: Ken Arnold, Public
Works. This is a design contract for phase ten traffic signal expansion. It's for various locations throughout the county. We have received three bids from design firms. GP was the lowest responsible bid. They have 15 percent MWBE component to their contract. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Can you tell me just a little bit about this? There's a message board reference in here. Can you tell me what that is?

MR. ARNOLD: The department put out this RFP before we had the discussion on the message board issue. So it's a legacy item. We will take that to the consultant and there will be no message boards unless we come back to this body and discuss it. But it is included as part of the design service and our intention is not to put these in. If something comes up that we feel like there's really an obligation to discuss it with you we'll do that beforehand.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I
appreciate that. Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.

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LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Do
you mind just mentioning what areas this entails, this contract?

MR. ARNOLD: Sure. It's Forest Avenue, Glen Cove, Glen Cove Avenue, Franklin Avenue, Valley Stream Malverne, Willis and Mineola Avenues, New Hyde Park Road and Franklin Avenue in Valley Stream and Franklin Square.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Thank you.
LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any
further debate or discussion? Any public comment on this specific item? Hearing none, all in favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously. Contracts have been adopted.

Make a motion to adjourn. Moved by
Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator
Schaefer. All in favor of adjourning signify by saying aye. We are adjourned.
