Officer Rivera passed away. Officer Mora is, as we sit here, fighting for his life. I would ask that we all keep them and their families in our thoughts and prayers in the coming days. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you very much. We are honored today to be recognizing our top cops, and today we have a presentation by the Detectives Association and I'd like to invite up president John Wighaus as well as Commissioner Ryder.

MR. WIGHAUS: Thank you Presiding Officer Nicolello, Minority Leader Abrahams, the full legislative body for your support of law enforcement and also for recognizing the two NYPD officers who were ambushed on Friday night. They are in our prayers as well. Thank you for recognizing them.

Today we have detectives Michael Shreve, Dakota Clark from the Fifth Squad, Joe Albergo from Gang Unit and Bobby Rescigno from Electronics Squad.

On October 12th at approximately 11:30 p.m. Fifth Precinct patrol units were

dispatched to a house in Lakeview for a call of a suspicious and unusual occurrence. The 911 caller witnessed a disturbing video on Snapchat where a man was being tortured. The victim of this assault was shown on video being kicked multiple times and attacked by a pit bull. The injuries depicted in this post showed that the victim's health status was getting progressively worse.

At the end of this three-minute video, the victim is observed unconscious with shallow breathing, bound, naked and covered in his own blood. The 911 caller did not know the name of the person who posted this video. She only knew him as Danny from Hempstead.

The 911 caller provided this video and Snapchat screen name to Fifth Squad detectives Michael Shreve and Dakota Clark. These detectives conducted multiple checks and conferred with Gang Squad detective Joe Albergo. A short time later detectives Shreve and Clark were able to determine that "Danny from Hempstead" was in fact Danny Harrell. Mr. Harrell is known as a Crip member from

Hempstead.
Due to this, Gang Squad detective Joe Albergo joined the investigation and these three detectives worked side by side in search of this victim and the subjects. These detectives coordinated the search of multiple locations from Hempstead to Uniondale to Long Beach. Assisting in these numerous searches were detectives from the First Squad, Third Squad and Hempstead Police Department.

Detective Bob Rescigno, from
Electronics Squad, responded and coordinated the digital forensic search for this subject. Detective Rescigno was in constant communication with Snapchat and was able to obtain the possible location of this subject as being in a large apartment building located in Schenectady, New York.

With this information, these detectives contacted the Schenectady Police Department and advised them as to the events of this heinous act. The Schenectady Police Department immediately responded to this apartment building and conducted a large-scale

search going door to door and utilizing critical information provided by these detectives to locate the apartment where this assault had transpired.

Schenectady police officers were able to gain entry into this apartment and rescue the victim, who was found inside of a closet still bound, naked and near death. This victim was immediately transported to a local hospital where he was in critical condition. The attending physician stated that if this victim wasn't found when he was he would have succumbed to his injuries.

Due to the swift action of these four detectives from three separate detective squads in Nassau County, the life of this victim was saved and three evil individuals were arrested.

The following contraband was
recovered by Schenectady $P D$ from this apartment. Two illegal handguns and a large quantity of Fentanyl, heroin and crack cocaine. Two of these subjects were from Hempstead and one subject is from Uniondale.

They were charged with kidnaping, attempted murder, criminal possession of a weapon and possession of a controlled substance.

Thank you for recognizing these detectives today.

COMMISSIONER RYDER: So, first, I'd like to thank you for that moment of silence for the officers in New York City and the entire NYPD. We are all one family. We bleed the same. We go out there and we do the battles every day. This past weekend alone we took five guns off the streets in Nassau County. Five. Due to the work of our narcotics bureau, our CERT, COPE, aviation was involved, canine. There were foot chases involved. Officers were injured. That's one week in Nassau County.

These residents that you just heard that did this horrific act lived in Nassau County. These are the people that sometimes get mixed up in our communities, our good communities, and we go out there and we find them and weed through to find out who they are and take them out of that environment so the

environment get healthier.
39 years doing this, I have never ever in my life seen a video like I had to watch with this act and what this poor man was done is basically fed to the pit bull and the pit bull going after him ripping his flesh from his body. It was the hardest thing I ever had to watch. My detectives had to watch it over and over and over again to figure out who they are.

Our specialty and our technology in Electronics Bureau had to step in. Our gang members had to step in. They work together as a team to take these individuals out. To get them out of the environment so we can have our healthy environment here. This is a thing that goes on every single day and you saw it in New York City this weekend.

Five guns off the streets. One of the officers was killed was 22 years old. My son is 22 year old. Just started the police department. It starts you thinking. We have to do more for the respect of our law enforcement.

I thank every one of you, both sides of the aisle, who always respect law enforcement in this county and will continue to do that forward while we all along respect our communities. Thank you.

MR. CLARK: I want to thank you guys for the award and thank you for the continuing support of law enforcement from the leg. Thank you.

Presiding Officer Kopel.
LEGISLATOR KOPEL: So, while I'm not in -- my district and this precinct don't coincide we're very close. It's very comforting to know that we have such vigilant and actually smart people working to protect us. It's quite remarkable that you're able to take something like a video and ultimately figure out that somebody else is being harmed in Schenectady. That's just an amazing and an astonishing thing.

We're lucky of course that some evil doers are dumb enough to post things online. We're lucky that we have citizens

here in Nassau, who, having seen that, alerted the police. That's a terrific thing.

But as I said, I'm just astonished
that you were able to figure this out and ultimately save this man's life. I
congratulate you. And on behalf of everyone, I think I'm sure on behalf of everyone, we thank you. We thank you and appreciate all that you do for us not only this time but every day.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I would
just add to that $I$ think Howard hit the nail on the head. The fact that you were able to take a Snapchat video and then through detective work, incredible detective work, connect it to a victim and perpetrators in Schenectady is truly extraordinary. To do it in a fashion and a timeliness that you were able to save a man's life, $I$ mean, we are very proud of you. Wonderful job you've done. Anyone else? Legislator Bynoe.

afternoon. I echo the sentiments of my colleagues. This is extraordinary police work

done by an extraordinary police department. I thank you all for your service. You did not give up on the trail. You kept going. And even when it took you outside of your jurisdiction you kept going. So, for that I say thank you for your tenacity and your perserverance. You saved this man's life and you may have saved countless lives by making sure that those criminals, who were from Nassau County up in Schenectady, will be incarcerated and they will have to pay the fine and pay for justice for this young man that they harmed sounds like horrifically. When I read this account it was horrible. To see that they would take a dog and sic it on this person like that without any regard for human life. So, thank you for all that you do, what you did in this situation and what you do every day.

Schaefer.
LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: I also echo the sentiments of all my colleagues. This may sound silly in light of everything but what

happened to the dog in that situation?
Usually do they remove a dog that's been or no?

MR. SHREVE: I think they put it
down. But they actually had taken DNA from the victim from the dog's mouth that they tested and actually found it. So the dog was actually a big part of the case.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Thank you. LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: We'd like to invite you up here. We have presentation for all of you.

We are going to the public comment portion of our meeting and the first speaker is Claudia Borecky. MS. BORECKY: Hello everybody. I'm Claudia Borecky, codirector of LI Clean Air Water and Soil. Also known as CAWS. I gave copies of our letter, our December first letter, to you and should be in front of you. I've been advocating for the establishment of a public authority to take over New York American Water's Long Island operations for over a decade. To that end,

our state representatives passed legislation last June that established water authorities for both the north shore and the Town of Hempstead. The county legislature has now had over six months to prepare for appointments. We then pushed our new governor to sign the two bills, which she did, on November 3rd. The new South Nassau Water Authority is to be governed by a board of directors consisting of five members. Three members appointed by the Town of Hempstead, two members appointed by the Nassau County Legislature. The board shall receive no compensation for their services. Last time the towns of Hempstead and Oyster Bay reestablished a water authority they invited the public to go through a screening process which took nine months from the time they made an announcement to when they made its appointments. The state this time made sure that the governing bodies would not be allowed to procrastinate. The South Nassau Water Authority will go into effect on February 1.

I'm here today to urge the legislature to take immediate steps to appoint knowledgeable, capable, independent commissioners with varied financial, municipal, environmental, civic and legal experience to the authority so that the Nassau County Water Authority is fully established by February 1, 2022 as ordered by the state.

This is the county's last meeting in January and we've yet to see appointments up for a vote, which means the Nassau County Legislature must appoint the water commissioners within the week in order for the Nassau County Water Authority to be established by February 1.

As I'm sure you're aware, Liberty Utilities recently purchased New York American Water's stock. CAWS opposed such sale mainly because we believe the purchase price to be inflated and we expect Liberty Utilities to want to make a profit on their investment if they sell it to the new authorities in the short term.

As part of the settlement

negotiations, CAWS made sure that the Public Service Commission require Liberty or New York American Water to negotiate in good faith with the new South Nassau Water Authority to acquire its Hempstead operations. We made sure that this was included with the hope that an agreement will be reached without having to go through eminent domain.

As a specific time frame forming this organization is included in their sales agreement, it is imperative that the Nassau County Legislature and the Town of Hempstead acts expeditiously in appointing commissioners to the South Nassau Water Authority. The South Nassau Water Authority will supply water to 114,000 customers serving approximately 250,000 of your constituents.

I have a few minutes left. I can read them off. The following legislators represent communities served by Liberty. Legislator Abrahams, Roosevelt. Legislator Bynoe, Lakeview. Legislator Solages, Valley Stream, Inwood, Lawrence and North Woodmere. Legislator Ford, Atlantic Beach, East Atlantic

MR. PULITZER: Miss, your time has expired.

MS. BORECKY: I'm sorry. It
looked like I had a minute left.
MR. PULITZER: There was a mixed up communication. Sorry.

MS. BORECKY: Okay. Just one question. What has been done so far to appoint the new water commissioners to the South Nassau Water board?

understanding is that the legislation actually
becomes effective on February 1st and therefore the appointments cannot be made until after February 1st.

MS. BORECKY: Town of Hempstead is making their three appointments tomorrow.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Well, then, apparently they're jumping the gun but that's fine.

MS. BORECKY: Have you done anything to start even interviewing people?

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you

Ms. Borecky. We appreciate you being here. MS. BORECKY: That's my answer. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Richard Clolery.

MR. CLOLERY: To the members of the legislature. I would like to congratulate those that got voted in even though I voted for Democrats. Without being Democrat of Republican, I am here because I would like to see what your plan is to increase funding for the buses. You're concerned about getting people to stay on the island. You're worrying about businesses failing and also concerned about increasing tax revenue. But one major expense for any person is their car. Whether it's gas for it, insurance, repairs, whatever, it adds up. Especially when they have to buy their car now because of the pandemic because of high prices.

One way to cut this is dedicated funding for the buses. Without matching funds from the state bus lines got cut. Like the $\mathrm{N}-50, \mathrm{~N}-73,74$ etcetera. So please help

everyone not just the drivers but everyone who can't drive. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you. Pat Boyle.

MR. BOYLE: Hi. How is
everybody? My name is Pat Boyle. I work with Gateway Youth Outreach in Elmont but I'm also here representing the Coalition of Youth Service agencies.

Two very quick things. One is welcome back everybody that was voted back into your seat. I look forward to working with you again. And also too welcome to the people who have been newly elected to the seats. Those are the people who we really do want to speak with so that way we can get an opportunity to explain to you what youth programs in Nassau County are.

They're not just bats and balls like some people would think. We throw out a ball and say go have fun. That's not what we're all about. We're here to be able to help and to be able to teach kids on many, many different levels. As well as provide

counseling for those youngsters. Which is a very important component right now because unfortunately we're starting to see a lot in the way of depression with regard to kids. A lot in the way of social issues. All due to the isolation that they've had to go through with COVID.

As you can imagine, if you are a parent or if you remember having children if they were younger, parents are going a little bit on the bonkers side as well too. That's not a technical term. But they're going a little bit crazy as well too because it's tough. It's tough having kids around all day and not being in school and things of that nature and that's already happened. It's just really starting to show itself in fruition now.

So, I do welcome you and I especially welcome John Giuffre because he will be representing part of the district that we're in and I look forward to speaking with him.

talk about a little bit was is let's think about what's going on as far as finances in the county go. You all know, who've been here, that youth services is kind of the bottom ladder in the funding chain and now might be an opportunity to be able to do something about that. There are ARP monies out there -- ARP is federal monies -- that they promised to give us 20 percent of our regular contracts. We were supposed to receive that money in September. I think it's a little late.

So, one of the things that we'd like to do is to be able to work together. And I think the new administration is starting to go in the right direction with regard to this. But we'd like to be able to work together to be able to provide that funding for agencies. The main reason being that we had higher expenses because of COVID. When you do individual programs it makes it that much more expensive. We can talk about these types of things when the time comes up and my six seconds are left. Thank you very much for

listening and I look forward to speaking with you all.

Pat. Meta Mereday. Meta, let me express our deepest condolences on the loss of your father. We are very sorry for your loss.

MS. MEREDAY: Thank you so much.
On behalf of my family we accept your condolences and I want to thank my legislator for her lovely card.

But as they say, the work goes on. And as the Reverend Dr. Vernon Johns, who was the predecessor to Martin Luther King at Dexter Avenue Church in Montgomery, he said if you see a good fight get in it. So, I'm going to continue to be in the fight. Particularly for our veterans and for all who are underserved in this county.

My concerns as we're going into the new year with a new administration, I want to say, I want to actually say my hope as we go into a new year and new administration, that we take a better look, a deeper dive and actually get some action items in place as it

pertains to our veteran support services.
I've been asking with regard to a review of the particles at the NUMC, the medical center, and the empty spaces that could be effectively utilized and better served for our veterans for a wide range of particular services.

I note that there is an ordinance here as it pertains to Hiring Our Heroes Act. I'm all for anything that is providing support services to our veterans. But just to exempt the fee for the civil service exam and not provide them with jobs, credible jobs, so that they can live in Nassau County, which continues to rank among the highest in property taxes in the country, is a disservice.

There is a law that's still on the books with regard to service disabled veteran businesses and contracting that still is gathering dust.

So, if we don't create those opportunities for veteran businesses, which provide 85 percent of the jobs for veterans,

then what would be the point? You're just saying okay, we're going to exempt you from taking a test but we can't give you a job. That's why we still have such high levels of unemployment for our veterans and their families.

We have opportunities right here in
this building. Public safety officers do a commendable job. They need to be supported. We have veterans among that contingent. That again is a resource. So we have to look where we are and do what we need to do.

Also transportation, which is an issue for people who live in Nassau County, to get to certain jobs. Health care is becoming a problem with regard to COVID and the transportation and supports. We have more seniors actually who need assistance in the northern part of the county and we have more workers who are viable in the southern part of the county. But we have a piss poor and I mean piss poor transportation modality that goes north and south. We need to address that.

There's federal and state funds that are available. Newsday just reported that Nassau County lags behind in the number of grants that it can possible receive in state and federal funds. That's a problem. I'm hoping that we can address that. I'm also looking at where were the changes with regard to the minority business affairs office? There's some individuals that I haven't heard anything about. I'm curious as to where they were because for them to lose a job in a position where they were not given any resources we have a problem.

Again, I was the one that distributed the lift every voice lyrics for everyone. I hope you all get a chance to read it, to actually look it over and understand it because black history is not just a month, it's 365 days a year. Thank you.

Meta. Kevin McKenna. MR. MCKENNA: Good afternoon. Kevin McKenna Nassau County resident. I provided a copy to the clerk for the record

and I've also provided it to the authorities. Only seven out of 19 Nassau County legislators voted to award a massive $\$ 122$ million no-bid contract to Motorola in December of 2020 with the other 12 legislators not even voting. Seven out of 19 legislators is not a majority. So Nassau County taxpayers have two questions. How do 12 legislators avoid voting for a $\$ 122$ million no-bid contract? And how does a $\$ 122$ million contract become a no-bid contract? I will tell the Nassau County residents how. Motorola would have to be, quote, the only entity qualified to provide the services to allow just seven legislators in the Rules Committee to vote on the $\$ 122$ million contract and to allow that the $\$ 122$ million contract become a no-bid contract. Who determines if Motorola is, quote, the only entity qualified to provide the services? Well, NIFA did. So, I submitted a FOIL request to NIFA. I received a two-page document from NIFA general counsel Jeremy Wise. It states -- it was to the NIFA

directors from Evan Cohen. Evan Cohen is NIFA's executive director. This document from Evan Cohen falsely states that Motorola is, quote, the only entity qualified to provide the services. I provided you all a copy of that.

How do I know that Motorola is not, quote, the only entity qualified to provide the services? Well, I simply emailed Motorola's chief competitor $L 3$ Harris and its representative Natalie Ciao replied, and I quote, it was completely sole sourced to Motorola. There wasn't an opportunity for competitive bid process with other vendors.

I provided you all a copy of that email.

If Nassau County never solicited bid proposals, how can NIFA executive director Evan Cohen know if Motorola is, quote, the only entity qualified to provide services.

Getting back to the legislature, I wanted to know which seven legislators voted and who voted yes. So I submitted a FOIL request to the legislature clerk Christopher

Leimone and he mailed me back a response telling me the seven legislators that voted. I'm going to skip over the names. I provided you all with a copy of this email from Leimone.

I then emailed NIFA general counsel
Jeremy Wise a request for the contract approval request form for this $\$ 122$ million contract. Jerry Wise refused to provide that to me, writing, in quote, it's not available under FOIL. I provided you all with that I replied to this email and he refused to comment any further.

And what is unbelievable is that NIFA general counsel Jeremy Wise, once he realized the questions $I$ was asking, he had me blocked from sending emails to him and all the NIFA individuals. I strongly suggest that you take a look at the fraud that was purported on Nassau County and all of you that voted on this by NIFA director Jeremy Wise. Thank you very much.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: First item is ordinance number one of 2022. It's an

ordinance to be known as the Hiring Our Heroes Act amending Section 6 of Ordinance 180 of 2016 to exempt active duty and military veterans from the payment of civil service examination fees.

That is moved by Legislator Lafazan and seconded by Legislator Gaylor. That's before us. Does anyone want to say a few words? Any public comment?

MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday. First of all, I also want to add my condolences to NYPD and the families of those officers. That is something that we have to definitely focus on and they have to focus on. And again, also coming from a family of police officers and other first responders and being a first responder myself on 9-11 too often we have to have these types of scenarios. But we have to focus also on addressing the needs in these communities involving housing and homelessness and things of this nature.

Again, I support anything that provides opportunities and access and takes

away any obstacles for our heroes, our veterans. But again, $I$ challenge this legislature that you really have to blow the dust off of the many initiatives that are in place that have not been implemented to benefit the veterans in this community. Nassau and Suffolk combined have the largest veteran population in the northeast corridor. But we have, as far as the results and the focus, even though we have a very hard working and committed team in Nassau County veteran services, they continue to need resources and bodies and just those supplies in a location that befits the work that they do.

I don't know how many of you and including the new members on this body have actually toured their space and the amount of work that they do within that space. But I challenge you to look at what is taking place and what is not happening that's resulting in so many actions and the despair that's impacting many of our veterans and those in service. Our war widows.

We have a lot of work that needs to be done and this is 2022. I really have other things that I myself could be doing as opposed to coming here and challenging you at every opportunity to step outside of the comfort zone.

I'm tired of Nassau County just being known for cronyism, corruption, nepotism and patronage. We've got to get on board with addressing the homelessness, the hopelessness that's impacting our veteran community and the taxpayers and the residents that are here.

So, I'm in support of this but this is not it. It can't be the well, this is the first step and we have to have a starting point. No. We've been out of the gate long enough. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator Gaylor.

LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: I just want to first of all thank each and every one of the legislators who do support this bill and I believe it's unanimous support. Any action we can to do to support a veteran is an action

that I'm always going to vote for. Whether somebody deems it significant or insignificant I don't care. Okay? We're doing something and we're moving forward to help veterans. So, we're going to keep doing the little things. We'll do the big things. More may be able to be done and it will be done as the issues arise.

But, you know, let's not look a gift horse in the mouth and bad mouth because someone doesn't think it's significant. Like I said, this is meaningful legislation, well thought of. I appreciate the efforts of my colleague on the other side, Josh Lafazan, for bringing this before us so that we can work with it, make it even better. That's how democracy works. So this is what we're going to do. We're going to keep moving the little issues. We're going to move the big issues. We're going to do what we got to do to take care of our veterans in Nassau County. So I appreciate each legislator's support for this bill. Thank you.

MS. MEREDAY: Legislator Gaylor,

Item two, resolution one of 2022 is a resolution to amend Resolution 119 of 2021 establishing a special legislative task force to combat anti-Semitism.

Item is moved by Legislator Mazi Pilip. Seconded by Legislator Arnie Drucker. I know that some legislators want to speak to this but why don't we go through the procedures and set it up before we do that. We need a motion to establish an emergency on this. Moved by Legislator Walker. Seconded

by Legislator Pilip. All in favor of
establishing an emergency signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously. So the emergency has been established.

Now we need a motion to amend which
will allow the county executive or his designee to be a member of the task force, a voting member as opposed to ex officio.

That is moved by Legislator
Giuffre. Seconded by Legislator Lafazan. Any debate or discussion on the amendment? All in favor of the amendment signify by saying aye. Passes unanimously. The item as amended is before us. I know Legislator Drucker you wanted to speak.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you very much Presiding Officer. I am gratified by the unanimous bipartizan support that this legislature has played in the imminent formation of the special task force to combat anti-Semitism.

The task force is about to embark upon it's crucial mission and, quite frankly, we do not have a moment to spare. When I

introduced this legislation back in June of 2021 to create the task force I cited an alarming and frighteningly persistent increase in anti-Semitic incidents in recent years. Based on recent events in our region and across the nation it is clear that it has not abated.

For example, on January 22 nd there was an arrest of a woman who days before verbally attacked and spat upon three children in Brooklyn ages eight, seven and two and yelled, in sum and substance, that Hitler should have killed you all.

Or the adoption agency in Tennessee that according to recent reports in the New York Times refused to allow them to adopt a child because they are Jewish.

And the shock of a horrific hostage incident at congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas last week still weighs heavily upon my heart. The congregation was attacked by a gunman who took the synagogue's rabbi and three worshippers as hostages. While we were all profoundly

grateful and relieved that the four hostages were released safely, we were haunted by yet another attack on Jewish people practicing their faith in America.

Through the work of Nassau's special legislative task force to combat anti-Semitism, we have an opportunity to fearlessly confront that question and devise solutions that will help Jews in Nassau County worship in peace and live without fearing for their family's safety. Now is the time to come together as one Nassau County to pave the way to a brighter, more inclusive future and send a clear message that we will never be silent when confronted with hatred of any kind. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you. Any other legislators?

LEGISLATOR PILIP: First, I would
like to thank all of my colleagues for not only recognizing the seriousness of anti-Semitism but also for the commitment together, concrete proposal, how to fight this kind of hate. I'm looking forward to working

with the task force. And talking about the problem is a great start but this is a time to do something about this. This is people's issue and I'm happy that all my colleagues are with me with this day.
