1 Public Works - 5-9-22 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: I will call 2 3 the Public Works Committee to order. I'll ask 4 the clerk to call the roll. 5 MR. PULITZER: Thank you 6 chairman. Public Works and Parks roll call. 7 Carrie Solages. 8 LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Here. 9 MR. PULITZER: Legislator Arnold 10 Drucker. 11 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Here. 12 MR. PULITZER: Ranking member 13 Siela Bynoe. 14 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Here. 15 MR. PULITZER: Legislator James 16 Kennedy. 17 LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Here. 18 MR. PULITZER: Legislator Laura 19 Schaefer. 20 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Here. 21 MR. PULITZER: Vice-chairman John 22 Giuffre. 23 LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: Present. 24 MR. PULITZER: Chairman C. 25 William Gaylor III.

PULITZER: We have a quorum 4 sir. 5 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Thank you. 6 There are three items on the agenda today 7 which are clerk items 137-22, 139-22 and 146 - 22. 8 9 Clerk item number 137-22 is a 10 resolution authorizing the county executive to 11 execute an agreement between the county of 12 Nassau acting on behalf of the Department of 13 Parks, Recreation and Museums and Friends of 14 Garvies Point Museum and Preserve. 15 May I have a motion. Moved by 16 Legislator Solages. Seconded by Legislator 17 Schaefer. The item is before us. Who do we have from the administration? 18 19 Darcy Belyea, parks MS. BELYEA: 20 commissioner. Good afternoon again 21 everybody. 22 This is Friends of Garvies Point 23 Museum, an MOA, to provide administrative and 24 professional services to the county in support 25 of the museum. They had an agreement in place

1 Public Works - 5-9-22 2 that has expired. That was in '07 that that 3 was created. Basically their functions are to 4 operate the museum gift shop. Which if you 5 haven't been there and you need a gift, 6 ladies, definitely I recommend you take a stop 7 in there. Very unique items. 8 Fund-raising, educational programs 9 They've had some recent and special events. 10 ones that have been met with great success. 11 And then we have another one, an Indian 12 They're actually partnering with the powwow. 13 Montauket tribe from out in Montauk. So 14 there's some great family things going on 15 there. They also recently offered boater 16 education classes through the Friends of 17 Garvies Point. The full board includes the now 18 19 retired former museum director. 20 So we're looking for a ten-year 21 agreement with an option to renew for an

22 additional ten years. The first agreement, 23 again, was in 2007 and was renewed for an 24 additional five years and it's expiring. 25 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Thank you.

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1 Public Works - 5-9-22 2 Quick question or two. How do we monitor the 3 collection of the funds from fund-raisings, 4 sales, powwow, whatever? Monies coming in. 5 MS. BELYEA: Through quarterly 6 reports which are submitted to the parks 7 accounting team. 8 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: And then 9 likewise I guess expenditures? 10 MS. BELYEA: Correct. 11 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: So the parks 12 department provides the oversight on the 13 financial component? 14 MS. BELYEA: Correct. 15 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Those monies 16 that are collected are they transferred into 17 the general account or operating fund? 18 MS. BELYEA: No. It stays with 19 the Friends of Garvies Point and they are 20 using that for like start-up costs for the 21 next event, to purchase more items for the 22 gift shop, etcetera. 23 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Is there a 24 point in time where the balance becomes a 25 certain level and then the excess is

BELYEA: I haven't gotten that far in my job to know that but I 4 5 don't believe so. 6 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Just was 7 I have no further questions. Does curious. 8 anybody else? Legislators have questions? 9 Committee members? Public? Comments? 10 Questions? There being no further debate or discussion, we'll take a vote. All in favor 11 12 of passing this signify by saying aye. Those 13 opposed? This item passes unanimously. 14 Clerk item 139-22 is a resolution 15 authorizing the county of Nassau to 16 participate in a federal aid transportation 17 project providing for the resurfacing of various county roads under capital project 18 19 H61587-75G, with a pin number 0761.18 and 20 authorizing the county executive of the county 21 of Nassau to execute the agreement on behalf 22 of the county with the New York State 23 Department of Transportation for the 24 advancement of said aid for transportation 25 projects in Nassau County, New York.

2	May I have a motion. Moved by Vice
3	Chairman Legislator Giuffre. Seconded by
4	Legislator Bynoe. I see we have commissioner
5	Arnold from the Department of Public Works to
6	speak about this item. The floor is yours.
7	MR. ARNOLD: Ken Arnold, public
8	works. This is a master agreement that allows
9	the county to accept funding from New York
10	State that's associated with the TIP. This
11	project is for resurfacing as you stated. The
12	funding received will be \$5 million. The
13	total project cost is \$6 million.
14	LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Is there any
15	debate or discussion? Legislator Drucker.
16	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you
17	Chairman Gaylor. One quick question
18	Commissioner Arnold. When would this
19	resurfacing start to take place?
20	MR. ARNOLD: It's our intent to
21	have this part of the 2023 resurfacing season.
22	LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you.
23	LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Any further
24	debate or discussion? Any public comment?
25	We got one more question.

1 Public Works - 5-9-22 2 LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: Is this for 3 Old Country Road from 107 to 135? 4 MR. ARNOLD: That is one of the 5 roads, yes. Also Salisbury Park Drive. And 6 then the expressway service road north and 7 south parts of them. 8 LEGISLATOR GIUFFRE: Thank you. 9 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Do we have 10 any public comment? 11 MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday. 12 Yes. One of my questions was answered with 13 regard to exactly which roads and it just 14 furthers my comment as to which roads get 15 designated. Because, unfortunately, we have 16 so many roads in Nassau County that need 17 resurfacing. 18 And the third part of my question, 19 again with this list, since we're talking 20 about federal and state dollars, I just want 21 to make sure that the county is in compliance with regard to the outreach, inclusion and 22 23 utilization of service disabled, minority 24 woman-owned businesses. There was a hot 25 minute when at least here I would kind of hear

1 Public Works - 5-9-22 2 something about a reference to a contractor 3 that was woman owned, minority owned or service disabled veteran. But I'm not seeing 4 5 or hearing that. So that is becoming of great 6 concern to me. 7 Because we have a budget here that 8 rivals many countries and unfortunately we 9 still don't seem to address the fact that we 10 have a large percentage of our population who 11 need to get work to stay here as well and they 12 don't seem to be getting that work. 13 Those are my questions. My first 14 part of the question what roads exactly 15 pertain to this particular piece of the budget 16 were answered. But my second question has to 17 do with the inclusion process and what is the 18 determination process for the selection of 19 roads for these projects. Thank you. 20 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Thank you. Ι 21 think those are very good questions. I'm glad 22 the first part was answered by Commissioner 23 Arnold. But if Commissioner Arnold could 24 return and just address how do we ensure in 25 the bidding process that minority owned and

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Public Works - 5-9-22 veteran-owned businesses are considered? MR. ARNOLD: So, this being a state contract the state sets DBE goals that are requirements that are in this bid for a certain percentage of MW and SDOB firms. So the DBA that they set.

8 As to how roads are selected. The 9 department meets on a regular basis with its 10 maintenance and it's permit offices and its 11 engineering offices. We look at the roads. 12 We rate them based on complaints and what 13 they're seeing in the field. And that's how 14 roads are selected. We are looking towards 15 doing a countywide assessment in the next year 16 or so to reset what we need to do next as 17 we've done a good majority of the roads over the last five or six years. 18

19 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: So back to 20 the first part of your answer. The state sets 21 the goals?

22 MR. ARNOLD: For state 23 contracts. This is one of them. If it's a 24 county-funded contract only then it's just 25 appendix EE I believe which is the best

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1 Public Works - 5-9-22 2 efforts. 3 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: All right. Is there any other further public comment? 4 5 So, all in favor of passing this item signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The item passes 6 7 unanimously. The last item is clerk item 146-22 8 9 which is an ordinance making certain 10 determinations pursuant to the State 11 Environmental Quality Review Act and 12 authorizing the county executive on behalf of

13 the county of Nassau to execute a release of 14 an approximate 20-foot easement reserved for 15 highway purposes situated in Port Washington, 16 which sits within the Town of North Hempstead 17 and in the county of Nassau, New York.

May have I have a motion. Moved by
Legislator Kennedy. Seconded by Legislator
Drucker. The item is before us.

21 MR. SERANDIS: Nicholas Serandis, 22 deputy county attorney. This was an easement 23 that was granted to the county approximately 24 40 to 50 years ago for the proposed widening 25 of the Port Washington Middle Neck Road area

For purposes of that, we had 3 retained a 20-foot easement over a portion of 4 the property that was then owned by a 5 Mr. Scofani, which was years ago. 6 The Department of Public Works has 7 later determined that we would not be widening 8 this road and some of the other easements that 9 were granted were released years ago. But 10 recently another gentleman bought the property 11 and the title company and the bank which was 12 doing the refinancing had both requested, even 13 though the document -- the retainees contained 14 language that said if the property is not used 15 for highway purposes the easement would be 16 released. But it didn't specify what the 17 conditions were in the release. 18 So the title company decided that 19 we would have to go through a formal process 20 to release the easement for them to accept 21 that the easement is released. 22 So, we went through OSPAC, the Open 23 Space Committee. We went through planning. 24 We had a SEQRA determination that the 25 property -- there would be no adverse impact

1 Public Works - 5-9-22 2 on anything. 3 In accordance with prior practice, we are collecting \$500 for the release of 4 5 easement, which is basically what was done in 6 the past like ten years ago when we released these sort of easements. And we went through 7 8 the processes and here we are. 9 There's no detriment to the county 10 because the property would never be used for 11 highway purposes and it is owned by the 12 gentleman in guestion, Montauk 3 L.L.C., which 13 is an entity which is just seeking this 14 ministerial item which has to be eventually 15 recorded at the clerk's office. 16 So, if I were LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: 17 to sum it up it would be this is an easement 18 that runs with the land. The property owner 19 has made a request because this strip of land 20 is not being used for which the easement 21 intended it to be used. So, my question would 22 be, the adjourning neighbor property is there 23 an easement on their properties and are those 24 easements being released? 25 MR. SERANDIS: This is the only

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1 Public Works - 5-9-22 2 neighbor that has requested it at this time. We did find other records of easements 3 retained in the area that have already been 4 5 released many years ago. And usually this comes up when somebody is doing a refinance or 6 7 sale of property and when the title company 8 and/or banks say they want formal 9 documentation we go through this on a fairly 10 regular basis. 11 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Got it. Any 12 debate or discussion? Is there any public 13 comment? All in favor signify by saying aye. 14 Any opposed? The item passes unanimously. 15 There is no other business before 16 this committee. May I have a motion to 17 adjourn. Moved by Legislator Giuffre. 18 Seconded by Legislator Bynoe. All in favor? 19 The committee is now adjourned. We will be 20 followed by the Health Committee. 21 (Committee adjourned at 3:00 p.m.) 22 23 24 25
