- 3 will call Public Safety Committee to order and
- 4 I will ask the clerk to call the roll.
- 5 MR. PULITZER: Thank you madam.
- 6 Legislator Debra Mule.
- 7 LEGISLATOR MULE: Here.
- 8 MR. PULITZER: Legislator Siela
- 9 Bynoe.
- 10 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Here.
- MR. PULITZER: Ranking member
- 12 Delia DeRiggi-Whitton.
- 13 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:

- MR. PULITZER: Legislator John

- MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum
- 4 ma'am.
- 5 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very
- 6 much sir.
- 7 There are three items on the agenda
- 8 today which are clerk items numbers 133-22,
- 9 142-22 and 144-22.
- 10 Clerk item 133-22 is a local law to
- amend Section 21-29.10 of the Nassau County
- 12 Administrative Code with respect to catalytic
- 13 converters.
- May I have a motion. Moved by
- 15 Legislator Pilip. Seconded by Legislator
- 16 Rhoads. The item is before us.
- 17 This proposed legislation is
- introduced by Legislators Gaylor, Giuffre and
- 19 Pilip. It's purpose is to prevent the theft
- of catalytic converters by implementing
- 21 certain reporting requirements with respect to
- 22 their sale.
- I'm going to hand this over. I'm
- 24 going to allow Legislator Pilip to continue
- 25 with this as she was one of the sponsors

- 2 sore.
- 3 LEGISLATOR PILIP: Thank you
- 4 Legislator Ford. According to the National
- 5 Insurance Crime Bureau, catalytic converter
- 6 robbery increased by 325 percent between 2019
- 7 and 2020. This has been the case in my
- 8 district. These robberies simply to commit
- 9 take merely seconds to complete and very
- 10 costly and requiring victims to spend over
- 11 \$1,000 in repairs.
- 12 As Deputy Presiding Officer Ford
- 13 stated, Nassau County must do everything in
- 14 its power to stop these crimes. With the
- passage of this proposed local law potential
- 16 catalytic converter robbery will stop and if
- it is happening the police will be able to
- 18 track where the stolen device came from.
- 19 Thank you again. I'm hopeful that
- this proposed local law receives bipartisan
- 21 support. Thank you.
- 22 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you
- 23 Legislator Pilip. It's interesting to note
- that when you speak with the officers who tell
- 25 us about the theft of these catalytic

- 2 converters it can be done in a matter of
- 3 seconds, if not even -- seconds basically.
- 4 They've had I think videos where a car can be
- 5 at an intersection, people jump out, the next
- 6 thing you know the catalytic converter has
- 7 been removed from the car causing a lot of
- 8 cost to the car owner. Anywhere from \$1,000
- 9 to even like sometimes \$8,000. Recently they
- 10 took them out of school buses.
- So, this is a crime that's on the
- 12 rise and it is something that is very
- 13 concerning to all of us. So, with this
- 14 legislation we're hoping that we can help
- 15 curtail this crime by requiring that anybody
- 16 who is going to buy these, I guess these
- 17 junkyards and other places that deal with auto
- 18 parts that they know who they're buying from
- 19 and trying to get everything registered so we
- 20 know exactly who's selling it and where it's
- 21 coming from.
- 22 Any other comments? Legislator
- 23 Mule.
- 24 LEGISLATOR MULE: Thank you madam
- 25 chairwoman. I certainly recognize the need

- for us to do something. I just want to make
- 3 sure that we're doing exactly what needs to be
- 4 done. So, I just have a couple of questions.
- 5 Who can make requests for
- 6 inspections? Is it limited to Department of
- 7 Consumer Affairs and the police department or
- 8 can anyone make those requests?
- 9 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Under the law
- 10 it's those two specific departments. However,
- 11 we can request, if you wanted to as a
- 12 legislator, if you are advised of a particular
- 13 complaint you can request that those two
- 14 departments make an inspection.
- 15 LEGISLATOR MULE: If that
- 16 happens, if someone loses their catalytic
- 17 converter due to theft they would go to the
- 18 police department or the Department of
- 19 Consumer Affairs? How does that work?
- 20 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: If someone
- 21 were to lose their catalytic converter, if
- their catalytic converter was stolen?
- LEGISLATOR MULE: Was stolen,
- 24 yeah.
- 25 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Yes. I'm

- 2 assuming that they would be reporting that to
- 3 the Nassau County Police Department. The
- 4 police department would have the opportunity
- 5 obviously to be able to check the registry of
- 6 dealers. That's certainly within their
- 7 purview. But yes, those would be the two
- 8 departments that would have enforcement
- 9 responsibilities under the legislation.
- 10 LEGISLATOR MULE: Do we have the
- 11 necessary resources to make sure that this
- 12 gets handled?
- 13 LEGISLATOR FORD: The police
- 14 officers can do an investigation. Also with
- 15 consumer affairs, there are time when we may
- 16 call you up, like you may get -- somebody may
- 17 say that when I go shopping I think that
- 18 they're overcharging me for whatever I'm
- 19 purchasing. So, they'll go out and do an
- inspection on weights and measures and things
- 21 like that. So, this would be the same type of
- 22 enforcement. That they would then go out to
- 23 be able to check the records of the people in
- 24 regard to the catalytic -- if they're selling
- 25 catalytic converters they have to make sure

- 2 that they know where they got them from.
- 3 LEGISLATOR MULE: We certainly
- 4 have been in conversations with regards to the
- 5 Department of Consumer Affairs and their
- 6 backlogs. That's why I'm asking the
- 7 question. To make sure we're not creating a
- 8 law we can't properly enforce. This is a very
- 9 necessary thing to have happen. I just want
- 10 to make sure that we're properly resourced.
- 11 LEGISLATOR FORD: I'm with you on
- 12 that one because I think that we need to bring
- more people in to make sure that whatever laws
- we are passing that they are effectively
- 15 enforced.
- 16 LEGISLATOR MULE: Legislator
- 17 Rhoads do you want to say anything else? No?
- 18 Thank you.
- 19 LEGISLATOR FORD: Legislator
- 20 Bynoe.
- 21 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you
- 22 madam chair. I'm going to support this bill
- but I am concerned that it really is going to
- 24 drive the folks, the criminals who are
- 25 stealing these catalytic converters, just to

- 2 sell them in Suffolk and sell them in Queens.
- 3 They're going to sell them right outside of
- 4 Nassau.
- 5 We still have to be vigilant and we
- 6 still have to implore the police to do as much
- 7 as they can on this issue. Because this is
- 8 not going to stop folks. They've hit the gold
- 9 mine here. They understand that they can sell
- 10 these things at tremendous amount of revenue
- 11 for themselves. And I understand just the
- 12 other day they stole two out of a van, I think
- in your neck of the woods, in Glen Cove, and
- 14 the resale on it is like \$11,000 for the both
- of them. That's what they reported on News
- 16 12.
- So, like I said, I'm going to
- 18 support this but it's really only going to
- 19 drive the sellers of these things outside of
- 20 Nassau. And if I our friends to the east and
- 21 west don't get on board to do something here
- or the state at some level we're really not
- 23 solving the issue. But thank you.
- LEGISLATOR FORD: I agree with
- you Legislator Bynoe. I think it has to be a

- 2 combined effort. Especially even in the
- 3 state. Because yeah, what's going to stop
- 4 them from like running into Suffolk and
- 5 selling out there? It's crazy. The next
- 6 thing you know they're going to make these
- 7 things with GPS on them so we know where the
- 8 catalytic converter is. It just is amazing.
- 9 I'm not a car person. I couldn't tell you
- 10 where it is. Underneath. Thank you.
- 11 Legislator Rhoads.
- 12 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: To Legislator
- 13 Bynoe's point, we actually have reached out to
- 14 Suffolk County. I believe we've also reached
- out to the City of New York and Westchester
- 16 County as well to see if we can get them to
- 17 adopt a regional approach specifically as a
- 18 result of your concern. It certainly makes
- 19 sense.
- I think that this is really is an
- 21 effort for us to reposition consequences that
- have been removed, in my opinion, as a result
- of cashless bail and criminal justice reform.
- There's no coincidence behind you seeing an
- 25 uptick in this type of crime with the removal

- of consequences. And even though the
- 3 consequences now are being placed on the
- 4 dealership, if that's the only avenue we have
- 5 the opportunity to be able to place those
- 6 consequences.
- 7 So, now there's going to have to be
- 8 a registry. Now the dealers are going to have
- 9 to be responsible for maintaining it. If it
- 10 turns out that they are not there's going to
- 11 be there consequences behind them doing that
- 12 as to what the source of the catalytic
- 13 converter is.
- So, again, I think this is just
- 15 another example of us trying to react to a
- 16 problem that has largely been created by the
- 17 state as a result of cashless bail and
- 18 criminal justice reform. But we're going to
- 19 continue to try and find ways to address these
- 20 problems to the extent that we can. But we're
- 21 attempting to take a regional approach as you
- 22 correctly note.
- LEGISLATOR BYNOE: On topic, yes,
- 24 I do believe that that's what we should be
- 25 doing.

- 2 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Can
- 3 I say one thing? I know that there are VIN
- 4 numbers on seven parts of the car. Like the
- 5 doors have VIN numbers. It just makes sense
- 6 to me that they would put them on.
- 7 LEGISLATOR FORD: Legislator
- 8 Ferretti.
- 9 LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you
- 10 Legislator Ford. I want to thank the sponsors
- of this legislation. Of course Legislator
- 12 Pilip and Legislator Giuffre and our Colonel
- 13 Bill Gaylor.
- I share some of the concerns.
- 15 Legislator Bynoe, I think you're right. It's
- a shame that even have to really be passing
- 17 something like this. I know in my community
- 18 car thefts are skyrocketing. I had one right
- on my block. There was another one in Wantagh
- 20 that I read about in Legislator Rhoads'
- 21 district just a couple of days ago. It was
- 22 actually at gunpoint. Which, I hate to say
- 23 that that's a relief, but at least if it's at
- 24 gunpoint they're not let out with an
- 25 appearance ticket.

- So, look, I think that this is
- 3 something that is unfortunately necessary. I
- 4 want to thank the sponsors for. I will
- 5 support it. But i think that we do need a
- 6 regional approach as it relates to bill. But
- 7 what we really need is a statewide overhaul on
- 8 some of the reforms that were put in place
- 9 which are causing us to have to have these
- 10 discussions and put these local laws in place
- 11 to begin with. Thank you.
- 12 LEGISLATOR FORD: Legislator
- 13 Rhoads.
- 14 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: To Legislator
- 15 Ferretti's point and I know we're getting a
- little far afield here, but not only did we
- 17 have the carjacking in Wantagh, but we also
- 18 had a stolen vehicle in Merrick.
- 19 And just to illustrate the
- absurdity of the example, they were
- 21 actually -- the police, through outstanding
- 22 police work, was able to actually capture the
- 23 individual and get back the stolen vehicle.
- When the suspect was actually apprehended he
- 25 had keys to three other vehicles on him that

- 2 were not his. This individual was released on
- 3 an appearance ticket. When I talk about
- 4 problems that the state is creating and us
- 5 having to do deal with the consequences that's
- 6 what I'm talking about.
- 7 LEGISLATOR FORD: Anyone else?
- 8 All those in favor of passing this item please
- 9 signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The item
- 10 passes unanimously.
- 11 Clerk item 142-22 is an ordinance
- 12 supplemental to the annual appropriation
- ordinance in connection with the traffic
- 14 safety board.
- May I have a motion. Moved by
- 16 Legislator Bynoe. Seconded by Legislator
- 17 Ferretti. The item is before us. Good
- 18 afternoon.
- MR. ARNOLD: Ken Arnold,
- 20 commissioner of public works. This item is a
- 21 supplemental appropriation for \$1.121 million
- 22 to be put into the traffic safety budget.
- 23 It's funded through fines received by the
- 24 state for DWI and this funding is passed along
- 25 to various agencies to implement a DWI

- 2 program.
- 3 LEGISLATOR FORD: Any questions
- 4 from the legislators? Any public comment? I
- 5 see none. All those in favor of passing this
- 6 item please signify by saying aye. Anyone
- 7 opposed? The item passes unanimously. Thank
- 8 you.
- 9 Clerk item 144-22 is an ordinance
- 10 supplemental to the annual appropriation
- ordinance in connection with the police
- 12 department.
- May I have a motion. Moved by
- 14 Legislator Pilip. Seconded by Legislator
- 15 Mule. The item is before us. Good afternoon
- 16 sir.
- 17 MR. FIELD: William Field,
- inspector with the police department. Item
- 19 144-22 are several grant appropriations. The
- first one, which ends in 02, is a supplemental
- 21 appropriation of \$96,061 in funds received
- from the United States Department of Justice
- related to the JAG grant justice assistance
- 24 grant. This is to prevent and control crime.
- 25 It can be used for state and local

- 2 initiatives, technical assistance, training,
- 3 personnel, equipment, supplies and other
- 4 support. Do you want me to do them all or
- 5 individually?
- 6 LEGISLATOR FORD: Just the one.
- 7 MR. FIELD: There's three
- 8 appropriations.
- 9 The second appropriation ends in
- 10 03. This it for the 2022 Surveillance
- 11 Apprehension Vehicle Enforcement Program, or
- 12 the SAVE grant. This is for an appropriation
- of \$145,869 from the New York State Department
- 14 of Criminal Justice. This is to assign police
- officers and detectives on an overtime basis
- 16 to investigate and identify individuals that
- 17 commit the crime of vehicle theft or
- 18 theft-related crimes.
- The last appropriation ends in 04.
- This is a \$79,492.50 from the New York State
- 21 Department of Criminal Justice. It's part of
- our live scan project for 2022 to procure new
- 23 live scan fingerprint machines.
- LEGISLATOR FORD: Any questions
- 25 from the legislators? Any public comment?

- 2 Come right up.
- MS. MEREDAY: Meta Mereday,
- 4 county resident. Actually I was just passing
- 5 through but I'm just a little curious with the
- 6 previous discussion as it pertained to the
- 7 catalytic converters, and I agreed with
- 8 Legislator Mule and Bynoe with regard to the
- 9 concerns of the implementation and the
- 10 additional work that's going to be put on the
- 11 police department with the registration
- 12 process. I'm definitely for it but there are
- other parts of cars that are being removed. I
- don't know if this is like the start of
- something that needs to be maybe reviewed and
- 16 expanded upon.
- 17 I think, as Legislator Rhoads
- 18 commented, involving Suffolk County as well as
- 19 New York City I think we need to as opposed to
- 20 maintaining adversarial aspects with our state
- 21 and federal representatives for various
- incendiary reasons we can agree or disagree
- 23 upon, we need to work better together and come
- 24 with generalized formats across the region and
- across the state that's going to be beneficial

- 2 for residents. And I think possibly maybe
- 3 looking into this grant, the surveillance
- 4 apprehension vehicle process I think that
- 5 might be something that we could look into
- 6 that could benefit this process with regard to
- 7 the catalytic converters.
- 8 And also with regard to
- 9 appropriation for the police department. I'm
- 10 trying to put a plea out again to all of the
- 11 legislators that we have to address the
- 12 traffic safety. Living around the corner from
- 13 the most recent fatality. Literally. The
- 14 young lady who ran into the -- that was around
- 15 the corner from my house. I had to call the
- 16 police department to ask why helicopters were
- 17 circling my house at six o'clock in the
- morning just to be told that a 66 year old man
- 19 got killed by a someone who was driving while
- 20 intoxicated. We need to address that.
- 21 Particularly on Grand Avenue.
- 22 And crossing quards. It's not the
- 23 responsibility of the police department to
- take the time away from the work that they
- 25 have to do and the added work that they get

- 2 put on from this body for public safety. I
- 3 get it. But we have to do a better outreach
- 4 and appeal to get people to stand up and
- 5 support efforts to cross our children and our
- 6 seniors. Short period of time.
- 7 I stood before this body to
- 8 advocate getting more money. I'm in my
- 9 community trying to encourage people to do
- 10 that. But we need our elected officials to
- 11 step up to get our police officers back on the
- 12 patrols, back in the service that they are
- 13 supposed to do. They have to take away their
- 14 time.
- 15 Again, I live right by Grand Avenue
- and I've almost been hit myself by people who
- 17 have speeded by and the officer cannot leave
- 18 their post because they have to cross the
- 19 children and seniors and our disabled and
- 20 etcetera.
- 21 Again, I'm hoping that we can look
- 22 at how we're getting these grant funds to
- better serve the community. And again, when
- it's grant funded it's not coming out of the
- 25 taxpayers' pockets. I've already said enough

2	how much taxes we have all pay in Nassau
3	County. I thank you all very much. I wish
4	you all well.
5	LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very
6	much. All those in favor of passing this
7	please signify by saying aye. Any opposed?

9	much everybody.
10	There's no other business in front
11	of this committee. May I have a motion to
12	adjourn. Moved by Legislator Rhoads.
13	Seconded by Legislator Ferretti. All those
14	favor? This committee is adjourned. Thank
15	you very much. Public Works is next.
