- 3 Health Committee to order and ask the clerk to
- 4 please take the roll.
- 5 MR. PULITZER: Thank you Madam
- 6 Chair. Health and Social Services roll call.
- 7 Legislator Joshua Lafazan.
- 8 LEGISLATOR LAFAZAN: Here.
- 9 MR. PULITZER: Legislator Arnold
- 10 Drucker.
- 11 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Here.
- MR. PULITZER: Ranking member
- 13 Delia DeRiggi-Whitton.
- 14 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
- 15 Here.
- MR. PULITZER: Legislator C.
- 17 William Gaylor III.
- 18 LEGISLATOR GAYLOR: Present.
- 19 MR. PULITZER: Legislator Laura
- 20 Schaefer.
- LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Here.

- 3 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Here.
- 4 MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum
- 5 ma'am.
- 6 LEGISLATOR WALKER: There are two
- 7 items on the agenda today. Clerk item 199-22
- 8 and clerk item 202-22. The first clerk item,
- 9 199-22, is an ordinance supplemental to the
- annual appropriation ordinance in connection
- 11 with the health department.
- May I have a motion please. Moved
- 13 by Legislator Gaylor. Seconded by Legislator
- 14 Drucker. How are you?
- MS. DISIMONE: Ann DiSimone,
- 16 health department.
- 17 There are three items within this
- 18 199-22. The first one is a supplemental
- appropriation in the amount of \$251,400 for
- the childhood lead poisoning prevention
- 21 grant. This grant is funded through New York
- 22 State Department of Health. Program provides
- 23 comprehensive services to reduce the
- prevalence of blood lead levels in children
- and provide case management services and

- 2 environmental inspections to all children
- 3 identified as having elevated blood lead
- 4 levels.
- 5 Do you want me to do it
- 6 separately?
- 7 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Do it
- 8 together.
- 9 The second one is a supplemental
- appropriation in the amount of \$1.7 million
- 11 for the WIC, Women and Infant, Children
- 12 Program. The WIC grant is federally funded.
- 13 Supplemental nutrition and education program
- 14 that provides vouchers for foods and infant
- 15 formula to women, infants and children who
- 16 qualify under federal financial need
- 17 guidelines. This program serves over 5,000
- 18 clients monthly at two WIC sites. One in
- 19 Hempstead and one in Glen Cove.
- The third item is a supplemental
- 21 appropriation in the amount of \$670,611 for
- the public health emergency preparedness
- 23 grant. This grant is the Centers for Disease
- 24 Control funded program administered by the New
- 25 York State Department of Health. Funds are

- 2 used for local public health infrastructure
- 3 and emergency response and preparedness.
- 4 As an additional note for this,
- 5 this is the grant that really helped us
- 6 facilitate the quick set up for COVID
- 7 vaccinations to almost 100,000 residents. Any
- 8 questions on any of those three items?
- 9 LEGISLATOR WALKER: I just a
- 10 quick question. The first that deals with the
- 11 issue with lead. How do we stand there? Do
- we still have high levels?
- MS. DISIMONE: Right now
- 14 currently we have 231 active childhood lead
- 15 cases that we're following. About 212 are
- less than 9.9 and then the rest range in other
- 17 levels.
- 18 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Do we try to
- 19 determine like the cause of this? Is it
- 20 something in their homes and then we can help
- 21 that situation in the home or whatever?
- MS. DISIMONE: We have teams that
- 23 go into the home. We have a nurse, lead
- 24 nurse, and an environmental sanitarian that go
- in and assess if it's paint, if it's cosmetic,

- 2 if it's some kind of food item to remediate
- and to try to stop that from happening.
- 4 LEGISLATOR WALKER: My other
- 5 question was on the WIC Program. How do we
- 6 deal with that especially with the whole
- 7 formula issue? I know it was a disaster
- 8 because I have a little grandchild. You were
- 9 all over the place trying to find formula.
- 10 I'm sure that for many of the moms who, you
- 11 know, are in this WIC Program that really
- 12 became an issue for all of them.
- MS. DISIMONE: I will double
- 14 check that. I think right now they're okay.
- 15 They've been getting formula in from other
- 16 areas. Doctors are giving different formulas
- 17 to cover but I will double check that before
- 18 the full leq.
- 19 LEGISLATOR WALKER: If we know
- anyone who might have additional formulas, say
- 21 the baby finished formula, can we give that to
- 22 you? I know we had spots where we could drop
- them off but I don't know if those spots are
- 24 still available.
- MS. DISIMONE: I will check that

- 2 as well.
- 3 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any questions
- 4 or comments from the legislators? Legislator
- 5 DeRiggi-Whitton.
- 6 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
- 7 think it's great. I'm just looking at -- all
- 8 of your items you're really receiving a lot of
- 9 money from the state. Like almost three and a
- 10 half million dollars by the time we add all
- 11 these up and that saves us money here in
- 12 Nassau County. So thank you for your hard
- 13 work.
- 14 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Ann thank you
- for being patient. I know it's hard sometimes
- 16 to sit here and wait when you're later.
- 17 MS. DISIMONE: It's all
- 18 interesting.
- 19 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you.
- 20 All in favor of clerk item 199-22 signify by
- 21 saying aye. Any opposed? Any abstained?
- 22 That will move on to Finance.
- Now we have clerk item 202-22,
- 24 which is an ordinance supplemental to the
- annual appropriation ordinance in connection

- 1 Health 7-18-22
- with the Department of Human Services.
- A motion please. By Legislator
- 4 Schaefer. Seconded by Legislator Drucker.
- 5 MS. ZAKI: Seema Zaki, the
- 6 director from the Department of Human
- 7 Services.
- 8 Clerk item 202-22 has two
- 9 supplemental appropriations. The first item
- is for \$948,915 for the Office of Chemical
- 11 Dependency. It's 100 percent state funded to
- 12 that existing grant from New York State Office
- of Addiction Services and Support. The
- 14 increase is for the purposes of the cost of
- 15 living to the subcontracted agencies. So it's
- 16 all 100 percent state funded.
- And the second item for \$55,118 is
- 18 for Office of Youth Services. It's from New
- 19 York State Office for Children and Family
- 20 Services. It is for the purpose of youth
- 21 support and education and it's 100 percent
- 22 funded by the state.
- 23 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any questions
- or comments from the legislators? Legislator
- 25 DeRiggi-Whitton.

- 2 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
- 3 Thank you for all you do. You are extremely
- 4 important to us. When you're talking about
- 5 the item referring to chemical dependency and
- 6 different support services what type of
- 7 programs is that?
- MS. ZAKI: These are substance
- 9 abuse and alcohol and substance abuse. Those
- 10 are the programs that are serviced under this
- 11 grant. This is an existing grant for the like
- 12 last 35 years or so. And this is just a cost
- of living increase. COLA increase. Which
- when we budgeted we did not have the 2022
- 15 stated letter with us so we budgeted less.
- 16 You will see, legislator, on the back you will
- see the stated letter, showing that when we
- budgeted we budgeted for \$21,698,030. When
- 19 the 2022 state aid, when we received the 2022
- 20 state aid funding it has actually increased by
- 21 \$948,000. The total is \$22,646,945 million.
- 22 So that's what we are requesting to increase.
- 23 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
- 24 guess that's one good sign of inflation. We
- 25 get a little bit of a bigger budget with

- 2 this.
- 4 legislators on both sides of the aisle. Does
- 5 this provide for Narcan kits and Narcan
- 6 training?
- 7 MS. ZAKI: I will get back to you
- 8 with that answer. But this has a vast
- 9 services. That is part of it.
- 10 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: It
- hasn't passed yet, but we're hopeful that
- 12 possibly the Fentanyl strips might be now
- included. I don't know if something like that
- 14 could be covered through this type of grant if
- we do go ahead and do it. If there's a way to
- 16 find out if that type of funding could be
- 17 covered I'd appreciate it. Thank you.
- 18 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any other
- 19 questions or comments from the legislators?
- 20 Any public comment?
- 21 MS. MEREDAY: You didn't ask for
- 22 any public comment before you took the vote on
- 23 the previous item.
- 24 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Afterwards I
- 25 realized that. I'm sorry.

- MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday.
- 3 Particularly because we are dealing with so
- 4 many situations in the summertime.
- 5 Unfortunately, we always have an uptick with
- 6 DWI. It just saddens me that the initial
- 7 Nassau County Department of Drug and Alcohol
- 8 Addiction, where I actually interned and
- 9 worked years ago, was very instrumental in
- 10 many programs, lifesaving programs,
- 11 particularly the stop DWI program itself, that
- did a lot of work going into the summers
- working with young people and adults with
- 14 regard to addressing the drinking and driving
- 15 issue.
- So, I'm hoping, again, because all
- of you get the access to the information that
- 18 the public does not have access to and
- unfortunately when there's an outcry because
- there are traumatic incidents and accidents
- 21 everybody wants to know what's going on. The
- 22 public really needs to know specifically what
- is coming out of Nassau County as it pertains
- to addressing the drunk driving, the buzzed
- driving, that's impacting and affecting so

- 2 many communities.
- I'm just concerned -- I understand
- 4 cost of living. Again, we pay the second
- 5 highest taxes. I get all that. But I think
- 6 the community and the residents, what I know
- 7 specifically, the programs themselves, the
- 8 support services and with the prior situation
- 9 on the health side with women and children as
- 10 it pertains to black woman and maternal
- 11 health, that is an epidemic crisis that again
- this county does not seem to be addressing in
- 13 facing that. When we're talking about woman
- of color who are dying in child birth
- needlessly in 2022 as well as in this county.
- So again, I'm hoping that the
- 17 public can get more information specifically
- about the programs and services that can save
- 19 lives in these diverse and underserved
- 20 communities and we really need to step up our
- 21 efforts with stop DWI in working with the
- 22 police department because we have an
- 23 exceptional team, we have a great commissioner
- in the police department. But again, they too
- need the resources. They can't always be the

- 2 go-to and the only ones that are responsible.
- 3 Our elected officials, our public officials,
- 4 our community residents we have to come
- 5 together to do a better job to protect the
- 6 lives of our young people, our seniors and
- 7 residents and just try to maintain where we're
- 8 paying and where we're putting our money and
- 9 our funding and our resources. But better
- 10 communicate those resources and information to
- 11 the public. Thank you.
- 12 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you.
- 13 Any other -- Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
- 14 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Just
- in a follow-up to that statement. There is a
- lot of money sitting in the opioid settlement
- that the county has received. We really need
- 18 to work on getting that out to the people that
- 19 need it and disbursing it in a correct way so
- 20 that all communities benefit from it. The
- 21 fact that we're sitting on it is making me --
- 22 I'm having a very hard time with that because
- 23 there are lives involved.
- I have three teenage plus kids and
- there are so many problems going on out

- 2 there. Especially right now -- I know I keep
- 3 bringing up the Fentanyl issue -- but that is
- 4 a whole new game changer. I think the
- 5 education has to be there. I think anything
- 6 we can do to protect our kids, any tools even
- 7 if they're not 100 percent are so necessary.
- 8 So, that money we have to either
- 9 discuss it in some type of committee with
- input from the public or whatever we have to
- do we have to start doing it immediately.
- 12 Because sitting up in one of our bank accounts
- is not helping us. I'd like to see that
- 14 happen.
- 15 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any other
- 16 comments from the legislators? Hearing none,
- 17 all in favor of clerk item 202-22 signify by
- 18 saying aye. Any opposed? Any abstained?
- 19 This will also move on to Finance.
- There's no other business before
- 21 this committee. May I have a motion to
- 22 adjourn. By Legislator Schaefer. Seconded by
- 23 Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton. All in favor of
- 24 adjourning signify by saying aye. We are
- 25 adjourned and Finance is next.
