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LEGISLATOR WALKER: Call the
Health Committee to order and ask the clerk to please take the roll.

MR. PULITZER: Thank you Madam
Chair. Health and Social Services roll call.

MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum ma'am.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: There are two items on the agenda today. Clerk item 199-22 and clerk item 202-22. The first clerk item, 199-22, is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the health department.

May I have a motion please. Moved by Legislator Gaylor. Seconded by Legislator Drucker. How are you? MS. DISIMONE: Ann DiSimone, health department.

There are three items within this 199-22. The first one is a supplemental appropriation in the amount of $\$ 251,400$ for the childhood lead poisoning prevention grant. This grant is funded through New York State Department of Health. Program provides comprehensive services to reduce the prevalence of blood lead levels in children and provide case management services and

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environmental inspections to all children identified as having elevated blood lead levels.

Do you want me to do it separately?

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Do it together.

The second one is a supplemental appropriation in the amount of $\$ 1.7$ million for the WIC, Women and Infant, Children Program. The WIC grant is federally funded. Supplemental nutrition and education program that provides vouchers for foods and infant formula to women, infants and children who qualify under federal financial need guidelines. This program serves over 5,000 clients monthly at two WIC sites. One in Hempstead and one in Glen Cove.

The third item is a supplemental appropriation in the amount of $\$ 670,611$ for the public health emergency preparedness grant. This grant is the Centers for Disease Control funded program administered by the New York State Department of Health. Funds are

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used for local public health infrastructure and emergency response and preparedness. As an additional note for this, this is the grant that really helped us facilitate the quick set up for COVID vaccinations to almost 100,000 residents. Any questions on any of those three items?

LEGISLATOR WALKER: I just a quick question. The first that deals with the issue with lead. How do we stand there? Do we still have high levels?

MS. DISIMONE: Right now
currently we have 231 active childhood lead cases that we're following. About 212 are less than 9.9 and then the rest range in other levels.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Do we try to determine like the cause of this? Is it something in their homes and then we can help that situation in the home or whatever?

MS. DISIMONE: We have teams that go into the home. We have a nurse, lead nurse, and an environmental sanitarian that go in and assess if it's paint, if it's cosmetic,

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if it's some kind of food item to remediate and to try to stop that from happening.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: My other question was on the WIC Program. How do we deal with that especially with the whole formula issue? I know it was a disaster because I have a little grandchild. You were all over the place trying to find formula.

I'm sure that for many of the moms who, you know, are in this WIC Program that really became an issue for all of them.

MS. DISIMONE: I will double check that. I think right now they're okay. They've been getting formula in from other areas. Doctors are giving different formulas to cover but I will double check that before the full leg.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: If we know anyone who might have additional formulas, say the baby finished formula, can we give that to you? I know we had spots where we could drop them off but $I$ don't know if those spots are still available.

MS. DISIMONE: I will check that

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as well.
LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any questions or comments from the legislators? Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
think it's great. I'm just looking at -- all of your items you're really receiving a lot of money from the state. Like almost three and a half million dollars by the time we add all these up and that saves us money here in Nassau County. So thank you for your hard work.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Ann thank you
for being patient. I know it's hard sometimes to sit here and wait when you're later.

MS. DISIMONE: It's all
interesting.
LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you. All in favor of clerk item 199-22 signify by saying aye. Any opposed? Any abstained? That will move on to Finance.

Now we have clerk item 202-22, which is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection

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with the Department of Human Services.
A motion please. By Legislator Schaefer. Seconded by Legislator Drucker. MS. ZAKI: Seema Zaki, the director from the Department of Human Services.

Clerk item 202-22 has two supplemental appropriations. The first item is for $\$ 948,915$ for the Office of Chemical Dependency. It's 100 percent state funded to that existing grant from New York State Office of Addiction Services and Support. The increase is for the purposes of the cost of living to the subcontracted agencies. So it's all 100 percent state funded.

And the second item for $\$ 55,118$ is for Office of Youth Services. It's from New York State Office for Children and Family Services. It is for the purpose of youth support and education and it's 100 percent funded by the state. LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any questions or comments from the legislators? Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.

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LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Thank you for all you do. You are extremely important to us. When you're talking about the item referring to chemical dependency and different support services what type of programs is that?

MS. ZAKI: These are substance abuse and alcohol and substance abuse. Those are the programs that are serviced under this grant. This is an existing grant for the like last 35 years or so. And this is just a cost of living increase. COLA increase. Which when we budgeted we did not have the 2022 stated letter with us so we budgeted less. You will see, legislator, on the back you will see the stated letter, showing that when we budgeted we budgeted for $\$ 21,698,030$. When the 2022 state aid, when we received the 2022 state aid funding it has actually increased by $\$ 948,000$. The total is $\$ 22,646,945$ million. So that's what we are requesting to increase. LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I guess that's one good sign of inflation. We get a little bit of a bigger budget with

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this.
I've been talking to people, legislators on both sides of the aisle. Does this provide for Narcan kits and Narcan training?

MS. ZAKI: I will get back to you with that answer. But this has a vast services. That is part of it.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: It
hasn't passed yet, but we're hopeful that possibly the Fentanyl strips might be now included. I don't know if something like that could be covered through this type of grant if we do go ahead and do it. If there's a way to find out if that type of funding could be covered I'd appreciate it. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any other questions or comments from the legislators? Any public comment?

MS. MEREDAY: You didn't ask for any public comment before you took the vote on the previous item.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Afterwards I realized that. I'm sorry.

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MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday. Particularly because we are dealing with so many situations in the summertime. Unfortunately, we always have an uptick with DWI. It just saddens me that the initial Nassau County Department of Drug and Alcohol Addiction, where I actually interned and worked years ago, was very instrumental in many programs, lifesaving programs, particularly the stop DWI program itself, that did a lot of work going into the summers working with young people and adults with regard to addressing the drinking and driving issue.

So, I'm hoping, again, because all of you get the access to the information that the public does not have access to and unfortunately when there's an outcry because there are traumatic incidents and accidents everybody wants to know what's going on. The public really needs to know specifically what is coming out of Nassau County as it pertains to addressing the drunk driving, the buzzed driving, that's impacting and affecting so
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many communities.
I'm just concerned -- I understand cost of living. Again, we pay the second highest taxes. I get all that. But I think the community and the residents, what $I$ know specifically, the programs themselves, the support services and with the prior situation on the health side with women and children as it pertains to black woman and maternal health, that is an epidemic crisis that again this county does not seem to be addressing in facing that. When we're talking about woman of color who are dying in child birth needlessly in 2022 as well as in this county.

So again, I'm hoping that the public can get more information specifically about the programs and services that can save lives in these diverse and underserved communities and we really need to step up our efforts with stop DWI in working with the police department because we have an exceptional team, we have a great commissioner in the police department. But again, they too need the resources. They can't always be the

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go-to and the only ones that are responsible. Our elected officials, our public officials, our community residents we have to come together to do a better job to protect the lives of our young people, our seniors and residents and just try to maintain where we're paying and where we're putting our money and our funding and our resources. But better communicate those resources and information to the public. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you.
Any other -- Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Just
in a follow-up to that statement. There is a lot of money sitting in the opioid settlement that the county has received. We really need to work on getting that out to the people that need it and disbursing it in a correct way so that all communities benefit from it. The fact that we're sitting on it is making me -I'm having a very hard time with that because there are lives involved.

I have three teenage plus kids and there are so many problems going on out

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there. Especially right now -- I know I keep bringing up the Fentanyl issue -- but that is a whole new game changer. I think the education has to be there. I think anything we can do to protect our kids, any tools even if they're not 100 percent are so necessary. So, that money we have to either discuss it in some type of committee with input from the public or whatever we have to do we have to start doing it immediately. Because sitting up in one of our bank accounts is not helping us. I'd like to see that happen.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Any other comments from the legislators? Hearing none, all in favor of clerk item 202-22 signify by saying aye. Any opposed? Any abstained? This will also move on to Finance.

There's no other business before this committee. May $I$ have a motion to adjourn. By Legislator Schaefer. Seconded by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton. All in favor of adjourning signify by saying aye. We are adjourned and Finance is next.
