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LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I'm going to call the full legislature to order and we are going to reconvene our meeting of August 8th. I'd ask Legislator Ford to lead us in the pledge of allegiance and please remain standing after.

A moment of silence for Kalil Jones who is the son of Dawn Wood Jones who is a member of our Office of Legislative Budget Review. Kalil tragically lost his life at 25 years of age. Please keep Kalil and his mother in your thoughts and prayers. Thank you.

First order of business is a point of personal privilege that all 19 of us are going to join in. This is the final day of our stenographer, Frank Gray, who is retiring. Yes, it is. After 23 years Frank is going to call it a day. Please prepare a resolution barring him from retiring.

Twenty three years is an extraordinary length of service. I'm not sure that anyone will ever do that again or anyone in their right mind anyway. He's been taking

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transcribing our meetings for all of those years. I can't count the number of times that we went late when some people said it was going to be a short meeting. I can't count the numbers of times there were verbal disputes where Frank had to throw his hands up because there were five or six of us yelling at the same time.

He has had to endure filibusters by Legislator Rhoads. Frank has taken down enough hot air that can fill several Hindenburgs.

In all seriousness, Frank, it's been a pleasure to have you. You've been serving us consciously for all those years. You have sat there for hours on end without requiring breaks and you've been there and available whenever we had a meeting or hearing or whatever it was he was doing. We all thank you very much for your service and wish you all the best in your future endeavors.

Minority Leader Abrahams.
LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you
Presiding Officer. Frank, I remember the

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first day $I$ served in the legislature at the old building and you've been a part of our institution from the very beginning. And I guess older guys like Rich and I that have been serving for 20 plus years know the amount of sacrifice you have made. The late night meetings. The times where legislators go on and on. I mean, you're a steward of everything that is good about this institution. I hate to see you go but I know in life it's a part of the times. I know you're looking forward to is it retirement. When you just said yeah do you stenograph that too?

But all in all, Frank, you are a genuine person and you've put this institution first every single time and $I$ just want to wish you the best on behalf of our caucus and the entire legislature for your tremendous amount of service that you've given to this county and more importantly also to this legislative body. But thank you Frank. LEGISLATOR FORD: Frank, I have to say also I remember when I first started

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and we were over at West Street and I think about the marathon of the meetings that we had, especially during budget time when we had a budget hearing on each and every single committee and it gave people an opportunity to drag those hearings out for eight hours, nine hours. And how many times did we sit here until, Kevan, remember, like one o'clock, two o'clock in the morning.

So and your patience and good natureness always came through. God bless you. I can't believe I've been working with you now almost 19 years. We were like young kids at that time.

Just even the fights that people had. I think it actually is the district that Steve Rhoads is in because Dave Dennenberg was another one that really just loved to like carry things on to the end.

Whatever it is you decide to do well deserved. I have to say I don't know what we're going to do without. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Anyone else? If not, you're going to have to tear

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yourself away from that for a moment. We have a presentation.

In terms of the reconvened meeting, I'm going to be calling now calendar numbers 36 through 41 and resolutions 151 through 156 of 2022. These are resolutions authorizing the county attorney to compromise and settle the claims of petitioners as set forth in the actions entitled Fortuna LA L.L.C., Board of Managers at Stratford at North Hills Condominium, Board of Managers of Hamlet East Condominium, Board of Managers of the Wharfside Condominium, Rockaway Realty Associates and Seasons at Mitchell Field. We need a motion and a second. Motion by Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel. Seconded by Minority Leader Abrahams. Any debate or discussion on these items? Went through committees at our last meeting in August. Any public comment? Hearing none, all in favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed? They carry unanimously. Now we have an emergency or was it two? One emergency. Mike, could you call the

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emergency?
MR. PULITZER: Thank you. An emergency resolution declaring an emergency for immediate action upon a local law to amend Section 6-2.2 and 6-2.4 of Title A of Chapter 6 of Chapter 272 of the Nassau County Administrative Code in relation to increasing the maximum income eligibility level for the real property taxation exemption for certain persons with limited income and for persons with disabilities and limited incomes pursuant to Section 467 and 459-C of the real property tax law.

## LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank

 you. We need a motion to establish the emergency. Moved by Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator Drucker. All in favor? Any debate or discussion on the motion? All in favor of establishing the emergency signify by saying aye. Those opposed? The emergency is established. Now I will call the item. Clerk items 286 and 287 of 2022. A local law to amend Section 6-2.2 and Section 6-4.2 of TitleFull - 9-7-22
A of Chapter 6 of Chapter 272 of the Nassau County administrative code in relation to increasing the maximum income eligibility level for real property taxation exemption for certain persons with limited income and persons with disabilities and limited incomes pursuant to Section 467 and 459C of the real property tax law.

Motion by Legislator Rhoads.
Seconded by Legislator Bynoe. The item is before us. This is the action that will opt in to increases in the income levels permitted for the senior citizens and disabled tax exemptions.

Recently the state changed the law to allow localities to opt into increased limits. In particular the minimum amount to be eligible. Actually, you have to have at least under $\$ 50,000$ to be eligible for the exemption. Then there's a sliding scale as you move up. But previously we were limited to providing these exemptions to those earning $\$ 28,000$ or less.

This increases both the limits for

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the senior citizens exemption as well as the exemption for those with disabilities. It does not, however, unfortunately, increase the exemption to what New York City can currently offer. We have been advocating for years now that Nassau County be permitted to increase the income limits up to the same amounts that the city has which $I$ believe is $\$ 58,000$. That may not for the senior citizens, correct? It goes up to 50. The city has a higher number. Check that. But we are increasing the income limits for these two exemptions. Anyone else want to speak to this?

Legislator Rhoads then Minority Leader Abrahams.

LEGISLATOR RHOADS: I couldn't be more excited that this is finally happening. For years we had been decrying the fact that our seniors here in Nassau County and Suffolk County are being treated differently from seniors in the city of New York. We are one of the most expensive places to live. Our residents pay among the highest amount of taxes any place in the state. Really any

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place in the country. And with inflation running rampant, with our economy suffering as a result of the pandemic and the shutdown, any relief we can offer to our seniors is something that we're interested in offering. We have been calling for an increase in the limits since 2019 and it took three years for the state legislature to actually move forward and put our seniors, treat our seniors the same as the seniors in the city of New York. That finally happened when the governor signed the bill about three weeks ago. And while it took the state legislature three years to put our seniors on parity, it's going to take this legislature about three weeks to do the same thing. I'm excited that this is being advanced. I want to thank the presiding officer for moving this ahead so quickly and I'm happy to vote in favor of the bill.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Minority
Leader Abrahams.
LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you Presiding Officer. Again, we are in support

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of the bill for obvious reasons. It's going to be able to help our seniors and our limited income residents and households as well. I think of no -- right now the current thresholds of $\$ 26,000$-- I'm roughing it -- to $\$ 34,000$ is helping generally about 9,000 people. When we are now increasing thresholds to $\$ 50,000$ and $\$ 58,000$ you would think conceivably we will be able to double the amount of people that are eligible. But that's really based off of the applicants that are being asked. So I want to encourage -assuming upon passage of this legislature and the county executive signing this into law -I just want to make sure that we are doing a full court press to make sure residents are aware of the higher incomes than in the past that they should be applying.

I think everyone in this
legislature should be imploring the county executive to use every resource he has to insure that those residents that weren't eligible in the past are aware of these new thresholds so that we can even maybe exceed

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that doubling based off of the income levels alone. But thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I think we will do the same as legislators trying to reach as many people as possible. Maybe not as directed because we would not have access to whom might be eligible. But if we can use social media as well as other means to let people know that they may be eligible for this exemption. As with all exemptions, they have until the end of this year to apply. We will be making that push.

Anyone else? Any public comment? Hearing none, all in favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously.

That was all of our business for the recessed meeting. Now I need a motion to adjourn. Moved by Legislator Ford. Seconded by Legislator Walker. All in favor of adjourning the legislature signify by saying aye. Those opposed? The legislature is adjourned and now we will go right into the Rules Committee.
