LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very much sir. There are four items on the agenda today which are clerk items numbers, 272-22, 273-22, 274-22 and 279-22.

Clerk item number 272-22 is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the district attorney.

May I have a motion.
Moved by Legislator Rhoads.
Seconded by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton. The item is before us. Good afternoon sir.

MR. MCDERMOTT: Good afternoon chairwoman, legislators. Dennis McDermott, assistant district attorney.

This is a supplemental
appropriation. A grant was awarded to the Nassau County District Attorney's Office for their victims' assistance program in the

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amount of $\$ 1.355$ million dollars. It is mostly used for the salaries of the crime victims advocates.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. Any questions or debate from the legislators? Any public comment? I see none. All those in favor of passing this item please signify by saying aye. Opposed? The item passes unanimously.

Clerk Item 273-22 is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the crime victim advocate.

May I have a motion. This is different. Seconded by Legislator Ferretti. So far the item is moved by Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator Ferretti. And the item is before us. Is there anyone here from the administration?

MS. DIEHL: Jeanine Diehl, executive director of the Office of Crime Victim Advocate.

I'm presented item 273-22. We are respectfully requesting the approval of a

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supplemental appropriation in the amount of $\$ 505,183.68$ in funds received from the New York State Office of Victims Services, victims of crime at grant.

This funding is to enhance the existing support services provided by the Office of Crime Victim Advocate that need the immediate and long term needs of victims and witnesses of crime in Nassau.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. Any debate or discussion? Yes, Legislator Mule. LEGISLATOR MULE: I have a question. So, do these two grants work in tandem with each other or are they different offices? Can you help me to understand?

MS. DIEHL: It is the same grant but they are mutually exclusive to each respective office.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Anyone else?
Any public comment?
MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday. I'm definitely in support of this grant and it's an unfortunate scenario that we do have to provide. But I'm just curious as to what

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types of recommendations are presented I guess at the end of the year with regard to the efforts to actually reduce the number of crime victims that we have in terms of any type of research or statistics that could be incorporated into possibly police enforcement, community outreach and support services.

I think we need to look start
looking at where we can go with the long term with this type of situation so that we can reduced the rate of attacks that are happening on various constituencies, ethnic groups, etcetera, with the rise in divisiveness that we are currently experiencing. Just hopeful that we're looking at that type of reporting and whoever may be getting that information and all of you should be getting access to that information and any recommendations from that department or agency that's monitoring that.

Because public comment is something that clearly I don't take lightly but unfortunately it doesn't seem like the comments from the public or the impacted

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communities seems to be getting across in the types of legislation and resources that can be most beneficial for them. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very much. And it is something that we should note and look to see because it's important to reduce crime. Less victims. Thank you.

All those in favor of passing this item please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The item passes unanimously. Thank you.

Clerk item 274-22 is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the traffic safety board.

May I have a motion. Moved by Legislator Bynoe. Seconded by Legislator Mule. The item is before us. Who is here from the administration to speak on this item?

MR. ARNOLD: Good afternoon. Ken Arnold, Public Works. So, 274 is a supplemental appropriation to increase funding associated with a change in the VTL where they

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added a surcharge to parking violations associated with handicapped parking. LEGISLATOR FORD: So this would be that -- so then we're going to increase the fee by $\$ 30$ ? Would this be certain types of parking?

MR. ARNOLD: The VTL, the state put a $\$ 30$ increase on those violations and it's a pass-through. That $\$ 30$ half goes to physically challenged, half goes to the traffic safety board. And this supplemental is associated with the traffic safety board piece, which my department manages. So we're just increasing money that we'll receive associated with that.

LEGISLATOR FORD: But it will be a pass-through?

MR. ARNOLD: Yes. And then we go around and we program it with education, whatever we end up doing with this.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. Any
debate or discussion? Any public comment? I see none. All those in favor of passing this item please signify by saying aye. Any

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opposed? The item passes unanimously thank you.

Clerk item 279-22 is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the medical examiner's office.

May I have a motion. Moved by
Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator
Pilip. The item is before us. Good afternoon.

MS. DOOLING: Karen Dooling, assistant director crime lab.

There are two grants before you. The first is a federal NIJ grant passed through New York State, no match, in the amount of $\$ 54,656$. Funding is used for overtime to work cases associated with the opioid crisis and also general lab funding to support our laboratory information management system for upgrades and maintenance.

The second grant before you is a New York State DCJS grant. \$504,885. It's a no match. And this is for overtime for the rest of the disciplines, equipment, supplies

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and instruments, maintenance contracts and calibrations to support lab case work and our quality control program.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Do you want to tell us about the second one as well?

MS. DOOLING: I went through the two of them.

LEGISLATOR FORD: I'm sorry. We have a question from Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I was just wondering what the status of the lab. Where are you today?

MS. DOOLING: The status of the lab is we currently have all of our disciplines up and running. We have chemistry controlled substance, biology, which is DNA, firearms. Which we were recently accredited in this year is up and running. And also latent prints. So, the lab is doing well. There is basically no more outsourcing to NMS unless it's a specific type of case that are few and far between that the lab doesn't do analysis on because it wouldn't be cost

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effective to validate and keep that particular technique online.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: So
that's great. So basically all of the different specialties are now being addressed in-house?

MS. DOOLING: Yes. Except for
trace analysis.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
That's good news. Thank you very much. So, what would you say the caseload would be? Do you feel that you're adequately -- like as far as your employees and budget?

MS. DOOLING: So, I would imagine like any other department in the county we certainly could use more staffing. Budget, right now we're doing fairly well in managing our budget and managing to get by. Staffing, we could definitely use some staffing.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: The turnaround is also adequate?

MS. DOOLING: Turnaround times are increasing because we have seen a large increase in the number of cases coming into

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the laboratory. About half way through the year, this last year we saw as many items submitted as of all of last year.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Wow. Hello. So, you're saying that the numbers have increased significantly. In what areas are you finding the higher rates?

MS. DOOLING: Our drug caseload has increased significantly. We just took on firearms. So that has increased our work load considerably. And we're getting more criminal possession of weapons cases. CPW cases. Which also has increased our caseload.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: So what role do you play in criminal possession of firearms? The fingerprints? The latent? MS. DOOLING: Latent prints and sometimes DNA analysis.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: And then the increase in drugs is Fentanyl?

MS. DOOLING: The increase in drugs is --

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Drugs period.
MS. DOOLING: The drug world is

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always just increasing. New types of drug evidence. Opioids, Fentanyl.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Okay. That goes along with the, unfortunately, with the trend that we've been seeing and hearing about.

MS. DOOLING: Yes. Thank you.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
would hope -- we did receive money from the opioid settlement and $I$ wonder if there's a way to use some of that for our lab. I would love to see, $I$ don't know if there's a way to research that, but it's just something as a legislator, I'm not even asking you directly, but I think it's something that the county should look into. If can fund you directly to help with you that money $I$ think it would be money well spent.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Do the
employees that work there like the lab technicians, I'm sorry that $I$ don't know the actual title, do they have specialties? Are ones trained just to do firearms? Ones just to do drugs? Or is it that any lab technician

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can work on any type of discipline?
MS. DOOLING: You're correct the way you stated it the first time. It's not like you see on TV CSI. One person doesn't do all those specialties. If you're a firearms examiner that's your specialty. If you're a biologist then that's your specialty. So there really is no cross-discipline interaction. That's because of our accreditation standards. We spend a lot of time making sure people are competent in those disciplines but they also have to take proficiency tests and there are all sorts of other requirements to allow them to do work in those particular disciplines.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Do you know offhand do you have an active list that you can like from a test you can hire the people? Because I'm wondering what is the age of a lot of the lab technicians? Are any of them close to retirement? I know this is a budget question but I'm curious.

MS. DOOLING: Our title series
are forensic scientists. We hire people as

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trainees and the scientist position goes from a trainee all the way up to a forensic scientist four. Who's usually the supervisor and the technical lead of the discipline.

The titles are noncompetitive. And we get lots of applicants. You know, Nassau County residents. And they're generally individuals that have just graduated from college or have a masters. Have to have a science degree. And depending on the discipline the requirements are specific for a discipline. You need certain courses for biology. Certain things for chemistry. But there are a lot of nice programs, nice forensic programs even within Nassau County itself. CW Post has a great program and Hofstra has a great forensics program. LEGISLATOR FORD: Glad to hear that. Legislator Mule.

LEGISLATOR MULE: You mentioned I think it was firearms. Has that just come online? Is that why there's an increase in the number of cases? Because you've taken on this discipline and so that has caused the

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number of cases to increase? Did I understand that correctly?

MS. DOOLING: We did increase our caseload partially because of firearms. But all of our other disciplines have seen an increase in caseload. Especially in the chemistry section.

LEGISLATOR MULE: Thank you.
LEGISLATOR FORD: Anyone else?
Any public comment? I see none. All those in favor of passing this item please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The item passes unanimously.

Just to let everyone know, it was passed by Legislator Rhoads because I don't think I spoke into the mic and it was seconded by Legislator Pilip. Just in case so that we have it on record and everybody knows. Thank you very much.
