19	These are resolutions authorizing the
20	Commission of Shared Services to execute
21	a purchase order or to approve additional
22	funding for a blanket purchase order
23	between the County and Focus Camera, Chef
24	Minute Meals, Sterling Corporation, Blue
25	Marlin Boats.
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ī	RULES COMMITTEE 12.05.2022
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2	E-117, E-131. E-132, E-133, E-134,
3	E-135, E-136, E-138. These are
4	resolutions authorizing the County
5	Executive to execute personal services
6	agreements or amendments to personal
7	services agreements between the County
8	and Maximum Associates, New York State
9	Industries for the Disabled, Tyler
10	Technologies, Abrams Fensterman, 1
11	Security Services, Rainbow Sound, Inc.,
12	Brownfield Development Solutions, Inc.,
13	and Skudin Swim.
14	Motion by Deputy Presiding Officer
15	Kopel, seconded by Minority Leader
16	Abrahams. So those contracts are before
17	us.
18	Also, we need a motion to suspend
19	the Rules. Legislator Bynoe makes that
20	motion seconded by Legislative Schaefer.
21	All in favor of suspending Rules, signify
22	by saying aye.
23	(Whereupon, all members of
24	the Rules Committee respond in
25	favor.)

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2	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Those opposed?
3	(Whereupon, no verbal
4	response.)
5	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Motion carries
6	unanimously.
7	And then I'm going to call this
8	additional contract so that it's on a
9	list of contracts to be discussed:
10	E-137 resolution ratifying the
11	Commission of Shared Services award and
12	the County Executive's execution of
13	personal services agreement between the
14	County and a cyber security vendor.
15	All right. So all those before us, a
16	couple of them, have to be tabled. Motion
17	by Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel,
18	seconded by Minority Leader Abrahams,
19	that was E-137 to put that before us.
20	The following contracts have to be
21	tabled: A-41 of 2022, Blue Marlin Boats
22	and E-117 of 2022 Maximus Associates
23	Security Services. Blue Marlin Boats, my
24	understanding is that the AG is still
25	gathering data, and Maximum Associates,

3	resolving an issue with the CSEA.
4	Motion to table by Minority Leader
5	Abrahams, seconded by Deputy Presiding
6	Officer Kopel. All in favor of tabling,
7	signify by saying aye.
8	(Whereupon, all members of
9	the Rules Committee respond in
10	favor.)
11	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Those opposed.
12	(Whereupon, no verbal
13	response.)
14	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Those two are
15	tabled.
16	So let's start with Emergency
17	Management and Chef Minute Meals A-35.
18	MR. DELANEY: Good afternoon.
19	Thomas Delaney, OEM. Item A-35-22 for
20	the purchase of emergency meals that are
21	going to be used in case we need to open
22	up sheltering. They'll be stockpiled in
23	our climate controlled warehouse. This
24	\$161,400 purchase is 100% grant funded.
25	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: The notes
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	RULES COMMITTEE 12.05.2022
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2	indicate that the County has a unique
3	agreement with the vendor in which they
4	agree to take back at reduced price their
5	soon-to-be expired products; is that
6	accurate?
7	MR. DELANEY: That is true. FEMA
8	does not want us to throw away what's
9	called critical emergency supplies when
10	they reach their end-of-life. You know,
11	as such, when we have a stockpile of
12	bottled water, before that expires, we've
13	got a use for it, the Marathon; we handed
14	it out there. We're not throwing it away.
15	The meals, it's not so easy. We ran into
16	a problem years ago where, I don't like
17	to say fortunately, but there was an
18	Earthquake in Haiti, and they took meals
19	that we had that we're going to expire.
20	This relieves me of that problem.
21	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: That's great.
22	Any other questions? Legislator Bynoe.
23	LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you,
24	Presiding Officer. Mr. Delaney, could
25	you tell me the shelf life on those
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[RULES COMMITTEE 12.05.2022
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2	meals?
3	MR. DELANEY: The shelf life on
4	these is approximately four years, but
5	we're going to again give them back to
6	the vendor before they expire.
7	LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Perfect. Thank
8	you.
9	MR. DELANEY: Thank you.
10	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any other
11	questions?
12	(Whereupon, no verbal
13	response.)
14	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Okay. Thank
15	you.
16	MR. DELANEY: Thank you.
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1	RULES COMMITTEE 12.05.2022
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3	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: E-131, Contract
4	with the New York State Industries for
5	the Disabled Social Services.
6	DEPUTY COMMISSIONER CARMENATY: Good
7	afternoon and thank you for having us.
8	Deputy Commissioner Rudy Carmenaty from
9	the Department of Social Services. This
10	is an imaging contract for a mandated
11	service for the State of New York and I
12	have with me Sharon Lucidi to give you
13	the details.
14	MS. LUCIDI: Good afternoon. This
15	contract is to allow us to continue the
16	imaging process that we have been doing
17	at DSS for clients' records. They are
18	imaged and they're stored. We are looking
19	into doing a new process with New York
20	State to have them hold our repository of
21	images. It would share information
22	between counties of the State so that, as
23	people move, their services can go with
24	them and it would allow us to eventually
25	shred the documents.

4	LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Hi. So they sign
5	a disclosure that would allow for us to
6	share the information with the State?
7	MS. LUCIDI: It's the State OTDA.
8	LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you.
9	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any other
10	questions?
11	(Whereupon, no verbal
12	response.)
13	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thank you very
14	much.
15	MS. LUCIDI: Thank you, sir.
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]	RULES COMMITTEE 12.05.2022
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2	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Information
3	Technology E-132 2022, contract with
4	Tyler Technologies.
5	DEPUTY COMMISSIONER JACOVINA: Good
6	afternoon, Joe Jacovina, Deputy
7	Commissioner, Information Technology.
8	This amendment is to authorize an
9	increase in the maximum amount of the
10	contract with Tyler Technology, Inc.
11	\$544,416, the purchase amount needed to
12	purchase, install, implement, and
13	maintain the mobile version of the Nassau
14	County FireCom computer-aided dispatch.
15	The software is known as Crew Force.
16	In addition, the amendment exercises
17	the County's option to extend the
18	contract and date by two years. Amendment
19	will also encumber \$450,000 upon
20	execution of funds that would be covered
21	by a Federal grant.
22	The FireCom Crew Force module
23	provides emergency responders mobile
24	access to critical data captured at
25	centralized dispatch locations. This
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2	real-time information is provided to the
3	responders prior to their arrival at the
4	scene. Mobile access is facilitated by
5	Ipads and mobile phones. I'll be happy to
6	answer any questions.
7	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: I see that you
8	have Chief Uttaro behind you. If you
9	could add little bit of detail.
10	CHIEF UTTARO: Sure, thank you. Just
11	a quick synopsis of what the system does
12	so you have a better understanding. The
13	Tyler Crew force, which will be
14	accessible on MDTs, which is mobile data
15	terminals which you see in police cars
16	and fire vehicles, also police
17	ambulances, fire trucks. It's also on
18	mobile device, smart phones, phones,
19	tablets, etcetera. So it's going to be
20	providing a link, finally, between the 71
21	volunteer fire departments and the six
22	ambulance cores that serve Nassau County.
23	It is a countywide technology that we've
24	never had before.
25	It will permit units utilizing GPS
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2	locators to identify available duty crews
3	and in-service ambulances, engine
4	companies, ladders, rescues, so that
5	during countywide emergencies or local
6	emergencies like a structure fire or
7	battalion area incident, the incident
8	commander can view on this source what
9	assets are nearby and what can get their
10	fastest.
11	It will allow the 71 fire
12	departments and six ambulance cores and
13	all PD ambulances the ability to see all
14	call activity within the Nassau County
15	Fire Service dispatching system,
16	including the primary dispatch agency,
17	which you guys know as Fire Com, and the
18	20 independent fire dispatch agencies
19	which currently dispatch other
20	departments. So it's going to basically
21	bridge and network all of them together.
22	A more advanced user will allow
23	dispatch agencies to receive turn-by-turn
24	directions, call narratives from the
25	dispatcher, and even change in their

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2	status from en route to on scene.
3	It will also allow responding units
4	to clear themselves from a call and get
5	ready for another call. So it's yet
6	another thing that if someone gets mutual
7	aid from New Hyde Park to Westbury, the
8	New Hyde Park unit will get turn-by-turn
9	instructions and hydro information, stuff
10	that they couldn't get before when
11	they're responding to assist another
12	department.
13	Additionally, the data can be shared
14	with the County Police Department's
15	Communications Bureau and Emergency
16	Ambulance Bureau. We're working on
17	policies and procedures right now with
18	the fire service to get this
19	interoperability shared service off the
20	ground.
21	In closing, it's what we see in this
22	world and as a county where neighboring
23	departments no longer need to make phone
24	calls, switch radio frequencies to
25	communicate, evaluate situations, and
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2	mutually aid their counterparts without
3	having to go through the old, antiquated
4	system which causes delays.
5	With this vision, the fire
6	dispatchers will have a clearer picture
7	than ever before to respond to calls
8	quicker than they have in the past. The
9	most important part is this great
10	project. It's about safety. There is
11	proof that this solution can provide
12	quicker response times and, therefore,
13	safer communities.
14	So I appreciate all the work that's
15	gone into this and I think this is going
16	to be a big game changer to the volunteer
17	fire service.
18	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: That's great.
19	All sounds fantastic. Any questions?
20	(Whereupon, no verbal
21	response.)
22	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thanks again.
23	Could you provide the notes that you were
24	reading from for our staff?
25	CHIEF UTTARO: Yes, absolutely.

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2	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Okay. Thank you
3	very much.
4	CHIEF UTTARO: Thank you.
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	RULES COMMITTEE 12.05.2022
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2	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Next contract
3	is with the County Attorney's Office and
4	Abrams Fensterman E-133.
5	MR. LIBERT: Good afternoon
6	legislators, Brian Libert from the County
7	Attorney's Office. This is a contract
8	with the law firm of Abrams & Fensterman.
9	The predominant case on this contract is
10	asbestos. The staff summary references a
11	few other cases. Because of some
12	transitions at the firm, there are other
13	matters mentioned there. To my
14	understanding, all of those are long
15	since complete. So the only active thing
16	at the moment is asbestos, and when that
17	is complete, that will also be the last
18	case. So my belief is this is the final
19	amendment.
20	Happy to answer any questions about
21	any of that.
22	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thank you,
23	Brian, any questions on this?
24	(Whereupon, no verbal
25	response.)

3	MR. LIBERT: Thank you.

3	Services, E-136 Brownfield Redevelopment
4	Solutions.
5	DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MALHAME: Good
6	afternoon Allison Malhame, Deputy
7	Commissioner of Shared Services.
8	This contract is for grant research
9	and writing services for all county
10	departments. Brownfield Development
11	Solutions is a certified women-owned
12	business enterprise that employs
13	proprietary software to track grant
14	opportunities. They will notify the
15	appropriate County departments of grants
16	that they may be interested in pursuing
17	and, if accepted by the Department,
18	complete all sections of the grant
19	application.
20	This is a three-year contract with
21	the option to renew for an additional
22	three years. Fees are payable on an
23	hourly basis, with maximum cost per task
24	capped. The maximum amount of the initial
25	contract is \$267,000. Thank you.
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	RULES COMMITTEE 12.05.2022
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2	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Just a quick
3	question: Often you see with these grant
4	writing contracts the compensation will
5	be based on a percentage of what they are
6	able to achieve. So the administration
7	feels that this is a better way to go
8	forward with this grant writer in
9	particular?
10	DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MALHAME: Yes.
11	This contract is structured so that
12	there's, as I mentioned, there is a
13	maximum amount for each type of grant
14	that they write for. For example, major
15	Federal grants, I believe, is capped at
16	15,000, a regular Federal grant at 5,000,
17	State grants grants at three, but those
18	are maximum amounts. It's billed hourly;
19	it could be less.
20	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: All right,
21	another questions?
22	(Whereupon, no verbal
23	response.)
24	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Okay. Police
25	department. First contract is A-30 of
24	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Okay. Police

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2	2022 with Focus Cameras.
3	DEPUTY INSPECTOR MURPHY: Good
4	afternoon, Deputy Inspector Tom Murphy,
5	the police department.
6	This is to utilize the purchase of
7	camera equipment to be utilized by our
8	Crime Search Unit. It's to bring up the
9	technology advance to be more efficient
10	in answering to the new discovery.
11	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any questions
12	on this?
13	(Whereupon, no verbal
14	response.)
15	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Let's go to the
16	second one with the Police Department,
17	with Sterling Corporation A-37.
18	DEPUTY INSPECTOR MURPHY: This a
19	request to raise our contract with
20	sterling from up to one million dollars.
21	Previously, we had a \$300,000 contract
22	with them, which allowed us to have
23	approximately \$95,000 a year. With the
24	rising cost of parts, we are asking for
25	additional funds preemptively, not that

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2	we are going to use them, but should a
3	problem arise, we want to make sure we
4	have a cushion to have additional monies.
5	This will be in the ongoing three year
6	contract we have with Sterling.
7	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any questions
8	on this one?
9	(Whereupon, no verbal
10	response.)
11	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: My backup says
12	that we have three helicopters: One is 15
13	years old, the other are two and seven
14	years old.
15	DEPUTY INSPECTOR MURPHY: Yeah, the
16	one that oldest one we use for training,
17	and the other additional are seven years
18	old. They're all in tiptop condition
19	right now. Air worthy, mission worthy.
20	Want to make sure that should something
21	go wrong, we would have the money to
22	replace.
23	A simple one piece tail rotor is now
24	up to \$56,000 just for one. Each of
25	those helicopters has four. So if
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[RULES COMMITTEE 12.05.2022
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2	something should go bad, we don't want to
3	have a helicopter go down for six to
4	eight months, while we're waiting for the
5	funds to replace these rising costs in
6	parts.
7	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: That's a great
8	explanation. Thanks. Minority Leader
9	Abrahams.
10	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you,
11	Presiding Officer. This is a general
12	question. Are there any other
13	municipalities, any other police
14	departments that have helicopters?
15	DEPUTY INSPECTOR MURPHY: Multiple.
16	Suffolk County.
17	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: In Nassau.
18	Smaller police departments; Hempstead,
19	Freeport?
20	DEPUTY INSPECTOR MURPHY: No.
21	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Okay. Thank
22	you.

3	are with the Parks Department. First one
4	would be E-134, with Priority-1 Security
5	Services.
6	COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Good afternoon
7	Darcy Belyea, Parks Commissioner. This is
8	an amendment to a personal services
9	agreement that was executed and approved
10	in 2020 with the vendor providing
11	security at various county parks and for
12	events. This amendment increases the
13	maximum amount authorized for the second
14	year of the contract by \$4,087.42 in
15	order to satisfy the balance owed to the
16	vendor. These funds are paid out of the
17	Hotel/Motel Tax Grant Program and this
18	amendment will also terminate the
19	agreement effective September 30, 2022,
20	which has been mutually agreed upon by
21	both the vendor and the County, because
22	they can't provide the services to us at
23	the rate that they proposed in their RFP
24	and there's no way to adjust that hourly
25	rate.

3	on this one?
4	(Whereupon, no verbal
5	response.)
6	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: All right,
7	very good to go to the next one.
8	COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Rainbow
9	Sounds, E-135-22 is an amendment to a
10	personal services agreement between the
11	County and Rainbow Sounds Inc from May 1,
12	2021, terminating on September 30, 2026.
13	Rainbow Sound provides sound,
14	backlight, and production assistance for
15	high level concerts at the Lakeside
16	Theatre serving as a support for our
17	mobile operations team. Due to the high
18	level of some of our acts, we needed to
19	use Rainbow an increased number of times.
20	So as a result we are seeking to increase
21	the annual maximum amount authorized from
22	\$25,000 to \$75,000 and this annual amount
23	is funded through the Hotel/Motel Tax
24	Grant Program. This amendment will also
25	add a cancellation policy to the

2	agreement. The existing agreement does
3	not provide for cancellation due to
4	weather or other act and the vendor
5	expected the County this summer to pay a
6	full invoice for an amount that we had
7	cancelled in excess of 24 hours even if
8	the services are not provided, which to
9	me that didn't sit well. So we are
10	negotiating cancellation clause of
11	reduced fee in the event that we don't
12	cancel within a 24 hour period, which of
13	course we would seek to do that.
14	CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any questions
15	on this one? Legislator Deriggi-Whitton.
16	LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Just as
17	far as the prior one, with the security,
18	what do you plan on doing going forward?
19	COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Hopefully,
20	this Committee will hear in January a
21	replacement contract.
22	LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: And
23	then you still have funds left over from
24	this, because this was a five-year
25	contract?

4	only used \$40,000. So you still have
5	some.

11	COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Yes.

20	COMMISSIONER BELYEA: E-138-22 Parks
21	seeking to amend a contract for services
22	between the County and Skudin Swim Inc.

24	15, 2017. I'm seeking to exercise this
25	second and final renewal option. Skudin

2	Swim will provide the County with a
3	mechanism to keep Nassau County Aquatic
4	Center open and staffed during the winter
5	seasonal period of January 1st to March
6	15, 2023. The amendment term will end on
7	March 15, 2023 and we are seeking to add
8	an additional \$42,000 in funds to this
9	amendment, which is in line with the pay
10	increases that the previous
11	administration gave to County lifeguards.
12	Skudin will assume responsibility,
13	under our oversight, for lifeguarding and
14	first-aid services at the Aquatics Center
15	for a 10 week period.

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
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
