CHAIRMAN GAYLOR: Thank you. So we have one item on the agenda today, which is Clerk Item 44-23.

Number 44-23 is a Resolution authorizing the County Executive to execute an amendment to an agreement with the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation in relation to the New York State Septic System Replacement program.

May I have a motion? Moved by
Legislator Schaefer, seconded by
Legislator Giuffre. The item is before
us. I see we have Commissioner Arnold at
the podium. The floor is all yours.

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Thank you.

Good afternoon. Ken Arnold, Commissioner

of Public Works.

Item 44-23 is an amendment to an agreement with the New York State

Environmental Facilities Corporation for grant funds associated with the installation of septic tank systems on private properties. This is the third grant received totaling \$2.03 million, bringing the total cap to \$4.03 million for this contract. The County is also contributing funds to ARP. Currently, we have approved \$5 million for that.

I'm here for any questions.

CHAIRMAN GAYLOR: Okay. Just a couple of questions. Do you know how much money we've already spent on this program to homeowners?

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: I know we sent that over. Let me look it up (perusing). So we've spent. We've spent \$836,000 in total for both ARP and EFC funding.

CHAIRMAN GAYLOR: That's good. And do we have a program to get the word out to the homeowners? Is there a Public Relations campaign to let them know, replace your old septic and you're eligible for the grant money?

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Yes, we do. We have a contract with the Soil and Water Conservation District who's managing this for the department. They do quite a bit of outreach both industry conventions, social media, attending different meetings with officials. So they are pushing that that message.

CHAIRMAN GAYLOR: And I guess just because I don't know, how does one apply for these funds for this grant application? Is it similar to going online and making a request or --

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: We have an online portal that's on the Public Works website. I can get you the information. I think it's just a link on the website.

But any resident can go to the website and get on the portal that way.

CHAIRMAN GAYLOR: And that's the Department of Public Works website?

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Let me confirm, I don't -- it may not be the DPW. Let me double check that. I know

Lookout applied for it, we would say no to them. But I know this is for enhanced septic treatment. So I think there's a limitation on the amount of property you need to do that. Point Lookout might be problematic for some certain homeowners, but I don't believe that we are denying anybody because of the location. It's anybody that's using septic that we would take an application from.

LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Okay. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Ken, I just want to thank you. This has made a huge difference. I think 90% of Nassau is sewers and out of the 10% that's not, I think 90% are in my area. So I appreciate it, and Legislator Lafazan.
