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CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Good afternoon. At this time, I will call the Public Safety Committee to order and I will ask the Clerk to call the roll.

CLERK PULITZER: Thank you, Ma'am. Public Safety Committee roll call.

Legislator Debra Mule?

LEGISLATOR MULE: Here.

CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Siela Bynoe?

CLERK PULITZER: Thank you. Ranking Member Delia DeRiggi-Whitton?

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Here.

CLERK PULITZER: We have a quorum,
Ma'am.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you very
much.

There are two items on the agenda
today which are Clerk Item numbers 264-23
and 268-23.

Clerk Item number 264-23 is an
ordinance supplemental to the annual
appropriation ordinance in connection
with the Medical Examiner. May I have a
motion?

Moved by Legislator Bynoe, seconded
by Legislator McKevitt.

The item is before us. Good
afternoon.

MS. DOOLING: Good afternoon. Karen
Dooling, Assistant Director of Crime Lab
for Medical Examiner's office. The item
before you consists of three different
grants. Two are for the Toxicology
Laboratory and one is for the Crime Lab.

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The first, for the Toxicology Lab, is the 2023/2024 Highway Traffic Safety Grant and the amount of \$36,000. It's a federal pass-through; no match. It's used to support alcohol and drug testing and suspected DWI cases.

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The second grant is the 2023/2024 New York State Aide to Lab Grant. One is for the Toxicology Laboratory. That's the amount of \$2,108.

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The other is for the Crime Lab \$504,885, and that grant is used to support accreditation and operations, enhance the effectiveness and the efficiency of lab testing, and also used for reoccurring accreditation costs.

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CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you.

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I just want to go back to the \$36,000 in regard to the DWI, drug and alcohol testing. Are you able to like, determine the amount of drugs that are in a person's body? I know with alcohol you could determine an alcoholic level. But how about drugs? Is there -- or do you

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just look at the presence of them?

MS. DOOLING: So I know the drugs are compared to certain standards. Since I'm not a tox (sic) person, I'm not going to get into the Crime Lab aspect. I believe they can quantitate the amount in blood and that's what the Toxicology Lab works with. They work in blood levels.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you.

Any debate or discussion?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: No. Any public comment?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: I see none. Thank you very much.

MS. DOOLING: Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Okay.

(Whereupon, all members of the Public Safety Committee

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respond in favor with, "Aye".)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: The item passes
unanimously.

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CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Clerk Item number 268-23 is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the Correctional Center. May I have a motion?

Moved by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton, seconded by Legislator Pilip.

The item is before us. Good afternoon.

MS. HALL: Good afternoon, Legislators. Narda Hall, Correctional Center.

Item 268-23 is a supplemental appropriation request for Asset Forfeiture Funding and GIV award.

The Asset Forfeiture is for \$184,916 to be received from the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency deposited with the County Treasurer. The amount and timing of the receipt of the funds is dependent on the amount of seizure as well as completion of pending investigations and convictions. The funding will be used for canine handlers expenses, training

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equipment, kennels fencing,
transportation, food, veterinary services
et cetera.

The Gun Involved Violence
elimination program (GIV), is for
\$35,769. Funding is received from the New
York State Division of Criminal Justice
Services. The grant focuses on reducing
violent crimes through coordination with
the federal, state and local Criminal
Justice agencies. The funds will be used
for overtime, training, investigations,
information sharing and meetings for the
Gang Intelligence Unit. It is for a
period of July 1, 2023 through June 30,
2024.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Any questions or
discussion?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: No. I see none.
Any public comment?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

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CHAIRWOMAN FORD: No. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Opposed?

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: The item passes unanimously.

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CHAIRWOMAN FORD: There is an addendum to this Agenda.

May I have a motion to suspend the Rules?

Moved by Legislator Pilip, seconded by Legislator McKeivitt.

All those in favor, please signify by saying, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Public Safety Committee respond in favor with, "Aye".)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: The Rules have been suspended.

There is one item on the Addendum today, Clerk Item number 270-23.

Clerk Item 270-23 is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the Probation Department. May I have a motion?

Moved by Legislator Mule, seconded by Legislator Bynoe.

The item is before us. Good afternoon.

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MR. LANDSMAN: Good afternoon, members. Douglas Landsman, Probation Accountant.

The Item before you, 270-23 is for our annual GIV grant for one year, July to June, in the amount to \$400,000. This grant has been in existence for 10 years, serves an important role in trying to remove guns and other weapons from our streets and control gun violence. GIV's goal is to reduce shootings and homicides by promoting integrated evidenced-based strategies that look to reduce crime in neighborhoods.

While coordinating with the County PD, our team is comprised of six probation personnel. It's a combination of GIV gang officers, supervisors and an assistant deputy director overseeing operations.

The grant provides partial reimbursements for salaries, fringe, OT for surveillance, GPS monitoring, software for background checks, and a

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small amount for training travel expenses.

The second Item that we have for this 270-23; this item is our annual STSJP grant or Supervision and Treatment Services For Juveniles Program. This is the RTA portion of it. It's a one year, October to September, in the amount of \$635,000. It is 100% reimbursable.

This grant has been in existence for over 10 years. It is part of the Governor's initiative for Juvenile Justice Reform. The targeted population is youth who are alleged juvenile delinquents (JD) and youth adjudicated to be Persons in Need of Supervision (PINS).

The purpose of RTA, Raise the Age, in which children are prosecuted as adults in the New York State Court system. This is designed to give them a chance at a clean record for the future. This grant covers family court appearance officers' overtime, (CBI) Cognitive-based Behavioral Therapy Interactive

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Journaling, and, finally, a Peer
Diversion Program as well.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: So the New York
State Office of Children and Family
Services, when you're talking about the
juvenile delinquents, is that those up to
the age of 18 that this covers, or is it
for the younger children?

MS. REYER: Arianne Reyer, Counsel
for the Department of Probation. Good
afternoon.

A juvenile delinquent is anyone 17
and younger for certain crimes. Some 16
and 17-year-olds who are charged with
violent felonies are not considered
juvenile delinquents, but it could be
anyone 17 and under.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: All right. Any
questions?

Legislator Bynoe.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you.

Good to see you. I have a lot of
questions, but I'm not going to do that
to you today, tons of them.

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MS. REYER: That's alright. I'm ready. Let's go.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: I just like to know: Year to year, has this grant increased or has it stayed flat? Both grants? And I'm particularly interested in the grant that allows for the GPS surveillance.

MR. LANDSMAN: GPS occurs both on the regular stip and on the RTA portion.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: So I'm wondering whether the grant has increased.

MR. LANDSMAN: It's basically the same.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Are we using it a little bit more than we had been in the past?

MS. REYER: We are using it much more than we have in the past. So I think that with a decrease in detention, there has been an increase in electronic monitoring. So that is both in the juvenile world and everywhere else within the criminal justice system.

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LEGISLATOR BYNOE: I'm just wondering whether the State has kept up with funding us appropriately, given the fact that this has increased.

MS. REYER: Well, I'll just say that our funding has not increased and our use has increased considerably.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: As I thought; as I thought. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Anyone else?

(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Okay, thank you very much.

MR. LANDSMAN: Thank you.

MS. REYER: Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: All those in favor of passing this item, please signify by saying, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of the Public Safety Committee respond in favor with, "Aye".)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Opposed?
