CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Good afternoon. At this time, I will call the Public Safety Committee to order and I will ask the Clerk to call the roll.

CLERK PULITZER: Thank you, Ma'am. Public Safety Committee roll call.

3 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Here.

4 CLERK PULITZER: We have a quorum,
5 Ma'am.

6 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you very
7 much.

8 There are two items on the agenda
9 today which are Clerk Item numbers 264-23
10 and 268-23.

11 Clerk Item number 264-23 is an
12 ordinance supplemental to the annual
13 appropriation ordinance in connection
14 with the Medical Examiner. May I have a
15 motion?

16 Moved by Legislator Bynoe, seconded
17 by Legislator McKevitt.

18 The item is before us. Good
19 afternoon.

20 MS. DOOLING: Good afternoon. Karen
21 Dooling, Assistant Director of Crime Lab
22 for Medical Examiner's office. The item
23 before you consists of three different
24 grants. Two are for the Toxicology
25 Laboratory and one is for the Crime Lab.

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2 The first, for the Toxicology Lab,
3 is the 2023/2024 Highway Traffic Safety
4 Grant and the amount of \$36,000. It's a
5 federal pass-through; no match. It's used
6 to support alcohol and drug testing and
7 suspected DWI cases.

8 The second grant is the 2023/2024
9 New York State Aide to Lab Grant. One is
10 for the Toxicology Laboratory. That's the
11 amount of \$2,108.

12 The other is for the Crime Lab
13 \$504,885, and that grant is used to
14 support accreditation and operations,
15 enhance the effectiveness and the
16 efficiency of lab testing, and also used
17 for reoccurring accreditation costs.

18 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you.

19 I just want to go back to the
20 \$36,000 in regard to the DWI, drug and
21 alcohol testing. Are you able to like,
22 determine the amount of drugs that are in
23 a person's body? I know with alcohol you
24 could determine an alcoholic level. But
25 how about drugs? Is there -- or do you

2 just look at the presence of them?

3 MS. DOOLING: So I know the drugs
4 are compared to certain standards. Since
5 I'm not a tox (sic) person, I'm not going
6 to get into the Crime Lab aspect. I
7 believe they can quantitate the amount in
8 blood and that's what the Toxicology Lab
9 works with. They work in blood levels.

10 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you.

11 Any debate or discussion?

12 (Whereupon, no verbal
13 response.)

14 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: No. Any public
15 comment?

16 (Whereupon, no verbal
17 response.)

18 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: I see none. Thank
19 you very much.

20 MS. DOOLING: Thank you.

21 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Okay.

22 All those in favor of passing this
23 item, please signify by saying, "Aye".

24 (Whereupon, all members of
25 the Public Safety Committee

respond in favor with, "Aye".)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Opposed?

response.)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: The item passes

2 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Clerk Item number
3 268-23 is an ordinance supplemental to
4 the annual appropriation ordinance in
5 connection with the Correctional Center.
6 May I have a motion?

7 Moved by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton,
8 seconded by Legislator Pilip.

9 The item is before us. Good
10 afternoon.

11 MS. HALL: Good afternoon,
12 Legislators. Narda Hall, Correctional
13 Center.

14 Item 268-23 is a supplemental
15 appropriation request for Asset
16 Forfeiture Funding and GIV award.

17 The Asset Forfeiture is for \$184,916
18 to be received from the Federal Drug
19 Enforcement Agency deposited with the
20 County Treasurer. The amount and timing
21 of the receipt of the funds is dependent
22 on the amount of seizure as well as
23 completion of pending investigations and
24 convictions. The funding will be used for
25 canine handlers expenses, training

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2 equipment, kennels fencing,
3 transportation, food, veterinary services
4 et cetera.

5 The Gun Involved Violence
6 elimination program (GIV), is for
7 \$35,769. Funding is received from the New
8 York State Division of Criminal Justice
9 Services. The grant focuses on reducing
10 violent crimes through coordination with
11 the federal, state and local Criminal
12 Justice agencies. The funds will be used
13 for overtime, training, investigations,
14 information sharing and meetings for the
15 Gang Intelligence Unit. It is for a
16 period of July 1, 2023 through June 30,
17 2024.

18 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Any questions or
19 discussion?

20 (Whereupon, no verbal
21 response.)

22 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: No. I see none.
23 Any public comment?

24 (Whereupon, no verbal
25 response.)

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CHAIRWOMAN FORD: No. Thank you.
All those in favor of passing this
item, please signify by saying, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of
the Public Safety Committee
respond in favor with, "Aye".)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: The item passes
unanimously.

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2 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: There is an
3 addendum to this Agenda.

4 May I have a motion to suspend the
5 Rules?

6 Moved by Legislator Pilip, seconded
7 by Legislator McKevitt.

8 All those in favor, please signify
9 by saying, "Aye".

10 (Whereupon, all members of
11 the Public Safety Committee
12 respond in favor with, "Aye".)

13 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: The Rules have been
14 suspended.

15 There is one item on the Addendum
16 today, Clerk Item number 270-23.

17 Clerk Item 270-23 is an ordinance
18 supplemental to the annual appropriation
19 ordinance in connection with the
20 Probation Department. May I have a
21 motion?

22 Moved by Legislator Mule, seconded
23 by Legislator Bynoe.

24 The item is before us. Good
25 afternoon.

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2 MR. LANDSMAN: Good afternoon,
3 members. Douglas Landsman, Probation
4 Accountant.

5 The Item before you, 270-23 is for
6 our annual GIV grant for one year, July
7 to June, in the amount to \$400,000. This
8 grant has been in existence for 10 years,
9 serves an important role in trying to
10 remove guns and other weapons from our
11 streets and control gun violence. GIV's
12 goal is to reduce shootings and homicides
13 by promoting integrated evidenced-based
14 strategies that look to reduce crime in
15 neighborhoods.

16 While coordinating with the County
17 PD, our team is comprised of six
18 probation personnel. It's a combination
19 of GIV gang officers, supervisors and an
20 assistant deputy director overseeing
21 operations.

22 The grant provides partial
23 reimbursements for salaries, fringe, OT
24 for surveillance, GPS monitoring,
25 software for background checks, and a

2 small amount for training travel
3 expenses.

4 The second Item that we have for
5 this 270-23; this item is our annual
6 STSJJP grant or Supervision and Treatment
7 Services For Juveniles Program. This is
8 the RTA portion of it. It's a one year,
9 October to September, in the amount of
10 \$635,000. It is 100% reimbursable.

11 This grant has been in existence for
12 over 10 years. It is part of the
13 Governor's initiative for Juvenile
14 Justice Reform. The targeted population
15 is youth who are alleged juvenile
16 delinquents (JD) and youth adjudicated to
17 be Persons in Need of Supervision (PINS).

18 The purpose of RTA, Raise the Age,
19 in which children are prosecuted as
20 adults in the New York State Court
21 system. This is designed to give them a
22 chance at a clean record for the future.
23 This grant covers family court appearance
24 officers' overtime, (CBI) Cognitive-based
25 Behavioral Therapy Interactive

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2 Journaling, and, finally, a Peer
3 Diversion Program as well.

4 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: So the New York
5 State Office of Children and Family
6 Services, when you're talking about the
7 juvenile delinquents, is that those up to
8 the age of 18 that this covers, or is it
9 for the younger children?

10 MS. REYER: Arianne Reyer, Counsel
11 for the Department of Probation. Good
12 afternoon.

13 A juvenile delinquent is anyone 17
14 and younger for certain crimes. Some 16
15 and 17-year-olds who are charged with
16 violent felonies are not considered
17 juvenile delinquents, but it could be
18 anyone 17 and under.

19 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: All right. Any
20 questions?

21 Legislator Bynoe.

22 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you.

23 Good to see you. I have a lot of
24 questions, but I'm not going to do that
25 to you today, tons of them.

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2 MS. REYER: That's alright. I'm
3 ready. Let's go.

4 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: I just like to
5 know: Year to year, has this grant
6 increased or has it stayed flat? Both
7 grants? And I'm particularly interested
8 in the grant that allows for the GPS
9 surveillance.

10 MR. LANDSMAN: GPS occurs both on
11 the regular stip and on the RTA portion.

12 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: So I'm wondering
13 whether the grant has increased.

14 MR. LANDSMAN: It's basically the
15 same.

16 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Are we using it a
17 little bit more than we had been in the
18 past?

19 MS. REYER: We are using it much
20 more than we have in the past. So I think
21 that with a decrease in detention, there
22 has been an increase in electronic
23 monitoring. So that is both in the
24 juvenile world and everywhere else within
25 the criminal justice system.

2 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: I'm just
3 wondering whether the State has kept up
4 with funding us appropriately, given the
5 fact that this has increased.

6 MS. REYER: Well, I'll just say that
7 our funding has not increased and our use
8 has increased considerably.

9 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: As I thought; as
10 I thought. Thank you.

11 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Anyone else?

12 (Whereupon, no verbal
13 response.)

14 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Okay, thank you
15 very much.

16 MR. LANDSMAN: Thank you.

17 MS. REYER: Thank you.

18 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: All those in favor
19 of passing this item, please signify by
20 saying, "Aye".

21 (Whereupon, all members of
22 the Public Safety Committee
23 respond in favor with, "Aye".)

24 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Opposed?

25 (Whereupon, no verbal

response.)

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: The item passes
unanimously.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: There is no other business in front of this Committee, may I have a motion to adjourn?
