CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thank you.
We start with the Rules Committee and start with the contracts in the Rules Committee. After the contracts are done, we move on to the other committees, which will hear some of the committee items. I mention that specifically because $I$ have four slips here for individuals who want to speak on the CSEA Contract. That will not be called until Finance, which will be after a little bit of a while. As I
said, we consider the personal services agreements, etcetera, with the county, so the CSEA Agreement will not be called until Finance. So you may have a little bit of wait.

All right. As we always do, I'm going to call all the the contracts before the Rules Committee at once:
$A-19, A-21, A-26, A-27, A-28$, A-30; These are all Resolutions authorizing the Commissioner of Shared Services to award and execute Purchase Orders or Blanket Purchase Orders between the County of Nassau and Barnwell House of Tires, Matco Service Corp, Cogsdale Corporation, Malvese Equipment, CDW Government, Intellitech Corporation.

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B-24 \text { and } B-27 \text {; these are }
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Resolutions authorizing the County Executive to execute contracts between the County and $H \& L$ Contracting LLC and VRD Contracting.

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E-97, \quad E-99, \quad E-100, \quad E-101, E-102,
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$E-103, E-104, E-105, E-106, E-107$, E-109, E-110, E-114, U-3; These are Resolutions authorizing the County Executive to execute personal services agreements or amendments to the personal services agreements between the County and SVAM International; H2M Architects; RealAuction.Com; Elite/KSE; Vecchione, Vecchione, Connors; Insum Solution Corp.; Raj Technology; Berkman

Henoch; Moody's Analytics; Jacobs
Project Management; LIRO Engineers; Ed Moore Advertising; Rainbow Sound; and Milber Makris.

E-108 is a Resolution for the authorizing the County Executive to execute Use and Occupancy Agreement between the County and Luminocity, Inc. E-111 is a Resolution authorizing the County Executive to execute Personal Service Agreements and an Assignment of Said Agreement between the county and the Fund for the City of New York.

Motion by Minority Leader Abrahams, seconded by Legislator Giuffre to put all those items before us.
One other item, I have a motion
to untable A-14, a Resolution
authorizing the Commissioner of Shared
Services to award and execute a
Purchase Order between the County and HFT Management.
Moved by Legislator Walker, seconded by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton. That's a motion untable.
All in favor of untabling that contract, signify by saying, "Aye".
(Whereupon, all members of the Rules Committee respond in favor with, "Aye".)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Those opposed?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Carries unanimously.
So they're all now before the
Rules Committee. Let's start with the Health Department contract, A-14, HFT.
MS. DESIMONE: Good afternoon.
This is A-14-23, correct?
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Yes.
MS. DESIMONE: So this is a
request to authorize and award a
purchase order for a sole-source vendor
for media campaign bus ads to promote
and increase vaccine uptake to high risk and underserved populations. It's
$100 \%$ grant funded and it's in the amount of up to $\$ 295,500$.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any
questions on this one?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thank you
very much.
MS. DESIMONE: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Next contract is with Corrections, A-30-23 with Intellitech Corporation.

MR. JACOVINA: Joe Jacovina, Deputy Commissioner, Information Technology.

A-30-23 for Intellitech
Corporation. This is to authorize and award the Purchase Order to Intellitech Corporation for services to upgrade the current jail management known as Imax to a new version known as Jmax.

Imax is a client-server based application utilizing 10 plus year-old technology. Jmax is a user friendly, web-based application using current technology. Jmax is more efficient and covers the functional requirements of the Nassau County Correctional

Facility.
This is a sole-source
procurement. The maximum amount authorized under his purchase order is \$387,000. I'll be happy to answer any
questions.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Okay. Thank you, Joe. Any questions from the Legislators?

Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Hi.
I was just there recently. Do you do you include like cameras and things like that with this type of contract, or is it just the data?

MR. JACOVINA: That's a separate project, but we are working on that.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: All right. Because $I$ can't believe that we still don't have cameras where the jail cells are in a number of rooms and there are sometimes only one guard.

MR. JACOVINA: I believe we're currently in the process of wiring the jail.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: All
right. So this security software
platform is just --
MR. JACOVINA: Yeah, this is
record management. It just tracks and retains all the data for a prisoner from their intake until they are released.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Well, that's important too, but $I$
really think we need cameras in those
rooms. I can't believe we can't watch
to make sure that our correction
officers are --
MR. JACOVINA: Yeah, we are in the process of working on it. We're doing the wiring as we speak.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Perfect. Thank you.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Legislator
Schaefer?
CHAIRWOMAN SCHAEFER: How are you?

MR. JACOVINA: Hi.
CHAIRWOMAN SCHAEFER: Just
curious, does the Correctional Center already have the internet capacity for it, or is that being upgraded as well?
MR. JACOVINA: Yes, we have internet at the Correctional Center.
CHAIRWOMAN SCHAEFER: Enough for this? I'm just asking, does it support it?
MR. JACOVINA: Yes, we have the network also.
CHAIRWOMAN SCHAEFER: Okay.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any other questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Okay. Thank you, Joe.
MR. JACOVINA: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Next Item is with the Treasurer E-100, with RealAuction.com.

MR.CHIANG: Good afternoon David Chiang, County Treasurer.

We're here for extension of the contract, with RealAuctions.com for two years. RFP was done in 2020 . This is a revenue-generating contract. This is for our annual lien sales. Last year were sold over 4000 lines. The way it works is that we pay $\$ 20$ then we get $\$ 10$ and they they take $\$ 10$ as a fee. So it's revenue-generating contract and we need this to make sure that all the sales are done efficiently and quickly.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thank you,
David. Any questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: All set.
Thanks again.
MR.CHIANG: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thanks, thank you. Next contract is with Budget, E-106 with Moody's Analytics.

MR. PERSICH: Good afternoon. Andy Persich, Office of Management Budget.

E-106 is an amendment to a contract with Moody's Analytics. It's another extension. We have an RFP going out, but we have a year to decide when we're going to do that. But the RFP is currently out, but we need the services in place and this is just an extension of the current contract.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Okay. Any questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: No.
Thank you, Andy.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: E-111 with the Probation Department and the Fund for the City of New York.
MR. SCHILIRO: Good afternoon, Joe Schiliro, Nassau County Department of Probation.
This is an amendment and an assignment to the existing contract with Funds for the City of New York that provides the Peer Diversion Court Program that we utilize as part of the Raise The Age Program that extends this contract through September of 2024 .
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Next couple of contracts with the Police Department, A-19-2023.

INSPECTOR FIELD: Good afternoon. William Field Inspector, with the Police Department.

Item A-19-2023 is a contract that was previously approved by the Rules Committee. This is to notify the Rules Committee that we requested an increase in total funding to the total amount of $\$ 1,770,000$. The reasoning for this funding is just the cost of the movement of Police Department vehicles from sedan to SUVs has seen an increase. We've also seen an increase with taking over the ambulance maintenance. Those tires are also substantially more expensive, so it has caused our cost to go up.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thank you.
Any questions on this contract?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.) CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Go ahead and
present on A-28.
INSPECTOR FIELD: Item A-28-2023. This is to authorize award of purchase order for the Varonis Data Protection System between the Police Department and CDW Government, LLC.

This is system is a software platform that allows the police department to track, visualize, analyze and protect data on the network. It performs behavioral analytics and identifies normal behavior from cyber attack. It will also be used to detect and uncover insider of threats and potential data breaches.

The total amount awarded under this purchase order is $\$ 967,526.85$. It is funded by both grant and asset funding. CDW was the recommended vendor.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: There is a request to go into Executive Session on this item, which we will do at the end of all the contracts, but before we do


CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Let's move on to County Attorney's office. First contract is with Vecchione, Vecchione, Connors \& Cano.

MR. LEIMONE: MR. Libert is in the back chambers. He is on his way.

MR. LIBERT: Brian Libert of the County Attorney's Office. Sorry for the short delay.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Sure.
MR. LIBERT: I understand that Vecchione is the first contract on.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: That's right.

MR. LIBERT: This is a continuing contract with the County's Workers Comp providers. This is merely a year long amendment. There is an in RFP process to select, potentially, a new vendor, so new contract would be presented.

This is just to extend the current term, because there was a delay that we wanted to have the gap covered.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any

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questions on this contract?

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questions on this contract?

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    Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
    LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: DO
    you know when you will be submitting a
    new contract or a new proposal?
    INSPECTOR FIELD: My
    understanding, it is literally at the
precipice of completion. So that is my
understanding. I don't want to make any
promises, but $I$ am told it is virtually
almost finished.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Okay. Thank you.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any other questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any other
questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Nope. Move on to U-3, Milber Makris.

MR. LIBERT: This is a contract with Milber Makris. I'm going to not try to pronounce the third name for fear of mispronouncing.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Plousadis.
MR. LIBERT: Ah. I learned something today.

This is a contract with Milber Makris, as mentioned, for a case which normally we would call ERPO or the "Red Flag" law. The case was defended aggressively due to various different issues which have been described, and the case is now complete and the County was successful in this case.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thank you.
Any questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: All right.
Very good. Thanks. All set.
MR. LIBERT: Have a good day.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Information Technology. First contract is A-26 with Cogsdale.

MR. JACOVINA: Joe Jacovina, Deputy Commissioner, IT.

A-26-2023 is for Cogsdale
Corporation. This is to authorize an award a blanket purchase order for Cogsdale Corporation for the maintenance and support of the County's famous financial management system software. Cogsdale is a sole-source provider to these support services.

The term of the blanket is from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2026. The total three-year cost: \$583,619.48. The first year cost is $\$ 160,335.06$.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any
questions on this?
Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
just wanted to make sure that the IG was okay with this. There was a question regarding -- Do you mind? Is
that she comes up real quick?
INSPECTOR GENERAL FRANZESE: Good afternoon. So the Cogsdale Corporation, their parent company, had a data breach. However, Cogsdale Corporation didn't have a data breach. So at this point we're comfortable going forward, if you were going forward.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
know it's always very sensitive with cyber security and all, but we're confident that whatever happened in Vermont, or wherever, has no impact on Nassau County?

MR. JACOVINA: If I may, Cogsdale themselves, their parent cooperation, was breached. If we had hosted our data and applications on their hardware, we would have been susceptible to a loss of data. The entire financial system and data warehouse for the county is hosted at the Bethpage Data Center on County-owned IT and is protected by our County's cyber security tools.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: The next one is E-97, SVAM International.
MR. JACOVINA: SVAM
International, this is an amendment to renew the term of the agreement and extend by one year the termination date from December 8, 2023 to December 8, 2024. SVAM has provided consulting services to the Oracle Peoplesoft Project.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any
questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: The next one is E-103, Insum Solutions.

MR. JACOVINA: E-103-2023, Insum Solutions is a two-year agreement with a two-year renewal option for Insum to provide Oracle APEX consulting services. APEX is an oracle tool that provides for quick development of applications. The tools allowed the building of applications in-house within the County's unique requirements, such as police roll call.

The County has over 150 APEX applications in production and $80 \%$ of the County's departments utilize one or more of these APEX applications.

Insum's staff provides APEX training to the current county staff, assists enhancements and upgrades of existing production applications. An RFP was issued for these services and two vendors responded. This agreement is for a maximum of four million dollars, including the renewal period,


CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thanks. Last one for you would be E-104, Raj Technologies.

MR. JACOVINA: Yes. Raj
Technologies, E-104-2023. This is an amendment to renew the term of the agreement and extend by one year the termination date from December 1, 2023 to December 1, 2024.

Raj Technologies has been providing support for the services being provided for the Police Radio Project. Funds for this project are out of Capital Project 50696 Local Municipality Interopable Radio System.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Okay. Any questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: All set.
Thank you.
MR. JACOVINA: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Next contracts are with the Parks Department. Starting with E-108, Luminocity, Inc.

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Good afternoon. Darcy Belyea, Parks Commissioner.

Item E-108-23 presenting a Use and Occupancy Agreement between the County and Luminocity, Inc. You'll recall we did one year permit with them last year. Typically, a permit is not presented, but anticipated revenue will exceed $\$ 25,000$, so we're presenting this for approval by Rules Committee.

This permit will commence on October 1, 2023 for one year, ending on September 30, 2024 with four one-year-renewal options upon mutual agreement to renew.

The 2023 and 2024 event nights will be Mondays, Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays for their light show in Eisenhower Park running between
November 9 th and January 7 th with the exception of all holidays. Fees payable to the County are a $\$ 10,000$ permit fee upon execution, plus royalty on all tickets sales: $\$ 3.00$ per adult, $\$ 1.00$ per child. You'll recognize that that's little bit less than we took last year, but we've also cut out of the permit the cost that the county is going to be responsible for. So our net should be about the same, based on attendance and weather.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Okay. Thank you.
Any questions?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.) COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Next one is E-112 with Ed Moore Advertising.

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: This is an Amendment number two to the Service Agreement between the County and Ed Moore Advertising Agency, Inc.

In the original agreement was approved by this Body on March 1, 2020 and Amendment one was presented and approved in July of '22. Amendment one extended the term expiration, February 28, 2025, that will remain unchanged. Amendment one added funds received by the County under the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Funds under the American Rescue Plan Act ' 21 , or ARPA.

Today, I respectfully request that an additional $\$ 500,000$ of ARPA funds be added to this contract and no other terms will be amended.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any
questions on this contract?
Legislator Bynoe.
LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you,

Presiding Officer.
Good day, Commissioner; how are you?

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Good. How are you?

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Good, good, good.

First, congratulations on all of the successful events you pulled off this summer.

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Thank you.
LEGISLATOR BYNOE: I don't
begrudge us an opportunity to have our residents come and celebrate the summer season with us with these concerts. My concern is the $\$ 500,000$ of ARPA money that would be used for that purpose. There are many good programs and services that are in need of some additional funding and for us to be in this moment moving forward with such a large amount of money to be earmarked for -- in some cases, when you compare the two, when you look at all community
services and the supportive services
that are needed in our communities
versus having these concerts in the
park and other County events, seems
somewhat lofty.
We really have some significant
needs that are presenting themselves in
our young people and our elderly. We're
seeing that folks -- we have homeless
people that are -- $I$ just left the
meeting in Lakeview at the library with
the MTA, where they want to remove all
the trees from the Lakeview train
station because people are sleeping
under those trees and in the brush.
I don't begrudge us an
opportunity for these concerts. I
attended one of them and really
thoroughly enjoyed myself. But we're
holding back from funding services that
are essential, that are critical in the
face of all of the adversity that we're
meeting. And for $\$ 500,000$ to go to this
service with deaf ears falling on our
request for funding to go to the organizations that could help us, there can be boots on-the-ground, I think it flies in the face of what we have been advocating for. I'm shocked that we would even come down here today with this type of item, knowing that we're faced with all of these issues, using ARPA money.

So I have questions: How has it benefited us based on tourism? Have we been able to look and see and determine that we have been able to earn enough sales tax money from these type of expenditures and investments in these types of events? I think we should have some of these questions answered before we start putting $\$ 500,000$ of ARPA money towards this type of expense when we know we have homeless people sleeping in our train stations, we have young people who are facing suicide-type of tendencies and ideologies on a regular basis, and we have senior citizens that
are crumbling and in despair. So I'm going to tell you that $I$ think this is ill timed.

Do you have any questions
regarding how much tourism dollars that we were able to generate from any of these events?

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Our metrics have shown a great increase in the amount of visitors to the county based on Hotel/Motel fees that are reported quarterly. We also had a record-breaking attendance at our events. Our attendance is up at all of museums, pools, facilities.

Not disregarding anything that you said with regard to ARPA funding in general, $I$ have no hand in that, $I$ just know that this is another amount of money in a wallet that was set aside in the ARPA funds, so-to-speak, for tourism advertising. This is not an additional ask of that overall ARPA funding. There was an amount earmarked
by OMB for tourism marketing, and
that's what this is for.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: But you
wouldn't be here if we had, as a Body,
agreed to that. It was earmarked, but
we as a Body, haven't -- you wouldn't
be here if that was the case. Am I
right?

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Okay.
LEGISLATOR BYNOE: And so the correlation between the increase in the use of parks and our other amenities here, in terms of museums, does it tie back to these events? Are we able to tie it back to say when we had the event? You know, with Boys 2 Men, we saw that folks came and they went to the museum at the same time. COMMISSIONER BELYEA: I think
it's tourism advertising in general,
not just specific to those events.
That's what this contracts for. You'll
recall that $\$ 150,000$ per year to this
contract is from Hotel/Motel funding
and then it was supplemented for the tourism piece for ARPA and that's for programs, events and facilities that we use the contract for.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Again, I don't
discount the benefit of that right, but
I just know that it does not compare to the magnitude of the issues that we're facing in other facets of managing a county. I just don't know that that's the best use of ARPA money. I just think we're going down the wrong path here if we just keep looking at this one-sided. Our community organizations got small little increase to what they receive on an annual basis to provide services to a County that is reeling, reeling from the impacts of the pandemic.

I know this isn't -- giving it to you right now, unfortunately is the issue, and $I$ know that you don't have an overall say, but $I$ am concerned about how we're using ARPA money.


CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: All right. Move on to the next contract, 114, Rainbow Sounds.

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Yes.
E-114-23 is Rainbow Sound. Presenting an Amendment to a Personal Services Agreement originally approved by this Body in May of 2021. Amendment one was proposed and approved on January 17, 2023. This amendment seeks to amend only Section three of the original agreement regarding payment. The request is for an additional $\$ 75,000$ to be encumbered only during the term of May 1, 2023 to April 30,2024 for total incumbrance not to exceed $\$ 150,000$ during this term only. The reason for the increase is due to the rental of amplifiers for our system at Lakeside Theatre. We had been ordering different parts, I believe, since 2020. The amplifier pieces did not come in, so to avoid not putting up the new sound system which we greatly needed, we are
renting the amplifiers from Rainbow, who we also used to supplement our existing sound and backline for the larger concerts, so we are going to exceed the cap. No other section of this agreement will be amended.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: With respect to the sound system upgrade, when will that be completed? The amplifiers are due by the end of October, so we'll be up and running for the next season. This was just a one year short-term rental of certain components.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: So you will need to rent those components for next year?

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Correct, which is why we're doing it for this particular term, if permitted.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
got a complaint from one of our constituents, if you know who it is,
that works with this equipment.
COMMISSIONER BELYEA: Okay.
LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON:
Anyway, he said that all the equipment was kind of outdated. Is it just the amplifiers?

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: So it was very outdated. And last year it really showed that, and we spent a lot more money with Rainbow; thus, the original amendment to supplement a lot of our regular shows even. All of the parts that have been ordered over time, global supply chain issue, have come in. It was just certain amplifiers that we didn't have, so we're renting them
from this provider and then, once they're here, then we have a full upgrade.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: So the rest of the equipment is pretty much upgraded?

COMMISSIONER BELYEA: And being used. I didn't want to not use it for

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CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Our last bunch of contracts are with DPW.
Starting with A-21, Matco Service Corp.
COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Good afternoon. Ken Arnold, Public Works.
A-21 is a Service Blanket Order for central air conditioning services. Two bids were received and Matco was determined to be the lowest responsible bidder. The contract is for one year with extensions and the contract cap is $\$ 1.375$ million.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any questions for this one?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Go right to Malvese, A-27.

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: A-27 is a Blanket Order for the rental of street sweepers. This is a five-year agreement, has a cap of $\$ 5$ million. Monthly rent of the street sweepers is $\$ 11,900$. This is the sole source. Malvese is the sole provider of these sweepers in this region.

Our anticipated usage is one sweeper per garage. The Department is buying sweepers, which will take the place of this rental agreement at a future point. But the lead time for street sweepers is between 12 and 18 months currently.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: So it is
anticipated at some point that we will not need this rental, we will own the street sweepers.

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Right. We may rent to supplement on occasion, but we won't need him as a full-time basis.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: How many street sweepers do we have now?

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: We have two. We had rental contract with a company that we had PESH violations with. We had to terminate the contract, which is why we had to run out and put this rental out right away. We were using a state contract in the meantime, but that we cannot use at this moment. CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: How did we get down to two street sweepers, considering the length and breadth of this county?

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Well, we were renting them. We determined a while back -- sweepers are high maintenance vehicles and they were down quite a bit. Even when they're new, they're troublesome to keep up and running. So we went through a period of time that we felt that if we rented sweepers, the maintenance would be on the rental company and we would just
have to change the brooms. And that's what we've been doing. Unfortunately, the sweepers were very poor that were given to us and we had issues and led to some PESH issues, and then we terminated that contract.

So in the light of that we went back and looked at rental versus purchasing and this time we'll look at purchasing sweepers this time through. CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: You're in the process of purchasing street sweepers?

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Purchasing has, I think, a purchase req (sic) for five right now. They're expensive. Then we'll supplement the rest with the new capital program that comes through.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any other questions?

Minority Leader Abrahams.
LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you,
Presiding Officer.
Ken, you know one of our
constituents, she's adamant about streets being swept all the time and now we have the rental agreement.

Two things. One: I would like to take a look to see if we can work with our constituents to publicize the schedule, and $I$ know that's difficult to do and $I$ know we don't do streets as often as potentially some of our villages. But if we can publicize the schedule that would be helpful, so people can know when their streets are going to be cleaned.

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: The problem is we sweep most county roads on a monthly basis, but it's all depending on weather and availability of staff. So it's very hard for me to be at a certain road, a certain date. We do that one place in the county -Legislator Schaefer knows well about that -- where we have parking restrictions on Westbury Avenue, that we have to be there on that occasion. I
believe Grand Avenue has the same that we try to meet, but it's very difficult for us to keep that type of schedule on a county wide basis with many locations.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Okay. And if $I$ heard correctly, we have two sweepers for the entire county that are ours and the rest are going to be rented to try to keep up with the pace. COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Yes.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: So I guess the next point that we should probably take a look, and it might be for the future, but what are other municipalities doing in terms of street sweeping? Are they still trying to take on that responsibility themselves, or are they bringing in outside contract help to be able to try to assist in that?

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: In all
cases that $I$ know of, they're doing the sweeping themselves. I know there are
municipalities that rent sweepers, like we did. New York state rents sweepers.

You'll see sweepers alongside their equipment that's not theirs. I'm not aware of anybody who brings in an outside person to sweep.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: No, because
I know you just mentioned that that it's depending on staff and staff availability, so it sounds like we don't have enough staff to be able to try to keep up with all the sweeping. COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Remember, sweeping is a separate shift. It's not our normal shift. So if somebody calls in on a 5:00 or 3:00 a.m. shift, there's not another person to fill that spot. Union rules is two weeks notice to change shifts. So it's not like an automatic thing that we have people stand by that can fit that role if somebody calls in the sick one day. We bring in the people we need for the sweeping each day and that's their
shift.
LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Got it.
Look, if there's things that we can do to try to make it a little bit easier for the public to understand when the streets are going to be swept, it'll be helpful.

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: I think if you want to talk about -- I know the road you're talking about, Uniondale Avenue. If that is a road that we could mark for no parking a certain time of the month and then we work towards that goal, I think that can be a conversation. But $I$ can't expand that throughout the whole county. I can do it in certain locations where we have high issues of litter to pickup and that's I think that's one of the road that we have a lot of traffic. So we could talk about that. But $I$ don't want to promise I can do that throughout the whole county.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: All right.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Let's move on to the next one, $B-24, H \& L$ Contracting.
COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: B-24 is a construction contract for the resurfacing Phase 75. This is a federal state-funded project. We're receiving $50 \%$ of the costs for this project. It covers seven million miles of road. Three bids were received and H\&L was was determined that the lowest responsible bitter at $\$ 6.9$ million. The DBE requirement, which is 10\%, will be met by the contract.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any
questions for this one?
(Whereupon, no verbal response.)

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: The next one, if you want to handle both, you can. VRD Contracting, B-27 and E-107. COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Sure.
B-27 and E-107 are both
associated with the Second Precinct.
B-27 is the construction contract for the new precinct. There were seven bids received and VRD was determined to be the lowest responsible bidder at $\$ 26.1$ million. This is below the engineer's estimate by 13\%.

E-107 is a construction
management contract to provide
inspection services and resident
engineer services during the
construction of the second. As we had
declared an emergency on this project
for the CM services, we issued
proposals only to our on-call
engineering firms that do this work to expedite the process. We had seven that we sent that out to. The Technical

Review Committee determined Jacobs had
the highest technical ranking and provided a reasonable cost at $\$ 1.47$ million dollars. The duration of these projects is 16 months being done on the emergency declaration, which was signed by the County Executive in November of
'22. I had updated this Body in June about the process we are going to follow, which was to go through our normal procurement but then issue Notice to Proceed prior to Rules approval for both these contracts, which we have done, and we wanted to get these to the next available meeting, which was today.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Thank you.
I was wrong before, $B-27$ is VRD and B-27 is Jacobs; not both VRD.

The only question with VRD is I
don't recall seeing the name before, and then they came in well below the engineer's estimate. Did the Committee reviewing this feel confidence that they have the capability to do this?

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Yes. VRD built, I believe, either the Fourth or the Eighth. They did one of our precincts prior.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any
questions for this one?
Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton?
(Whereupon, off record
discussion.)
COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: Do you
want me to address the SDVOB? I'm
sorry because $I$ jumped around on my
notes. The question Legislator Drucker had was regarding the $S D V O B$, the disabled veterans. VRB has submitted a company to cover the 6\% best faith efforts. We will review that when it's submitted, but they have identified a company as part of their package for that work and I provided that to Michelle a little while ago.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Okay. So basically, at this point we don't know if the 6\% for service disabled veterans
is going to be met, but they're going to do a best effort.

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: They
actually identified a company that they plan on using. So $I$ would expect to see that be submitted and the value of that work I'll see in that submittal. And what the Department will do is, as we get subcontractor requests, we'll go through our catalogue of firms we've used in the past and ask if they've reached out to some of these firms.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Okay. If the $6 \%$ is not met or we can't substantiate why it's not met, are we subject to losing any potential funding?

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: No. This is all County money, so it's best faith efforts.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: All right,
I've nothing further.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any other questions?


CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Let's move on to E-99, which is $H 2 M$ Architects and Engineers.

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: E-99 is a design services contract for the blower facility at the South Shore Water Reclamation Facility; aka, Bay Park. This project will replace the blower facility to increase nitrogen removal at the plant. This is actually the last large major design services contract for Bay Park coming from the 428 Program.

We received four proposals. The highest technically ranked from HDR had proposed a two-year construction period which was not found to be acceptable by the Review Committee once they got into the cost proposal review, so they were removed from consideration. That led us to $H 2 \mathrm{M}$ as the highest technically ranked firm and proposing an acceptable price. All this will be covered under our feMA money we are receiving from

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Next one is E-101 with Elite.
COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: E-101 is one of our on-call construction management contracts. This is one of the nine firms we were going to award to. I've been to this Body prior with some of the other companies. The joint venture of Elite and KSE along with their sub proposed, makes this contract 100\% MWBE. They also have an SDVOB identified as a sub for cost estimating. This is a one million dollar cap contract for three years.
CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any

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questions for this one?
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    (Whereupon, no verbal response.)
    CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: The last two are with LiRo; 109 and 110.

COMMISSIONER ARNOLD: E-109 is an amendment to LiRo's existing traffic on-call contract. This amendment is for an additional one year at $\$ 709,000$.

This will allow us to finish existing work. This is a retroactive contract, but we did stop the work while we were having this processed so there's no outlay of money currently until this is approved.

E-110 is a new traffic on-call contract that replaces the one that we just amended. We have 17 firms proposed, 10 firms would be selected. A number of the firms have already come across this Body. LiRo is one of these 10. This contract, has a cap of $\$ 10.5$ million for a five-year period. The MWBE for the new on-call contract will be determined based on the assignment that are given.

CHAIRMAN NICOLLELO: Any
