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LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Clerk Item 269-23 is a Resolution approving an amendment via Memorandum of Understanding to the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the County of Nassau and the Civil Service Employees Association.

Moved by Legislator Ford, seconded by Legislator Drucker. The Item is before us.

Briefly, this is the proposed contract between the County and the Civil Service Employees Association, the term of which is January 1, 2018 to December 31, 2030. Today, the Finance Committee will tee-up the Item for the purpose of moving it onward to the Rules Committee later today and the Full Legislature on Monday, September 18th, at which time the entire Legislature will receive testimony regarding the Item and ask questions.

Mr. Persich?

MR. PERSICH: I'll just give you the 30,000 foot view on the on the contract and then we'll have further discussions.

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It provides for general wage increases over the 13 year period. I'm just going to read out the numbers: Two percent; two percent; two and a half percent; two percent; three percent; three percent; two and a half percent; 2.5%; 2.5%; and 2.85%.

It is a 13 year contract which provides stability and it finally gives the civil service employees a fair and equitable contract. Nobody leaves the negotiation happy, but I think the way this was structured and how it came out I think made everybody happy. It was a large approval by the membership, so it was a good thing.

In addition to the general wage increases there would be a sign on bonus for full-time employees of \$3,000; a \$1,000 for full-time employees who don't work a full 35 hours; and \$250 per part-time and seasonal.

In addition, members who have 15 years of service will receive a stipend

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of \$2,000. The other piece of this MOU, the membership will be switching from NYSHIP, or other plans that we have to the NYSHIP Excelsior plan, which is a little different of a flavor than what we have. But to offset that, we will be putting about between four and six million into healthcare reimbursement, help off at any cost that the employees may have.

We are unfreezing the chart, which is unprecedented, from the NIFA freeze, which I think people should understand, that we're going to the college chart with some caveats to it. It's being phased in over time. So it'll be a new step chart which will bring the employees up to comparable rates from what we've been hearing a lot about, which should help in retention and help with the ability for people to move up and provide fair and equitable wages to our civil servant employees.

In addition, there'll be 20 year

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vesting period starting 6/30/26 for healthcare benefits.

There'll be a reduction in leave days of approximately two days from 1/24-12/31/26.

The workday will be increased for 6.75 employees by 15 minutes, which is a managerial thing. We'll get an extra 15 minutes of work out of our employees.

Termination pay will be capped at 1.5 of the base salary and the emergency leave will be capped for four days.

In a nutshell, that's what the deal is. I will tell you that it was a long negotiation. It was hard and fast, but it took a little time because of the complexity of what was out there, but I think both sides are very happy with the outcome of what happened here.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: All right.

Thanks, Mr. Persich. I'm sure there will be questions. But like I said, for purposes of this Committee, we're just teaming this up over to the Rules

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Committee and the Full Legislature. But thank you.

Any further debate from the Legislators?

(Whereupon, no verbal

response.)

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: We do have some public comment, so I'll call those. I have four slips. First is Kathy Mucerino.

MS. MUCERINO: Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen.

I was hired to work at the Health Department in July of 2020. That was about a couple of months before I turned 59. I entered into an agreement with the County that I worked for 10 years and I had this pot of gold at the end of the rainbow; it was called my healthcare.

My husband is a first responder so healthcare is very important to me. He developed lung cancer within 18 years of working down at the Trade Center.

Now a contract comes into play. I've

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been in agreement for the last -- I just entered my fourth year. It was never mentioned to me that 10 years would be ripped out from under me. All of a sudden, I'm told I have to be here for 20 years. I'm going to be 81 years old by the time I'm able to retire with any type of full benefits. This is unrealistic. People were always grandfathered in previous contracts. So what happened to us being grandfathered?

My goal was 10 years. I was told to give the County 10 years. My goal was actually to do 11 or 12 years, depending on how I felt and what my health was. For my husband to turn round to me and say, "I've never used the word forbid, but I forbid you to work until you're 81 years old. I'd like to spend a little time with you". I'm currently married for 43 years.

This is just ridiculous. I'm not the only one that was hired in 2020. There are several people that were hired at my age. Had I been told that it was 20

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years, well, that would have required the second conversation, because the first, of course, was the salary, which was \$35,000 a year. My thing was, can we afford to do this? He said, I want you to do this because this is what you've wanted to do, will be fine. And think about it, 10 years, 11 years at least. We don't even have to worry about some kind of supplemental health insurance.

Well, I do have to worry about health insurance because even if I do get grandfathered now, I have to worry about a horrible healthcare plan that's not even going to cover the hearing aids that I may need, because I'll be 81 answering phones and I'm going to need to be able to hear these people when they call, correct?

I'm just asking you to please put an amendment in there. Allow us to be grandfathered. We were grandfathered for years. All of a sudden -- and who's to say that at the end of 13 years, that

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they don't turn around and say, we changed our mind? It's not 20 years, it's going to be 25 years.

Please consider people like me. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you, Ms. Mucerino. We wish your husband a speedy recovery.

Vivian Sasson.

MS. SASSON: Good afternoon. I too also worked at the Department of Health. When I came to the Department of Health I had a big decision to make. Not only was I overqualified for the job that I took and was also getting job offers for substantially more money, I decided to take the lesser pay due to the fact that I would at 10 years, have my health insurance and retirement. I didn't take the job right away. I kept on pursuing it with the Human Resources Department asking them over and over again, is this a benefit that I will be receiving? And they said, yes, you will be given the

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benefit if you work 10 years at the Department of Health or for the County. So that was a very easy decision for me to make give up the money at another job and come and work here for the benefit at the end.

I was appalled to find out that our Union let us down and allowed for the benefit to be taken away from us. They have eliminated us, meaning anyone hired within the last six years, anybody in my age-group, where I will be 78. If I, if I stay here for 20 years.

How can you hire someone under these false pretenses? This was told to us as a benefit that we would receive. Nobody ever said that it may be taken away. And I understand it's part of a contract; however, we were told this is what you get. You would get this benefit. They could have asked us, they could have grandfathered us in or asked us to pay towards it for until we made our 10 years. There were so many other ways

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around this. Do you have any idea how

much it will cost somebody 60 plus to

have secondary insurance? It would cost

almost \$2000 a month. I looked it up,

AARP, Forbes. You could look up any of

them. It will be approximately \$2000.

That's at today's cost. That would

bankrupt most people, maybe losing their

homes, definitely not being able to live

in Nassau County. Why should we be

promised something and have it taken

away? Have the rug taken out from under

us?

I know I speak for myself, but I

know I speak for others who are in my

situation. You will ruin a lot of lives.

We came here with the understanding that

we were going to work a job and we kept

our end of the contract. It was a verbal

contract. However you want to look at it,

but we kept our end of the agreement. We

are here working. We're doing our best.

But now we have this ripped out from

underneath. I feel betrayed, I feel

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abandoned and I feel that our union representatives did not really negotiate this for us and didn't walk away from the table without at least something on our behalf.

We gave up a lot. We gave up six vacation days, we gave up 15 minutes longer in the workday, six minutes grace period and our insurance coverage went to -- Thank you for your time.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you, Ms. Sasson. Jackie O'Loughlin.

MS. O'LOUGHLIN: My name is Jackie O'Loughlin. You're going to hear a lot of the same thing.

I was hired to work at the Nassau County Department of Health in 2020. Prior to that I was a speech pathologist for the state and then an independent consultant. Because of that, my husband carried the benefits which were costing us over \$14,000 a year. A friend of mine suggested that, although the County does not pay the best, that I look into

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working for the County because the benefits are absolutely amazing, which is what I did. And I took several tests, and the first test that I was called for an interview was the Nassau County Department of Health Clerk. When I saw the salary on the canvas letter, I was a bit shocked. The 2020 starting salary for a full-time clerk in the County was \$22,803. If you are to do the math,

that's not even minimum wage.

When I interviewed, I questioned the salary and the woman told me, yes, the salary is very low, but the benefits are amazing. The benefits was what I was there for. And on top of that I was told that after 10 years I would receive lifetime benefits for myself and my husband. I went home. I discussed this with my husband. The pay cut was significant, but I could not give up these benefits. It would have been foolish of me to give up these benefits, so I decided to work for the Department

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of Health in a renovated garage that has leaks, holes in the ceiling, rodents and occasionally birds in the building, and I took less than a livable salary and I gave this job a 150%.

On top of that, I took two more tests and advanced twice. And I am kicking myself because as of five months ago I turned down, yet again, three school jobs offering more than twice my administrative salary on a school year calendar because I could not give up these benefits. I would be foolish. I weighed it out. I did the cost -- I couldn't do it. I did what I thought was best for for my family. I was ready to give 10 years, maybe 15. I might give 20, but I don't know. Now I'm locked in to giving 20 years. I'll be on my death bed at work.

I never had a union job. I was so excited to finally have a job because I thought the Union would protect me from something like this ever happening. When

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that contract went through I felt like the rug was pulled out from underneath I really don't feel that I'm asking me. for anything other than what was agreed upon August 23, 2020 when I agreed to work here. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Thank you, Ms. O'Loughlin.

Susan Naftol.

MS. NAFTOL: Hello, I'm Susan Naftol. I am also at the Department of Health, although I was formerly at Nassau Community College.

I just want to start with a definition. Contract: A written or spoken agreement, especially one concerning employment, sales or tenancy, that is intended to be enforceable by law.

When I became a CSEA worker hired by the Nassau County back in April of 2018, one of the agreements made with the County was that after 10 years I would be fully vested. There was an offer and an

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acceptance. This verbal contract informed my decision, as it did when I turned down in school districts this last April after taking a promotional civil service exam, and I decided to stay with the County. I already had five years in and decided that the lower salary the County offered was balanced by the benefits. Now I'm off the list and my options are zero.

As the vestment was contractually agreed on by both the employer and the employee, I believe we should be grandfathered in. Let this new contract effect new hires, not me or us.

As is the case with many of us. I am not 25. I was hired when I was 55. For me to reach the 20 year carrot that's being dangled as per this new proposed contract, I would not be able to retire fully vested till I'm 75, not the 65 that was originally agreed upon.
