CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Here.

CLERK PULITZER: We have a quorum,

1
2 sir.

3 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: There is one Item
4 on the Agenda. Clerk Item 304-23. An
5 ordinance supplemental to the annual
6 appropriation ordinance in connection
7 with Human Services.

8 May I have a motion?

9 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: So moved.

10 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Moved by
11 Legislator Walker, seconded by Legislator
12 Mule.

13 The item is before us. Who is here
14 to speak about the Item?

15 MS. ZAKI: Good afternoon,
16 Legislators. Seema Zaki, Fiscal
17 Director, Department of Human Services.

18 Item 304-23 is a supplemental
19 appropriation for additional increase in
20 the state and federal aid for the fiscal
21 year 2023. It is being allocated to fund
22 the nonprofit agencies programs like
23 nutrition, senior centers, case
24 management, home health aides, respite
25 caregiver programs. It will be allocated

1
2 through a contract to the nonprofit
3 agencies, all the 1.3.

4 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Is there any
5 debate or discussion? Anybody have any
6 questions?

7 Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton?

8 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Hi. Is
9 this in line with what we've received in
10 the past?

11 MS. ZAKI: Yes.

12 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Is it
13 increased at all?

14 MS. ZAKI: It is increased.

15 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Okay.
16 Thank you.

17 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Any other
18 legislators?

19 (Whereupon, no verbal
20 response.)

21 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Any public
22 comment?

23 Oh, I'm sorry, Legislator Walker.
24 Sorry.

25 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Under the

1
2 nutrition, does this cover -- some of our
3 school districts, the entire districts
4 get free lunch, does that come out of
5 this or is that come out of somewhere
6 else?

7 MS. ZAKI: This is separate. This is
8 for the senior citizens. It's the
9 congregate meals at the senior centers,
10 home delivered meals.

11 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Okay, so this
12 only deals with our seniors. Lunches we
13 might bring to them or --

14 MS. ZAKI: At the senior centers,
15 the congregate meals and the home
16 delivered meals at their homes.

17 CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: Thank you.

18 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Any other
19 legislators?

20 (Whereupon, no verbal
21 response.)

22 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Any public
23 comment?

24 MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday.

25 I'm all for these types of programs.

1
2 I'm just curious, again, with regard to
3 the overall reporting at the end of the
4 year where these programs are getting the
5 most impact, or where there may be gaps
6 that are not being addressed.

7 Particularly, when we talk about a number
8 of senior centers that do not have this
9 type of programming or access for its
10 local residents. So I'm just hoping that
11 there is someone on the Committee that's
12 addressing this, and it's nice to see
13 that there's something on this agenda
14 item.

15 Again, it's very disheartening to
16 come here and we're killing trees for a
17 number of these Committees that have yet
18 to have any type of listing or agenda
19 item, particularly Veteran Services,
20 Minority Affairs, etcetera.

21 So I'm concerned, again, that we've
22 got funded programs that are just not
23 getting into the communities that need
24 them the most. And there doesn't seem to
25 be any kind of tracking or oversight to

1
2 determine, okay, this is where we are
3 lacking, this is what we need to do about
4 it. And we have people who are literally
5 starving in their homes or cannot get to
6 the noted facilities, or I should say,
7 the well connected facilities to get
8 these much needed resources. And we have
9 a lot of residents, particularly our
10 seniors and our veterans and those with
11 physical challenges who can't get to a
12 lot of these facilities. And again, I
13 don't see any type of programs in place
14 to provide them with that access. So I'm
15 just putting it out there.

16 Again, I'm in support of this, but
17 again, we need to be a little bit more
18 effective and efficient as well as
19 inclusive.

20 Thank you.

21 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: John,
22 do you mind?

23 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Sure.

24 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Do you
25 know of any senior center that doesn't

1
2 have this program with the subsidized
3 lunches? I mean, if you can send us a
4 list of those. Normally the Meals on
5 Wheels would be affiliated with that. So
6 all the senior centers that I've been
7 involved with for a long time have this,
8 even smaller ones. If you ever hear of
9 one that doesn't have this program, let
10 us know.

11 MS. MEREDAY: Okay. But also my
12 concern is that the County is not
13 coordinating with the Town with regard to
14 its senior facilities that, again, could
15 be a stronger impact to reach a lot of
16 the residents as far as access.

17 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: From
18 the way I understand it, all the senior
19 centers basically get their funding, a
20 lot of them, from the County. That's why
21 they have to keep the tracking and
22 everything, like Glen Cove, for instance,
23 so they subsidize the lunches. A really
24 good lunch is \$3. It would normally
25 probably cost like 8 to 10, but because

1
2 of this, it's subsidizes it. But if you
3 hear of a senior center that doesn't have
4 a program like this, you should let us
5 know. Because most of them, from what
6 I've seen, do.

7 MS. MEREDAY: Okay.

8 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Thanks.

9 MS. MEREDAY: No problem. Thank you.

10 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Any other public
11 comment, discussion or debate?

12 (Whereupon, no verbal
13 response.)

14 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Hearing none, all
15 in favor of passing this Item, please
16 signify by saying, "Aye".

17 (Whereupon, all members of
18 the Senior Affairs Committee
19 respond in favor with, "Aye".)

20 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: Any opposed or
21 abstention?

22 (Whereupon, no verbal
23 response.)

24 CHAIRMAN GIUFFRE: The item passes
25 unanimously.

CHAIRWOMAN WALKER: There is no
other business before this Committee.

May I have a motion to adjourn, by
Legislator Walker, seconded by Legislator
Lafazan.
