10	today which are Clerk Item numbers
11	331-23; 332-23; 333-23; 334-23
12	Clerk Item numbers 331-23, 322-23
13	and 333-23 are ordinances supplemental to
14	the annual appropriation ordinance in
15	connection with the Office of Emergency
16	Management. May I have a motion?
17	Moved by DeRiggi-Whitton, seconded
18	by Legislator Bynoe.
19	The items are before us. Good
20	afternoon, sir.
21	MR. DELANEY: Thomas Delaney, Office
22	of Emergency Management.
23	I'd like to just discuss 332-23
24	first, because the other two have
25	similarities. Makes it easier to discuss.

So 332-23 is our emergency

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management performance grant. It's awarded to us non competitively through FEMA, pass through New York State. We use it primarily to offset the salary fringe expenses for the office, but also for travel expenses that can't be covered by our other grants. There is a 50% cost

match on this one. And we've been getting

this now every year for many years.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: And I'm glad to hear that, because I'm sure that you do have to travel for different events and different seminars and everything to be updated on everything. Correct any debate or discussion?

MR. DELANEY: Correct. And, you know, some of the travel is covered by our other Homeland Security grants, and we have to use this grant to backfill for others.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Legislator Mule.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: Hi. Does this grant go up in cost over the years or has

-

it stayed flat?

MR. DELANEY: It's been going down a little bit, unfortunately, just like everything else. It's gone down probably from when I started maybe being around \$510,000 to this year, \$496,000.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: Have you been able to find funding in other places to make up for the loss?

MR. DELANEY: Not really. No. There are very few of these types of grants available. Again, we use this to pay for our salaries and fringe in the office or offset. It doesn't cover the whole cost.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: Right. Okay.

Thank you. So in other words, the extra money just comes from the County budget; is that correct?

MR. DELANEY: Well, yes. And we have a cost match that does come from the County's budget. Yes, it has to. It's an in-kind.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: Right. Okay. Thank you.

MR. DELANEY: All right.

The other two are our State Homeland Security Grant Program, 331-23; and our Urban Area Security Initiative 333-23 called SHSP (SHIP) and UASI. Our total SHSP allocation for this year is \$1,038,973. This is split between several departments that are involved in recovery operations, which include our ME Office, Health Department, Department of Public Works, along with OEM. We also use this to fund salaries within the office for employees that are 100% grant funded; there's no cost match on this one.

Similarly, our UASI grant this year it was for \$2,800,365. That is divvied up a little bit with our law enforcement agencies, because we have to put 35% to law enforcement. So to that, Corrections, Fire Marshal, PD and OEM share the funding on this grant. And we also again use it to pay for salaries for 100% grant funded employees in the office; no cost match on this one.

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2 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Okay. So then so the total amount that you receive aren't 3 aren't necessarily just utilized solely 5 for OEM, as you had indicated that you have to share it with whether it's the 6 Nassau County Police Department or the 8 Medical Examiner, so forth. Correct? MR. DELANEY: That is correct. 10 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Thank you very 11 much, sir. Any public comment? 12 (Whereupon, no verbal 13 response.) 14 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: All those in favor 15 of passing this item, please signify by 16 saying, "Aye". 17 (Whereupon, all members of 18 the Public Safety Committee 19 respond in favor with, "Aye".) 20 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Opposed? 21 (Whereupon, no verbal 22 response.) 23 CHAIRWOMAN FORD: The item passes

ADA MCDERMOTT: Good afternoon

Chairwoman. Good afternoon, Legislators.

Dennis McDermott, Assistant District

Attorney.

Number 334-23 is an ordinance that

encompasses two supplemental

appropriations. The first is a \$10,000

grant from the New York State Division of

Criminal Justice Services for the Byrne

JAG, which goes towards funding for

technologically improving programs. In

this case, it's going to be used to help

the cryptocurrency investigations. It's

going to be supplemental software that

they use now to enable them to go further

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into tracking various crypto scenes.

The second is from the New York State Office of Victim Services. It is for \$1,355,884.41. It's used primarily to fund the crime victim advocates. And I think when we were here for the resolution to approve accepting it, Legislator McKevitt, you asked if this was newer. It's now for current. But before the grant, which I believe was started in 2018, there were three crime victim advocates, now there's 21. And it's used for fringes and salaries of the crime victim advocates.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: So currently there's 21 crime --

ADA MCDERMOTT: There are now 21 crime victim advocates here.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: In the DA's office?

ADA MCDERMOTT: Correct. That's separate, the County has their own.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: We have our own. Well, obviously they're much needed.

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ADA MCDERMOTT: And the ones in the District Attorney's Office are after criminal charges have been filed. The County CVA's, handle ones where there's been no charges.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: I understand. And just having worked with our own crime victim unit on an issue, I'm amazed at the work that these advocates do and what comfort and relief that they can bring to many of these victims. So I can only imagine. And this is pre crime ones yours is after. Wow, I'm impressed. Anyone else?

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: And I just want to correct on the record that this is item number 334-23. So I just want to make sure we have everything correct.

(Whereupon, all members of the Public Safety Committee respond in favor with, "Aye".) CHAIRWOMAN FORD: The Rules are suspended.

There are two items on the Addendum. Clerk Item 342-23 is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the Probation Department. May I have a motion? Moved by Legislator McKevitt, second by Legislator Pilip.

The item is before us.

MR. SCHILIRO: Joe Schiliro, Nassau County Probation Fiscal Officer. The two programs covered under this supplemental appropriation are the Stop DWI program. The item appropriates approximately \$237,000 in funds. DWIs represent about 45% of all probation cases.

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The second is the Reentry Task Force. It's a pass through grant administered by Nassau County Probation that serves offenders returning to Nassau County after release from the New York State prison system.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Your reentry program, does it also work with other programs as well, or is this the sole program that we use for those who are entering into society?

MR. SCHILIRO: It's a New York State program, it's a New York State pass through. So it funnels through us. But New York State sets the parameters on it, and it's administered through an outside vendor leadership training institute.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Okay. All right. Anyone else?

Legislator Bynoe.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Good afternoon. So this is a reentry program. And this is for individuals who are actually convicted?

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MR. SCHILIRO: Correct. They've been convicted. They've been sentenced to incarceration as opposed to probation. They reenter into the population through this program upon release from the prison system.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: And so there's no reentry program that the Probation Department would have at all for folks outside of that realm, right?

MR. SCHILIRO: No, not outside of that.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: And there's no program, as you understand it, at the County, either in the DA's office or --

MR. SCHILIRO: Not, to my knowledge. And like I said, this is a pass through program. So Probation is in the middle of it, but we do not have anything to do with the program, directing the program, the parameters are set by the State, the funding is set by the State. It passes through.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Do you have any

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data you could share with us in regards to --

MR. SCHILIRO: As far as -- let me see what we have (perusing).

Not specific data. Services include enhanced case management, transportation, family reunification services, emergency housing, provision of personal necessities, that type of thing. I don't have specific data in terms of individuals who pass through the program, though.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Would you be able to provide that? I think it would be something useful for this Body to review.

MR. SCHILIRO: Actually, I do have some some data here in terms of case conferences. This was in October 1, 2022 to September 30, 2023. This is actually from October through July of '23. Performance year to date was 115 case conferences, 92 intakes, 92 Service coordination. Service coordination began 92 individuals, 74 completed. That's what

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I could tell you in terms of the data that I was provided with prior to walking over here today.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: I think one of the benchmarks for me, in terms of how successful the program is would be through the period of time to which there in case management and going through the program, whether they re-offend or they're successful in integrating into the public. So that's the kind of data I would like to see. Thank you.

MR. SCHILIRO: Okay. All right.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: I just have a few follow up questions then too: So the Leadership Institute is the agency that does this reentry program?

MR. SCHILIRO: Correct.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: All right. And are they based here in Nassau County?

> MR. SCHILIRO: Yes. In Hempstead.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Okay. And they solely just work with individuals in Nassau County, or do they also provide

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services --

MR. SCHILIRO: To my knowledge, it's Nassau County.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Offhand, do you know how many employees they have there?

MR. SCHILIRO: Focused on this particular grant, I believe it looks like three full time employees and then not a part time employee, but somebody who's got part time focus on that.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: And I'm also interested with recidivism to see how many people -- are we helping people to get on a better track rather than to keep going back? You know, and I guess even with their schooling and the possibility of getting some type of jobs or maybe put them through workforce development so that they could get jobs, that they can make money or whatever.

And do they also follow up, like, do they provide any mental health type of services there as well? Or is this strictly --

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MR. SCHILIRO: I believe they do an assessment, an individual assessment on each individual that comes through and determine what services need to be provided.

CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Okay. Because I'm sure that they could suffer from depression or whatever.

All right. If you can get the information requested by Legislator Bynoe, I think that would be great.

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CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Clerk Item number 356-23 is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the Police Department. May I have a motion?

Moved by Legislator Mule, seconded by Legislator Bynoe.

The item is before us. Good afternoon, sir.

INSPECTOR FIELD: Good afternoon.

William Field Inspector with the Police Department. Item 356-23 is several supplemental appropriations.

The first one is to appropriate \$865,000 from the United States Department of Treasury.

The second one is to appropriate \$50,000 in funds received from the District Attorney's Office as a result of moneys seized under New York State Forfeiture Law.

The third is \$400,000 in funds received as of successful forfeiture actions for the misdemeanor forfeiture

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funds.

The next one is a supplemental appropriation of \$2,383,070 from the US Department of Homeland Security as part of our Port Security Grant program.

After that is the 2023 GIVE Initiative grant, which is the Gun Involved Violence Elimination Grant. This is to appropriate \$550,000 in funds from New York State Department of Criminal Justice.

And the last one is a grant for our Live Scan Acquisition Project. This is to assist the Department in purchasing new fingerprint machines and devices.

> CHAIRWOMAN FORD: Any questions? Legislator Bynoe.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you, Madam Chair. Good day.

I have a couple of questions: First, let's start with the State forfeiture funds. That comes from specifically some kind of split from the State as it relates to all police

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agencies within the state, or is it specific to whatever, I guess, seizing that we did.

INSPECTOR FIELD: My understanding is that is there is a breakdown. I don't know the breakdown. We get a specific amount from the District Attorney's Office. I could try to find out what that is and get back to you.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: That would be great. And also same would apply for the 865 that comes from the US Treasury.

INSPECTOR FIELD: That's a federal forfeiture. So that comes from the United States Department of Treasury based on investigations that the Police Department has assisted and participated in.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: So it's correlates with our seizures or does it correlate with the size of our Police Department; how is that allocated to us?

INSPECTOR FIELD: This isn't a grant. It would be more for police involvement that we had in an

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investigation.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: And we investigate crimes or participate in these investigations that are regional.

INSPECTOR FIELD: That involve multiple agencies outside the County.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: In so much that we even have some assets that assist with JFK in some of the work that we do there. We have dogs that are there and all that other stuff; is that correct?

INSPECTOR FIELD: Not specific areas. I'm not 100% sure where, but we're always involved in inter-agency participation and task force and things of that nature.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Okay. If you could get back to us about that State number.

INSPECTOR FIELD: The DA one?

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Yeah.

INSPECTOR FIELD: Yes. No problem.

LEGISLATOR BYNOE: I would

appreciate it. And honestly, I think a

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little more information for this Body in general would be helpful regarding the the US Department of Treasury. Just so that we have a good handle on exactly how this money comes in. I think I have an understanding on where it's spent. Through the years I've been able to see

its use and benefit and purpose. I just would like to know a little bit more about what it's connected to. The breakdown.

INSPECTOR FIELD: The breakdown. Okay. Yes.
