2 CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: At this time I
3 will call the public safety Committee to
4 order. I will ask Mr. Pulitzer to please
5 call the roll.

6 CLERK PULITZER: Thank you, sir.

7 Chairman Patrick Mullaney.

8 CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Here.

9 CLERK PULITZER: Vice Chairman Scott
10 Strauss?

11 LEGISLATOR STRAUSS: Present.

12 CLERK PULITZER: Substituting for
13 Ms. Pilip, Rose Walker?

14 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Here.

15 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator John
16 Ferretti.

17 LEGISLATOR FERRETTI: Here.

18 CLERK PULITZER: Ranking Member
19 Legislator Siela Bynoe.

20 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Here.

21 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Debra
22 Mule?

23 LEGISLATOR MULE: Here.

24 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Scott M.
25 Davis?

LEGISLATOR DAVIS: Present.

CLERK PULITZER: We have a quorum.

CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Thank you. There are three items on the agenda which are Clerk Item 15-24; 16-24; and 25-24.

Clerk Item 15-24 is an ordinance supplemental to the Annual Appropriation Ordinance in connection with the Office of Crime Victims Advocate.

May I have a motion?

LEGISLATOR STRAUSS: Motion made.

CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Moved by Legislator Strauss. Seconded by Legislator Walker.

The items are before us. Is anyone here from the Administration?

MS. DIEHL: Good afternoon, Chairman Mullaney and honorable members of the Public Safety Committee. My name is Jeanine Diehl, executive director of the Nassau County Office of Crime Victim Advocate.

On August 1, 2022, the Nassau County Office of Crime Victim Advocate procured

1
2 the Victim Crime Act grant, which
3 provides support to state and local
4 programs that assist victims of crime.
5 OCVA was awarded in total, \$1,515,551.04
6 for a three year contract period, which
7 started on October 1, 2022 and ends
8 September 30, 2025.

9 This supplemental before you is an
10 appropriation for the second year of the
11 contract for period October 1, 2023
12 through September 30, 2024, in the amount
13 of \$505,183.68.

14 I'd be happy to answer any
15 questions.

16 CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Legislator Mule.

17 LEGISLATOR MULE: Thank you.

18 I don't have a comment about this
19 item. I just want to acknowledge and
20 commend you on the excellent work that
21 you do. And this is an office that has
22 really brought value to the County.

23 Thank you.

24 MS. DIEHL: Thank you so much,
25 Legislator.

CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Any other
questions?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Yes, Jeanine.
Thank you very much.

MS. DIEHL: Thank you so much.

2 CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: We're going to
3 move on now to Clerk Items 16-24 and
4 25-24, which are ordinances supplemental
5 to the annual appropriation ordinance in
6 connection with the Probation Department.

7 (Whereupon, off the record
8 discussion.)

9 CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Clerk Items
10 16-24 and 25-24, ordinances supplemental
11 to the annual appropriation ordinance in
12 connection with the Probation Department.

13 May I have a motion?

14 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Moved by
15 Legislator Bynoe; seconded by Legislator
16 Strauss.

17 The item is before us. Is anyone
18 here from the Administration?

19 MR. LANDSMAN: Good afternoon, Mr.
20 Chairman. Douglas Landsman, Nassau County
21 Probation Accountant.

22 The item before you is our annual
23 Supervision and Treatment Services Plan,
24 known as STEP. The Supervision Treatment
25 Services Program is part of the State's

1
2 initiative to treat juvenile offenders.

3 It seeks to increase the number of
4 juvenile delinquents referred to and
5 successfully adjusted and treated at
6 probation intake, reduce the number of
7 secure non-secure detention care days,
8 and established viable alternatives to
9 residential placement.

10 STEP program is a unique opportunity
11 to have a positive impact on young lives
12 and to realign resources more
13 thoughtfully, efficiently and
14 effectively. The program seeks to aid in
15 juvenile reform by assessing risk levels
16 and then matching that risk level to
17 proper level of intervention needed for
18 the juvenile. Targeted population of
19 youth are those who alleged juvenile
20 delinquents, juvenile offenders,
21 adolescent offenders and youth
22 adjudicated to be Persons in Need of
23 Supervision or PINS.

24 Plan includes services provided by
25 outside specialized agencies that will

1
2 participate with Probation and servicing
3 this program.

4 Finally, there are multiple programs
5 utilized which assists youth and include
6 overtime for family division officers to
7 supervise youth; CBI, which is Cognitive
8 Behavioral Intervention therapy for
9 interactive journaling; Electronic
10 Monitoring; Community Service Monitoring,
11 Juvenile Justice Services; and Peer
12 Diversion Court.

13 This is a one year grant from our
14 New York State Office of Children and
15 Family Services for \$260,400. There is an
16 additional match of \$159,600, making the
17 total grant gross \$420,000. It covers the
18 periods from October to September of this
19 year.

20 Thank you.

21 CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Thank you.
22 Legislative Mule.

23 LEGISLATOR MULE: Thank you.

24 When you say it's a match, is that a
25 match from the County?

1
2 MR. LANDSMAN: Yes it is. It would
3 be a cash match. The actual grant, total
4 grant is 420, and we get reimbursed 62%
5 of that amount. That would be 260,400.
6 The remaining amount, the 159,600, is a
7 38% match, which the County has to come
8 up with. That's paid through the General
9 Fund.

10 LEGISLATOR MULE: Okay. And
11 alternatives to residential placement,
12 does that mean you're looking to keep
13 offenders in their homes with services?
14 Is that what that means?

15 MS. REYER: Good afternoon. Arianne
16 Reyer, I'm counsel For Adolescent and
17 Juvenile Justice for the Department of
18 Probation. And yes, that's exactly what
19 it means. It's ways to keep young people
20 who commit offenses, whether they be
21 juvenile offenders, adolescent offenders
22 or juvenile delinquents, in their
23 communities with community based
24 services, so that we're not removing them
25 from their school districts, their

1
2 families, their communities, etc..

3 LEGISLATOR MULE: And are services
4 also provided to the families to to help
5 them to learn coping skills for perhaps
6 better being able to address the
7 offenders?

8 MS. REYER: Not through the
9 Probation Department directly, but one of
10 the service providers that we're seeking
11 to work with goes into the home and does
12 services with the family. Unfortunately,
13 the Probation Department doesn't have
14 jurisdiction over the parents, but we do
15 provide voluntary services in the home
16 through an outside provider.

17 LEGISLATOR MULE: Thank you.

18 CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Any other
19 questions?

20 (Whereupon, no verbal
21 response.)

22 CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Is there someone
23 to speak on behalf of 25-24 as well?

24 MR. LANDSMAN: Yes. Again, Douglas
25 Landsman, Nassau Probation Accountant.

1
2 25-24 is basically a continuation of
3 the item we just heard. It's also our
4 STIP grant, but now it's an additional
5 funding for our Raise the Age portion of
6 that grant. That raise the age portion,
7 we define as: "The purpose of RTA is to
8 raise the age at which children are
9 prosecuted as adults in the New York
10 state court system. This is to give them
11 a chance at a clean record. RTA tries to
12 schedule most cases in the Family Court
13 parts, unless there are felonies or
14 serious crimes committed, which then move
15 their cases to adult court. There are
16 multiple programs utilized, which include
17 overtime for family division offices to
18 supervise youth electronic monitoring,
19 Peer Diversion Court, a CBI again
20 Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for
21 interactive journaling, community service
22 monitoring, juvenile justice services,
23 and community mentorship employment
24 skills. This grant is in addition to the
25 one you just heard. It's \$720,000. There

1
2 is no match specifically for Raise the
3 Age, covering the period from October
4 through September of this year".

5 In addition, there's there's one
6 other item. This would be our annual
7 Alternatives to Incarceration grant.
8 There are two amounts involved, \$307,672.
9 That was our initial grant this year. We
10 were very fortunate. We got additional
11 funding with secondary stream of
12 1,768,637, bringing the total to
13 2,076,309.

14 The Pretrial Services grant is one
15 of the state mandated programs comprising
16 Nassau's Alternative to Incarceration
17 Plan (ATI). ATI is funded by the New
18 York State DCJS, Office of Probation
19 Correctional Alternatives, and is
20 renewable annually. Release of an
21 offender at arraignment provides the
22 substantial cost savings as the first
23 several days of confinement are typically
24 the most expensive. The grant allows
25 release of defendants saving jail costs

1
2 in excess of \$200 per day per individual.
3 Offenders are released by the reigning
4 judge to be monitored under the least
5 restrictive conditions necessary to
6 ensure their return to court.

7 Individuals are assessed using
8 Monroe County Risk Assessment for
9 pretrial services. Released individuals
10 are monitored by telephone, in person and
11 GPS, which prompt violation notifications
12 made to the court.

13 Reimbursement is performance based
14 of attainment of milestone targets. We
15 actually did very well, hit those
16 milestones in the first quarter of the
17 grant, which was July to September of
18 last year. We continue to work with this
19 grant regardless of the funding. We still
20 do what we need to do.

21 This is a one year New York State,
22 DCJS grant covering from July to June of
23 this year.

24 Thank you.

25 CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Thank you.

Any questions?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: All right. At
this time, any public comment?

(Whereupon, no verbal
response.)

CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: All right.
Recognizing none.

We'll vote separately. So all those
in favor of passing Item 15-24 say, "Aye.
Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of
the Public Safety Committee
respond in favor with, "Aye".)

CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: 15-24 passes
unanimously.

All those in favor of passing Items
16-24 and 25-24 signify by saying, "Aye".

(Whereupon, all members of
the Public Safety Committee
respond in favor with, "Aye".)

CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Opposed?

(Whereupon, no verbal

response.)

CHAIRMAN MULLANEY: Both these items
pass unanimously.
