American Cancer Society Walk - Making Strides Against Breast Cancer





Get ready to gain an hour of sleep—day light saving time is about to end. On Sunday, November 4, it's time to fall back and set the clocks back to mark the end of daylight saving time.

The country sprang clocks forward the second week of March, but the reverse will happen come November 4.

The change will happen to those living across the country 2 a.m. local time the first Sunday of November, according to the National Institutes of Standard and Technology (NIST). Some people



across the country will turn their clocks an hour back come November 4, but there are some states in the U.S. that won't have to participate in turning their clocks back because they never had to spring them forward.

Daylight savings time is not observed in Hawaii and Arizona (with the exception of the Navajo Indian Reservation in the state), according to NIST. U.S. territories like Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, and the Virgin Islands also do not observe daylight savings time, according to the institution.


Daylight savings time (DST) began in 1883 after the U.S. and Canadian railroads determined a four-zone system to stop confusion from the 100 conflicting locally established "sun times" that were observed across train terminals across the country, according to the United States Department of Transportation. Four zones were established: eastern, central, mountain, and pacific time zones.

The Standard Time Act in 1918 created boundaries between the standard time zones in the U.S., according to the U.S. DOT. This led to daylight saving time (DST), which was introduced in 1966 as part of the Uniform Time Act. The law was an effort to preserve the daylight, according to the U.S. DOT. The department keeps a <u>list</u> of reasons on the positives for turning the clock back, including saving energy, preventing traffic injuries, and claim the time change even prevents crime.

2018–2019 WINTER WEATHER FORECAST



ABOVE-NORMAL TEMPERATURES (ALMOST) EVERYWHERE

This winter, we expect to see above-normal temperatures almost everywhere in the United States, except in the Southwest, where we're predicting a colder-than-normal season. It's still going to be wintery, of course, but it won't be an especially frigid year. Our milder-than-normal forecast is due to the expected arrival of a weak El Niño, which will prevent cold air masses from lingering in the North. Despite a decrease in solar activity, we predict that the other factors that contribute to winter weather will keep temperatures above normal.

MORE RAIN, LESS SNOW

In terms of precipitation, we are predicting **above-normal levels for most of the country**, except in the Southeast, southern California, the nation's midsection, and parts of Alaska and Hawaii, where normal or below-normal precipitation amounts are expected instead.

As for snow, we expect to see **below-normal levels of snowfall** in areas that normally get snow, with the interior West and a small part of the nation's midsection being the **snowier-than-normal exceptions**.

Winter storms are named based on either meeting, or the expectation to meet, at least one of the following criteria:

- NWS winter storm, blizzard, or ice storm warnings covering at least a population of 2 million
- NWS winter storm, blizzard, or ice storm warnings covering at least an area of 400,000 square kilometers

Storms forecast to trigger NWS warnings over a much larger population and/or area, such as January 2018's Winter Storm Grayson in the <u>South</u> and <u>Northeast</u>, are typically named well ahead of time.

Lake-effect snowstorms are not named, and any warnings covering lake-effect snow are not counted for consideration for naming a winter storm.

Using these criteria, the number of named winter storms has been consistent over six seasons.

According to winter weather expert <u>Tom Niziol</u> of The Weather Channel, there were 24 named winter storms in the 2017-18 season. The three previous seasons each had 22 named storms. There were 26 named storms in <u>2013-14</u> and 27 storms in <u>2012-13</u>.

Preparing Your Home and Car for the Blast of Winter

We live in the Northeast, you know the drill. Four to five months of heavy clothes, seeing your breath and generally freezing outside. Sometimes even elsewhere, Old Man Winter stops in for an unexpected visit. But beyond the inconvenience and discomfort, a winter storm or other severe weather conditions can cause real damage. So it's important to think about winter preparedness.

Protecting your home is vital. A frozen water pipe can burst and flood your house or basement. An ice dam in your gutter can cause water to seep into and saturate an interior wall. And then there's your car. Making sure it's prepped to face winter's worst is just as critical.

After all, what would happen if a blizzard stranded you in your car?

10 Tips To Prepare Your Home and Property for Winter

If you take good care of your house and property, you'll be better prepared to weather any storm or disaster.

- Inspect your gutters and make sure that they are clean so that water can drain properly.
- Are bugs getting into your home? Perhaps you need to seal gaps and cracks around windows and doors to keep both bugs and the cold air out.
- Don't forget to look up. Inspect your roof for any damage or leaky vents.
- How are your driveway, sidewalk, and steps holding up? Be sure to repair anything that needs attention.
- Trim any dead branches or trees that may be leaning over your home.
- After all of that spring and summer pollen, now is a good time to repair dirty filters.
- Clean your clothes dryer exhaust duct and the space behind the dryer and remove any lint or dust that may have accumulated.
- Hire a professional to check out your furnace, fireplace, and chimney.
- Insulate water pipes that may be prone to freezing temperatures.
- Now is also the time to test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Prepare your car

According to the Department of Transportation, 22% of all vehicle crashes in the U.S. – and 16% of the fatalities – are due to severe weather such as rain, snow, sleet and ice. So, prepare your car for treacherous conditions and extremely cold temperatures – and know what to do if you find yourself stranded in a vehicle. When the temperatures start to drop:



- Drive only if it is absolutely necessary. If you must drive, travel during the day.
- Don't travel alone. Keep others informed of your schedule.
- Stay on main roads and avoid back road shortcuts.
- Top off antifreeze, windshield wiper fluid, gas, oil and other fluids.
- Make sure your tires have enough tread. Consider snow tires.
- Keep bagged salt or sand in the trunk for extra traction and to melt ice.
- Clear snow from the top of the car, headlights and windows.
- Save the numbers for your auto club, insurance agent and towing service into your cell phone.

Keep a cold-weather kit in your trunk. It should include a blanket or sleeping bag, gloves, hard candy, bottled water, folding shovel, first aid kit, flashlight and cell phone charger.

If you're trapped in a vehicle



- Remain inside. Rescuers are more likely to find you there.
- Run the engine and heater about 10 minutes every hour. Clear any snow from the exhaust pipe to reduce your risk of carbon monoxide poisoning.
 - Move around to maintain heat.
 - Use maps, floor mats and seat covers for insulation.
 - Take turns sleeping. Someone should always be awake to alert rescuers.
 - Drink fluids to avoid dehydration.
 - Turn on the inside light at night so rescue crews can find you.
