As COVID-19 infection rates continued to drop in Nassau County, County Executive Curran delivered her 118th and final daily COVID-19 press briefing on Monday, July 13th. The County Executive expressed her gratitude for the County's response team, medical and essential workers and to our Nassau County residents for the shared efforts in flattening the curve and fight the disease. "We have made great progress. But, as coronavirus cases spike dramatically across the rest of the country, we are reminded that we must continue to stay alert, practice proper social distancing and continue to adhere to common-sense guidance. Nassau County has proven to the rest of the country that it's possible to re-open the economy and protect public health at the same time and we want to keep on this track," **said County Executive Curran.**

OMA – A Voice in Important Conversations



Unified Long Island is a bi-county taskforce that will serve to empower communities to stand united against all acts of hate and bias that are based on antisemitism, race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, gender, gender identity, disability or sexual orientation. The taskforce will partner with existing stake holders, leaders and residents as well as law enforcement agencies, human rights advocates, community organizations, religious institutions, government offices and education platforms to advocate for unity, acceptance, and diversity. **OMA Deputy Director, Bishop Lionel Harvey**, is the Nassau County Chair for this endeavor.

The taskforce is developing an action plan to identify, and document hate and bias incidents while working towards strengthening the bonds of friendship and respect within and amongst the communities across Long Island.

Police and Community Trust (PACT):

On 7/16/2020 Nassau County Executive announced the creation of PACT - A committee of community activists, Nassau County Police Commissioner, police union representatives, the County Executive and other public officials brought together to create meaningful dialog designed to repair the relationship between the police and Communities of Color.

PACT will also engage the Nassau County District Attorney, Office of Minority Affairs, faith-based groups, and Human Rights Commission to seek and gather ongoing input. **OMA's Program Supervisor Victoria Roberts** is our liaison for this community effort.



Serving on Important County Committees:

Members of OMA's staff have served on a number of additional committees, including recent selection committees related to the selection of developers for affordable housing projects and transit-oriented development funding.

Supporting Minority Businesses

OMA has assisted MWBEs with County, State and federal loan applications and helped promote the County's Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) kit giveaway, in conjunction with Nassau County IDA's Non-Profit arm, LEAC. We've also advised businesses on NYS closure rules and reopening guidelines and participated on the County Executive's COVID-19 Economic Advisory Council, with LIAACC, Long Island Hispanic Chamber and the Nassau Council of Chambers of Commerce.

Our OMA Team has been out and about visiting our MWBE's as they re-open their businesses. We are here to help our business owners during these challenging times -- Our small businesses are the economic engines of our communities!

Small Business Loans:

OMA recognizes the financial toll this pandemic has caused on small business owners. We have assisted businesses with information on County, state and federal loan programs. We encourage businesses and non-profit with under 20 employees to please go to <u>www.boostnassau.net</u> to apply for the County's low-interest loan program, which is part of the Governor's New York Forward Loan Fund.



Additionally, federal Emergency Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL) provides loans of up to \$2 million dollars to help overcome the temporary loss of revenue due to the coronavirus. This program expires December 21, 2020. PPP is a forgivable loan that incentivizes small business owners to retain their workforce and rehire laid-off workers. 

This system was conceived and developed by **OMA's Deputy Director, Dr. Regina L. Williams,** supported by NC Department of Information Technology. OMA thanks IT Commissioner Nancy Stanton, Christine Levitsky and staff. The teams worked collaboratively to create and test the new "MWBE App" both before and during the COVID-19 pandemic, ensuring the June launch. **OMA's Program Coordinator, Michelle Crosley,** functions as Certification Analyst laboring diligently with our MWBEs. Although having to handle all MWBEs via telephone calls and emails during the pandemic, the "MWBE App" in its functionality has been a seamless tool in navigating the enormous influx in filings.

Diversity & Community Engagement

This new arm of our department links OMA to all County residents by providing invaluable information to bring resources to our residents during these unprecedented times. **Bishop Lionel Harvey is OMA's Deputy Director for Diversity and Community Engagement**. A concerted effort has been in researching and building a database which now encompasses over 200 Faith-Based and Community Organizations. Our recent focus has been to assist with County Initiatives such as the Community Food Distributions, COVID-19/Antibody Testing Sites in minority communities and the distribution of PPE equipment to our business partners for safe re-openings. **OMA's Special Assistant, Lynne Poole**, plays an essential role in the success of this endeavor.

Nassau County Community Food Distributions

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Nassau County Executive Laura Curran established a Community Food Distribution program that has served over 25,000 families to date, utilizing federal funding and partnerships with Island Harvest and Long Island Cares. Hundreds of volunteers joined team members from numerous County offices, including Housing, Human Services and OMA, to collaborate with school districts, nonprofits, community groups to try to address the tremendous food insecurity created by the health crisis and record unemployment. Communities served have included Hempstead, Roosevelt, Uniondale, Freeport, Glen Cove, East Meadow, Hicksville, Valley Stream and Long Beach.

One County-sponsored event, at the Nassau Coliseum, was the largest food distribution effort ever in the County, serving over 4,000 families. "As we work to revive our economy, Nassau County will remain committed to addressing the food insecurity crisis triggered by COVID-19. We've reached every corner of the County with our food distribution events, and we're not done yet. We will continue putting food on the table for families in need." said **County Executive Laura Curran**.




OMA's Millennial Chat Series
