Request for Proposals

Nassau County, New York (the "County") is currently seeking proposals from qualified individuals and entities authorized to do business in the State of New York, to design and implement a Disparity Study to identify what barriers, if any, did individuals living in communities hard hit by COVID-19, have in accessing testing and treatment.

The purpose of this Request for Proposal (RFP) is to provide Nassau County with proposals and recommendations that asses the barriers communities of color face in receiving COVID-19 testing, treatment and related services, including assessing attitudes towards a future COVID-19 vaccine among individuals living in communities of color. In addition to gathering data that would inform Nassau County's long-term response to the COVID-19 pandemic in Black and Brown communities, the Disparity Study should also address longstanding health inequities in Nassau County which exacerbated the impact of COVID-19 on the most vulnerable communities.
