Are you prepared?



As the hurricane season begins, being prepared is the best way to safeguard your home, protect your family, and ensure peace of mind. Hurricanes can bring powerful winds, heavy rain, and high tides capable of causing significant damage. This simple guide will help you understand how to prepare for hurricane season in an easily digestible manner.

Understanding Hurricane Season

5. Check Your Insurance Coverage

Once the storm has passed, check your home for damage and report it to your insurance company. Beware of potential hazards such as downed power lines or gas leaks. Do not drink tap water until officials say it's safe to do so.











Sink-Hole Opens in Lido Blvd.
