Okay. Mr. Aracich, followed by Mike Greco. So, Mr. Greco, wherever you are, please come up front and be ready if you're here.

MR. ARACICH: Good evening, Mr.

Presiding Officer and members of the Legislature. My name is Matthew Aracich, President of the Building and Construction Trades Council for Nassau and Suffolk counties, and I rise in support of the Sands DEIS.

I recognize the efforts made by Sands as evidence in their 28,000 pages. It is a highly detailed and complete document and precisely what the project of this magnitude deserves. It is the most extensive environmental analysis I've ever experienced in my 45 years in construction in New York City and Long Island.

From the very first moment I was introduced to the Sands team, they

1
2 pledged the support to expand the union
3 movement and invited us to be part of the
4 plan. The DEIS backs up Sand's commitment
5 not only to the labor movement, but also
6 to the core issues affecting Long Island,
7 like meaningful employment with benefits.

8 Sands proactive, collaborative
9 approach proves that they are committed
10 to a workforce development model that has
11 become Long Island's success. The hard
12 working, skilled women and men in labor
13 intend to build this LEED Silver project
14 from the beginning to end, with more than
15 7000 union construction jobs, with over
16 \$150 million in ancillary infrastructure
17 investments complementing their
18 multi-billion dollar plan in this resort.
19 This development clearly is sensible and
20 demonstrates a profound impact on Nassau
21 County's future. Once the expansion of
22 the Meadowbrook substation and the
23 addition of the new well in Uniondale,
24 this project enables the core of Nassau
25 County to continue to deliver safe,

1
2 reliable infrastructure that focuses on a
3 quality of life.

4 And let us not forget about the
5 money in this project that is injected
6 into the communities with over \$563
7 million every single year in tax revenue
8 funding initiatives that really matter
9 for schools, libraries, parks, public
10 safety, the chambers of commerce, and
11 even our local nonprofits. This is not
12 about just today. It's about giving to
13 our kids. It's about grandkids,
14 generations and a brighter future.

15 (Whereupon, interruption
16 from audience.)

17 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: All right.
18 Listen, everybody, if you keep on talking
19 out, we're going to be here all night.

20 MR. ARACICH: This property sat idle
21 for four decades, and now you can breathe
22 new life into the County. I urge the
23 leaders to move this process forward to
24 the final EIS and bring lasting benefits
25 to Nassau County and Long Island.

Mr. Greco, are you here? Followed by Steven Rolston.

MR. GRECO: Members of the Legislature, I am no way a professional, refined speaker like the other folks who have spoken before me, so I'm going to read this.

We can talk about and read about all the destructive environmental drain the casino will have on Long Island, our water supply, our dwindling water supply that's already diminished by the Grumman plume and is further reduced to emergency drought levels by the lowest rainfall amounts since records have been kept for such things. It boils down to one question: Does the casino increase the danger and reduce the physical health safety of our children, our grandchildren

and our families? We're talking about environment, Physical health, safety, environmental safety, mental health, safety, financial health and safety of all those people.

So it comes down to this. I think that what types, what types of people aspire to build something that they know will cause this kind of harm? What type of people to aspire to that for their careers? The people we trusted when we elected them need to aspire to earn that trust when we elected them because we trusted them to say no to the casino on environmental basis as well as others. That's what I have. Thank you. Okay.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Steve Rolston followed by George Krug. George Krug, please get ready. Thank you.

MR. ROLSTON: We're here to consider the environmental issues. This is not happening in a vacuum. There are environmental reasons, plus economic and social reasons, that a casino is

considered nothing more than legal fraud resulting in new addicted gamblers, bankruptcy increases and crime increases of 10% each year every year, academics and economists confirm it in 2024. Laura Gillen is the first local politician, aside from Delia DeRigg-Whitton, to speak out against the idea of bringing a casino among us. The Baldwin Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Shari Camhi, has also stated -

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Please comment on environmental impact statement --

MR. ROLSTON: Yeah, it's two paragraphs away. I got 30s more. This is an all encompassing monster.

Dr. Camhi said it will have a deeply negative effect on not just school children, but on all of us. Problem gamblers spend 10% less on food, 25% less on clothing and 37% have raided their bank accounts. This is a preventable social issue. Don't build it.

The DEIS uses terms like mitigation and best practices seeking to absolve LVS from the environmental damage this will cause. The Long Island Sierra Club has listed their many deep concerns on their website. Not one concern is mitigated here. They are made worse.

The DEC warns our water supply is compromised. Our aquifer has been under stress from over pumping drawing salt water into our drinking water. During an autumn of drought in a climate crisis, LV Sands seeks rezoning for a well to drain 750,000 gallons of water daily to host 23,000 daily visitors, which will foul our air.

Long Island celebrated its best tourism year ever in 2023 thanks to our open spaces, beautiful beaches, charming towns and access to great restaurants and vineyards.

Supporters say the hub is fallow ground and not making money. It is making money by giving us space to breathe,

giving visitors access to the rest of Long Island with a highway system that works. We all love our garden at home because it gives us space. There are very few open spaces.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: 30s left.

MR. ROLSTON: Nassau County, south of the -- You interrupted me twice, sir.

Why crowd this open space with a casino? Nassau County will lose money. Sands will make money from our pockets for no goods and return. We are left with increased crime, rising cost of social services, reduction of real estate values, air and ground water pollution, and loss of business to merchants across the county.

Jesse Jackson warned the new chains of slavery happen to be lottery tickets, all commercial gambling targets people of color --

MR. ROLSTON: Please be very critical. This is a losing proposition. Please reject it. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: All right. Please. Listen, everyone, understand if you're going to speak about extraneous matters as the last speaker did and/or refuse to leave the podium, what you're doing is you're being very discourteous to a lot of other people here. This is a very large crowd. You have a lot of people who want to speak. And when you don't confine yourself to the subject at hand, you're being very unfair.

Mr. Krug, followed by Gino LaRocca. Go ahead, sir.

MR. KRUG: All right. Good evening, and thank you for the opportunity to speak. My name is George Krug. I'm from Garden City, and I stand with the majority of Nassau residents who oppose a casino in the heart of our
Just 19 days ago, Las Vegas Sands suburbs.

2 dropped an 819 page sales pitch, backed
3 up by a pile of charts and data that few
4 of us, including all of you, have the
5 expertise to interpret or vet for
6 accuracy or legitimacy. It didn't take 19
7 days to see that this one sided
8 presentation must be thoroughly
9 scrutinized and challenged.

10 Many of the conclusions simply defy
11 logic. They projected four years of heavy
12 construction, 10 million visitors a year
13 arriving by car, bus and shuttle will
14 have an insignificant impact on air
15 quality. Where's the accounting for
16 moving 155 tons of trash per week off
17 island? I say off island because our
18 incinerators are already at capacity. So
19 this new waste stream is going off island
20 and that should be factored in.

21 The study purports to examine the
22 socio economic impact, but the analysis
23 is all about how much LV Sands is going
24 to give, but nothing about what they will
25 take or what it will cost Nassau

1
2 taxpayers. Nothing about the cost of
3 crime and gambling addiction and drunk
4 driving, or the impact of 3300 seats of
5 food and beverage competing with local
6 businesses. This project will not only
7 create a cone of depression in our
8 aquifer, it will create a cone of
9 economic depression, \$2 billion big in
10 our local economy.

11 But here's the show stopper, or
12 should be, from a socio economic point of
13 view. People in this room who would
14 oppose a marijuana dispensary in any one
15 of our neighborhoods are saying yes to a
16 casino next to a university and a
17 college; yet, 1 in 10 college students is
18 already a pathological gambler. That's
19 10%. That's at a rate that's 2 to 5 times
20 higher than the general population. Young
21 adults already get hammered with online
22 gambling and sports betting promotions.
23 People in their early 20s are the fastest
24 growing group of gamblers. Building this

MR. ROLSTON: It's not off topic,
it's socioeconomics. Just to set the
record straight, I didn't bring it up the
Sands brought it up by including
socioeconomics in their survey. Residents
have a right to comment on it.

I submit that this DEIS is woefully
inadequate. I put it upon you to
challenge it and scrutinize it to the
degree due. To do anything other than to
do that, makes this a 28,000 page butt
covering exercise and not a process at
all. Thank you.

We have Gino LaRocca. Gino LaRocca is not ready. Adrienne Esposito, followed by Karen Riordan. Karen Riordan, please get ready.

MS. ESPOSITO: Good evening, members of the Legislature. Hope you're having a good time.

My name is Adrienne Esposito. I'm the executive director of Citizens Campaign for the Environment. We're here to comment specifically on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement, which was quite voluminous. We will be submitting written comments, hopefully by January 6th, but I'm just going to touch on just a couple of little points here for your consideration.

The first one is water withdrawal. The DEIS says that they will use approximately 763,000 gallons of water per year, and that includes the water for irrigation purposes of 62,000 gallons. Then it also talks a little bit about

2 they will mitigate that through using
3 water conservation devices; about 25%
4 native plantings and other "no mow"
5 plantings. But I think the DEIS should
6 just say we're using that and, therefore,
7 the water draw is less. It didn't seem to
8 have a a commitment to using it, just
9 stating that they could use it and reduce
10 it by 25%. So we'd like to see that area
11 strengthened.

12 Also, we'd like to see strengthen
13 the area in solid waste, which we felt
14 was a little bit anemic.

15 Overall, I want to say it was a very
16 comprehensive and a very complete draft
17 EIS. I've been reading draft EIS for over
18 40 years, which I hate to admit, but this
19 was quite comprehensive.

20 But in the area of solid waste, it's
21 projecting about 623 tons per month of
22 waste to be generated from the facility,
23 which is approximately 7500 tons per
24 year. We heard earlier testimony that the
25 Reworld can't take it; that's not true.

There is room at Reworld, but the point is we want to see it reduced. We'd like to see a stronger commitment to recycling with some metrics for reducing that solid waste generation over time. That was not in the plan, and we'd like to see it in the plan.

The other issue is the water withdrawal issue. As water is withdrawn from the aquifer, we want, perhaps, Sands to work with the USGS to say how that will impact any nearby tributaries or streams in their water levels, particularly the streams and tributaries to the South Shore Estuary Reserve.

The last thing we're just going to comment on for this purpose is the energy. We really want to commend sand for going for the gold star, which is the lead standard of gold. That is not an easy thing to do. We appreciate them working to achieve that. In the DEIS, it talks about 60% by 2030; 90% of their energy coming from renewable energy by

1
2 2040; and 100% by 2050. That's stronger
3 than even New York state standards. So
4 that's a great thing.

5 Lastly, I want to say we're
6 recommending and we hope that you agree
7 because this is something you can do,
8 that they put together a community
9 advisory board that as the Sands project
10 commences in construction, and if it is
11 approved and if it is built, there would
12 be an advisory board that looks at the
13 metrics to see how they're doing on
14 energy and water and solid waste
15 management.

16 Thank you very much.

17 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you.

18 Karen Riordon, followed by Bob
19 Hussey.

20 MS. RIORDON: A recent eight
21 year federal study shows Long Island's
22 unique sole source aquifer is under
23 threat from saltwater intrusion. And we
24 were specifically called out for over
25 pumping in the middle of the island for

having

2 consequences on shore communities like
3 Long Beach and Great Neck.

4 The 28,000 page DEIS report was not
5 accessible this weekend, as it was
6 conveniently offline, making it difficult
7 to fact check. However, I believe it
8 failed to take into account the full
9 regional impact the casino project will
10 have on saltwater intrusion on shore
11 communities, as studied in this federal
12 report, relative to over pumping and
13 large projects. With this in mind, and
14 given that we are currently in a severe
15 drought, I was struck while previously
16 reading in the report that a deep well
17 may be required. This language is vague.

18 I would like to note the law
19 requires you to explicitly mention the
20 Loyd aquifer in the days, if it is in
21 fact under consideration due to the
22 strict regulatory and environmental
23 implications, so that the absence of such
24 statements suggests that the wells that
25 you're going to draw are only going to

come from the shallow aquifers.

This morning, I was finally able to view the DEIS appendix 3.24 from the EPA regarding the cleanup plan for the groundwater contamination of this known Superfund site. Its plan is to install new pipes, remove contaminated groundwater, then treat the water at a treatment facility. It states the phase of this work will take several years to complete. The EPA will coordinate with local officials to ensure engagement with residents and the impacted communities. Do the communities of Uniondale, Salisbury, North Hempstead, Hempstead, Hicksville and Westbury know that their water will be coming from a known contaminated Superfund site and that they likely will be paying more due to the excessive demand in what will likely be uncertain a water drought future? I think the very least you could have done was to send them a postcard notifying them of today's hearing.

According to the report, the scale of this project introduces risks that are going to require ongoing monitoring and management for this specific project. Has the Legislature factored this cost into your deal with Sands?

Who will be paying for this dedicated department or personnel? The casino -- by the way. You know, it's two casinos? You read that in the report, correct -- is too big and unsuited for our fragile island, with its unique environmental limitations, suburban location with no mass transit and proximity to 60,000 students.

Ten million extra annual visitors is a lot of wear and tear on our county roads, infrastructure, hospitals, train stations and social services. And it's also extra crime and drunk driving we don't need to invite into our suburban neighborhoods. Say no to the casino.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay then, Dr. Jeffrey Reynolds, followed by Joanna Mikucki.

DR. REYNOLDS: Good evening. My name is Dr. Jeffrey Reynolds. I have the privilege of serving as the president and CEO of Family and Children's Association. We are a 140-year-old organization based about a mile from here with 13 locations across Nassau and Suffolk County. Most germane to this conversation, we serve about 36,000 Long Islanders in any given year, and a large percentage of those folks are struggling with addiction. So we run two state licensed treatment centers, one in Hicksville, one in Hempstead, three recovery centers. And then we have a cadre of about 60 folks with lived experience. That is people in long term recovery who work with folks who are struggling.

I looked at the DEIS impact study specific to the issues related to problem gambling. That is part of the environmental impact study. It should be part of the environmental impact study. And as I've shared here before, it was one of our key concerns going into this conversation. Both in that document and in my conversations with Las Vegas Sands, I've not only been satisfied with the provisions they're putting in place to mitigate problem gambling, but they've gone beyond the industry standards. A great example of that is most casinos have exclusion rules for folks that self-identify as having an issue with gambling. Sands actually goes the next step to have proactive efforts on site to deal with folks who might be struggling.

Additionally, there are no other casinos in North America that are supporting local problem gambling services, as Las Vegas Sands has. I will quickly note Las Vegas Sands hasn't put a

1
2 shovel in the ground, and they're already
3 supporting problem gambling addiction
4 services in Nassau County. Problems,
5 quite frankly, they didn't cause, but
6 that we're seeing in the community. And
7 so when we started this process, we spoke
8 to the lawyers, we met with the Sands
9 representatives. But I had two meetings
10 with that, with their director of problem
11 gambling Services, and was incredibly
12 impressed with the commitment to
13 addressing any potential problems related
14 to problematic gambling.

15 Again, we are seeing issues right
16 now in the community. We're seeing folks
17 with these issues in our Hempstead and
18 Hicksville locations, every single one of
19 them is associated with online gambling.
20 I don't have anyone that's struggling
21 with actual casinos.

22 And so we support the impact report.
23 We think it goes a long way. We're
24 committed to working with Sands to
25 advance those plans around problem

gambling, whether or not their application is approved.

I thank you very much for your time tonight. I'm giving you back 30s. I appreciate your attention.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you. Joanna Mikucki, followed by John Durso.

And as I said before, when I announced somebody to follow, it would be good if you came up front and just get ready.

MS. MIKUCKI: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. My name is Joanna Mikucki. They call me Jojo. So everyone's given a big deal about traffic patterns and all that jazz, but I don't think it's a problem. Look at UBS arena. Look at the shuttles. I've been there, back and forth, taking a shuttle to the arena. There's been problems already with the roads on the Meadowbrook, etc.. I drive Ocean Parkway and Meadowbrook every goddamn day. There is traffic and this is a solution. Sands is going to make a

John Durso followed by James Lynch. James Lynch, please come up front and get ready.

MR. DURSO: Good afternoon. Each and every one of you. Thank you very much for being here. Thank you for taking the time to talk to all of us and hearing our concerns.

This project and this draft impact statement is an extraordinary piece of information, 28,000 pages -- I'd hate to be the person carrying it. It is absolutely, absolutely well done, well informed. There is so much information in

And I will tell you that when you conclude this, when you read this, when you see this, you will see that we are more than prepared to handle what is proposed, and what it will do for our

resident of Stewart Manor, New York. In
respect to Dr. Reynolds, my esteemed
colleague who has treated many more cases
of addiction than I have, I understand
his concern that the Sands has helped the
potential situation that will arise.
However, I will alert the members of this
Legislature that there is 17 active
Gamblers Anonymous meetings happening at
this very moment within ten miles of
where we stand. There will be need in the
sands and in the community to add to
these services. And I agree with Dr.
Reynolds that that should be part of this
environmental study, because the

environmental study is affecting the communities that we live in.

I thank you. I ask you to reconsider the to the consideration of having this casino and the impact on this community and its environment. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you. Next is Paul Fleischmann, followed by Joseph Garcia. Mr. Garcia, please get ready.

MR. FLEISCHMANN: Thank you for the opportunity. I can tell you right off the bat, I do not have Adrienne Esposito's expertise when it comes to environmental issues, nor do I have Matty Aracich's expertise when it comes to construction. But what I do have in common with both of them is I love Long Island, and this is an opportunity that may not come again to our community.

When I look at this DEIS, which again, I don't have the expertise that others have, my takeaway is we have a company that is demonstrating that they

2 are ready, willing and able to make any
3 necessary investment to make sure that
4 the environmental impact is positive
5 along with the economic impact. And this
6 may very well be Long Island's last and
7 best chance to have a project, to have a
8 development on that glorious piece of
9 property that will be both positive for
10 the environment as well as positive for
11 the economy.

12 Thank you very much.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Joseph
14 Garcia, followed by Julie Berger.

15 MR. GARCIA: Hello. So I'm here
16 tonight really mostly as a parent. I am
17 with a lot of different organizations, I
18 helped co-chair a committee with The
19 Sands, but really it is as my role as a
20 dad; three kids.

21 I've been hearing since I'm a kid
22 about all kinds of different ideas for
23 the Nassau Coliseum site. Over my
24 lifetime of only 42 years old, I've seen
25 it, frankly, get worse there over time.

1
2 This is an opportunity to have a
3 development where the environmental
4 concerns are real, and I think they've
5 been addressed. Certainly I didn't read
6 the 28,000 pages, but I've been to the
7 presentations. I've had a chance to get
8 an overview. And I don't think you'll
9 ever get better than this. The next plan
10 ten years from now and ten years after
11 that and ten years after that, are they
12 going to have as much mitigation as the
13 Sands is committing to? I don't see it. I
14 see this as a place where there's
15 opportunity both for for jobs, for labor,
16 for small business. I also see as an
17 opportunity for my kids to fix some of
18 the problems that have just been built
19 onto Long Island since the 30s, and I
20 think this is a positive step. I think
21 it's good development. I think these
22 conversations are positive for the
23 development and I look forward to it
24 moving forward. Thank you.

MS. BERGER: Good evening. I live in East Meadow, just on the other side. This impacts me greatly. All my East Meadow people, they couldn't make it because they're stuck in traffic right now.

MS. BERGER: You know what? It would be nice if these folks would just be quiet when everyone is speaking. That would be the right thing to do. Right. Okay. You guys are in control. The police are on the side. Please be respectful. Please. Okay.

This is wrong for a lot of reasons. Joni Mitchell said pave paradise put up a parking lot. That's what we're doing. Paving Paradise for putting up a parking lot? Yes it is, and it could be broken down by you guys, right? The construction unions can break up the cement and put in grass, can't they?

2 Our water. We are in a drought. That
3 drought is not a secret. We don't know
4 how much really is underground. Let's
5 talk to Flint, Michigan and all the
6 people who have been who cannot use their
7 water because of fracking.

8 (Whereupon, interruption
9 from public.)

10 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: There's no
11 back and forth.

12 MS. BERGER: Get them to stop.
13 That's your job. That's what the police
14 are here for.

15 Let's talk to Flint, Michigan -- and
16 I still have time on the clock -- they
17 can't shower, they can't bathe. They
18 can't drink their water. They can't do
19 anything with the water because it's
20 destroyed. Is that what we want? That is
21 not what we want.

22 And as far as the Meadowbrook, you
23 widen the Meadowbrook, they still have to
24 get off on the exits. Then what? Then all
25 our streets are clogged. It makes no

Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Leo Stimmler will be followed by Ryan Stanton.

MR. STIMMLER: Good evening. My name is Leo Stimmler.

Presiding Officer Kopel, I think at the beginning of this hearing, you should have asked anyone who speaks if they have a financial -- if they received anything financially from the Sands Casino, they should share that, because that may compromise their opinion.

Last month in *Newsday*, Dr. Reynolds organization supposedly received

2 \$200,000. If that's true, Dr. Reynolds
3 should have shared that when he was
4 sharing his opinion about this project.

5 I have three brief comments. My
6 first is on air pollution. The flight
7 path over Hempstead and and the Nassau
8 hub is common for planes traveling to JFK
9 airport. Now an additional 23,000 cars,
10 trucks and buses traveling to and from
11 the Sands Casino will dramatically
12 increase the sources of air pollution.

13 In in August Tracy Tullis of *Newsday*
14 reported that saltwater is increasingly
15 seeping into the aquifer that supplies
16 drinking water to Nassau and Long Island,
17 as drinking wells in western Long Island
18 have been abandoned over the past few
19 decades as they become spoiled with
20 saltwater. And new research suggests that
21 saltwater intrusion is spreading.

22 Last month, Candace Ferret in
23 *Newsday* reported that the casino will use
24 750,000 gallons per day. Now, with all
25 this use of water, will this accelerate

the saltwater intrusion and be a danger to all of us?

Finally there are nearly 40,000 students, ranging from preschoolers to graduate students who attend schools that surround the Nassau hub. It's an entirely inappropriate location for a casino. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Ryan Stanton is followed by Joshua Margolis.

MR. STANTON: Good evening, everyone. My name is Ryan Stanton. I'm the executive director of the Long Island Federation of Labor. You heard from our president. You'll hear from our members. You'll hear from our affiliates.

We're concerned about the environment, right? We made a pivot as a union movement over a decade ago when we realized that when natural disasters happen and they destroy our communities and our members go out and respond to them, not only do they have to go home at

2 night and figure out how to feed their
3 families and provide for them in homes
4 that have been destroyed, just like their
5 neighbors, and without power while they
6 turn on everybody else's power, but then
7 we have to, because we represent public
8 employees in this county and on this
9 island, negotiate with local
10 municipalities who have to respond to
11 disasters. So more and more, we need
12 corporations and we need communities to
13 prioritize the environment. And
14 ultimately, Las Vegas Sands has come to
15 the table and said, we're going to make
16 investments at a scale that you have
17 never seen on Long Island. We're going to
18 study at a scale the impact we're going
19 to have on the environment.

20 If you took the Draft Environmental
21 Impact Statement and printed it double
22 sided, it stands at over six feet.
23 Anybody that supports or opposes it can
24 go to the Clerk's Office and ultimately
25 see that witness it. That's pretty

thorough, right? I don't have to go point by point through 28,000 pages. What I can do is focus on the \$150 million in infrastructure upgrades that are going to decrease traffic time, right? Long Islanders care about traffic taxes and economic opportunity. When we make investments in infrastructure, it creates economic opportunity for the people behind me.

It reduces taxes for the people behind me. And when people have a reduced tax burden and money in their pockets, they can make good environmental and economic choices, right? It's not, I'm choosing between putting food on the table or a shirt on my child. It's you know what, maybe I'm going to upgrade to the geothermal. Maybe I'm going to install a heat pump in my house. Maybe I'm going to be able to make on an individual basis across an island of 3 million people that juts out into the Atlantic Ocean, a decision that I can

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Joshua Margolis. Followed by John McFeely.

MR. MARGOLIS: Joshua Margolis, lifetime Nassau resident, father of two.

I am in support of this project for a multitude of reasons. I know these are difficult decisions to be made, but this is life changing for everybody and all considerations have to be put forward on it. I'm in support of this, but on the same note, we have to make sure that we

This is an opportunity for Long Island to grow again and be a better version of itself. So again, I'm in suport of this project. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: John McFeely, followed by Glenn Aldridge.

MR. MCFEELY: Good evening. My name is John McFeely. I'm a resident of Garden City, and I've always lived near the intersection of Stewart and Clinton

2 and Old Country Road and Clinton. To say
3 that the solution for additional traffic
4 problems that goes into at those
5 intersections is honestly ludicrous. If
6 those intersections have to take their
7 share of the additional 25 or 30,000
8 visits in a day, it just isn't going to
9 work. And those are just two of the
10 intersections that are mentioned in the
11 DEIS. There are at least 50.

12 As a person who's learned how to
13 drive in Nassau County, I honestly find
14 it insulting that the solution that's
15 proposed is to go and sit in a long line
16 and wait for a red light to change. That
17 is insulting. It's not going to work. Is
18 that the best they could come up with in
19 this DEIS?

20 I also question, since the history
21 of this project seems to be that there
22 are surprises after the fact, what does
23 it mean to leverage the service of the
24 NICE Nassau bus service? How is that
25 going to work? How are they going to get

buses directly from New York City to the project? Are they going to stay away from our roads? This just is not going to work. Extend the Meadowbrook. The person who spoke before me knows the answer. My other point has to do with the water. They so grandly offer to us a fully financed water well. To borrow a saying from an earlier political campaign, the answer is, it's the water, stupid; it's not the well. We need a well there, that may be. But the problem is still 875 gallons of water coming out of the aquifer every day.

I have to wonder why this DEIS is being approved for a corporate vagabond that has already left Salt Lake City and Pennsylvania, are they going to come here and stay, or are they going to leave? Thank you very much.

MR. ALDRIDGE: All right. My name is Glenn Aldridge. I live in Garden City. However, I am a graduate of W. Clark High School, class of 1972. I've been in the county pretty much my whole life, except for a few years in college and a couple of years in Queens.

I've seen it all. I'm older than probably -- you've got a couple of people up there older than me -- but I've seen it all. I've seen all the development. I've seen the roads expanded, new lanes, new this. It hasn't been good. It's gone one way. We keep degrading and degrading and degrading our environment. To me, it's not getting better. It's getting worse. If you go back to 1972, it was not like this.

Do you guys drive down Old Country Road or Hempstead Turnpike? Occasionally I go to Farmingdale; 40 minutes to go down Old Country Road to Farmingdale, 40

15 we certainly can't take this casino.

17 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Claudia
18 long. Claudia Long is followed by Timothy
19 Forehand.

20 MS. LONG: My name is Claudia Long.
21 Thank you and say good evening to all of
22 you at the table of legislators.

23 I just agree with those who have
24 spoken on the water issue, the traffic,
25 the salt water studies. But it's all the

life. I'm here in support of the Sands

MS. KRUG: I'm Lynn Krug, Garden City resident. I want to talk about our resources and our priorities. LV Sands intends to pump 5.3 million gallons of water each week. To put that in perspective, and using data in their own document, this one project by itself would increase water usage in the Uniondale Water District by 11%.

To gauge cumulative impacts, the report predicts water usage for the other planned projects in the Town of

Hempstead, including the NYU Langone Medical Center right across the street. The Sands project, by a wide margin, will use more water than all eight of those projects put together.

Our aquifer is already under stress, according to the USGS and the DEC. In fact, we are already pumping in excess of the New York State DEC caps. So what happens if the DEC starts enforcing those caps? Do we forego the hospital and other developments that will provide housing, office space, and shopping in favor of a casino related project/resort just because they showed up first and pave their own way with money? Are we really going to hand over a portion of our most precious resource in service of a project that will enable an out-of-state company to extract wealth from our community?

They paint a rosy picture of rainfall, and I quote around the subject area, unquote, as if the aquifer around the subject area is separate from the

rest of Long Island. There may be many water districts, but we are all connected and share the same aquifer. Water usage in one spot most assuredly impacts every other spot.

If we are talking about rainfall, according to the 2023 report of the Long Island Commission for Aquifer Protection, drought periods have outnumbered wet periods in the past ten years, and aquifer levels were dropping at the end of the study period in 2023. Everyone knows that we are in a severe drought, inexhaustible, and focus on the big picture. As the Port Washington Water Commissioner said, withdrawals from the middle of the island affect the water on the coasts, even though it's hitting us on the coasts first. We are an island. We have limited resources that are already diminished. We need to prioritize how we use them. I, for one, will prioritize a hospital over casino any day. The threat is real. Experience has shown that once

1
2 saltwater intrusion takes place, it will
3 not reverse. The South shore and north
4 shore water wells that had to be shut
5 down should be the canary in the coal
6 mine. We ignore those warnings at our own
7 peril. Vote no Casino. Thank you.

8 LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: Anthony Simon,
9 followed by Monica Kiley.

10 MR. SIMON: Good evening, and thank
11 you for committing your time and your
12 attention for this important project. My
13 name is Anthony Simon. I am the smart
14 transportation general chairman for the
15 Long Island Railroad employees. I'm here
16 today to not only add our voice of
17 support for this project, but to support
18 the mitigation elements that are in this
19 DEIS, specifically two that align with
20 the Long Island Railroad service that
21 demonstrates Sand's commitment to the
22 region, not just with words, but with
23 dollars.

24 First, within the DEIS, Sands is
25 committing to rebuilding the MTA Long

Island Railroad Bridge that spans the Meadowbrook Parkway and covers the cost entirely. As *Newsday* detailed today, the vast majority of the Long Island Railroad bridges are old and in need of extensive maintenance, repairs, or replacements. For a private developer to take on the cost burden of the extensive project is unheard of for the MTA and must be applauded. And anyone that rides a Long Island railroad or pays taxes in New York state.

Second, as you know, the Coliseum site is not located within reasonable walking distance from a Long Island Railroad station, which in the Coliseum history has meant that all employees and visitors must drive to the site. As detailed in the DEIS, the proposed development will use the Hempstead station as its hub and offer shuttle service at regular intervals. Simple solutions will allow easy, efficient access from the Long Island Railroad to

the resort site for both employees and visitors, something that the site has never benefited from in the past.

With the addition of Sands commitment in the DEIS to regular shuttle service, these investments provide reliable form of mass transit commuting for the 7800 permanent workers that will operate the resort, as well as our visitors. As a member of the IDA, I know that as a region, we must continue to allow for economic development if we are to be sustainable and keep taxes down.

The site right now is highly

3 once in a lifetime opportunity to add

6 region, and a developer who is committed

10 grandfather, I am grateful that such a
11 thorough and robust environmental review

13 unprecedented infrastructure investment
14 will ensure while we redevelop this prime
15 entertainment hub, we are sure to protect
16 our communities and our quality of life.

17 I urge you to move this forward to
18 the final EIS, and all of us will keep
19 the Long Island Railroad on track. We
20 look forward to welcoming employees and
21 visitors on the railroad and visiting the
22 Sands resorts as well. We are ready. So
23 if you're worried about the traffic, come
24 on the trains and ride.

MS. ARSO: Hi, I'm Alex Arso.

LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: Thank you. Please, go ahead.

MS. Arso: My name is Alex Arso and I'm here on behalf of the Long Island Association, Long Island's leading business organization. The LIA supports Sands Project and the robust Draft Environmental Impact Statement that has been presented.

The DEIS outlines a thoughtful and forward looking approach to addressing Nassau County's unique challenges, while enhancing the quality of life and strengthening infrastructure.

Expanding the tax base on Long Island is key to addressing our region's high cost of living, and the Sands New York Project achieves this by generating

2 substantial new revenue streams. The plan
3 includes a major expansion of the
4 Meadowbrook Parkway and Sands New York
5 will invest \$150 million on this project,
6 which will reduce traffic congestion,
7 improve regional connectivity and unlock
8 economic potential for Nassau County.

9 Their sustainability efforts include
10 a LEED Gold Certification for buildings,
11 renewable energy and protection of
12 Hempstead plant ecosystem. The project
13 also directs payments to Nassau County
14 and the Town of Hempstead, which can be
15 used towards property tax stabilization,
16 education, educational programs, and
17 quality of life initiatives for seniors.

18 Additionally, the design features of
19 this project, such as tree planting,
20 native vegetation, and concealed light,
21 will transform the underutilized Nassau
22 Coliseum site into an attractive and
23 vibrant community hub. These efforts
24 demonstrate commitment to both a
25 commitment to both environmental

2 responsibility and the well-being of
3 Nassau County residents.

4 In addition to these contributions,
5 Sands New York's project will be an
6 economic driver, creating thousands of
7 union construction jobs and permanent
8 positions for hospitality, retail and

12 small businesses and boost Long Island's
13 tourism sector. These jobs and

But now that I realized, and I should have realized, that it's about the DEIS, I'm going to only narrow it to that which will make it a lot shorter.

I'm here today to share my concerns about short term thinking behind the proponents of the Sands Casino. Short term thinking that has led to the downfall of civilizations, projects and institutions throughout history. That includes short term profits, too.

Regarding the DEIS, the lesson is clear. When decisions are made for short term gain, rather than long term vision, the consequences of far reaching and often devastating. History is littered with countless examples of how short term enticements little bribes here, money for

Creativity and small businesses while creating more --

LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: Mr. Miller, your time is done.

Miss Kiley, please begin.

MS. KILEY: Thank you.

The environmental review process, known as SEQRA, is designed so that decision makers can assess the environmental harm a project will do, and weigh that harm against an economic good

2 or a societal good. In regards to the
3 casino, our Legislature will be weighing
4 environmental harm, societal harm and
5 economic harm. There is no long term good
6 that can come from allowing a gambling
7 operator to construct the second largest
8 casino in the country on our doorstep. We

11 At the end of the environmental
12 review, you, the Legislature, will be
13 voting on whether to move forward with
14 the casino. We, the people, are expected
15 to trust that you will vote in our best
16 interests. We are asked to believe that
17 you will put our concerns first above

19 allies, and of course, above those of a
20 Las Vegas gambling operator.

21 The County has done no public
22 education about this issue. There have
23 been no mailers, no town halls, no
24 letters to constituents. The County has

The County has not done any research on what the social fallout will be from a casino that will take 2 billion in gambling losses from our people every year. Instead, the Las Vegas sales pitch has been allowed to stand unchallenged and serve in the place of fact. And I count the 28,000 page DEIS as a continuation of that sales pitch.

We're expected to read 28,000 pages in a month. Give me a break. Las Vegas Sands documents are on the County website, but they're labeled things like 173-24, updated version redacted. Why bother post documents if you can't even tell people what they are. You don't have a timeline of events for anyone. Residents don't know what's coming next. They get a bare one week minimum notice of meetings. And where is it? Buried in Newsday and buried on your website, can't even make the home page of your website. And by the way, tonight's meeting was not

Where are the public comments about the casino that were sent to the Legislature in August and September? We have a right to see those. And you've ignored our FOIL request. It's embarrassing. The Nassau County Planning Commission public comments were 99% against the casino. That's embarrassing. That's why we can't see the thousands that were sent in August and September. We need to ask why.

LEGISLATOR MCKEVITT: All right. Next Terry Coniglio, please. Followed by Kevin O'Keefe.

Miss Coniglio, please proceed.

MS. CONIGLIO: My name is Terry Coniglio, and I'm speaking on behalf of Hofstra University.

On November 21st, a 28,000 page Draft Environmental Impact Statement was released by the County. This hearing, 19 days later scheduled to begin at 5 p.m. provides wholly inadequate time for

review and for testimony concerning this massive document. Additionally, January 6th for written submissions is an inadequate time to provide comments.

From the limited review that we have been able to conduct, it's clear that the draft statement provides the community and the county Legislature with insufficient information about the potential long lasting impacts on Nassau County stemming from the proposed casino development. There are many consequential environmental harms that are not adequately addressed by the current documents. For example, the Traffic Impact Study did not address certain key locations such as Mineola Boulevard and Second Street, and Post Avenue and Union Avenue, among others. The study does not appear to include significant data to justify or confirm the anticipated trip generation volumes, nor are the proposed number of gaming stations identified, making it difficult to confirm the

accuracy of the estimated traffic generation volumes, which could be more than 20,000 cars daily.

There appears to be insufficient data for the hotel and restaurant trip generation's conclusions. The statement referencing a public attraction in relation to the daily attendance number, without any information about what that public attraction will be and what its environmental impacts may be.

There is inadequate data provided about the number of employees, their shifts, their commuting and their parking.

More information is needed about the water demand in phase two and the proposed new water supply well, especially in light of the recent and well-documented problems with Long Island water supply.

More information is needed about the energy demand, funding for the substation expansion and the impact if significant

additional users are identified.

And there is insufficient data regarding potential public health, socioeconomic and demographic impacts from the problem gambling.

In addition, the draft statement contains conclusions that are not supported by any evidence. For example, an extra 20,000 cars per day will not cause excessive pollution because most people will be driving electric vehicles in the near future.

These are preliminary comments in light of the short time frame to review this massive document provided. If public participation regarding the future of our community is truly desired by the County, we urge the Legislature to hold further hearings and extend the time for written comments by at least an additional 60 days. There's more we could say if we and the rest of the community had adequate time to review the draft. It's clear that the development does not take adequate

I look around here and the only people I see from East Meadow are our elected official and many of the people who are opposing the Sands Casino. Okay, I don't see the local board. I don't see them here. Are they going to speak or are they here? Usually they would be here to support him. I don't see that. That's troubling for an environmental study, that they're okay with everything and not here proudly to jump in front of it.

I'm told I have to talk about the environment, so let me talk about the environment. The construction and the operation of the casino are going to have

It's not just those communities, but the community in East Meadow itself is going to have issues with the construction and the operation of the casino. There'll be garbage, debris. We have an incinerator that may be maxed out, may not be maxed out. We don't know till we find out. That's one thing.

And they keep saying it, I'm sure everyone here, including behind me, how many times are you in your car and you go, there's too many people on Long Island. I can't get home. I can't get to my son's soccer match. I can't get to the basketball. I can't get to church. Traffic is a problem. I'm worrying about it. Because I live in East Meadow, Hempstead Turnpike, Merrick Avenue. They're building a Chick fil-A, they're stuck because of environment. They're digging up the streets to provide services. Okay, traffic was crazy. And that was just for one little store. Now we're having a gigantic casino being

22 of whom live in this community. I just
23 wanted to speak on behalf of them myself.
24 We are strongly in favor of the
25 Draft Environmental Impact Study and want

5 just say I am behind Sands Casino. I am a

7 resident. The traffic in the area is

13 MR. CHU: Sammy Chu, CEO, Edgewise

17 Sand's commitment to sustainability

We were able to have in-depth discussions on topics ranging from water conservation and reuse to waste management. These conversations translate into design and it's clear from those designs that Sands is not only committed to being a friend to the environment, but also a friend and a member of the community.

Sands is committed to building to LEED Gold standard. A remarkable accomplishment for a project the size this world, this world recognized standard ensures careful review and

MR. MAJKUT: Good evening, Mr. Presiding Officer, ladies and gentlemen of the board. My name is Jack Majkut. I'm a business representative for the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 25.

Local 25 represents over 2000 working families here on Long Island. I'm here today to support the efforts of Las Vegas Sands. The Draft Environmental Impact Statement prepared by VHB Engineering is absolutely one of the most comprehensive impact studies to date, and as everybody has noted is 28,000 pages.

The DEIS shows the Sands overwhelming commitment to the community. The statement outlines Sands \$150 million commitment to mitigate any potential

And I speak tonight on the strains for both our Police Department and our Fire Department. Our 55 member Police Department, and are a little over 100 young volunteer Fire Department. The Sands Casino and Project and hotels will put a strain on both. The reason being

MR. MULDOON: Good evening, everybody. And thank you for taking the time to listen to the residents of Nassau County. I'd like to make it clear. I'm a resident of Garden City. Most of you guys probably know by now that I'm not born and raised in Garden City. A lot of my good friends are cops, firemen, union guys, construction guys. And I want to say first that I think 99% of this room wants the union to do great work in this area. We just don't want this particular project because we don't think it's good for Nassau County. It's certainly not good for all the surrounding villages. And that's really the crux of this. It's about what can we do that's best for Nassau County and have an amazing project or projects over at that area, but not Sands Casino for a lot of different reasons.

You look at Atlantic City, a lot of

So with that said, I am here to make two observations and to have two asks. The first observation has been made by many. It has to do with the traffic on on Meadowbrook Parkway in particular, traveling north to south, and south to North.

The little that I believe I Know about the environmental plan, I've gotten from local media. If this is not true, I'd be a happy person, that the roadway. Improvements on Meadowbrook Parkway are going to extend from Northern State Parkway down to around Hempstead Turnpike. I believe that if if those improvements are going to be made and they are going to work, they need to go through to at least Southern State Parkway on both ways.

The second piece to that is, anybody who is traveling anytime from 3 o'clock on as late as 7:30, you come off Northern State Parkway and you need to move over to go and exit on Old Country Road, it is

thing that I don't think has been accounted for here is the commercial traffic that's going to be created if this licence is granted to the Sands. You're going to have tens of thousands of pounds of materials moving through our village and the roadways in and around Garden City. So please keep that in mind.

I would make a very general comment with regard to the the study of 180 intersections that are going to be impacted by this construction here. Take a look at that very closely. It really bespeaks the fact that this project is so extensive and so unnecessary and harmful to the environment, that it took 819 pages of verbiage and another \$25,000 of exhibits to prove it. Ask yourself, folks, what is that about?

If you look at the other two largest casinos in this country. One is in Connecticut. It's Foxwoods, it's tribally owned. It's on 1625 acres. If you look at the next biggest casino, it's

2 in Oklahoma, of all places. It's called
3 the Winter Wonder Park. That's in a
4 community of 400 people. Ladies and
5 gentlemen, the impact environmentally is
6 extraordinary. And you've heard both
7 sides here. So you know, the decision you

Mary Carter Flanagan, the mayor of the Village of Garden City. Thank you for the opportunity this evening to comment on the recently released DEIS. You've seen me here before, and I'll just reiterate, the Village of Garden City's Board of Trustees remains unanimously and unequivocally opposed to this casino project. As I've mentioned before, we've passed three resolutions on the matter opposing the casino. All votes in favor of that opposition. County that gives Sands the possession and site control required to advance zoning applications and secure approvals for the Casino. SEQRA prohibits such segmentation. We have a flawed neg dec. There are very real consequences to the County's improper segmentation, because the County's environmental review of the 42 year lease was deeply flawed. It failed to define a proper "no action baseline" against which to measure the impacts of the 42 year lease, thereby ignoring potentially significant impacts and making the conclusion drawn in the negative declaration, arbitrary and capricious.

You have heard from three other members of the Village board of trustees and have spoken to the very serious impacts on traffic, air quality community impacts, emergency services and water. So I would ask for additional time. We'll be submitting extensive comments, and I thank you for your attention to this very

Everybody's complaining about the environment, okay? Everybody's complaining about the air. But they all want the resources from the County. But they don't think about what \$6 billion is. Everybody says it's not about the money. Money talks; Bullshit walks. Okay. All right. And that's it. That's all I got to say. And it's going to create a lot, of lot of jobs okay. That's it. Thank you.

MR. SPURGEON: Hello. Thank you for

3 of an organization called Boss. Boss
4 represents 30 companies that serve as

6 approximately 3-4000 employees over the
7 course of those 30 companies, 3-4000
8 voting employees, taxpaying employees who

10 County and throughout Long Island.

11 I am a lifetime Long Island
12 resident. I have seen over those years,
13 proposal after proposal, get shot down
14 because people don't have the foresight
15 to see the improvements that it can

18 This is a LEED Gold Project. Now, if
19 you're not in the construction field, you
20 don't understand what a LEED Gold Project

25 requirements, to the air requirements, to

And so I echo the comments that he made about the work that we did, and that the document reflects priorities that were developed in the committee and discussed at length and the report did a good job.

I also reflect Adrienne Esposito's comments that there are a few edits we'd like to see a few tweaks. She commented that she'd like to clarify some of the rigorous measures, especially for waste management and water, and that there has to be a mechanism identified to monitor

The document does speak about the future, and it does have provisions for safety and other things that get monitored throughout the life of the document. There are a few areas of tweaks that, as a Uniondale resident I would add and there are things that were discussed there.

On page 723 of the document at 605 in the actual document, but 723 in the PDF, it talks about 40% of the community benefits program going to community facilities, and in Uniondale we want it to go to facilities and programs. It won't be sufficient if it's just facilities. So we want to look at some of the detailed language and just make sure that certain things are included.

We also had discussions with Sands that indicated that the 2% annual inflation increase would also pertain to the community benefits package of money

2 for everyone's benefit. So it was named
3 for Nassau County. It was named for the
4 Town of Hempstead, but we also want it in
5 the community benefits package, which
6 seemed to be under a different paragraph,
7 that it will be adjusted for the
8 inflation.

9 On page 164, the language spoke to

I know Nassau County is considering some legislation. The surrounding communities need that to help us.

But overall, I support the document and the DEIS. Thank you.

MS. MAYNARE: Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Terrific. Thank you. Riva Hickson, are you here? No. Richard Catalano. Followed by Ed Carr.

MR. CATALANO: As a CPA for 40 years, I'm going to limit my comments to the economic aspects that were in the study. The report compares the casino economic output to the current Colosseum. A more appropriate comparison would be to an alternative projects such as a life science complex.

The report does not disclose the number of visitors during weekdays and weekends. Sands knows how enraged your constituents would be if they actually

knew. A smaller casino in Boston suburb gets 50,000 visitors on peak weekends.

The report does not disclose the percentage of visitors who will be from Long Island or off Long Island. Where will the \$2 billion in gambling losses come from.

The report did not analyze the economic harm to our local restaurants and downtown shops by diverting \$2 billion into gambling losses.

You also didn't analyze the impact on your sales tax revenues. When you take \$2 billion of discretionary sales, taxable dollars, and you convert them into gambling losses, you lose that sales tax revenue.

The report did not analyze the economic harm to Roosevelt Field and the surrounding shopping district that's going to be impacted by the construction and all the result in traffic jams.

The report falsely states 15 times that a local schools would get \$217

1
2 million a year. To quote a previous
3 speaker, "that's bullshit". There is no
4 provision to require the State to provide
5 more state aid to schools near a casino.
6 Albany gets 80% of gaming taxes. That's a
7 \$400 million cash grab that goes from
8 Nassau County and Long Islanders to
9 Albany; money we will never see again.

10 The report ignores a negative impact
11 on home values for those unfortunate
12 residents who are going to live near the
13 casino like Uniondale, East Meadow,
14 Westbury. Will the County indemnify
15 these homeowners for these economic
16 losses? Think about it.

17 The report ignores the economic harm
18 to Hofstra University. My fellow alum Tom
19 McKevitt turned his back on this
20 institution. I was shocked to find in the
21 report that Legislators McKevitt and
22 Bynoe, both inappropriately co-chaired
23 committees that were established by Sands
24 solely to lobby residents for this
25 massive casino; that was inappropriate.

You have spent \$0 on newsletters telling us about this massive casino. That is a dysfunctional legislative body.

The significance of the volume of an environmental impact statement is the number of concerns, concerns and risks that a mega project brings and identifies from environmental, health and safety, infrastructure, economic, social quality of life, and much, much more.

Statement Section 3 titled Existing Conditions, Potential Impact and Proposed Mitigation Measures. This section only identifies 15 areas of impact and their corresponding mitigation measures. This definition is very limited and unrealistic for this mega project.

But let's erroneously assume for a moment that there is only 15 areas of concern. We know for a fact that it is statistically impossible to predict the future with 100% accuracy. So the question here would be: What if the assessments are off by 5% inaccuracy, or 10%, 20% or 30%? What if there was an unforeseen omission? Can we recover without irreversible damage? These risks are real, unpredictable and cannot be underestimated.

Section 5, Unavoidable Adverse Effects, Identify Short Term and Long Term Effects. Under short term effects only identifies construction related issues. This is totally unrealistic and

I refuse to let my family's future and the future of countless other families in our community be sacrificed for corporate profits. MR. JACOBS: Good evening. Chris Jacobs, Uniondale, New York.

After reading the Sands Draft Environmental Impact statement, I have many concerns which I wish to convey. Regarding the Meadowbrook Parkway. What led to the conclusion that the Meadowbrook would only be effective for the Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum site to the Northern State Parkway, and not for the Coliseum site to the Southern State Parkway? The daily gridlock on the Meadowbrook Parkway affects this entire length of highway between the northern state and southern state parkways. This daily gridlock is what led to the communities of Uniondale and East Meadow to be identified as disadvantaged, due to their close proximity to the Meadowbrook

daily congestion.

As for widening the Meadowbrook Parkway from Zeckondorf Boulevard northbound to North State Parkway and southbound to Old Country Road from the Northern State Parkway, that does not alleviate the severe congestion occurring from the south. In particular, widening the Middlebrook South bound for the Northern State Parkway up until the old Country Road interchange will create a dangerous bottleneck. Bottlenecks create traffic jams, increase fuel burning, increase air pollution, and increase accidents. Quoting the DEIS report, "designing truck travel routes that avoid or minimize impact to disadvantaged communities" funneling a majority of commercial traffic onto Old Country Road and Hempstead Turnpike to avoid disadvantaged communities exacerbates Nassau County's gridlock crisis. Just take a look right outside this building to see all country roads, high volume of

Regarding disadvantaged communities, the proposed shuttle bus service is going to utilize the Long Island Railroad's Hempstead station exclusively. Nassau County's average asthma rate is 20. Hempstead Village has a county high asthma rate of 69.1. How does adding traffic to their roads to mitigate the asthma rates?

Also, I have read no useful plans on the DEIS on traffic mitigation, aside from futile turning lane extensions and traffic signal reprogramming solely on the roads in immediate proximity to the Coliseum site. What about the many other gridlock roads nearby and the surrounding communities like Uniondale Avenue and Merrick Avenue, just to name a few, that was studied according to this report? What is the plan for them?

1
2 Finally, comparing the Coliseum
3 traffic when events occurred there
4 frequently and the fabricated projected
5 traffic numbers for this proposed project
6 is incomparable. The Coliseum events
7 where most four times a week and very
8 time specific, particularly in the
9 evening to nighttime hours. The Sands
10 casino would operate 24/7 365 days a
11 year. After reading all those pages in
12 the DEIS, my question I always ask is
13 still unanswered. With the projected
14 30,000 more vehicles daily with this
15 proposed project, how does adding traffic
16 to our overburdened roads reduce our
17 gridlock and mitigate asthma rates,
18 especially on disadvantaged communities?
19 Have a great evening.

20 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Pearl
21 Jacobs, followed by Daron Spleen.

22 MS. JACOBS: I am wearing my
23 environmental racism shirt today. After
24 reading through the DEIS report,
25 specifically the section that speaks of

high asthma rates in our disadvantaged communities, I should be wearing a neon sign that flashes "environmental racism". I found the report to be dismissive and disingenuous.

The report states that asthma is a chronic disease and people live with asthma every day, and traffic related emissions contribute to some of the criteria pollutants that may exasperate asthma.

The New York State DEC report, however, states that traffic congestion and traffic gridlock are the primary reasons of high air pollution levels and high asthma rates in Nassau County's disadvantaged communities.

The DEIS report states that statewide total and age adjustment asthma deaths are down roughly 25% from 2020 to 2021. Could this down turn in asthma deaths be a result of the lockdown during the pandemic, when New York State roadways were free and clear? So then

this data would substantiate the correlation between less traffic and lower asthma rates.

The DEIS report goes on to imply that asthma is influenced by a combination of genetic, environmental and lifestyle factors as well as socioeconomic status, and access to healthcare can influence the prevalence and severity of asthma, thus complicating the assessment of the direct impact of air pollution. There is nothing complicating the asthma assessment, as the New York State DEC report has already made the assessment and determined that the primary cause of asthma in Nassau County's disadvantaged communities are due to environmental harms, in this case, specifically high traffic volumes and gridlock.

I found the mitigation strategies to be disingenuous as well. For example, designing truck travel routes that avoid or minimize impact to disadvantaged

2 communities. Great idea. Let's spread the
3 pollution throughout our neighboring
4 communities. Physical mitigations such as
5 the planting and upkeep of trees, green
6 infrastructure, and other means of carbon
7 sequestration; this hypocrisy is at its
8 finest. As a project of this magnitude,
9 the sight of seven football fields that
10 would operate 24/, with an estimated
11 increase of traffic over 30,000 vehicles
12 per day, will kill off our projected
13 Hempstead Plains, a prairie habitat that
14 is home to 250 species of plants and
15 numerous rare and endangered species.

16 Again, this DEIS report minimizes
17 the impact that this project would have
18 not only on disadvantaged communities,
19 but every community in Nassau County. It
20 boggles my mind that us all legislators
21 who are elected to put the best interests
22 of your constituents at the forefront,
23 would think that this project would bring
24 improvement to our county. In the past
25 several years, many of you have adamantly

Saying yes to this project will be saying yes to environmental racism. Thank you.

Go ahead, sir.

MS. SPLEEN: Good evening, Legislative Board. My name is Daron Spleen and I'm the executive director of Morris Mentors, a mobile STEM organization that teaches STEM to our kids throughout Nassau and Suffolk County, equipping our youth with 21st century skills in the current booming industry in the world.

Of these total trips, walking/bicycling trips range from 27 to 90 trips depending on the peak hour.

Okay, so the problem here is you guys did not interview anybody in this who actually works and goes to school in those areas. Did you interview anybody and say, hey, look, you work there. How long does it take you to get to work?

All told South Shore Audubon has identified 20 diverse environmental areas of concern where this DEIS is deficient. 5 When our team completes its comments

MR. MEYER: Good evening, Ray Meyer. I did fill out a slip for the record. Thank you for asking.

I'm a resident of Garden City. Third generation resident. Virtually my whole life. I was really proud of my Board of Trustees and other fellow residents from Garden City voicing their opposition tonight. I think they spoke intelligently with authority and passion, and they were calm. And they represented my village very well. I'm here to support them.

I'm also here to ask that this Body, the Town of Hempstead, be a little bit more visible in what they think about this project. The silence is absolutely deafening.

The Long Island Railroad as part of this proposes that they're going to run more trains. I live on the Hempstead Line. We have two lines that run through our village. The Long Island Railroad almost destroyed the line on the northern edge of ours. We've had to spend time and money in lawsuits and building up shrubs to match the renderings that the Long Island Railroad proposed would be the result of the final project, and their final project was nothing like that. So I don't have faith in the Long Island Railroad to help out with this project.

When there's a concert at Forest Hills, Garden City feels the impact the whole Hempstead Line feels the impact. When there's a concert at Forest Hills

2 and a hockey game or a concert at UBS, we
3 also feel that impact. Now we'll feel the
4 impact of a new casino, and it won't be
5 just Hempstead, it'll be Westbury and
6 it'll be Mineola. And those buses will
7 come down Franklin, go down Stewart. And
8 no matter how much you widen the roads,
9 it's just going to bring more people. It
10 takes me 40 minutes to get across town of
11 my own village. It takes me an hour and a
12 half to drive my daughter to a lacrosse
13 practice in Farmingdale.

14 What I know is that you're all very
15 intelligent people, and you live in this
16 village, and you're just as intelligent
17 as I am, or more. And you know that these
18 are problems. That's what makes your
19 silence frustrating. That's why I'm here.
20 I never come to these. And you have a
21 village of people that are furious. And
22 the Village is going to go through the
23 SEQRA. The County has not done anything
24 to take responsibility to explain any of
25 this to the residents that they
